GRACE CRASHES ON HOP OFF TO WESTERN COAST

MOVIE STUNT AVIATOR AND PUP UNINJURED IN HAWAII

PLANE IS WRECKED

LIGHT MAY NOW HAVE TO BE ABANDONED, IS BELIEF

(By Associated Press) HAWAII, July 4. — The stunt flier of the movies, Richard Grace of Hollywood, California, crashed here today shortly after leaving taken off for the California mainland. Grace and the dog were unhurt, but the plane was so badly damaged that the trans-Pacific flight of more than 4,000 miles may be abandoned.

Grace made a good take-off at 8 a. m. from the rough and rocky landing runway. He had previously practiced a series of stunts in the air, and the plane was in perfect condition when it left.

Accident is Witnessed. A number of witnesses were present when the crash occurred. The plane was seen to lose control and to crash into the water.

Grace returned heartbroken to his home in Hollywood. He had been hoping to make a record-breaking flight across the Pacific.

His mechanic, Fred D. Brown, was also injured. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

Death Calls Editor From Fame's Hall

HOUSTON, July 4. (AP)—Colonel George M. Bailey, one of the outstanding old-school newspaper editors of the Southwest, died here shortly after 11 p. m. Monday.

The courage he had given for nearly half a century to his newspaper work had carried him through an extended illness which slowly sapped his strength and had forced him to alter and alter his plans of recent months.

Three months ago, when he was chosen one of 50 outstanding American editors to make a tour of Europe, studying its political, financial and sociological aspects for a Carnegie foundation, he was given an elaborate testimonial banquet here, attended by scores of influential persons.

THREE HURT IN CRASH

Auto Accident Near Denton May Be Fatal For Woman; Two Compensated Hurt

DENTON, July 4. (AP)—Mrs. Will Morrison, Wichita Falls, was seriously injured, and her two companions, Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Morrison, were injured less seriously, when their automobile crashed into a tree near Denton, Texas, today.

The accident occurred on a curve five miles north of this city.

Mrs. Morrison was taken to Fort Worth in an ambulance. Although the extent of her injuries had not been ascertained, she was believed to be in a critical condition.

Mrs. Morrison suffered a broken hip and ribs, while Mr. Morrison was only slightly injured.

THREE DEAD AND FOUR DYING AS RESULT OF HOLIDAY

ONE CHILD BURNED

FIREWORKS GIVE WAY TO AUTOS AND GUNS OVER FOURTH

Three dead, four dying or near death, and 14 injured was the toll of Independence day celebrations throughout Texas Monday.

As an instrument of death the once feared and now nearly taboo cannon cracker Monday was replaced by the automobile, railroad train and revolver, for a check up shows that not a single death or injury was attributed to fireworks.

There was only one casualty from fire and that was a child who was seriously burned while playing with a bonfire.

Two were killed in automobile crashes, a third met death from gunshot wounds, 14 others were injured in automobile accidents and another was injured in a motorcycle accident.

WELLINGTON MAN SLAIN BY NEGRO

NEGRO TENANT TAKEN TO JAIL AS FEAR OF MOB VIOLENCE IS FELT

(By Associated Press) WELLINGTON, Tex., July 4. — Earl Elliott, residing on a farm about 10 miles from Wellington, was fatally shot early Monday by a negro tenant from whom he attempted to collect a debt.

A negro suspect was arrested and spirited away to another town for fear of mob violence.

Elliott was taken to a Wellington hospital where he died within an hour after arrival. He was survived by his parents, who live near Elk City, Okla., and Murrell Elliott, a brother of Elliott.

Another Hero—Here-to-Fore Unsung Airman Still Saving Flood Victims

(By Associated Press) NEW ORLEANS, July 4. — The tales of the air have won the applause of the nation. The Lindberghs, Chamberlains, Byrds, Maitlands and the rest have dared great and achieved greatness. They have brought new honors to American aviation.

But now it is time to talk about another American aviator; an aviator who dared greatly too, and risked all that a man can risk—his life—but who did it in obscurity, without the blare of trumpets, steering not glory but the safety and comfort of others.

This man is Major Gordon McCoy, of the U. S. Army air service. For two months he has been saving lives in the flooded regions of Louisiana, flying all day long, week after week, spending his own money, without sleep, risking death in various forms, doing it quietly and with a calmness that makes a record that the people of the valley will not soon forget.

