Municipal Swimming Pool To Open Saturday, June 1

Perryton's Municipal Swimming Pool located in the city park will be opened to the public on Saturday, June 1, according to Mayor G. Matherman and Floyd Murry, pool manager. Work has been in progress during the past three months on a general renovation program in preparation for the grand opening at 10:00 a. m. on that day. Swimming will be the theme

in launching the season and all swimming enthusiasts are cordially invited to pay the pool a visit between the hours of 10:00 a. m. and 9:30 p. m., Mr. Murry said. This is the first season the pool has been opened since 1941, and it is being done over with new paint throughout. The bath houses are

being remodeled and the heating plant will be overhauled to provide a consistent temperature during the season. Mr. Murry stated that particular attention would be paid to sanitation. Periodical checks will be made for bacteria, and a continuous circulatory purifying system will be

in operation at all times. Keith and Norma Flowers, who have been qualified as Red Cross life guards will be on duty at all hours during the operation of the swimming facilities. Soft drinks and candies will be available for customers. Pool hours during the season will

be as follows: 10:00 to 12:00 a. m. for ladies and children; from 2:00 to 6:00 p. m. and from 8:00 to 10:00 p. m. for the general public. On Sunday the pool will be open between the hours of 2:00 to 7:00 p. m. only. As in the past, special parties will be accommodated between the hours

of 8:00 to 10:00 a. m. on week days. Season tickets are now on sale by Mr. Murry and may be secured by payment of \$7.00 for adults and \$6.00 for children. These tickets will permit as many swims as the holder desires all during the season. Admission for single plunges are 25c for children and 40c for adults.

Rains Total 1.86 Inch Moisture Tuesday

Abundant rains fell over Ochiltree county and generally over the Middle and North Plains area with a total of 1.86 inches at Perryton by Tuesday. This brings total moisture for the month of May, according to the records but gives little for an increased wheat yield in this area. It will benefit row crops, however.

Rains filled the Canadian river eight feet above its normal from reports received here. The river drain the area over which the rains fell and more was expected to rise much more than was at first reported. The plains area have been hit as follows: Dumas and City, Okla., one inch; Canandaigua, Moebette and Clinton, Okla., averaged one inch; Memphis, Hedley, Claude, Brandon, two inches; Chaney and one-half; Amarillo one inch.

Recorded in Perryton for the month has been as follows: May 9, .22; May 15, .35; May 19, .26; May 28, 1.86.

Instruction School For Supervisors

A supervisory training course for executives, buyers, managers, sponsors, and all others having training and supervisory responsibilities is being conducted in the grand jury room of the Ochiltree county courthouse under the direction of Miss Gertrude Prifce, Extension Service, T. U. This course has been developed especially for Texas merchants, Miss Prifce said. "It deals with personnel relationships and is being offered to Perryton merchants as a service through the Extension Division, The University of Texas, and State Board for Vocational Education, Distributive Education Division. "Personnel administration is constantly strengthening its contribution to business. This course on personnel supervision is aimed at prevention rather than a cure," she further added in commenting on the school.

The first class was held Tuesday between the hours of 8:00 and 10:00 p. m. and other meetings will be conducted May 31, June 3, 5 and 7. It is pointed out that all interested parties missing the first meeting may enroll and attend class on Friday evening, May 31. Certificates will be awarded for those successfully completing the course with 80 per cent attendance. Turner-Pugh Case Reversed by Higher Court

The Court of Civil Appeals, Amarillo, handed down a decision on Monday of this week, reversing and rendering the judgment in favor of T. O. Pugh. The appellate court held that Mary Virginia Scott Turner was entitled to full judgment against T. O. Pugh upon two notes, and rendered judgment for the principal, interest and attorneys fees due upon the notes. The action of the higher court in this case set aside the verdict previously rendered in favor of Pugh and held that the trial court should have granted the motion of plaintiff for an instructed verdict. Mrs. Turner is the former wife of the late J. H. Scott who operated a grain business in Perryton for many years. She was represented by Boyer and McConnell, attorneys of Perryton. Mr. Pugh was represented by R. T. Correll of Perryton and Hoover.

Memorial Day, 1946. The guns are silent—now! Another period of peace has been purchased with the blood and sacrifice of the finest flower of our youth.

