First Aid Training Course To Start Here Tonight

Tuesday evening, January 20, beginning at 7:30 o'clock in the library room at the City Hall in Gatesville, Vernon Lipsey will start a Red Cross First Aid training course for instructors. The subject matter used in the course is a text book published by the American Red Cross, and it sells for sixty cents. The length of this basic course is twenty hours.

Citizens of Gatesville and Coryell county are being given this opportunity to participate in Red Cross First Aid training under the auspices of the local Red Cross chapter with County Chairman of First Aid Ray M. Ealy, and County Chairman of Home and Farm Accident Prevention, Miss Sidney G. Gibson, cooperating.

It is necessary for persons interested in becoming instructors in First Aid training to take this basic course of twenty hours. After completing this amount of study, they take an additional ten hours and be examined by a Red Cross Examiner in First Aid in order to be eligible to teach community courses in First Aid.

And, right here, folks, write your Congressman W. R. Poage, and Senator Tom Connally, that we ALL want it called "Camp Coryell" or "Fort Coryell". We should get that much out of it. They'll get their mail at Senate, or House Office Building, Washington D. C., which ever part of the national government they belong in.

And, from the Saturday Temple Daily: "It will cover 109,000 acres in Bell and Coryell counties for cantonment site and training and maneuver grounds.

"The camp proper will be in the shape of an 'L' lying north and west of Killeen and will cover 4,000 acres straddling the Bell-Coryell county line. It will be four miles long and one mile wide.

Buildings will include 1,800 buildings constituting a complete modern city, with complete sewage, water, street and other utility facilities...plus maybe eight churches, many theatres, recreation halls and other units.

Best unofficial information has it that a minimum of 30,000 men will be stationed there, altho, one report has it, as many as 42,000 may be there. Cost of the camp indicates it will be of temporary construction.

It is understood the army will purchase 4,000 acres needed for the cantonment side. whether the remainder of the area needed for training grounds will be leased or purchased could not be determined Thursday.

JAPS FAIL AT BATAAN

Washington, Jan. 18 (UP)—General Douglas MacArthur's heroes of Bataan peninsula have stopped the enemy dead in his tracks and "pressure has lessened", a war department communique jubilantly announcing the failure of the first Japanese all-out attempt to complete the conquest of the Philippines said today.

REDS 60 MILES, SMOLENSK

Moscow, January 19 (AP)—Russians have fought their way back into the highly important city of Mzhaisk on the front before Moscow and are battling the German in the streets, the Red Star said today.

BURMA CHIEF IS NABBED

London, Jan. 19 (AP)—Bland, skirt-wearing Premier U Saw of Burma, the southeast Asiatic British possession vital to Singapore's defense has been arrested by the British for conspiring with the Japanese.

'NOTHER SHIP ON E. COAST

An East Coast Canadian Port, Jan. 18 (AP)—The torpedoing of a Panamanian freighter in the western Atlantic and the apparent loss of 31 of her 37 crewmen has been disclosed with the arrival of

survivors at this port in a Canadian rescue ship.

Later, the Navy Department, announced another merchant ship had been torpedoed and sunk off the North Carolina coast.

130 DIE AT SINGAPORE

Singapore, Jan. 18 (AP)—Striking with unabated fury behind air attacks which have dealt Singapore its heaviest blow so far, Japanese attackers pressed still closer to this far eastern defense bulwark today, but apparently, they were able only to inch ahead against Britain's stiffening offense.

Even the customary few casualties soared to 130 dead and 100 wounded in the 70-plane pounding.

PAN-AM MEET LOOKS GOOD

Rio De Janeiro, Jan. 18 (AP)—Nineteen new world nations favoring a complete rupture of relations with the axis brought strong pressure today on Argentinian and Chile to get these two remaining American republics lined up in a solid, 100 percent western hemisphere front.

STALIN TO FREE 25,000 POLES

Cario, Jan. 18 (AP)—Josef Stalin has agreed to let 25,000 Poles of military age leave Soviet Rus-

sia to join Polish forces fighting under the British middle east command, it was learned authoritatively here tonight.

15 FLIERS LOSE LIVES

Las Vegas, Nev., Jan. 18 (AP)—Carol Lombard lost her life in an airplane crash 40 miles south of here Saturday, and also, 15 men, who were "transporting bombers and other aircraft east."

