Former President Clinging To Life By Narrow Thread

Physicians Give Up Hopes
For Recovery Of Former
Chief Justice; Declare
Any Rally Temporary

Given Short Time

Capital Is Sadly Awaiting
Inevitable; Breathing
Constantly Becomes More
Difficult Thursday

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Former Chief Justice Taft was sleeping when his physicians visited him at 10:45 tonight and they said there was no change in the condition of the patient.

Doctors Francis R. Hagner and Thomas A. Clayton said they did not expect to return to the former Chief Justice's bedside until sometime tomorrow morning. Dr. Hagner expressed the belief that Mr. Taft would live through the night, despite earlier, bulletin indicating that death might be only a few hours away.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Death drew closer to William Howard Taft tonight. The capital wherein his accomplishments as President and Chief Justice had won him the world's respect sadly awaited the inevitable.

Time and again the physicians who have attended him since his collapse were by his bedside. Regretted that his blood circulation had been followed by paralytic rashes. But Dr. Francis R. Hagner said "There is hope for his recovery; any improvement will only be temporary."

At the best, the former President has been given but a short time to live. His breathing constantly is more difficult. His blood circulation is at low ebb. His heart may give way at any time and he can take very little nourishment.

Mrs. Taft and their daughter, Mrs. Helen Taft, are at his bedside.

Museum Group To Meet Here Today

Interesting Program And
Collections Of Exhibits In
Prospect For First Annual
Gathering Here

Inaugurating an annual gathering of the South Plains Museum society, members of that organization will gather in Lubbock today with an interesting program and collection of exhibits in prospect.

First session of the meeting will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock in auditorium of engineering building at Texas Tech. Addresses will be made by Dr. F. A. Kien Schmidt on "How I Would Plan a Museum," and by Miss Mary W. Dool on "The British Museum."

Following addresses a fellowship period and a visit to the exhibits of the Tech museum is scheduled.

The Tech Museum society will be held to all visitors at a luncheon following the afternoon session.

The evening program will be opened by Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college, in the auditorium of the chemistry building with an address of welcome. After this Dr. W. C. Holden will talk on "Archaeological Achievements and Prospects in Texas." Dr. M. A. Stainbrook will talk on the subject of "Large Fossil Animals of West Texas."

Three types of exhibits will be open to the public during the meeting. Some of these exhibits belong to the college, and others have been loaned for the special occasion.

OIL LAND INVOLVED Pecos County Land Object Of Suit At Austin

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Title to approximately 600 acres of land in Pecos county, some of it producing oil, was involved in a verdict on special issues returned by a jury in the case of the State vs. the California Oil company and 32 other defendants today.

Attorneys on both sides were drawing judgments to be submitted to Judge Geo. Calhoun for entry and it was likely the probable disposition of the litigation would be the center of contention before the final order is entered.

The jury found that judgment should enter definitely against John H. Tyler, one of the claimants to the land in dispute.

Value of the land involved was estimated at from \$1,000,000 up to \$2,000,000.

Proposed Tax On Cigarettes Sold In Texas Denied

Measure Opposed By State
Druggists, Tobaccoists;
Prison Problem Same As
In Fourth Session

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—The house committee on revenue and taxation tonight refused to approve the bill of Rep. J. W. Harper of Mount Pleasant to place a tax on cigarettes and cigars sold in Texas.

It was the seventh time the house had refused to tax these items.

The bill was opposed by Representatives of wholesale and retail druggists and tobaccoists from over the state, and a petition containing five thousand signatures against it was presented to committee.

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—The fifth special session of the 41st legislature tonight found itself in the same position it occupied when it completed the fourth extra ordinary session nine days ago.

The house passed the bill by Rep. Harry N. Graves, Georgetown, to rehabilitate the existing penitentiary properties — improve and renovate them — without moving headquarters from Huntsville and the senate passed the administration "Austin-style" constitutional bill, sponsored this time by Sen. J. W. E. Beck of DeKalb.

The legislature had split identically the same way during the 4th session, when Governor Moody called.

