Church Grant For Rec Program

Paying For Summer Supervisor

A Methodist grant of \$900 has made possible a summer recreation program in Colorado City.

The grant has been announced jointly by Rev. Billy Wilkinson, pastor of First United Methodist Church, and Community Action Program coordinator, Mrs. Bob Shambarger.

It bears a "no strings attached" tag and will provide \$300 monthly for a youth director who will develop a program for youths using

facilities at recently renovated Wallace Neighborhood Center.

The unique program will involve a panel of youth leaders from "local churches" and organizations working with the youth director.

In addition to the board of adult leaders four Neighborhood Youth Corps workers and volunteer instructors will carry out the summer program of scheduled activities planned especially for all youths, Mrs. Shambarger said.

up for the specific activity or class they are interested in, the coordinator said.

There will be three basic groups with appropriate activities - six to nine, ten to 13, and 14 to 18.

"In order to be successful," Mrs. Shambarger emphasized, the summer program will have to have volunteers to take an interest in the overall project.

And she made an appeal to anyone who would like to teach a specific craft or subject,

such as children's music or art, needlecraft, leather craft, etc., to contact CAP office, 728-5060.

Volunteers will be asked to teach one and a half hour classes on any day.

The "three-year program" is being made available to Colorado City CAP through a Fund of Reconciliation developed by General Conference of United Methodist Churches.

Fund was voted during the 1968 General Conference of United Methodist Churches and 20 million dollars was raised throughout the United States for the programs developed especially for poverty areas and minority groups.

First United Methodist Church here made application for funds to support the CAP project and received the grant from the conference committee on reconciliation.

At the end of the summer, the project will be reviewed

by the conference committee and at that time will determine the feasibility of continuing the program during the summers of 1971-72.

CAP next week will begin taking applications for the youth director position.

Qualifications set up by CAP directors include "must like working with youths, have some previous experience and be able to supervise."

Mrs. Shambarger explained that CAP prefers a mature college student that is perhaps planning a career of youth work.

DDD - A Call Not A Spray

Direct Distance Dialing began at 12:01 a.m. today for Colorado City telephone customers.

With this service local residents can dial their own station - to - station long distance calls, according to an announcement made this week by Bill Gilliland, manager, here for Southwestern Bell.

This improvement in telephone service, at no increase in rates, has taken years of planning and engineering, Gilliland said.

"We're very happy to be able to furnish direct distance dialing to Colorado City."

Various steps have been taken during the past week to acquaint persons with dialing procedure for direct distance dialing (DDD).

Bell personnel have presented dialing demonstrations to local

civic clubs, telephoned business firms offering information and will have a visual and audio display explaining details of DDD this month in business office here at 508 Walnut Street.

Information pamphlets will also be included in March statements.

Here's how to make a DDD call.

1. Dial "1" - this connects your phone to the vast DDD network.

2. Dial the Area Code only if it's different from your own.

3. Dial the number you want to call, just as you would a local call.

DDD can be used by all residence and business customers. Long distance calls from pay telephones must be placed through operators.

Election Tuesday

Only Nine Absentee Voters

Three positions on Colorado City Council will be filled Tuesday when voters mark their choices from a list of five candidates.

Only incumbent in the race is Eddie Piliand, owner of Eddie's Pharmacy.

Also on the ballot will be Axel Alvarez, compress employee; Buck May, service station owner; J. O. Dockrey, auto dealer; and Trevlyn Kelley, vice-president and cashier of City National Bank.

Only nine absentee ballots had been casted as of late Friday afternoon.

But City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. reported that number "about normal" for pre-election day voters. Voting this year is to exceed last year's total of 300 plus, city officials said.

R. D. Baker will be election judge for Tuesday balloting at City Hall beginning at 8 a.m. and continuing until 7 p.m.

Which of the 57 "finalists" to be selected for bilingual program financing will be decided in June.

This initial grant from Health, Education & Welfare Administration in Washington, D. C., is paying for all expenses of the Denver trip.

Heading the Colorado delegation are Assistant Supt. Lloyd McKee, who will be the chief architect of the bilingual planning for the staff of Supt. James C. McMath, and Manuel Molina, an employee of Dowell Inc., who is a member of the school's citizen advisory.

Consultants with them will be Dr. Tom Lawrence, executive director of Education Service Center, Abilene, and Dr. Len Ainsworth, associate professor of education at Texas Tech University and evaluator for Colorado City's proposed bilingual program.

Similar foursomes will represent the other 56 school districts selected for the \$10,000 planning grants and final consideration in the program.

With Development Grant

Bilingual Group To National Workshop

A group representing Colorado City public schools travels to Denver, Col., Tuesday aiming for a bilingual education program here.

