

## Mitchell County Voters To Elect Local Leaders

Mitchell County voters will have an opportunity to select their local leaders Saturday when the polls open.

Voters will be electing school board, hospital board and city council leaders.

Loraine and Colorado City voters will choose school board and city council representatives. Westbrook voters will elect school board members and all of Mitchell County will choose county school board members and hospital district representatives.

Three incumbents are seeking re-election to the Mitchell County School Board unopposed. They are J. M. Templeton, T. C. Moore and W. A. Bell.

Bell, Templeton and Moore will be the order of names in the Mitchell County School Board ballot.

Voting for the county school board will be at the Loraine Lion's Club building and at the curriculum room of the Colorado Independent School District administration office.

Election judges for the county school board election will be the same as for the Colorado City, Westbrook and Loraine school boards.

Tuesday afternoon absentee voting closed with only one vote being cast in the Mitchell County hospital district board election.

Three board seats are up for election for the hospital board and each incumbent—Murrell Blassingame, Bob Reilly and T. C. Moore—is seeking re-election. There are no other candidates for the hospital board.

Reilly, Blassingame and Moore will be the positions of the names on the hospital board ballot.

Election for the hospital board will be held at Mitchell County Court House lobby from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Saturday. Dennis Walding will serve as election judge and Mike Burt will assist him.

According to George Whitten, secretary for the hospital board, about 120 voters are expected to cast

ballots in the hospital election.

"We're hoping for at least 500 votes," said Brenda Tarter, city secretary for Colorado City, in regard to the city council election set for Saturday.

Four candidates are seeking election to fill the places of Marion Bassham, Lee Jones and Larry Hamner. Mrs. Bassham is the only incumbent seeking re-election. Tom Goss, Jesse Munoz and Loyd Ledbetter are vying for council seats.

The order of the names on the City Council of Colorado City ballot will be Bassham, Ledbetter, Goss and Munoz.

Council voting will take place at city hall from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Eddie Mitchell

is election judge and Dwain McGuire, Sue McGuire and Cresta Mitchell will assist him.

When absentee voting came to a close Tuesday afternoon, 15 ballots had been cast in the city council contest.

Four candidates are vying for two open slots on the Colorado City Independent School Board.

Incumbents, S. L. Mac Morris and Tom Rees are seeking re-election and Bob Motley and Coleen Palmer are running for positions.

On the Colorado City School Board ballot, the names will be positioned as follows: Motley, Rees, Palmer and Morris.

At the close of absentee voting Tuesday, 25 ballots had been cast for the Colorado City school board election.

Voting for the school board will be held in the curriculum room of the administration building. The polls will be open from 8 a.m.-7 p.m.

Bob Reilly will serve as election judge for the school board and Billie Marie Long and Margie Wulfjen will assist him.

In the Loraine City Council election, two incumbents are running unopposed, Roy Holland and Doris Henderson are seeking re-election to the council.

Holland will be the first name on the Loraine City Council ballot, followed by Henderson.

Ballots for city council candidates can be cast at city hall between 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Saturday.

Election judge for the Loraine City Council will be Christine Britton.

No absentee votes were cast in the Loraine City Council election.

The Lion's Club building will be the location of the Loraine school board election. Polls will be open from 8 a.m.-7 p.m. and Ted Lefevre will act as election judge.

Seven absentee ballots were cast for the school board election which has six people in the race.

Three seats are open on the board and incumbent's Linton Ray Webb, George Martin and Ronald Bruce are seeking re-election. Also running are JoAnn Merket, Edward Beaty and Dean Oliver.

Westbrook School Auditorium is the site of the polls for the Westbrook school board election.

In conjunction with National Library Week, the Brush & Palette Club will present the Mitchell County Art Show, beginning Saturday.

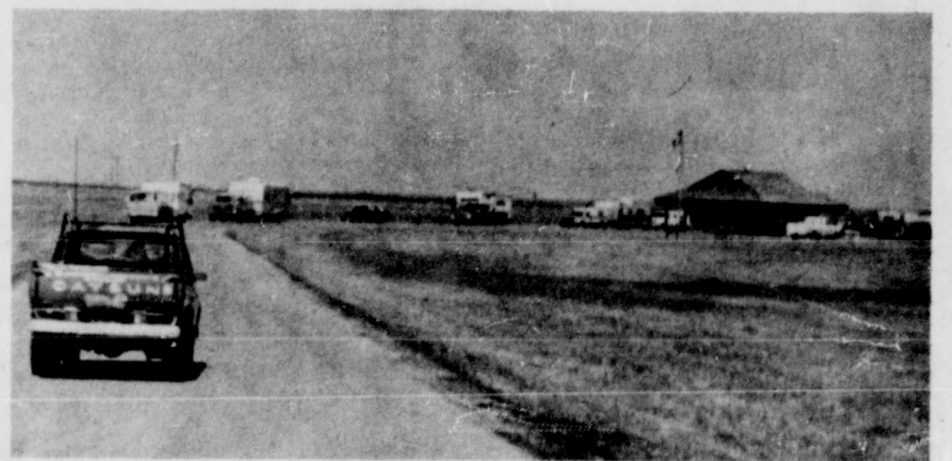
The art exhibit will run from April 1-8.