Volunteered for Service. Major McCoy was stationed at Memphis, Tenn., as instructor in the Tennessee national guard, when the flood came. He volunteered for service, took his army plane and was assigned to rescue work in the lower valley.

No one knows just how many lives he has saved. Daily he flies far over the flooded valleys, circling like a hawk over inundated farm lands and pastures. For below he would see a group of people clinging to a raft in the midst of the swirling waters. Down he would swoop, hovering beside them. A wave of his hand would give them a message of encouragement; then he would shoot aloft again, rising high so he could signal a distant coast guard boat to come and rescue the marooned people.

Rescued the most dangerous of the valley, came you, Dailey, landing on Bayou Boeur. He saw a hand on the roof of a house, dropped down and landed in the water alongside.

"Here, honey," cried the negro. "The men, glad to see you and the boat will not be able to say anything more."

Major McCoy entered the house. He found 25 white people lying in their stuffy, damp attic. A short examination showed him the trouble.

ANGELO LAD IS KILLED DURING ABILENE RACES

CLYDE COATS, 22, DIES AS HIS CAR CRASHES THROUGH RAIL

WIFE IN AUDIENCE

PARENTS AND KIDDIES ALSO SEE ACCIDENT ON DIRT TRACK

(By Associated Press) ABILENE, Tex., July 4. — Clyde E. Coats, 22, of San Angelo, died at 5:20 o'clock this evening from injuries received when his car crashed through the inside rail in a race on the West Texas Fair Association's Annual Independence day program here this afternoon.

In addition to a fractured leg he received injuries to the lungs which brought death. Coats was driving in the fifth lap of a five mile race, the third event of the day, when he lost control of his Ford Ford on the east turn, headed into a hub rail post and overturned. It was the second race he had ever entered. He is survived by his young wife and two small children, who, with his parents, witnessed the accident.

ALL PARIS FETES AMERICAN AIRMEN

CHAMBERLIN-BYRD AVIATORS HONORED AS L. BLERIOT PLAYS HOST

(By Associated Press) PARIS, July 4. — The six Americans who followed the air trail which Lindbergh traced across the Atlantic were honored together in Paris today on the anniversary of America's birth as a nation. Together the men who came over in the Columbia and America broke bread with Louis Blériot, the Frenchman, whose flight across the English channel 18 years ago first linked through the air, nations separated by the sea.

The airmen attended in a group ceremonies this afternoon in a group honor at the home of Le Marin, whose columns are ever friendly to the United States. Tonight the crews of the two trans-Atlantic airplanes were guests of the American chamber of commerce of Paris, at its annual Fourth of July banquet.

The lion's share of the honors were heaped on Commander Byrd, he was by far the highest man of the six. But if the French thought of him more than they thought of the others, it can be said that he was unusually thoughtful of them.

FLOOD IN SOUTH TEXAS

Valley Families Forced To Flee From Waters As Rio Grande Rises Over Bank Near Marlin

RAYMONDVILLE, Tex., July 4. (AP)—A number of families were forced to flee westward in water from their homes here Monday when flood waters of the Rio Grande crossed the Raymondville-Harlingen highway and quickly spread to a mile in width.

The highway between Sebastian and Lyford was closed to automobiles and bus traffic and indications are that it will be closed for ten days or two weeks.

Sacks of sand have been thrown up as ballast for the railroad tracks. It is believed the temporary ballast will hold. The underbreak of high ground is filled with rabbits and other animals.

MAN, WIFE AND TWO BABES ARE FOUND IN HOME

MISSING NEGRO HANDS SUSPECTED; FAMILY CAR MISSING

HUSBAND IS SHOT

(By Associated Press) ALANREED, Tex., July 4. — The bodies of Frank Weatherby, his wife and two young children were found today in their home, three and a half miles south of here in Donley county, by neighbors who had become uneasy at not seeing any members of the family.

The bodies were badly decomposed. Weatherby had been shot in the head in a bedroom. In another bedroom was the body of Mrs. Weatherby, apparently dead, and the bodies of the two children, fully dressed. A mattress had been thrown over the bodies of these three. The little girl was six years old and the boy four.

Struggle is Evident

Underneath the bodies of Mrs. Weatherby and the children a crowbar and hammer were found. The room bore evidence of a struggle.

