## March Campaign for Scout Pledges

### Of Poppies For Saturday

Arrival of the time of the year for the annual Boy Scout fund campaign in the South Plains area perfected and ready to go with 15 teams due to make their jump off Monday morning, November 8, under the direction of Jas. F. Potts.

Potts was named fund campaign chairman for Floydada by Edgar Hayes, of Lockney, Blanco district finance chairman, last week. Although no set amount of money to be raised has been stipulated, the local Scout committee hopes that last year's \$1,100 will be exceeded this year. The goal will be to see at least 10 per cent of the community's population.

**New Scout Field Man**  
The fact that Blanco district now has a field man in the person of Raymond Lupfer, who is putting considerable drive into scout work in the five-county area which he serves, is expected to make a considerable difference in the ease with which funds are contributed to the cause. All funds raised on the South Plains will remain in the 20-county area to cover operating expenses.

Noting that it goes to the national organization, it was pointed out by J. W. Reize, district chairman, "It takes about \$5 per year per boy to see Scouting through on an efficient basis," said Mr. Reize, "and this should give an idea of what our objective should be in this district."

The local committee will do their utmost to make a one-day campaign in Floydada. Total to be raised in the 20-county South Plains council area to meet the budget for the year is \$46,500.

Lockney, South Plains, Crosbyton, Ralls, Lorenzo, and Silverton are the other towns in Blanco district, which are due to carry on campaigns simultaneously.

## Jaycees Go All Out For Ellis Plan Reform Penitentiary System

Special guest for the Tuesday meeting of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce will be D. Whitley of Lubbock, Whitey, the state vice-president for the Texas Jaycee organization. The Texas Jaycees endorsed the "Ellis Plan" and an active campaign to sponsor a plan for the rehabilitation of Texas Prison system.

A letter to the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce, Governor J. B. Jester gives his thanks for the support the Jaycees are giving to the Ellis plan. The plan calls for an increase in salaries, maintenance and staff positions in the system, correction of abuses in the system, and provides full facilities for the rehabilitation of the prisoners. D. B. Ellis for whom the plan is named, and the Texas Prison system predict that within a few years the prison system would be self-supporting.

Governor Jester, "I can think of no more important civic service than in bringing to the attention of the people of Texas the extreme importance of securing full and adequate support for this plan, and I urge you most heartily to your public-spiritedness in this matter."

## Burglars Take 10 Typewriters From School

Commercial department of Floydada High school is minus 10 good typewriters this week at a cost of a thousand dollars or so, and with only 25 left and four or five machines that have been impressed in service are having something of a difficult time taking care of the typing students.

of the school, missed the machines at about 7:30 o'clock. Local officers and the typewriter agency were notified at once. The serial numbers of the machines were given the authorities, Supt. I. T. Graves said.

The school people had hopes of early recovery, which are fading as days pass and there is no word. The burglars, it is speculated, could have the machines a thousand miles away taking off the old numbers and substituting new ones.

Besides the typewriters the burglars took a \$5 alarm clock and a \$2 paper cutter.

Entry into the building was obtained by prying open the locked outside west door, and entering the laboratory of the commercial department also by prying open that locked door. Apparently the burglars wore gloves as no fingerprints lead have been found.

**More Than 200 At Methodist Conference**  
Plainview District conference conducted at First Methodist Church in Floydada on November 2 was attended by more than 200 persons, ministers, lay delegates and visitors.

According to Lockhart the board has received no induction calls yet. Names of men who will be called up to receive the pre-induction physical, the place for their examination was not indicated by Mr. Lockhart, who said that this information as well as the information on an induction call would be given as soon as the information reached his office.

Perfecting the CROP organization of Floyd county farmers and church people will be the theme of a meeting here tomorrow afternoon in the county court room at 2 o'clock.

Ben Quebe, of Providence, who was named chairman of the committee on October 28, has issued the call for the meeting and has especially asked the attendance of church pastors of every organization in the county. This meeting in particular will set up a county CROP committee. It follows a meeting held on October 28 when a group decided to set up the county organization to attempt to do a fitting share in caring for destitute children in war torn lands in cooperation with the church organizations set up for that purpose.

