HERALD CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY THIS WEEK

Today is the Ochiltree County Herald's fifteenth birthday and with this issue the publication goes into its sixteenth volume.

Back over the pages, yellowed with years, is told the story of Ochiltree county and this section of the Panhandle, of the origin of Perryton and its development and of the passing of Old Ochiltree where the Herald was first published in January 1918.

The Herald was moved to Perryton in the fall of 1919 by the Brazell brothers when the town-site was opened. In the fall of 1920 the plant was entirely destroyed by fire and with it all the back files.

The publication was taken over by the Stewart Printing company in April, 1931, the firm being composed of Paul F. Stewart and Van W. Stewart. The interests of Paul Stewart were purchased in October 1932 by the present owner and publisher under whose charge the publication has been issued ever since.

And so, with fifteen years of service behind it, the Herald opens a new chapter in the development of the North Plains country with the first issue of the fifteenth volume.

The Herald is authorized to announce Herbert Shindler as a candidate for the office of City Clerk of Perryton subject to the action of the voters at the city election to be held in April. WIND AND DUST STORM WORST IN MANY YEARS; DAMAGE IS GREAT; MANY ACRES WHEAT OUT

Highway Chief Believes Farm Trucks Not Exempt Payment License Fees

The matter of exemption of trucks used by farmers for their own agricultural pursuits seems to be a much disputed question. We are not attempting to tell anyone just what to do, whether to pay or not to pay. We have presented opinions on not to pay. Now we are publishing the following communication sent to Sheriff Talley by L. G. Phares, Chief of the State Highway Patrol. Phares believes that trucks are not exempt.

January 17, 1933

TO ALL COUNTY TAX COLLECTORS:

We have recently received a great many inquiries from Tax Collectors in various parts of the State as to whether or not farmers should be required to register their motor vehicles for the current year.

This condition seems to have arisen from a decision handed down by the Court of Civil Appeals of the 4th Supreme Judicial District of Texas at San Antonio, Texas, on November 30, 1932, in which the Honorable Court affirmed the judgment of the trial court of Hidalgo County, Texas, in which a case was filed against J. C. Engleman for allowing unregistered motor vehicles to be operated over the highways of this State.

The Honorable Court was of the opinion that in view of the fact that these motor vehicles were transporting water for irrigation purposes that they should not be required to pay a registration fee. Hon. Judge Lattimore, Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, delivered a decision on December 23,

POLL TAXES PAID FAR BELOW FORMER YEARS

It looks like a mere handful of people are going to do all the voting in Ochiltree county during the coming year. To date, Sheriff Talley's office has issued only 337 poll tax receipts. This is a mighty big come-down from the 1519 issued last year. January 31, next Tuesday, is the last day, and remember, that you have to have a poll tax before you can vote in any election, county, state, school or city. Some people think that they can vote in city and school elections without paying a poll tax. They are mistaken. There will be school directors to elect in April. In the same month, Perryton will elect a mayor, two aldermen, a city clerk and a city marshal. There may be other elections. Do you want to have a vote or will you deliberately disfranchise yourself by neglecting to pay your poll?

Times are serious and many do not have finances with which to meet their taxes, but if at all possible it is a duty to community, state and nation to pay your poll, thus giving you a voice in your government. People who shirk the responsibility of the ballot are evading a duty which is plain to every citizen. When a person is able and does not pay his poll tax, he automatically places himself in the same category with the alien, the insane and the criminal, who by reason of some law violation is disfranchised. Make an effort to pay your poll. You are needed to select suitable officials to administer your city government, to supervise your schools, and to decide other questions which may at any time come before the electorate. It is a duty which we must not shirk.

GREEN SEEKING CLERKS OFFICE

man who operated a farm or ranch

in one part of the State of Texas might put in operation on the highways of this State one truck or a fleet of trucks of forbidden sizes or length conveying farm products to another farm or ranch twenty miles away or for that matter two hundred miles distance along such highway. It could be well said that if a farmer could haul in a sixty foot truck along a public highway a load of any weight he pleased to be fed to his cattle on a ranch two hundred miles distant it would appear odd that an oil company or a coal company, etc., might not haul its output on the same size truck on a highway to its refinery or coal yard, etc., etc.

Believing the case correctly decided and that no error appears, the judgment will be affirmed.

