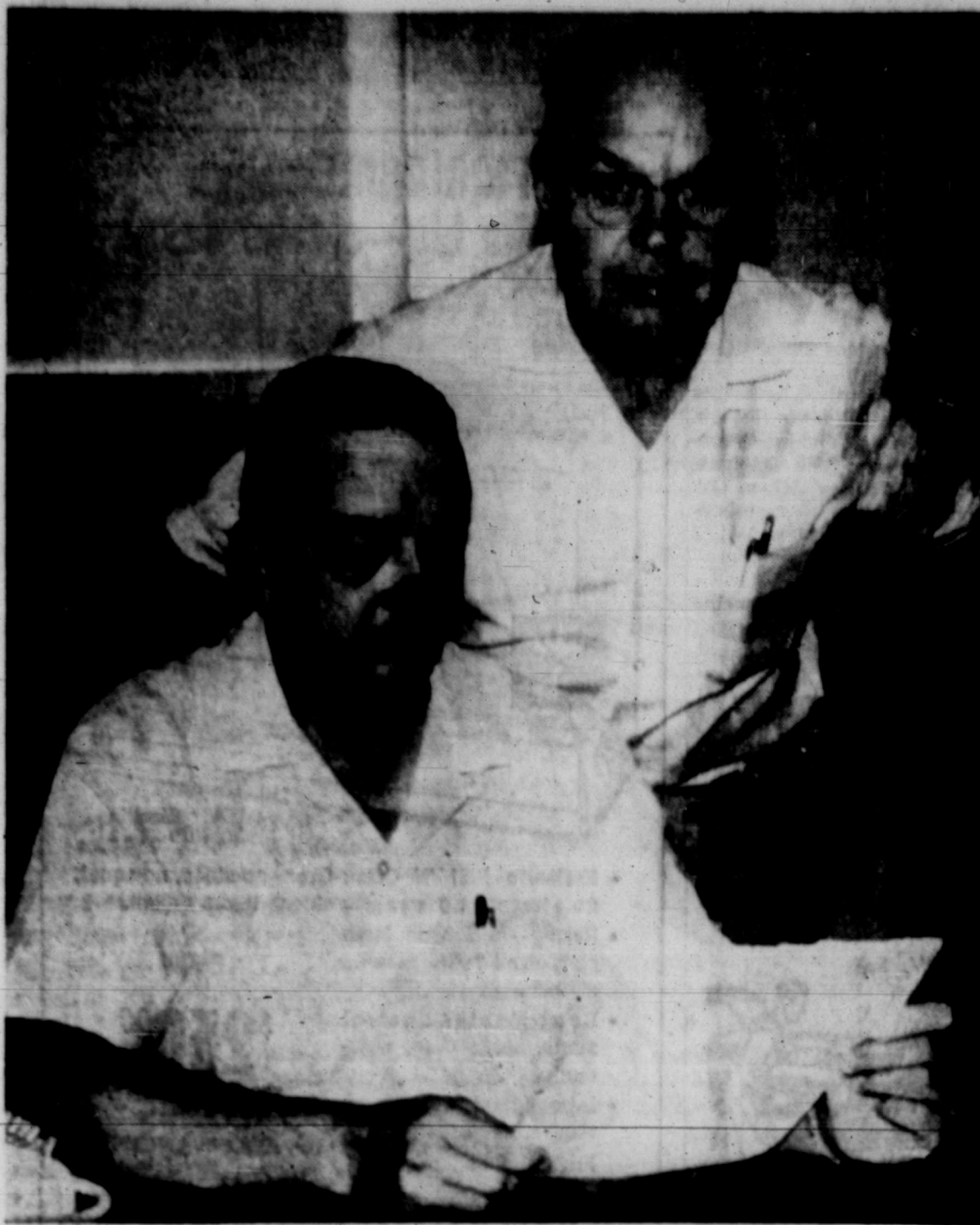

Fair dates are Monday Oct. 7 through Saturday Oct. 12 for the midway and entertainment features, Thursday Oct. 10 through Saturday Oct. 12 for the fair exhibits.