Over 500 Listen As Allred Flays Wall Street Men

Wichita Falls Attorney, In
Anti-Chain Address Here,
Directs Attack On Large
Eastern-Owned Companies

Politics Avoided

Candidate For Nomination
As Attorney-General Is
Accorded Large Crowd In
Courthouse Speech

SPEAKING before a mass meeting of more than 500 persons last night in the district court room, James V. Allred, of Wichita Falls, candidate for democratic nomination as Attorney General of Texas, brought his fight against Wall street-owned chain stores of the nation into Lubbock. The young attorney, fiery in his presentation, frank in his choice of language and bitter in his denunciation, took as his subject "The Menace of the Chain Store System."

"I am not speaking here as the representative of any organization or individual," Allred stated. "I want it distinctly understood that I am carrying this fight merely as a private citizen of Texas. I am not receiving pay for my work from independent merchants."

"I conceive it to be a duty of any man to espouse the cause of right against the cause of wrong, even if the wrath of the gods are called down upon him. This is an issue that is before every man and every woman of the State of Texas, as well as of every other state. This is not W. K. Henderson's fight, not a small fight of independent against the chain, but it is the battle of the people against the privileged few."

Allred, in scathing words, told of the methods "adopted and used by the wolves of Wall Street."

Jury Deadlocked In Tahoka Trial

Addie Lee Roberts Tried
On Manslaughter Charge
Growing Out Of Slaying
At O'Donnel In 1925

TAHOKA, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—The jury in the manslaughter trial of Addie Lee Roberts, of Bull Lake, located west of Littlefield, held here this week, was released late yesterday afternoon following hours of deliberation without reaching a verdict.

Roberts was being tried on manslaughter charges growing out of the death of Calvin Petty near O'Donnel in 1925.

His first trial, on charges of murder, held five years ago, resulted in conviction and a sentence of five years in the state penitentiary. The court of criminal appeals, however, granted a rehearing.

The firm of Vickers and Campbell, of Lubbock, are counsel for defense, while the firm of Lockhart, Garrard and Brown, also of Lubbock, are siding in the prosecution.

BOND BIG-TS GIVEN AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—The right to issue \$50,000 bonds to purchase land for donation to the state as the site for the proposed \$150,000 state psychopathic hospital was given the city of Galveston today in a bill passed by the senate. It was sponsored by Senator Thomas Holbrook of Galveston.

