rabbits and heifers. After a lunch break the steers will be judged. The sale will start right after the steers are shown at about 2 p.m.

Trophies will be given, with all but three being sponsored by the Motley County Livestock Association. W. E.

Burleson Estate will furnish the Rate-of-Gain trophy, and Matador Nursery and Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Cross will furnish a trophy for Best-Steer Bred in Motley County.

The MC Livestock Commission will provide the trophy which goes to the Grand Champion steer. Ribbons will be

furnished by the Motley County Farm Bureau. Judge for the show will be Bill Gregory of Spur.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the show and sale, and show support to the young FFA and 4-H exhibitors who have worked hard raising and preparing their animals for the annual show.

Amy Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doug Terry of Matador, received severe head injuries and was rushed first to the Crosbyton Hospital by Motley County Ambulance, then to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock by Crosby County Ambulance.

Miss Miller was north bound on Texas Highway 70 3.2 miles south of Roaring

Springs at about 5:20 p.m. She was riding on the improved shoulder of the highway when a pickup pulling a gooseneck trailer began passing her from behind.

"She apparently did not see the trailer," DPS Trooper Dude Speed said. "She appeared to be attempting to turn left of FM 3203, and turned into the side of the trailer."

Speed called Methodist Hospital Tuesday morning and was told Miss Miller's condition was slightly improved, but she was still classified as critical.

birthday, Sunday, March 6, 1983. Mrs. Self was 92 years old.

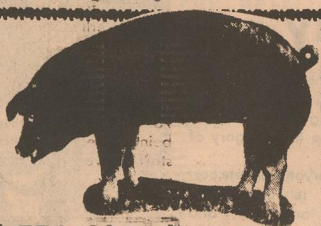

Bentsen Introduces Bill To Help Farmers, Businessmen

Senator Lloyd Bentsen introduced legislation last Thursday requiring government officials to compile a precise estimate of the costs imposed on farmers, ranchers and small businesses by

government regulation and to reduce that cost 25 percent within two years.

"After all the years of rhetoric and smoke on the issue of the regulatory burden, we still have no precise

estimate of the impact of federal regulation," Bentsen said in remarks accompanying introduction of his Federal Regulation Act.

"The first comprehensive estimate of the impact of federal rules and regulations was presented to me by Professor Murray Weidenbaum before a hearing I chaired in 1979 of the Joint Economic Committee. He estimated a regulatory burden at that time of \$100 billion a year. Professor Weidenbaum has come and gone as Chairman of the President's

Council of Economic Advisers. But his old estimate is still the most quoted one we have, as clouded as it is by time and imprecision."

"My bill requires the President to estimate the cost of all major rules and paperwork requirements which are imposed by any federal agency on farmers, ranchers or small business. He is required to collect that information annually and provide it in a report to Congress no later than January 31 of each year."

"My bill further requires federal

agencies to slash the burden on small businesses, farmers and ranchers of their major regulations and paperwork requirements by 25 percent over the next two fiscal years."

"My 25 percent burden reduction is a mandate for federal agencies to start the hard task of meeting regulatory objectives more efficiently. It will light a fire under their feet, giving them a

clear and simple target and timetable for reducing these regulations," Bentsen said.

"We have seen good progress over the past several years in the reduction of many types of burdens imposed by federal regulation. Yet, the pace has not been fast enough. The legislation I am proposing today will speed it up," Senator Bentsen said.

Foot Facts

Nail Problems

One of the conditions that is commonly seen in a podiatrist's office is an ingrown nail. This is caused by a nail edge pressing into and actually puncturing the flesh of the toe. Once the skin is broken the likelihood of infection is greatly increased.

The natural shape and width of the nail, determined by heredity, is the most important factor in causing an ingrown nail. However, wearing tight shoes can cause a problem with a nail that would not otherwise have become ingrown.

Soaking the affected foot and taking antibiotics are both helpful but if a sharp piece of nail remains in the skin, the problem will persist. This sharp edge must be removed in order for the condition to clear. In a mild case the offending nail border can be trimmed off. In severe case, however, a nail surgery may be needed to remove the troublesome nail border. Fingernails and toenails, like hair, are made of a strong protein called keratin. They don't have any cells and have no blood vessels or nerves and so are not living tissue. The nail matrix, however, is alive and it continually makes a new supply of keratin which is added to the nail from behind. As the new keratin is added, the front edge of the nail is slowly pushed forward, and so, of course, requires regular cutting.