Again, as in past decades, we will march to the cemeteries and lay the sweet blossoms of memory on the last resting places of our hero dead.

While we at home are doing the little that we can, on this one annual day of memorial, to honor those who have saved a free America for us who remain, similar ceremonies will be taking place in far places beyond the seas where lie those who have not come home, but who rest on that far frontier of war where duty required that they go.

Again we will parade. We will place flags and flowers over those who fell. We will listen to speeches, hear the rifle salute to the dead—and as the notes of "Taps" are echoed from a distance we may ask ourselves, "Why did this have to be? What can we do to prevent its re-occurrence?"

We note with fresh amazement how the harvest of death has grown since those days when last we observed a peacetime Memorial Day. How far have become the Soldiers' and Sailors' Memorial plots in the four long years our nation was engaged in this last bitter struggle.

The American Legion and its Overseas Graves Decoration Trust will not forget, as it has never forgotten. No grave of those who served the colors will be neglected.

Not only will The American Legion remember our dead on this Memorial Day, but it will recall the years and years during which our people were told: "Unless this nation takes the steps to prevent another war—it could happen again."

The steps were not taken. It did happen again. And again The American Legion tells the nation that these United States must be strong—strong enough to insure the peace we pray for; strong enough to guarantee the peace we love so dearly despite our historic reluctance to pay what it costs in time and interest and money to maintain it.

This Memorial Day again points to the eternal truth—we will pay for peace in one way or another, at one time or another! Either with effort and time and money now, or with the lives of our youth when the war tocsin is heard.

These things The American Legion believes will preserve the peace so dearly won: Full cooperation with other countries to make the United Nations a practical and operating agency; an intelligent effort to understand other nations as we hope they will understand us; The American Legion plan for national security through universal military training.—The National Legionnaire.

Ochiltree county people are responding with their traditional generosity to the nation-wide Emergency Food Collection for the hungry and starving millions overseas. Rev. Ralph Durham, county chairman of the drive announced Tuesday.

J. W. Daniel contributed a check for \$200 and Mrs. H. C. Brown donated \$5 to the list of donors named last week, bringing the total voluntary contributions to \$333.50 since the campaign opened last week, according to Morris M. Payne, treasurer.

Containers have been placed at Earl's Lunch, Bark Drug Co., Sanford Drug and City Drug where those desiring to give small amounts may deposit same. Persons desiring to make contributions direct are asked to contact Mr. Payne at the Herald office.

The appeal for money to buy food for shipment to famine areas is now underway in more than 6,500 cities, towns and villages, of which 500 have been organized since the campaign officially opened May 12. Additional local chairmen are being enlisted daily.

The contributions already received throughout the country indicate that the average American is willing to make more than an average sacrifice and effort to give direct and personal help to some desperately hungry human being overseas.

All money given in Ochiltree county will be sent to national headquarters in New York City, where it will be turned over to UNRRA for expenditure in purchasing food to be sent overseas where most needed.

284,698 Bu. Wheat Sold Under Bonus

In answer to the government's plea for the release of farm stored wheat under the Emergency Purchase Plan and on offer of a 30 cent per bushel bonus above the ceiling price Ochiltree county grain producers had delivered to elevators a total of 284,698 bushels of grain between the period May 13 to acceptance deadline May 25, according to Elliott Lee, secretary for the local AAA office.

Wheat was sold under the plan to the government and delivered to elevators on or before Saturday and immediate payment was made through the AAA office. The ceiling price plus the bonus brought producers approximately \$2.00 per bushel, the highest level reached since World War I.

Babson Discusses Money Rates

ROGER W. BABSON, Editor-in-Chief

Babson Park, Mass., May 24.—Interest rates are today lower than ever before. Banks and insurance companies are hard hit when they have to invest their funds to get only 2 1/2%. When they cannot earn good returns on their investments, it means: (1) that their profits will shrink; and (2) it will soon cost more to buy bank services and insurance of all kinds.

Big Tax Savings
Despite the uncomfortable position in which these companies find themselves, as a result of falling money rates, most readers are unknowingly benefiting from hidden-tax savings. The Liberty Bonds sought during World War I paid

4% or more; the very highest rate available in World War II was 2.9%. Indeed, many of the war bonds issued this time return the holder only 2 1/2%—or even less.