In view of the opinion rendered by the Court of Criminal Appeals and also in view of the fact that the case decided on by the 4th Court of Civil Appeals has been appealed to the State Supreme Court and is now pending before that body, we believe that unless trucks which are the property of farmers are registered, that they would be operating over the highways of this State in violation of the highway laws and after February first they would be required to pay a full years registration fee and penalty in registering this equipment if they were operated on the highways during January of this year.

FEW CAR TAGS BEING ISSUED

LAST MINUTE RUSH EXPECTED BY SHERIFF TALLEY; REGISTRATION LAW EST IN YEARS

With only five more days in which to buy registration tags for cars and trucks, without penalty, the number of 1933 tags issued is lower than it has been for years, so reports Sheriff Talley. On February 1, 1932, 876 automobiles and 210 trucks had been licensed. To date, only 290 cars and a very few trucks have been licensed in this county to operate on the highways of Texas.

Cars and trucks with 1932 license tags will not be allowed to operate after January 31. If car or truck has been operated on any highway since January 1, 1933, an entire years license is due and a penalty will be added if same is not paid before February 1. If paid after February 1, the entire years fee with penalty added will have to be paid. If car or truck has not been operated since January 1, 1933, and owner makes sworn affidavit to same, then it can be registered at any time during the year, the owner paying only for the remaining months of 1933.

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BIG AIR MAIL PLANE GROUNDED NEAR NOTLA

A big transport plane landed at Notla near the Frank Cox home last Saturday afternoon during the big dust and wind storm. G. W. Cutter, operator of the Perryton-Canadian stage line, says that the plane loaded with mail and passengers took the air, east bound from Albuquerque, N. M., Saturday morning. They soon ran into the dust storm, one of the worst ever experienced in the Panhandle, and could not see the ground, overshooting their stopping place at Amarillo. Near Notla was the first place where the pilot could pick a decent landing place, so he set the big ship down with no damage. It was off the course at least thirty-five miles, the regular airway runs a few miles east of Canadian. Passengers and mail were transferred by motor to Canadian where they were placed aboard the Santa Fe. The pilot took the plane into Amarillo Sunday.

RAZE OLD CITY WATER TOWER

TOWER AND TANK IS BEING MOVED TO KISMET, KANSAS; MOVED TO PERRYTON FROM K. C.

Another landmark of the early days of Perryton will soon be gone for workmen are now tearing down the town's first water tower and storage tank. The tank has already been dismantled and shipped to Kismet, Kans., and the tower will follow soon. On account of the flat bottom type storage tank, it has not been used for a number of years, being condemned as unsanitary. The old tower and tank have been on the market for a number of years and it is now only bringing the sum of one hundred dollars, but this is the first time that the city has ever been able to even get rid of it, most concerns wanting more for tearing down than they would give for the salvage.

Those of us who were here in the early days of Perryton can well remember how proud we were when this water supply was completed. A Herald representative called on C. E. Whippo today and got the real history of its erection. Mr. Whippo, who is now division manager for the Texas-Louisiana Power Co., and president of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, was one of the owners of the city's first light and water systems. He, in partnership with his brother-in-law, Fremont Meade, installed the first system which they owned and operated for a number of years before selling to the city. The city later sold the light plant to the Inland Utilities Co., the latter selling to the Texas-Louisiana.

The old water tower was purchased in Kansas City, originally being used for a reserve water supply for the Kansas City Star. It was torn down and brought to Perryton. The storage tank had a capacity of 50,000 gallons and was purchased new. It was originally made for oil, being some heavier in weight than the usual type constructed for water storage. Workmen who dismantled said that it was in excellent condition. Mr. Whippo states that the concrete base, tower, tank and cost of erecting totaled about \$3,500.00.

The first city well was going down at the site of the water tower at the time of the grand opening of Perryton on August 22, 1919. W. W. McLarty, pioneer merchant at Ochiltree, had a large refreshment stand on the same site on opening day. Mr. Whippo recalls that many boxes of fresh peaches were sold at the stand on that day and that hundreds of seeds were thrown on the surrounding ground. Later in building activities around the tower and light plant, many of these seeds were covered up, later producing hundreds of small peach trees. Many were transplanted and will be found in orchards in this city and community. Several are still alive at the base of the tower.

