Following the final two days of registration, all pupils are asked to report on Thursday 9 a.m. until noon for room assignments.

Wednesday is the first day of classes.

Grades 1-2 go to Primary School; 3-5 to Hutchinson; and sixth grade to Wallace School.

Principals at each of the schools have emphasized the importance of new pupils not yet registered to be present for enrolling.

Band Aiming For Big Cash

Colorado Wolf Band members didn't let Wednesday's rain hamper their door-to-door sale of Colorado City Record subscriptions.

The weather was a handicap, all right, but the students were still hoping to earn more than \$500 in cash, commissions and bonuses—and this surpass their all time sales record.

Annual band sale of Record subscriptions will continue today (Thursday) and continue through Friday. That's all, no more.

The students left Colorado High band hall Wednesday at 10 a.m. in the opening phase of their sale — shooting for special opening cash bonuses that could up their earnings for the band by as much as \$300 extra.

Funds raised from the sale of Record subscriptions during the three-day event will finance special programs of the band, educational trips and additional equipment.

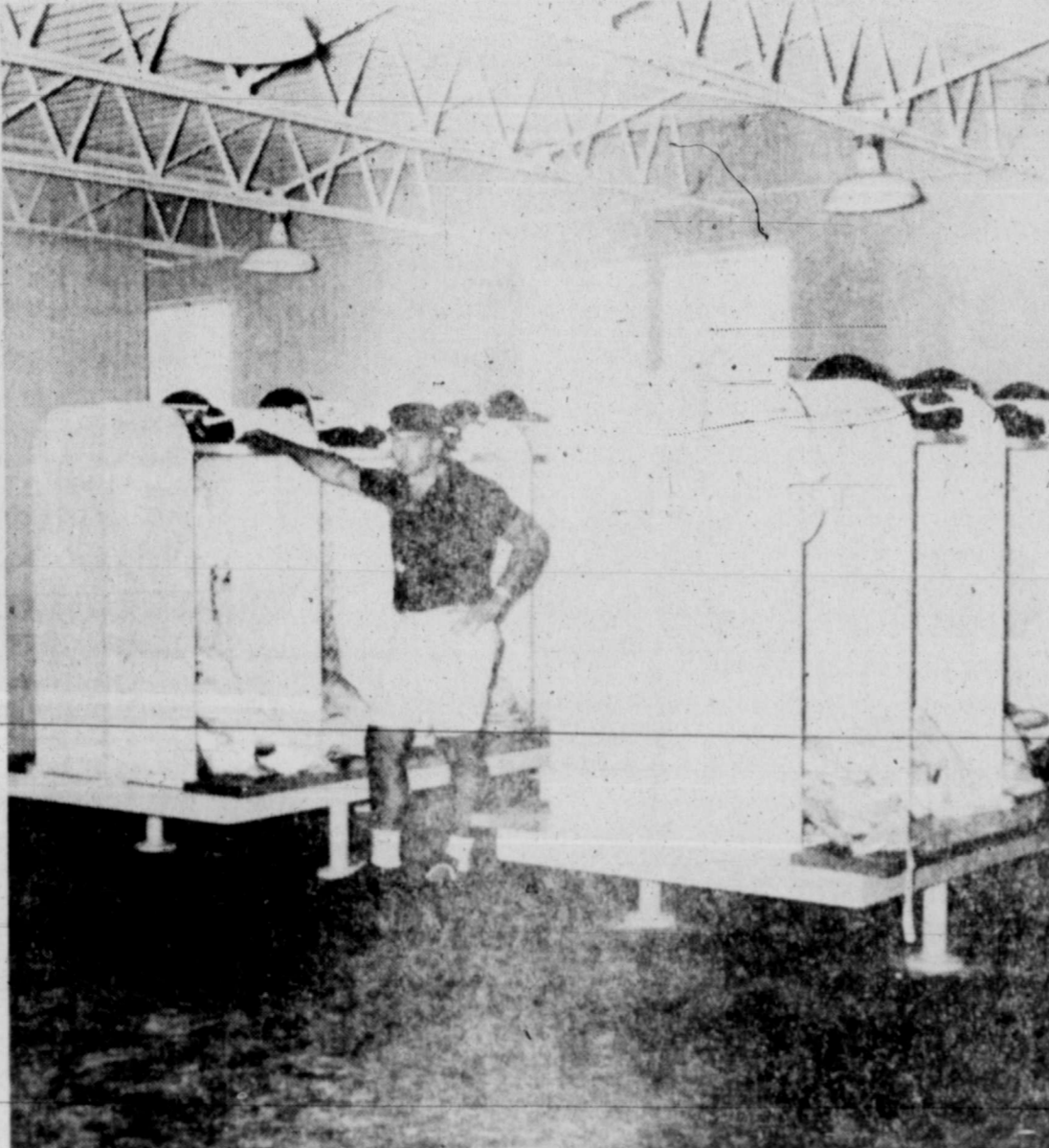
Band Aiming For Big Cash

Band members will be out in force today and Friday in an effort to make up for any slack the weather might cause. Every time they sell a 1-year (12-month) subscription to the Record, they earn a commission for the band.

In addition, every day they have opportunity to earn extra bonuses with sale records and to earn cash for their individual teams.

Bonuses offered opening day — in addition to regular commissions — amounted as high as \$300 for the band and more than \$150 for individual students.

New subscribers earn more for the band, but renewal subscriptions also provide hefty earnings, too. In the last four years the band and its members have earned approximately \$2,700 in cash in the Record sale. And, if sales hold up today and Friday, this mark will approach the \$3,500 mark by the weekend.

COTTON IN GOOD SHAPE

Boll Weevil Increase Possible Over County

Boll weevil buildups in portions of Mitchell County brought a word of warning to farmers from County Agent Bobby Lemons.

Following the weekly survey of fields in all parts of the county, Lemons noted that a field south of Lorraine had incurred 22 percent damage from boll weevils.

