No Word of Haskell Wright Downed Over Germany Nov. 13

Nothing more has been heard from the War Department following the receipt of a message by his mother reporting that T/Sgt. Haskell Wright was missing in action over Germany on Nov. 13. It is presumed that he was in the fight over Bremen on Nov. 13 when the American Air Forces announced the loss of 15 four-motored bombers and nine fighter planes. Haskell was assigned to a fortress crew.

Haskell enlisted in the Air Force Aug. 6, 1942, and reported for duty on Aug. 19. He received his basic training at Sheppard Field, then six weeks training with the A.A.F.T.C. at Middle River, Maryland. This was followed by eight weeks at Buckingham Air Field, Fort Myers, Fla., topped off with three months at

Pocatello, Idaho, before leaving the states Aug. 4, 1943.

He was born Nov. 17, 1915, at Gray, Okla. His mother, Mrs. Tharasa Marie Wright, lives at 820 S.W. 3rd St. in Perryton. He attended grade school and two years of high school at Edinburg, Tex., and

also studied aeronautics at a Wichita Falls, Tex., school.

He has a number of brothers and sisters. They are: Mrs. Oia Mae Butler, Galt, Okla.; Ray Wright, Perryton; Mrs. Beulah Leona Jantz, Melrose, N. M.; Leonard Wright, Parnsworth; Gordon W. Wright, Balke, Okla.; Mrs. Josie Thrasa Brunner, Laverne, Okla.; Mrs. Bell Marie Anderson, Dallas; Mrs. Nelda Rose Sanford; Weldon Wright, Perryton; and Miss Carmelita Wright, Perryton. Haskell was engaged in farming when he entered service.

Writes from England
Following are portions of a letter written from England on Oct. 24, 1943, to his brother Gordon:

"Well at last I have heard from everyone. I have received 36 letters since I returned here a few days ago. Got two from you. Sure glad to hear. Hope you have rain there. I wish you could get some that falls in this miserable place. It really isn't much of a place for flying. Have a hard time finding our field every time we go up. Landed on the wrong field the other day our radio was out. I get \$203 per month. I have really been around. I am going to get a pass some day and go to London. I have been there twice for the army but didn't get to stay long. Have been to Scotland four or five times. It's a beautiful country but never stops raining.

"The weather in Africa is nice. Gets cool at nights, only had one sandstorm while I was there. They raise some wheat. You remember when they were fighting and took Hill 609. Well I was camped close to it for awhile. The mines still go off. I saw two munition ships blown up in Tripoli. Threw big pieces of steel for four or five blocks. Killed several people. I was about ten blocks from it. I have flown every place I've been. I have been lots of places on trains here. There are lots of pretty girls here. There were lots of pretty French girls in Africa but I couldn't speak French."

KIRTLAND FIELD, ALBUQUERQUE, N. M.—Aviation cadet Dwight N. Drake of Perryton, Texas, has been commissioned a second lieutenant and awarded the silver "wings" of the aerial bombardier upon graduation from the Army Air Forces Bombardier School here following successful completion of eighteen weeks of flight and combat training in high altitude precision bombing and navigation.

Lieut. Drake of Perryton, where he resided with his wife the former Doris A. Ballard and infant son, Daniel D., is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Drake. He is a graduate of Perryton High School, class of 1930 and in civilian life was employed as a bookkeeper and truck operator.

Prior to his advanced training at Kirtland Field, Lieut. Drake was stationed at Kingman, Arizona, where he won the "wings" of the aerial gunner upon completion of the gunnery course.

Now ready for active duty, Lieut. Drake will report at Barksdale Field, Shreveport, La., as a bombardier-navigator on B-26 light bombers. He reports Dec. 19 after a visit with his folks at Perryton.

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As the Herald closed its forms at 10:30 o'clock Friday morning, the first blizzard and snow of any consequence was raging. Rainfall started about 2 a. m., turning into snow shortly before dawn. Moisture from the rain was .45 inch and at 10:30 a. m., snowfall was estimated at from four to six inches.

The snow is driving out of the northwest and is piling up in drifts. Experienced cattlemen say that cattle losses will be heavy if the blizzard continues. Cattle losses will be heavier among inexperienced cattle operators. Most of these speculators have no feed, no shelter and many have no means of looking after their cattle except passenger cars or pickup trucks which are of little use in a storm like this.

