## EXTENSIVE ADVERTISING FOR THE V-H RANCH

An order for several thousand folders for the V bar H Ranch is now in the hands of the Eagle force and will be turned out and ready for distribution within the next few days.

This ranch, owned by V. B. Hardeman, saw its first season last summer as a vacation resort for tourists. While it had only a modest beginning, only having four cottages, hundreds of tourists enjoyed swimming, boating and camping along the river.

As noted in this paper some weeks ago, about ten thousand dollars worth of improvements are now under construction on this ranch and by the time the summer season opens, it will be one of the finest resorts of its kind in the state.

Three miles of river front, with fine bathing and boating facilities, a dairy, supply house, saddle horses, added to the furnished cottages, a beautiful ranch home where rooms and meals can be secured, will provide almost every accommodation the vacationist will want.

One diversion, out of the ordinary, will be horseback riding. Horses will be kept at the ranch and parties desiring to take side trips in the mountains, will be provided with pack mules and all necessary equipment for a one or more nights camping.

## ROAD MARKERS TO BE PLACED ON HIGHWAYS

Senator Joe Burkett, one of the commissioners of the state highway department, states that the highway department has just let a contract for the erection of mile posts, markers, guide posts and warning signals for the entire system of designated state highways. All posts are to be set in 3 feet concrete uniformly 10 feet high hand made of two-inch iron pipe, and all hangers are to be made of 28-gauge iron. The posts are to be painted red and all lettering is to be white, the name and number of the highway being in six-inch letters.

Warning signs are to be placed at all curves, railroad crossings and bridges, guide posts are to be stationed at all diverging and cross roads, while the mile posts and markers are to be placed one mile apart throughout the system.

The contract was let to a company, which pays the state \$1 per post for the first year and \$2.50 per post per year for the next five years and erects and maintains the posts. A further consideration in the contract is that the company putting up the posts is permitted to place advertising boards four and one-half feet long and two and one-half feet wide on such posts as they see fit and that they shall be permitted to paint signs for commercial advertisers on either side of the board.—Rising Star Record.

## COMMITTEES APPOINTED TO SECURE FUNDS FOR JUNCTION HIGH SCHOOL

At a mass meeting at the School Auditorium Wednesday night, after considerable discussion, it was decided to ask the county judge to appoint a committee of five men, and Mrs. Riley, president of the P. T. A., to appoint five ladies, who would get together and work out some practical plan for raising the necessary funds, then carry out these plans.

The mass meeting, while only fairly well attended, with a good percentage who have no children in school, was called by the trustees for the purpose of appraising the patrons of the condition of the school finances. Only about enough money remains in the treasury to carry the school for another month. About \$1,300 additional is needed, if the school is to run nine months.

The teachers have voluntarily accepted a 10 per cent reduction in their salaries for the last two months of the term.

The following men were appointed by Judge Farmer: W. P. Riley, John Munn, M. E. Blackburn, Will Murrah and W. Z. Miller. The ladies comprising the committee, appointed by Mrs. Riley are: Mesdames John Martin, Edgar Jordan, Roy Blackburn, F. E. Garrett and W. C. Wharton.

The members of the Junior Class of the High School rendered an excellent program Monday night that was fairly well attended. The class presented two short plays in a most creditable manner and those attending were well entertained. The proceeds, after taking care of expenses, go to the P. T. A.

## NEW DUMP GROUND IS A GOOD ONE

For several years the proposition of providing a satisfactory dump ground for the town has been a troublesome one, and numerous changes have been made and much money spent in an effort to provide a permanent place, away from the view of the traveling public, yet conveniently located.

The county owns some land just east of town on the road, and two attempts have been made the past three years to use it as a dump ground. The ladies of the town, working thru the Parent-Teachers Ass'n., and assisted by the business men have spent considerable money to clear away the trash accumulations, but the grounds have gradually been filled again, and the location, right along the highway, gave the traveling public and home people as well a very unsightly view.

Both of these dump grounds have been cleared away, and under the direction of County Judge Farmer, funds, provided by the P. T. A. and Chamber of Commerce, have been used to build a strong railing on the high bluff just north of the end of the road railing leading from the South Llano bridge. A road has been worked to the railing and it is now an easy matter for cars and trucks to drive along side this railing and unload, so there is no longer an excuse for people dumping their trash in the road leading to this railing.

When thrown over this railing, trash falls many feet and this will provide a dumping place for some years anyway.

