FALL GUILTY OF ACCEPTING BRIBE

Fifty-Seven Men Perish In Storm In Lake Michigan

BRADLEY TO FIGHT BAIL FOR LESTER

PROSECUTOR SAYS CASE IS NOT BAILABLE

LESTER APPEARS MORE NERVOUS TODAY IN JAIL CELL

District Attorney Durwood Bradley, state prosecutor for 72nd and 99th district courts, announced this morning that he would fight any effort to obtain bail for Clay Lester, 37, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting here Thursday morning of his estranged wife, Mrs. Virgie Lester, 36.

Lester, held in the Lubbock county jail, told authorities yesterday that he wanted a hearing, but he has not yet employed defense attorneys.

Maintains Silence.
Smoking cigarettes almost continuously, Lester appeared nervous this morning, when he refused to talk with newspaper reporters. After announcing late yesterday that he would make a statement today, the prisoner maintained his silence this morning.

Mr. Bradley announced that he would demand a hasty trial. The grand jury for the October term of 9th district court, which convenes Monday, will investigate the case.

BOY ADMITS STRANGLING TWELVE-YEAR-OLD SAYS HE KILLED AGED WIDOW

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—A 12-year-old boy was held on a charge of homicide today for strangling a 12-year-old widow who detected him stealing \$3 from her dresser.

Mrs. Clara Hewes, bed-ridden widow of "Hewes the Magician," died just as Edward Moran, Jani's son in the apartment in which she lived, was leaving her.

Edward, the boy quoted her as saying, "you put that back where it got it."

"Got to Wraslin'"
Edward, said in his confession to the police, "we got to wrasslin' and she tried to take the money from me. But I got my hands under her neck and gave her a squeeze, and she fell right back on bed. She was so still, I got scared. I then threw a brick through transom window to make everybody think it was robbers and went to school."

BANDITS REFUSE TO TESTIFY

LAMAR, Colo., Oct. 25 (AP)—Called by the state to testify against Ralph Fiegle, Lamar bank robber, whose confession led to the arrest of three members of the gang, George J. Abshier and Howard L. Abshier and Royston have been bitter against their former companion and have said he was the man who killed two of the four men slain in connection with the robbery.

"I couldn't testify and keep my self respect," Abshier announced when called to the stand.

"I figure I've got enough man wrapped up in me yet, not to be a rat," Royston said.

EL PASO, Oct. 25 (AP)—Hundreds of additional delegates, including 230 and a band from Fort Worth, arrived in this well advertised retreat of sunshine in a driving snow storm today for the last two days of the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Despite three consecutive days of unwholesome weather, El Pasoans continued to assert it all "very, very unusual."

The policy and work of the West Texas chamber for 1930 again stood forth as major subjects for consideration when delegates sought shelter from the snow storm in Liberty hall with an \$18,000 deficit still ominously in the background. There still was a distinct rumbling of dissolution or reorganization of the chamber, and talk revolved about the deficit and a dwindling interest in the past several months.

DR. HALL IS FOUND DEAD EARLY TODAY

DEATH COMES TO AGED PHYSICIAN ON HUNT ON ANDREWS RANCH

Dr. R. J. Hall, 68, pioneer physician of Lubbock and the South Plains, was found dead early this morning in his bed at the Richards & McWhorter ranch house, 35 miles southwest of Seminole in Andrews county, having succumbed sometime last night to severe heart attack, according to telephonic information received by the Daily Journal shortly before noon.

Dr. Hall, said to have been in excellent spirits and apparent good health when he left this city early Thursday morning, had gone to the ranch to spend several days on a hunting trip. He was accompanied by Dr. W. L. Baugh, Lubbock county health officer.

Had High Blood Pressure
According to his colleagues in this city, Dr. Hall has been in fairly good health, with exception of the fact that he had been troubled slightly with high blood pressure.

Coming to Lubbock in 1906, Dr. Hall was one of the few physicians in the then sparsely settled Plains who frequently went 25 and 30 miles on calls from the sick. He came here in the days of the horse and buggy, and he has watched Lubbock grow from a mere frontier town to

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—Cotton of the 1929 crop ginned prior to October 18 was announced today by the census bureau as 9,099,082 running bales, including 291,505 round bales counted as half bales, compared with 8,151,971 running bales, including 304,743 round bales, to that date last year.