Officers from Clarendon, county seat of Donley county, went to the scene at once, and are investigating. None of the neighbors recall seeing any members of the Weatherby family since Friday, June 24. On that day Mrs. E. Lee Crisp, a neighbor, went to the Weatherby home to get Mrs. Weatherby to go with her to visit another neighbor who had just become a mother. At the Weatherby home she met some negroes who had worked on the place, and these told her that Mrs. Weatherby had been taken there and that Mr. Weatherby had taken her to a hospital at Wellington.

Negroes Disappear

The negroes who disappeared. An automobile purchased by Mr. Weatherby a few weeks ago is also missing.

The bodies were found about 3 o'clock this afternoon, when neighbors went to the Weatherby home. The condition of the bodies was such that recognition was difficult and the exact cause of the death of the mother and children has not been determined. Blood was found on the floor and on the walls. Weatherby's body was found lying face down. The weapon with which he was shot was in evidence.

An inquest was held by a Donley county justice of peace this afternoon, the verdict being that the four came to their deaths at the hands of parties unknown.

Jackrabbit Tough, It Ruins Thresher

(Special To The Avalanche) PLAINVIEW, July 4. — A jackrabbit tore up and wrecked a combine harvester and thresher at Will Hammond, Plainview farmer, on his place ten miles northwest of Plainview, Thursday afternoon.

Hammond was running his combine in his wheat field when he picked up the jackrabbit, ran it through the combine's rollers and into the thresher part of the machine where the rabbit was killed. Hammond said that he has never found anything that will harm wheat so rapidly as a combine, but that he did not know before a combine was faster than a Plainview.

Prison Rules Hold Willing Rescuers In Check As Three Canoeists Are Drowned Sing Sing Convicts Weep Before Guards' Rifles, Begging For Chance To Help

ORRINING, N. Y., July 4. (AP)—Prison rules today held dozens of willing rescuers in check as three canoeists drowned in the Hudson near Sing Sing's east wall. The canoeists, whose identity was not known and whose bodies have not been recovered, were thrown into the river when their canoe, pulled by a Sing Sing convict, sank. Sing Sing's 1,200 prisoners watched the three men struggle to save themselves. Some wept, and others begged guards to allow them to leap over the fence that protects the dock. The guards, however, covered the men with rifles and threatened to shoot any man who went to the assistance of the drowning men.

The wind had blown the canoe near the wharf, and one man was reported to have drowned about 15 feet from it. The tragedy upset the prisoners and some of them refused to eat. An Independence Day dinner served later. Warden Lawson said that previous faithfulness of prisoners had attracted the guards, who feared prisoners permitted to aid the drowning men might attempt to escape.

LIBERTY

Yesterday we celebrated the Glorious Fourth. In Lubbock no demonstration was seen. Some people thought enough of celebrating the day to hang out a flag of the nation. Some of the younger ones celebrated by the liberal use of fire crackers. Others paid only a silent tribute by giving thanks to the Allwise ruler, for the blessings that have been the nation's in the past, and for the wonderful prospects that stand out prominently before us.

Only in broken gleams and partial light has the sun of Liberty yet beamed among men, yet all progress hath she called forth.

Liberty came to a race crouching under Egyptian whips, and led them forth from the House of Bondage. She hardened them in the desert and made of them a race of conquerors.

The free spirit of the Mosaic law took their thinkers up to heights where they beheld the unity of God, and inspired their poets with strains that yet phase the highest exaltations of thought.

Liberty dawned on the Phoenician coast and ships passed the Pillars of Hercules to plow the unknown sea.

She broke in partial light on Greece, and marble grew to shapes of ideal beauty, words became the instruments of subtlety thought, and against the scanty militia of all free cities the countless hosts of the Great King broke like surges against a rock. She cast her beams on the four-acre farms of Italian husbandmen, and born of her strength a power came forth that conquered the world! She glinted! She glinted from shields of German warriors, and August wept his legions. Out of the night that followed her eclipse, her slanting rays fell again on free cities, and a lost learning revived, modern civilization began, a new world was unveiled; and as Liberty grew so grew art, wealth, power, knowledge and refinement.

In the history of every nation we may read the same truth. It was the strength born of Magna Charta that won Crecey and Agincourt. It was the revival of Liberty from the despotism of the Tudors that glorified the Elizabethan age. It was the spirit that brought a crowned tyrant to the block that planted here the seed of a mighty tree. It was the energy of ancient freedom; that, the moment it had gained unity, made Spain the mightiest power of the world, only to fall to the lowest depths of weakness when tyranny succeeded liberty.