While the blizzard and rain is hard on cattle, it increases the store of moisture for wheat in this area which is now in the best condition of any part of the southwest.

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Agricultural Adjustment Agency Announces Farm Program for Ochiltree County for 1944

The Agricultural Adjustment Agency program for 1944 has been announced according to Viola S. Blair, administration officer of Ochiltree county. "The 1944 program again calls for an increase in the production of food and feed crops needed in the war effort. It is asking for all-out production of tremendous wartime requirements. The 1944 program also emphasizes the importance of balancing production so there will be enough of the essential commodities needed to shorten the war and establish a sound peace."

With average weather, the suggested schedule of production should be the largest food crop in the county's history, which would be the eighth year in a row that American farmers have exceeded the previous year's record-breaking food production.

The suggested total crop acreage for 1944 would be about 16 million acres more than this year. Several of the general pattern of production are proposed to expand the acreage devoted to urgently needed crops such as soybeans, peanuts, wheat, corn, potatoes, canning crops, dry beans, and dry peas.

For a record-smashing production of meat animals to bring about a moderate reduction in livestock population. It is important that the abnormally large livestock population be brought into balance with the feed supplies which are expected to be about the same as 1940. When asked about other changes in the program for 1944, Mrs. Miller said there will be no restrictions on what the farmer produces in 1944. Marketing quotas will be limited to the amount of cotton and wheat a farmer could plant without a penalty have been withdrawn. There will be no crop payments on wheat in 1944. Payments will be available to assist farmers in carrying out production practices needed to maintain and build up the productivity of the farm and ranch lands of the nation. This is not a profit making proposition for the farmer for he receives from the government only about what he spends in carrying out the practice. The purpose of these payments is to protect our greatest national resource, the soil, and keep it producing food at maximum capacity."

The practices selected for the 1944 program are those which are needed most to conserve and improve soil fertility, improve range and pasture land, prevent wind and water erosion and promote conservation and better utilization of water.

Payments with respect to practices are classified as limited and unlimited.

The limited practices are carried out according to the allowance set out for the individual farm. This allowance is the sum of the following figures: 75 cents per acre for each acre of cropland on the farm, plus \$1.50 per acre for each acre of commercial orchards on the farm, plus \$1 per acre for each acre of commercial vegetables grown on the farm, plus six cents per acre for each acre of pasture or range land on the farm. The practices used for earning this production practice allowance are about the same as those used in 1943. Some new 1943 practices have been eliminated and two new practices have been added. Payment will be made for establishing a satisfactory cover

of rye grass or small grains, except wheat, seeded in the fall of 1943, provided the small grain is not harvested for grain. The other new practice payment is for the harvesting of much needed grass seeds. The new program year started Dec. 1, 1943, in Ochiltree county.

The unlimited practices are regarded as very essential to war production and the government proposes to pay the farmer for all of these practices to the extent that they are carried out on his farm, in addition to the payment earned on limited practices. The unlimited practices are terracing, drainage ditches, pasture mowing, elimination of prickly pear, cactus, mesquite, cedar and underbrush, and the construction of one tank or dam on each farm not in excess of 2,000 cubic yards of material moved.

Many of the out practices have been increased above the rates in 1943 to partly offset the increased cost of labor and seed.

Indications are that there will be an adequate price support program to assure the farmer a fair return from the crops that he is being asked to produce but this phase of the program has not been announced. Everything possible will be done during 1944 to assist the farmer to get the needed machinery and labor.

Admission will be the purchase of a War Savings Stamp or a War Savings Bond of any denomination. Over \$50,000 worth of stamps and bonds were sold at Victory concerts last year.

The Wooten farm is well known for the quality of its livestock. Mr. Wooten states that the 54 head to be put on the auction block are high bred animals. Many of the cows have calves by side.

Many Must File Income Tax Declarations or Amended Declarations of Income by Dec. 15

Are you all straight with Uncle Sam on your income taxes for this year? A great many people are not, and must file tax Declarations or Amended Declarations December 15. Better be sure about yourself. Here is the situation.

The Current Tax Payment Act of 1943, approved June 9, 1943, made no change in the tax rates imposed by the Revenue Act of 1942, but changed the manner of reporting and paying the taxes. Certain classes of taxpayers were required to file with their respective Collectors of Internal Revenue a statement reporting what they estimated their 1943 income tax would be. The forms were called "Declaration of Estimated Income and Victory Tax by Individuals for Calendar Year 1943." Many thousands of such forms were filed during the filing period ended September 15, 1943, by persons due to file at that time.