This means that your government—which indirectly means you—is saving 2 percent on the cost of its war money. On each billion dollars borrowed, this saving amounts to \$20,000,000. Since World War II increased our debt by over \$200,000,000,000, this lower money rate results in saving taxpayers over \$4,000,000,000 a year. It was not so many years ago that \$4,000,000,000 would have paid the total cost of running our whole federal government! This means a real tax saving to us all.

Blessing To Home-Owner

When I was a boy back in Gloucester, Massachusetts, no one ever expected to pay less than 6 percent a year for mortgage money. Some paid 7 percent or 8 percent. Today, the savings banks are scrambling to lend money on homes at 4 percent. When you realize that the average borrower will pay interest on his mortgage for twenty years, the total saving in living costs is indeed sizable. On a typical mortgage of \$3,000 a saving of only 2 percent comes to \$100 a year. Over a twenty-year period \$2,000 is saved on a compound-interest basis. That is money which the home-owner can have available for other things.

Following World War I, the electric and gas companies were hard hit, not only by soaring prices, but also by rising interest costs. One of the largest utility companies in the country had to pay 8 percent for sound first-mortgage money in 1920. Now, with World War II closed, an operating utility company recently borrowed money for 2 5/8 percent. Think what a saving of over 3 percent means on a \$30,000,000 loan. On such an amount, there is an annual cost reduction of \$1,500,000. This means that every dollar of this column should be

Bullish on Heavy Industries
Prosperity in this country of ours is highly dependent on a healthy expansion of industry of all kinds, as well as on building, road and other construction. To build a new

factory or plant to give employment requires vast amounts of capital—about \$5,000 for every man employed. The cost of capital, to those men of vision and courage who embark on such ventures, is measured by the money rate they have to pay. Present low "cost of money" is a great stimulus to such job-providing enterprises. Low money rates encourage plant extensions and this means more jobs.

I have one word of warning about this low money rate situation. In a nutshell the low cost of money makes it altogether too easy to borrow. Money is plentiful today and money lenders are anxious to put it to work. If you must borrow to buy or build a home, or to expand your business, or to obtain greater conveniences in your home by all means do so—but do not be lulled to unproductive purchases. Pay off your loans as rapidly as you can! My half a century of experience has driven this home to me, time and again: **if you don't get out of debt when business is good, you won't be able to do so when the turn comes.** My father had this motto on his desk: "Debts kill more men than germs do."

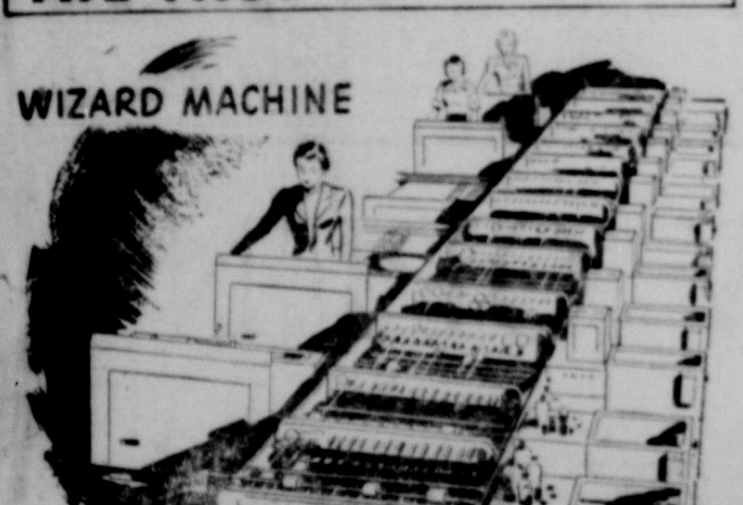

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Teacher Personnel Conditions Texas Warrant Public Concern

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey among the city and county school superintendents to determine the condition of the teacher personnel in Texas, according to J. A. Anderson, Supt. Perryton Public Schools. Replies were received from 945 superintendents representing 36,067 teaching positions or about 80 per cent of the total in Texas. Since the opening of school in September, 3,633 teachers have resigned their positions which represents about 10 per cent of the total. Of the teachers included in the survey, 5,346 were listed with sub-standard qualifications which represents approximately 15 per cent of the total.