They will be briefed for developing a final plan for the proposed bilingual program in Colorado Independent School District, beginning next fall.

It was announced in Washington this week that Colorado City already has been selected with 56 other school systems across the nation for federal grants up to \$10,000 each for preparation and submitting complete plans for final consideration in the 1970-71 grants.

District's \$10,000 development grant was announced in Washington by Senator Ralph Yarborough, a main force for the bilingual education legislation, and Mrs. Olivia Reed, with bilingual programs of Health, Education & Welfare being developed through U. S. Office of Education.

If Colorado City is selected for the program, beginning next fall, it will be the pilot program for more than 20 counties in the Abilene District of Education Service Center.

It is the only school system in the upper two-thirds of Texas qualifying for the \$10,000 development grant and

final consideration. Twelve other Texas districts in the finals are from the lower one-third of the state.

Senator Yarborough, who authored the Bilingual Education Program told the Record he is "happy to see more communities develop these programs." He expressed disappointment, however, that the program had not been expanded to more communities.

This program is designed to stimulate the development of programs, services and activities which meet the special education needs of children 13 to 18 years of age who have lim-

ited English-speaking ability and who came from environments where the dominant language is other than English.

Colorado City in its preliminary application said a survey revealed 80 per cent of its Mexican - American children live in homes where only Spanish is spoken. It proposed allocations ranging up to \$64,000 per year over a 5-year span to institute bilingual program here.

In Denver, the local delegation will learn details for preparing the final proposal and receive instructions for type of bilingual staff necessary, fiscal requirements, evaluation and curriculum.

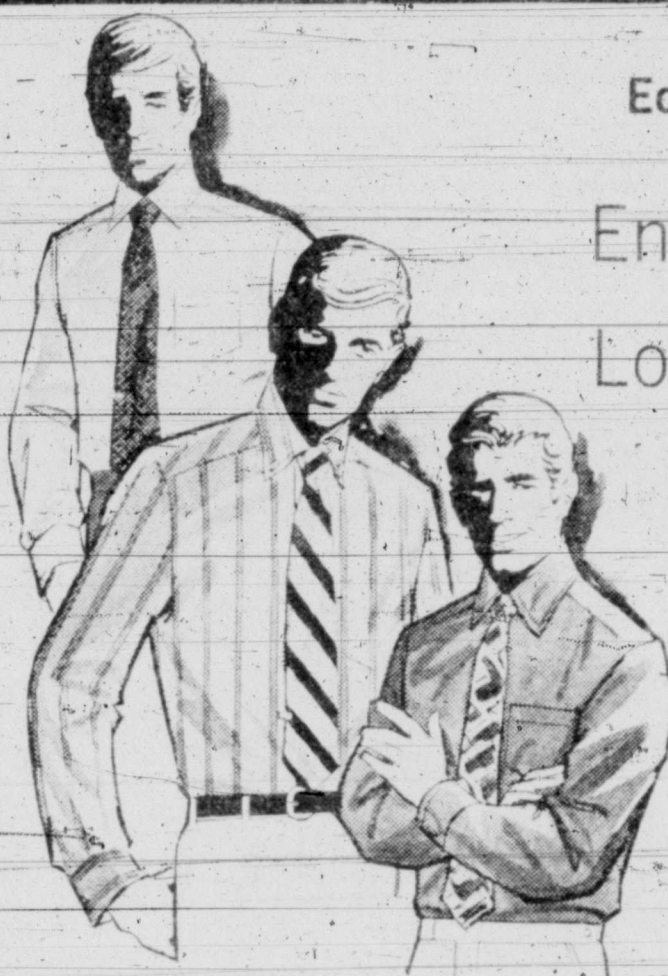

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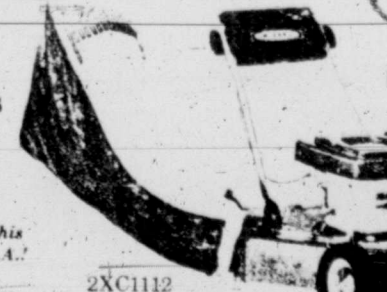

Candidate For Mitchell County Judge BELIEVES:

There is room for progress in the operation of our Mitchell County government. Following are some areas that need particular emphasis. With the proper leadership and harmonious cooperation from all concerned, definite improvements can be made.

1. Law Enforcement. If the rule of law is to be a strong, enduring and vibrant one, it must sustain our community under order and justice, then it is imperative that each citizen take his respect for law and continue to cooperate with all law enforcement agencies.

A. Our law enforcing officers should feel confident that they have the full support and cooperation of every Mitchell citizen.

B. That adequate personnel be employed so that our entire county can receive more protection from law violators. There is a particular need for this around our lake areas.

