Truman Blasts Taft On Boom Or Bust Theories

SAYS U. S. TO AID CUSTED DEMOCRATIC ELEMENTS

WASHINGTON — President Truman today called the Communist coup in Hungary a terrible outrage.

Mr. Truman said this government did not intend to stand idly by. The state department, he said, is now making a thorough investigation of the Hungarian situation.

The President bluntly stated this government's anger over the Communist seizure of power in Hungary at his news conference. The week-old Hungarian political crisis found the Hungarian legation here split in two, pending official statement of this country's stand.

The President's news conference remarks left no doubt that the United States would act promptly and vigorously. State department officials had hinted that U. S. moves supporting anti-Communist forces in Hungary would be forthcoming shortly. They reportedly would include a stiff protest to Russia, additional economic crackdowns on the new regime, and a pledge of assistance to the currently ousted democratic elements.

Mr. Truman's use of the word "outrage" indicated the tone that the U. S. protest would take.

President Favors Investigation Of Vote Fraud

WASHINGTON — President Truman said today the Kansas City vote fraud investigation should be carried through to its logical conclusion.

Mr. Truman's statement was made to a news conference as FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover told a Senate committee that his agency was making "a full investigation" of the disputed Missouri Democratic congressional primary.

Mr. Truman told reporters that no one wanted a vote fraud. He described it as one of the worst things that can happen in a Democracy.

The alleged vote fraud occurred in the 5th Congressional District in Missouri in Mr. Truman's home Jackson County where the Pendergast machine gave him his political start.

Legislation On Labor Hits The Home Stretch

WASHINGTON — Republican sponsored labor legislation hit the home stretch in Congress today. It headed for Senate passage by a vote which Republican spokesmen expected to surpass the 2 to 1 margin needed to override a presidential veto.

Chairman Robert A. Taft, R., O., of the Senate labor committee planned to call in mid-afternoon for Senate approval of the compromise measure which passed the House yesterday by a majority of 4 to 1. A final Senate vote was expected late today or tomorrow.

Begin Army, Navy Cuts
WASHINGTON (UP)—The House armed services committee today began work on the final draft of legislation to make heavy slashes in officer personnel of the Army and Navy.

MORE LETTER BOMBS

LONDON (UP)—Three more letter bombs were delivered to Scotland Yard experts for examination today, raising to 11 the number that have been received.

Push Plans To Return Mines To Operators

WASHINGTON — The Coal mines administration today pushed plans for returning the government-operated soft coal pits to their private owners on June 30 regardless of whether a new wage contract has been signed by that time with John Lewis.

A spokesman for the administration said the schedule would not be affected by the dismal prospects of an agreement between Lewis and the two groups of mine operators. The government's legal authority to hold the mines ends on June 30.

Capital Betting On Truman's Tax Cut Plans

WASHINGTON — Political Washington is betting today that President Truman will propose reduction of personal income taxes next January if he vetoes the Republican tax bill which reached the White House yesterday.

At his news conference today, Mr. Truman declined to give any hint on what he will do about either the tax reduction or labor bills.

The President smiled and shook his head when asked about the bills by reporters.

DENIES AID PROGRAM AIM IS TO KEEP PRICES UP

WASHINGTON — President Truman today denounced as "falacious and dangerous" what he called the "boom or bust" economic theories of Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O.

In a long and unusual statement, Mr. Truman sharply challenged a recent assertion by Taft that the chief executive and his administration were abandoning talk on keeping prices down in favor of heavy spending abroad to keep them up.

The President said this flatly is not true. He said he regarded price reductions now as important or more important than they have been.

He charged Taft with advocating an economic course which would lead to "a tragic recession or depression."

The president read his prepared statement to his news conference in a stern, loud voice. He attacked the assertion by Taft that loans to other countries for the purchase of goods here increase the competition on home markets and thus force prices up. The President said there might be some reflection on the home price structure, but he did not think it was important. The larger consideration was to help starving millions and to bulwark their nations against totalitarian aggression, he said.

