President Urges American People To Respond To Call Made by Red Cross

President Roosevelt has issued a proclamation urging all who possibly can do so to respond to the American Red Cross appeal which is being made throughout the nation.

In his proclamation, the president pointed out the fact that the Red Cross has responded to calls in 128 disasters in the last year, efficiently and speedily, and that during the same time the organization has developed a countrywide program for safeguarding home and highways from accidental deaths.

Following is the president's proclamation:

"The American Red Cross is an institution in which our people in every walk of life and in every section of the nation can unite in a common tie of brotherhood. It represents them in their instinctive desire to be of a service to suffering humanity. It knows no distinction of race, creed, or color. There are no boundary lines either state or national in its never-ending mission of mercy for those who are in distress."

"During the last year one hundred twenty-eight disasters occurred in thirty-seven of our states. In each catastrophe the afflicted community turned with assurance to the Red Cross for the efficient relief which was so speedily given. During the same time this great organization has developed a countrywide program for safe-guarding our homes and our highways from the mounting toll of accidental deaths. HOULTON, Me., Nov. 19—Maine is a hot potato these days—too hot for the new deal to handle.

Old Dennis Sheehan told me they would live on a crust of bread around here before they'd vote democratic. Dennis is about 80 and an old-time democratic leader in Arrostok county.

He teetered back in his rocker in "the Handy Store—D. Sheehan, Prop." As he discussed the current political situation in Maine.

Sheehan sells a strictly cheap and unostentatious stock of all day suckers, bulk candy, and canned goods.

Sees Demo Victory
He thinks the nation will go for Roosevelt next year, but that Maine will vote for the republican nominee for president—any republican nominee. AGE PENSION BILL SIGNED BY GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, Nov. 19—Gov. James Allred today announced the signing of the officers salary bill and the old age pension measure, Texas' first major attempt at social security legislation.

The legislature adjourned last week, however, without passing also a revenue bill to provide funds for the pension payment. Controversy over various proposals for taxing industries to obtain pension funds blocked passage of the measure at the last minute.

"The bill has its defects," Governor Allred explained, "and I am sure it is not exactly as any of us would prefer. I really feel, however, that it was little short of an achievement to get any kind of an old age pension bill through."

He said he would call another special session in January to finance the pension payment.

The bill does not go into effect for 90 days. It provides for an appointive commission of three members and a director to administer the pension act.

Pensions will start not later than July 1, 1936, to 1,650,000 needy Texans past 65 years of age.

No Let Down

Merchants of Cisco will give away, absolutely free, turkeys to the people who are in town for the event.

The trades day is sponsored by the Daily News and the definite hour of the event will be announced in the regular trades day edition of the Thursday weekly American and Roundup and the Daily News of either Thursday or Friday.

First Big Crowd
Merchants of the city already are preparing for increased buying in the holiday period, and Saturday's trades day event is expected to bring to the city the first big crowd.

Arrangements are already being made by merchants to take care of the unusually heavy trade on that date.

The rules of the contest for obtaining a turkey for Thanksgiving are simple. The place of meeting will be announced in the trades day edition, and the people will assemble at the first appointed place and hour.

Just Catch Turkey
Promptly at that hour a turkey will be thrown out to the crowd and whoever captures him will become the owner.

The contest will move on to the next place in the previously announced route. Another turkey will be thrown to the crowd and so on until all the turkeys have been given away.

Every turkey will be given away in front of the place of business giving the turkey.

Only one turkey will go to a family. If a turkey is captured by a member of a family already having captured a turkey, the bird will be re-thrown, and so on.

There are no strings on the contest—nothing to buy—just be able to capture a turkey before someone else gets him.

After the contest, all birds not wanted will be sold to the highest bidder, if those who capture them should desire it.

CONCLUSION IN STEEL BIDDING CHARGE AIRED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19—Public Works Administrator Ickes said today he was sending President Roosevelt "a statement of facts with prima facie evidence of collusion" in steel bids on two government financed projects.