C. Our county should be tied in with the nation wide law enforcement tele-type hook-up. This could be a joint arrangement with City and County and would be advantageous to our area. All counties adjoining Mitchell County are participating in this modern type of law enforcement.

D. There is an urgent need for a qualified person capable of working with our juvenile problems. He could be a liaison between our youth and the home. He could work directly with our local Mental Health Out Patient Clinic. He could coordinate Welfare Programs as they relate to children with the schools. He could

work with the state Welfare Department in an intensified program of child welfare for our County. These programs are State supported. He could possibly coordinate the efforts of all agencies working with young people through a Youth Council. His assistance would be of great value in solving our social problems, and deterring the chronic appearance of some youth in our juvenile court.

E. When violators have been arrested or charged, their cases should be expedited and under all circumstances violations that have been delayed in the court docket should receive a final disposition.

F. There is a need for a full time staff of 40 out county jail. It is a matter for public and judicial review to be passed to the prisoners from the outside. Serious thought should be given that when juveniles are detained or arrested they can be completely isolated from adult prisoners rather than being placed in the same area with them.

2. In accordance with State Statutes, all Commissioner's Court meetings should be publicized as to the date, time and proposed agenda. Proper minutes of business transacted should be kept and maintained on a current basis. The public should be invited, in fact urged, to attend Commissioner's Court meetings so that they can become more familiar with the operation of our County government.

3. The rural areas of our county should be given more adequate fire fighting assistance. When calls are made to the rural areas by our counties' three fire departments, they are paid approximately \$60.00 per call. City Fire Dept. receives \$60.00 per call. Laramie Fire Dept. receives approximately \$40.00 per call. Westbrook Fire Dept. receives \$6.00 per call. Shouldn't this be equalized?

4. In the past, under State Law, the county has cooperated with the City of Laramie in paving and repairing streets and areas of that community. THIS IS FINE. The same cooperation and assistance can be extended certain streets and areas in Westbrook and Colorado City, specifically around the school area in Westbrook and possibly Front, Tenth and Seventeenth Streets in Colorado City.

5. That in expending county funds, preference, where practical, should be given to the Mitchell County trade area.

6. We should seek the cooperation of our counties' three city governments, the three school districts personnel and the interest of everyone who may be concerned about the betterment of our communities. This type cooperation is urgently needed in various ways, such as recreation, Mini Parks, and in establishing a better line of communication with all ethnic groups.

7. The facilities of our county government should be available to all areas of our county in seeking and securing new industry.

8. When planning all county road improvements preference should be given to school bus routes because of the safety involvement of our children.

9. All County funds, that are not directly needed to maintain our County Government, should be wisely invested so that interest derived therefrom can be used in various county programs and projects.

10. The person elected to fulfill the duties of County Judge should devote full-time to these specific duties.

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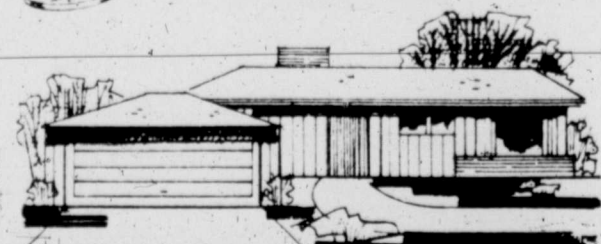
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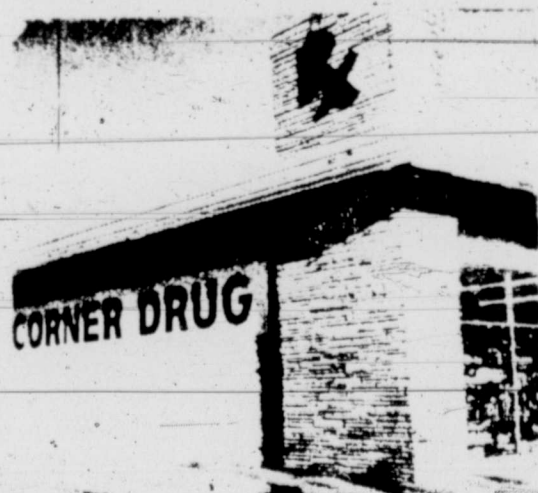

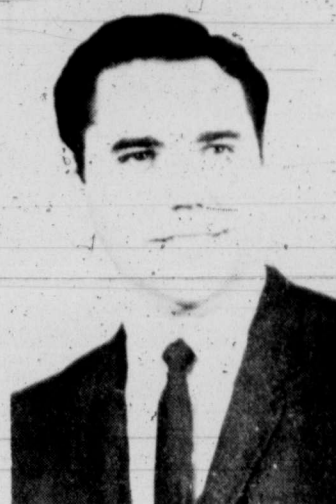