Another requirement is that certain other classes of taxpayers shall file the "Declaration" forms on or before December 15, 1943. Are you among those now required to file such "Declarations"? Generally, there are three principal groups of individuals coming under the December 15 filing requirement.

The first are those who filed Declarations in September but underestimated their tax by more than 20% and who should, therefore, file

an "amended" Declaration now. Some of those who filed in September may now believe they overestimated their 1943 tax and these may file an amended Declaration. If this is true in your case, be sure to attach to your "Amended" Declaration the bill you receive from the Collector shortly after December 1.

"Amended" Declarations are filed on the same form as original Declarations, and should be clearly marked by writing the word "Amended" in a prominent place on the Declaration. A penalty is imposed by law on those persons who filed in September but underestimated their tax by more than 20%, unless they file an "Amended" Declaration correcting such underestimation by December 15, 1943.

The second group due to file a "Declaration" form by December 15, 1943, consists of those persons, farmers and non-farmers, who did not file in September because their 1943 income as estimated at that time was not sufficient to require such filing, but who now come within either of the following classes:

1. Those persons who expect to receive for the calendar year 1943 more than \$100 gross income from a source outside of wages subject to withholding if they also expect sufficient gross income to require filing an income tax return (\$500 for a single person, \$1200 for a married couple, or \$642 for an individual married person).

2. Those persons who expect to receive for the calendar year 1943 wages subject to withholding totaling more than \$2,700 if single or \$3,500 if married (married couples must file declarations if such wages of husband and wife together exceed \$3,500).

3. In addition the declaration is required of any person who was required to file an income tax return for 1942 and who expects his wages subject to withholding in 1943 to be less than similar wages were in 1942.

These requirements should be studied carefully, in order that you may not fail to file a Declaration on or before December 15 if you are classified under any of the groups described.

The last group, and perhaps the most important or largest, at this time, is comprised of farmers, stockmen and ranchers who have sufficient income to require their filing income tax Declarations. Farmers, stockmen and ranchers reporting income on a calendar year basis were not required to file Declarations in September regardless of their income, because the nature of the source of their income did not enable them to make a fair estimate of their tax at that time. 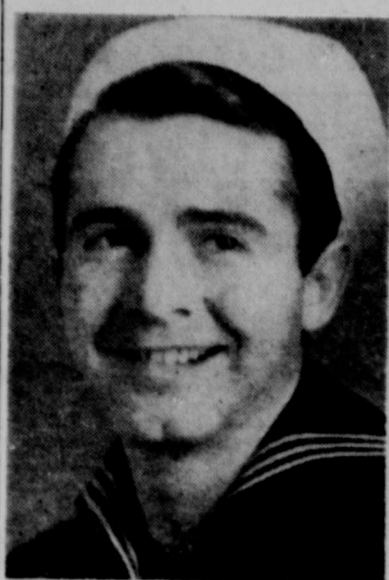

Church, Worcester, Mass., assists in the training at William and Mary. Specialist Gaylord E. Carter, formerly of the Columbia Broadcasting System, serves at Pearl Harbor; Specialist William E. Butler, formerly director of Father Flanagan's Boys' Town Choir, serves at the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis; and Specialist James M. Dobbins, formerly orchestra leader at Wheaton College, directs the Chapel Symphonic Choir at the U. S. Naval Air Station, Glenview, Ill.

"We are beginning to realize that the United States and Canada need a great missionary movement in order to save their own national existence," President Walter T. Brown, of Victoria University, Toronto, said recently. "Great nations, like great individuals, can never be developed on the basis of selfishness. We cannot take our places in the councils of the world unless we can rise above our insularity, our tendency to national isolation, and develop a world-consciousness."

"In a day when the limited efficacy of religious education causes so much concern and when the unresponsiveness of the secular community to a Christian social message is continually deplored, it is strange that adult education in the church should on the whole be such an anemic affair," said Prof. F. Ernest Johnson, of Columbia University, and of the staff of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, recently. "Two things are urgently needed: encouragement of small groups to crusade, with the blessing of the church, for purposes in which Christians they intensely believe; and a sharpening of vocational conscience through group study and action on the part of Christians who belong to the same calling. . . . The leaven of social reconstruction must be found in small unofficial fellowships."

