Phillips' Davis No. 4 Completed; Deep Test Drills

W. B. Hinton has completed and moved off of A. O. Phillips' Davis No. 4 and set surface Wednesday on Davis No. 5 in the Pettit Ranch area. It is one location west of Davis No. 2.

Talco's deep test, scheduled for 10,000 feet, three miles southeast of Talco in the M. V. Delgado survey, was drilling at 8,690 feet it was reported on Tuesday.

The well is being drilled by W. B. Hinton, Magnolia Petroleum and on a 11,000 acre block which extends westward into Franklin County.

Tigers Lose to Trojans in Last Quarter, 13-6

A savage ground attack netted the Talco Trojans to a 13-6 victory over Deport's pass-happy Tigers here Friday night in a conference 25B game.

Coach Guy McGill's Trojans rolled up 363 yards around while holding Deport to 106.

A 4-yard jump pass from Mac McLemore to Pat Bailey gave Deport the games first touchdown. The short pass capped a 17-play, 97 yard drive.

Although the Trojans were never outplayed, they trailed at half time 6-0.

After intermission the Trojans roared in and after four plays, Jimmy Williams cracked the goal line from 7 yards out to wind up a 70 yard drive.

The Trojans drove within the Tigers 10 yard line several times only to lose the ball. Late in the last quarter Elton Belcher neatly stepped 8 yards for the second Trojan score, climaxing a 6-play 51 yard drive. Paul Miller kicked the extra point.

The Deport Tigers played a spirited top notch game throughout the contest. Many followers of the Tiger club were amazed at the stubborn defense and flashy offensive power shown in the game. The Trojan line refused to permit the Tigers to move on the ground and forced them to take to the air. Deport pitched 25 passes during the game with 9 being completed.

The Trojan line played one of its best games of the season both on offense and defense—while the entire Trojan backfield demonstrated power and speed in their department.

