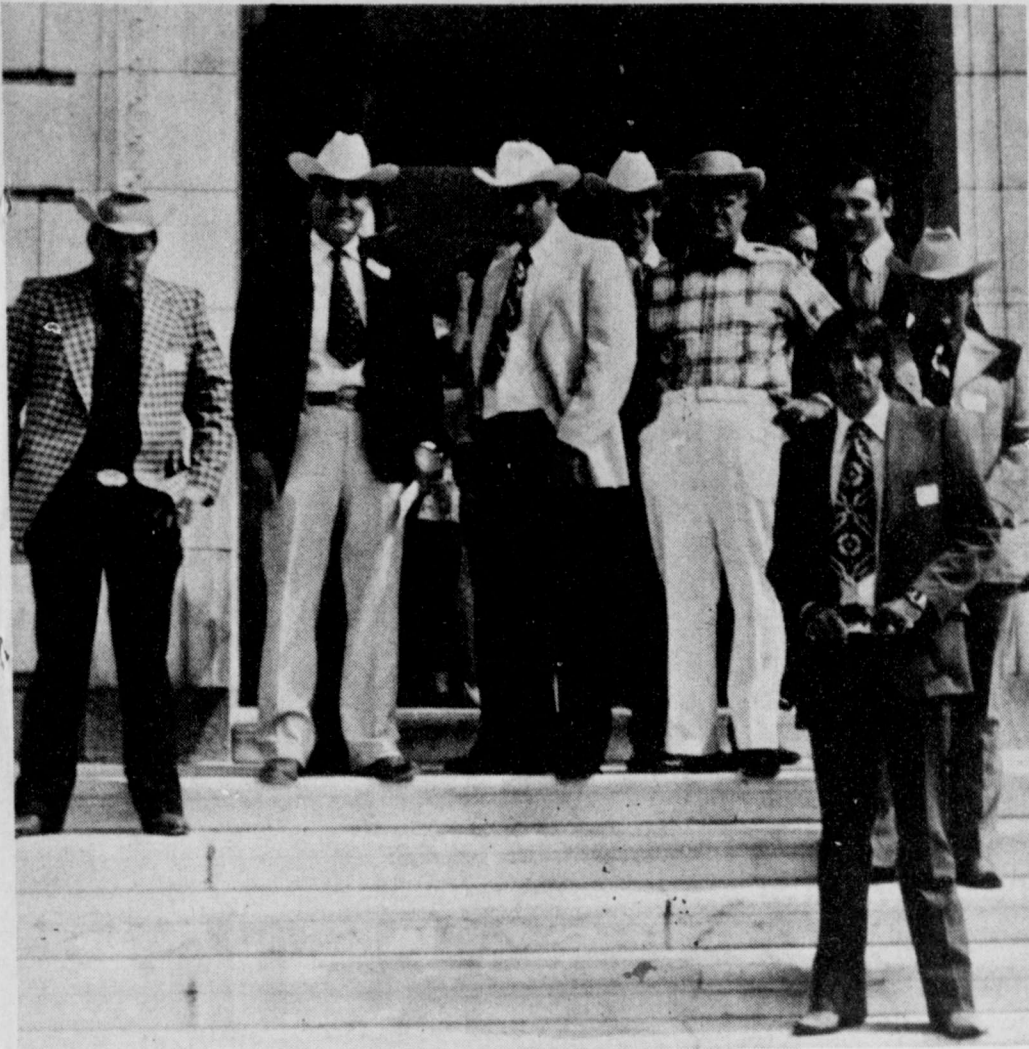

Boots And Stetsons Visit Washington

A group of 26 Red River County cattlemen, who went to Washington, D. C. last week in a quest for help for the struggling beef and dairy industry, was joined by representatives from other cities and states, who returned with promises of help and sympathy from the officials with whom they spoke.

Marion Mitchell, vice-president of the First National Bank in Bogata and a cattleman, said that nothing tangible could really be attributed to the journey, but that he hoped something would come from it.

The approximately 300 Texans in Stetsons and cowboy boots saw as many congressmen, senators and other officials as possible, with Lee Perkins of Clarksburg among those who talked with Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz.

High spots of the trip were a conference with Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz and an unexpected session with Mrs. Ann Armstrong, consumer affairs adviser to President Ford.

They found perhaps their strongest big-name supporter is Senator Hubert Humphrey, whom they stopped on the street and who turned out to be almost as aroused about the dairy and livestock situation as they were.

Contrary to predictions heard earlier, the eight spokesmen found Secretary Butz cooperative and also well versed on the problem.