Moving to another part of the county, damage estimated at 16-18 percent was found two miles north of Colorado City.

Lemons urged farmers all over the county to keep a close check on their cotton for signs of increased weevil activity.

In the majority of the county, damage is running around three percent according to checks made early this week. Lemons said it was many times advisable to spray if the percentage of live weevils rose to five or above.

Bollworm damage was reported in fields in the Buford area and in the northwest portion of the county.

A small amount of fleahopper activity was noted on tender cotton in areas receiving an abundance of rainfall.

Cold weather has put the cabbage loopers on the run with dwindling activity from this insect.

Medium populations of beneficial insects continue to stay in the county with ladybugs, spiders and lacewinged flies making up the majority.

Lemons said no reports of damage had been received as a result of the latest rainfall.

Among those honored by a memorial resolution was the late E. V. Wilder, a former manager of the Lone Wolf Coop.

Annual Farm Tour Draws 70 Persons

City folks got an insight as to what their "country cousins" were doing and farmers being employed on other operations.

One tour followed a route visiting the Fairview, Westbrook, Conway and Spade communities while the other went through the Lorraine, Lorraine, Buford and Mitchell areas of the county.

On the Rex McKenney farm near Westbrook, the group saw dryland cotton variety and parallel terracing. Southwest of the community a dryland cotton fertilizer demonstration.

Results of a trial spraying along with water and soil conservation projects were on the program in the Spade and Conway areas.

Real time farmers saw a large cotton variety on the Lorraine farm and parallel terracing on the Delmas farm.

Wally Brown, a cotton variety expert of the Raymond-Washington farm, the tour got a look at the unique irrigation system of A. K. McCarley Jr. along with a field where the farmer has interplanted guar with cotton.

Edo Erswell, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce and Public Relations, said more territory was covered by this year's tour than in the past. "Information was given on rates and farming practices all along each of the tour routes," Erswell said, "as well as scheduled stops."