RICH PERSIAN DIES Deposed Shah Ahmed Called By Death In Paris

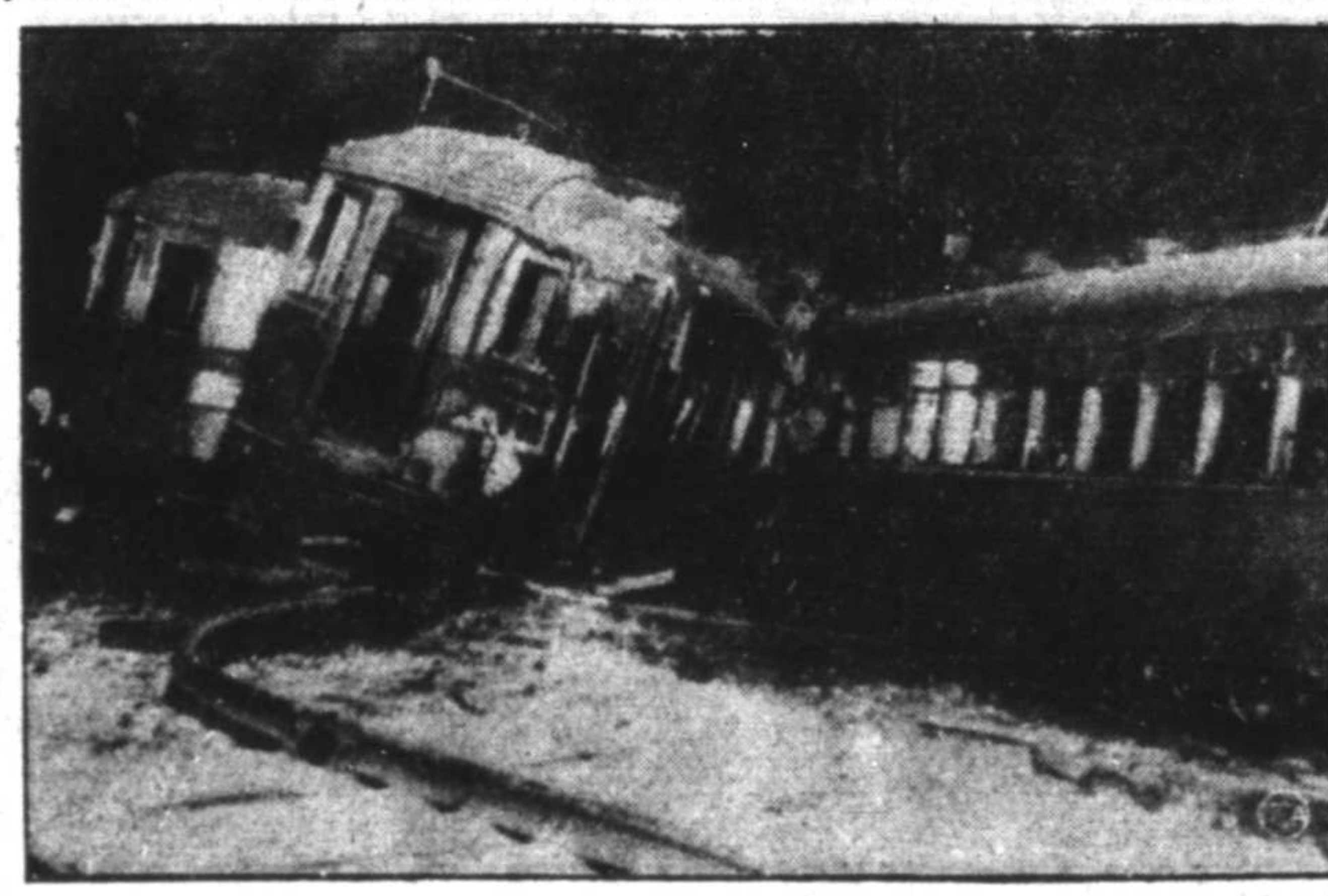
PARIS, Feb. 27.—The deposed Shah Ahmed of Persia, 32, descendant of the prophet and reputed to be one of the richest men in the world, died in Paris today.

His death came in the American hospital in Paris, and tonight his body was taken to the Mosque for the last rites. Only a few friends accompanied it.

Immediate Improvements Of Lubbock Park System Authorized By City Dads

AUTHORIZATION of appropriation of \$1,500 for immediate park improvements in Lubbock was made yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the city commission at the city hall.

The commission also authorized City Engineer Martin R. Smith to ask for bids on a storage reservoir at the sewerage farm southeast of the city. Plans for the structure were presented by the body by the engineer and, after some discussion and explanation, adopted. The proposed reservoir will provide additional storage facilities for waste from the city.

The installation of six inch water mains from Morningside west on 32nd street to O'Neill Terrace was ordered by the commission, work to be started as soon as possible.

Gap Between Two Parties Widened

Premier Tardieu Faced By

PARIS, Feb. 27.—The gap between the policies to the deadlocked right and left parties in the French chamber of deputies widened today as Premier Aristide Briard attempted to reassemble a government to succeed the short-lived Chautemps cabinet.

High School Girl Killed in Crash

WALDENBURG, Colo., Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—A 16-year-old high school girl was killed, another seriously injured and the pilot slightly hurt in the crash of a three-place biplane on the top of Moccasin Pass, 50 miles northwest of here late today.

Miss Elsie Noble, a junior student in Centennial High school, Pueblo, was killed and Miss Abba Tallon, 18, student in the same school was seriously injured. Harry Miller, pilot, was slightly injured.

FALLS TO DEATH University Student Falls Two Stories At Austin

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Winn of Alvin, University of Texas student, died late today of injuries sustained when he fell from a second story window of an Austin hotel.