The county owns the land on either side of the road leading down the hill, and as this ground is not for the use of the general public, people using this road as a dumping ground will be subject to prosecution.

Every one ought to have enough civic pride to help keep this roadway clean, and to unload at the proper place provided, and by doing this the unsanitary and unsightly condition, existing for some years, will be avoided.

## RECORD ASSOCIATION BOOKS TRANSFERRED TO SABINAL

A letter from Bob Davis, telling of a recent meeting of the directors of the A. A. G. B. A., to Jack Turner, gives some information of interest about the future of the merged Record Ass'n.

Mr. Davis, on approval of the directors, requested Mr. Turner to send the books of the N. A. R. A. to Sabinal, where the A. A. G. B. A. is now temporarily located, with the old Ass'n. secretary, C. E. DeGroff, in charge. That was done this week, but the furniture will be stored here pending the selection of a permanent location for the Record Ass'n.'s office. This selection will likely be made at the meeting some two months from now when the South African Goat Sale is held. Present plans now seem to indicate that this sale will be held at Brady, however, Mr. Davis' letter states that the exact date of the sale cannot be announced until the imported goats reach New York port.

The following members were appointed as a committee to draft new by-laws for the merged organization: F. O. Landrum, chairman; C. A. Pepper, Fred Earwood, J. D. Cowsett and C. E. DeGroff.

## NO TRUSTEE ELECTION HELD IN JUNCTION

Some weeks ago, announcement was made in this paper that elections would be called by the County School Trustees, for elections in all common school districts. It was afterwards found that the law had been changed and that the trustees of the several districts were empowered with authority to call and conduct the elections in their respective districts. Several districts of the county held elections, but complete returns had not been made this week early enough for publication. No election was called or held in Junction district. The present trustees hold office until their successors are appointed by the county board, where no election was held.

## LIGHT RAIN FALLS WEDNESDAY NIGHT

A rainfall of about one-third of an inch was recorded at Junction early Thursday morning. Reports from over the county show the shower was only a local one. The precipitation was slightly heavier at the Mudge ranch and around Roosevelt, and over a small area of a few miles north of town. Very little fell at London, but from the E. Rohner farm to Junction it was about the same as here. From Junction south it was light, with only a light shower at Telegraph.

Telephone reports from Kerrville and other towns nearby report only very light showers.

This is the first rain of any consequence that has fallen here since last fall, and even this will do little good except settle dust and probably start some weeds and grass, unless more follows.

## APPETIZING FOODS

During winter oranges and other citrus fruits are most reasonable in price and most abundant.



Their delicious flavor stimulates and refreshes the appetite and their color adds to any dish or table.

For the first course an orange cup, filled with diced orange, a bit of grapefruit, seeded and peeled grapes and rind-flavored sugar sirup, is especially well liked.

Although the orange is delicately acid, it has an alkaline reaction which makes it especially valuable in counteracting foods that produce acids.

As a dessert, oranges make an excellent sweet course, containing sugar which is partially digested. After an elaborate and heavy dinner a light, easily digested dessert is a necessity.

**Orange Mint Cup.**—Take one cupful each of diced grapefruit pulp, orange pulp and pineapple. Mix and sprinkle with a little sugar and lemon juice—or better a lemon sirup, made by cooking sugar, lemon juice and rind with a little water. Chill and fill halves of oranges, set into sherbet cups, or simply fill the glasses with the fruit mixture. At the last moment sprinkle with finely minced mint and garnish with a sprig of fresh mint in the center of the glass.

**Orange Meringues.**—Separate into sections four oranges, without breaking the membrane. Make a sirup of one-half cupful each of lemon juice, water and any canned fruit juice, boiling five minutes. Add the oranges, cover and cook. This is complete and may be served just as it is. Place these sirup-covered orange sections on rounds of sponge cake, moisten with a little of the sirup. Prepare a meringue, using two egg whites, two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar and a tablespoonful of the composite sirup. Cover the oranges and set in a moderate oven to brown. Serve cold with some of the composite as a garnish.

**Orange Ice Cream.**—Cook two cupfuls of water with one cupful of sugar, cool and add one cupful of orange juice, a pint of thin cream, a pinch of salt. Freeze as usual.

## MORE NEW LAWS.

The following are some of the bills signed by the governor last week. Special bills and those not of general interest are omitted from the list:

Increasing the salary of county tax assessors.

Providing that lands may be admitted to water improvement districts upon agreement that they be taxed on the assessment benefit plan or on uniform acreage.