Mrs. Don Benson, who heads the Arts & Crafts Division this year, announced her committee, Saturday. They are Mrs. Terry Keel, Joe Earnest and George Womack.

There will be ribbons awarded in both junior and adult classes for the Arts & Crafts showing. All entries must be registered by 12 noon Thursday, Oct. 12, Mrs. Benson said. All exhibits competing in any class in any division will be housed in the south portion of Mitchell County Agricultural Building, business route Highway 80, west.

35-0 OVER WOLVES

Haterius Leads Stamford Victory

If Colorado City never sees the likes of Steve Haterius again, it won't be too soon.

For this young guy—a chesty 160-pound quarterback with the talent, timing and guts to back it up—took command of a state-ranked AA Stamford High football team here Friday night.

And he didn't let up until his Bulldogs had soundly subdued Colorado City's hopeful 3-AAA Wolves.

The score was 35 to 0, with a field goal jacking up the count with only three seconds remaining in the game—Something of a final humiliation.

But the outcome was obvious much earlier as the Bulldogs, led by their sturdy Steve, jumped to a 7 to 0 first quarter lead, then lengthened it to 20-0 before halftime.

All that Haterius did in that deadly first half was to score three touchdowns—the first, a 7-yard jaunt to climax an 81-yard drive; the second, a 29-yard burst to end a 57-yard drive; and the third, a 55-yard punt return.

Coach Sam Christy's Wol-

ves, fresh from an impressive 27 to 0 victory over Monahans, tried repeatedly to break the Bulldog grip.

Once, at the start of the second half the Wolves appeared to have reversed the trend, and drove to the Stamford 5-yard line. But a fumble halted the drive and took the starch of the Wolves, upsurge.

At times, too, the entire Colorado line appeared to rise up and gang tackle effectively.

But, mostly, the quick-charging Bulldog line was in command, with Haterius, Rusty Kelley and Randy Samuels picking their holes with telling results.

It all started soon after the opening kickoff, after Stamford held the Wolves to only five yards in three tries.

Then, from their own 19-yard line where they returned C-City's punt the Bulldogs began an 81-yard touchdown drive.

Fullback Eddie Jones hit right guard for three. Halfback Roger Hughes made it

a first down on the Stamford 31.

Four first downs later after a finely engineered screen pass from Haterius to Harrison Cole—the Bulldogs were on the Colorado 13.

The Wolves stiffened defensively, held Stamford to only 6 yards in the next 3 plays.

But Haterius moved toward left end, stepped around a stumbling Wolf defensive player and picked his way goalward for the first touchdown.

Five minutes, six seconds remained in the first quarter when Samuels, who took over quarterback duties when Haterius was out of the game, kicked the extra point for a 7 to 0 Stamford lead.

Stamford quickly cut short Colorado City's attempt at retaliation, intercepting David McKay's pass on he Wolves' 33 yard line. Then, one series of downs later, forcing the Wolves to punt.

The Bulldogs were in business again, so to speak, and only three plays after taking the punt, scored their second

Fun part of the Fair which opens at the Mitchell County Agriculture Building and grounds next Monday, Oct. 7, is shaping up, according to Hallie Norman, executive vice president of Chamber of Commerce.

Current Tax Statements Due Monday

It's tax statement time again. Monte Hardegree, Mitchell and his office deputies will be mailing statements of county and state taxes Monday, he told the Record.

Statements will be for 1963 taxes currently due—and delinquent after Feb. 1, 1964. Citizens paying taxes as early as October receive a discount which lessens with payments made in November and December. Hardegree reminds all young citizens that he has available in the tax office, first floor of the courthouse, poll tax exemption. All citizens who will become 21 years of age on any day during this year of 1963 are entitled to poll tax exemption receipts.

Deadline date for "voting free the first year you become of legal voting age," is Oct. 9, Hardegree said. Exemption receipts must be issued at least 30 days before an election is held.

Saturday afternoon at 1:30 Western Riding Club will stage barrel races as an entertainment feature.

Exhibits in all divisions will open promptly at 5 p. m. Thursday, Oct. 10 in the south portion of the Agriculture Building. Exhibits will remain open until 9 p. m. Thursday and Friday but will be closed at 8 p. m. Saturday night because

of the Wolf-Anson foot ball game here.

