## The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

**BREAKFAST**—Grapefruit juice, salt codfish, spider cornbread, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Eggs, piquant, lettuce sandwiches, apple tapioca pudding, milk tea.

**DINNER**—Bouillon, toasted wafers, creamed fish, haddock, steamed rice, spiced figs, buttered green beans, grapefruit, fresh pineapple with mock angel food cake, milk, coffee.

If small children must be served breakfast, a cereal should be added to the menu. The average adult, however, will find the meal suggested much to his liking.

**Eggs, Piquant**  
Four hard-cooked eggs; 1-2 onion, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup cream, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1-2 cup fine toasted bread crumbs, 1-4 lemon.

Melt butter, add onion, peeled and cut in thin slices and cook until onion is yellow. Cut eggs in halves lengthwise and all with cream to onion. Beat eggs until very light and mix with crumbs, parsley, salt, pepper and juice of lemon. Pour this mixture over eggs in sauce pan, cover pan and cook over a low fire until eggs are set, about ten minutes. Turn into a hot serving dish, garnish with parsley and serve at once.

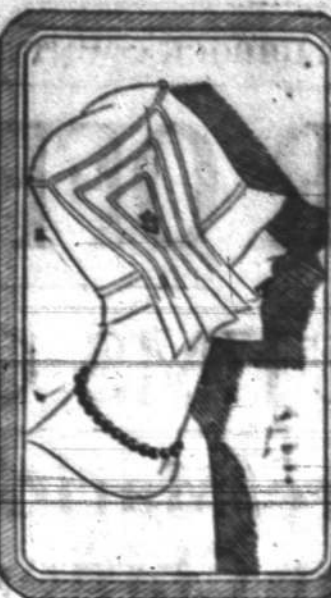

## Traffic Violators Will Be Prosecuted

Drivers of cars not equipped according to state regulations as regards license plates and head and tail lights, will be called upon to pay the penalty for violations after Monday, when officers will open an intensive campaign, especially against cars with no lights or one light, and no tail light, G. R. Scott, justice of the peace, said Friday.

Some little misunderstanding, in connection with the law as regards lights is held by some motorists, Justice Scott said, they believing that they are under the law anyway, and hours after notification in which to

adjust their lights. He continued that such is not the case and cited a communication from state headquarters of the highway department stating that no time at all is allowed, except in instances only where lights are found by the inspector to be out of focus, in which case they are allowed 72 hours to have the lights adjusted and report to the magistrate. Lights will hold particular attention of officers in the next few days, he said, warning that they should all be burning and adjusted according to law.

## Mrs. Freeland Wins In Telegraph Suit

Returning with a verdict in favor of the plaintiff while court officials believe will not stand judgment, the jury reported into judgment of higher courts, the jury reported into yesterday afternoon in the case of Mrs. J. A. Freeland versus the Western Union Telegraph company in suit for collection of damages totalling \$1,900 as the result of non-delivery of a telegram last October 21 from Dallas, telling of the death of W. T. Waggoner, her father there. Two questions were answered for the plaintiff and two were answered in favor of the defendant in the case which presented a conflict in the verdict.

The jury found that an agreement had been reached with the sender of the telegram and the company to deliver the message to the post office box here but they also found that the company was negligent in not trying to get in communication with the party any further than the post office box.

County Judge Charles Nordyke said last night that argument would decide whether the verdict would be rendered as it is or whether it will be set aside and a new trial granted.

## Babies Swamp Man Who Offers Prizes

HOUSTON, April 8. (AP)—Corporations which encourage babies perform a real service in the promotion of both corporate and human relations, believes C. A. Peden, as president of a Houston iron and steel company. Peden apparently has introduced a new wrinkle in human relations by offering prizes to the babies of his employees.

A promise of \$100 for each 1926 baby first announced a year ago, cost him \$2,400 when he paid the bill for what might be termed the first Peden Baby Futurity.

Mr. Peden had been "baffled" from time to time of baby arrivals among his employees, but the full significance of what he had let himself in for apparently escaped him. When he suddenly was confronted with 17 of the 21 Houston babies and told of two others in San Antonio and a twenty-fourth in the family of an employee in Mexico City, he quickly saw that his personal purse was to be hard hit.