The material is probable submission to the federal trade commission for investigation.

Ickes at the same time said he was increasing 15 per cent differential allowed domestic steel over foreign producers, steel to 25 per cent on all orders amounting to \$100 or more.

Plan for Brazil Trade Announced

Thomas said the plan would also release \$17,000,000 in frozen credits owed by Brazilian merchants to American business firms.

Economists enthusiastically greeted the tentative agreement as one of the most important events of the year in foreign trade. Thomas said the council was negotiating with the Brazilian government for final completion of the plan.

Red Cross Roll Call

The annual roll call for the American Red Cross began here today with the meeting of workers for the purpose of organizing their house to house canvass.

Workers will call upon all residents of Cisco and solicit their membership in this worthwhile organization. Cisco likely will respond to the call and join the other cities contributing to the aid of stricken and needy humanity.

The Red Cross makes only one distinction in giving aid. It does not bother with race, color, position, or creed lines. It asks only that its funds be used where they are actually needed. Its peculiar setup enables it to send aid to points of distress before other charities can organize and for this reason it has been particularly beneficial in times of depression and emergency.

Texas Voted Drivers License Bill

In the closing hours of the second called session, the Texas legislature enacted a drivers' license bill. Thanks to the senate for the boon to the people who ride or walk the public highways or city streets.

It is not model measure. There are many gaps in it, but future lawmakers will have an opportunity to add amendments and make it as drastic as the public demand it. Many of its provisions are said to be harmless, or worthless, but it is the best that could be won for the champions of public safety at this time. The department of public safety, meaning the rangers and the highway patrol, will have a voice in its enforcement. They are the guardians of peace, and should be given the support of the public.

Another Called Session Coming

Another called session is on the road for January and the new year. Then the senators and representatives will be called upon to provide revenue for the support of the pensioners of the state. The same taxation bill, known as the omnibus bill, went down in defeat.

It had the backing of the senate, but it failed in the house by a few votes. Indeed, it is said that the heads of the brotherhood rail organization and their allies in the state federation of labor, defeated the sales tax amendment—and then it was all lost for this session.

There is a liquor control measure. Its major provisions have been given to the reading public. District and county officers will go on the salary list, and the fee system, it is predicted, will disappear forever under the skies of Texas. It came in years and years ago. Hogg battled against it. All his successors fought the system while they were in office. Now, under Gov. James Alfred, it will pass out of the picture as well as "the pocket of the taxpayers."

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON—The mystery as to what NRA is doing may be considered partially solved.

It's making campaign material for Senator Borah.

One may be neutral in the argument whether NRA's post-Schechter activity as a great research project—code histories, post-code studies, and whatnot—is valuable, or whether NRA is merely pawing through its own files to no particular purpose.

But the fact that NRA, which was instructed by law to prevent monopolies and has often been accused of fostering monopolies, is spending millions of dollars on business and post-mortem research without making any study at all of monopoly has struck the few persons who realize this as most bizarre.

Several weeks ago a unit was organized to study the evils of monopoly, coercion of business, and predatory competition. Its dozen lawyers and economists were told to find out whether codes had bred monopoly, whether they had resulted in coercion, and whether the monopolists, coercers, and predatory competitors were now doing their stuff without legal sanction.

The unit has been summarily abolished, with the explanation that its work might irritate monopolists, coercers, and predatory competitors. The abolition is traced to Maj. George Berry, one of NRA's bosses, who will have a convention of business men to get ideas as to new NRA legislation and apparently doesn't want to hurt anybody's feelings.

Borah, in his fight to make monopoly a Republican issue,

undoubtedly will make use of this quaint incident. Especially if he gets hold of reports of investigators who scratched surfaces for two weeks in New York, Philadelphia, Newark, Hartford, and Boston before they were called off.