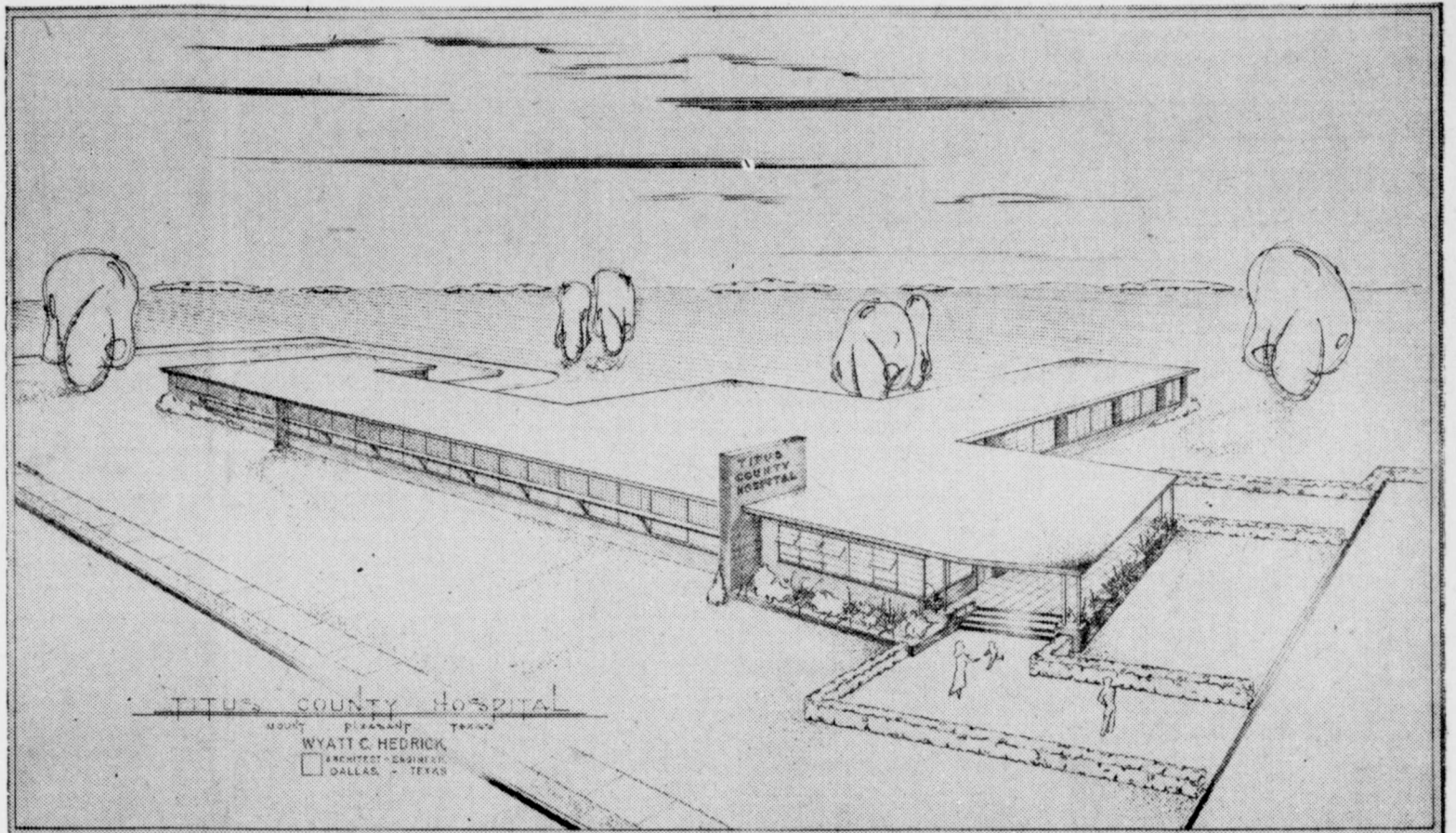

Architect's Drawing of Proposed Titus County Hospital



The Titus County Hospital is

proposed to be of modern functional design, providing a forty bed capacity with provisions to grow. This bed requirement is divided in sixteen private rooms, eight double rooms and one large ward.

Each private room will be provided with a lavatory adjacent to the bed, and a closet for the possessions of the patient. Toilet facilities are provided between private rooms in a unique design. Each double room will be provided with a closet for each patient. A bath is provided between the rooms, serving four patients.

The patients ward is located at the end of the double room wing, and designed to the size of four double rooms and two baths. Future additional rooms can be added to this wing, always leaving the large ward on the end, and

installing partitions in the present ward to form the four double rooms and corridor extension.

The nurses station is located at the intersection of the bed room wings which can be maintained with a minimum amount of help. A drug supply, a diet kitchen, and toilet are provided adjacent to this nurses station.

The nursery is near the nurses station, having a vestibule, store room and formula room. A vision window is provided from the corridor to the nursery.

Clean and dirty utility, linen room, cold drink station and snack bar are centrally located. Also centrally located will be the boiler and mechanical equipment room, kitchen, refrigerators, dining room and public toilets.

The public will enter a covered entrance to a reception room. Near the entrance door will be

information designed as an integral part of reception.

The admissions office adjoins the reception complete with record room, files and coat closet.

This entire public portion of the hospital is located at the intersection of the two bed-room wings but are arranged in a manner to isolate its traffic independent of the inner hospital, but easily accessible for visiting patients.

The operating and delivery wing is isolated from the main hospital. The delivery room is designed to serve as a second operating room. A sub-sterile room and scrub-up will be located between these two rooms. Labor rooms, work rooms and facilities for alcohol, splints, anesthesia storage and sterile closets complete this portion of the building.

Adjoining the operating, delivery and emergency suites will be quarters for X-ray, dark room,

films, doctors, nurses, metabolism and E. K. G., laboratory and physiotherapy.

All lighting, communications and signal systems will be according to the latest practice for hospitals.

The hospital will be provided with a complete, zoned system of air conditioning, including separate conditioning of the operating suite.

This will give Titus County a modern hospital with a moderate initial cost and one that can be maintained and operated economically and efficiently while the appearance of the structure will be pleasing, no money will be spent on expensive ornamentation or other unnecessary frills.

Extensive care will be executed to provide the very best facilities for the care of patients rather than for superfluous exterior adornment.

The mother was holding the infant in her lap when she arrived at the hospital, according to attendants of the hospital. The baby girl weighed 6 pounds and 10 ounces and has been named Paula Jane. Both mother and baby are reported doing nicely, according to Dr. A. G. Elder.

The young lady is the 10th child born to Mr. and Mrs. Hearron. They have one son married and the others are at home. The mother is 41 years old and the father 47.

