Brenda Tarter Resigns From City Manager Post Monday At Meeting

Some unexpected news came immediately following the scheduled business portion of the Colorado City Council meeting Monday night, the resignation of City Manager Brenda Tarter.

Mrs. Tarter stated that she would officially resign her position November 30, giving the council six weeks notice.

Mrs. Tarter said the reason for her resigning her position was to accept another job in town that would give her more time with her family.

During the time Mrs. Tarter has been in office, she has worked to get a grant approved from Levi Strauss to build the gazebo, worked out the landfill

problem and put the city's financial situation in better perspective, stated various City Councilmen.

"Her resignation is a loss to the town, but her reason for leaving is understandable," added a councilman.

Prior to Mrs. Tarter's announcement of her resignation, the council approved a rate increase of 2.85 percent by Lone Star Gas Company with an adjustment to be considered each year.

The city attorney, city manager and Lone Star Gas manager met October 21 to review the increase request and the ordinance will officially be approved November 10.

The Colorado City ISD school board met Monday night in the administration building for a meeting at 7 p.m.

They met to discuss the energy management systems that will be installed in the high school, Middle School, Kelly Elementary, Hutchinson Elementary and the Administration Building.

The board invited Oliver Energy Systems to come to the meeting and discuss their bid with the board.

The board decided to go with the bid from Oliver Energy Systems because it met with the plans and qualifications of the board. Their bid was for \$63,591. This includes a 10 channel micro processor for the Middle School as well as for the high school.

This system is guaranteed to pay for itself in two years in the money that will be saved on electricity and gas.

Oliver Energy Systems will begin the work in two weeks and it should be completed in four to six weeks. There will not be any discomfort to teachers or students with this system.


Felix Vigil Dies