Claim Tax Would End Gas Business

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Testimony that the tax on natural gas proposed in the Sanders and Maurice-Tyler bills would force many Texas gas producers out of business was presented to the house committee on revenue and taxation today.

Peonage Charged Five Including Officers Indicted At Waco

WACO, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Five citizens of Normange in Leon county were indicted by the federal grand jury late today on a charge of conspiracy to violate the peonage act. They are: C. F. Cobb, tenant farmer; M. A. Shepherd, justice of the peace; Ed Parker, farmer-constable; W. S. Jamison, town marshal; and J. D. Lott, P. Taylor, deputy sheriff and candidate for sheriff of Leon county.

Naval Conference Breathing Easier

Delegates Are Elected As
MacDonald's Government
Wins Vote On Coal Bill;
Activities Resumed

LONDON, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—The naval conference, breathed easier tonight after Prime Minister MacDonald's labor government had won the vote on the coal bill, 230 to 271.

Herriot Declines

Working with the aim of forming a "wide concertation cabinet," Tardieu attempted to bring the radical socialists into the fold by offering the ministry of foreign affairs to Premier Edouard Herriot. Sheriff A. Y. Baker, Other Election Officials Charged With Conspiracy To Injure Civil Rights Of Persons

Bills Returned By Federal Grand Jury After Four-Day
Investigation Of Charges Brought By Republican
Independents; Bonds Of \$1,000 Each Set

HOUSTON, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Sheriff A. Y. Baker of Hidalgo county, wealthy lower Rio Grande valley democratic political leader of years standing, and seven other men were indicted tonight by a federal grand jury here for conspiracy to injure persons in the exercise of civil rights.

For four days the grand jury had investigated the charges of republican independents that the Westaco Hidalgo county box was thrown out in the last general election to perpetuate the administration of Baker.

Snook Scheduled To Die In Chair In Prison Today

Last Chance For Life Of
Former Professor Denied
When Governor Refuses
To Grant Clemency

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 27.—Dr. James Howard Snook, the deposed Ohio state university professor, today lost his last chance for life and so must die in the electric chair at Ohio penitentiary tomorrow for the murder of Mrs. Theresa Hix, Ohio state co-ed, last June.

Acting with the speed which characterized Dr. Snook's trial and his unsuccessful appeals to state and federal courts, Governor Cooper today listened attentively to an application by Snook's counsel for a reprieve in order that they might take the case before the state board of clemency. Half an hour later, he denied the application on the ground that there was nothing presented to him that would justify executive clemency.

E. O. Ricketts, defense attorney, made a formal application for commutation of sentence to life imprisonment. The Governor replied, "It is denied," and with those words died Snook's last chance for life.

The matter tonight was in the hands of Warden Preston E. Thomas of Ohio penitentiary with power to execute the former professor anytime between "midnight and midnight," tomorrow.

The usual time of executions is 7 p. m., but there had been strong indications that the one would take place shortly after midnight tonight, the earliest moment possible under the law.

New State Patrol To Take To Roads

Two Members Will Work
Out Of Lubbock On Highways
Starting Today

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—Fifty members of the recently created state highway patrol, riding shining new headquarters in Lubbock today, local officials last night stated that no word had been received as to personnel of the officers.

Chief of Police John Lemond said that the officers would not be connected in any way with the local force and that they would have no jurisdiction over cases inside the city, operating only on state highways.

Lubbock Youth, Injured by Propellor Of Plane, Refuses to Give Up Hopes

Despite the fact that his left arm, shattered several months ago by a whirling propeller at the Fort Worth municipal airport, has knitted back together in such a way as to make it practically useless, Dayton Orr, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Orr, 1022 Avenue B, of Lubbock, has not given up hope.

Information received in this city yesterday stated that the young flier has good prospects of receiving his commercial pilot's license.

A piece of bone was grafted on the arm which was broken just above the left elbow, and Orr was released from the Fort Worth Baptist hospital during Christmas week. He spent the holidays in this city and returned to Fort Worth to take up his air studies. But the arm did not knit well and one of the nerves refused to function so that his left hand was practically useless.