He said the Greek-Turkish aid program was not advocated as a measure to bring prices down. The administration realizes the foreign air programs would place some strain on the American economy, Mr. Truman said.

"But the fact that necessary foreign aid programs add to our economic problems at home makes it all the more important that we handle these domestic problems with vigor and common sense," he added.

Price reductions remain extremely important to the American economy, even more so in the face of the world situation, Mr. Truman said.

ASSOCIATIONS LOANS STILL ON INCREASE

AUSTIN, Texas — In spite of the fact that construction costs are at an all-time high, loans made by the savings and loan associations in Texas continue to increase, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

An analysis of data supplied by the Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock shows that the 119 insured savings and loan associations in Texas made 11 per cent more loans in April than in March as the total amount of loans grew in value by 14 per cent from March to April.

Loans for the purchase of homes show the only decline in the entire picture. There has been a 36 per cent reduction in the number of loans made since April 1946 while the value has slid 35 per cent. Since purchase loans account for a major portion of the total, the result has been an overall decline for the year in spite of the fact that gains were recorded in all other kinds of loans.

WORLD FAMILY CONGRESS MEETS IN PARIS JUNE 22

PARIS (UP)—An attempt to bring the force of international cooperation to bear on the intricate, every-day problems of home life and human relations will be made at the World Family Congress to be held in Paris June 22 to 29.

France, which considers herself the most progressive nation in the world in matters of social justice, has invited representatives of 40 countries to attend the first world conference on families and populations.

"The improvement of family life all over the world is an essential factor in reconstruction after the war and in the maintenance of

world peace", Robert Boudet, general secretary, said in outlining the reasons for calling the congress. "Yet at the present time families in numerous countries of the world find themselves in extremely difficult and precarious positions."

Discussion at the congress will center around five main themes:

1. The need for higher living standards for families.
2. Working women.
3. The world housing shortage.
4. Relations between parents and children.
5. Family organizations and their role in the state.

Discussing the first point, Boudet said, "Several countries have sought to remedy the injustice which has long weighed on the

fathers and mothers obliged to raise their children on salaries no higher than those received by bachelors.

"Various systems of family allocations or doles have been tried in order to lift the living standards of the families, thus avoiding child labor and the impoverishment of large families. The conference will compare these systems."

Related problems, such as the effect on population growth of financial aid to families, will be discussed. In France, for instance, the birth rate now exceeds the death rate for the first time in a century as the result of liberal subsidization of families since the war.

The discussion of "working women" is expected to bring up a whole host of topics, including equal rights and wages for women, post-war manpower needs, unemployment, and effects on children and population.

Recognizing that the post-war housing shortage is nearly worldwide, the congress will discuss its effect on family life, whether it has reduced marriages, the benefits and disadvantages of collective dwellings, and methods for encouraging construction and redistributing available housing so that large dwellings may be placed at the disposal of large families.

The question of whether the housing shortage contributes to drunkenness is one of the more abstract points on the agenda.

The subjects, "relations between parents and children," calls for a comparison of all the basic cultures of the 40 nations expected to attend, comprising discussions of home discipline, schools, and preparation of girls for marriage. Also, under this heading the phenomenon of post-war juvenile delinquency will be examined.

FLOWERS IN OUR LIVES

Flowers are one of the loveliest details of the wedding march. However judgment should be used in the choice of flowers to get the most beautiful effect.

The bouquets should suit the style of gowns worn and their size must be in proportion to the height of those who carry them. The colors of the various bouquets should harmonize, too.

The old fashioned colonial bouquet with flower closely arranged and encircled by a frill of soft lace net is ideal for the short bride who wears a fluffy wedding gown. The dramatic shower type bouquet of loosely arranged flowers is better suited to the tall stately bride. The bride's going-away corsage can be nestled in the center of the bridal bouquet. Arranged, ready to wear, it can easily be removed before "throwing-away" the bridal bouquet.