Without warning, Peden was ushered into one of the plant buildings where the babies and their mothers were stationed. He then recognized the significance but after a moment's hesitation he declared he would be compelled to modify the 1927 offer and limit it to \$25 a baby because it was a private gift and not a corporate benefit. He said he hoped to increase the amount to the original \$100 within a year or two.

Mr. Peden was inspired to makeable \$100 offer at a gathering of Peden employees in January, 1924.

"Do you know, boys," he said as he looked over them, "this is such a fine looking lot of men that I'd like to see their kids increase in the world. I'll tell you what I'll do: I'll give \$100 for every baby born to a white employee—I must make the reservation of the Peden company in 1924."

A little more than a year later he was \$2,400 poorer in money but believed it had paid large dividends in the promotion of friendliness between employer and employee.

Of the 24 babies, seven were boys.

## INDIVIDUAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR HEALTH

Two closely related and vitally important public concerns are being promoted in Texas Clean-up Week observance, under City Health Department auspices, which should receive the hearty co-operation of the schools and numerous civic agencies.

Some twenty centuries ago Horace advised, as a standard of efficient living, "A sound mind in a sound body." That maxim accurately defines the objective of the clean-up campaign and it applies to the community as to the individual. Perhaps there is a little danger that the latter may be neglected in such efforts; that in seeking the collective good, personal responsibility may not be stressed properly.

Never before, from babyhood up, have there been so many agencies—official and semi-public—to look after one's welfare, as at present. Beginning with the infant care provided by the Children's Bureau and State authorities under the Sheppard-Towner Act, such splendid activities as the Milk and Ice Fund, the pre-school age clinics, the highly-organized and steadily-growing sanitary work in public schools, the clinics for adults, the municipal and state health departments, the United States Public Health Service, may be enumerated. These agencies protect the citizen from the menace of impure water, contaminated or diseased milk, unfit food, filth and rubbish, and the spread of deadly bacteria. Each is a distinctly paternalistic function, though so essential and so long discharged by official and philanthropic organizations as to be taken for granted. Certainly the social order has achieved great progress along humanitarian lines since the '70's when defendants charged with mistreating children were prosecuted for "cruelty to animals" because there was no statute covering cruelty to children! To a degree undreamed of even fifty years ago, man collectively is his brother's keeper.

Yet these ministrations often have one undesirable effect: they tend to dull the sense of individual responsibility. Now one sees a disposition on the workers' part to recognize this hazard and to guard against it. For example the Health Association calls the adult population's attention to the need for annual examinations. If that practice become universal, the result would show quickly in the longevity tables. The human body is a vastly complicated machine and it deserves from its tenant at least as much attention as his automobile motor receives.

## AT LEAST A START IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

None of the numerous bills which Governor Moody has signed lately has a greater bearing on the general welfare than that which scales upward the judicial salaries from judge to justice of the Supreme Court.

Thereby—after long delay—something more nearly approaching fair compensation is accorded these public servants. But even now they are not to receive salaries commensurate with the heavy responsibilities they are called on to bear, nor with the unusual qualifications exacted and the heavy, endless labors demanded of them.

To be sure, the dispensing of justice is a sacred function akin to spiritual mentorship; yet the judge, like the minister, must live. It seems hardly credible—as stated in the legislative debate on this bill—that the judges in Texas have been paid the same salaries for more than forty years. During that period the wage-worker's earnings have been multiplied three or four times and the purchasing power of the dollar has been cut in half.

Legislators of a past generation who fixed the district judge's compensation at \$4,000 a year and that of a Supreme Court justice at \$5,000, were not niggardly. Measured by the living standards of that period, those sums in themselves were munificent. Their successors who, until now, have neglected to readjust judicial salaries to the vastly changed economic conditions, are not free of blame on this score.

Though belated, the measure to remedy that oversight is welcome as marking a step in the right direction. Under the new salary schedule, however, the qualified lawyer who offers for a judgeship still must be willing to sacrifice private interest to the public good. If elected, he cannot receive such financial returns as the required talents and application might command for him in private practice. He must take the honor and the privilege of service as part reward.