The young Lubbock man, however, was not disheartened. When it became apparent that he could not pass the physical examination re-

quired for pilot's licenses, he entered the hospital again and doctors took over the work on his arm once more.

Now he is out again and anxious to get back into the air.

Reports state that the lad declares his arm "feels fine," as he wiggles his fingers gingerly. "I'll soon be able to take that test."

"If she doesn't get well enough this time I'll try it again."

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Farmers Have Fighting Champion at Last; Alexander Legge Proes Real Go-Getter in Fight for Farm Aid

WASHINGTON, February 28.—The most distinctive thing about Alexander Legge is that he is a federal jobholder who isn't afraid to tell anyone where to get off. Such fearlessness in the chairman of the federal farm board marks him as a man apart in Washington. He is immune from political pressure, he isn't looking forward to a bigger and better job, he has all the money he will ever need and you just can't imagine anyone of whom he might ever stand in awe.

The two things which seem to actuate Legge in the early stages of the government's attempt to put agriculture on a paying basis are his sympathy for farmers and his own obvious relish for doing a difficult job well in his own way. Some people consider Legge helpful, pleasant and sympathetic while others regard him as a hard-boiled individual. It all depends on what Legge thinks of them and their propositions. He faces a tremendously big job, but no one so far has suggested that he isn't able, dynamic and efficient—his record proves that he is all those things.

A Six-Foot, 200-Pounder
There are a few men in Washington whose appearance anywhere causes many strangers to ask, "Who's that?" Legge is one of them. He's a big, lanky Scotchman with a rather large head, more than six feet tall and weighing about 200 pounds. His face is clean-shaven and red. Sometimes it wears the most baleful look that has been seen here since the retirement of Senator Jim Reed of Missouri. Legge wears a conservative suit. He sits lightly, holding back at the table but keeping plenty of apples and pears in his office. He scowls a great deal, especially when studying or thinking. But he kids his staff and usually says it with a smile if he has to criticize his subordinates. In his office he thinks fast, but moves slowly.

He lives at the Willard hotel, only a block away from the farm board offices, and is up early every morning to exercise with the Hoover machine ball cabinet. This morning's ball tossing is said to be his nearest approach to social life. He has made friends all over the world, but has no family and usually takes papers to his hotel to work on at night. All his movements seem to be guided by his determination to put the farm job over in a big way.

When President Hoover sounded him out about leaving his \$100,000-a-year job as president of the International Harvester Co. to go on the farm board, Legge is said to have accepted on condition that he be made chairman. Originally he took the job for a single year, ending next July 1st, but it seems unlikely that he will quit at that time unless convinced that the campaign to put agriculture on a sound basis is off to a good start.

After selling farm machinery for 40 years Legge appreciated what farmers were up against and also that the farming business has been the basis for his own rapid rise. "I'm not a seeker for the job," he told the senate agriculture committee after some objection had been made to confirmation of his appointment. "I am not even a volunteer. You can't hurt my feelings by sending me home. That is perfectly all right and I am perfectly willing you should."

"I think perhaps I know more farmers personally than even any of you," Legge was quickly confirmed and has been talking turkey to people here ever since. He told President Butterworth of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, for instance, that the chamber ought to direct itself to the economic theories of the horse-and-buggy age.

Senator Caraway of Arkansas, questioning Legge, said: "I believe you said you read the farm bill 20 times, and didn't understand it?" "Frankly," replied Legge, "I will read it 20 times more, and then I am doubtful whether I will understand it."

Work Just Starting
"I may be kicked out and probably will," he told the American farm bureau federation in warning it that surpluses must be controlled at the source. "But the work is being started and the rest depends on you."

Legge's present popularity here was mostly achieved when he defied Julius Barnes and the western grain dealers, who made most of the profits in the business, but they were at the dealers' mercy. Now they have a champion in Legge. The farm board has been trying to set up a marketing and stabilization structure owned and operated by farmers. If the grain operators are forced from control the farmers may get a fair break. Because Legge wanted the farmer to dominate the marketing system the operators went gunning for him. Barnes, a large exporter and chairman of the directors of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, led the charge. He found no encouragement at the White House or anywhere else.