Carol Lombard, "Mrs. G.", was Clark Gable's wife. Her loss was bad, rather terrible, but, it seems to us, the most important people on this ill-fated ship were the 15 Army men, especially, right now.

FDR GETS MORE POWER

Washington, Jan. 18 (AP)—Administration leaders hope to speed thru Congress this week legislation augmenting wartime powers of President Roosevelt.

LABOR TRIES PEACE, ONCE

Washington, Jan. 18 (AP)—Labor circles appeared convinced today that mechanical difficulties in the way of union of the AFL and CIO could be overcome in new peace negotiations, proposed by John L. Lewis.

"YOUR AND MY
INCOME TAX"

The Revenue Act of 1941 provides a simplified method of computing income tax in the case of individuals whose gross income is derived wholly from salary, wages or other compensation for personal services, dividends, interest, rent, annuities, or royalties, and does not exceed \$3,000. A new Form 1040A has been provided for taxpayers who are entitled to and elect to use such method. A table on the reverse side of this Form shows the amount of tax on increasing amounts of gross income after the proper allowance of \$400 for each dependent, if any.

The tax under the simplified method is the same for each \$25.00 block of gross income and the taxpayer need only ascertain in which block his gross income (less allowance for dependents) falls to determine his tax. A flat reduction of 10 per cent has been made in arriving at the amount of tax shown in the table for deductions such as charitable contributions and taxes paid, so that the taxpayer who uses this method does not list these but gets an automatic deduction of 10 percent.

Under the simplified method the status of a person on the last day of the taxable year is the governing factor in determining the exemption level \$750 for single persons and married persons not living with husband or wife, and \$1,500 for married persons living together, as well as the credit for dependents.

A husband and wife living together on the last day of the taxable year may file separate returns on Form 1040A if the gross income of each is from the prescribed sources and does not exceed \$3,000 or they may file a single joint return on that Form if their combined income is from the prescribed sources and does not exceed \$3,000.

The use of the simplified method is optional with the taxpayer but once an election has been made for any year, it is irrevocable for that year. If a taxpayer files a return under the simplified method for the taxable year he may not thereafter file a return under the general provisions of the law for that year. Conversely, if he files a return under the general provisions for any taxable year, he may not thereafter file a return under the simplified method for that year. However, a new election is allowed for each succeeding taxable year.

IRELAND AND JONESBORO QUINTS MEET IN CRUCIAL CLASS B CONTEST

CLASH TONIGHT IN EAGLE GYM TO DECIDE PROBABLE COUNTY CHAMP

Tonight at 7:30 the probable winner of the County Class B championship bunting will be decided, for at Jonesboro the two leading quintets, the Ireland Cardinals and the Jonesboro Eagles, will clash in a mighty roundball battle that is due to attract all the fans in that section of the county. They will come from the deep wooded sections and from the forks of the creeks, and the Eagle gym is due to be packed by game time, for this is the most colorful attraction offered Coryell County cage fans this season.

At the present, the fiery, red-shirted Cardinals are leading the round-robin playoff instituted in Class B circles this year. They have met defeat only once, but that came at the hands of the same Eagle five that they meet tonight. 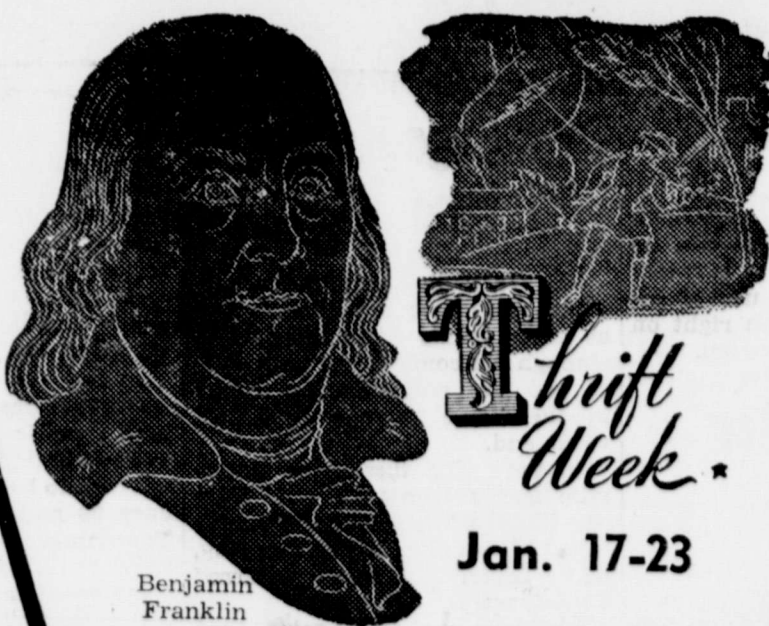