COTTON EXPORT RAISE ALLOWED

Secretary of Agriculture Char-
les F. Brannan Monday increas-
ed the export quota of American cot-
ton 146,000 bales.

The new quota is 2,146,000 bales
for the 8-month period ending
next March 31. On Oct. 10 Bran-
nan imposed restrictions on for-
eign sales and set a preliminary
quota of 2,000,000 bales for the
eight months.

The restrictions on exports
were imposed to protect supplies
for domestic needs. A very short
cotton crop this year has caused
a tight supply situation.
The 146,000-bale increase will
be apportioned among eligible
importing countries later.

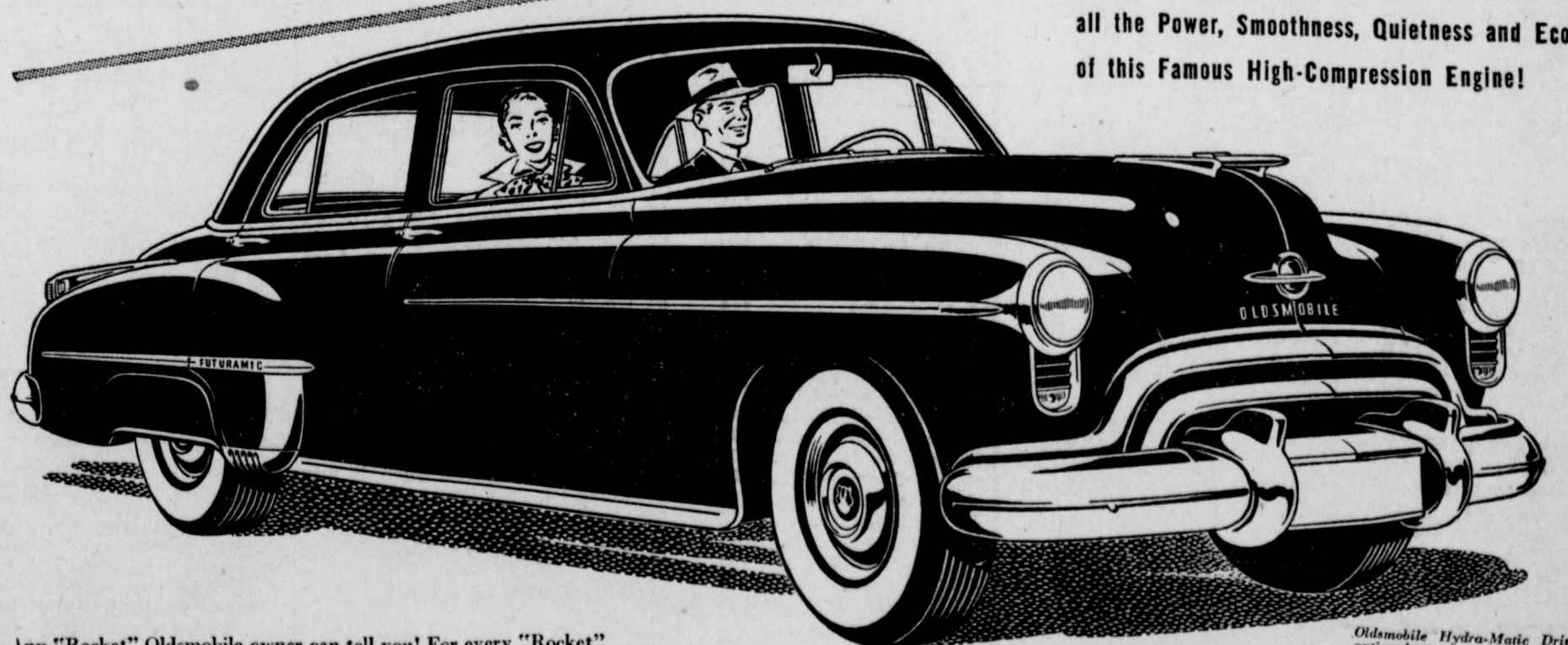

Each voter shall draw a line through one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

4. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1 of Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

5. A substantial copy of this order signed by the County Judge and attested by the County Clerk shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with the provisions of Article 74, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, supra. The County Judge is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the Courthouse door and in each of the election precincts in Titus County not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election and the said election shall be held not less

than fifteen days nor more than thirty days from the date of this order. Facts about the County Hospital Bond Election Tues., Nov., 7

NEED: 1. Titus County is centrally located in a trade area which needs a modern well-equipped 40 bed hospital, as existing hospital facilities are wholly inadequate and not up to standard of American Hospital Association. Our population of approximately 20,000 requires minimum of 80 beds according to U. S. Health standards—we now have only 30 beds. The records show that approximately one-half present Titus County hospital cases go out of county, with the result that an estimated revenue of \$100,000 per year is spent out of the county.

