Board Reorganizes, Approves Services

Votes were canvassed in Monday evening's regular meeting of the school board and oath of office administered by Superintendent Ted Averitt to June Brown and Cecil Ray Jones.

Officers were elected with Wamon Foster as president; Bill Rich, vice president; and Joe Edd Carson, secretary.

School attorney Paul Lyle met with the board to discuss duties of new school board members.

Approval was given for the purchase of a new 53 passenger bus for route number one. Also okayed was the proposal athletic budget of \$14,500, submitted by athletic director Bill Taylor for the school year of 1977-78.

The board approved media services, drug education and crime prevention and contracted services fees relating to Title I from Region XVI Service Center for 1977-78.

July 1 was set as the deadline for all resignations. Teachers will be released after this date if a good replacement can be employed in their place. Resignation was accepted Monday evening of Mrs. Martha Sue Mears as homemaking teacher.

Mrs. Mears is anticipating motherhood.

The school calendar for 1977-78 was approved. The scheduled teacher work-day April 18 was changed to April 25 because of delay in six weeks tests.

"A very good sale" was the report of Hart Lion's Club's 1977 broom sale held Election Day. Deposits from the sale were reported at \$2,364 with a number of "IOU's" still to be collected.

Announcement was made of the district and state conventions. District 2T2 Queen's Contest will be held Friday night during the June 2-5 Convention which is to be held in the Hilton Inn in Amarillo. Lions Sweetheart Jana Mapp will represent the club in the contest.

Announcement was made that local American Legionnaires will meet Tuesday evening in the Legion building to conclude details for civic clubs use of the building.

Lion Boss Weldon Jones asked if members wished to visit with other Lions Clubs in the district in small teams of perhaps six members. A number indicated interest in this project.

Lion Theron Morrison paid five dollars for not helping conduct the broom sale. Announcement was made that the Lions will be guests of the CVAE students for the next club meeting, Monday, April 18. The meeting will be held in the CVAE lab.

Frank Barnes, fire chief, presented a program concerning the Volunteer Fire Department. "Tornado season is here," he said, reminding members that the fire department volunteers have had the responsibility of manning the city's warning system and will continue to offer that service to fellow residents.

During the event of a tornado's threat to Hart, the fire department will put four vehicles out about town and will also be broadcasting on Channel 14 on CB's, Barnes said.

The fire department has a severe weather scanner at the city hall. Barnes said "It's up to

me whether to blow the whistle or not."

Barnes said "We have had less vicious thunderstorms since we've had the hail suppression program."

In the event of an emergency when the electric power is off, trucks will "patrol" the city to sound the alarm. An additional phone, installed for emergencies, is installed in the fire department. That number is 938-2595.

"We desperately need more volunteers in the department. This is a community responsibility. We need help when we need it. We can use financial aid but we are desperate for more man power. We'll train you, too."

Barnes reminded members that two blasts of the siren indicate a fire drill. Three blasts are sounded to alert citizens of the possibility of a tornado and one continuous blast means "take cover."

Cook Of The Week

"I can always manage time for needlepoint," says Mrs. Ed Bennett. Completed samplers and pillows which prove her mastery of that needlecraft art add a decorator's touch to the Bennett home. The beautiful stitchery may be found in every room as well as in the homes of family members and friends.

ALL BRAN BREAD

Melt $\frac{3}{4}$ c. Crisco and add 1 c. All Bran cereal. Measure 3 c. lukewarm water and add one package yeast. Let set one minute. Add $\frac{3}{4}$ cup sugar, 1 tsp. salt and 2 cup flour.

Stir well then add All Bran mixture. Add 5 cup flour (7 in all). Let rise in warm place two hours or double in size.

Work down and put in two regular and one small loaf pan pressing flat. Let rise double. Bake 325° until done. When cool slice, butter and warm when ready to serve. It may be frozen after slicing and buttering.

APPLE PUDDING

$\frac{1}{4}$ c. Crisco
1 c. sugar
1 egg
1 c flour
 $\frac{1}{2}$ t salt
1 t soda
1 t cinnamon
2 lge apples, peeled & diced
 $\frac{1}{2}$ c nuts

Cream together sugar, Crisco and egg, add flour, soda and cinnamon. Then stir in apples and nuts. Bake in 9x9 pan 20-25 min. 375°. Serve warm with hot sauce.