Thus goes another landmark, just about the last vestige of the original water and light plant, which those

SCRIPT NOTES WILL BE USED TO PAY LABOR

Five Dollars In New Money Appeared Thursday Afternoon; More Out This Week

120 Firms Take Script

First Issue Of \$350 Approved Wednesday Evening By Chamber Of Commerce

Perryton script money made its first appearance on Main street Thursday afternoon when five dollars in notes were issued by the Perryton Chamber of Commerce out of an appropriation of \$350 authorized by the committee in charge. Notes No. 1, 2 and 3 in dollar denomination and No. 1, 2, 3, and 4 in the fifty cent were the bills started on their first tour of Perryton business firms and they will be closely checked to determine how rapidly they will be redeemed at the First National Bank, depository for the script fund.

Following a canvass of Perryton business and professional firms on Wednesday, agreements were signed by 120 different institutions to accept script. The names of the firms signing the agreement can be found on another page of this paper. The committees out on this canvass made an effort to see every business firm but several were out when the committee called however only a very few still remain to be seen, and those wishing to sign will be included on the list next week.

The committee in charge of handling the script is composed of H. C. Sanford, chairman, and Van W. Stewart, J. R. Russell, R. P. Hurn and O. H. Black. It was voted at the Wednesday meeting of the committee to issue \$350 in script to be used in labor projects within the next two or three weeks. The first such project undertaken is the improvement of the golf course, \$150 in script being donated to the Perryton Golf Club for this purpose. The labor will be supplied through the committee in charge of the Federal Relief fund and will be paid in script. Other labor projects will be decided upon later.

Perryton script, a facsimile of which will be found on another page of this issue, is issued in two denominations, fifty cents and one dollar. When script is received by a Perryton business man for merchandise sold, payments on account or services rendered, it must be stamped on the reverse side, the dollar notes requiring a three cent stamp and the fifty cent bills a one and one-half cent stamp. The stamps are to be cancelled by endorsement across the face of the stamp.

These trade stamps are purchased from the Chamber of Commerce and will be handled at the Stewart Printing company. The money from the sale of stamps is deposited in the First National Bank and when a script note has the required thirty-six stamps affixed, can be converted into cash at this bank.

No individual citizen receiving script in change or through other transactions will be required to place trade stamps on script. The merchants signing up to accept script have agreed not to give change on script or convert it into cash unless it has the required number of endorsements.

While the script or wooden money idea is not new it has never been used in this section and it is thought that Perryton is one of the first cities in Texas to introduce script.

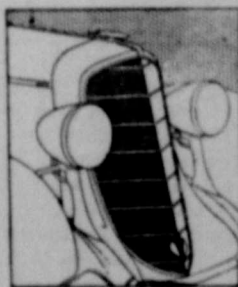

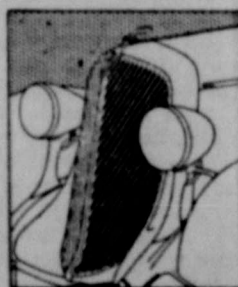

Perryton Chamber of Commerce Resolution Opposes Anti-Veteran Legislation

WHEREAS, the Perryton Chamber of Commerce is a member of and has contributed to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, it has come to our attention that said Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America has taken a decided stand against pending Veterans Legislation, including pension to Spanish-American War Veterans; Disability Compensation to World War Veterans for service connected injuries; Disability Allowance to World War Veterans service connected proof not established; Retired Emergency Officers of the World War; Insurance Benefits, bought and paid for out of the World War Veterans pay; Administration Expense for Veterans of all wars; Hospitalization of the Veterans of all wars; and said organization has gone to the extent of passing a resolution at its Twentieth Annual meeting at San Francisco, California, May 20, 1932, memorializing Congress to abolish the Disability Allowance Law as passed and amended July 3, 1930, whereby disabled veterans suffering from a disability to the extension of 25% may have the benefit of small disability allowance payments, even though they are unable to trace their disability to service connection.

WHEREAS, we feel that such disability allowance law as now prevails is fair and proper, especially to the thousands of ex-service men who are unable to prove disabilities incurred by service in the World War, making such proof from hospital records, many of which do not and could not reflect the true conditions of the health of the ex-service man at date of his discharge.