See, in France, all intellectual vigor dying under the tyranny of the seventeenth century to revive in splendor as Liberty awoke in the eighteenth, and on the enfranchisement of the French peasants in the great revolution, basing the wonderful strength that has in our time laughed at despotism.

What Liberty shall do for the nation that fully accepts and loyally cherishes her, the wondrous inventions, which are the marked features of this country; give us but a hint.

A hundred years have passed since the last friend of American liberty—the great Earl Chatham—rose to make his last appeal for the conservation, on the basis of justice, of that English-speaking empire, in which he saw the grandest possibility of the future. Is it too soon to hope that the future may hold the realization of his vision in a nobler form than even he imagined, and that it may be the mission of this republic to unite all the nations of English speech, whether they grow beneath the Northern Star or Southern Cross, in a league which by insuring justice, promoting peace, and liberating commerce, will be the forerunner of a world-wide federation that will make war the possibility of a past age, and turn to works of usefulness the enormous forces now dedicated to destruction. Is this the dream of dreamers? One brought to the world the message that it might be reality, but they crucified him between two thieves. Not till the world can accept that message can it have peace. Look over the

past. What it it but a record of woes, inflicted on man, by man, of wrong producing wrong, and crime, fresh crime. This will ever be true till justice is acknowledged and liberty is law. Who is Liberty that we could doubt her? That we should set bounds to her, and say, "Thus far and no farther!" Is Liberty not peace? Is Liberty not prosperity? Is Liberty not progress? Is she not the goal toward which all progress is striving?

BUREAUCRACY

The question of the Government being in business against the private interests of the country has occupied the attention of the big thinkers of the country for some time, and there is a difference of views in this matter just the same as there is in every other great question. Recently Merrie Thorpe, one of the nation's well-informed writers, in an article in Nations Business says that Bureaucracy is a dead hand on industrial endeavor. It batters on the moor of stupidity, political favoritism, economic fallacy. When Government enters the field of business, all real incentive to serve the public gives way to red tape, to political skulduggery, and to mediocre performance. Consider the example of the Government's experiment in shipping. The people, through Congress, ordered the disposal of the ships; today after seven years and the expenditure of \$226,000,000 in operating expenses, we hear proposals of a rebuilding program and an issue of merchant marine bonds. Ask any shipping man about the Government's operation of ships, and he will tell you unbelievable tales of waste and petty politics. But he will caution you not to quote him. Why? "The Shipping Board," he will say, "has the power to ruin me."

Bureaucracy in fine flower! Congress nodded when it set up a plan to sell ships and to operate them while selling. It ignored the desire to remain in office—a human trait—together with another natural human desire to build and grow. That spelled the answer seven years ago. What individual can operate ships with the Government and its long purse as a competitor? Unfair and unintelligent competition—and the fear of it will paralyze any real development of a privately operated merchant marine. But more important than deficits and the postponing of a real merchant marine is the attack on an American institution which has made this country great—individualism. Too many readers will stop right here and say, "Let the private shippers fight it out." What short-sightedness! The government operation of ships reaches out and touches every man. It strikes at his right to receive from his Government a promise of fair play in the opportunity to find reward for his energy, imagination, and initiative. These words will doubtless bring the usual rebuttal from the Bureaucracy: "It's foreign ship propaganda." "Would you have the glorious Stars and Stripes of John Paul Jones wiped off the seven seas forever?"

It is not alone that the personnel has failed. Quite likely Judge Gary or Willard, or Schwab, or Ford, could have done better. For our Government, as constituted, cannot operate a business. It wasn't built that way. It was designed to do a different thing—to protect the political liberty of the individual. We forget that our forefathers who created the greatest form of government of all times did not design that political mechanism to operate business enterprises. The checks and balances, designed to protect political liberty, by their very nature prevent efficient operation of business projects. As Herbert Hoover puts it, "The Government lacks rapidity of decision." There must be debate, even red tape. Business must make quick decision. We make a mistake to call upon this political mechanism to operate ships. The machinery creaks. It breaks down.

There are students of history who hold that the danger to democracy always lies in saddling the political mechanism with more and more industrial and social tasks. Government in the shipping business is more than ships on the sea. It is a challenge to the best thought and action of America. The way out is not easy. But American business must find an answer and it is not government ownership.