2. Widespread use of voluntary hospital insurance requires adequate facilities in order to secure proper benefits.

3. Best equipment is required in order for your doctor to properly and promptly diagnose and manage your illness, and proper working facilities would enable our people to have a visiting staff of specialists from other towns on call if needed.

ties would enable our people to have a visiting staff of specialists from other towns on call if needed.

4. While not a charity hospital, it would provide a method of handling charity cases.

5. We need more doctors in Titus County now, and proper hospital facilities will attract well trained men. Some 6 to 8 doctors have stayed only a short time in Titus County and left because of the lack of proper hospital facilities.

6. In event of a major explosion or fire in local or nearby towns, many lives would be saved by presence of a modern hospital.

7. Patient can save much time and expense by having first class facilities locally, also loved ones can be together in critical periods of illness.

METHOD AND COST:

1. The cost of a well-equipped, modern 40 bed hospital will be approximately \$400,000. A Federal grant of ½ this cost, or \$200,000 has been tentatively approved if we match the Government money by voting \$200,000 in Hospital Bonds. More than 500 qualified property owners have petitioned the Commissioners' Court to hold the bond election, and the Court has set the election for Tuesday, November 7th.

2. If the bonds are voted, they will be issued when Government participation is allocated to this project. The bonds will be paid off in yearly installments over a period of approximately 30 years, but can be paid off sooner if surplus funds are on hand. The bonds will bear interest at approximately 3¼% per annum.

3. There are no Government strings attached to the Federal participation. The management and operation of the hospital will be in the hands of the county citizens without government interference.

CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND MANAGEMENT:

1. CONSTRUCTION: The hospital will be built under specifications and supervision of competent hospital architects in accordance with approved methods of the State Health Department. Complete, first class equipment and facilities will be used.

2. SITE: Three acres in excellent location have been offered free for the hospital.

3. OPERATION AND MANAGEMENT: As specified by law the Hospital will be under a board of 7 tax paying citizens from all parts of the County, who are to serve without pay, and are not to be public officials or doctors. A competent superintendent is to run the hospital on a business basis, and will be answerable to the Board. This Board and the Superintendent will function like the Trustees and Superintendent of a school district, and report to the Commissioners' Court each month.

4. This is not to be a charity institution: Worthy charity patients must be cared for and this hospital will provide a method of handling them; doctors will rotate on charity service free of charge and the hospital will handle on a cost basis. Cases will definitely have to be proven worthy of charity, however, before they will be accepted as such. The hospital is to be operated on a business basis with proper charges made for all services. The Hopkins County Hospital at Sulphur Springs was built and is operated under this same plan—it made a \$30,000 profit during its first year and is now enlarging to serve an ever increasing demand.

THIS HOSPITAL WILL NOT RAISE YOUR TAXES ONE CENT: These bonds can be paid with a part of the existing county taxes. A part of the taxes now being levied will merely be allocated to pay these bonds, therefore, there will definitely be no tax increase now or in the future to pay these bonds.

OUR COUNTY NEEDS A HOSPITAL: This plan seems to present the best method for obtaining a first class health center at the least possible cost—let's get our share of Federal Assistance—with no additional cost to our taxpayers. These are the facts, it's you the People who will decide the issue on TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 7th.

Dear Mr. Stephenson:

I received your letter of thanks for attending your hospital committee meeting a few weeks ago. I do hope that the spirit that was manifested in the meeting that night will not be lost. As I have said so many times, there is an extreme need for hospital beds in East Texas.

The trend throughout the United States has been for the past few years the erection of small hospitals to take care of people in their own communities. During the past four or five years there have been many small hospitals built throughout the State of Texas and after they have been completed and in operation the people in each community can hardly believe how they had ever been able to get along without the services offered by a small and modern hospital. Big hospitals and medical centers are certainly wonderful, but as you know, these places are extremely crowded and naturally cater to their own medical staffs leaving most small towns and communities outside their immediate areas to take second best.

