Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

First Congressional Dist. of Texas
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

MILLIONS OF DOLLARS are hidden away each year in secret Foreign bank accounts by Americans who seek to evade U. S. taxes or to conceal the use of secret foreign accounts. To correct this situation, I have developed legislation controlling the use of these secret foreign facilities by Americans. Briefly, my bill would improve law enforcement programs of existing government agencies and tighten up the record keeping procedures of American banks, thereby restoring the flow of tax dollars otherwise lost to the U. S. Treasury and also disclosing the financial operations of organized crime. Legislation that helps the taxpayers and hurts the criminal is desirable — that's for sure!

POSSIBLE NEW SOURCE OF HELP FOR VETERANS. From May 1968 to January 1969, less than one year, the Veterans Administration mortgage interest rate increased from 6% to 7½% — a whopping percentage increase of 25%! As a result, VA housing starts are down about 30% to a level of 46,000 units a year, and interest rates may yet increase even further which would price many more low and moderate-income veterans out of the housing market. To assist our veterans, I have proposed that up to \$5 billion from the national service life insurance fund be used to finance housing for veterans.

THIS WOULD BENEFIT BOTH VETERANS AND THE HOUSING INDUSTRY by, in effect, loaning the veterans' own insurance contributions back to individual veterans at a reasonable interest rate. This does not in any way jeopardize the fund which would profit from the interest paid on the home mortgages. In fact, the fund would be strengthened. When I offered this proposal as an amendment to a House bill relating to VA mortgage rates, it was unfortunately held to be not germane, but the concept is obtaining considerable support in the Senate and such a system may soon be approved by the Congress.

LAST CALL FOR APPLICANTS FOR ACADEMY APPOINTMENTS. Although my quota at the United States Military Academy is now at the maximum strength of five cadets and, therefore, I will not have a West Point vacancy for 1970, I will have vacancies to be filled at both the U. S. Naval and Air Force Academies. Young men from the First Congressional District who are interested should get in touch with me immediately so that they can be scheduled for the preliminary designation examination conducted by the Civil Service Commission.

CALLOUS ATTITUDE TOWARD UNEMPLOYMENT. The reaction of some economic policy makers to the recent sharp rise in the unemployment rate to 4% was shocking. The Secretary of the Treasury said it was an "acceptable" increase and one of his assistants actually expressed great pleasure at this economic indicator. High unemployment can be expected in view of the unfortunate way the economic planners have tried to curb inflation with their tight-money and high interest rate policies, but in truth, it is not necessary to throw people out of jobs in order to control inflation. This economic policy is as disastrous as a hurricane or tornado for the family without a paycheck to take care of its basic needs. When the ship of state is in trouble, should it be our national policy to throw the women and children overboard first?

SINCE COMING TO CONGRESS In 1929, I have worked to assure the small businessman his rightful share of the nation's economy. Therefore, I was particularly honored this week to be named "Federal Man of the Year" by the National Association of Mutual Insurance Agents. The award will go annually to a public official who has made special efforts in behalf of small business.

TIME CHANGEOVER

Sunday, October 27, marks the end of Daylight Saving Time in effect since April 27. Clocks are to be moved back one hour at exactly 2 a. m. on Sunday, Oct. 26. It is suggested that the necessary time change be made before retiring Saturday night.

Austin. — Texas Aeronautics Commission has expressed concern that the new federal aviation legislation may shut off its revenues for state airport building aid which now totals more than \$400,000 a year.

Proposed aircraft user charges would increase the general aviation fuel tax from two to seven cents a gallon, levy a licensing fee of \$25 per aircraft plus two cents a pound for prop planes and three and a half cents a pound for jets, increase the passenger tax on airlines from five per cent to eight per cent, place a new five per cent tax on cargo shipments and establish a \$3 per passenger tax on international travel.

Airline would go to airport improvements and relief of congestion. Some \$180 million a year would air large, airline-served terminals and \$25 million a year would be reserved for smaller airports like those helped by TAC funds. Based on population.