That incident, plus the credit given him for stepping in at the time of the stock market crash and pegging wheat at \$1.25 a bushel when it might have gone down to 80 or 70 cents, seemed to make Legge solid with both the farmers and the belligerent senate farm bloc, which has kept off his neck ever since, turning its guns on the grain dealers.

No "Pull" Behind Scenes
"That's the first time my motives were ever questioned," Legge said of the dealers' criticisms after he had told them that if they wanted action they must put their case squarely before the board without depending on any work behind the scenes.

Some delegations of farmers come to the board and want the earth,

but Legge sees to it that they comply with the provision of the law that all loans must be reasonably safe. "All you fellows want is to be led around by the hand," he told one group. "You've got to do something for yourselves." He doesn't often tell anyone to go to hell in so many words, but he has on occasion when they made him good and angry.

Sharkey Beats Scott In Third On Technical Knockout

Ralls Smothers Spearman In Bi-District Opener, 36-9

Boston Sailor Declared Winner Of Fistic Feature At Miami After Phil Had Claimed Foul Early In 3rd Round

Sharkey Warned For Hitting Low In Fatal Spasm; Briton Stimulates Great Agony As Usual; Risko And Campolo Fight To Ten-Round Draw

RING SIDE, MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 27. (AP) — Amid scenes of the wildest and most extraordinary confusion, Jack Sharkey was declared the winner over Phil Scott tonight on a technical knockout after two minutes and 34 seconds of the third round. Scott, claiming a foul, resumed fighting after a minute's rest but was unable to continue after a smashing left hook to the body. Referee Lou Magnolia then stepped in and lifted Sharkey's hand in token of victory.

The third and final round witnessed some of the most remarkable scenes of heavyweight fight history as Sharkey was warned for hitting low, then felled Scott with another left to the side which sent the Briton to the canvas, claiming a foul. Refusing to be stampeded, Referee Magnolia helped Scott's handlers to drag him to his corner and halted the fight to make an examination.

Handers of both men leaped about the ring and all was chaos. Scott, finally, though stimulating great agony, declared he would continue. The ring was cleared and they went at it again. Up against the ropes, limping and manifesting great pain, Scott took a smashing left to the body. The Briton sagged and turned helplessly as the referee stepped in. There was no question about this blow and Magnolia, after a few seconds went over to lift Sharkey's hand in victory.

Sharkey's victory followed an unpopular decision of a draw in the 16-round semi-final between Johnny Risko and Victor Campolo after Risko appeared to have won on points. The show was declared a financial flop, although no official figures were available. It was estimated not more than 25,000 persons paid nearly \$200,000 with indication on this basis of a \$50,000 loss to the Madison Square Corporation.

Argentine Victor. The first bout ended in the first round with a clean knockout for Raul Bianchi, former navy heavyweight champion, from the society stable maintained by E. F. Hutton, New York broker, as Phil Beach, put Daring down for the full count with a left hook, followed by a terrific right to the chin. Daring was counted out flat on his back, after two minutes and 25 seconds of the round had elapsed.

Tommy Loughran was declared the victor over Pierre Charles, of Belgium in a 10-round main bout put on after the main event. Referee Johnny Brannan lifted the Philadelphia's hand in token of a clean-cut triumph on points.

Round By Round

Round One. Scott, with the British flag sewed on the side of his trunk took time to adjust his gloves and go out for instructions. Sharkey wore the navy emblem. Sharkey opened with a rush but failed to connect. Scott clinched as the American rushed again. They sparred and exchanged rights to the body. Scott adopted a half crouch and ducked away from Sharkey's wild rush.

The Briton chopped a right to the side of the head and clinched. Sharkey smashed a left hook in the ribs, but was tied up as he came to close quarters. Phil picked a right hand out of the air and boxed coolly. Sharkey was short with both hands and they clinched again. Scott showed no disposition to mix at close quarters, but fired a long right to the ear at the bell.

