Survey at Middle School indicates exposure to alcohol and drugs but students are aware of dangers

In the spring of 1993 the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, in conjunction with the Public Policy Research Institute at Texas A&M University, administered a survey to students in 5th grade in the Colorado Independent School District (CISD). 88 students completed the questionnaire, in which they were asked about their experiences with alcohol and drugs. Of that number, one survey was excluded from analysis because a student did not indicate grade or age or was identified as an exaggerator (i.e., claimed to have used a non-existent drug or reported overly excessive drug use). The final number of surveys included in the overall district analysis was 87.

Colorado Middle School principal Mark Merrell said the results of the survey should make the public even more aware of the problem with drugs and alcohol among the youth of Colorado City and the entire United States.

"We definitely have a deep concern," Merrell said, "and reading reports such as these enforces our efforts for drug education for our students."

"Drug prevention programs, like D.A.R.E., are so important as

the survey also indicates," said Merrell. "We are constantly looking for ways to improve our programs in the district."

Students' responses to the questionnaire indicate that:

• 25 percent of CISD 5th grade students reported using tobacco at least once during their lifetimes and 21 percent said they had used tobacco during the past school year.

• 27 percent of CISD 5th grade students said they had consumed alcohol at least once during their lifetimes and 19 percent said they had consumed alcohol during the past school year.

• 41 percent of CISD 5th grade students said they had been offered alcohol, 12 percent said they had been offered inhalants and 9 percent said they had been offered marijuana.

• 7 percent of CISD 5th grade students reported using inhalants and 2 percent reported using marijuana at least once during their lifetimes.

• 21 percent of CISD 5th grade students said they "don't know" how their parents feel about kids their age drinking beer and 20 percent said they "don't know" how

their parents feel about kids their age smoking marijuana.

ALCOHOL
Alcohol is the most widely used substance among 5th graders in the district and statewide. 27 percent of CISD 5th grade students reported using alcohol at least once during their lifetimes, a rate similar to that reported by 5th grade students statewide (29 percent). 19 percent of Colorado 5th graders reported using alcohol in the past school year (18 percent statewide).

CISD 5th graders were asked how many times during the past year they "had two or more drinks in a row." 16 percent of CISD 5th graders said they "had two or more drinks" of beer in a row at least once during the past year (16

percent statewide). 15 percent of Colorado 5th graders said they "had two or more drinks" of wine cooler in a row (15 percent statewide), 11 percent said they "had two or more drinks" of wine in a row (11 percent statewide) and 2 percent said they "had two or more drinks" of liquor in a row (7 percent statewide) at least once in the past year.

41 percent of CISD 5th graders said they had been offered alcohol (33 percent statewide) and 37 percent reported that some or most of their close friends drink beer, wine coolers, wine or liquor (37 percent statewide).

Parental attitudes can be a major factor in whether or not a student uses alcohol or drugs. When asked how their parents feel about

kids their age drinking beer, 76 percent of CISD 5th grade students said their parents "don't like it" (82 percent statewide). 21 percent of CISD 5th graders said they "don't know" how their parents feel about kids their age drinking beer (16 percent statewide).

INHALANTS
Overall, inhalant use among Colorado 5th graders was similar to that reported by 5th graders statewide. Seven percent of CISD 5th grade students reported using inhalants at least once during their lifetimes (11 percent statewide), and 7 percent also said they had used inhalants during the past school year (7 percent statewide).

Letter prompts JP's to set up alternating schedules

A letter to County Judge Ray Mayo by Colorado City Police Chief David Montgomery concerning the availability of the two Mitchell County JP's has apparently resulted in some changes in their offices.

Justice of the Peace Glenda Haltom said she had met with JP Keith Ruddick last Wednesday and said they had set up a schedule whereby each JP will now be available on a set after-hours and weekend schedule.

These changes were prompted by Montgomery's letter stating the Police Department and the Mitchell County Ambulance responded to a call on Jan. 15 that necessitated a JP to give a ruling on a death.

The letter continued stating that "a JP was not readily available and neither responded to their pagers. Three Sheriff's deputies and two additional Police Officers were called out to locate a JP and Deputy Augustin Alvarado finally located JP Ruddick and took him to the scene."

Montgomery said his main concern was for the family of the deceased having to endure anymore hardship.

In Texas, a body cannot be moved from the scene if it was an "unattended death" until an appropriate official pronouncement of death has been made.