Butz was willing to make no specific promises, however, except to refer to the USDA hearing October 8-9 on a possible increase in the government support price of milk.

The secretary also expressed hope the grain crop might turn out to be larger than anticipated if killing frost does not appear early in the Middle West and announced that a ban on Canadian beef

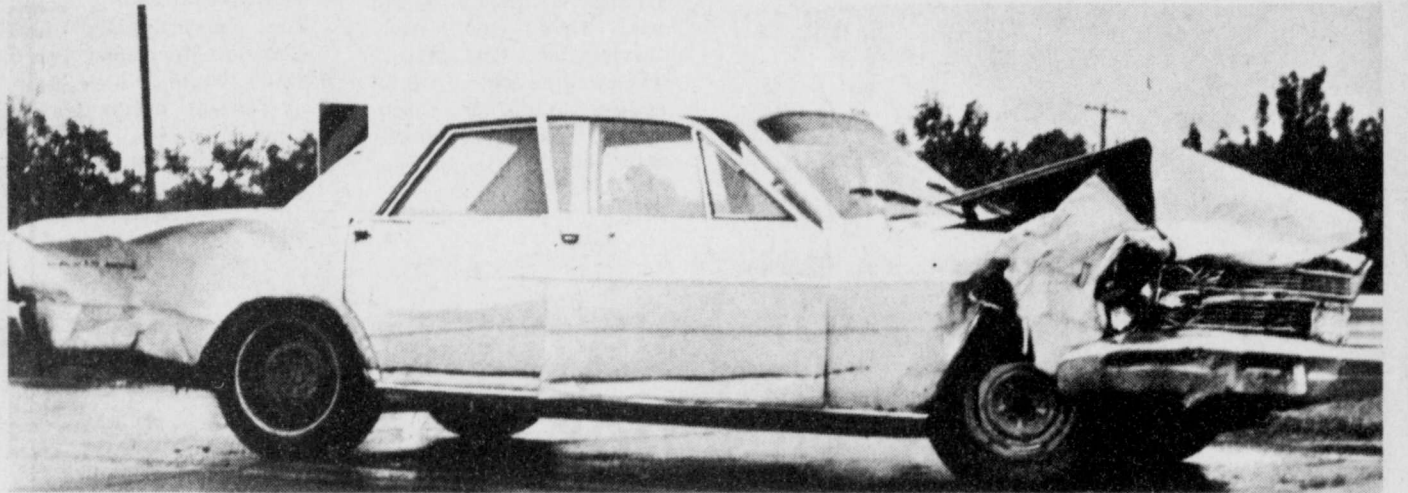

Deport Man Breaks Out Of Lamar County Jail

A 17-year-old Deport youth, in Lamar County jail for both burglary and absent without leave charges, made a short-lived bid for freedom about 4:15 p.m. Friday afternoon. He was captured only 40 minutes later by Paris Police and county officers almost two miles from the jail in northwest Paris.

Jimmy Dell Seat, 17, put a knife to the back of Lamar County Jailor Richard Parsons, forcing Parsons to accompany him down an emergency staircase, where he freed him and ran, Parsons wrote in his report.

An intensive search followed, with county officers, Department of Public Safety and city officers searching. City Patrolmen spotted the youth on West Cherry Street and lost him again.

City patrolman Andy Smith later spotted the youth hidden in some weeds and bushes behind 1035 W. Shiloh St., where he told Seat to come out with his hands up and empty.

Smith fired a warning shot "in case he had any ideas of his own," Smith's report said.

According to reports, Seat had first traveled downtown then turned north wearing a football jersey which he later discarded. Officers, however, only spotted him one time near West Cherry Street in the northwest part of the city near the railroad tracks. Officers had radioed that the youth might attempt to hop a freight train near the tracks to escape. Area citizens, however, constantly informed police units of the escapee's whereabouts.

According to Parsons' report, he had released Seat from his cell in the county jail when Seat asked to call his recruiter. Parsons added that Seat told him that his recruiter was to call him back, so Parsons allowed Seat to remain outside his cell. The report said that Seat then asked Parsons for some personal items and when Parsons turned to retrieve them, Seat pulled a screwdriver out of a drawer, to

Parsons' side. Parsons said he then spun around and struggled with Seat, when Seat pulled a knife from the property rack.

Seat then told Parsons, the report said to unlock rear doors and follow him down the

staircase, leaving Parsons on the third floor.

"We got him quick," Lamar County Chief Deputy Richard Eatherly said. "He didn't get too far. Despite all the vast amount of information (received during the break) we had all officers in the vicinity and had it covered up."

