## Kitty's Korner

The world, our nation and society has gone through many ages, eras, and phases. Usually these periods are named by historians many years after the age has past, so we can only guess what name will be given to the age in which we are now living.

"The Age of Madness," or "The Insanity Era" would certainly be appropriate, although I am well aware that I will not be around to make suggestions, and, believe me, most thankful.

This subject came to my mind as I thumbed through my Time magazine last week and turned to the section on "Education." It seems that an assistant professor at Yale was suspended for a year for "blatant disregard of ethics" when it was discovered that while teaching courses on revolution and black liberation at Yale, he was also lending his services to the Social Welfare School of the New York State University at Stony Brook. Without telling either university about his job with the other, he began making four weekly trips between New Haven and Stony Brook. He taught his two regular courses at Yale on Fridays, Saturdays and Tuesday nights, and taught at Stony Brook the rest of the week, according to the article.

The 6-ft., 4-in. black from Trinidad with a towering Afro hairdo and a penchant for blue jeans was found out. Stony Brook asked for and received his resignation. Yale demanded his resignation, but when he refused, he was suspended for a year.

I can halfway understand the uproar over a teacher holding down two fulltime jobs at once. However, the madness is the fact that the avowed Marxist was hired in the first place to teach the overthrow of the system that made Yale a great university.

It is sheer madness and nothing short of insanity to introduce courses on revolution in our universities. What can a student do with this knowledge except put it into practice?

Where else and in what other age does an American President travel half way around the world to bow and scrape to mass murderers such as Mao Tse-tung and Chou En-lai, who have by estimate killed 64 million Chinese people since their take-over of mainland China? This is not madness? Even more insane is the elation of the American people over the junket. That is, of course, provided the polls can be trusted. I personally have not talked to anyone who thought that anything was accomplished for the good of America.

And look at defense? Is it not madness to allow our navy to run down, cut down on development of new weapons, speak of complete disarmament when every little nation in the world is arming to the teeth while thumbing their noses at us, the most powerful country in the world? It took Israel six days to soundly whip the United Arab Republic, and India around two weeks to free East Pakistan, now Bangladesh, from its oppressors in West Pakistan. Yet we, the most powerful nation in the world (I wonder), have been fighting in the tiny country of Vietnam for well over ten years and have lost much more than we have won. Is this sanity?

Only last week Senate investigators took a dim view of a purported statement by the President to his Attorney General in which he was to have said "make a reasonable settlement," in relation to the ITT anti-trust suit. You would think the President would always instruct his Attorney General to make reasonable settlements at all times, but even the White House denied the statement. You see it's not feasible to

## Three New Drill Sites Announced For Crockett Co.

Southland Royalty Co., Fort Worth, will drill a 7,000-foot wildcat in Crockett County, six miles northeast of Sheffield, six miles northeast of the Sheffield townsite (Pennsylvanian gas and Connell and Devonian oil) field, 4 1/2 miles west of the Lancaster Hill (Strawn gas) field, 1 1/2 miles southwest of shallow oil production in the Clara Couch field and 2-5/8 miles southeast of shallow oil production in the Half field. It is the No. 1 Meadows.

Location, on a 793-acre lease, is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of 43-GG-HE&WT.

Texaco, Inc. will drill the No. 1-A J. L. Henderson Jr. an 8,200-foot lower Canyon test, 2-3/4 miles east of dual lower Canyon and Strawn production in the DePaul field of Crockett County, 11 miles southeast of Ozona.

Location is 467 feet from the south and east lines of 1-F-GG&SFL Abst. 3203.

## Preliminary Nursing Home Plans Examined; Federal Aid Doubtful

In its regular meeting Monday, the Crockett County Commissioners Court received a preliminary floor plan for a nursing home from an Austin architect. Besides members of the court, several members

of the hospital board were on hand for the discussion.

Architect John Chiles Allen of Austin presented the preliminary plan and discussed it at length with members of the court and board. Proposed al-

terations and renovations in the existing hospital were also discussed.

A pessimistic note crept into the discussions when Allen told the group that Hill-Burton funds for the county were doubtful due to the big demand for the funds in the area. He said that he had made preliminary contact with the State Director of Hill-Burton Funds and that Crockett County is grouped with Sutton, Schleicher and Val Verde counties, where there is a surplus of nursing home facilities which are not filled to capacity.

