## 8,000-Footer Set For Virginia Area

Union Producing Co. has scheduled another wildcat in the Aransas County area 11 miles north of Lamar at the No. 6 Virginia Tattou.

This new venture, contracted to 8,000 feet, is 1,575 feet from the west line, 2,269 feet from the north line of John Durst Survey, A-5, 1,500 feet northwest of the No. 5, drilling below 10,500 feet at last report, and 7,750 feet northwest of the No. 2 Tatton, Virginia Field oil well. Location also is about 1,500 feet west of State Highway 35.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 18 St. Charles Ranch Co., contract depth 8,800 feet, is a new test for the St. Charles Field of Aransas County. This test is 500 feet from the south line and 3,880 feet from the east line of Sumpter Turner Survey, A-210 and 5,100 feet north-east of the No. 10. Elevation is estimated at 10 feet.

Union Production Co. No. 5 Virginia Tattou, wildcat four miles north of Lamar, was drilling at 10,334 feet on a projected 12,000-foot test.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 07, wildcat in Aransas Bay one and a half miles southeast of Lamar, was coring at 7,702 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 8 Copano State 76, in the Salt Lake Field, drilled July to 9,822 feet, ran gamma ray and neutron log, and is now preparing to perforate at 9,799 to 9,821 feet for a test for gas.

Phillips Petroleum Co. has made location for its No. 22 State Tract 06, in the new West Fulton Beach Field, Copano Bay. Location is 1,420 feet west of the No. 17, 1,890 feet southwest of the No. 13 and 1,980 feet from the north line and 960 feet from the west line of the tract. Contract depth is 8,000 feet. Offset acreage is held by Phillips and by Sun Oil Co. which has the southwest, southeast and south acreage.

### Presbytery of Western Texas Met In Victoria

The Presbytery of Western Texas met in observance of their centennial in Victoria, on Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 23 and 24. Dr. A. M. McCurdy, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Goliad, gave the historical address on Tuesday afternoon.

Rev. T. H. Pollard, Jack Davis and J. F. Brundrett of Rockport, attended all the meetings.

A rare event in the Presbytery was the election of a ruling elder as moderator. Wiley Cochran of the Alamo Heights Church in San Antonio, was elected.

The next meeting of Presbytery will be held in Weslaco in January, 1952.

### Spencer Sues Stanolind Over Fire Loss

Emory M. Spencer yesterday filed a \$25,000 suit in federal district court against the Stanolind Oil and Gas Co., claiming a firm employe caused a 300-acre grass fire which damaged some of his property.

The suit alleges a Stanolind employe on Oct. 18, 1950 was negligent in allowing a fire in refuse oil to get out of control.

The fire was on Live Oak Peninsula, just north of Rockport.

The fire "burned over 300 acres, destroying grass, shrubs, and fine trees," Spencer alleges in the suit, and forced the plaintiff to drop plans to develop the "area for a residence subdivision."

### Aransas Gas Use By Carbon Black Plant Approved

Austin, Texas. — Utilization of gases produced in the Fulton Beach, West Fulton Beach, Copano Bay and Salt Lake Fields in Aransas County without prior extraction of the hydrocarbon content of the gases was authorized for the United Carbon Co., Inc., today. The gas will be used at the carbon plant between Rockport and Aransas Pass.

The Railroad Commission order said a hearing showed the attempted extraction of the natural gasoline content from the gases would be unprofitable. The commission has authority to permit use of the gases without the extraction when an unprofitable operation is shown.

### Most Business Men Now Covered By Social Security

The coverage of self-employed persons under the Social Security Act is not option, says H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"With a few exceptions, anyone in business for himself who has net earnings of \$400 or more a year beginning 1951 is covered by the law," he said. "Excepted are farm and ranch operators and the following professional men who work for themselves: Doctors, lawyers, public accountants, undertakers, and professional engineers."

Among those who are covered by the law are the individual owners or partners of stores, shops, filling stations, garages, barber shops, hotels, cafes, tourist camps, boarding houses, publishers and contractors.

Owners of their own trade or business must report their net income up to \$3,600 a year for social security purposes on their income tax returns before March 16. The social security tax is 2 1/4%, and will be paid to the Collector of Internal Revenue at the same time, according to Cleveland.