Officers elected at the meeting last Thursday include Ben Quebe as chairman, A. H. Kreis as treasurer and Robert Crowell as secretary.

In the call for the meeting tomorrow afternoon Mr. Quebe says that a full discussion of plans will be held and that community committeemen will be named.

CROP is the abbreviation for Christian Rural Overseas Program, a nation-wide movement among church and farm people. Mr. Quebe was impressed into the service as county chairman by the group which met last week. A very busy man with many personal, community and county responsibilities, he agreed to serve with some reluctance but said last week that the plan is one which will undoubtedly appeal to the great-hearted people of the county.

## Weather Man Gives Slight Rainfall Here

The weather man, who dished out rather considerable moisture throughout the north portion of Floyd county Sunday night and northward to the Texas line and beyond, was extremely partial to the point of unkindness, it appears to residents of the south part of Floyd county and those further south.

Slight showers to half an inch of moisture fell during the afternoon and night at various points in the south half of the county, Floydada's 43-hundredths of an inch being about typical Providence, Lone Star, South Plains, Sterley, most of Lockney district, and the area below the north and east the more rain.

The Sunday downpour made it a certainty that a great deal of wheat land will be ready for cattle grazing in something like half of the county.

Sunday night's rainfall was accompanied by slight hails in some communities, where little damage is reported, however. Considerable wind blew at Floydada. Cotton is never helped by rainfall, but no more than normal damage is indicated to many thousands of bales of cotton open or opening in the fields. Heavy dews since the rain have slowed down the cotton harvest materially.

**Feed Waits For Freeze**  
While the movement of forage feeds to market has been fairly brisk, some of the fields await a freeze to dry out the grain and stalks to make it handle better and get better reception on the markets.

# EDITORIALS

No constitutional convention: The Hesperian would like to say now that we do not at this time favor a constitutional convention of Texans to re-do the state constitution, now so hopelessly (say the intelligentsia) out-moded. So far as we are concerned the constitution of Texas does fairly well. It does a dang sight better than we can hope to get from a mess of re-doing by the kind of people who hanker to do the job. The men who in 1876 fashioned the constitution Texas now has were laboring under the shadow of a great catastrophe, it is true. They had barely emerged from the Civil war which left their country financially prostrate, their substance gone, most of their able bodied men dead their homes the prey of wild Indians, their way of life a hard one. But they did have integrity, self-reliance left. They were not seeking personal and class preference under the law. Which is more than their scions of this day can say.

That's the way the Romans did: When the republic of the United States had its inception and for a century or so thereafter everybody voted. This is almost a statement of fact. Even the fur hunters made it a point to come out of the wilderness and be where they could vote when election time came. It is gradually getting less and less on the consciences of Americans to vote, in about the same pattern as the Romans, who once voted and took their respective parts in the affairs of their country. Now they do not call the Romans Roman citizens, they call them Italians and many Italians have no pride of citizenship in their country. How are American citizens taking their responsibility less and less seriously as they get further along in the history of our country? Well, in 1896 there were still 83 per cent of the citizens who voted. In 1916 the percentage dropped to 73.5 per cent. In 1944 our people voted a proudful 56 per cent. Are we going the route the Romans went? Will some foreign nation fly in de-lousers and spray us 200 years hence because we are too shiftless and no account even to pick the body lice off of ourselves? The once proud Romans did it just the way we have started.

Mental health: One out of every ten persons in the United States will some day need psychiatric care -- at this time one out of every two hospital beds in the United States is occupied by a mental patient. This appalling statement is made by another one of those innumerable organizations which flourish now in the country. In the name of a strong America--physically, morally and mentally, this organization appeals for help

to prevent and alleviate mental illness. Whether their statement of fact is a correct one we do not know. It does not seem possible to the average layman. But whether they are over-stating the fact or not it is true that mental disease has a growing number of victims. Quite likely the result of the kind of life Americans are living now. Whatever the cause, whatever the fact of the matter is about the organization making the appeal the astounding fact is that the minds of American people are wearying more rapidly in these times than formerly. Whether one would like to help in the "drive" to cure mental fatigue, mental illness, one might at least check on himself and see if the life he is living is conducive of illness of the mind. Nearly all of us had rather die or something else than an irrational mind that refuses to go along with the rest of the body.