Texas would get about \$18 million annually for larger airports and \$2.5 million for smaller ones. Hitch, according to TAC Executive Director Charles Murphy, is this:

Federal act requires states to match aid funds on a 50-50 basis. At present, the source of funds TAC has for airport building is unclaimed refunds on the state's five-cent-a-gallon tax on aviation gasoline. Plane owners now leave some \$46,000 a month in the state till rather than go to the trouble of filling out forms for refunds. However, with stiff new federal charges, it is feared they will start applying for all refunds they can get, thus leaving TAC with an "empty bucket," as one commissioner said.

Murphy said a state jet fuel tax of three to four cents a gallon would be necessary to raise as much as \$2.5 million a year. Meanwhile, TAC approved a \$224,500 construction aid program for the next year, including these projects:

Dalhart, Commerce, McLean, Hale Center, Haskell, Hemphill, Pleasanton and Vega, \$27,000 each; Taft, \$20,000; Bridgeport, Giddings, Jackson County (Edna), Jasper, San Benito, Hearne and Van Horn, \$10,000 each; Shamrock, \$4,500, and Caldwell, \$4,000.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin spelled out the duties of county commissioners, county election boards and sheriffs to determine the number of voting machines needed, provision and delivery of them to the polls for each election held at county expense.

In other new opinions, Martin held that:

• Small claims court jurors must be paid the same \$3-\$6 a day) as those serving in justice courts, with payment out of county jury fund.

• Alligators now are under the control of the state as protected wildlife specie.

• Legislative act providing for the method of school board elections in counties of 8,605 to 8,615 population is unconstitutional since the population base is unreasonable.

• A former legislator with eight or more years service who is a state employee can become a member of the "elective class" under the employees retirement system without working five consecutive years at an appointive job.

• Grand and petit jurors selected for Jim Hogg County by the 49th judicial district court and for Duval and Starr counties by the 79th district court are legally-selected jurors for the new 229th judicial district court from September 1 to commencement of the new term.

DRINKING HOURS EXTENDED — A dozen counties and 19 cities have adopted the new 2 a. m. drinking curfew approved by the last Legislature on a local option basis.

Included are Harris, Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant, El Paso, Potter, Bandera, Bell, Aransas, Wilson, Galveston and Fort Bend counties; Corpus Christi, Aransas Pass, Rosenberg, Temple, Texas City, Denison, Poth, Boerne, Post, Kemah, Pharr, Galveston, Rockport, Bandera, Port Aransas, Port Neches, Laredo (private clubs only), Victoria and Herker Heights near Fort Hood.

Liquor Control Board is studying the proposal of a Dallas restaurateur for authorization of Texas travelers to join a single giant private club with guest privileges in any participating club.

LCB authorized two airlines to sell mixed drinks during flights — American Airlines and Braniff. Texas International and Delta also have applied for licenses.

4-H Automotive Program To Aid in Driving Safety



There is a ray of hope for a reduction in the number of motor-vehicle accidents in hundreds of communities across the country. And hope is turning to reality in areas where young drivers and pre-drivers are participating in the 4-H Automotive program.

Conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service, with the help of local police departments, firemen and community leaders, the program aims to develop the right attitudes toward safe driving. And the popularity of the 4-H Automotive program is shown by the increasing number of teens who enroll and complete the course of study. Nearly 70,000 participated last year.

E. C. Hale, chief of police, Lexington, Ky., claims the 4-H Automotive program approach works. In three years, teen motor-vehicle accidents in his city decreased from 1,034 to 967. Fatalities dropped from nine to two and injuries from 206 to 158.

Chief Hale also says that he is encouraged by the increasing interest and responsibilities taken by young people in the conduct of the program. "It has proven to be an excellent tool in preventing losses of juvenile life in the community," he reports.

Nationally, the 4-H Automotive program is supported for the tenth year by The Firestone Tire & Rubber

Company which provides incentive, recognition and other program aids. The company also provides a number of grants to state Extension Services for program promotion and expansion.

At the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 30-Dec. 4, Firestone will award eight \$600 national scholarships and host state winners in the 4-H Automotive program. And at numerous local recognition events, county medals of honor will be awarded this fall.

Room for Improvement

Although encouraged by the favorable response of young people, Firestone and Extension officials see need for increased effort. They note that during 1968, the National Safety Council reported 26 million licensed drivers, one of every four, were involved in motor-vehicle accidents. Deaths totaled 55,200 and some 2,000,000 persons were disabled.