## Council Visits Sewage Site

Greatly needed repairs and improvements have been completed at the Colorado City Water and Sewerage treatment plants. The City Council went in force to the sites Tuesday to inspect the work and equipment before making final payment of \$41,000 due April 10.

The facilities were neat, clean and all in good repair. The new equipment included hydraulic valves, control panels, filter systems, pumps, a new digest cover and general equipment.

City Manager James Campbell noted that the city is currently using two million gallons of water daily. This figure jumped from one million overnight this past Sunday because people began to water lawns.

The holding capacity of the water system is 2.8 million gallons. City water is pumped from Lake Colorado City into the treatment plant west of town. The council gave unanimous approval of the work completed.

The Council reconvened in the City Hall and held its regular business meeting.

A bid for City owned property blocks 114 and 115 which were previously

bid were awarded to Floyd Shepherd for \$251.

Campbell was granted permission to advertise for bids on Group Life and Health Insurance for the city employees. Currently Blue Cross and Blue Shield is carrying the city insurance policies.

The city discussed proposed changes in the 1978-79 budget and noted that the only major change was to be the increased revenue from the sewer department. These funds are to be used for capital improvements, according to Campbell, to upgrade the system.

In the City Manager's report, Campbell noted a request to open and extend East 13th Street. Since no prior agreement either in writing or verbal had been considered by the Council the request was denied.

Campbell also noted the City had received a petition from citizens to lay a water line from East 7th and Austin to the City Park. He noted that that project would follow the Vine Street water line project.

A suggestion was made some time ago for the city to keep and sell garbage bags to citizens. This suggestion was made to help facilitate the trash pick-up

and to try to control loose trash. Campbell noted that the city could purchase 30 gallon bags in bulk and sell them through city hall at about half the price of retail stores.

Southwestern Bell's telephone rate increase is being held for consideration for the next four months by the public utilities commission. Campbell stated that for \$138 the city could hire a representative to appear before the commission on the city's behalf. The Council will take further action on this matter.

An old pickup truck and 4,000 feet of heavy chain were left at the auxiliary airfield when the Air Force turned it over to the city. The city is anticipating obtaining title to the field within the next week. Campbell requested permission to sell these items and use the proceeds to help in the restoration of the field. These items are to be put up for bids by the city.

Councilmen's reports included a suggestion to fence the sewer plant because of the location of the ballfields next to the plant and the possible danger of injury to someone inadvertently entering the plant area.

## Parks Are Locale Of Summer Fun

With summer fast approaching, thoughts have turned to summer recreation. Already campers are waiting in line at the Colorado City State Park for camping spots.

City Manager James Campbell, noted that "there are a number of summer recreation plan-

ning programs underway now."

The Jaycees have started building a softball diamond next to the present field on Central Street in the south part of town.

He noted that the city also has plans to make improvements to Fisher Park at Lake Champion which has public boat ramps. He also noted this is a fishing lake, there is no skiing allowed on the lake due to the water level.

Fisher Park has a bait shop, grocery store, camping grounds and picnic areas. There is a minimal charge of 50c per day or \$5 a year for using these facilities.

Ruddick Park has Lone Wolf Creek where children up to 16 or adults over 65 are allowed to fish.

The swimming pool located at Ruddick Park will be opened this year on schedule even though it has major problems.

Because this is the only public pool in Mitchell County there is a great influx of people the beginning of the summer. Campbell noted that the number of persons using the facility usually wanes as the summer progresses.

The pool, built in early 1930's has not had a major face-lift since 1964 when all its filter equipment was replaced according to Campbell.

Although it has had minor repairs annually, it leaks water badly.

Plans are underway to fill the cracks in the floor and walls with an Epoxy type material. Epoxy paint will be used to help seal the gaps. Campbell noted that cement may be required in the larger cracks.

Last year the pool was open about 10 weeks. One manager and two lifeguards ran the pool. The hours of operation were from 1 p.m. until 7 p.m. each day and closed on Wednesday. The same schedule is planned for the coming season.

"Water conservation is always a problem in an area like ours. Water for the pool is pumped from Lake Colorado City," Campbell stated.

Since the lake water system was put into use, rather than the well system, it has been necessary only once to use conservation measures.

The Colorado City Lake is maintained at 2,057 feet above sea level. Water is pumped from Lake Champion to maintain that level. Currently the lake is at 2,057.4 feet above sea level. The overflow level is 2,070.2. The lake has only reached that level three times since it was built.

"We have lots of good (park) expansion plans but no money," Campbell stated. He added that now the Parks and Recreation Board has become active perhaps more money can be allocated in that area.

## Council Candidates Slate Ideas, Views

The Colorado City Council election will be held Saturday with four candidates running for the three seats to be vacated.

Marion Bassham, Larry Hamner and Lee Jones Jr. have expiring terms with only Bassham running for re-election. The following letters were solicited from each candidate in order to better acquaint the public with the candidate's views on issues and answers.