One of Brazil's highest decorations—the Order of the Southern Cross—has been conferred by the government upon the Rev. Dr. Hugh Clarence Tucker, "grand old man" of Methodism in Brazil, and veteran missionary of the United States to that country. Born in Beechville, Tenn., eighty-six years ago, Dr. Tucker first went to Brazil in 1886 under the former Board

of Missions of the Methodist Church, South. A few years later he became the agent in Brazil for the American Bible Society. In 33 years he has distributed more than 5,000,000 Bibles. His services include assisting Dr. Oswald Cruz in fighting yellow fever in Brazil in 1902; presidency of the trustees of Granbery College, Brazil; founding of the Institute for the Poor in 1906, one of the founders of the Brazil Conference of the Methodist Church; promoted the translation of the Bible into Portuguese; helped in every social movement in Brazil through half a century.

The Goodwill Industries of Morgan Memorial Methodist Church, Boston, Mass.—the parent Goodwill of the country employing handicapped people to remake discarded articles—has found a new outlet for its products: the United States Army and associated governmental services. The new business started with the donation by the Army of some discarded furniture and the reupholstering of some chairs by the Goodwill shop for the army base in Boston. Now it has contracts with the Army, the WACS, the Red Cross, and the USO.

Clergymen, physicians, and members of Parliament are greatly concerned with the increase in juvenile delinquency, prostitution, bigamy, illegitimate births, and venereal diseases reported throughout England. While blaming the conditions on the sociological and psychological strains of the war, churchmen say that they can be controlled. The mobilization of women, as well as men, for war service of many kinds, is pointed to as the direct cause of waywardness among "latch-key children" of from ten to eighteen years of age. It is leading many Britishers to question if the nation has been wise to take mothers and fathers out of the homes and sacrifice the children to the needs of the war machine.

Against Bureaucracy

In a speech at Des Moines, Ia., Governor Schoepfel reiterated his call for a return to government at the grass roots, and cited some Kansas history by way of illustration:

"In 1874 the western part of Kansas suffered a calamity in the form of a horde of grasshoppers," he said. "Our state was young—only thirteen years old—and the settlement of the western part was very new. The ravages of the grasshopper invasion threatened the livelihood of many settlers. . . . The Governor called a special session of the Legislature. It met, considered the problem, and enacted proper legislation for the relief and aid of those in distress, and the necessary steps were promptly taken, relief was extended, a calamity averted."

"If that same situation should occur today we all know what would happen. It would take practically a photo-finish to determine which would land first—the grasshoppers or a horde of Federal agents. The state and county would have absolutely and nothing to say about it. The benefits—all from the Federal Treasury—would come to farmers with them scarcely knowing what it was about. The other day a number of farmers in Kansas did receive Federal checks and dozens of them are wondering what in the world they were for, as they knew of no payment which was due under any existing programs in which they were participating."

Governor Schoepfel has spoken out on many occasions against the surrender of state and local rights and against the spread of Washington bureaucracy. What he is saying is similar to what many other men in positions of leadership are saying throughout the country.

The battle against bureaucracy is on.—Topeka Capital.

Slight Increase in Old Age Pensions

Austin, Dec. 2.—John H. Winters, executive director of the State Department of Public Welfare, announced today that payment of Old Age Assistance grants will be raised a flat 20c over November payments when December checks are written. The welfare director said that the \$2.64 cut in each grant, which has been in effect for several months because of insufficient money, will be reduced to \$2.44 this month when \$3,781,489.16 is distributed to 180,511 aged persons in an average payment of \$20.95. The rolls made a net decline of 1,332 cases between November and December payments, due principally to better employment conditions and to a general increase in resources of recipients, the director said.

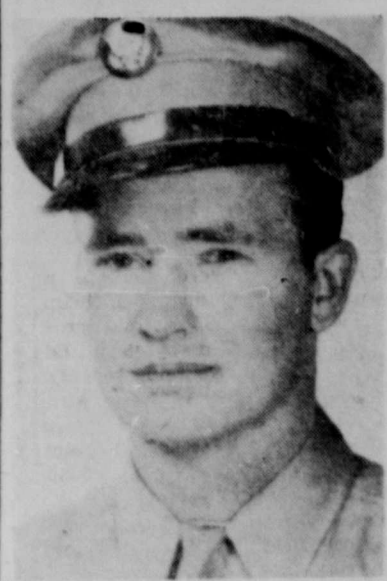

Mutual Aid in New Zealand
While New Zealand furnishes hospital beds, buildings, meat, fruit, dairy products, eggs, flour, sugar, and vegetables to United States forces, the U. S. supplies ordnance, ammunition, airplanes, steel, wire, tinplate, machinery, hardware, cotton, yarn, and thread to New Zealand.

