Trustees Administered Oath Of Office Tuesday

School board members canvassed ballots and declared Joe Edd Carson and Deryl Clevenger winners in the school trustee election at the regular meeting of the board Tuesday evening.

The oath of office was administered the newly elected members by Superintendent Ted Averitt.

W. T. King was elected president of the school board. David Nelson was named vice

president and Deryl Clevenger, secretary.

Paul Lyle, school attorney, met with the board. He discussed duties of the board members and also spoke concerning delinquent school tax suits.

Board members set the bonus for teachers for the 1972-73 school year at \$500 above the state base schedule. Contract services to PESO Education Service Center under Title I and Special Education for 1972-73 was also approved.

In other action, trustees approved the purchase of \$748.72 worth equipment and tools for the Vocational Agriculture department. The state will pay \$534 of the amount.

John Henry Robinson, Erasmo Castillo, James McLain and Brown finished third in the 440 relay with a 46.5.

Cindy Dyer continued to collect wins in track competition Tuesday, by taking first place in the 80-yd hurdles. Her time was 11.0. The win qualifies her to compete in the regional meet April 29 in Levelland.

cated to finding a cure for cancer.

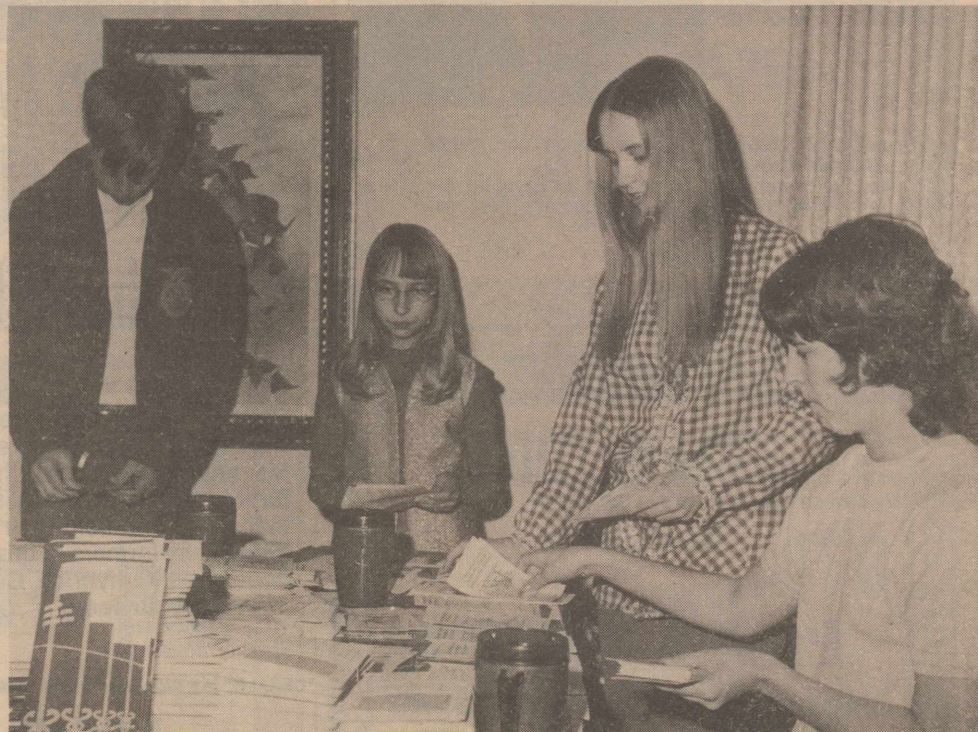

"Vaccinate now for VEE" is the theme of a new campaign urging vaccination of horses for the sleeping sickness disease, Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE).

The 1972 campaign calls for vaccination of all equines (horses, mules, donkeys, etc.) not vaccinated in 1971, in Texas, the Gulf Coast States and States adjoining Mexico. These States are designated "high risk" States for the disease.

There are four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now. They are: (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently moved into the area, (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive, (3) foals vaccinated too young to develop lasting immunity (under 6 months old when vaccinated), and (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Scientists believe VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. The time to vaccinate is now, before mosquitoes emerge in the warm months ahead.

Texas has a horse population of about 625,000 animals. With nearly 800 Texas veterinarians participating, about 575,000 horses, or 92 per cent of the total population, were vaccinated in Texas last year.

However, the State of Texas remains under Federal quarantine for VEE. This means that horses must be vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the State for other areas. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo, or other means.

The current program calls for vaccination at horse owner's expense. Federal emergency funds were used for that purpose last year.