No thinking citizen contends that men should seek places on the bench merely for the emoluments; but on the other hand there is a

limit to the sacrifices which a people amply able to pay for its public services, rightfully may ask of its judges. That limit still is exceeded in Texas. The original figures in the Bledsoe Bill—\$5,500 for district, \$7,500 for civil appellate, \$10,000 for criminal appellate judges and a like sum for Supreme Court justices—were none too high. And a succeeding Legislature doubtless will revise the schedule upward to that extent, at least.

There is great need in trained men in public office. Men who are equipped for doing the work that is expected of them, and in order to get this type of men who have prepared themselves for service there must be remuneration equal to what can be made by those men in their profession outside of the office. We think that many men are underpaid, while others are also overpaid, but in neither case do we get the service that we should have. There should be ample qualifications and examinations in public officials before they are elected, just the same as the qualifications for teaching or practicing law, or in doing the work that is required of corporations and business firms. No big business concern would think of employing a man who had had no experience in the work they expected him to do, but in public office it is even very often the case in regarding his qualifications, and as a result there are thousands of dollars being spent of the people's money because there are no compulsory requirements of one's ability, therefore anyone can take a chance and the public pays the bills.

## BUS TRANSPORTATION

Governor Moody's signature to the house bill providing for the regulation of motor bus lines is the completion of a movement that has had the undivided support of fair-minded citizens and bus operators alike. The bill provides that motor transportation lines shall be subject to the supervision of the railroad commission, and declares motor busses to be common carriers. The railroad commission is given power to fix or approve minimum and maximum fares to be charged; to prescribe the routes, schedules, service and safety of motor bus companies; to require the filing of such annual and other reports as the commission may deem necessary; and "to supervise and regulate motor bus companies in all other matters affecting the relationship between such motor bus companies and the traveling public." No company may operate bus lines without first having obtained from the commission a certificate declaring that the public convenience requires such operation. Lines already established and operating, however, shall be granted a temporary permit to continue operation, and this permit shall become permanent unless a protest is filed with the commission. This, obviously, works no hardship upon companies which have become an integral part of the transportation system of the state. Perhaps the most important part of the bill is the provision requiring bus companies to obtain liability and property damage insurance will protect any passenger against personal injury or property damage, and "the taking out of such indemnity policy or policies shall be a condition precedent to any operation." Failure to procure and file the policies with the railroad commission will be cause for revocation of permits to operate. Another rather interesting provision is that requiring the commission to ascertain if particular highways designated in an application for bus operating permits "are of such type of construction or in such state of repair, or subject to such use as to permit of the use sought to be made by the applicant." Agitation for the law which the governor has just signed has been motivated very largely by the rapidly developing importance of motor bus transportation system; if it is to continue to serve the public—and if it does not serve it is not entitled to existence—it must be conducted along sound lines. The day of the fly-by-night bus operator, here today and gone tomorrow, carrying passengers in any kind of vehicle for fares which vary as the breezes, has passed. The new bill, we believe, will be one of the greatest steps forward for reputable bus operators and the public alike.

## PROGRESS

From the biennial report of the Board of Trustees, State Institution for the Training of Juveniles, Gatesville, to the Governor of Texas, November 1, 1926:

The gentleman elected to that position by the Board has done well under adverse circumstances, and the results already obtained are such as to fully vindicate the wisdom of the law and the necessity of continuing the policy. This Board feels, however, that he should be allowed to be a 'Chaplain' and not be compelled to try to do a half-dozen other things that ought to be done, and can be done better, by a teacher or guard."

From the biennial report of the Board of Trustees, State Juvenile Training School, Gatesville, to the Governor of Texas, October 1, 1926:

"At this institution the 'bat' question seems to have solved itself. Neither are dark cells any longer employed. There is, when absolutely necessary, light corporal punishment—with strict adherence to the rules and statutes governing its administering—but the strap is not much in evidence. This is a training school. The very name of 'reformatory' has been erased from the facades."