Losses In Filmland Fire Lowered Today

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Oct. 25 (AP)—Losses incidental to the destruction of the laboratory here of the Consolidated Film Industries were tentatively fixed today at less than \$2,000,000 as a result of discovery that several of the valuable screen productions stored in the building were not damaged. Fears that the six vaults in the building might have been penetrated by fire, which would have destroyed master films within, were allayed by the opening of one room last night. Films were found in perfect condition.

DOZEN BODIES ARE PICKED UP FROM SHIP'S WRECKAGE TODAY; PROBE TO BE MADE

(By The Associated Press.)
MILWAUKEE, Oct. 25.—A dozen bodies marked today the resting place of a Lake Michigan steamer and revealed the fate of her crew of 54.

Each encased in a life belt, they floated among wreckage from their ill-fated ship, the grand trunk ferry Milwaukee, on the lake 16 miles southwest of Kenosha, Wis.

Boats Going Out
A half dozen boats were detailed to steam to the scene and complete the work of salvage today. Last night, searchers recovered the bodies and bits of wreckage, which told how the Milwaukee plunged to the bottom when she was unable to breast the battering waves of Tuesday night's storm and make port at her destination, Grand Haven.

Capitan Found
The story of the actual events leading up to the sinking seemed destined to remain locked in the bosom of Lake Michigan. The man who could have told it, he is Capt. Robert "Red Weather" McKay of Grand Haven, whose 50 years of battling the treacherous lake gales ended with defeat. His was the first body identified.

While searchers were writing the last entry in the log of the Milwaukee—fourteen federal investigators laid plans for an investigation of the tragedy, one of the worst since the Lady Elgin disaster in 1860.

Marine men here, discussing the cause for the disaster, believed freight cars carried in the hold were torn from their moorings by the buffeting of the storm. The weight of the cars, they thought, likely centered on one side of the ship, tipping her just as she was caught in the trough of the waves. One on her beam end, with water pouring in through the opening where the cars are loaded, she would have gone down quickly.

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DEATH TAKES AGED COWMAN

V. O. HILDRETH DIES OF PNEUMONIA IN DALLAS TODAY

(By Associated Press.)
DALLAS, Oct. 25.—V. O. Hildreth, 88, ranchman and one of the best known short-horn cattle exhibitors in the United States, succumbed today to an attack of pneumonia here.

The body was taken to Fort Worth pending funeral arrangements.

Owner of a 7,000 acre ranch near Aledo, where he had lived for 38 years, Hildreth captured many prizes in competing with other ranchmen in stock shows in Texas, Oklahoma, Minnesota, Nebraska, Illinois and Missouri. A Hildreth entry won the grand champion steer award at the Southwestern Exposition and Fair Stock show at Fort Worth this year. Last week at the State Fair of Texas at Dallas, another steer owned by Hildreth took the same honor.

FIVE HUNDRED MEN IN FIGHTING TODAY IN CALIFORNIA

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WOOL CO-OP IS ENDORSED

TEXAS ANGORA GOAT RAISERS APPROVE MARKETING PLAN

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANGELO, Oct. 25.—The board of directors of the Texas Angora Goat Raisers' association in meeting at Brackettville, recently endorsed the mohair cooperative concern chartered under the laws of Texas and made plans to gain a large membership of growers all over Texas.

It is proposed to handle mohair on the cooperative basis next spring when the crop will be short. F. O. Landrum of Laguna, has been in Chicago attending the meeting of the federal farm board. The concern has the assurance that money will be granted it by the board. It is to handle not only Texas mohair, which is 75 per cent of the nation's total, but hair from all over the nation. Organization of a federal aided loan company to finance growers while the mohair is being grown also was announced.

The organization asked that Bob Davis, F. O. Landrum and a goatman from Arizona be named advisory members of the federal farm board representing the wool and mohair interests.

It also voted its thanks to Representative John Garner for his aid to mohair growers. The same thanks was voted to Senator Tom Connally. 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BAR MEET TO CLOSE TODAY

ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND SELECTING CITY SET FOR TODAY

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 25.—The records jammed with recommendations and resolutions, the 52nd annual convention of the American Bar Association approached adjournment today with election of officers and selection of the next convention city.

Henry Upon Sims of Birmingham, Ala., and Frank Pace of Little Rock, Ark., appeared outstanding in discussion of a new president, and indications were the next annual meeting would go either to Chicago or Atlantic City.

The executive committee which announced many months ago that the bar association could not discuss the 18th amendment in convention with propriety, kept the subject off the floor. A wet wing of the association confined its fight

on the amendment to the sectional meetings.

Of reports the organization received, the one on radio law was the most far reaching and the one on law reform the most debated.

