



Thousands Expected To Attend Will Rogers Memorial Round-Up

Developments came thick and fast as Muleshoe people this week put the final touches on their preparations for the first Will Rogers Memorial Roundup, to be staged here Thursday and Friday of next week, August 30 and 31.

To begin with, final plans were made for the two day goodwill tour of this section of the Plains of West Texas and New Mexico to publicize the event. A group of cars will leave Muleshoe at 7 a. m. Monday morning for a north and west tour. They will meet at Gerald's Cafe on Main street. At least 20 cars will be in the caravan each day to extend the invitation of this city to the celebration. There will be music and entertainment for the people in every community that is touched on these tours.

"Old Man Gloom" will be killed and buried in a brief ceremony in each town. Literature telling of the event will be distributed everywhere.

The parade committee decided to have their staging area on east Avenue D, which runs east to the park, and on the paved

A joint luncheon of the Lions, Rotary, and JayCees will be held at the American Legion Home at noon Thursday. Two hundred and fifty are expected to attend and some distinguished guests will be present. Cal Farley, founder of Boys Ranch, will be the speaker.

The big parade the first day will be led by the military band of Reese Air Force Base, Lubbock. Muleshoe's high school band will march in the parade. A group of riders from the Will Rogers Range Riders group in Amarillo will be a colorful part of the parade. A color guard of United States Marines will be on hand to

To handle crowds that are expected quickly, cafes of Muleshoe will serve a "Roundup Special", a plate that will be ready to serve without the ceremony of placing an order.

On Friday evening preceding the rodeo performance, it is planned to have a public singing on the courthouse lawn. A widely known quartet is being invited to come here for this event.

Many other events are in the two day program. The Valley Theater will show Will Rogers' famed picture, "David Harum", and the Cox Drive-In will show "Steamboat Round The Bend." at midnight, August 30.

The World's Championship Muleshoe Pitching contest will be held during the Will Rogers Memorial Round-Up on August 30 and 31. This event is being sponsored by the Muleshoe Lions Club.

A special trophy will be awarded the first place winner of the contest and the second and third place winners will receive certificates. Amateur "muleshoe pitchers" from all over the Plains and Panhandle areas are expected to enter.

Blocher Rites Held Saturday

The remains of Josh Blocher, Bailey County pioneer, brutally murdered about a week before, were laid to rest in Muleshoe cemetery Saturday afternoon. Graveside ceremony was held at 3 p. m. with Rev. H. W. Hanks, pastor of the First Methodist Church officiating. Arrangements were in charge of Muleshoe Funeral Home.

Mr. Blocher's body was found in a cotton field several miles west of his home in Progress last Tuesday. He had disappeared from his home sometime Saturday night. He had been a resident here since 1902, the town of Progress was founded by him on land he had owned many years.

A group of relatives came from Kansas to supervise funeral arrangements. The group included Albert Maichel, a nephew, with two other nephews and a niece, all of Wichita, Kans. Mr. Blocher is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Lydia Maichel of Topeka, and Mrs. C. N. Reed, of Overbrook, Kans.

Sheriff Hugh Freeman this morning told the Journal that there has been no arrest in the case. Several local people have expressed the desire to raise money to be offered as a reward for information leading to the apprehension of the person or persons who perpetrated this outrage, and if the investigating officers agree it will be done quickly. The backers of the plan felt that practically everybody in the neighborhood would contribute to the fund and that it might help the officers to find the guilty.

D. B. Lancaster Assumes Duties As New Bailey County REA Manager

D. B. Lancaster assumed duties as Manager of the Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association August 13. Previous to coming here he was Industrial Engineer for Red River Arsenal, Texarkana, Texas for 5 months. From 1939 to the latter part of 1950 he was manager of the Bowie Cass Electric Cooperative, Douglassville, Texas. During this period he gained much experience in managing a Rural Electric Cooperative as Bowie Cass grew from 350 members with \$800.00 per month revenue in 1939, to almost 8000 members and \$30,000.00 per month income in 1950.

He served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Texas Power Reserve Electric Cooperative two years (1949-50) and four years (1947-1950) as Secretary-Treasurer of Texas Job Training and Safety Committee.

The experience that Mr. Lancaster has will help the Bailey County Electric Cooperative progress.

He is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College, a member of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers, was listed in "Who's Who in the South & Southwest" of 1950, chairman of Boy Scout District for two years, a Mason and a member of the Baptist Church. He received the President's (National Safety Council) medal in 1943 for successful Artificial Resuscitation.