"This tour was more thorough and tried to show all the different aspects of agriculture in the county," he added.

The chairman noted that this year's tour had the largest number attending in the history of the event.

The annual tour was sponsored by the ASCS, FFA, Extension Service, Mitchell County Soil and Water Conservation District along with the Chamber.

A barbecue followed the tour at the Lone Wolf Cooperatorium.

Tour leaders include John Russell, FFA supervisor, Willard Howell, SCS, Bobby Lemons, County Agent, and Braswell.

Others helping were Dink Rice, publicity; Alfred Carey, tickets; and Jimmy Kelley, barbecue.

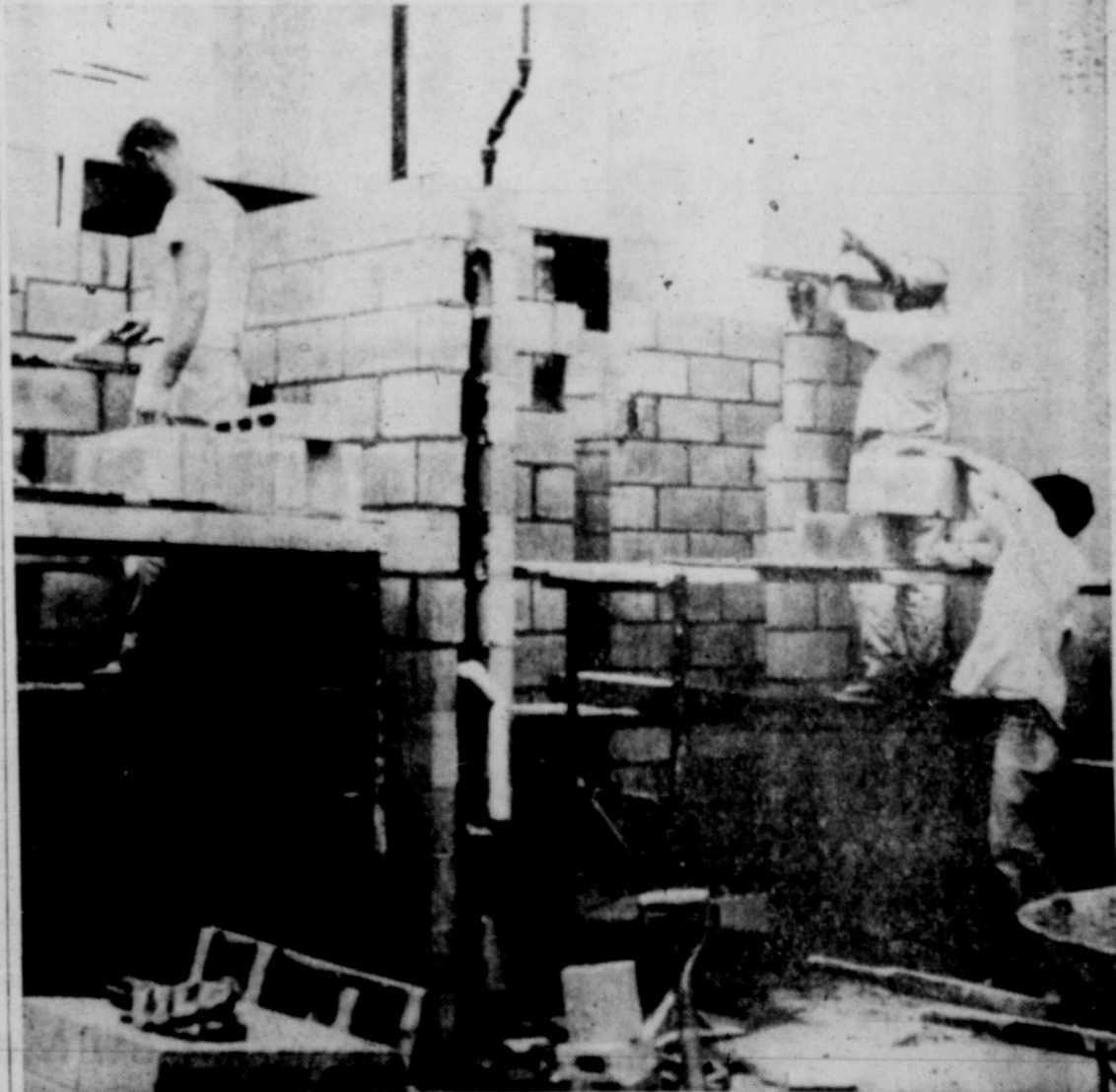

PEOPLE sometimes have trouble meaning what they say. More often, the problem is saying what they mean. Words that sound alike but do not mean the same thing all present a hurdle. Wonder, for instance, if the average druggist has as many requests for refilling "subscriptions" as the average little paper gets for renewing "prescriptions?" Main complication, though, has come about through new meanings assigned to old words by the young. Language with no slang in its makeup is pure and proper. But you've got to admit it certainly is not so colorful and apropos.

THE WORD "dumb" is one example. Time was when you called a person unable to speak or make sounds "dumb." Not long ago, a favorite little girl named Betsy heard the expression used in its original form. "He was deaf and dumb."

"That isn't a very nice thing to say," the child objected. "One shouldn't call a poor man dumb. It simply isn't polite to call him stupid, is it?"

And there again you have a new meaning. "Stupid" these days is used to refer to any and every thing . . . from this stupid zipper to that stupid ball pen.

Stupid doesn't mean dumb any more. It means what ever refuses to perform properly.