Marion Bassham

To all the citizens of Colorado City, Texas:

"I have been on your city council four years. This has been good for me. I have had many encouraging words from you for which I am sincerely grateful on the strength of your support and a strong positive feeling of my own. I am asking for another two year term in which to work for our town.

"Helping to keep the city is sort of like keeping house. One never really gets finished but it is a rewarding feeling that comes to a housekeeper when her guests say, 'We have enjoyed being in your home.' It seems to me that we would all be proud to hear travelers say, 'Colorado City, Texas is a good place to stop-to rest-to play-to eat.'

"I have been wondering for some time if we are trying to be a 'city,' when we are supposed to be a 'town.' When I say this it is a figure of speech. Personally I don't like cities—except for visits. I would rather live in a town. However, I do not intend to move from 898 East 8th Street because that house is exactly right for me.

"Much good came to Colorado City since the passing of the Bond Election two years ago but I am well aware that there is much left to do:

1) "Many of our streets need attention.  
2) "Drainage from alleys and streets is a problem.  
3) "We are going to have to work improving our airstrip while negotiating for a new one.

4) "The cemetery board members must be active and progressive.

5) "Our parks must be continuously cared for and improved.

6) "We are out growing

Dear Mac,  
"Many thanks for the opportunity to express an interest in the upcoming city council election.

"Most pre election statements contain little substance, but I don't mind expressing my thinking on some of the things that people are talking about.

"The ambulance service situation has caused comment, with most people saying that it should be in the hands of the hospital. The hospital does seem to have adequate manpower and their business is handling sick people. An ambulance run will generally end at the hospital. Transfers begin there.

"Everybody says more money will be needed. I don't know what present fees are, but I feel that they should be raised to take care of some of the expense. Every effort should be made to operate an ambulance service as economically as possible. Attempts should be made to end ambulance use as a taxi service.

"If elected, I would vote for whatever seems to be the best and most economical solution. I would certainly favor ending the use of police as a full time ambulance service and reducing the number of police to a police work level. This can be done by attrition, without firing anyone.

"I have heard some adverse comment about recent pay raises for city personnel. I haven't checked the new payroll figures, but offhand, I would think they were justified.

"I'm not so sure about the recent sanitary-sewer increase. This was a 50 per cent increase and I think it ill becomes us to fuss about the increase being asked for other utilities if we ourselves set so poor an example."

Dear Record:

"Thank you for the opportunity to express my views on certain issues prior to election time. My statement is as follows:

"My position is that, if elected, I would like to help see that Colorado City continues to advance at a consistently good pace and to do so with good, sound, financial business practice.

"I wouldn't like to see the city grow so fast that it loses its 'home town' atmosphere, or get on an unsound financial basis by over-spending and causing taxes to rise.

"There are a few projects I would like to see accomplished, in the near future, for the betterment of Colorado City.

1. "An improved airport with adequate run-ways and services, for the following reasons:

A. "Because of the high cost of travel, and the high cost of management personnel, any industry of any size needs the facilities of a decent airport, and this is one of the first things they consider when scouting for an area in which to locate.

B. "The transit trade that this would develop would bring in considerable taxes in gasoline sales and related items. I feel certain we would see a considerable increase in local owned aircraft being based here, which would also bring in taxes from gasoline, hangar rent, etc.

"Let me assure you that flying is no longer a 'rich man's toy,' but is essential for any growing industry. The reason being that flying is so much more fuel efficient than auto travel, plus it enables industry to derive so much more production out of management personnel due to the accessibility and speed provided by air travel.

2. "We need continued improvements in our water

distribution system in Colorado City; as you know, a considerable amount has already been done in the last two years.

3. "I feel we need more concentrated advancement on our park systems in Colorado City and Lake Champion. This would result in two things for the betterment of our city:

A. "I would give our families (especially our children) a place to play and enjoy themselves.

B. "It would bring more tourism into the immediate area of Colorado City proper. This, in turn, would bring in more tax dollars to the city by sales tax and related business taxes, which in turn would pay for these improvements without an added tax burden being placed on the tax-payers of Colorado City.

4. "I definitely see a need for us to make a more concentrated effort to get more adequate housing in Colorado City. I feel it is needed in the form of both apartments and moderately priced single-dwelling houses. If this is accomplished, Colorado City will be much more attractive to new industry when they do consider locating here.

"Let me illustrate that all above items need to be accomplished with good, sound, solid financial business practice...strictly on a 'pay as you go' basis.

"We all know this deficit spending that is done by our federal and state governments is the reason for such heavy tax burdens on the people, and the cause of accelerated inflation which is destroying each and every one of our budgets."

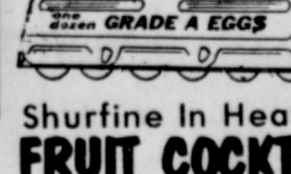

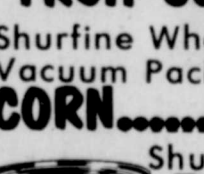