Written before the election on the assumption that Mr. Dewey is to be elected president of the United States and will assume the office after the first of the year, this is to express the hope that the people of the nation have not made an error in their judgement of the best thing for the country. Undoubtedly Mr. Dewey will cut loose some driftwood that has accumulated in the stream of government, which will be a good thing. However, he is likely to replace some poor and only fair material with some more of the same stripe, with exactly no net gain for the people. This seems to be the expected and the only thing that can happen along that line. Since he is considered a great administrator perhaps Mr. Dewey will also figure out and work through congress some other reforms in the many duplications and over-lapping of administrative agencies. Perhaps, also, he will be more responsive to the needs of the ordinary mortal and not be a big man's big man. Prejudiced against him because of some of his mannerisms and his aloofness and the seeming smallness of his mentality, we are hoping all of this is unfounded and that the country is to have a great president who will go down the middle of the road -- for his country.

Mrs. Ruth Daniels of Dougherty gave informative paper on Nicaragua. Its geography, the people and customs and other facts about the country were interesting to all. The foods of the people were especially interesting.

Mrs. J. L. Helms of the Center club discussed Venezuela which is especially important for its vast oil fields.

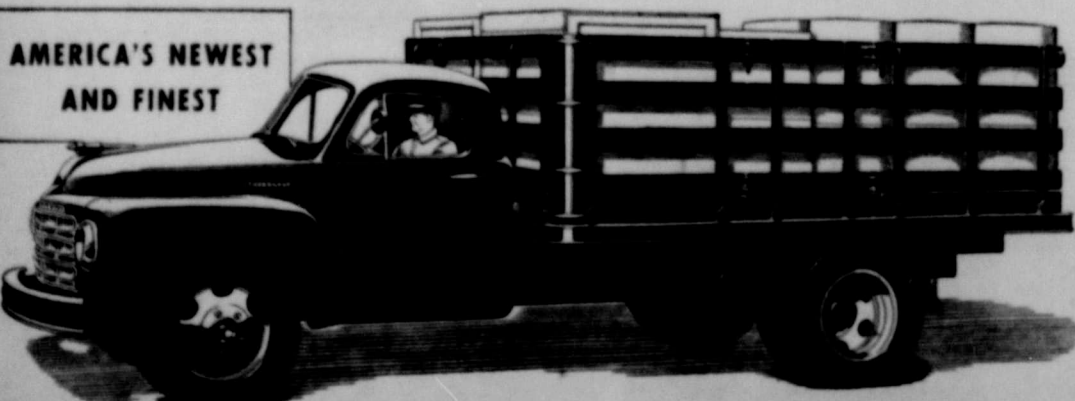

Now with Lockney having the ball they made little use of it for they were stopped and forced to kick.