Youth of 4-H age, under 20, represented 10.2 per cent of all drivers and accounted for 15 per cent of the fatal accidents and nearly 17 per cent of all accidents. They were surpassed only by the 20-24 years-olds.

Information about how teens and their parents may participate in the 4-H Automotive program is available from the County Extension office.

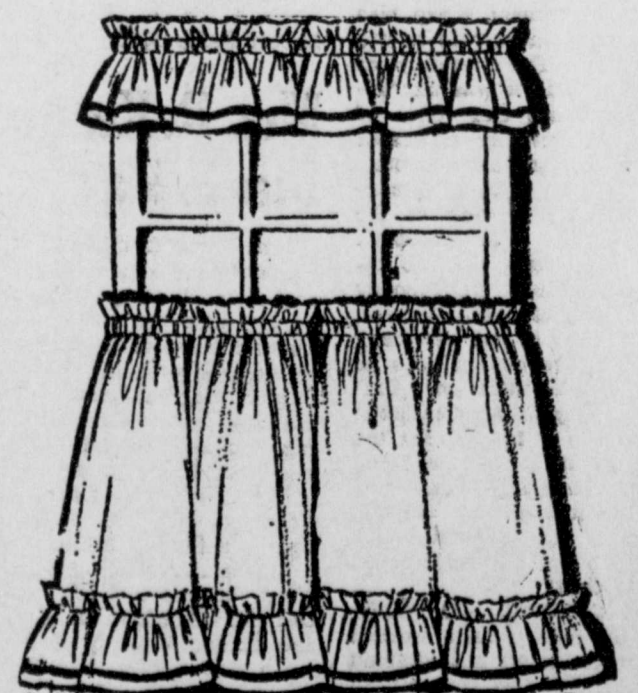

FLOWERS UNLIMITED

Observing Etiquette Guidelines Eliminates Confusion In Sending "Sympathy Flowers"

In this latter half of the 20th century, as Man breaks the confines of his planet and witnesses constant change of pace and practices, there would seem little left in our daily life comparable to the slower, traditional eras of the past.

However, some things never change, and one of those "constants" is etiquette. The authoritative guidelines of gracious living are as useful and necessary to every situation in today's busy world as they were to granny's gaslight contemporaries.

In regard to the constant role of etiquette in our lives, many queries have been directed to Florists' Transworld Delivery (FTD) asking about the proper handling of another unchangeable in the life cycle—sending "sympathy flowers."

In answer, they note that at a time of mourning, when the bereaved are in most need of solace and should be relieved of as much confusion as possible, etiquette pays its most valuable service by smoothing personal contacts and making sure the last rites are performed with beauty and gravity.

The proper handling of etiquette guidelines greatly facilitates the sending of sympathy flowers. To begin with, authorities suggest that they be addressed "To the funeral of (name of the deceased)," either at the funeral home or at the church. If you don't know the

deceased, but only his close relatives, flowers may be sent to them at their home. On an enclosed card write simply, "With deepest sympathy," or, if appropriate, "With love and sympathy." Address the card to one of the family.

If you don't know where to send the flowers at the time of the funeral, or if you hear of the death some time later, it is still proper to send them to the family of the deceased at their home.

To avoid mix-up, one person should be asked to take charge of flowers which are sent to the house or funeral home. This person should write a description of the flowers sent with the card on the outside of each envelope. Such notations and descriptions are invaluable when the family is writing notes of thanks.

Also, the family may ask one or two friends to go to the church an hour before the service to help the florist or someone on the church staff arrange flowers. Their duty is only to see that those sent by relatives are given a prominent position. The sexton or one of his assistants should collect the cards, noting the variety of flowers as just described, and give them to these friends. They in turn deliver them to the person responsible for all arrangements.

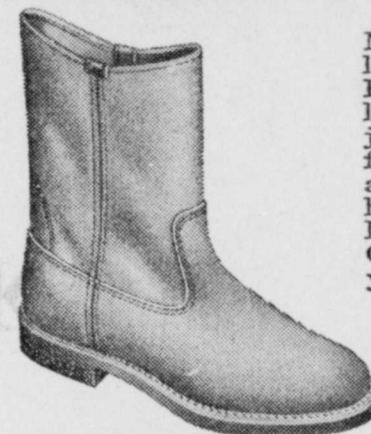