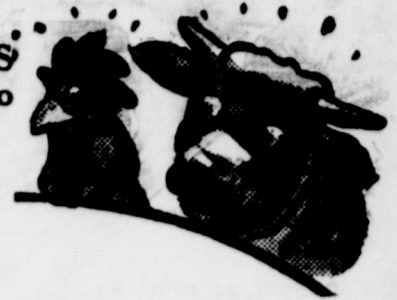

GRAND JURY REPORTS TO DISTRICT JUDGE R. BATES CROSS

—v—
THE STATE OF TEXAS,
COUNTY OF CORYELL.

TO THE HON. R. B. CROSS,
JUDGE OF THE 52ND JUDICIAL
DISTRICT:

Now comes your Grand Jury for the January Term of the District Court of Coryell County, Texas for the year of 1942, and respectfully submits this report.

The Grand Jury has been in session for a period of 5 days and has interviewed 64 witnesses. Resulting from our work are 14 true bills, 11 of which are felonies and 3 of which are misdemeanors.

We wish to thank Judge R. B. Cross for the able charge he gave us at the beginning of our session, as well as the District and County Attorneys for their assistance. We further thank all of the bailiffs and officers of the Court and the Sheriff and his Deputy, and all witnesses who have promptly an-

swered their summons to appear before the Grand Jury.

We feel that Coryell County should take pride in the fact that there are few serious offenses which this Grand Jury was called upon to investigate and especially are we glad that there was no homicide occurring the County.

During our session we have had brought to our attention several lay violations committed by escaped inmates of the Gatesville State School for Boys in Coryell County. Also we have noted a widespread apprehension on the part of our citizens with reference to the problems created in this county by the escape of boys from the institution. Much of this no doubt has been created by speculation and rumor and we would urge the citizenry to concern itself only with established facts and authenticated information about escapes from the School. Furthermore, while we realize that our County is the home of the State institution and that for the most part our interest in the

School is a common one with the entire State of Texas, still we do feel that we have a vital concern with the safety of the persons and property of Coryell County, as affected by the School; that in so far as this problem is concerned, it is one that is peculiar to Coryell County. We have thus concerned ourselves and have spent some of our time in seeking to achieve a better understanding between the local officers and citizens and the administration of the Gatesville State School for Boys. We feel that some progress has been made in this direction, and we have requested and do request that the Administration of The Gatesville State School for Boys be ever mindful of the rights of persons and property in this County and that appropriate steps be taken to insure in so far as possible, the safety of our citizens and their property.

In view of the rubber shortage and the restricted sale of automobile tires we have been urged to ask all persons to mark or brand their tires and make a record of the serial numbers. It is expected that many tires will be stolen in the months to come and it will be a great help to officer and owner alike if a positive identification can be made of your tire.

The Grand Jury has also observed that there are some persons who still loiter about our streets and businesses in idleness and without evidence of any gainful employment. In this time of national emergency it seems that there is work for everyone and that there is no occasion for vagrants. Should this condition continue we would ask our peace officers to enforce the statutes dealing with vagrants.

Having completed our work, we respectfully ask that we be discharged this the 16 day of January, 1942.

UNCLE SAM TEACHES RADIO



To meet the demand for qualified men created by the huge shipbuilding program of the Maritime Commission, the United States Maritime Service is training youths to become radio operators in the American Merchant Marine.

Physically fit American male citizens 18 to 23 years of age with no previous experience are being offered a 10 months' course in radio operation, maintenance, and repair. Youths accepted are paid from \$36 to \$60 a month while in training. Food, quarters, and clothing are furnished by the Government.

Those who successfully complete the course become radio operators in the Merchant Marine, with pay starting at \$105 a month; food and quarters furnished.