SQUARE used to be a nice word. It once meant honorable. Now it means, mostly, anybody who likes Lawrence Welk.

Bug was an insect — before it got to mean "bother or upset," as in "what really bugs me . . ."

People hardly ever get excited any more. They don't even get "in thrill." They get "turned on."

Kicks once referred to Uncle John's mule. As nearly as can be determined, kicks now mean some form of pleasure usually in the recreational stage.

In some quarters, a pretty girl is no longer "like a mel-

ody . . ." she's more like a babe, a doll, a mouse, a chick.

READ some where, the other day, that nearly all the slang terms begin in the underworld. It crosses over into the ordinary or upper world, too. And has invaded the world of music to an alarming degree. Alarming to all ears not tuned on that is.

Stinks never was a word of good repute. Now it's another of the overworked category. Whatever displeas and sometimes wild-very in any way, major or minor, now stinks.

English as spoken, and even as sung, is full of peculiarities. Mother always called peculiarities "idiosyncrasies." Now they're just "hep," or way out.

OH, WELL. 'Twas ever thus. Those of us who used to giggle at the "You tell 'em" craze . . . who survived the Little Audrey jokes . . . the shaggy dog tales . . . should be immune to shock by now.

It's dumb to let it bug you. Stupid to be a square.

In other words, friends and readers, it is not intelligent to allow the new speech, beat and lyrics to disconcert you. Nor is it wise to admit that the years have turned you into an eccentric.

Try to remember that when the offspring of the current crop of offspring make up their own new language, as adults they won't understand the next younger generation any better than you do now . . . for than your parents, teachers, and neighbors did YOU, back then.