Local districts are exerting every effort possible to keep teachers in the classrooms but many superintendents report that it appears impossible to fill all of their positions this coming year because of the low salaries paid and the number of resignations which are anticipated at the close of the current school year. Practically all of the cities in Texas report resignations averaging 13 per cent. Many local school districts are voting to increase their tax rate or will increase property valuations in order to secure more revenue for teachers' salaries. 110 independent school districts have voted a tax increase above the rates they levied a year ago and 143 report that they plan to hold elections for tax rate increases soon. In 40 counties, one or more common school districts have increased their tax rates and 10 counties report that they plan to hold elections for this purpose soon.

It is estimated that 8,900 Texas teachers entered the armed forces and industry from September 1941 through 1945. However, only 1,277 have returned to teaching. In looking over the results of the survey Mr. Anderson said: "If we are to keep a staff of well trained teachers in the public schools of Texas, we must materially increase salaries. There is no other solution to the problem. The continued exodus of our teachers from the class-

rooms presents an alarming condition. We must give our attention to this problem immediately with the hope that local communities and the next session of the legislature will provide greatly increased support for the public schools."

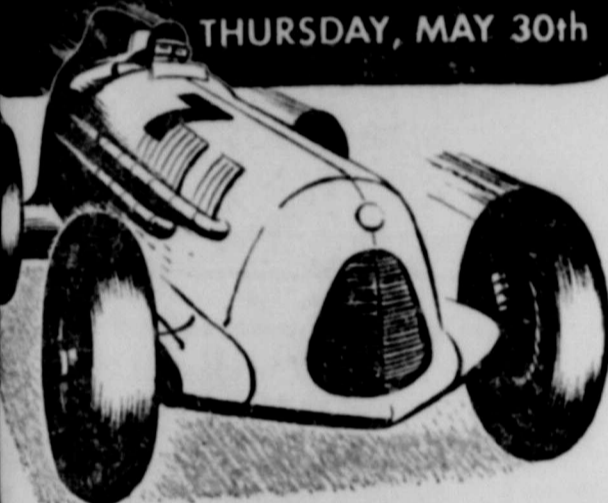

SUNDAY LESSON

Story of Bethany Shows Jesus Both Real and Divine

The International Sunday School
Lesson for June 2
Scripture: Mark 14:3-9; Luke
10:38-42; John 11:1-44; 12:1-3,
Galatians 5:13

MANY people miss the full sig-
nificance of the earthly life
of Jesus through a failure to
grasp with realism the fact of
His humanity.

The significance of His di-
vinity is that it was revealed in
His human life. As John says,
"The Word was made flesh."

Both the human and the divine
in Jesus are made very real in
the story of His friendship with
Martha and Mary, at Bethany,
and with their brother Lazarus.
We see Jesus in the friendly
contacts of that Bethany home,
a welcome guest, accepting the
kindness and hospitality like any
man in need of companionship.
We see Him observing the con-
flict of temperaments between
the two sisters, overcome with
human emotion as He finds the
sisters weeping over the death
of Lazarus.

What humanity in that short-
cut of all verses in the Bible,
"Jesus wept!"

The scriptural passage as-
signed for this lesson from Mark
14 tells of an incident at Beth-
any, but in another home—the
home of Simon the Leper. John
12:1-3 tells of a somewhat sim-
ilar incident in the home of Mar-
tha, when Mary anointed the
feet of Jesus.

The similarity of these inci-
dents does not justify the
supposition that some have
made. There is no clear indi-
cation that the woman men-
tioned in Mark's account was
Mary of Bethany.

The age-old debate concern-
ing the characters of the two
sisters, and the justification of
the one or the other, is not very
profitable, either. There will al-
ways be Marthas and Marys.

The Marthas may complain,
but they wouldn't be happy if
they weren't serving; and Mary
of Bethany is a constant re-
minder that there is something
higher than the satisfaction of
material needs. It is not enough
merely to serve the Master; we
must also listen to His words.

Veterans' News

Many veterans apparently do not clearly understand the regulations governing payment of unemployment benefits under the Service-men's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill). To help clarify the matter, the Veterans Administration offers these reminders:

Veterans who take temporary jobs retain their rights to unemployment allowances after they are released from the jobs.

Veterans are not required to ap-

ply for jobs pay immediately upon leaving service in order to protect their right to unemployment benefits. These benefits may be obtained any time within two years after the official end of the war, or within two years after the veteran's discharge whichever is later.