Mr. Lancaster has expressed a desire to get acquainted with the members of the Bailey County Electric Cooperative, the people in Muleshoe and surrounding communities. He has stated that he is looking forward with great deal of enthusiasm toward rendering well regulated, continuous, low cost electric service to all the rural areas.

He is married and has two children, Linda Lou, 13 and D. B. Jr., 8. He expects to move his family to Muleshoe before the beginning of school.

Gloucester, Mass., August 17 — I was asked by a Boston friend to help him find a cottage in Gloucester which he could rent for the summer. On the following Saturday, we visited three real estate offices and all were closed. They were locked and bolted.

WHY MERCHANTS LACK CUSTOMERS

Upon inquiring the reason, I learned that, in view of the recent raise in wages and the forty hour week law, the real estate and insurance offices tried to "make both ends meet" by closing on Saturdays. This resulted in enabling the office clerks to have more time to themselves; but let us look at the result to the other parties involved.

This closing of the real estate office prevented my friend from renting a cottage because he could come down to look at cottages only during a week end. The next two week ends were cold and rainy. This caused him to give up renting any cottage this season. I find this caused a loss of work to several different trades needed to be employed for opening up vacant cottages.

because of inventors and laboratories, not due to labor leaders and politicians.

WHY LIVING COSTS ARE HIGH
Whether our sympathies are with these office employers or the clerks, the fact is that everyone involved loses by such nonsense. The clerks have no money to take home; the real estate offices lose commissions; the cottage owners lose rents and the merchants lose customers. Higher wages may be deserved; but they should not be followed by shorter or fewer working hours which result in less business and higher prices. Certainly, this inflation ball is bound to collapse sometime.

The plan of keeping an office or store open a few hours in order to keep costs down is bad for the nation as a whole. Merchants are the bottleneck of business. The fewer hours an office or store is open, the less it sells; the less it sells, the less it buys from the factories. As retail sales decline, the factories are obliged to layoff employees. This unemployment results in less purchasing power and so the trouble increases. Working fewer hours may easily be a cause of the next business depression.

WHAT IS THE REMEDY?
If prosperity is to continue more sales and more production are essential. This requires more work by all of us. "Money-wages" mean nothing until we turn them into "goods". What we can get for our weekly pay, in food, clothing, and shelter are our Real wages. This can be increased only through increased sales and increased production which requires longer hours, better work and more new inventions. Wage-workers have more goods today

He Knows How To Beat The Heat, But Not How To End Korean Trouble

There have been times when I felt it was necessary to figure out an excuse for not working, and times when I haven't worked, excuse or not but when the temperature reaches 100 out here I just lay down what ever I have in my hand and sit. May not be able to do anything about the weather, but I blamed sure can do something about myself.

I know there are people who argue you're better off if you just keep on working when it's hot but that seems like a mighty big price to pay just to be better off.

A neighbor of mine says he forgets about the heat by thinking of how cold he was last winter, but I ain't never been able to kid myself in such a fashion. It reminds me of tryin to lift your spirits by thinkin about the time you got 35c a pound for a steer while the one you're sellin now is goin for 21c. I can remember four years ago I thought I was out-smartin a man when I sold him a calf for 16c a pound, and while the same calf will bring 30c a pound now, that ain't no consolation to me, as it would also have brought 35c four months ago. Tryin to keep cool now by thinkin about last winter is about like bein tickled over high taxes now because they was low in 1911, like bein over-joyed with a sorry bill Congress passed because they passed a good one year before last.

As far as I'm concerned, the weather's been too hot, and while I know there are people who will say if you don't like the heat, work harder and get some air-conditionin, the idea of workin yourself half to death the first two-thirds of your life in order to cool off the last third never has appealed to me. There are ways to beat the heat from the start, and the best way I know is to sit still, and that's what I'm doin. Me and Congress know how to handle a situation like this.

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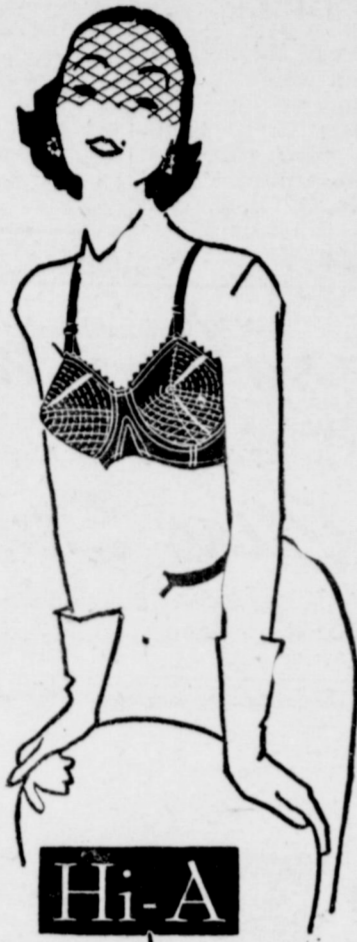

Sims Resigns Lazbuddie Post

Archie Sims, superintendent of schools at Lazbuddie for the past two years, has resigned to accept the position of principal of the elementary school at Tahoka, where a \$250,000 building is under construction.