Hill-Burton plans are set aside for the states to assist in building medical facilities where there is a need. It is a federal project administered by the states and individual counties or municipalities must assume one-half the cost and have it assured before applying for the aid. Local officials and nursing home planners had counted heavily on the funds during the preliminary planning of the nursing home wing.

The court, after hours of deliberation and discussion, authorized the architect to bring the revised plans to the next scheduled meeting of the court which is April 10.

Plans now are for the architect to work with the hospital administrator, the hospital board and the Commissioners Court in developing the new plans. Tentative plans include ten semi-private rooms for bed-fast patients and ten private rooms for ambulatory patients. A new kitchen, dining area, adequate for the present hospital as well as the nursing home is also included in the plans. As plans stand now, the new facility will be joined to the north end of the present hospital.

As far as other business was concerned, the meeting was uneventful. Routine monthly reports were submitted and approved.

Residents along Hwy 163 north are still sleeping lightly.

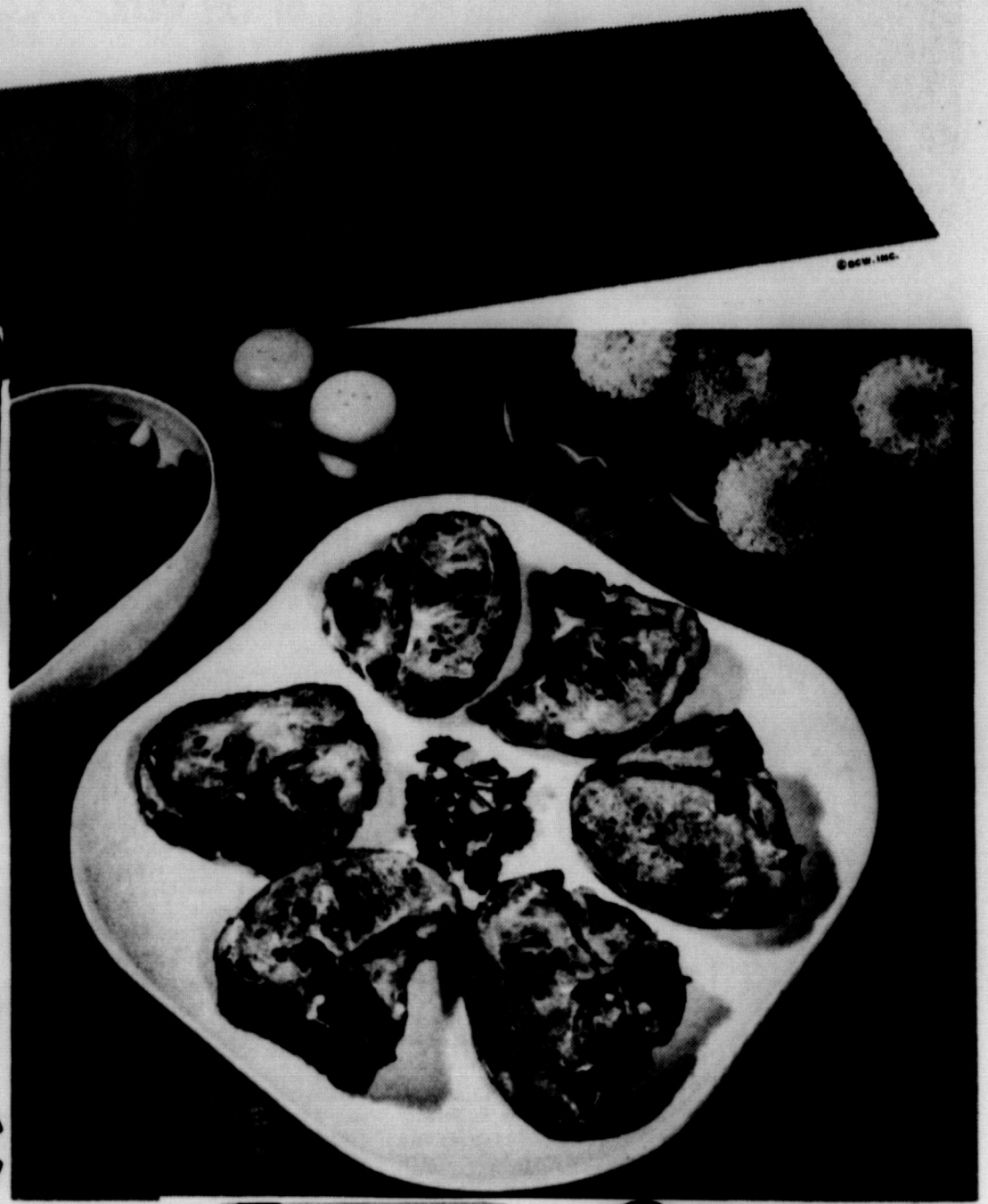
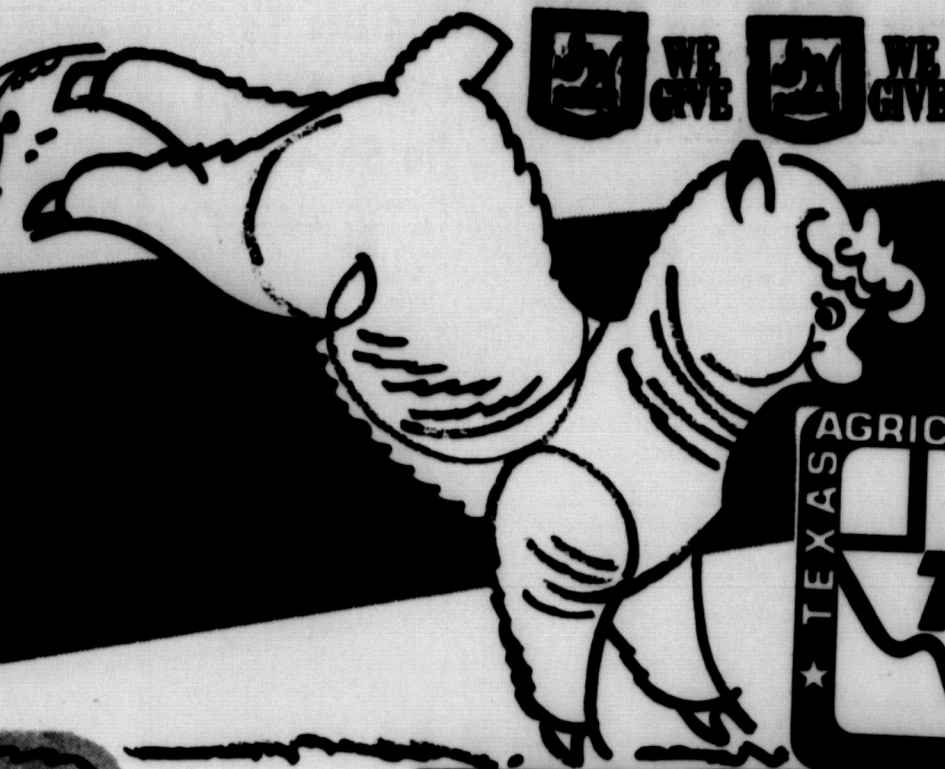