Justices of the Peace, County Judges, City Municipal Judges (if the death occurs inside the city limits) can make the death ruling. If a county has a coroner then that office makes the ruling.

People in nursing homes, hospitals and hospice programs do not have to have a JP ruling if they die in the facility (or under hospice care) unless foul play is suspected.

In talking about the incident on Jan. 15, Judge Haltom said she hated the stink was all directed toward Ruddick.

"I feel like it falls on me too," said the Judge. "I don't think he should get all the blame as the death occurred in my precinct."

Haltom said she was out of town at the time.

Ruddick stated that he was in

town at the time but did not have his pager turned on. Both JP's are furnished a pager by the county. He said he had performed a wedding at 1 p.m. and another was scheduled at 4 p.m.

The call for a JP first went out at 1:37 p.m. and the pronouncement of death was at 2:25 p.m. by Ruddick.

City schedules three committee meetings

Colorado City residents who want to see government in action will have a chance this week to attend three committee meetings.

The airport committee will be meeting Monday, Jan. 24 at 11 a.m. at the Municipal Airport to discuss needed improvements at the facility.

Committee members Kenneth Rogers, W. A. Findley, Don Bennet, J. O. Dockrey and Wendell Inman will meet with a representative of Oller Engineering concerning improvements.

The council's budget committee will meet on Tuesday, Jan. 25 at 7 p.m. for a workshop.

Members of that committee are Jim Baum, Bob Reily and Walt Staats.

Probably the most interesting and possibly the shortest meeting will be that of the personnel regulation committee which will meet Monday, Jan. 24 at 5:30 p.m. to discuss the information received at the Tim Atkin's hearing held on January 13.

A similar meeting held after the termination of another city employee's hearing lasted five minutes.

Atkins, who was a sergeant with the Colorado City Police Department, was terminated on Dec. 20, 1993 for accepting a western hat from a Flower Mound, Texas citizen following a traffic stop on I-20 in January, 1993.

A hearing was held on his termination on Jan. 13 at which time Atkins told the committee that he had notified both Chief of Police David Montgomery and City Manager Buddy Foster about the Resistol saleslady giving him the hat. Atkins told the committee that he was told at the time that is was "okay" to keep it "considering the circumstances."

However, state law and the city's police procedure manual Section 13.11) specifically forbids a city peace officer from accepting a gratuity from the public stating "members of the department shall not collect or receive any money, nor anything of value from citizens for any purpose. Neither shall they circulate subscription papers, sell tickets of any kind, nor collect money from any person for any purpose, without the express individual permission of the Chief of Police."

Jail certified

Sheriff Patrick Toombs said the County Jail has passed the yearly jail inspection conducted by the Texas Jail Commission with only one minor infraction.

"It was a very thorough inspection by Paul Scarbrough of the Jail Commission," said Toombs "and he was pleased with the facility and the operation of the jail."

SURVEY

Twelve percent of Colorado 5th graders said they had been offered inhalants (6 percent statewide) and 11 percent reported that some or most of their close friends use inhalants (9 percent statewide). One percent of the district's 5th grade students said they had used two or more different kinds of inhalant substances during their lifetimes (6 percent statewide). Five percent said they had inhaled glue (6 percent statewide), 4 percent said they had inhaled paint thinner (3 percent statewide) and 2 percent said they had inhaled substances in the "other inhalants" category (4 percent statewide) at least once during their lifetimes. None of the district 5th grade students said they had ever inhaled gasoline (5 percent statewide) or White-Out or Liquid Paper (4 percent statewide).

MARIJUANA
2 percent of CISD 5th graders said they had used marijuana at least once during their lifetimes (1 percent statewide) and 2 percent reported using marijuana during the past school year (1 percent statewide). Nine percent of CISD 5th graders said that they had been offered marijuana (7 percent statewide) and 6 percent reported that some or most of their close friends use marijuana (5 percent statewide).

When asked how their parents feel about kids their age smoking marijuana, 80 percent of CISD 5th grade students said their parents "don't like it" (87 percent statewide). 20 percent reported they "don't know" how their parents feel about kids their age smoking marijuana (11 percent statewide).

CHARACTERISTICS ASSOCIATED WITH DRUG USE
Statewide, female 5th grade students were less likely to have used drugs than were male 5th graders. In the Colorado ISD, male 5th grade students were almost three times more likely to have used tobacco than were female 5th grade students and were the only reported users of marijuana. There were no significant differences among the district's 5th grade students by gender with regard to the use of inhalants or alcohol.