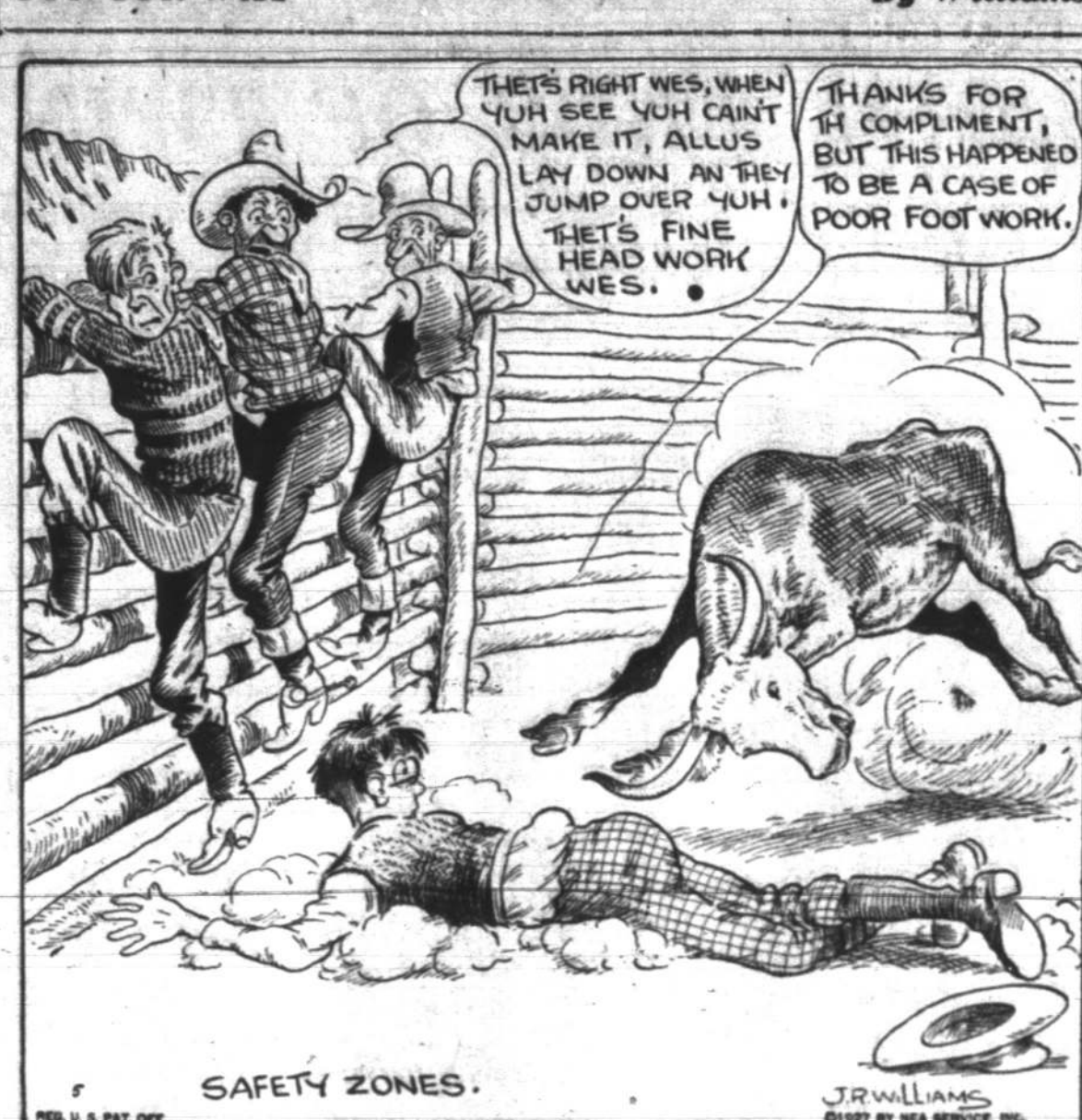

W. C. T. U. Fights Wets

Prohibition will never be removed from the statute books of the United States by the present tactics of the wet associations and wet politicians.

The dry side of the argument has its strength in the economic value of the improved conditions, while the wet side seems to concern itself mainly with the "personal liberty" plea and breaking down the law.