VEE vaccine will provide immunity for over one year and possibly longer. The com-

mercial product now available can safely be administered to horses previously vaccinated with government-furnished vaccine. If it is uncertain that a horse has been vaccinated, it is better to vaccinate again. Vaccine must be administered by a veterinarian.

VEE vaccine was used on more than 2.8 million horses in 19 states and the District of Columbia last year. Studies on the vaccine are continuing, to check safety and to determine duration of immunity.

Potato Board Seeks Members

A meeting to elect a member to represent Texas potato producers on the National Potato Research and Promotion Board will be held at 8:30 p. m. Tuesday, April 25, in Hereford.

The nomination meeting will be held in the hospitality room of the First National Bank Building.

All Texas growers of Irish potatoes are urged to attend the meeting, said Dave Fitz of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's McAllen marketing field office who will conduct the meeting. Growers of five or more acres of potatoes will be eligible to vote.

The West Texas Vegetable Growers Council and the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers and Shippers Association are cooperating in holding the meeting.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service recently announced approval of the Potato Research and Promotion Plan in a nationwide referendum, and now requests that nomination meetings be held to select board members. Texas is entitled to one member on the Board.

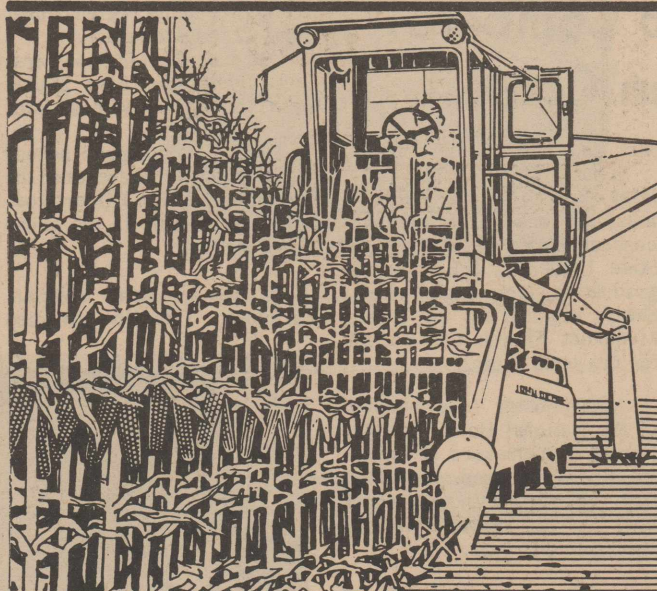

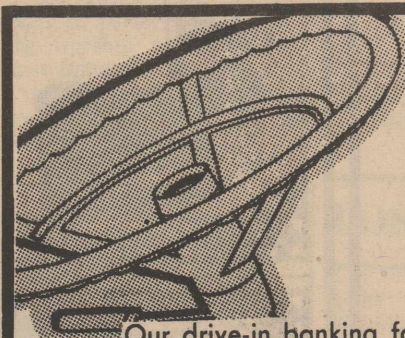

You are at home busily cleaning the house when you hear a knock on the door. You answer to find a man dressed as a delivery boy standing on your porch with a panel truck parked in front of your house.

He politely inquires as to the whereabouts of Mrs. Jones, your neighbor, and you inform him that you do not know where she is. With this, he gets a sad look on his face and informs you that he has a C. O. D. package for Mrs. Jones and she said it was very important that she get the package today since it was to be a present for a friend of hers who was having a surprise party tonight.

He doesn't know what to do since he won't be able to come back again and he really doesn't want to disappoint Mrs. Jones. It is at this time that a happy glow comes across his face and he hits upon a plan whereby you can do your neighbor a big favor. All you have to do is pay him the C. O. D. charges and then get your money back from Mrs. Jones.

This way she will receive the package in time and not be disappointed. After all, the C. O. D. charges amount to only \$10. Being a friendly neighbor, you give the delivery man \$10 and he goes on his way leaving you with a warm feeling inside, knowing that you have helped Mrs. Jones.

Later in the day when Mrs. Jones returns, the warm feeling begins to turn to doubt because Mrs. Jones informs you that she has not ordered any C. O. D. packages. You open the package to inspect its contents and find only rocks.

Another take-off on this scheme, and perhaps even more insidious, is practiced where there has been a recent death in a family. The knock on the door in this case presents a person who has a package for Mr. Smith at this address. When informed that Mr. Smith has recently passed away, the stranger gets a sad look on his face and says that Mr. Smith was in his store last week and picked out a beautiful gift for Mrs. Smith.

It was to be a surprise and Mr. Smith was so happy because he just knew that the gift would bring Mrs. Smith so much pleasure. Sentiment often pushes the person to go ahead and accept the item and pay for it, usually at an inflated price, and even though they don't need it, because it had been picked out for them by their deceased loved one.

