The weather has been ideal the past three weeks and cotton is rolling in at a rapid clip. Some think the crop is about half gathered. Estimates have varied from 8,000 bales upward to 10 and 12 thousand.

You never know what a cotton crop will produce until it is all gathered. I am of the opinion that the Lorraine territory will produce nearer 14,000 bales this season than the lower figure of 8,000. Of course there is some cotton in the territory that is not much good. And some is very good. All of it is a lot better than last year's crop which almost reached 7,000 bales.

On the average I believe the crop this year is almost twice as good as it was last year. Dry land cotton is better on the average and several hundred more acres are under irrigation this year.

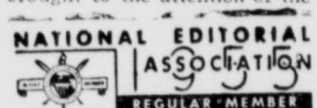

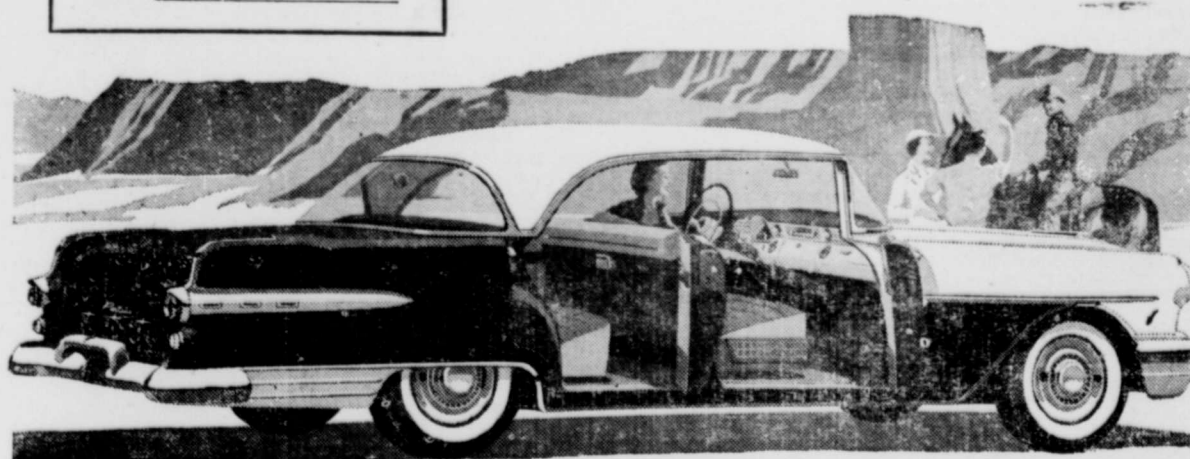

Q. If I buy a house with a GI loan, I understand I will have to make a down payment of two percent. Does the lender have any right to ask for a larger down payment?

A. Yes. The lender has the right to request a larger down payment than the two percent minimum.

Q. I am a disabled Korea veteran. If I apply for vocational rehabilitation training, will I receive the same GI allowances as a veteran training under the Korean GI Bill?

A. No. The vocational rehabilitation training program operates differently than the Korean GI Bill program. Under the former, VA will pay all training costs directly to your school and, in addition, pay you a monthly subsistence allowance. Veterans under the latter program receive a single check each month, out of which they must meet their own costs of training.

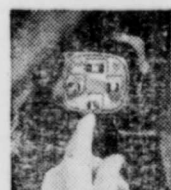

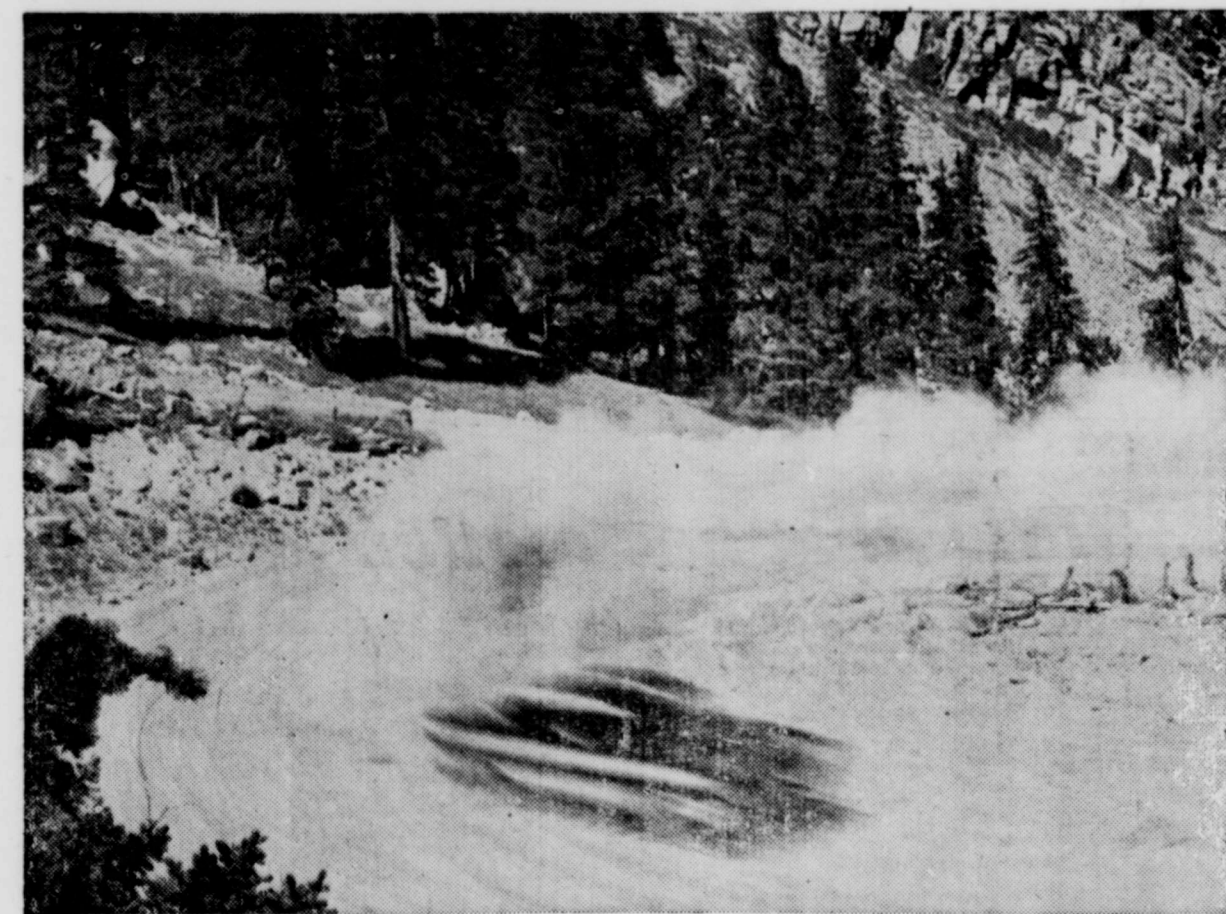