A veteran may be eligible for unemployment compensation up to \$20 a week if he becomes unemployed any time within the time limit. The maximum period for which he may draw jobless pay is 52 weeks, but benefits need not be drawn for consecutive weeks. A veteran with at least 10 months active service is entitled to the maximum 52 weeks' benefits.

The veteran may apply for compensation as often as he becomes unemployed, provided he does not voluntarily leave his job without good reason, or is not discharged for cause, and still has benefits available. Should veterans become unemployed after using all their veterans' unemployment credit, many of them will have built up enough credit to be eligible for regular State unemployment compensation.

A veteran also may qualify for self-employment allowances if he engages in his own business for profit and does not realize a net income of \$100 a month. In that event, an eligible veteran may draw the difference between his net profit and \$100 for the month for which the allowance is claimed. Self-employment allowances may be drawn for a maximum of 10-2 1/2 months.

A veteran who reenlisted in the service during the war years will be eligible for unemployment benefits when he leaves the service, but in no case can such payments be made later than five years after the end of the war. Thus, a veteran who still has a full two-year period to claim his unemployment benefits after he is discharged.

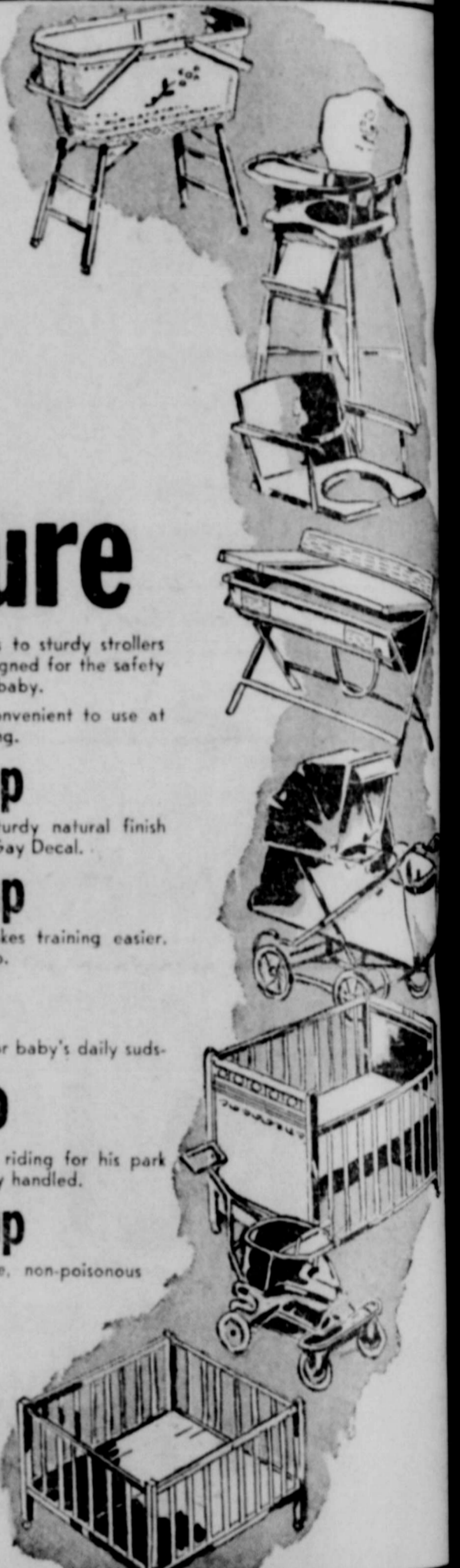

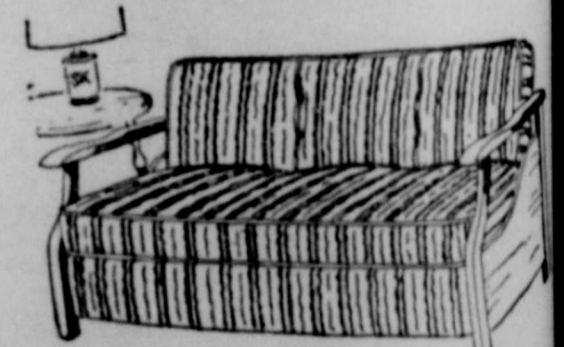