Eatherly added after the search that his department "could never have lived with it if he had got away."

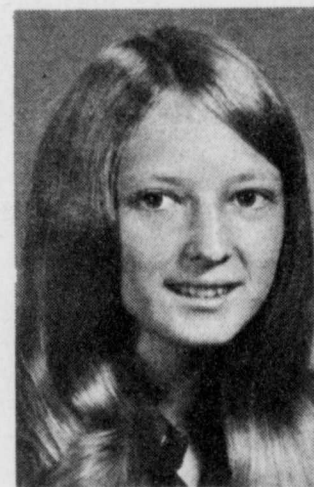
Lamar County Sheriff Louie Noles was out of the city during the jailbreak.

Eatherly said earlier Friday morning, before the break, that the office had been warned of an impending escape attempt and a shake-down order had taken place Wednesday night in which several contraband items, including razors, spray, sharpened coat hangers, metal straps, and a short wooden club had been confiscated out of the cell blocks. Eatherly said he had no idea how such items had gotten into the cell blocks.

Eatherly said his department had been concerned about a jailbreak since "we've been here."

Seat was returned to a maximum security cell.

The short session dealt only with the rate increase, and the vote for approval was unanimous. Mayor Clifford Barnard expressed hope that a state commission for regulating utilities be established before the next projected rate increase two years from now, as small towns and even cities do not have the personnel or the

funds to investigate the true financial status of utility companies.

