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State Capital NEWS

Austin. — A blue-ribbon committee named by Gov. John Connally has adopted guidelines for long-range research into public school needs in Texas.

Committee has ordered a survey to determine if the local share of the cost of education is divided fairly.

Known as the Committee on Public School Education, the group has authorized studies in 128 districts over the state, including 30 with 12,000 or more scholars.

Validity of the present economic index—relied on to determine contributions by local school district to the state-wide fund—will be measured carefully to determine how tax assessments compare with actual property value.

Overall study areas agreed on by the Committee include:

Definition of educational goals, program evaluation, personnel matters, financing, administration, impact of the new federal aid programs, effect of integration on educational quality (with particular reference to problems of faculty desegregation), equity of local property taxes, problems of school size, merit salary plans, teacher effectiveness with varying pupil-teacher ratios, and methods of removing incompetent teachers.

A spokesman for the Texas State Teachers Association called on the Committee to make an interim recommendation for another teacher salary raise next year, although the panel study is not due for completion until August, 1968.

TSTA is pushing for a pay boost of about \$60 a month to bring 120,000 Texas teachers to the national average (about \$6,506 a year), together with a built-in "escalation" provision in the state law to guarantee biennial raises, keeping salaries up to the U. S. average.

Committee members displayed widely-varying reactions to the presentation by TSTA's L. P. Sturgeon. Chairman Leon Jaworski of Houston said adequacy of compensation will certainly be weighed by the study group, but noted other pressing state needs and necessity of exploring entire area of school finance.

Pay raises for teachers and state employees likely will be among top money issues before the Legislature in 1967.

RURAL VOTES IMPORTANT—Rural voters were commended highly by Rep. James L. Slider of Naples for making such a strong showing statewide in the number of votes cast in the first primary.

In conferring with House Speaker Ben Barnes, Slider said he considered it of urgent importance that rural voters repeat this performance in the second primary to

offset block votes of metropolitan areas. "Their vote is now a matter of self-preservation, as well as responsible citizenship," he said.

Slider represents the predominantly rural areas of Cass, Marion, Morris and Titus Counties.

OIL PRODUCTION NIPPED—Eight straight months of steady increase in the oil allowable ended when the Railroad Commission dropped production for June back to 34.5 per cent of potential—compared to 35 per cent for May.

Under the June order, a maximum of 3,241,308 barrels a day can be produced, compared with the average at mid-May of 3,270,498.

None of the major purchasers appearing at the last proration hearings requested a bigger allowable for June. Three asked a cut.

Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey said Texas crude oil stocks increased 2,100,000 barrels in 1965, while national stocks declined.

Earlier, the commission was asked by oilmen and geologists to increase from five to ten the number of allowable discovery wells in new fields. Such wells can produce more than usually allowed and are exempt from monthly market demand factor.

On March 28 the commission had increased the onshore oil discovery allowable period from 18 to 24 months. Experts argued that the increasing number of discovery allowable wells would do more to encourage exploration.

McKINNEY CENTER PLANNED—Board of Texas Educational Foundation, Inc., operators of Gary Job Corps Center, voted to undertake direction of a Job Corps Center for Women in McKinney.

Plans for the center tentatively call for an enrollment of 500 girls in the facility to be developed at McKinney's abandoned Veterans Administration Hospital. Board authorized Gary Center Director O. J. Baker to work out details of the contract with the U. S. Office of Economic Opportunity.

A new \$14,000,000 contract has been approved for operation of the Gary Center through June, 1967.

SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS MADE—Texas Highway Department initiated highway safety improvements amounting to \$4,600,000 during April in the continuing war on traffic accidents.

This brings to \$75,500,000 the amount of funds spent or obligated in the Department's current four-year, \$311,000,000 program to eliminate hazardous locations along the Texas highway network.

During April the Department received bids on 10 projects aggregating \$1,500,000 to be financed by the state. State crews began work on 31 other projects with a total value of \$566,000.

Likes Spotlight On Auto Defects To Keep It Off Of Human Defects

Editor note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur has found out about the car safety controversy, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor: In nearly every newspaper I've gotten my hands on in the past two weeks there has been at least one article on the big controversy over whether cars are safe, and while I'd prefer to have the argument going on over whether tractors are safe, if you know what I mean, still I have followed the hearings closely.

According to a report at one session of the Senate Investigating Committee, 8 million cars in the last few years have been found to have defects, out of the 40 or 50 million produced. Of course that included everything, such as a horn that stuck and a windshield wiper that went too slow.

Understand, I'm not in favor of cars' having defects, I'm not even in favor of having one with a tail pipe that'll rust out or oil that needs changing and I think a fender out to snap back into place when you graze it on a fence post, but one can carry statistics too

far. For example, I would not be interested in seeing a Senate Investigating Committee come up with the figures on how many human beings have defects.