From an Associated Press dispatch, Austin, April 4, 1927:

"Boys at the State Reform (sic) School, Gatesville, in the future shall not be whipped except at the order of the superintendent of institution, and only then when the superintendent or chaplain is present, the State Board of Control ordered."

So, after all, the onus of heading this bit of legal and institutional reminiscence, "Progress," is allowable.

## Transportation Foremost Problem In Any Scheme For Rehabilitating China

Editor's Note: Here is another article by Rodney Dutcher, explaining the little-understood phases of the situation in China.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—If any forward-looking government gets a firm grip on China, it will have plenty of troubles, but the problem of developing modern transportation lines will be among the very foremost.

China has 1,500 miles of rail road, as compared to something like 250,000 in the United States. Yet China has four times our population and nearly 50 per cent more territory.

**Along the Seacoast.**  
Most of the Chinese are thus grouped along the sea coast and along her big rivers. The others are inaccessible except by the few routes of railroad and ancient methods of transportation, and enormous areas of the country, with all sorts of possibilities, remain unsettled and undeveloped.

Mongolia, for instance, has a population of but 2,500,000 scattered over 1,270,000 square miles. Six-sevenths of the Chinese population is concentrated in one-third of the area.

An estimated 100,000,000 people in western China are virtually isolated from the outside world by lack of roads.

"Much of the transportation in this section is in the hands of human beings," reports Commercial Attaché Julian Arnold to the Department of Commerce. "If the status carried in one year by the railways for the 100,000,000 people of the United States had to be placed on the backs of human beings, it would require 100,000 men working 365 days of the year, each carrying a load of 150 pounds over an average of 15 miles a day, to equal it."

J. R. Baker, technical adviser to the Chinese Ministry of Communications, has compiled a chart showing the number of miles of railway per 100,000 population. The ranking of some is: Australia 464; Canada 278; United States 261; New Zealand 254; France 64; Germany 51; United Kingdom 47; Spain 41; Italy 31; Russia 28; Japan 12; China 2.

**Last Of All Nations.**  
Of course, it follows that a country as devoid of transportation and communication facilities as China would continue steeped in provincialism.

The present inadequate railroad systems are chiefly confined to the coastal plain and Manchuria. The longest are the Chinese Eastern, which has 1075 miles and runs through Manchuria, and the Peking-Hankow railroad, which runs through central China for 325 miles.

**Some Progress Made.**  
There has, of course, been some progress since the first railroad was poked out from Shanghai to a 30-inch gauge track and the station of a Chinese who committed suicide by jumping.

# COURTS MAY END HORNSBY STOCK DISPUTE

## STOCKHOLDERS OF NATIONAL LEAGUE UPHOLD PRESIDENT HEYDLER IN BAN UPON HORNSBY UNTIL STOCK IS SOLD

(By the Associated Press)  
PITTSBURGH, April 8.—The ruling of John Heydler, president of the National League, banning Rogers Hornsby from the New York market until he disposes of stock he holds in the St. Louis Cardinals will be taken to court by the New York club.

The Giants will seek a temporary injunction to restrain the league from interfering with Hornsby as a player. It was announced tonight by counsel for the New York team after national league club owners had failed in their efforts to compromise the stock dispute and had voted to uphold Heydler in barring Hornsby.

Leo J. Bondy, attorney for the Giants, said that on Monday he will apply for the injunction in New York. He said that the matter must be disposed of within five days and that while a New York injunction could be enforced in other states a violation of it would mean contempt proceedings there against the league and its members.

### No Decision

An eight-hour conference of National League baseball club owners, called in executive session to dispose of the dispute growing out of the ownership of 1,167 shares of St. Louis Cardinals stock by Rogers Hornsby, was adjourned tonight without having settled the problem. The magnates upheld the ruling of President John Heydler that Hornsby cannot play with the New York Giants until he disposes of the stock.

At the close of the session it became known that the club owners had obtained an offer of \$100,000 for the stock from Sam Braden, owner of the Cardinals. Hornsby promptly turned this offer down, insisting that he wanted \$125,000 for his holdings. He informed the magnates that he had an outside offer of \$175,000 for the stock and suggested that the league make up the difference of \$50,000. When it became evident that a compromise was impossible, the club owners voted to uphold Heydler and bar Hornsby from the Giants lineup until he had sold the stock.