During his two years at Lazbuddie many improvements have been made. All teacherages and school buildings have been modernized and redone on the inside. The high school is to be provided with new classroom furniture for next year, barring any delay. All buses will be new or slightly used with the exception of one and another old bus will be retained for extracurricular activities and emergencies. Grounds have been leveled and partially sown in grass, flowers and shrubbery have been placed around the main buildings.

Lazbuddie has one of the nicest homemaking departments for a school of its size in the state. It is one of the few schools of its size which has a full unit of 10 months. It is vocational. Much new equipment has been added recently. An agriculture building has been remodeled and many needed supplies purchased. It is a full unit of 12 months.

The lunch room was without funds at the close of school two years ago. At present there is just about the maximum amount in that fund that the state allows. Equipment has been added during this time which includes a baking oven costing about \$300, potato peeler which cost \$180 as well as practically all new dishes, electric mixer, in addition to other equipment.

Probably the greatest progress has been made in the school's financial status. Finances were at a low ebb and now are probably as good as that of any school its size in this section of the state. Despite all the im-

provements, the local school debt has been decreased by about 80 per cent.

These improvements have been made possible by the cooperation of the parents, the PTA, the school board and the community in general and the school personnel. The system will have 12 teachers next year.

Property Rental Listing Service Added By C. of C.

A free property listing service for all owners of rental or sale property in the Muleshoe trade territory was announced this week by W. M. Pool, Jr., president of the Chamber of Commerce.

The service is designed to assist newcomers and prospective homeowners to locate residential property with a minimum of "house hunting". Although its primary purpose is to compile and maintain an accurate record of available residences for rent or lease, chamber officials point out that all types of property will be listed, urban business and residential property and farm lands for sale or lease.

"We are often asked about apartments, houses and even farm lands by folks who wish to move to Muleshoe", Pool pointed out, "and we are most anxious to help these people as well as local property owners who have vacant buildings or homes".

The free listing service offered by the chamber of commerce office should in no way compete or interfere with the services offered by local realtors, Manager Al Hall stressed. "We shall be glad to have these people furnish us with their listings if they care to and we shall be as willing to refer our prospects to them as to private individuals. All we seek to do is to have a central information point that will amplify the services rendered by the newspaper columns and the real estate people", he explained. "We hope to render the best possible service to everyone in our community and shall be delighted to have anyone with vacant property of any description list it with us by writing or phoning 67-J".