Be an informed consumer. Don't fall for rackets similar to those above described. When a stranger knocks on your door and asks for money, demand proof of his identity. Know all the facts before you part with your money.

Tech Animal Scientists Seek Answer To Feedlot Odors

Some of the nation's largest cities share a historic problem with their country cousins-- the smell of the livestock pens which go hand-in-hand with a steady demand for meat.

Texas Tech University animal scientists, responding to feedlot operators' demands as well as the hopes of the general public, are setting about solving the problem of odors related to commercial livestock production.

Sophisticated test tube studies are a part of the long-range research plan, but the first step is pretty basic, according to Animal Science Prof. Robert C. Albin, one of three directing the study.

"It begins with the nose," he said, explaining that 36 students, three faculty members, and one research associate are contributing their senses of smell to the program.

Albin pointed out that the problem is old. Historically, as populations become concentrated so did livestock production in order to supply meat, milk and livestock by-products.

"It isn't a case of people not wanting penned livestock," he said. "The feedlots supply the American appetite for a big meat supply and are heavy contributors to the agricultural economy."

"It is time, however, to give up the assumption that offensive odor necessarily is a part of the operation. It can be reduced and perhaps eventually almost eliminated."

Currently in the Texas Tech study 75 swine are separated into five groups, each of which is fed a special diet. Four diets have additives which should reduce the smell emanating from their feedlots.

Manure is collected, catalogued and put in sealed jars, and then students and faculty submit to "sniffing bees," rating each sample as to the degree of its offensiveness.

"There's really no other place to start," Dr. Albin said. "It is the olfactory sense which

is disturbed, and so it is this sense which must eventually be satisfied with the solution."

Long range study plans, he said, include studies to determine quantitatively what chemicals in the most successful additives are the critical ones.

Among the 40 participants in the basic study there is great variation in smell reaction.

"Some are much more sensitive to odor than others," Albin said, "but in choosing the most distasteful of the odors there very often is close agreement."

He said that the study already has shown that certain additives do change the odor of the manure. When the research is more advanced, he said, it is hoped that animal scientists will be able to advise feedlot operators which additives would most likely reduce the odors.

Later studies this semester

will deal with cattle waste, he said.

"You can be sure," said Albin, "the feedlot operators who are in contact with the odor no matter which way the wind blows are as eager as anyone to solve this problem."

Working with Albin in directing the study are Animal Science Profs. A. Max Lennon and Leland F. Tribble. Their research associate is a bacteriologist, Mrs. Lucy Porter.

Students involved are from an interdisciplinary class involving most departments in the College of Agricultural Sciences and the Department of Food and Nutrition in the College of Home Economics.

Texas Nutrition Specialist Warns Against Fad Diet

The Zen Macrobiotic fad diet that's now popular endangers the health of its followers, according to a Texas foods and nutrition specialist.

Sally Springer of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said that the concepts of the Macrobiotic diet which originated in Japan constitute a major public health problem and are dangerous.

"Individuals who persist in following the most rigid diets of Zen Macrobiotics stand in great danger of incurring serious nutritional deficiencies and malnutrition," Miss Springer emphasized. "Some incidences of death have resulted from strict adherence to this diet."

The unusual diet proposes 10 ways of eating and drinking through which a person may establish a healthy and happy life. According to its followers, this may only be obtained through a proper balance of Yin and Yang. Certain foods are categorized as Yin, whereas other foods are known as Yang.

The diet advocates natural foods and is predominately vegetarian. It places great emphasis on the inclusion of whole grain cereals. In addition, fluids are to be avoided as much as possible.

Especially popular among adolescents, the diet is considered to be a means of creating a spiritual awakening or rebirth. Some persons have undertaken this diet as a form of protest against the establishment which, in their minds, is represented by the food industry. The diet is even adhered to as a means of protest against war or man's inhumanity to man.

The proposed dietary plan comprises 10 diets ranging from the lowest level, which includes only 10 percent cereal, to the highest level, made up of 100 percent cereals.

"Unusual diets have existed in all societies since ancient times and appear to be a universal phenomenon," Miss Springer said. "However, the Zen Macrobiotic diet is one of the most dangerous dietary regimens posing not only serious hazards to the health of the individual, but even to life itself."

"A great deal of research still needs to be done to evaluate the effect of nutrition on many diseases. It would be premature at this time to categorize all unusual dietary philosophies as hazardous without evaluation of their nutritional contribution. When the diet has been shown to cause irreversible damage to health and ultimately lead to death as it has in the case of the Zen Macrobiotic, it can't be one that we would consider safe for the general population."