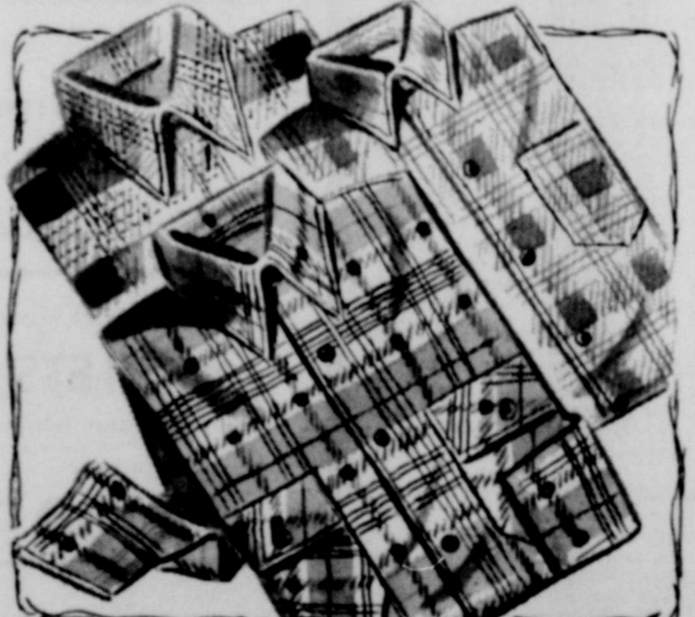

# Longhorns Have Best of Duel With Whirlwinds

Friday night before a crowd of about 2,500 persons, the Lockney Longhorns edged past the Floydada Whirlwinds, 15 to 12. The game went much as everyone had expected, although the Longhorns had more difficulty in pushing a score across than many had expected.

The game opened with the 'Winds' kicking and the Longhorns receiving. The Longhorns took the ball on their own 6 and returned it to the 28, and using weight and power, ran the ball to the 48 before being forced to kick.

The 'Winds' took over on their own 30 and three plays later, the ball resting on the 34. Jeter kicked the ball over the end zone. The ball was brought out to the twenty and play resumed, with the Longhorns starting a drive that carried to the Floydada 10. Here resistance stiffened and the 'Winds' took over on downs.

**First Period Safety**  
The first play lost 4 yards, the second play was an incomplete pass, and on the third play, Finley attempted a pass from his own six and was tackled behind the goal before he could get it off. The safety gave the Longhorns 2 points and the 'Winds' a free kick from the 20. Jeter chose to punt, and the Longhorns took the punt on their own 40 and returned it to the Floydada 40 as the period ended.

When the second quarter opened, the Longhorns wasted no time and in nine plays they had scored on a 60 yard drive, with McGowan going over from the four. McGowan's attempted placement was wide.

The 'Winds' took the kick on the 7 and returned it to the 28. On the first play from scrimmage, Finley's pass was partially blocked and Lockney intercepted on their own 31. Five plays later, Pyle, the left end went over from the 7 and McGowan's placement was good.

The Longhorns again kicked and the 'Winds' returned from the 10 to the 34. Two plays later, Pyle intercepted Finley's pass on the Floydada 46 and returned it to the

10. At this point the Longhorns could not move and the 'Winds' took over on their own five yard stripe. Jeter kicked to the 48, and the half ended with the ball resting on the 48.

During the halftime the Lockney band and pep squad put on a demonstration of how a resurrection of a dead Lockney player occurs. As the game turned out, it looked as if the wrong team was resurrected, as far as the Lockney fans were concerned.

The Whirlwind band performed at the half with June Powell twirling a flaming baton. The Whirlwind band always snappy, looked even better than usual.

The third stanza opened with Lockney kicking to the Whirlwinds who returned the ball from the 15 to the 36. The winds were unable to gain and Jeter kicked out on the Longhorn's 26. The Longhorns also unable to gain kicked to Bishop on the 22 and his return carried to the winds 33. From here Jeter carried off tackle for 16 and the Whirlwind's first, first down of the game. The 'Winds' were then unable to make necessary yardage and the kick carried to the Longhorn 30.

**Bishop Scampers 75 Yards**  
From this point the Longhorns carried their drive to the Floydada 28 before Bishop intercepted a pass on his own 25 and scampered 75 yards for the touchdown. Finley's attempt placement went wide.

The Whirlwinds kicked and McGowan took the ball on his own 15 and returned to the 35. Four plays later, lacking necessary yardage, the Longhorns kicked to the 'Winds' 36 where the quarter ended.

From this point the 'Winds' carried for another first down before being forced to kick. Jeter's boot carried over the end zone and the ball was put into play on the Longhorn 20. Here the Longhorns powered over another first before their offense bogged down and they were forced to kick.

The 'Winds' took over on their own 36 and on a pass from Finley to Handley, the ball was carried to the Longhorn 8. Jeter carried twice for seven and Finley, on a quarterback sneak carried over from the one. Both teams handled the ball after the kick off, with the Longhorns in possession of the ball on the Whirlwind's 5 when the game ended.