Polish Women on Night Shift
In a Wuppertal (Germany) factory, 1,400 Polish women have been making arms for Germany since 1941. They have been on the night shift continually, and German women or other foreigners relieve them during the day when the raid danger is much less. Polish women are always quartered on top stories where the danger from bombs is the greatest.

U. S. Trained Dutch Flyers in Action
Many of the Netherlands airmen who received their wings or completed their advanced training at the Netherlands flying school at Jackson, Miss., are already in action from British bases. Several have joined the Netherlands naval air service Mitchell bomber squadron or have been given assignments with Dutch fighter squadrons flying in British Royal Air Force blue.

Record Wheat Crop Expected
A record wheat crop of about 2,500,000 bags of 200-pounds each is expected in the Orange Free State, Union of South Africa, compared with 700,000 bags last year, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce.

Sufferings of Belgian Women
The Germans have imprisoned, deported to Germany, or executed numbers of Belgian women for sabotage, printing and distributing illegal papers, listening to BBC, or helping or hiding British soldiers.

Austrian Manpower-Travel Curb
Austrians will not be permitted to travel interstate in cases where the local Manpower Authority considers the person's work essential in his locality. The Inland Transport Authority may require a Manpower clearance before issuing a ticket.

"The Music Run"
American Liberator bomber crews call some bombing flights into the Netherlands East Indies, "the music run" because on these flights they tune in on musical program from Japanese radio stations. A special correspondent for Aneta, Dutch news agency, quotes an American captain: "We find some Jap station which is playing swing music and listen in. It makes the time pass more pleasantly particularly when you are on a long mission over the sea at night."

Dutch Feed Underground Armies
To feed the 300,000 Dutch ex-

service men students, and laborers who have gone into hiding rather than submit to forced labor in Germany is the biggest problem of the Dutch underground. Members of this army in hiding are being hunted by the German "Green Police" and are deprived of rationing coupons. The underground is solving the problem by increased thefts of food from freight cars and railway warehouses.

Britain's Food Production
Britain, which before the war imported almost 70 per cent of its food, is now producing nearly one half of it. The increase has been brought about by plowing land not previously cultivated and by switching from production of meats and dairy products to the growing of grains and vegetables.

Brazil to Help Bomb Mosquitoes
Ten thousand pounds of pyrethrum seed has been flown from Africa to Natal, Brazil, to assist that country in growing plants that will help "bomb" malaria-bearing mosquitoes and other insects on the battlefronts of the world. How Rubber Tappers Work

War has made business boom for Bolivian rubber tappers. When a rubber tapper starts his activities, he cuts out his route covering 100-150 wild trees within two or three miles of a river. Usually a worker has three such routes, one of which he covers every three days. He collects latex in a cloth bag slung over his shoulder. Returning at night to his fire, he makes rubber balls by repeatedly dipping a stick in the liquid latex, then turning it over the first until it dries, thus building up a ball at the end of the stick.

Dear Mother and Dad:

How is everyone there this rainy morning? I'm well and am O. K.

I received a letter from you yesterday and was sure glad to get it. Yes, I received the shaving equipment quite awhile ago. Christmas is coming early for me this year. I received the first box you mailed and it was really nice. Thanks a lot.

Well, I'll tell you of a few things that I have seen over here. A few weeks ago, we were stopping about one-fourth mile from an Italian cemetery. It was a nice looking one so three of us decided to go and look at it. The gate was closed at the entrance and it had about a five-foot wall around it made of stone. One of the boys could talk Italian so he asked some Italians how we could get in and they said climb over the fence, so over we climbed. The tombstones had pictures on them of the person buried there. They had vaults and it was a very nice cemetery.

Well, that is enough about that, so I'll tell you of my visit to Naples and Pompeii. I have been in Naples twice and Pompeii once. Naples is quite a city. The largest I have been in since I left England. The main street of the town is called Via Roma and it is quite a place. I guess that Adolph hated to give up such a large city. The civilians come around with souvenirs to sell. They have most everything to sell. A couple of fellows had cameras but they didn't have any films for them, so I didn't see any use in buying the cameras.

