County To Have Unified Food Preservation Program

A group of agricultural workers met in the county agents office Saturday, April 22, and organized a County War Food Committee. The primary purpose of the committee at present is to set up a unified food preservation program.

Attempts will be made to see that all persons who want to do home canning, drying, freezing, or preserve food by any other method, may be able to obtain the same dependable information from one agricultural agency as from another, and that the information given will be the latest and best information or methods recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture.

It was planned that home economics teachers, the local home demonstration agent, and the farm security associate supervisor, or any others who give out information on food preservation will assemble manuals with the 1944 recommendations for food preservation.

It is a known fact that research is being done continually on food preservation in order to be able to keep abreast with the times.

An organization was set up with the following members present: Mrs. Jack Phinizy, emergency war food assistant; Miss Ruth Magee, associate food supervisor; O. W. Orr, division of pink boll worm control; John Flache of the farm workers community; O. W. Richardson, farm security supervisor; Mrs. Myrtle Negy, county home demonstration agent; Lee R. Pool, county agent; Mrs. Waterson and Mrs. Keown, home economic teacher.

At the meeting Mrs. Myrtle Negy was elected chairman; Mrs. Keown, secretary, and Mrs. Phinizy, chairman of food preservation committee.

Another meeting will be held early in May, at which time food production will be considered.

War Unit Plan Is Dropped As Basis For Deferment

Editor's Note: This article was received by the local AAA office. It concerns the Selective Service system.

Selective Service officials have announced that the system of placing farm workers in deferred classifications on the basis of the number of farm war units they produce has been abandoned. Hereafter, local boards will use the Tydings Amendment to the Selective Service Act for determining agricultural deferments. Elimination of war units as a yardstick follows by a few weeks a Selective Service directive to local boards to use 16 as a minimum number of war units for granting deferments to any farm worker.

The Tydings amendment directs local boards to defer any registrant found to be "necessary to and regularly engaged in agricultural occupation or endeavor essential to the war effort," until a satisfactory replacement can be found. Final decision on granting any deferment is the responsibility of the local board.

Cooperation between County USDA War Boards and local Selective Service Boards will continue in the matter of deferring farm workers.

Control On Sale Of Typewriters Lifted

Easing of the War demand for typewriters has made it possible to remove all control on the sale and rental of a few new and all used typewriters, J. D. Doyle Settle, District rationing executive for the OPA has announced.

The order, effective, April 22, eliminated the need for a rationing certificate in these transactions. The relatively few new machines, in dealer's stocks are released, but manufacturers' inventories of new models are still controlled by WPB priorities.

RICH UNCLE

A young 4-F of my acquaintance works at a government - operated chemical laboratory in a distant state. He came home on leave a few months ago and scratched around considerably on his father's big farm collecting rocks. When he went back, he took the rocks with him, also notes on elevations and thicknesses of strata. He said he had always believed those shale glades might have value. Now he

would find out!

More recently he was at home again with a business-like glint in his eyes, mysteriously silent on the subject of his mineral samples. After his first home-cooked breakfast he went horsy and saddled a nag. Not pleasure; it was a business trip. He cantered directly to the home of his mother's uncle, the richest retired capitalist thereabout. When he took to horse again, he was a sadder but wiser young man of affairs.

HAD BAD NEWS

Apparently the young man's home acre are full of a good grade of valuable ore, near the surface and not costly to recover. He had visions of incorporating a new, local industry soon after the war, offering jobs to the whole county's discharged service men and unemployed war workers. All he needed was capital — that's what he thought. He even checked markets, demands, prices for years back and drew probable production and profit curves for his prospect.

"Uncle Jeff knows his business," the lad said woefully. "He said he had \$100,000 to put in such a venture if he could figure a way to come out whole. I showed him how we could gross \$100,000 easily the first year, but he got out tax sheets and showed me that \$100,000 return on an investment the same size is no good to him. The most he would be allowed to keep, along with his other income, is less than \$3,000."

This young man went to a lot of trouble to learn what economists have been shouting for two years. From his great uncle's point of view, a profit of \$100,000 a year was only 2.8 per cent return on a \$100,000 investment, thus:

Of course a \$3,000 annual income is \$60 a week, good pay for a stenographer or a truck driver, but that means salary; no investment and no risk of financial loss. When a man

put up the tenth part of a million dollars, or when ten men go together and invest a million, it is seldom in a sure thing. There are always risks.

MONEY PLAYS SAFE

Investors expect their money to work for them. For men of much wealth, \$100,000 earns only a small "salary." They are very careful therefore to put it in a safe place with little or no danger of loss—like municipal bonds, for example. That's the gravest prospect facing the United States at the close of the war: Danger of having service men come marching back victorious over various armies of various dictators, to find no work at home.

The American people need a lot of items, and will buy them. Manufacturers know how to make them, good enough for anybody at popular prices. Making these things can provide good jobs for millions of men, but will it happen? Well—there is one sure way to spoil the prospect, namely, keep the taxing system exactly like it is, so people who invest in industry can't benefit from it. Investments are essential to making jobs.

Research In A Pig's Eye

NEW YORK — At Duke university the periodic disorders of women are being placed in animals' eyes where they can be seen more clearly.

This technique of studying the progress of human ills is old, but the application is new. The work is projected at Duke university by Dr. J. E. Markee, in the school of medicine.

A bit of living tissue is transplanted to an animal's eye. It grows there independently and unchanged. It can be seen at all times.