Self-employed persons now have the same rights to retirement and family insurance protection for themselves and their families as employees have.

Cleveland pointed out that the old age and survivors insurance is not intended to encourage retirement, but is intended to insure against the loss of earned income in older years or death.

Old age and survivors insurance benefits are suspended for a beneficiary who works for wages of more than \$50.00 a month or who has net earnings from self employment averaging more than \$50.00 a month before age 75.

Since a social security account number will be needed, those who are now covered for the first time should apply for a social security card if they have not already done so. Those who have previously had a number but have lost it, should secure a duplicate card.

Additional information concerning the provisions of the law can be secured from the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

## Three Killed In Monday Wreck

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Richardson Jr. and their son Edward, of Bloomington, and a nephew, Ricky Richardson, of Corpus Christi, were traveling north on Highway 35 Monday morning about 1:30, when the automobile in which they were riding, ran headon into one of the Colter Corporation fish trucks.

When Sheriff Arley Shivers and others arrived on the scene, Mrs. Richardson and son Ricky, were on the ground (apparently thrown from the car by the impact). Mr. Richardson died before he reached the hospital and Ricky died about 9:00 a. m. Monday. Mrs. Richardson lived until early Tuesday morning. The son, Edward, is slightly improved.

Thomas Martinez, driver of the truck, received scratches and bruises, but no serious wounds. The car the Richardsons were riding in was completely demolished.

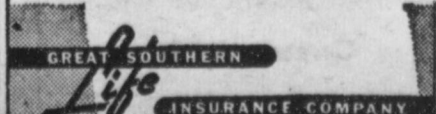

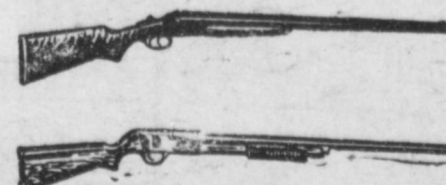

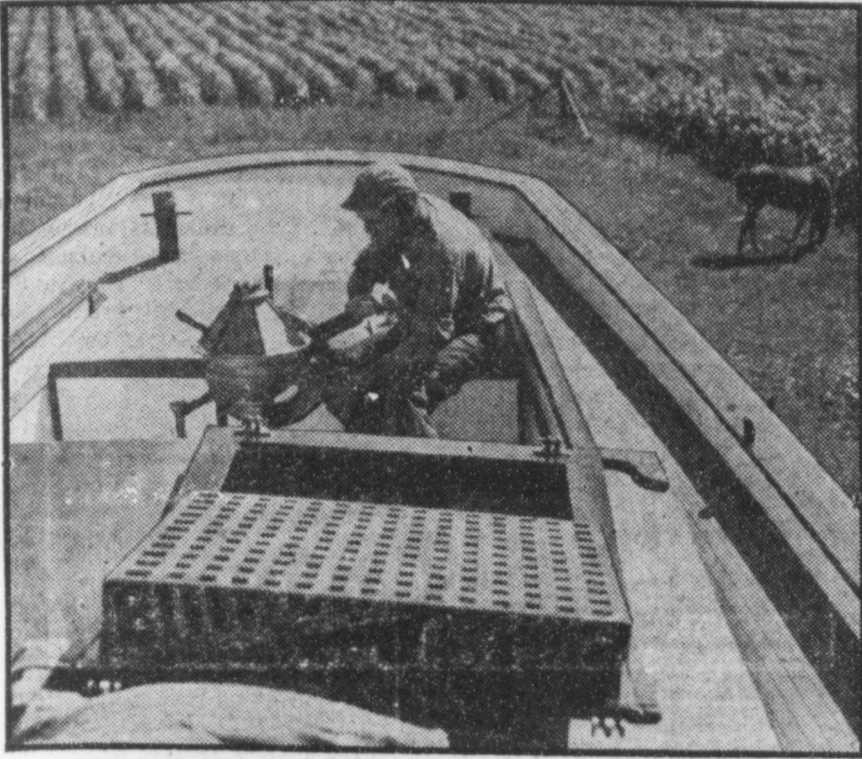