The committee on radio law was instructed to take steps it considered necessary to bring about repeal of the zone system and anti-monopoly provisions of the radio act of 1927 and to oppose enactment of any measure having for its purpose the establishment of a federal commission on communications, or any bill declaring broadcasting stations common carriers.

The convention accepted the criminal law section's recommendation of psychiatric treatment for felons, the service to be available at the courts and penal institutions. The association reaffirmed its recommendation that two years work in an accredited law school be made a prerequisite to bar admittance.

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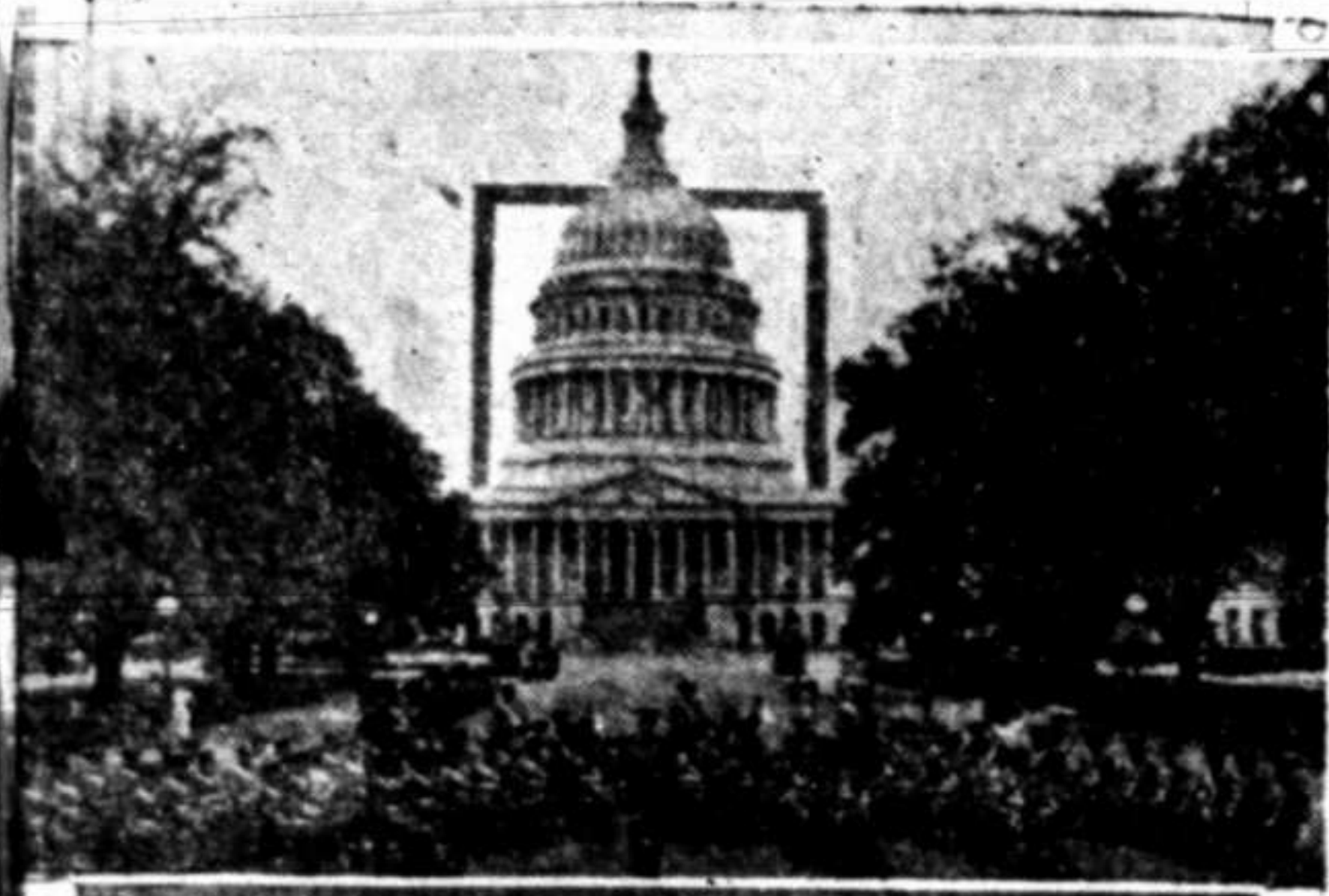

PAVING FOR AVENUE H IS AUTHORIZED

COMMISSIONERS VOTE TO ORDER WORK ON SOUTH PORTION

Acting favorably upon a proposal designed to eliminate a serious traffic hazard, the Lubbock city commission voted yesterday afternoon to pave seven blocks from the south end of Avenue H to the Denver crossing as soon as drainage problems between 20th and 21st streets can be settled.