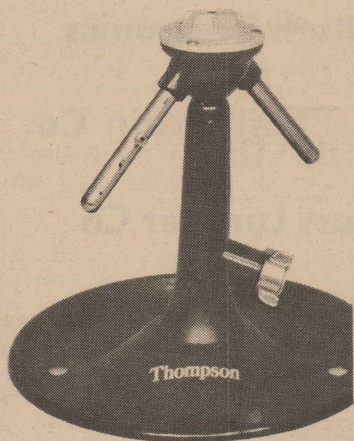

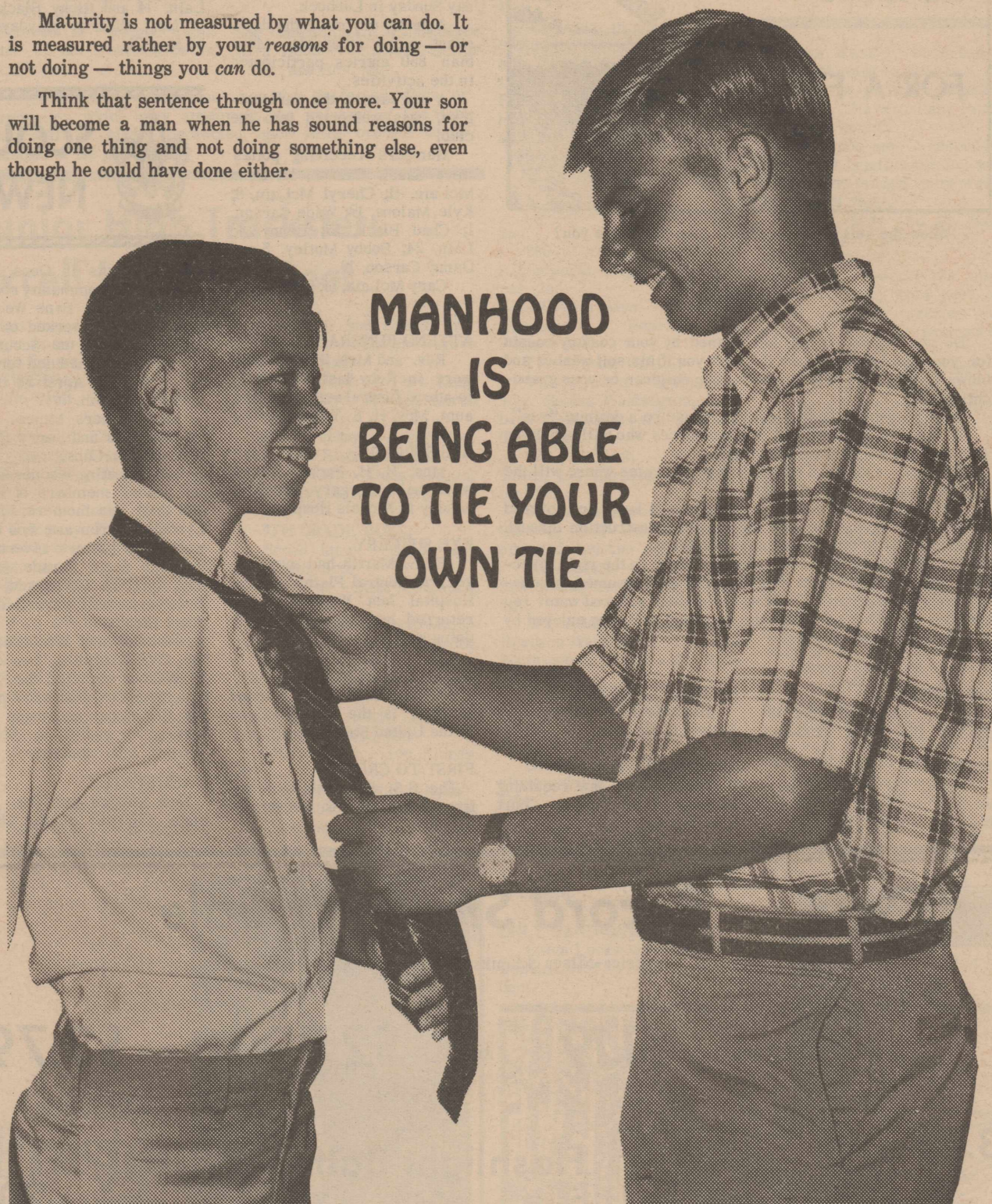
Here is one of those great epigrams of my favorite philosopher — Dad! Or was it Mother? It's hard to remember for sure.