Prohibiting search and seizure without a warrant describing the premises to be searched and the goods to be seized.

Providing that chattel mortgages shall be void unless copy filed with county clerk.

Limiting water improvement district notes to four per cent of the cost of improvement.

Granting to cities title in beds of rivers running through the cities.

Compelling use of muffler cut-outs on automobiles, and prescribing penalty of from \$10 to \$100 fine or ten days in jail.

Prohibiting use of the word "bank" by an association organized under the common law and not under the banking laws. Does not apply to banks now operating.

Including railroad gasoline motor cars in the term "train" and placing them under control of the Railroad Commission.

Declaring a closed season for rainbow trout in fresh water for two years.

Authorizing county commissioners courts to have old probate records recorded by the county clerk and allowing a fee for the work.

Providing that the advertising rate for public legal notices shall not exceed the lowest classified rate.

Authorizing trustees of common or independent school districts to discharge any bonded indebtedness owned by the permanent school fund and permitting the State Board of Education.

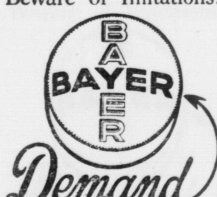

There are, of course, some who are always willing to do more than their part, and then there are always some who should contribute liberally that will have forty seven reasons and excuses why they will not help out. A little from every one will put it over.

### BUYING BY MAIL HABIT.

Mail order goods always look better in the catalogue than when they arrive. Add cost of carriage and quality of goods and you'll find you could have purchased just as cheaply at home. We are for the home merchant. They deserve your patronage.—Bryan Eagle.

Ordering by mail has become a habit with some people even when they know they will get stung. But an Athen merchant has found the best way to hold his business. He advertises regularly in the Review that he will "beat the price of any mail order catalogue."—Athens Review.

One of the mail order houses is having their advertising list of Upshur county buyers revised and brought up to date by the post office employees, and judging from the length of it, it includes about all the resi-

dents of this county. We understand that there was only \$180,000 sent out to the mail order houses from Upshur county during the past year, but that \$180,000 would have helped considerably in the volume of the home merchant's business here, and we have no doubt that the home merchant can do as well by you, in their respective lines, if you will try them. Patronize home industries and build up your own county.—Gilmer Mirror.

What would happen to the mail order houses if they assumed that the people know where they are and what they have to sell, and when goods are wanted, they can send after them? Not even the merchant, who never advertises, would miss a guess as to the speedy closing up of the mail order houses, but many merchants take this same attitude about their own advertising. They argue that "everyone knows

where our store is and what we have to sell and when anyone wants what we have they will come and get it." Of course they will, but they hardly ever want it. They want the goods they see advertised, whether it is in the catalogues or in their home newspapers, and they are going to buy advertised goods because they can buy them cheaper. The merchant that advertises his goods, keeps his customers informed as to his stock and prices, can beat the mail order houses' prices, quality considered, and he can beat the prices of the non-advertiser, because his turnover is greater and his expenses on the sales are less.

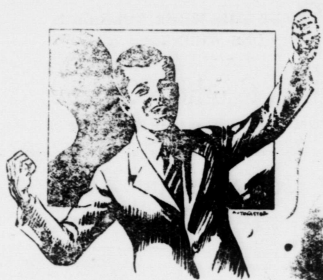

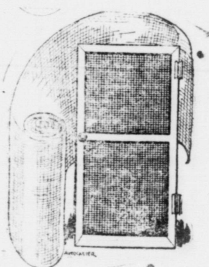

## THINGS UNUSUAL

By T. T. MAXEY

**NEW YORK'S OLDEST  
CHURCH**

St. Paul's church, which stands at  
the northwest corner of Broadway  
and Vesey street in "Little Old New  
York" is one of the three public build-  
ings erected before the days of the  
Revolutionary war which have with-  
stood the ravages of progress in that  
fast-changing city. The third church  
to be built, it is the oldest church edifice  
still standing on Manhattan Island  
—the other two having passed into  
history.

This venerable, yet exceedingly  
well-preserved house of worship was  
commenced in 1794 and first opened  
for worship on October 30, 1795. The  
conflagration some years later ruined  
a considerable portion of the city and  
laid to waste buildings on all sides of  
this religious home, but by reason of  
the flatness of the roof which enabled  
the firemen to mount it and exting-  
uish the fires which were started by  
brands blown from other buildings  
falling on its roof, St. Paul's escaped  
with but little damage. A few years  
later a steeple was added.