The tradition of the bride wearing "something blue," can be followed if you have your florist place a tiny bow of blue satin ribbon on the back of the bouquet.

Many brides prefer to carry a flower bedecked prayer book or Testament. Clusters of stephanotis on this prayer book interspersed with white satin ribbons are most effective. Orchids, roses, carnations or gardenias are also suitable in an arrangement of this type.

The bridesmaid's bouquets should, of course, harmonize with the colors of their gowns. These bouquets can take many forms but should be well in keeping with the style of the bride's flowers. Unusual and picturesque are flower trimmed muffs. Also the bridesmaid's hats may be trimmed with fresh flowers or they can be worn in the hair.

The little flower girl can carry the ring in a flower-filled basket, on a flower trimmed white satin cushion, or on a small piece of cotton placed in the throat of a white lily.

In addition to flowers for the bride and her attendants, there are corsages for the mothers. Almost any type of flowers can be used so long as they go well with their dresses or the general color scheme of the wedding the bride wishes to carry out.

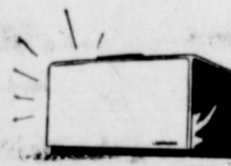
The men in the wedding party should wear white boutonnières. If the bridegroom wears formal clothing, lily of the valley, a white rose or a white carnation is correct. The best-man, fathers and ushers may wear small gardenias for the formal wedding, and white carnations if it is informal. The bride who is married in a tailored suit or informal dress, may wear a corsage, or she may choose a small tailored bouquet to carry.

SUGGESTIONS GIVEN ON FROZEN FOODS

By Mrs. Helen C. Marquardt County H. D. Agent

Quick freezing is one of the most desirable methods of preserving most foods. If foods are properly processed, packaged and stored, quick freezing retains practically the same flavor, texture and nutritive value of the original foods.

Here are tips on freezing vegetables:

Selection and Preparation

Select fresh, tender products at the right stage for eating. When they reach maturity, they should be harvested and frozen without delay. Vegetables lose quality more rapidly after harvesting than before.

The preparation of vegetables for freezing is similar to that required for canning. Wash well, drain, sort, trim, and cut the vegetables as for eating or canning.

Scalding and Heating

A heat treatment is necessary to stop certain undesirable changes which take place in vegetables. This heating also intensifies the color, shrinks the food, and further cleans the product.

Chilling

Cool vegetables immediately at the end of the heating period.

Packaging

There are two methods for packing vegetables which have been scalded, chilled, and drained. One is the dry pack and the other is the brine pack.

Seal and Label

Freeze and Store

All foods are best if they can be frozen quickly, at 20 degrees F in still air or -5 degrees in moving air.

Localities Given Larger Slice Of Highway Taxes

WASHINGTON (UP) — Local governmental units are beginning to receive more money from highway use taxes, according to a survey by the National Highway Users Conference.

The survey showed that 36 states have been considering legislation to turn over a larger portion of highway use taxes to cities, counties, towns and villages. Of these, eight already have passed bills.

Arkansas, Colorado, Indiana, Maryland, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oregon and West Virginia all recently enacted legislation to appropriate more of these funds to municipalities.

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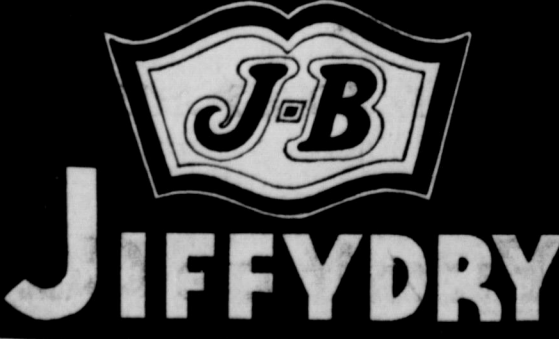
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