Statewide, students living with two parents were less likely to have used drugs than were students living in other family situations. In the Colorado ISD, 5th grade students living in other family situations were two times more likely to have used alcohol and inhalants than were district 5th grade students living in two-parent homes. There were no significant differences by living arrangement with regard to tobacco or marijuana use among CISD 5th grade students.

The influence of drug education programs may be reflected in students' attitudes toward the use of specific substances. When questioned about the danger associated with marijuana use, 78 percent of

Colorado 5th grade students believe that using marijuana is "very dangerous" (85 percent statewide). Sixty-eight percent of CISD 5th grade students believe inhalant use is "very dangerous" (66 percent statewide) and 71 percent believe alcohol use is "very dangerous" (71 percent statewide).

Also last spring the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, in conjunction with the Public Policy Research Institute at Texas A&M University, administered a survey to students in grades 6 through 8 in the CISD. A total of 266 students completed the questionnaire, which asked about students' experiences with alcohol and drugs. Of that number, 5 surveys were excluded from analysis because students did not indicate their grade or age or because they were identified as exaggerators (i.e., claimed to have used a non-existent drug or reported overly excessive drug use). The final number of surveys included in the overall district analysis was 261.

Students' responses to the questionnaire indicate that:

- 45 percent of CISD students reported using tobacco at least once during their lifetimes and 18 percent reported using tobacco during the past month.

- 52 percent of CISD students said they had used alcohol at least once during their lifetimes and 23 percent reported using alcohol during the past month.

- 6 percent of CISD students reported attending at least one class during the school year while "drunk."

- 21 percent of district students reported using inhalants at least once during their lifetimes.

- 4 percent of CISD students reported using marijuana at least once during their lifetimes and 1 percent reported using marijuana during the past month.

- CISD students are most likely to turn to their friends for help with a drug or alcohol problem (72 percent) and least likely to consult a school nurse or teacher (39 percent).

ALCOHOL

Alcohol is the most widely used substance among district students and students statewide. 52 percent of CISD students said they had consumed alcohol at least once during their lifetimes, a rate somewhat higher than that reported by 6th through 8th graders statewide (48 percent). 23 percent of district students reported drinking alcohol during the past month (23 percent statewide).

The alcoholic beverages most often consumed by Colorado ISD students are beer (38 percent/40 percent statewide) and wine coolers (31 percent/41 percent statewide). 25 percent of district students reported consuming wine (31 percent statewide) and 22 percent reported drinking liquor at least

once during their lifetimes (26 percent statewide).

20 percent of CISD students said they drink beer on a weekly or monthly basis (21 percent statewide), 13 percent said they drink wine coolers weekly or monthly (20 percent statewide), 9 percent said they drink liquor weekly or monthly (13 percent statewide) and 10 percent said they drink wine on a weekly or monthly basis (13 percent statewide).

When Colorado ISD students drink beer they tend to drink somewhat more heavily than do their counterparts statewide. 19 percent of district students reported that, on average, they drink five or more beers at one time compared to 11 percent of students statewide. 10 percent said they drink five or more wine coolers at one time (12 percent statewide), 6 percent reported drinking five or more servings of wine at one time on average (7 percent statewide) and 8 percent said they drink five or more drinks containing liquor at one time (6 percent statewide).

6 percent of CISD students reported attending at least one class during the school year while "drunk" (7 percent statewide). However, only 3 percent of CISD students said they had gotten into trouble with their teachers because of drinking (2 percent statewide).

22 percent of CISD students reported that most or all of their close friends drink beer, wine, wine coolers or liquor (17 percent statewide) and 50 percent said that alcohol was somewhat or very easy to obtain (52 percent statewide). 15 percent of district students said that alcohol was used at most or all of the parties they attended during the school year (13 percent statewide).

Parental attitudes can be a major factor in whether or not a student uses alcohol or drugs. When asked how their parents felt about kids their age drinking beer, 77 percent of district students said their parents strongly or mildly disapprove (77 percent statewide). 15 percent of district students said they "don't know" how their parents feel about kids their age drinking beer (14 percent statewide) and 3 percent said their parents neither approve nor disapprove (6 percent statewide).