WHEREAS, we feel that such stand is improper, unfair and contrary to the better judgment of the rank and file of the American people. That such propaganda as put out by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, and the so called Economy-League, is taking an unfair and arbitrary advantage of the men and women who rendered service to their country in the crisis of the war, many and the most of whom served for one dollar per day, out of which was paid their insurance, Liberty Bond payments, and other deductible items. We feel that the stand taken by the United States Chamber of Commerce and the so called Economy-League is un-American, and unreservedly disapprove of such step, which, in its final analysis is propaganda put out by capital, a large portion of which was created and made during the period of the World War, and as a direct result of the war. That to encourage and approve of such an attitude, as proposed and sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, and the so called Economy-League, is outright shirking of a responsibility and duty, which is justly owing to ex-service men and women and their dependents.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, that we are heartily in accord with such disability allowance and other Veterans' legislation and it is our sincere desire to see it continued in its present status. This community, as does most every other community, has cases of this character, which in our opinion are just and proper ones for partial government aid. In the absence of such aid it would resolve itself into a matter of state, county and community solution for financial assistance. We further feel that under the law in its present status, that the burden is properly placed and it can in no other manner be more justly and properly placed than on the Federal Government, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Perryton Chamber of Commerce go on record that legislation and financial aid to Veterans of the World War and their dependents is a duty of the Federal Government and should it fail or refuse to perform such duty and render such service and aid it will become that of the state, county and municipalities of the United States. It is our opinion that the only class who will receive any material financial benefit of the elimination or abolition of Federal aid as it now stands will be those who pay the higher amount of income tax, and it is at their (the higher income tax payers) instigation, capital and propaganda that a public sentiment is trying to be created towards the elimination of Federal aid and should they (the higher income tax payers) prevail in their sinister motives it will mean the wrecking of the lives of thousands of disabled veterans and their dependents, and the increase of our state and local property tax (to relieve the higher income tax payers), because the various states and communities will be forced to care for their disabled, whom the Federal Government would abandon under the proposed Chamber-League plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Perryton Chamber of Commerce of Perryton, Texas, go on record as heartily favoring the payment of the remaining one-half of the Soldiers Bonus, and that immediate payment thereof be made, which will relieve the distressed financial conditions in every city, town, hamlet, and country-side; now prevailing in these United States, and that we feel that it will be of more benefit to the rank and file of the people if paid now rather than longer defer its payment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to every Chamber of Commerce in Texas, and to the Honorable Tom Connally and the Honorable Morris Sheppard, United States Senators from Texas; to the Honorable Marvin Jones, Congressman from the 18th District of Texas, and to each of the other Congressmen of Texas; to Governor Miriam Ferguson of Texas, to the Texas Department Headquarters of the American Legion; and the National Headquarters of the American Legion; and to the Headquarters of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America.

New styling with a distinct difference between the Six and Eight and greater speed and power in both cars are the major distinctions of the 1933 Oldsmobiles, according to Jack Kelly, manager of the Perryton Motor company, newly appointed dealers for Oldsmobiles. In addition to these features and others that materially enhance performance, the new Oldsmobiles are announced with a substantial reduction in prices.

In outward appearance the 1933 Oldsmobiles are distinct style leaders, presenting very advanced modes in automobile design. They are low with aerodynamic lines from the sloping radiator grill to the gracefully curved rear quarter.

Every feature of body construction—sheet metal, doors, windows and trim—represents a new treatment that distinguishes these cars. Their design also includes the new Fisher No-Draft ventilation system.

The six cylinder Oldsmobile has been made more powerful through an enlargement of the bore and refinements of the down-draft carburetor. The engine now develops 80 horsepower. The bodies have been made more roomy through widening the tread.

The 1933 straight eight Oldsmobile engine also has been stepped up as regards speed and performance and now rates 90 horsepower. The wheelbase has been lengthened to 119 inches and this, with the increased tread provides additional room and riding comfort.

Improved performance, better economy and easier starting have resulted from several changes in the carburetor. The float needle valve has been placed in a horizontal position, thus preventing gasoline draining back through the fuel pump and

causing hard starting. The high speed jet has been placed above the gas level to prevent gas leaking into the intake manifold. Several other detailed improvements increase carburetor efficiency.

The automatic choke pioneered by Oldsmobile last year is retained and considerably improved. The two principal changes consist of more accurately controlling the position of the carburetor choke valve, resulting in more efficient engine operation, and automatically controlling the engine idling speed.