Round Two. Sharkey bobbed and shifted, chopped a right to the head as they clinched. Scott went down in a corner as they fought at close range, but got up at the count of six. It was a left to the head. It was the force of Sharkey's rush that put Phil down. Sharkey stepped with his left, but punished the Briton as he came to a clinch. Blood trickled from Phil's right nostril. They exchanged lefts to the body but Scott showed agility in tying up the American in the stomach. Sharkey dug a stiff left to the stomach, but missed an overhand by a half-foot. They clinched just before the bell.

Round Three. The third round opened with Scott boxing cautiously, at times effectively to ward off Sharkey's vicious rushes along the ropes. Sharkey glancing blow to the head as he was partly off balance and went down for a count of three. Sharkey was warned by the referee for hitting low with his left. Scott grunted but continued. Again a close range in a fast mix up, Sharkey's left hit near the belt line but seemed more on the side than in the stomach. Phil time Scott went down, gripping his side in an indication of foul. As his manager, Jimmy Johnston jumped into the ring. Scott rolled over and manifested acute agony. Referee Magnolia refused to allow the claim and temporarily halted the fight as Scott was dragged to his corner for an examination. Sharkey meanwhile raced about the ring, shouting and gesticulating he had not fouled his man. Magnolia consulted Scott and let a claim of foul and gave Scott the alternative of losing the decision or continuing. After a minute's rest the Briton elected to fight again. He limped out, pain and agony written on his face, and backed from Sharkey's rush. After a few seconds of mixing, Sharkey smashed a left hook to the stomach, as Scott staggered along the ropes. Phil dropped his hands and registered spleenless. Magnolia asked him whether he wanted to continue as he stepped in between the fighters. Scott shook his head slowly, and Magnolia then went over to lift Sharkey's hand in token of victory on a technical knockout.

Hutson and McClanahan were holding down regular berths with the local team in 1929 when forced out for the season with injuries. Hutson's arm was broken and McClanahan went out with a broken leg. Both were well up with the leaders, hitting .349 when forced to retire after the first three weeks. Parks played 85 games in left field and batted .327. The other outfield holdover is Cy Cashion, a very good hitter and fielder. Cashion has his job clinched. Perry comes to the Sports from the South-eastern league where he batted .359.