AN hour after President John A. Lewis of the United Mine Workers had punched President William L. Hutcheson of the Carpenters' Union at the A. F. of L. convention, the miners' leader received a telegram from a member of the Carpenters' Union in Kansas City, Mo. It simply said: "Sack him again."

SOME who believe General Johnson is trying to devour the Democratic donkey (whether he means to or not) recall that Johnson was sponsored for West Point 35 years ago by an Oklahoma politician known as "Eat-a-Mule" Callahan.

Callahan was a Populist and was elected on a Populist-Democratic ticket as territorial delegate to Congress. The big issue was free land for settlers and Callahan ran for office promising that if he didn't get free land he would "eat a mule."

So when Callahan didn't get a free land bill through and came to the political convention expecting to be renominated, some of the boys killed and barbecued a mule and served it up to him.

Then they laughed Callahan out of the renomination and named Dennis Flynn, who later got free land for them. Meanwhile, young Mr. Johnson was safe at West Point.

Legislative Investigators

AUSTIN, Nov. 19—There was "one of those moments" when Gov. Paul V. McNutt of Indiana addressed the Texas legislature.

Gov. Alfred, introducing McNutt, had praised his record of cutting state expenses of wiping out a big deficit, of paying the state's debts, keeping schools and pensions going, and accumulating a state surplus.

"I don't recommend it to you," Gov. McNutt said. "Our way is just one way, but we did it with this sort of system." Lowering his voice, he added, among other "and a one per cent sales tax."

Governor Alfred had just reiterated his opposition to a sales tax. The sales tax was a hot issue in the legislature. A laugh of appreciation of the situation went up in the house, and the warm advocates of the sales tax broke into vigorous cheering.

The extraordinary good fortune of the Brazos river project, to move along without a hitch toward starting the biggest single work program in the state, held good when the Brazos sponsors went to the legislature asking that some of the future tax diversion money be made available at once as a legislative loan appropriation.

Sponsors got the bill up in the final hours of the house session and were able not only to pass it but to muster far over 100 votes, so that the act will be effective when approved.

Under this, preliminary expenses, including the purchase of some of the lands and materials, can be met at once, and the work program hustled along rapidly.

The Brazos project, whose ultimate cost will be over 30 million dollars, will create values that will pay the state back in far less time than the 20 year period during which state taxes in 10 counties applied to its financing.

Conference committees have been proven again the most powerful single bit of legislative machinery. All the major bills went to conference groups in the face of wide differences between the senate and house, and were whipped into shape acceptable to both branches.

The legislature at this past session refused to restrict the power of conference committees to the narrow limits that apply in congress. In Texas, conferees may write an entirely new bill and bring in matter and language not adopted in either house. In congress, the adjustment is merely the acceptance or rejection in toto of amendments put by one branch on the bill originating in the other.

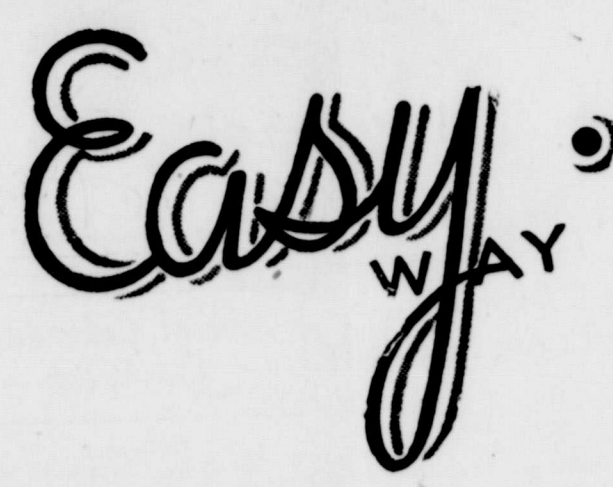

Williams was killed last August 11 during the holdup of a poker game in the woods near the Dallas-Denton county line Fred Batson, Cleburne, also is under indictment in companion cases of murder and robbery.