Workman's Efficiency Increased We have testimony from the best economists that the productivity of the American workman has increased enormously under prohibition. The lack of alcohol in his daily diet has increased the individual output of the workman of the leading industries 34 per cent in the past five years.

I don't mean that the value of his product has been increased. I mean that the actual amount of goods made has increased 34 per cent. These figures are from the heart of the report made to the British government recently by an official commission which was in this country several months getting at the facts on prohibition.

Prohibition may be a joke to some people, but it is no joke to the British manufacturer whose workmen are unable to compete against dry Americans.

Wet information now being promulgated arises from investigation made in wet territory only. It is certainly of no great importance to broadcast wet figures based on New York or Chicago studies, for those two big towns will be wet for years to come. But it is of real interest to study the questionnaire of Professor Feldman of Dartmouth College, whose letters to and from the mayors of the middle sized towns of the country show a large majority of city heads strongly in favor of prohibition because of the social and industrial benefits.

Studies of the business men and manufacturers, over a wide area show that the average American man does not want a modification of the Volstead Act. This statement is made in the face of the contrary testimony of a little handful of New York business men.

Those names are used over and over again by the Association. Against the Prohibition Amendment. As far as I know there has not been the addition of a single name of prominence to the list of business men who ally themselves

openly with that association.

W. C. T. U. Gains 100,000 a Year In outlawing the liquor traffic, America dealt the strongest legal blow against the greatest deterrent to complete prosperity. Now that liquor is outlawed, it is at a disadvantage, and the W. C. T. U., opposed to liquor, legal or illegal, is increasing its membership 100,000 a year simply because the women of America will never permit the saloon to return in any guise. The wets, however, say they, too, are opposed to the saloon. But the very nature of the liquor business makes it impossible to keep down the saloon.

The uncontrollable government control now in experimental stage in Canada is having trouble with the saloon even in those provinces where saloons are particularly outlawed. The Canadian theory of doing all the drinking at home with the wives and children around to see the husband fade into drunkenness, does not take so well, after all. Women don't want liquor at home, and therefore the Canadian boys all be out carry at the government dispensary and goes to a so-called "club" where he meets other drinkers and the old story of the saloon is being repeated.

Prohibition Good Business The W. C. T. U. is fifty-four years old and has met the liquor question in every phase. Since we started our fight on liquor the wets have proposed low license, high license, local option, state control, city ordinance and every other form of control—none of which has been successful.

We have never tried government control and I am sure this country will never let the government go into the liquor business. Nor are the reactionary wets in earnest about that proposition. They want the government to keep out of other business—why do they advocate government ownership of the liquor business?

We believe our experience shows that we are right in our principle that "prohibition is the best method of dealing with the liquor traffic."

It is not uniformly enforced, and there are many American citizens who are working to nullify what has been done. Prohibition is only seven years old and too much cannot be expected in that time.

Inasmuch as prohibition is a conceded fact as soon as possible, we will be content to stand on the economics of the situation as opposed to the "personal liberty" plea of the wets.

COLONEL IS SUICIDE

William P. Stone, 66, Retired, jumps in Ocean From Promenade Deck of Liner

NEW YORK, July 4. (AP)—Colonel William P. Stone, 66, U. S. A. retired, committed suicide by jumping into the sea from the promenade deck of the Cunard liner, Tusconia. It was learned today when the ship docked here.

The colonel boarded the ship at

Cherbourg and was bringing to this country the body of his wife, who died of heart disease in Paris a month ago. Yesterday morning he settled petty accounts with the ship's stewards and ate an early luncheon. The deck was deserted save for a fleet boy when he leaped into the sea. The ship was 300 miles from New York.

The ship circled for an hour and a boat was lowered, but no trace of the colonel was found.

was not determined. Experts thought that it might have been due to strain brought upon the machine as it roared down the uneven runway with a load of more than 4,000 pounds.

Today's crash was the twenty-fifth for Grace since he began flying at the age of 16. He is now 29. To provide thrills for picture audiences, Grace wrecked 16 planes. His other airplane wrecks were accidental, most of them in the performance of his work as a stunt flier. His only serious accident was nearly fatal. It cracked a vertebrae in his neck, and earned for him the sobriquet of "the broken necked flier."

The flight which failed was to have been either to San Francisco, 2,400 miles, or to Los Angeles, about 115 miles longer, dependent upon gasoline supply. Grace came to the islands June 24 and had made several attempts to take off before the accident today.