Wildlife exhibit to be shown by Texas Fish & Game Commission will be housed in the north building. It will be open 5 p. m. Thursday and will observe hours identical with those of the exhibits in the south building.

Webb Air Force Base will also have an educational exhibit free to the public. North building will house commercial exhibits along with the educational exhibits.

Concession booths will be operated by various civic and church organizations. Booths will feature foods, soft drinks, confections and refreshments for sale.

HORTICULTURE DIVISION

Fall Flower Show Part of Fair Plans

The fall flower show part of this county's '63 Fair, always a popular division with spectators, will be held in the south portion of Mitchell County Agriculture Building, Oct. 10-12.

Mrs. Ruth Alchert, chairman of the Horticulture Division this year, has readied rules, regulations and classes for the division.

Entries must be in place not later than 12 noon, Thursday Oct. 10. All entries will be judged for ribbons, first through third place, on a point system.

There are 9 major classes—roses, chrysanthemums, perennials, dahlias, annuals, lilies and other bulbs, shrubs and berries, trees, house plants and flowering vines.

Rose exhibits are divided into 4 specimen classes which include hybrid tea roses (one specimen bloom) of red, pink, white or cream, yellow, orange blend, bi-color or any color;

Floribunda (one specimen spray) of red, pink, white or cream, yellow, blend, bi-color or any color; grandiflora (red, white, pink, blend, yellow or any color; hybrid tea climber—red, pink, white, yellow blend and any color.

Out-of-town judges will score exhibits giving 25 points for form, 20 for substance, 25 for color, 20 for stem and foliage and 10 points for size.

Chrysanthemum class is subdivided into class 1, exhibition of one stem by color and class 2, hardy mums.

Perennials will offer flower growers a chance to show cut flowers of all kinds—garden pinks, phlox, gaillardia, canna, aster, gypsophila, thymus, ageratum, verbena, geranium, and others.

Dahlias will be judged in three classes—giant, medium and small.

Berried shrubs should not be over 24 inches in length white or cream, yellow, orange blend, bi-color or any color; should be in full bloom.

Field Crops, Vegetables And Orchard Exhibits

With Mitchell County '63 Fair dates now just eight days away, general chairman Bob Reilly and all division heads have completed plans for the exhibits portion of the event.

Jim Kelley, who heads the Agriculture Division; named his working committee Friday afternoon.

County Agent Buddy Logsdon has accepted chairmanship of the exhibits for the "Ag" show.

J. D. Hill Jr., Linden Solomon, Truman Bodine and Sam Thompson complete the Agriculture Division's supervisors.

Rules for exhibitors and designation of classes for field crops, garden products and orchard fruits or nuts are now available and may be had upon request at the Chamber of Commerce office here. Chamber of Commerce annually sponsors the County Fair as one of its major autumn projects.

Agriculture exhibits for the '63 Mitchell County Fair will be displayed in the south wing of the county's Agricultural building, west Highway 80.

Products are to be delivered by exhibitors between the hours of 8 a. m. and 12 noon Thursday, Oct. 10 and must be left on exhibit until 8 p. m. Saturday, Oct. 12, closing day of the fair.

Junior divisions will be judged separately from divisions for adult exhibitors. Junior exhibitors must be enrolled in school in Mitchell County. Ribbons will be awarded in each division, both junior and adult.

Any exhibitor may enter more than one entry in a class provided that each entry corresponds with requirements for that particular class.

Classes for the Agriculture part of the fair include classes for both irrigated and dryland cotton; grains and seeds; orange crops; sorghum heads and ear corn; vegetables; fruits and nuts.

Cotton exhibits include 20 open bolls, 1 lb. lint direct from gin, 1st talk with leaves removed and ½ gallon cotton seed, gun run.

Grains and seeds (½ gallon samples or plastic bags) include wheat, any variety, oats, any variety, rye, cowpeas, sweet sorghum, milo white, milo red, begari, alfalfa, guar, Sudan, any variety, blue panicle, sorghum alnum, pasture grasses, corn (1 gallon) and African millet.

Forage crops will be exhibited in bundles, tied in two places.