INHALANTS

Overall, lifetime inhalant use among Colorado ISD students was similar to that reported by their peers statewide. 21 percent of CISD students reported using inhalants at least once during their lifetimes (26 percent statewide). 15 percent of CISD students said they had used two or more different kinds of inhalant substances during their lifetimes (17 percent statewide).

The inhalant substance most

frequently used by CISD students was correction fluid/Liquid Paper (12 percent/13 percent statewide). 10 percent said they had inhaled glue (12 percent statewide), 9 percent said they had inhaled gasoline (10 percent statewide) and 7 percent said they had inhaled substances in the "other inhalants" category (7 percent/8 percent statewide) at least once during their lifetimes.

ILLICIT DRUGS

Illicit drugs are defined as controlled substances and include marijuana, cocaine (powdered form and crack), uppers (stimulants), downers (narcotics), hallucinogens and ecstasy. Lifetime use of illicit drugs in the Colorado ISD was reported by 4 percent of district students (10 percent statewide). 2 percent of CISD students said they had used at least one illicit substance three or more times (6 percent statewide). Statewide, students said they had used illicit drugs an average of 0.3 times in the past month and 0.9 times during their lifetimes while Colorado ISD students said they had used illicit drug an average of 0.1 times in the past month and 0.3 times during their lifetimes.

Marijuana is the most frequently used illicit drug among students in the district and statewide. 4 percent of CISD students reported using marijuana at least once in their lifetimes (8 percent statewide) and 1 percent reported using marijuana in the past month (3 percent statewide).

4 percent of CISD students said that most or all of their close friends use marijuana (4 percent statewide) and 12 percent of CISD students said that marijuana was somewhat or very easy to obtain (16 percent statewide). 3 percent of CISD students said that marijuana and/or other drugs were used at most or all of the parties they attended during the school year (4 percent statewide).

When asked about parental attitudes toward marijuana use, CISD students reported a disapproval rate of 86 percent (84 percent statewide). 11 percent of district students said they "don't know" how their parents feel about kids their age using marijuana (12 percent statewide) while 1 percent said their parents neither approve nor disapprove (2 percent statewide).

Other illicit substances were used by a small number of CISD students. 2 percent of district students reported using steroids (1 percent statewide), less than 1 percent said they had used uppers (3 percent statewide) and less than 1 percent reported using downers (2 percent statewide) at least once during their lifetimes. None of the CISD students reported using powdered

cocaine (2 percent statewide), crack (1 percent statewide), hallucinogens (2 percent statewide) or ecstasy (1 percent statewide).

CHARACTERISTICS ASSOCIATED WITH DRUG USE

Statewide, female students were less likely to have used drugs than were male students. In the CISD, male students were somewhat more likely to have used alcohol and inhalants and two times more likely to have used tobacco than were female students. However, there were no significant differences by gender among district students with regard to the use of marijuana or steroids.

In the statewide survey, students living in two-parent homes were less likely to have used drugs than were students living in other family situations. CISD students living in other family situations were also the only reported users of uppers or downers. Conversely, students living in two-parent homes were somewhat more likely to have used inhalants than were those district students living in other family situations and were the only reported users of steroids in the Colorado ISD. There was no significant difference by living arrangement among district students with regard to the use of marijuana.

When asked where they would go for help with a drug or alcohol problem the largest percentage of CISD students said they would seek help from their friends (72 percent/63 percent statewide). 61 percent said they would seek help from their parents (62 percent statewide) and 58 percent said they would turn to an adult friend or relative (59 percent statewide). CISD students are least likely to seek help from a school nurse or teacher (39 percent/42 percent statewide) or from a counselor or program in school (42 percent/49 percent statewide).

The influence of drug education programs may be reflected in students' attitudes toward the specific substances. 100 percent of CISD students believe that powdered cocaine use is "very dangerous" (93 percent statewide) and 98 percent believe that crack use is "very dangerous" (94 percent statewide). 95 percent believe that marijuana use is "very dangerous" (87 percent statewide), 94 percent believe that steroid use is "very dangerous" (82 percent statewide), 88 percent believe that ecstasy use is "very dangerous" (79 percent statewide) and 80 percent believe that alcohol use is "very dangerous" (59 percent statewide).

Dunigan Operating Co. of Pampa has revealed plans to drill an 8,400 foot wildcat well in Mitchell County. The operator has 320 acres leased, with drillsite in the H&TCRR Co. Survey A-1447. It has designated the venture as the No. 1 Strain. Drillsite is six miles south of Girvin.