## Walker And English Champion To Meet

CHICAGO, April 8 (AP)—Mickey Walker has decided to risk his prized middleweight championship in a London ring against a British referee and with a British referee as the judge.

Jack Kearns, manager of the title holder, today closed a 20-round match with Tommy Milligan, champion of Great Britain.

The fight will be decided in London sometime between July 1 and 15. It will be staged under the direction of Charles Cochran, London theatrical producer and sports promoter. Cochran plans to hold the bout in an arena seating 100,000.

Kearns says he has been contacted by considerable more than \$100,000 as Walker's share of the purse.

Promoter Jim Maloney tentatively closed a match between Walker and Dave Shaw, the San Francisco challenger, to be decided here late in August, provided Walker is still champion after engaging Milligan. Both Shaw and Walker are favorably regarded in Chicago, making the match highly attractive.

This, at least, represents the consensus of more than two score major league baseball writers who have scanned the contenders from points of vantage throughout the month and far west and given the Associated Press the benefit of their opinions.

The experts whose club is closest to the ground look for a five club battle for first division positions but when it comes to picking the winner, their choices rest almost exclusively between the Pirates and Giants.

Of the total of 42 pitchers, 15 favor the Pirates to carry off the flag while 10 pick the Pittsburgh New York outfit. Only three put the Cardinals at the top of their list while four expect the Cincinnati Reds to lead the pack to the finish, the point leads to the consensus further reveal how closely matched the writers regard New York and Pittsburgh. Only ten pick a separate team in this comparison, with 10 for the Pirates and 14 for the Giants.

## Dikes Held

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 8. (AP)—Despite local rains, levee conditions along the twisting length of the Mississippi river from Cairo, Ill., to the mouth of the Arkansas and White rivers below Helena, Ark., appeared good tonight and government engineers believed the great dikes were prepared to stand the strain of the tremendous weight of water, in some places 40 feet deep.

## Audible Light Ray To Aid Army In War

WASHINGTON, April 8. (AP)—An invisible ray, emitted from a light bulb but having no effect upon vision, will probably be used in broad daylight for signaling between American field forces in any future war.

The messages it will convey will be protected even more efficiently from enemy detection than those communicated by radio or by wire, but it has an operating distance limit of only about three miles. Another queer thing about the device is that its rays will be translated to the recipient as audible signals.

As developed by the Bureau of Standards, the device permits utilization of the "infra red" part of the "dark" rays emitted by a light, which produce no impression of color or light upon the eye but do transmit heat. A 300-candlepower electric bulb is completely screened against emission of any rays which appear to the eye as light but the "infra red" rays are allowed to escape and are focused with a mirror.

Thus concentrated, the rays are trained upon a receiver, a contrivance equipped with a number of electrical attachments, and are blinked off and on. As that is done, an operator with telephone head-piece attached to the receiver will hear dots and dashes, which can be manipulated into the usual telegraphic code.

The process can go on by night or day, and under full observation of an enemy, so long as the receiving and sending stations have an unobstructed line between them. An enemy, passing between, would be unconscious of the signaling, even though he should pass through the beam, for nothing is transmitted except a tiny wave of heat, so small as to be entirely imperceptible.

stitution except its enactment.

Adopting an attitude Dr. Butler declared in ringing tones:

"The fight is on, and it is to be a fight to the finish. The battle will be fought by men, not mannikins; with principles, not platitudes. No matter what may be the evasions and silences of party platforms, no candidate for high office will be permitted to shelter himself behind the paper-mache breastwork of law enforcement; he will have to stand up and declare whether he is for the federal union established by the constitution or against it, whether he is for freedom of religion, of speech and of the press, or against them. In short, whether he is for the protection of the powers reserved to the states, respectively and to the people, or against it."

After a grooving equalling in warmth that given his opponent, Senator Borgor, while making disagreement with many of Dr. Butler's opinions, declared he had "only the highest admiration for the man who goes out and sincerely expressed his view to the public on this important question."