In an ingrown nail has been removed once but becomes ingrown again, the best treatment may be to remove the nail matrix.

In this type of surgery the offending nail border and its corresponding matrix tissue are both removed, thus assuring a permanent correction.

General Telephone Offers New Calling Card Service

Matador telephone customers who make telephone credit card calls when out of town may find a new service designed just for telephone Calling Card calls available in some locations.

The new service, called Calling Card Service (CCS), makes it possible for users to dial their own Calling Card calls and billing number into the telephone network. The automated service has the benefit of convenience and speed, but it also provides customers with cost savings and increased security. Because the function is automated, customer dialed Calling Card calls are less expensive than third number billed calls, although still more costly than direct dialed calls.

To use the service, the customer will dial "0" plus the number being called. A tone or a tone and announcement will ask the customer to enter his/her Calling Card number. Once the number is entered, it is validated through a nationwide data base

which contains all the Calling Card numbers. Billing information is recorded automatically and the customer is connected to the called number in a matter of seconds, all without the assistance of an operator.

The fully automated CCS is being made available where equipment that can access the nationwide network is in operation. Only Touch Calling telephones in these locations can access the CCS network.

Customers who use rotary phones in exchange with the automated CCS equipment and customers in exchanges where the automated CCS equipment is not yet available can still make Calling Card calls but an operator's assistance will be required. While there is a charge for Calling Card calls, the charge is lower than collect or third number billed calls.

The new automated service is one of the first telephone services to be offered that utilizes a nationwide data base to store and process

information. In effect, the cardholders use the telephone to access a computerized network which verifies, almost instantly, all the information necessary to complete and bill the call. In cases of calls from exchanges where the customer cannot dial the information, the operator can access the network and verify the Calling Card. Although operator assistance is required, the customer receives the lower Calling Card rate.

Calling Card holders have more protection from misuse of their cards with the automated service. Since the customer does not need to say the billing number aloud, privacy is ensured, even in public places. In the case of a lost or stolen card, the card number can be changed quickly, making the card virtually useless to anyone else.

As in the past, there is no charge to obtain a Calling Card. General Telephone customers wanting to apply should contact their telephone company business office.

Social Security News

By Terry J. Clements

Last week we discussed recommendations of the National Commission on Social Security Reform that would save an estimated 128 billion dollars on Social Security's short term financial problem.

These recommendations are currently being considered by Congress for possible enactment into law. Today, we'll describe some of the other proposals.

Under current law, employees of states, city or county governments are covered under Social Security only if the organizations requested coverage. The government entity can still terminate coverage but the termination is permanent. The process of

withdrawing from Social Security requires a two year waiting period. The Commission's proposal is to prohibit termination for those organizations that elected coverage. This would include those who are in the above mentioned two year

waiting period by the time of enactment.

Federal civilian employees have previously not been covered by Social Security. The Commission proposes that beginning 1/1/84, all newly hired Federal employees be covered. A supplemental retirement program would be developed for these employees just as private employers have plans for their employees.

Employees of non-profit organizations are exempt from Social Security coverage with the same provisions as those for state and local governments. The Commission's proposal is to cover all non-profit organizations. An individual who has consistently lower wages during his lifetime receives a higher percentage of return in Social Security benefits. The "system" recognizes that persons with lower earnings will probably have little or no other sources of retirement income. However, under the current method of computation a "wind-fall" is said to be created for non-

covered employees for short periods of work. The Commission recommends that a method be developed to eliminate this problem.

Many of you have already heard of delayed retirement credits. Presently, a person who is over age 65 but does not receive Social Security benefits gets increases in benefits at the rate of 3% per year. The Commission proposes that this rate be gradually increased until it reaches 8% in the year 2009.

One of the Commission's proposals may have considerable impact on benefits received by women. Next, we'll discuss this proposal, another recommendation concerning cost of living adjustment and still more results of the National Commission on Social Security reform.