### Tips For Gardeners

From the  
Ozona Garden Club  
By  
Mrs. Bailey Post

March is the strategic time for laying the foundations for summer gardens. Take advantage of every favorable opportunity the weather affords. All established lawn grasses should be cut closely as possible now and all debris and grass clippings removed. Make an application of pre-emergence weed killer if crab grass has been a problem in your lawn. Check with a garden supply dealer to be sure you purchase the correct chemical for your particular type of lawn grass. After mowing, apply a complete fertilizer at the rate of 20 lbs. per 1,000 square feet of lawn area.

If you are planning to plant tender new plants outside, be careful to have coverage if a freeze is forecast. It might be wise to wait until Good Friday, March 31, or after Easter.

Next month will be clean-up time for Ozona. Start grooming your home grounds, and nearby unsightly areas, if everyone will enter into this project with 100% participation, our city will sparkle for the spring season. Some have tackled the tall dead weeds which are a fire hazard and a place for insects to breed. The date of the county truck pick-up will be announced at a later time. To begin your clean-up now will assure a more thorough job than if you wait until the last week.

If you intend to have glads, cannas, caladiums, elephant ears and others this summer, you will find these available now, but don't plant caladiums until the soil gets warmer in April.

For a low border plant, there is a new dwarf nandina which makes a beautiful small mounding shrub. Foliage is bright green in summer and intense scarlet coloring in cool weather. It can be used in patio planters or as accent plants as well.