Sauce:

$\frac{1}{4}$ c butter
1 c sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ c brown sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ can milk

Boil this 3 or 4 min. Let cool, add 1 tsp. vanilla.

1 can cream of celery soup

Five Minutes With The Bible

FRIENDS AND FOES OF THE TRUTH

Within today's world, there are friends and foes of the truth, each with their own distinct characteristics. A friend of the truth will not sell the truth, but buy it at every opportunity, while on the other hand, the foe of the truth will sell the truth if it personally benefits him or wins other followers to his belief. A friend of the truth will stand for the truth, boldly and firmly, and will not compromise it, no matter what the cost or consequences involved or the shame or reproach he has to bear because of his stand for the truth. In contrast, a foe of the truth will compromise the truth or go along with error at the very first sign of persecution or difficult circumstances if such will save him from danger personally or causes him to gain a few followers.

Futhermore, a friend of the truth is willing to study the truth diligently and with an open mind in order to learn more precious principles and applications of truth to his life to better improve himself. On the other hand, a foe of the truth will approach a study of

the truth with preconceived ideas and prejudices. He already has his mind made up what he will discover when he studies the truth. His mind is completely closed to any new principles or lessons he might find there.

A friend of the truth will do everything he possibly can in preserving the truth in its unadulterated, pristine purity. He will not allow it to become contaminated with human opinions, fables, and the vain philosophies or traditions of men. In contrast, a foe of the truth will grab every new idea of men that comes along to suit his purpose for propagating error and will treat these new ideas as an actual part of the truth. If a particular human philosophy sounds good to him he will add it readily to his message to win more followers to his false cause.

A friend of the truth will not subtract from it, but will declare all of the truth to the best of his ability on any subject no matter what consequences that he may face as the result of his declaration of the truth in love. However, a foe of the truth will proclaim only those portions of the truth that supposedly proves his

erroneous doctrines or ideas or that will tickle the itching ears of his audience. If necessary, he will subtract from the truth or present only partial truth pulled completely out of context to prove his false doctrine or to keep it intact. Are you a friend or foe of the truth? 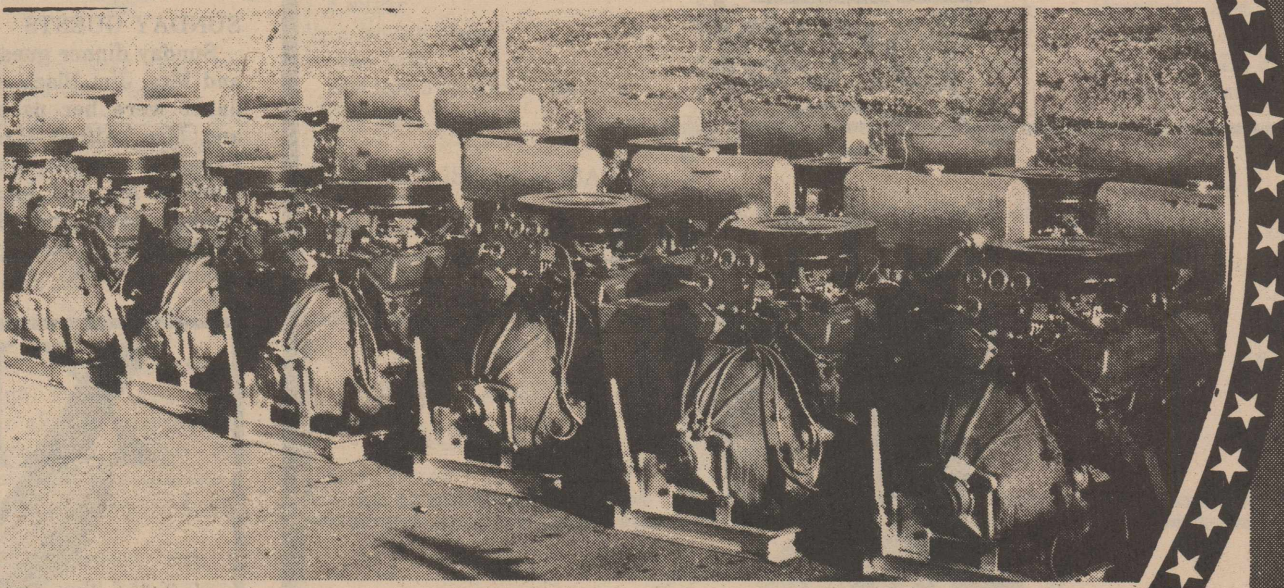