The next time I went to Naples I went on over to Pompeii. I forgot to tell you. But just before you get to Naples you can look out across the water and see the Isle of Capri. Pompeii isn't a very big place. They have an entrance to it and charge ten cents to see it. They have plenty of different things to sell. That is where I bought the table spreads. You should get them about Christmas time. I also sent two lava rocks. These came from the volcano Mt. Vesuvius. It was the one that destroyed Pompeii. I'm sending you a picture that I had

Ration Reminder

GASOLINE—In states outside the east coast area A-9 coupons are good through January 21.

SUGAR—Stamp No. 29 in book four good for 5 pounds through January 15, 1944.

SHOES—Stamp No. 18 in book one good for 1 pair. Stamp No. 1 on the "Airplane" sheet in book three, good for 1 pair.

MEATS—FATS—Brown stamps L and M good through January 1, 1944. Brown stamp N became good December 5 and remains good through January 1, 1944.

PROCESSED FOODS—Green stamps A, B, and C in book four, good through December 20. Green stamps D, E, and F in book four became good December 1 and remain good through January 20.

Civilians to Get Canned Foods. Increased supplies of canned pineapple, canned grapefruit juice, asparagus, corn, pumpkin, spinach, tomatoes, beans, and figs will reach retail markets within a few weeks, the War Food Administration said recently. They are supplies owned and held by canners, but set aside for Government purchase, which have been released to civilians.

More Farm Machinery in '44. An improved outlook for new farm machinery in 1944 is foreseen by the War Food Administration. Raw materials authorized by WPB to make planting, tillage, and harvesting equipment during the year provide for about twice the quantity produced in 1943, or almost 80 per cent of the production in 1940—a year in which manufacture was relatively large. The manufacture of repair parts will be unrestricted.

Suspend Slaughter Quotas. To facilitate marketing and slaughter of record numbers of livestock produced by U. S. farmers, slaughter quotas (for civilian consumption) until further notice have been suspended by the War Food Administration.

Must Collect Points for Pork. Although WPA has temporarily lifted all its restrictions on the amount of pork a farmer may deliver to persons living off his farm, he must continue to collect ration points for all rationed meats, OPA said recently. If pork is transferred point-free, it means that a great deal of this food will find its way into the black market and will be unavailable to legitimate consumers.

Brown Points for Waste Fats. For every pound of fat a housewife turns in to her meat dealer or other fat salvager, she will receive two brown points, beginning December 13. "But most important," Herbert M. Faust, director of WPA's Salvage Division said, "Within a month the fat will be transformed into war materials and on the way to the fighting fronts." He reminded housewives to save grease from turkeys, geese, ducks, and chickens, for the manufacture of war products.

The Wheeled Vehicle Department is one of eight in the huge Armored School. The school operates on two seven-hour shifts six days a week. Students on the early shift, march into classrooms at 6 a. m. and complete their day's program at 1 p. m. The second shift comes in behind them and works until 8.

Service Buttons Being Distributed

Plastic gold-coated lapel buttons for wear on civilian clothing, to signify honorable military service on and after the declaration of a period of national emergency, September 9, 1939, are being distributed to issuing agencies throughout the country, the War Department has reported. The insignia on the buttons is an eagle within a circle, the wings extended beyond the circle's edge. Persons whose army service has been terminated under honorable conditions will be permitted to wear the insignia.

Can Hold Shoes 30 Days

Without ration payment dealers may not hold shoes bought on a will-call or lay-away plan, or by special order, longer than 30 days after they become available for delivery, OPA has announced.

Requests for Penicillin

The War Department never has controlled penicillin nor received the entire output. Surgeon General Norman T. Kirk of the Army Medical Department explained recently. A civilian request for penicillin, the new drug which prevents the growth of infection bacteria, should be made through the civilian's doctor. The doctor should communicate by telegram, telephone, or personal letter with Dr. Chester S. Keefer, Evans Memorial Hospital, Boston, giving complete details of the case.

Western Gasoline Aids Attack

Gasoline drawn largely from west coast and Rocky Mountain areas is powering land, sea, and air attacks on Bougainville and bombings of Rabaul, according to OWI on the basis of Army and Navy statements. Gasoline also is saving our wounded men by enabling them to be flown in transport planes to hospitals far behind the lines.