The audience grew particularly enthusiastic when the senator asserted that "every one recognizes that the liquor traffic is a curse to the human family and must be dealt with by law in some way in order to protect the public interest."

To appeal for a full and fair trial of the proposition, under which the "mean people" of the year are outlawed, intoxicating

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic: Peter's Lesson in Trust.

Scripture Lesson: Matthew 14:22-32. 22. And straightway he constrained the disciples to enter into the boat, and to go before him unto the other side, till he should send the multitudes away.

## Introduction

The incident of today's lesson concerning Peter's trust in Christ was brought about through most interesting circumstances. Jesus had spent a busy day preaching the gospel of the kingdom of God, healing diseases, and feeding a multitude of five thousand men, besides the women and children, with five loaves and two fishes. When the day's work was over, Jesus "constrained his disciples to get into a ship, and to go before him unto the other side, till he should send the multitudes away." In this wilderness place his disciples were unwilling to leave him alone, being constrained by him, however, they took ship to ride other side of the sea and left Jesus to send the multitudes away.

## Jesus, in Prayer Alone

And after he had sent the multitudes away, he went up into the mountain apart to pray. Our Lord had had a difficult day. He had just worked a most stupendous miracle. Moreover, he was confronted with another temptation of the same nature as those he had met and conquered in the wilderness. Again this time worked through the minds and voices of the multitude and suggested to Christ with insidious force: "Become a king, and you will have no difficulty in establishing the kingdom of heaven on earth." Jesus needed the strengthening of will and the peace of mind which he had often before obtained from solitary communion with God, and he needed it as much as ever before. And if he, the Son of God, needed solitary prayer, how much more do we weak mortals need it?

Jesus Saw Them "Telling in Rowing"

When the ship was in the midst of the sea it was tossed by the waves, the wind being contrary. The darkness of the night was upon the sea. Contrary winds were blowing, and the disciples were telling of the sea was miles away out on the mountain side, praying. One of the most beautiful touches in the entire New Testament is given by Mark when he says: "And he saw them telling in rowing." (Mark 6:45). The all-seeing eye of the divine Son of God pierced the darkness of the night and saw the disciples as they rowed against contrary winds and waves. The eyes of the Lord are ever upon the righteous and his ears are open to their cry. When we are in the midst of contrary winds, and, telling against adverse circumstances, we have the blessed assurance that the all-seeing eye of the Son of God is upon us.

## "In the Fourth Watch"

And in the fourth watch of the night he came unto them. This was about three o'clock in the morning, according to the Greek and Roman method of reckoning, used by the Jews at this time, though formerly they had divided the night into three watches, recognizing the fourth watch, but considering it a part of morning. The four watches (Mark 12:35) were called "even," "midnight," "cock-crowing," and "morning." The disciples had rowed against the wind, as John tells us, twenty-five or thirty furlongs. Christ would emphasize their entire dependence upon him, and let them do their best without him, and fail. How often he does not come to his tolling disciples until "the fourth watch" of their night of struggle! But he always comes at the best time for us.

"Be of Good Cheer," v. 27

But straightway Jesus spake unto them, saying, Be of good cheer; I am I; be not afraid. The words are given, but the more significant of his voice would be enough. "Be of good cheer," Christ had said to the paralytic when he was about to heal (Matt. 9:12). Is not that in a very true sense, Christ's message to all mankind in that nervous and fearful "It is I; be not afraid." "It is I;—the same Lord of the tempest who only a few months ago on this same sea stilling the storm by a word (Matt. 8:23-27); why should they be afraid now that this Controller of the winds and the sea was with them? And why should any man fear in any of the storms of life, if he is sure that Jesus is beside him in the tempest?"

He recognized it as the miracle-working quality, the quality which puts man into touch with God.