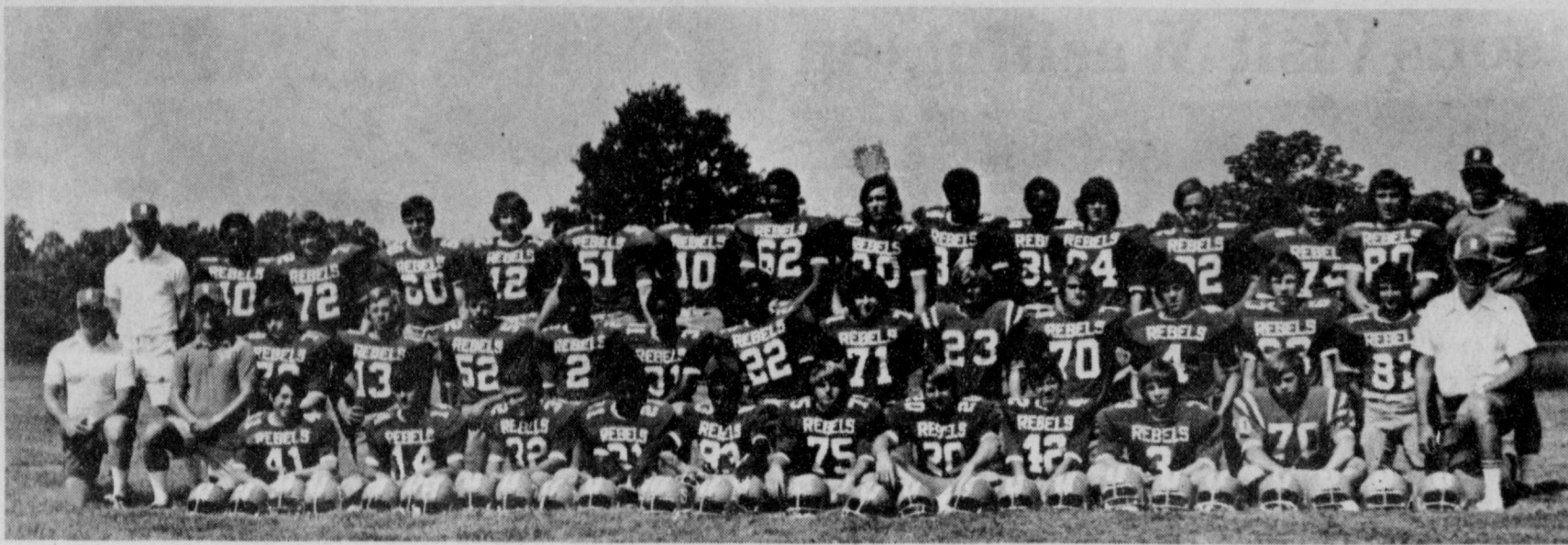

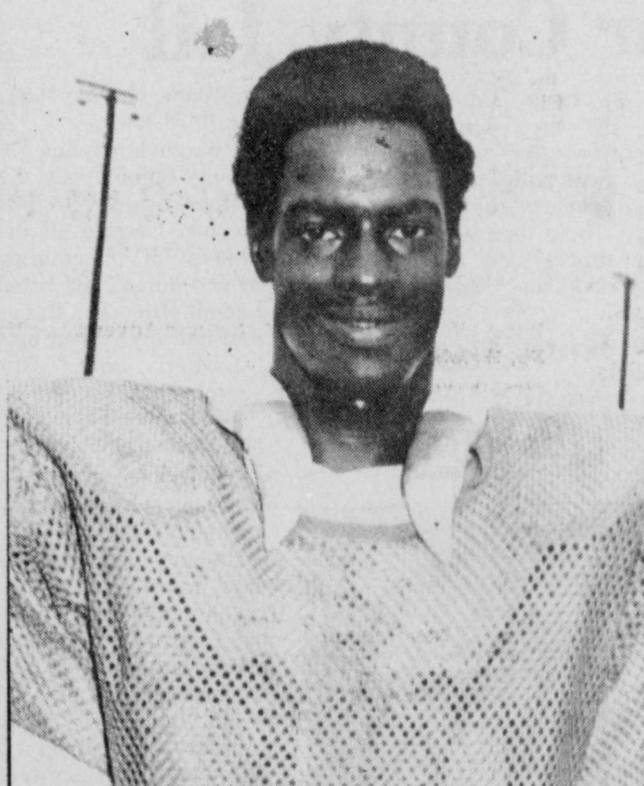

ETSU Has Record Fall Enrollment

A record total of 9,808 students are enrolled for the fall semester at the East Texas State university campuses in Commerce and Texarkana, according to figures released by the ETSU Office of Admissions and Records.

The Commerce campus enrollment of 9,238 is a 5.4 per cent increase over last fall's 8,762. The figure represents the highest fall enrollment in the Commerce campus' history.

The 570 students enrolled at the Texarkana Campus show an increase of 35 students over last fall's total.

A breakdown of the figures for the Commerce campus reveals a 21.8 per cent increase in the freshman class over last year's figures, a 2.6 per cent increase in the sophomore class and 12.9 per cent increase in the graduate class.

The Commerce campus total is composed of 1,991 freshmen, 1,316 sophomores, 1,520 juniors, 1,481 seniors and 2,930 graduates.

The 9,238 total on the Commerce campus marks the third time in the university's 85-year history that the enrollment has topped the 9,000 mark.

would go into effect that day.

The crusading Northeast Texas Dairymen apparently underestimated the impact of their trip to Washington.

As a result they were pleasantly surprised by an announcement by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Friday afternoon.

It declared the USDA will recommend an increase of up to 13 percent in the minimum price paid farmers for fluid (Class I) milk.

A firm decision will be made following a hearing on the proposal October 8 in the Chicago area.

An immediate increase in the milk support price was the No. 1 item in the program for easing the cost-price squeeze disaster afflicting the dairy and beef industries presented in Washington Thursday.

The October hearing had been announced earlier last week, but no indication of the USDA position was given the group which met with Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz Thursday.

It was estimated that the proposed price increase on the farm might result in a hike of 2 cents a quart in the retail cost of milk if it all is passed along by middlemen. Milk prices have been declining since spring while farm costs soared.

Congressman Wright Patman arranged for the appointment with Butz and Jim Farris of Paris, Republican candidate for Congress, set up the session with Mrs. Armstrong.

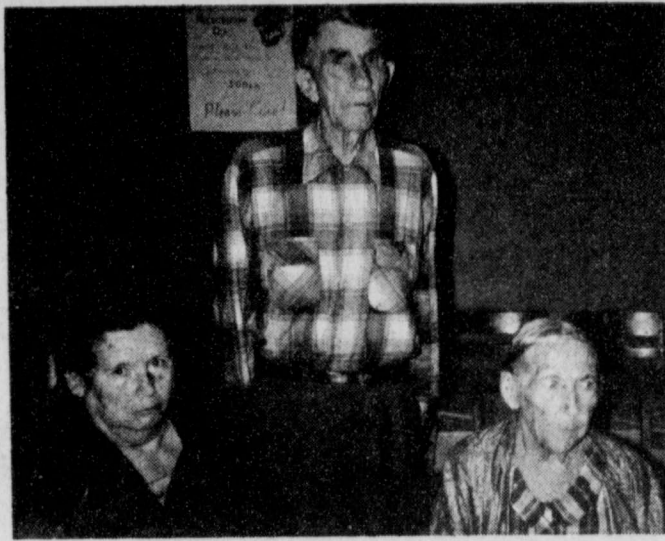