College Enrollments Drop

Enrollments in colleges and other institutions of higher education this year are more than one-quarter below the 1940 peak, according to a preliminary survey by the U. S. Office of Education of the Federal Security Agency. This year's total of about 1,110,500 persons is eight per cent below last year's figures. Of those enrolled this year almost one-quarter have been assigned by the armed forces for specialized training.

Farmers' Tax Deadline, Dec. 15

Farmers are required to file declarations of estimated 1943 income and victory tax and make a payment by December 15. Farmers who elected to make declarations September 15 when most other persons made them, will need only to make an installment payment December 15. Persons who made declarations September 15 and wish to amend them or those who made no declarations but since have had a change in income to require them, also should file by December 15. Persons with tax installments due on that date will receive and have received bills from the local Collector of Internal Revenue.

Reduce Meat Point Value

The entire list of rationed beef items has been cut two or three ration points, making the most meat available to civilians since rationing began late last March. Many pork cuts remain at the reduced value set by OPA in mid-November, and point values of lamb, mutton, and all veal remain unchanged. This means an increase of approximately 30 per cent in the housewife's meat ration for December as compared with the ration set at the beginning of November.

Change Date on Cattle Program

The effective date of the cattle price stabilization program has been changed from December 1, 1943, to the beginning of the first accounting period after December 15, 1943, for each slaughterer.

To Maintain Farm Structures

Farm building material makers, under sponsorship of the Farm Structures Institute and in cooperation with the War Food Administration, will hold a war conference in Chicago, December 10, on maintenance of farm structures. WFA announced recently. Keynote of the conference will be that the nation's ten and a half billion dollar investment in farm structures must be kept at top productive efficiency through adequate maintenance, with the necessary minimum of new construction. Only the value of agricultural land itself exceeds the amount of funds invested in buildings and structures on farms of the country.

Save Tree Leaves For Fertilizer

College Station. — Nature's alchemy translates dead tree leaves into humic acid which releases plant food in the soil for use by plants and trees the next season. Don't burn them. Instead, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, make them into leaf mold or a compost bed. Not leaves alone, but all plants refuse, such as grass clippings, weeds and other vegetation, may be used. A simple frame enclosure of scrap lumber should be provided to prevent the compost material from becoming scattered.

If a bed already is available, spread a thin layer of dirt over its contents, if any, before adding the leaves. In areas of very limited rainfall, it is best to wet the entire compost bed once or twice a month to insure uniform decomposition.

If a well-balanced plant food mixture is desired, add a 100-pound sack of 4-12-4 commercial fertilizer to about one wagon load of compost mixture. Sprinkle the fertilizer over the vegetable mass before covering with a layer of soil. The fertilizer tends to hasten decomposition.

Where soil is acid, also add 100 pounds of lime to the heap. Compost of this type is especially beneficial to soils which tend to pack or become hard and crusty during dry periods.

It usually requires about three months for leaves, weeds and other vegetation to decompose into a first class plant growing mixture. The application to a vegetable garden is one half to one pound per foot of row space. Mix it thoroughly into the soil before seeding. For pot plants the mixture should be about one half compost and one half good loam soil.

Since flowering plants in outdoor beds are more exacting in their plant food requirements, Rosborough suggests spreading a layer of compost about three inches thick over the bed. Then spade it in, mixing thoroughly with the soil.

Industrial Users Rationed Foods To Re-register

Between December 15, 1943 and January 5, 1944, all industrial users of rationed foods will be asked to re-register with their local War Price and Rationing Boards.

The purpose of this re-registration is to combine the allocation of all rationed foods on one form rather than on the three forms heretofore used. This will permit uniform application of the regulations. It will permit the issuance of all allocations of rationed foods at one time instead of at three times as heretofore has been the case.

After this initial re-registration between December 15 and January 5, allocations will be granted for three months at a time on all rationed foods. This will eliminate trips to the Board at different dates, and will enable the industrial user to plan his purchases and use of rationed foods on a uniform basis.