The city engineer has been at work for several weeks on the drainage problem and expects to have a solution in the near future.

Presented by Citizens.

Petition for the paving on Avenue H was presented by a committee of eight citizens, headed by W. M. Crawford. The committee expressed its practicality as one of the property owners are anxious to cooperate in the program.

Avenue H, a street of entrance to this city for highways 9 and 7, has been a menace during rainy weather, due to the heavy traffic pouring into the busy thoroughfare.

The commission will meet next

Thursday evening with a committee from the local Lions club at which time the Lions proposal for assistance in the development of a municipal park will be considered.

The subject of city planning, for some months one of the main projects of the commission, was discussed and cooperation between the body and the Board of City Development is expected to crystallize at an early date for some definite procedure.

Action on a petition by 25 property owners to extend the corporate limits to an addition of more than 800 acres was delayed until the next meeting. Should this action be favorable to the petition Lubbock taxable valuations would be increased approximately \$250,000.

Irons, North Texas college band; and Arthur Layton, Paris municipal band. A gold medal will be awarded each of them.

The Magnolia band will receive \$400 and a loving cup for winning

Thursday's contest, and another loving cup as state champion. The Southern Pacific Band of Houston was second winning \$200.

A cup will be presented the Gold Medal band of Memphis as the "best appearing band."

ROAD BETWEEN CITIES TO CHANGE

AUSTIN, Oct. 25.—The Austin-San Antonio highway will soon be shorter and wider. Plans for building the road on a new location to eliminate 11 railroad crossings in the 88 miles are progressing rapidly and the public will have access to a new road from end to end within three years, Gibb Gilchrist, state highway engineer, announced after a trip of inspection over the route. The 88 miles will be reduced to 77. Many dangerous curves will be

ironed out. As the road is at present it has a reputation of being one of the most dangerous in the state, Gilchrist said.

"When we get through with it, it will be one of the safest," he said.

The president sent a telegram to the parents of the young man expressing regret of himself and Mrs. Hoover that this accident should have happened and another message to the Mayor of Madison expressing regret at the injury of three other guardsmen.

Broomcorn Crop Is Short In Oklahoma

LINDSAY, Okla., Oct. 25. (P)—A low broomcorn yield is predicted this year for western Oklahoma, which ordinarily produces about half the nation's supply.

Buyers and growers claim the state's decreased yield is due to smaller acreage and thinness of stand, caused by lack of sufficient rain. Wheat has replaced broomcorn in many fields.

Milk Strike Goes On In Kansas City

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 25. (P)—With peace discussions promised in the near future by civic leaders, sympathizers with striking Kansas City milk producers today continued their milk dumping warfare, undaunted by the arrest yesterday of three of their number.

Twenty men in motor cars today built a barricade across a highway near Belton, Mo., halted a truck and dumped 150 gallons of milk consigned to a pasteurization plant.

