In 1950 Mary Ann Back, daughter of Johnnie R. and Birdie Back and then a senior in McLean High School, wrote a term theme on McClellan Creek. This story was entered in an historical essay contest sponsored by the Panhandle-Plains Society and won for its writer first prize of \$100.00.

In her story Mary Ann described the Eldridge Cemetery on McClellan Creek and five miles north of Alanreed as the oldest burial ground in the county and raised the question of whose remains were in the six graves—only one of which was marked. That mystery the Alanreed-McLean Historical Society has not yet solved, but we're getting closer to the solution.

But, Mary Ann, we have news for you. Johnny Carpenter has found an older graveyard than Eldridge. Just how old, we do not know and just how many people are buried there is still to be determined.

On Tuesday, April 30, Johnny's eagle eyes spied a bone shining in the sun on the banks of McClellan Creek. A closer scrutiny proved it to be a human bone. Then the digging began and his clever young wife Cindy joined in like a trapper. Soon some ribs were uncovered, then the double-up legs came into view, and later an arm bone.

By this time things were getting exciting. Johnny called us and we became excited, too. Maud assumed the roll of baby-sitter and Milton came to help the younger ones. By Saturday, parts of two skeletons were visible, so Dickie and Effie Lou Everett, with their young son James, joined the party.

Numbers of artifacts were uncovered, including beads, spears, a part of a bow, flint, burned rocks - showing there had been a camp fire there at one time. Another phone call and, accompanied by Oleta Harris, Leslie and Halcyon Back, we grabbed our polaroid and rushed out. The camera cooperated and we got some very good shots, but what we got the most was the thrill, the enthusiasm, and the feeling of mystery which pervaded the place.

David Pool and his father, Harlon Pool, joined the party, and David tried his hand at photography, too.

We came away reluctantly and had hardly calmed ourselves, when the phone rang and we heard the news: Milton had found two peace pipes, and all of them had a part in the uncovering of another skeleton.

We called Paris Hess, chairman of the Advisory Committee of the Museum Committee (of which Ruby Cook is chairman). Paris drove out for a few more pictures.

In the meantime, the Carpenters were seeing that the skeletons were covered with lacquer as soon as exposed to the air and properly protected from the

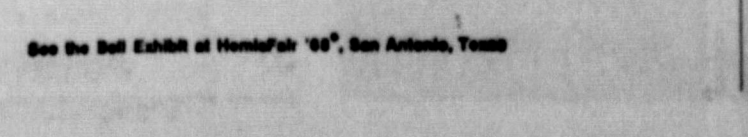

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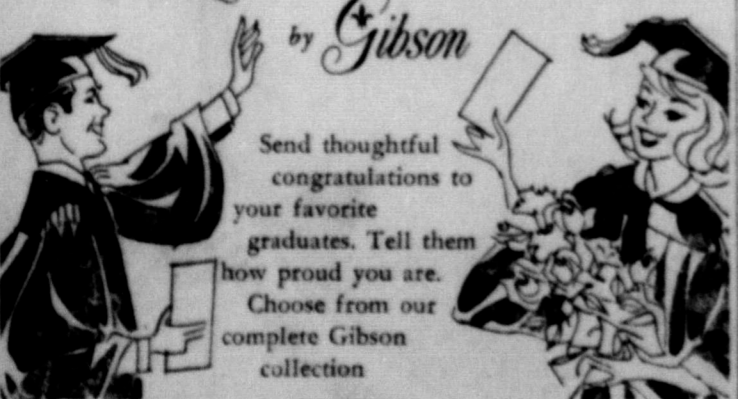