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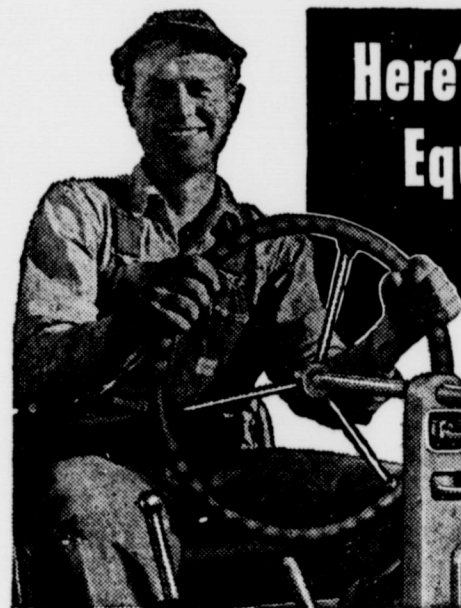
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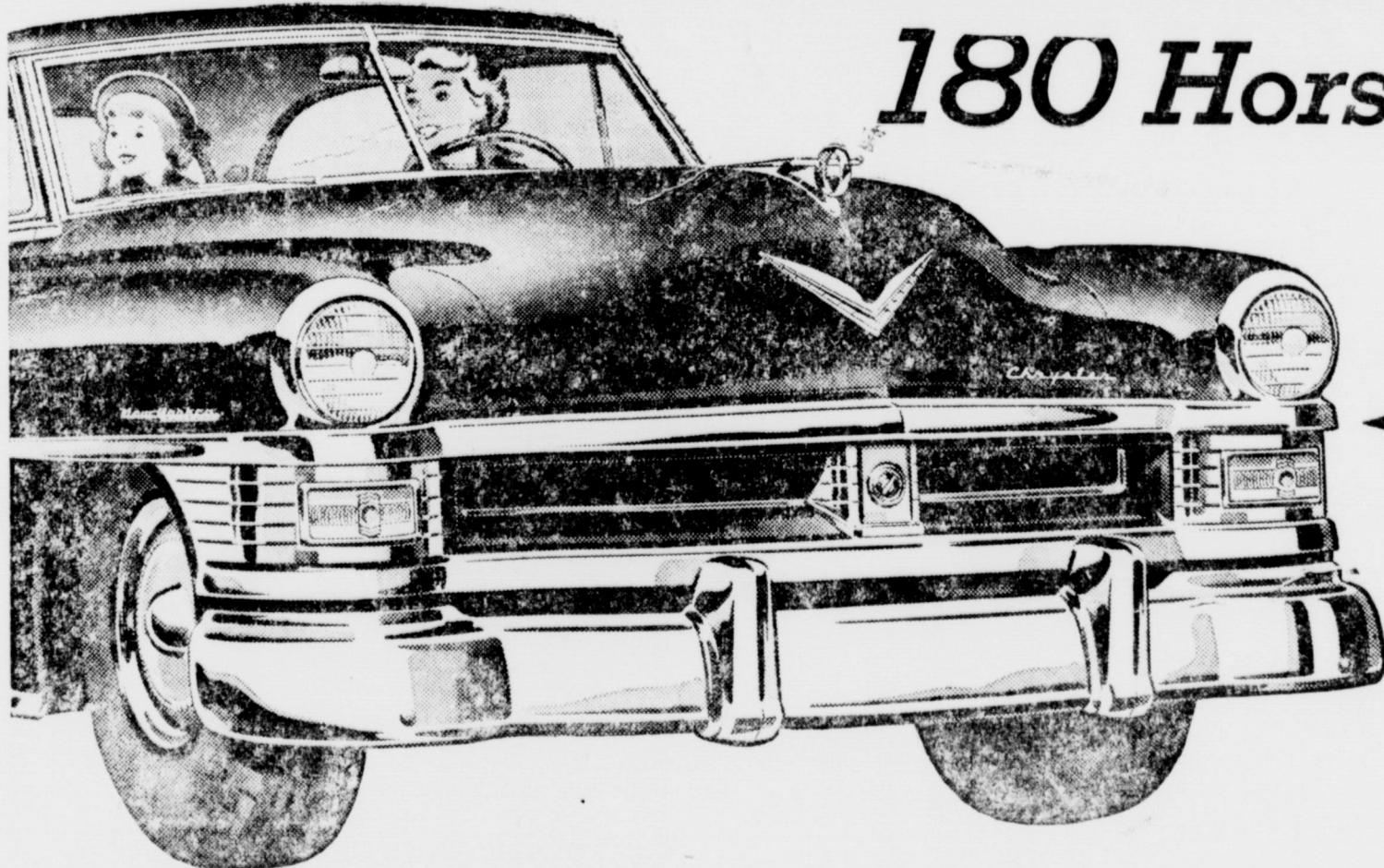

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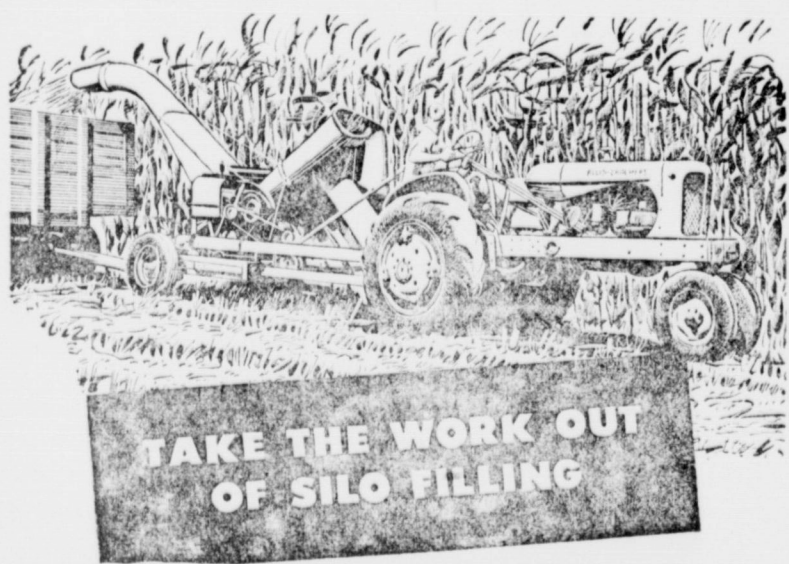