Visible also are the effects of drugs, gland extracts and hormones upon this transplanted tissue. This sort of study answers

questions about what goes on during an illness.

This work is not, however, confined to diseased conditions. It is often just as important for a physician to know how healthy tissue reacts.

All this is strictly animal experimentation. The tissues used are those of animals.

Treat Peanut Seed For Better Yield

Peanuts in areas most suitable for growing them can be made into a cash crop if proper cultural methods are used, says E. A. Miller, agronomist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Texas farmers will have opportunity to verify this since they have been asked to plant 1,315,000 acres, or about one-fifth of the 1944 acreage in the nation.

A government support price of \$160 a ton for peanuts grading 70 per cent sound meats assures a marketing floor \$20 a ton higher than in 1943. But the producers' income will depend upon the increase they can obtain in the present average yield of 16 bushels an acre. Miller believes this can be done through inoculation, chemical treatment of seed and use of fertilizer in view of results at the Nacogdoches, Troup, Beeville and Angleton Experiment sub-station where yields ranging from 25 to 40 bushels an acre were had.

It is a good practice, he says, to inoculate peanut seed with bacterial culture obtainable at most seed dealers before planting in soil which is not inoculated. This insures nodules on roots of the plants for utilizing nitrogen from the air. Shelled peanuts should be handled carefully during inoculation because injury to the outer covering causes

the seed to rot readily after planting.

Chemical treatment of shelled seed produces better stands and yields, and for the purpose either two ounces of arsan or three ounces of two per cent ceresan or spergon per hundred pounds of seed may be used for inoculated soil. On land not inoculated the spergon treatment may be used prior to inoculating the seed, provided it is planted within four hours after inoculation. The five per cent ceresan should not be used as it may cause severe injury to seed.

The land should be prepared similar to that for corn or cotton by flat breaking, or in medium beds in areas subject to wind erosion. Enough shallow cultivation should be given to destroy weeds and gradually work the soil to the plants until they begin to bloom and set pegs. Young plants may be covered lightly at the first cultivation unless the land is very wet and the weather hot.

Prices On Fowls And Chickens To Rise Seasonally

Acting to get a better distribution of poultry throughout the year and to permit the surplus crop to be carried for distribution into the period of short supplies, the OPA through the Lubbock District Office has announced seasonal increase in prices for chicken and fowls.

These premiums, effective, April 21, will mean an average increase of two-thirds cents a pound in the prices paid by the ultimate consumer of poultry over a year. For 1944 this is an estimated increase of \$15,000,000. The increase was authorized by the Office of Economic Stabilization to encourage the production of live poultry during the short months and to encourage processors to store for these months.

Premiums are effective from April 21, 1944, through the balance of April, May and June of this year, and for January through June of next year. Schedule for January is one-half cent; February, one cent; March one and four-tenths cents; April, one and eight-tenths cents; May, two and two-tenths cents; and June, one cent.

Agents Get Report On Cause Of Hens Dying In County

Reports on the cultures grown from the chickens sent by the County Agent and the County Home Demonstration Agent to Dr. J. P. Dellaplane, Poultry Pathologist of the Veterinary Science Department of A. and M. College, have been received. Two of these hens died from reproductive disorders. The third died from Fowl Cholera. Fowl Cholera has been rare in Texas, according to Dr. W. A. Boney, Jr. Poultry Veterinarian of the Extension Service. However, there has been a report on two hens sent to the Globe Laboratories in Fort Worth, which showed that the hens died with Fowl Cholera. The seriousness of Cholera is shown by Dr. Dellaplane's statement in his letter to the agents: "Unfortunately, there are no drugs of any value in combating the Fowl Cholera infection. Therefore, if the losses are high such as you indicate they may be, it would be advisable for the flock owner to dispose of all the healthy birds and to kill and burn the others. After 3 or 4 weeks and following the complete disinfecting of buildings, fencing off or draining of marshy or wet areas, it will be safe to resume operations."

The County Agents believe that other disease among flocks are being called Cholera by flock owners. Some of these infections may respond to medical treatment. Good results have been reported by some owners who have used bluestone and vinegar according to these directions: 1 ounce bluestone to 1 pint vinegar. Use 1 tablespoon of this solution to a gallon of water. Give it 3 days and skip 3 or 4 before resuming treatment. Other owners are seemingly having fairly good results from the use of Cholera and Typhoid Vaccine. The following recommendation is being made by the agents: If you are having high losses in your flock, send 2 or 3 chickens to a laboratory for examination immediately. Then if you find that you have Cholera, Dr. Dellaplane's plan will probably save the owner in the long run. If however, there is no Cholera present, the other treatments may prove satisfactory.

Soybean, Peanut Crops Are Vital

Editor's Note: The following article was turned in by Charles Tarter, administrative officer of the local AAA office:

On the list of critically needed war materials are the oil crops, such as soybeans and peanuts, of which farmers are being asked to increase their 1943 acreage substantially. One particular reason for planting more oil crops this year is to take up the slack in lard and other animal fat production expected next year.

Both soybeans and peanuts are used as direct food and for cooking fats and oils, and the meal, is also used to make such protein-rich foods as flour, breakfast and infant foods, macaroni, and crackers.

A small quantity of peanut oil goes to the textile and drying industries, and soybean oil is used industrially—to fill only military orders—for soap; glycerine for explosives; plastics for helmets and pistol grips; glue for plywood, paints, varnish, linoleum, medicines, and printing ink.

WFA recently raised the support prices for both soybeans and peanuts.