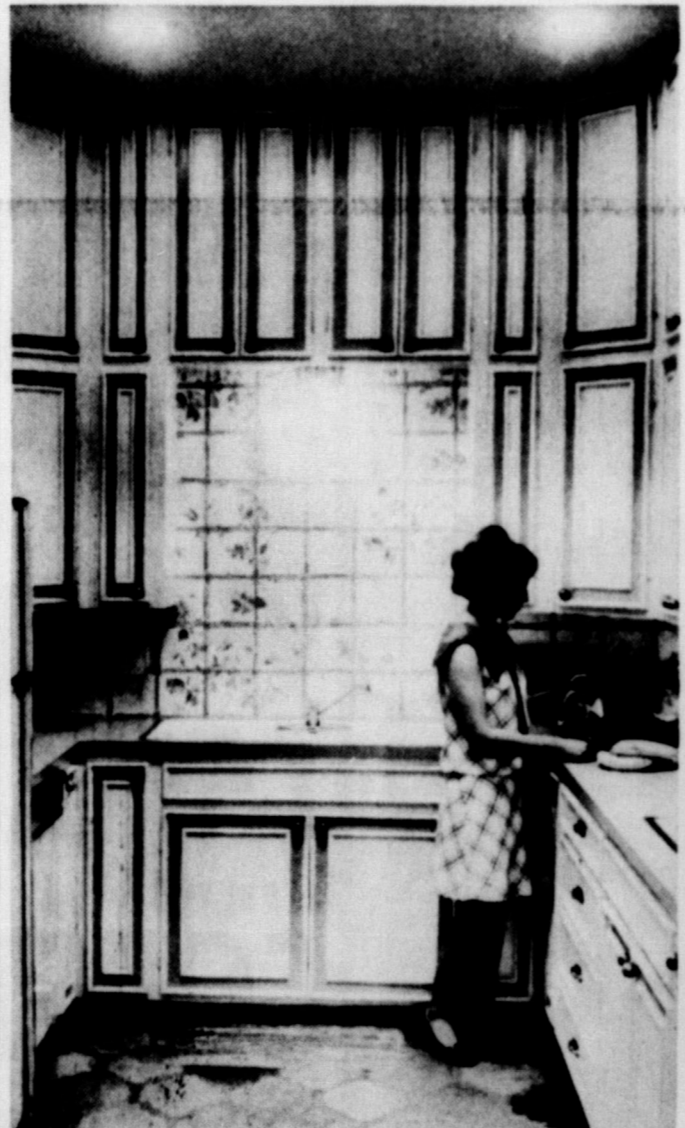

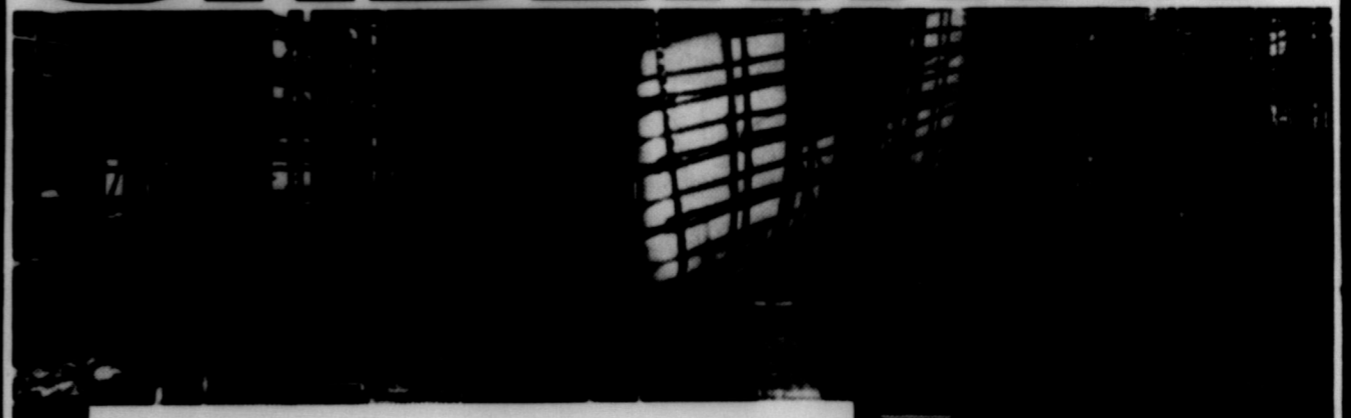