The interior of this splendid ex-  
ample of early-day church architec-  
ture was fashioned after that of St.  
Martin-in-the-Fields, London. The  
building is 113 feet long, 73 feet wide,  
and its tall, old-fashioned spire is  
made up of a series of differently  
shaped sections stacked one on top of  
the other.

In keeping with the majority of an-  
cient houses of worship, St. Paul's is  
surrounded by a burial plot which, in  
turn, is inclosed by a tall iron fence.  
The grave of Francis Irving bears the  
earliest inscription of all of those in  
this yard—1707. Behind the chancel  
within the church rest the remains of  
Gen. Richard Montgomery, who lost  
his life in the battle before Quebec in  
1775.

A condition which at once raises a  
question in the mind of the looker-on  
is the peculiar fact that this church  
turns its back on Broadway and faces  
toward the Hudson river and the New  
Jersey shore. It is explained that  
this came about because of the fact  
that at the time of its construction it  
was believed that the territory be-  
tween the church and the river prom-  
ised the greater development as the  
future unfolded. It has come to pass,  
however, that the reverse is true.

In 1780, a special service was held  
in St. Paul's following the inaugura-  
tion of George Washington as the first  
president of the United States.

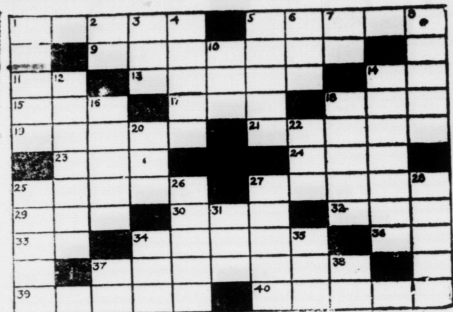

## RILEY APPOINTED SUPT. OF STATE HATCHERIES

The federal fish hatchery at San Marcos will be operated on a big scale, and a state hatchery will be established somewhere in Central Texas, according to announcement by Turner E. Hubby, who took office Wednesday as state game, fish and oyster commissioner.

The federal authorities have assured him, Hubby announced, that they will not only operate the San Marcos hatchery, but will build two others, one at Del Rio and one at San Angelo, within the near future. The state, under the new game and fish law, will build at least three hatcheries, to be located where

they will best serve the needs of Texas, and one of these is certain to be placed in central Texas, Commissioner Hubby stated.

The fish hatchery work will be actively carried on, under the policy of the new commissioner. Appointment of Mark Riley of San Marcos federal hatchery, as superintendent of hatcheries for Texas, was announced by Hubby. Riley was here Wednesday to take up his new duties.—Austin American.

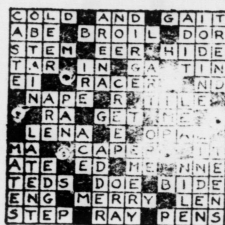
## SUTTON HIGHWAY SUIT DISSOLVED

## GOVERNOR SIGNS NEW HIGHWAY LAW

Austin, Tex., April 2.—Legislative and executive approval of state control of connected highways was assured today when Governor Ferguson signed the new highway law. This bill was introduced at the instance of the federal government so as to make the state regulations conform with the federal highway act rules, and will assure continued aid of approximately \$4,000,000 yearly from the federal government.

Under this bill the state highway department is given the exclusive power to contract for construction of the designated highways and also for their maintenance. The bill permits the department to make con-

tracts with counties to maintain the highways when it is not feasible for the state department to take charge.

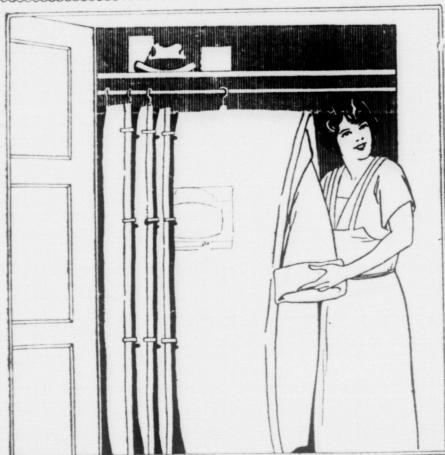

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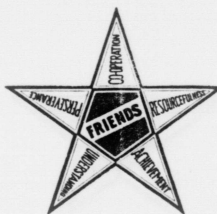
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