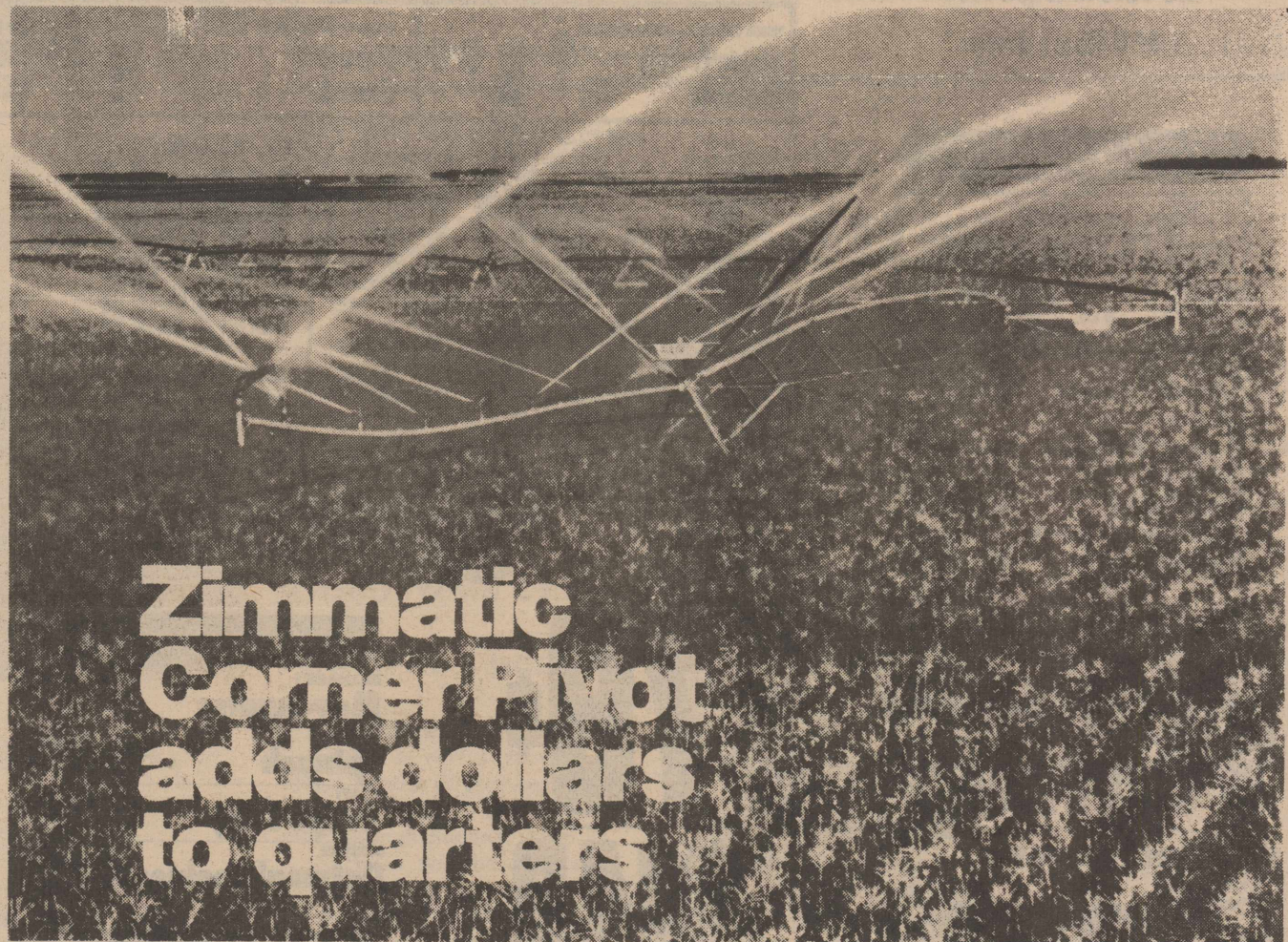