## When Christians Fail

Peter began to sink when he began to fear. And the scripture tells when he began to fear, it was when he took his eyes off his Lord. There is not a trace that the wind had blown more fierce while the disciples were telling on the water. It had been just as fierce, and the waves had been just as boisterous, when he had sprung from the gunwale of the boat. But then he thought of nothing but the Master, he took eyes for nobody except the Master and so long as that continued he was safe. Looking to Christ he could go anywhere. The very sea was as a pavement to him. Looking away from Christ he was an other man, and the perils that surrounded him were terrible. It is a simple message—looking unto Jesus and yet it is the message of salvation. To trust in him, and to keep the eye on him, is the one secret of all Christian victory.

## Three Local Men To Enter Farm Contest

At least three persons from Lubbock county will enter the Master Farmer contest this year, according to plans which have been launched by David P. Eaton, county agent, and Miss Hazel Hammett, home demonstration agent in cooperation with the extension department of A. and M. college and the Progressive Farmer.

Two members of a committee of five which include Mr. Eaton and Miss Hammett, have been named but the fifth member has not yet been decided upon. Falls Parks, of the north end of the county, who last year was selected as one of the fifteen Master Farmers of the state, and L. O. Burford, another prominent farmer, have been named on the committee.

Plans are to secure three farmers in the county by the final scoring date on May 31. On or about June 6, the score card for the No. 1 farmer will be submitted to a committee which includes the western district agent in the state, this committee being divided into nine sub-committees.

Then the score will be submitted by districts and four of the best records from each of the nine districts will be selected. District agents will score farms in their district during June and July. In the meantime the field editor of the paper will score all farms in the state still in the contest and on November 15, the scores of the editor, the district agents and the original scores of the county and home demonstration agent will be submitted to a state committee composed of T. O. Walton, C. H. Alvord, state agents W. A. Williamson and Miss Mildred Hutton, Miss Bess Edwards, A. K. Shoup and M. R. Martin. This committee will have the duty of selecting the fifteen Master Farmers in the state.

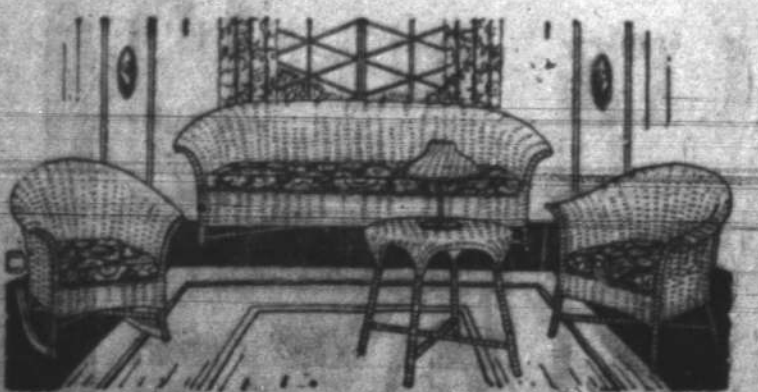

## Denver Collectors Make First Report

First report by members of the collections committee of the Chamber of Commerce, now asking for payment on pledges made to purchase the Denver right of way, was made Friday morning, but pending a complete check-up on the collections to date, the amount secured by the workers was not announced.

It was reported, however, that reception of collections in a few instances was not in the best of good humor and that in a few cases signers of notes refused to make payment. The committee generally seem to agree that their job is not one to be solicited, but they insist that the notes must be paid in order that the railroad may begin early construction of the line into this city.

While the committee of the Chamber of Commerce does not want to be placed in the attitude of threatening signers of the notes, they are agreed that there are ways of collecting them, for they were accepted not only as moral obligations by citizens of the city, but as legal tender on which court service may be had if necessary. O. L. Slaton, chairman of the committee said.

The right of way committee is actively at work signing up deeds for required city property on which the tracks will be built, and in securing

information needed. Rush of the Stanton chamber, E. H. Whitehead, publicity manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, stated that the failure of the former bill proposed regarding taxation of university land was not a disappointment, and that relief was expected to come in time. He declared that the regional organization would do little without cooperation of the 17 counties involved and suggested that the counties meet together and formulate a plan from which to work. An official of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce staff will be present at the meeting held here April 19 and will help the 17 counties burdened by non-taxable university land work out a plan of procedure.