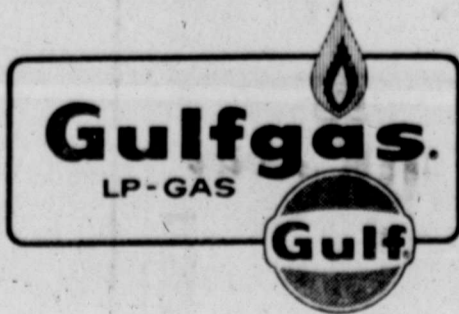

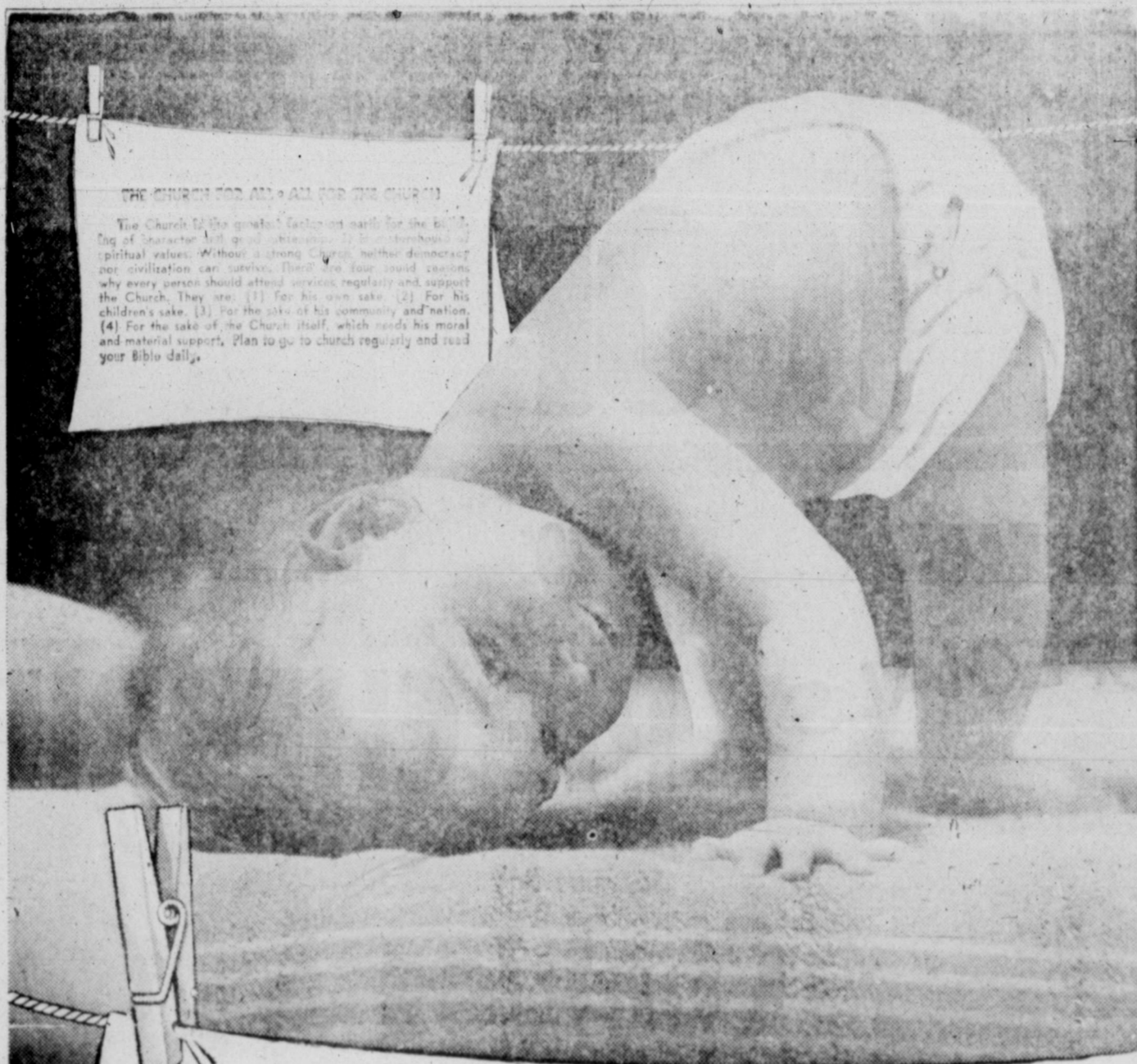