Here in Sulphur Springs we have a new and modern 44-bed hospital which contains practically all of the facilities of a large medical center. Our medical staff is so organized that we have a consulting specialist staff out of Dallas who gladly comes to our hospital for highly specialized surgical and medical cases. I have had literally hundreds of people, among the 30,000 people we serve, to tell me many times how proud they are that they no longer have to go to Dallas when some of their loved ones need hospital facilities. The time and expenses involved in going away for hospital care, much less being away from home, can hardly be estimated.

Where there is a small county or city hospital in the community the doctors can centralize their patients, and loved ones can be with each other during the critical period of illness. In many instances lives can be saved because of the immediate facilities of a hospital. Therefore, I would strongly urge any community and especially your own to promote and build such an institution before too many lose something that money can not buy.

If there is any way that we can help you, please do not hesitate to let us know. Our hospital has been such a success during the first year of operation that we already need to expand. If any one was in doubt about the value of such an institution in a community, we would be more than glad to show them through our hospital and to talk with our people.

Don't Confuse Old-Style Hams With Those of Today

Old style, palate tickling, succulent smoked hams like you used to prepare for special Sunday dinners are giving way to the tenderized and ready-to-eat varieties. Increased danger of spoilage comes with the change, State Health Officer George W. Cox says.

Used to be you could salt down a ham, then home-smoke it slow and easy. When done, you could hang it on the back porch easily accessible for a quick slice.

Those days are fast waning, for city folks. Ask your butcher for a smoked ham nowadays, and you get two choices: "tenderized," or "ready-to-eat." They look the same, and have some of the old sweetness. But there the similarity ends, Dr. Cox says.

Since less preservative salt is used in the smoking process, today's ham products have to be placed under immediate refrigeration, the same as any other meat.

"Tenderized" hams are smoked at a temperature of approximately 129 degrees. Dr. Cox says that means they have to be cooked before eating in order to kill any trichina larvae that may be present.

"Trichina larvae, which cause trichinosis, are killed at a temperature of 137 degrees F," the health officer cautioned. "That's internal temperature."

He warned that "ready-to-eat" ham products are smoked at approximately 160 degrees, and cured with less salt than regular smoked hams. They'll spoil easily unless kept under refrigeration until eaten.

Here are the health officer's recommendations regarding these meat products:

They cannot be stored in temperatures above 50 degrees. Neither can prepared dishes or sandwiches made from the products.

Strict sanitation should be observed in handling them.

They should be handled in refrigerated equipment from packing plant to consumer.

Cook-before-eating must not be confused with ready-to-eat meat products. Always ask the retailer about the meat to make sure of the cooking procedure.

Scientists Find New Remedy for Screw Worms

After four years of laboratory and field testing, scientists at Kerrville have found a new and successful treatment to control screwworm, the most destructive livestock insect pest in the South.

The Agriculture Department reported Sunday that the new remedy, to be known as EQ 335, will replace EJ 62, which has been known to stockmen for the past decade as the most effective method of controlling screwworm.

The remedy was developed by researchers at the Kerrville laboratory of the Department's Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, in co-operation with Department veterinarians attached to the Bureau of Animal Industry.

The screwworm is the maggot stage of a parasitic fly that lays its eggs on wounds of any warm-blooded animal, including man. It has caused heavy stock losses, especially in the Southern States, for many years.

The new treatment contains lindane, a powerful new insecticide. It is applied to wounds with a

Nine Million Program Detailed For Control of Sulphur River

A \$9,000,000 program to harness the cantankerous old Sulphur River was detailed at Cooper on Wednesday by Army engineers. The program would protect from flood damage some 50,000 acres of rich river bottom land along the main channel and north and south forks of the river above the new Texarkana reservoir now being built.

Col. Charles G. Holle, chief of the Army engineers New Orleans District, told about 200 East Texans during a hearing that plans for the river improvement already have been approved by top Army engineers and now await approval and appropriations by Congress.

When that time comes said Holle, the Army will begin a 5-point improvement program along the Sulphur to provide flood control for some ninety-eight miles along the river, rebuild the channels which contain the river's flow and construct a dam near Cooper on the south fork to trap flood waters and furnish municipal water for East Texas cities.

The \$9,000,000 would be added to more than \$150,000,000 which already has been authorized for flood control work along the Red River Basin, of which the Sulphur Basin is a part.