Out of the 200 million people produced in this country in the last decade, how many of us you reckon would really pass a safety inspection?

If checking up on that many people is too big a job for the Senate and it decided to narrow the field and get closer to home, how many Senators you reckon would show up without a defect?

I don't have the figures, but it would be interesting to see which are multiplying faster, garages or hospitals. At any given moment, are there more cars in garages than people in hospitals?

I'm not saying I'm typical, but out of the next 365 days, there will be more days when my car and my tractor are in better shape to start than I am.

But let's keep talking about car defects. Anything to get the spotlight off of human defects.

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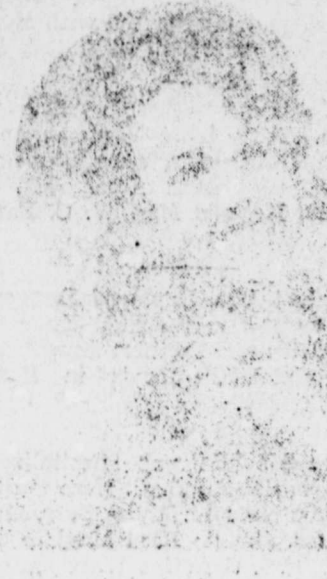

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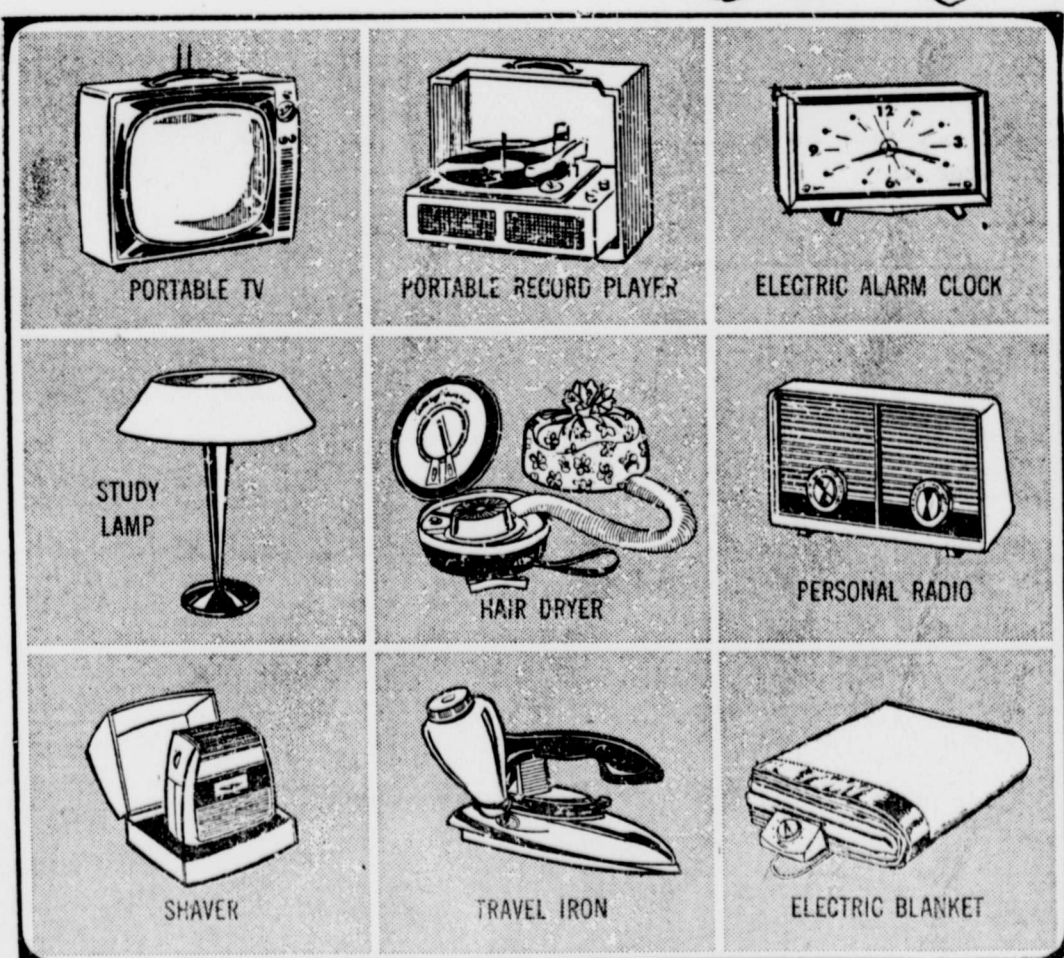