Industrial users include, for example, such people as bakers, dairies, bottlers, candy manufacturers, pharmaceutical manufacturers, and a host of others who use rationed foods in the preparation of other products, both rationed and unrationed. Settle declared. A baker, for example, he explained, would use sugar, processed foods, and fats and oils, which fall under the Meat program. He would be given one allotment of all of these commodities each three months. Any petitions he might file for relief on one rationed commodity could be made applicable for all his corresponding needs of other rationed commodities.

of the uncertainty of farm income, the law also extends to farmers, stockmen and ranchers more latitude than to other classes of taxpayers in estimating correctly their income. In other words, no penalty for substantial underestimation will attach to a farmer's tax if he has estimated it within 33-1/3% of its true total. A farmer, for the purpose of filing a "Declaration," is defined as a person who derives at least

80% of his income from farming, stock or ranching operations. The landlord farmer who rents his farm land on a share-crop basis is considered to have income from farming operations; but if he leases his properties on a stated money rental basis, his income is not considered as being from farm operations and he would be grouped with those persons required to file Declarations September 15.

In general, it may be stated that the December 15, 1943, filing is in reality a follow-up of the September 15, filing—both of them being steps toward the ideal of pay-as-you-go tax collection. Many taxpayers are not covered in the withholding provisions of the law or are not completely covered, since the withholding system keeps the average taxpayer paid up only to the extent of an approximate minimum tax. For these reasons, the September 15 and December 15 filings were devised. The form actually used for filing, the Form 1040-ES, "Declaration," is very simple. Forms 1040-ES, Declarations, and copies of either version of the work sheet may be obtained from your Collector of Internal Revenue at the Main office in Dallas, or at any of the 16 field offices located in principal North Texas cities. Many farmers already have the forms which were sent them in August. These forms are still good and may be used. Any farmers needing more forms, however, will be supplied promptly upon request to the Collectors. In order that these Declarations may be properly prepared and your tax closely or exactly estimated, work

sheets have been provided on which you may compute your tax as on a regular income tax return. One work sheet is a simplified form which may be used by persons whose incomes are under \$10,000. The other, or Alternative, work sheet is a longer form and may be used by persons desiring to make a more exact estimate of their tax liabilities. The Alternative Work sheet must be used by those whose incomes are more than \$10,000 for the calendar year 1943.

In seeking the assistance of income tax consultants have with you the following information:

1. Copy of 1942 income tax return.

2. Cancelled checks or other evidence on income tax paid on March 15 and June 15, 1943.

3. Definite Estimate of net income (gross income less allowable deductions) from all sources during the calendar year 1943.

4. If you were employed for wages or salaries at any time during 1943, you should have available the amount of Victory Tax withheld by your employer between January 1 and June 30, 1943, and Withholding tax withheld by your employer after July 1, 1943.

It is emphasized that any payment remaining due on your September Declaration or as shown on your December 15 Declaration either amended or original should be paid on or before December 15 to avoid on or before failure to pay the amount estimated to be due. Don't run the risk of severe penalties by overlooking this matter. If you are in doubt as to whether you are re-

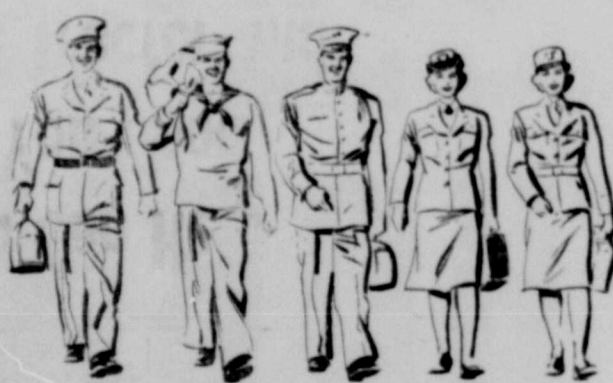

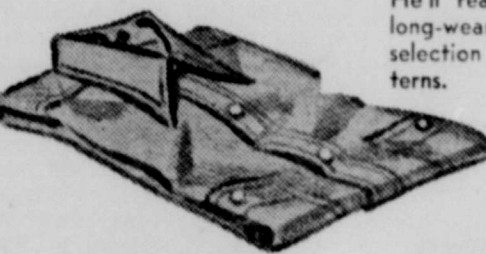

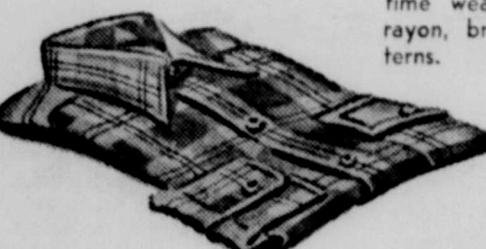