"Our survey shows the cost of these improvements, spread out on a yearly basis, would be about \$464,000," said Holle. "This compares with \$497,000 worth of benefits these improvements would bring. As an economical proposition alone, we believe improvements to the Sulphur ought to be made."

Matthias said it would be up to Patman to steer through Congress a bill authorizing the money for the improvements. He said he hoped to see work started in three years.

A. P. Hollins of Austin, a member of the Texas Board of Water Engineers, said residents of this East Texas area would "Be doing yourselves and Texas a favor," by taking advantage of the Army offer to improve the river basin and save soil and water. Civilian in the area would be called on to pay some \$90,000 at the beginning, in order to insure right of way of levees and maintenance of channels.

Looking for Car Dealer Not Smart Enough to Ask Big Down Payment

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, is still misinterpreting the government's credit restriction program, his letter this week reveals.

Dear Editor: I been readin some more about the government's credit restrictions, how some dealers say credit controls is gonna put them out of business, on account of nobody can buy anything unless he's rich, in which case he's probably already got it, and I myself have already been stopped from buyin a new cook stove due to the fact the government won't let anybody sell me one for a dollar down and a dollar a week, says I got to pay at least a third down, which eliminates my stove-buyin from now on, but I've been workin on an idea.

If you give American ingenuity a chance, it'll come through, and what I want to know is what would be wrong in goin ahead and followin the government's rules and payin a third down for a new car, say, but work out an installment payment plan for the downpayment? Say the car costs \$1800 and the downpayment has to be \$600, go ahead and meet them terms but pay out the downpayment at \$5 a week.

Of course, my favorite plan, which wouldn't require no roundabout way, is to have the government sell money orders on the installment plan, which would enable a man to select a new car, find out how much a third down is, go by the post office, take out a money order for that much, pay a dollar down on it, get the full amount, go to the car dealer's, hand over the money, and drive off. This way the government's credit controls would be preserved, the car dealer would be doin business, the car buyer would be happy, and the government's main goal of makin people contented and thrifty even when they ain't got enough sense to be would be achieved.

As I understand the reason for the credit control program, the government just don't trust a car dealer to have enough sense to get enough down-payment to protect himself, and while there may be some dealers in that category, I wish the government would publish a list so I could pick out the nearest one and head for him.

If there's any hardware store or lumber yard or appliance dealer or car dealer in this vicinity who ain't got enough sense to get enough downpayment on any item he's sellin, I wish I could find him, and if the government really wants to make me happy it can just forget its credit controls and furnish me with that list. The winning contestants and their fathers, O. J. Walker, J. C. Watkins and Hugh Brower, were luncheon guests of the Clarksville Rotary Club Thursday, at which time the awards were made by President Maurice Woolley and Secretary Marion Lawson.

Jack Walker's record showed a cost of \$22.57 spent for fertilizer under his prize winning one acre corn patch, 400 pounds of 8-8-8 and 300 pounds of ammonium nitrate. He planted Texas Hybrid No. 18 and had approximately 10,000 stalks on the acre. Voc. Agri. Instructors J. B. Jones of Detroit and Dixon Shelton of Paris checked the yield on the field.

Harold Watkins planted Texas Hybrid No. 24 and Billy Brower used Funks G 711. Both used slightly less fertilizer under their corn than was used under the prize winning field.

Other contestants with excellent yields were James Knight of Savannah, 78.7 bushels per acre, Herbert Knight of Savannah, 68.5 bu. per acre, Paul Peek of Boxelder, 60 bu. per acre, and Billy Allen of Rt. 1, Bagwell, 45 bu. per acre.

Willie John Blair of Boxelder reported a yield of 111 bushels per acre but was too late to be considered in the contest.

Marshall Orders Reserves Released

WASHINGTON.—Defense Secretary George C. Marshall Monday ordered the armed forces to release reserves recalled to active duty involuntarily as soon as they are thoroughly trained and enough draftees or volunteers are on hand to replace them.

At the same time, Marshall ordered the services to:

1. Determine their manpower needs six months in advance in order to alert reservists at least four months in advance of their recall to active duty.
2. Provide a uniform 30-day delay for reservists between the time they receive their orders and the date they must report for active duty.
3. Clean out the deadwood in the reserves—those who, for physical or other reasons such as critical occupations, are not available for extended active duty.