Another automatic feature incorporated on the 1933 Oldsmobiles is the thermostatic water temperature control. By means of two valves, the water circulates through the engine only until its temperature reaches 145 degrees. One valve is of the bellows thermostatic type and is located in the cylinder head outlet casting. The second valve is a spring loaded by-pass type and is fitted to the top of the water pump body. When the thermostat valve is closed, pressure created by the water pump forces open the spring by-pass valve and the water recirculates through the engine block. In this manner it is quickly brought to the proper temperature. Owing to this development and the use of an ornamental radiator grill, radiator shutters have been eliminated.

Other engine improvements include the fan and the valve lifter and cam arrangement. The fan speed has been slowed considerably without impairing the efficiency of the cooling system and, thereby, has been made quieter. Refinement of cam contours also adds to engine quietness.

The low, sleek lines that distinguish the 1933 Oldsmobiles are made possible in a great measure by the use of a double kick-up frame with an X-type cross member. This has lowered the overall height of the cars without any sacrifice of headroom or ground clearance.

Softer and smoother braking also has been made possible by the use of a double kick-up frame with an X-type cross member. This has lowered the overall height of the cars without any sacrifice of headroom or ground clearance.

has been made possible by the new frame. The new hook-up consists of a short cross shaft located between the front ends of the X-cross member. From this shaft cables run in a direct line to the brakes in an X-shape, hooking together the right front and the left rear brakes and the left front and the right rear. Through this simplification friction has been reduced and the return spring of the brake pedal made correspondingly lighter. In addition the brake cam and lever construction has been improved.

Riding ease has been improved through the use of free acting, threaded spring shackles and the use of metal spring covers. Double action Delco-Lovejoy hydraulic shock absorbers are standard.

As the result of a survey conducted by Oldsmobile the free wheeling unit has been eliminated with a return to standard shifting, but provision has been made for the installation of a vacuum automatic clutch at small additional cost where this feature is desired. Necessary holes have been bored in the frame for the quick and easy installation of this unit.

The automatic clutch is operated by vacuum and is equipped with a

pendulum valve and a lost motion unit. These provide smooth and positive clutch engagement. A quiet second speed, synchro-mesh transmission is used.

The body styling of both the Oldsmobile six and eight is entirely new throughout. The lines are of advanced mode, being low and air-resisting with all curves sloping toward the rear.

FORBES TALK ON BUSINESS

By R. C. Forbes

Detroit, Jan. 3.—This city has conducted an experiment which should interest every city in the land.

Need for economy having become acute here, just as it has in most municipalities, it was decided to save money by cutting down street lighting.

But what happened? Accidents and crime increased shockingly. Says General Superintendent of Lighting Louis J. Schrenk: "During the first 10 months of 1932 when street lighting was reduced, there was a daytime decrease of 22 per cent in fatal accidents as compared with 1931. But there was a night increase of 23 1-3 per cent in fatal accidents."

"Aside from the humanitarian aspect of these night accidents chargeable against inability to see, there is a traffic economic loss. Further, the City of Detroit itself was not spared part of this economic loss; whereas handling emergency automobile cases cost the city \$609,784 in 1931, it is obvious that the 23 1-3 per cent increase in night fatalities will raise the total hospital cost this year."

"Since the saving in lighting service was only \$9,000 per month, the but an economy shrdl shrdl aoinl experiment has proved anything

but an economy. Accordingly, lighting has been restored to virtually its former level."

During the period of dim lighting Detroit had 35 per cent more night traffic fatalities than in 1931. These avoidable fatalities, it is estimated, cost insurance companies alone \$200,000 to \$300,000.

The National Safety Council, after making a survey of four states, estimates that 35 per cent of all night accidents are due to insufficient illumination, while the National Surety Company figures that of the \$250,000,000 lost annually through night crimes \$100,000,000 would be prevented by good lighting.

America's total loss from traffic accidents is estimated at \$2,500,000,000 annually.

If every community were thoroughly lighted, several hundred millions, authorities figure, would be saved.

San Francisco has also had an interesting experience. It increased the lighting of its Bay Shore boulevard last year, and whereas heavier traffic involved an increase of 30 per cent in day accidents, there was not only no corresponding increase in night accidents but actually a 40 per cent decrease.