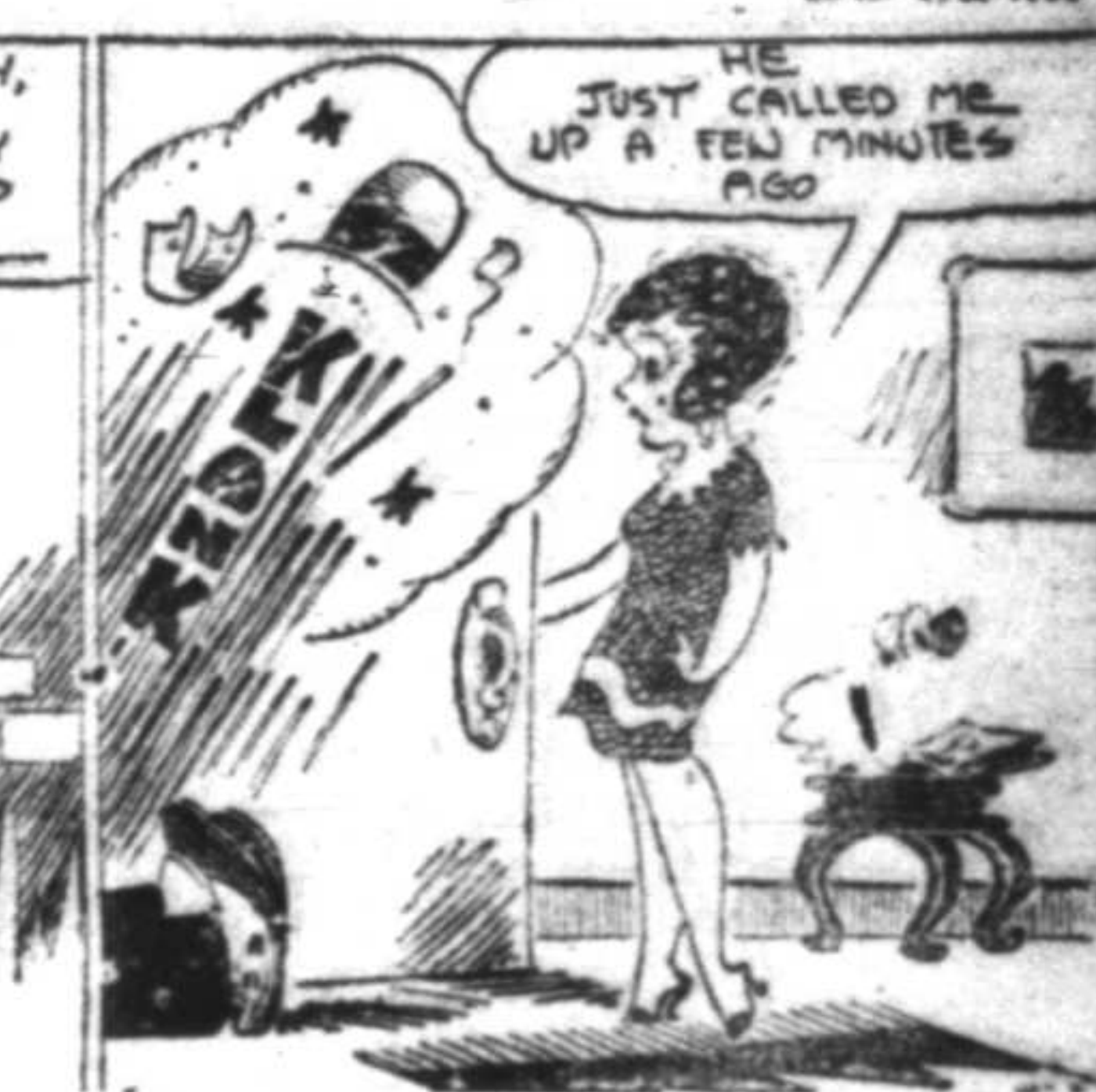

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 27. (AP)—A late bulge carried cotton prices about \$2 a bale over an opening decline today, under a demand prompted by the Mississippi legislature's action advocating a reduction in acreage to 60 per cent of last year's acreage and the reported forming of a big cotton pool on the Pacific coast.

NEW YORK, Feb. 27. (AP)—The upturn in share prices prompted by the turning of the tide in Chicago wheat was checked by heavy profit taking late in today's session, after nearly a score of issues had been sent up into new high territory for the year.

The day's transfers totaling 3,310,110 shares, about 200,000 more than yesterday. Credit conditions eased, with call money sagging to 4 per cent, after renewals at 4 1-2. The weekly brokerage loan statement showed a reduction of \$5,000,000.

Hope For Further Postponement Of Approval Grows Brighter In Inter-State Litigation Over Line

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 27. (AP)—Hope for further postponement of approval by the United States supreme court of the report of surveyors on the Western Oklahoma boundary, until some definite action can be taken by the legislatures of Oklahoma and Texas, grew brighter today with receipt of a telegram by J. Berry King, attorney general, from the clerk of the court, asking the status of the boundary litigation.

The report of the location of the one hundredth meridian boundary line by engineers who made a survey has been placed before the supreme court for approval. If adopted by the court, 28,500 acres now in Oklahoma will go to Texas, and title to property in the district will become questionable.

Postponement agreed. In October, 1929, the supreme court agreed to postpone final approval of the report until February 24 so that the legislatures of the two states might make a settlement. Oklahoma's offer of \$190,000 was rejected by the Texas, and the Texas legislature recently voted to allow the supreme court to conclude the case.

King, on February 24 expected immediate approval on transfer of the territory to Texas, but he was advised yesterday that the only action taken by the court was to allow the expenses of the surveyors.

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In a telegram to Governor W. J.