## Rabies Occur At All Times Of The Year

AUSTIN, TEXAS.—The "dog-days"  
of the midsummer months originally  
derived their name from the preva-  
lence of rabies spread from rabid  
dogs at that season of the year,  
but actually rabies occurs at all  
times of the year. During the past  
year the State Health Laboratory  
found 847 animal brains positive  
for rabies. Four deaths occurred in  
humans.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, states, "Few  
persons need to be warned that  
rabies is a fatal disease yet proper  
precautions against its spread are  
often neglected. Stray dogs should  
be humanely destroyed or impoun-  
ded, and all household pets should  
be vaccinated. Annual vaccination  
efficiently practiced will stamp out  
rabies in Texas."

The State Health officer stressed  
this fact as important: A dog sus-  
pected of being rabid should not  
be killed at once, but should be  
kept confined for ten days, since  
this is the infective period before  
death of the animal. If the dog does  
not develop rabies within ten days,  
the individual bitten is safe as far  
as that particular bite is concerned.  
Further observation of the animal  
should be at the discretion of the  
veterinarian since many other con-  
ditions resemble rabies.

The head of the suspected ani-  
mal should be packed in ice and  
sent to the State Health Depart-  
ment for examination. Freezing the  
brain, or killing the dog premature-  
ly or in such a manner as to in-  
jure the brain may make correct  
laboratory findings impossible.

Mere handling of a rabid animal  
is not sufficient reason for treat-  
ment, as scratches by the animal's  
paws do not ordinarily constitute  
exposure. It should be understood  
that rabies is transmitted only  
through exposure to saliva which  
gains entrance into the body wound,  
ordinarily through bite.

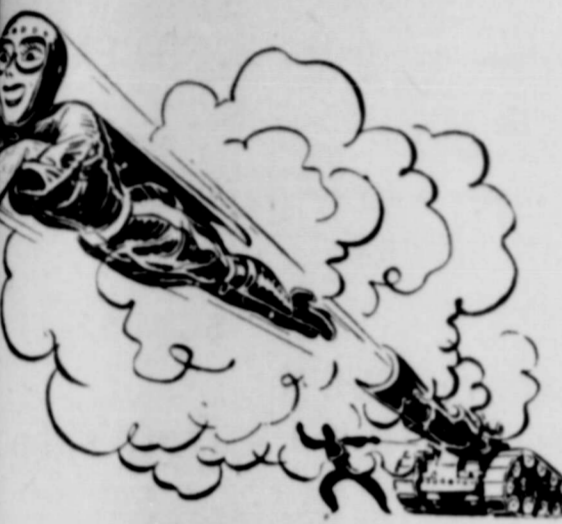

**This Bottle Washer Does The Job Well Does It Quickly**

A milk bottle washer that reduces time for manual labor tremendously, does a better job and a much faster one has been installed in the Lyndale Farm Dairy Store whole milk plant, George McAllister, head of the business reported this week.

The washer, an automatic machine, uses a caustic, then a chlorine, a hot rinse and two cold rinses to be sure the bottles are clean and free of odor or taste when they are re-filled. Nine hundred sixty bottles an hour it does just as long as a man can feed the bottles to it and will keep the power turned on. The old method of washing bottles, while effective, was too slow for a large volume of business and took too much of the time of valuable workers, said Mr. McAllister.

The additional facility at the dairy products plant, is one of many modern devices used at the plant to reduce chance of contamination and produce dairy products that are pure and wholesome.

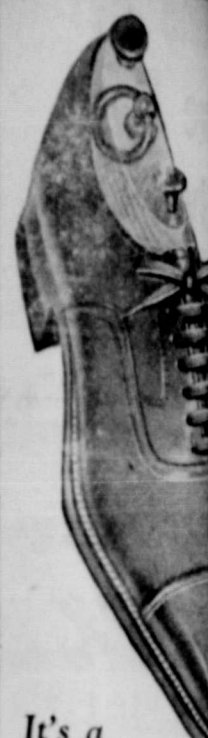