When London, during the war, dimmed its lights as a precaution

against air raids, traffic accidents increased tremendously, notwithstanding that people were not to go on the streets at night.

The moral of all this is: It is a wise and dollar-foolish for community to try to save money by cutting down street lighting. If, tentatively, wherever such action been taken, merchants have the effect injurious to trade.

PROPOSE CHANGE IN SCHOOL LAW

PANHANDLE PLAINS SUPERIN-
TENDENT'S ASSOCIATION
IN LEGISLATIVE RE-
PORT ON SCHOOL

Following is a report on legisla-
tion affecting the public schools of
Texas, which has been prepared by
W. B. Irvin, superintendent of the
Perryton school system. Mr. Irvin
is chairman of the Legislative Com-
mittee of the Panhandle-Plains Super-
intendent's association and this
report will go before the next meet-
ing of that body for consideration
and action.

1. That we urgently request the
Legislature to find some source of
revenue that will insure the apportion-
ment of at least \$17.50 per capita
to our elementary and secondary
schools.

2. That we are strictly opposed to
any bill that would reduce the legal
school tax rate maximum in school
districts from \$1.00 to 50 cents on
the \$100 valuation.

3. That we are opposed to the
present state ad valorem tax sys-
tem; and that we favor a combina-
tion of excise, inheritance, income,
and sales tax in its stead.

4. That the Legislature provide
some plan whereby the deficit in
local school funds, caused by the
\$3,000 homestead tax exemption am-
endment, may be replaced without
undue burden on local property tax
payers.

5. That we favor the passage of
a law that will empower school
district trustees to issue interest-bear-
ing school warrants, the amount of
said warrants together with the
cash expenditure for any particular
year not to exceed the tax levy for
said tax year. Delinquent tax due
from said particular levy or tax year
is not to be used for any other pur-
poses than to pay the outstanding
warrants for the year of their issue,
and to pay into the sinking fund of
the district the amount as apportion-
ed to it for said tax year.

6. That we favor and urge the
passage of a law basing the per
capita apportionment for our ele-
mentary and secondary schools upon
the average daily attendance rather
than upon the census count. This
gives the schools financial aid in
direct proportion to work actually
done rather than work that should
be done.

7. That we oppose the County Unit
in educational administration as a
general and compulsory plan for
our State—but favor allowing coun-
ties to have this plan at their option.

8. We favor the appointment of
county school superintendents by a
county board of education.

9. That we oppose the proposed
change in Article 2692, Revised
Statutes of Texas, 1925, which would
make it necessary for the county
superintendents to approve teach-
ers contracts of independent school
districts and to approve actions of
independent school district boards
of trustees.

10. That we favor the retaining
of West Texas State Teachers Col-
lege of Canyon, Texas, and Texas
Technological College of Lubbock,
Texas—but we recommend that un-
necessary duplication of depart-
ments be eliminated and that W. T.
S. T. C. be a teachers college and
the Texas Tech. be a technological
college.

MEMBER LEGION POST DIES AT VET HOSPITAL

Veterans Administration Hospi-
tal at Legion, Texas, of the
death of James Bellville, an ad-
opted member of this Post. Just
before Christmas, a letter was
received from State Command-
er Carl Nesbit, asking the local
Post to adopt some disabled vet-
eran, a patient in the Legion hospi-
tal, drawing no compensation
and unable to join the American
Legion, as a member of this
Post, paying his membership
dues and providing him with
those little things which can
brighten so much the bed ridden
and poverty stricken tubercular
patient. At the direction of the
Post, a letter went back poste
haste to state headquarters stat-
ing that the dues would be paid
and a veteran adopted. Last
week, when the membership card
was received by Adjutant Harry
Nail, it was found that James
Bellville was the veteran assign-
ed to this Post. The membership
card, with lengthy letter wel-
coming this poor soldier to the
Post was sent to Legion, but just
a few days later, it was returned
to the Post with the notation by postal
clerks that James Bellville was
deceased, that he had joined the
ranks of those thousands upon
thousands who have paid the su-
preme sacrifice for their serv-
ice to the country during the
World War. And yet the United
States Chamber of Commerce
and the National Economy Leag-

by almost one-half for just such
men as James Bellville who went
west down there at Legion last
week with not enough money to