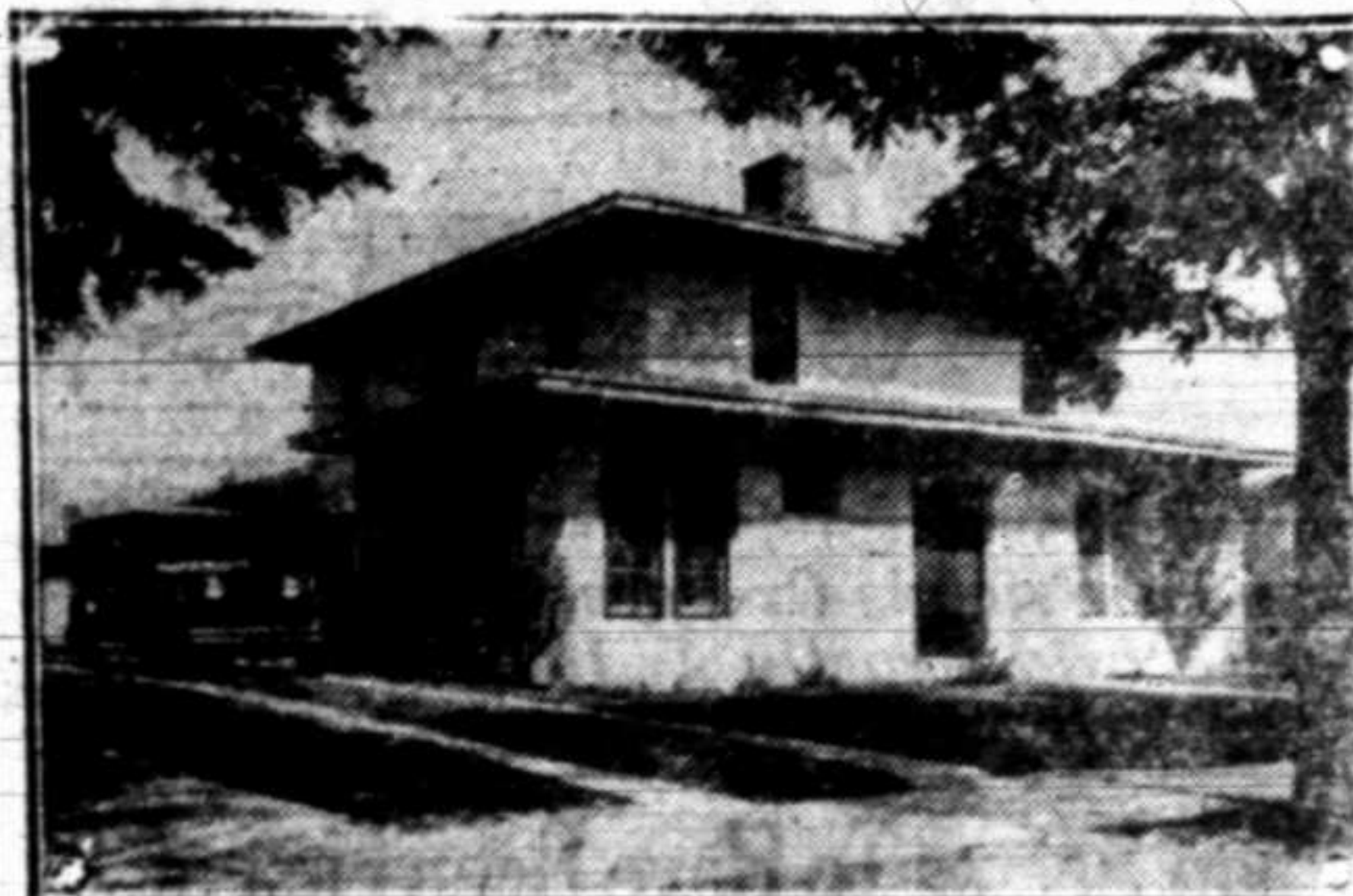

RALLY TODAY

TRADING QUIETS DOWN

ON OPENING; GAINS ARE REGISTERED

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (AP)—Stock prices staged a broad rally at the opening of the market today, and trading quieted down to more reasonable proportions, large blocks changing hands. Canadian Pacific was a high flier, jumping 18 1/2 points. Eastman Kodak gained 5 1/2 points. United Aircraft 3 1/2. Consolidated Gas 3 1/2. New York Central 1 3/4. Paramount 1 1/2. U. S. Steel, American Telephone and Anaconda each one. The only large block in the initial transactions to appear on the tape was one of 10,000 shares of Westinghouse up 3 points.

Reassuring advice of bankers, together with optimistic statements by several steel company heads and the decline of \$167,000,000 in brokers' loans appeared to have bolstered up speculative confidence in remarkable fashion. A little more distress selling appeared during early trading, on the part of weak holders whose accounts did not get cleaned out yesterday, but this was readily absorbed.

Kodak Increases Gain

Eastman Kodak soon increased its gain to 12 1/2, and A. M. Byers jumped 19 points. Industrial Alcohol and Standard Oil moved up 7 1/2 and 6 1/2 respectively. American Power and Light, American and Foreign Power, National Cash Register, General Electric, Radio and others 3 to 4 points. U. S. Steel, however, after selling up 11 1/2 points lost its gain, and American Can slipped back a couple of points.

A few isolated weak spots were uncovered. Fox Film dropped 6 points, and First National Stores 4 1/2, while Crucible Steel, Webster Electric, Industrial Rayon and Southern Railway lost 2 to 3.

Foreign exchanges opened firm, with cables at 4.86, a shade lower.

COTTON GOES DOWN TODAY

FIRST TRADES SHOW LOSSES; GINNINGS CAUSE DROP

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 25. (AP)—First trades showed losses of 2 to 7 points at the opening of the cotton market with the tone quiet and a shade easier due to cables hardly as good as due.

A slight rally on the former tone in the stock market, was soon lost on the ginnings report which showed total ginnings, prior to October 18, of 9,999,082 running bales, somewhat larger than expected. December dropped 17.96, January to 18, of 9,999,032 running bales, some 14 points down from early highs.

Near the end of the first hour the market was steadier and showed gains of 6 to 7 points from the lows. The market was comparatively quiet all morning. After a moderate dip on the ginnings report prices gradually improved in sympathy with the better stock market and owing to the colder weather in the belt.

December traded up to 18.18, January to 18.23 and March to 18.56, or 19 to 22 points above early lows and 6 to 9 points above yesterday's close. At noon the market was steady and at the highs.

DECLINE IS FROM 5 TO 11 IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (AP)—Cotton prices opened steady at a decline of 5 to 11 points with December and January deliveries selling 14 to 16 points net lower during early trading under liquidation or reselling influenced by larger ginning figures than expected, relatively easy cables and failure of the easy weather map to show any spread of killing frosts in the south.

The market was within two or three points of the lowest at the end of the first half hour.

Trading in current October contracts ended at noon today. Circulation of a few notices caused some liquidation which sent the price of new October off to 17.83 during early trading, or 34 points net lower.

BANKERS' STATEMENTS CHECK WORST STOCK MARKET DEBACLE IN U. S. HISTORY

WALL STREET HAS GREATEST PLUNGE DURING THURSDAY

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Reassuring
statements issued by five leading
bankers of the country from the of-
fice of J. P. Morgan and company,
checked the worst stock market
debacle in the history of Wall street
yesterday.

"While prices were plunging under
the weight of millions of shares
hurled into the market from the
Morgan offices. After a brief confer-
ence Thomas W. Lamont, partner in
the Morgan firm, speaking for the
group said their consensus was the
foundations of the market were
sound; the market smash had been
caused by technical, rather than
fundamental, considerations; and
many sound stocks were selling too
low.

Tide Is Stemmed
The statements, backed by sub-
stantial buying orders for key stocks,
stemmed the tide, but it was 10:45
until 7:08 p. m., four hours, eight
minutes and thirty seconds after
the close of the market, when the
ticker printed the last quotation,
that the strength of the rally was
known.

The day broke all records for
breadth and volume of trade. A

total of 12,894,650 shares, represent-
ing 974 separate issues, figured in
the day's transactions. The previ-
ous record was 8,246,740 shares, es-
tablished last March 26.

After the close of the market the
same bankers who had met earlier
in the day assembled again in the
Morgan offices. They were Charles
F. Mitchell, chairman of the Na-
tional City bank; Albert H. Wiggin,
chairman of the Chase National
bank; William Potter, president of
the Guaranty Trust company; Se-
ward Prosser, chairman of the
Bankers' Trust company, and Mr.
Lamont.

They said they had inquired di-
rectly from stock exchange authori-
ties and had learned no member
firms were in difficulty.

WASHINGTON KEEPS
CLOSE EYE ON MARKET
WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (P).—Of-
ficial Washington kept a watchful
eye on Wall street today and ex-
pressed the optimistic of unofficial
opinion that the disastrous slump
in security prices need have no de-
pressing effect upon the general
business structure of the nation.

The view was advanced in many
quarters that the stock market
break was in no way a reflection of
any factor in the business world
and that the latter is at present
upon such a sound economic basis
there should be no fear of a gen-
eral depression.

Business Unaffected
Many attempts were made to con-
struct the action of the federal re-

serve board in meeting late, yester-
day with Secretary Mellon attend-
ing and adjourning without an-
nouncement of a changing redis-
count rate or of any other step
which might affect the situation in
Wall street. From this was drawn
the view the board either considers
the crisis past or shares the general
opinion that business will be unaf-
fected by the security decline.

It was pointed out that for months
the highly speculative condition of
the stock market had been beyond
reaction to ordinary and normal in-
fluences from the field of actual
business. Moreover, it was asserted
the present situation had been fore-
seen by virtually all credit institu-
tions some time ago with the result
that precautions were taken to safe-
guard their positions.

TRANS-ATLANTIC STOCK
MARKET RALLIES TODAY
LONDON, Oct. 25 (P).—Trans-At-
lantic stocks showed a better ten-
dency at the opening of the stock
exchange today. Wall street's final
rally being responsible for recover-
ies from the lowest touched in the
street here last night. A good deal
of profit taking took place on spec-
ulative issues recently and it was be-
lieved losses on yesterday's slump
would not be severe.
