Art Festival Letters Mailed

Letters of invitation announcing Littlefield Sidewalk Art Show have been sent out to area art clubs, newspapers and radio and T. V. stations by Mrs. Bill Orr, committee member, and Lee Burnett, chairman of "We, The Women," sponsors of the show.

The unique and colorful event is scheduled here Friday, Aug. 25, at 5 to 8 p.m. "We, The Women," of Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, have arranged for the show to be staged on the west side of Phelps Avenue between 4th and 6th Streets. Letters explaining entries may register at 519 Phelps and, "In case of inclement weather the show will be moved inside."

Winners will be selected by vote of the people viewing entries. Voters must be 12 years or more in age. Lee Burnett said voting slips have been prepared. Numbers will be placed over names of artists and voters will list choices by number.

Adult and Student Divisions each will have first, second and third place winners. For adults, top prize will be \$35, with ribbons for second and third. Best student artwork (ages 12-18) will receive a \$25 Savings Bond, with ribbons going to second and third. A third group is designed to

encourage children under 12 years of age to enter. Ribbon awards will be given.

The letters state, "Bring your paintings, sculpture, ceramics and stitchery. Set up and sell your own show. No entry fees; no limit to number of paintings." No sub-categories have been arranged. The public will determine the winning artwork from among all entries shown. An added attraction will be continuous demonstrations given by Littlefield High School art students taught by Mrs. Hazel Ward.

Wounded Marine Defies North Vietnamese Guns

Life has moved at an accelerated pace for Marine Corporal Domingo Trevino, Jr., since he was wounded recently in the vicinity of Quang Tri, Vietnam. He was flown to San Francisco, then to San Antonio, and at last report was being treated in Corpus Christi.

Trevino is a son of Domingo Trevino Sr., of Littlefield, and Mrs. Estefana Trevino of San Marcos. The marine is a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Contreras of 1412 Copeland Avenue, College Heights, Littlefield.

Trevino was a radio operator at a forward post command which is normally protected by other units in an area about two miles below the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam, near Con Thien. The Bravo Company started out to sweep the area. "We started drawing heavy sniper fire and direct fire. We were pinned down along an open area along a trail," Trevino said. "The North Vietnamese were in the jungle all around us -- dug in. We fired back, but every few minutes someone got hit. We were spread out along the trail and never got a chance to dig in. There was only brush for protection."

Trevino's first wound came about three hours after the firing started. A bullet, possibly

fired by a sniper in a tree, crashed through his legs. He said the shooting then slowed down. "I thought they had killed everybody," he remarked. The loss of blood and heat caused Trevino to lose consciousness. When he awoke, he saw several North Vietnamese

firing a machine gun nearby. Instead of keeping quiet, the young man, a veteran of 14 months of Vietnamese fighting, lifted his M-16 rifle and emptied the 17 bullet magazine at the enemy.

He was unable to reload because

Joyner Praises Successor

Jim Joyner resigned as president of Littlefield Chamber of Commerce during a meeting of the Board of Directors Tuesday night, and President-elect Warren Dayton was elected unanimously as the Chamber's new head.

Joyner told The Leader-News Wednesday morning, "Dayton has been the hardest 'work-horse' on the entire Board during my six months as president. They're getting a highly capable man."

The resignation was from both the presidency and from the Board, but Joyner said he will remain a member of the Chamber "as long as I am in Littlefield." No new board member was named.

Basic reason for the resignation, Joyner said, is "I had to decide whether to stay with the drygoods business or go into a new business. In Littlefield, we have such nice, well-equipped drygood stores we don't need another."

Joyner, former manager of Penney's, has had 27 years experience in drygoods.

He added, "I have had several opportunities for franchises in other fields which I think would be good for Littlefield, but highly specialized parts men are needed. I knew nothing about these businesses and feel I need to remain in the field in which I have experience."

Joyner told the Board he did not believe he should remain in the position of president of the Chamber under the present circumstances.

Dayton, as president-elect, has been training for the presidency next year. He has been (See DAYTON Page 12)

Man Identified As Released Convict

Littlefield police apprehended and arrested here Monday about 3:45 p.m. a man who turned out to be an ex-convict and allegedly had stolen as many as four vehicles since released from the Oklahoma Penitentiary Aug. 4, according to Police Chief F. A. Fitzgerald.

Fred David Martin Jr., who first gave his name as Fred Dale Martin Jr., and his age as 25, was arrested at the cemetery here after a tip to police from the cemetery's supervisor.

A man in an automobile parked in the cemetery aroused the supervisor's suspicions and police were called.

Fitzgerald said police went to the scene but the man had gone.

The chief said, "We ran a check on the license number of the car and were notified it had been stolen at Floydada."

Police then returned to the scene and after a search discovered the car in the west

portion of the cemetery behind some trees, but the man had disappeared. Fitzgerald said they began searching for him but Patrolman Billy Reese remained with the stolen car. In the car, the man had left a shirt and other items.

Reese began looking in the vicinity near the car and discovered a man in a nearby lake. The man was underwater but bobbing his head up at intervals to breathe. Reese spotted him during one of these intervals.

The man, who carried no identification but said his name was Martin, told police he had not eaten in four days.

Officers from Floydada came after Martin Monday afternoon and placed him in custody there.

Fitzgerald said Martin reportedly had stolen a vehicle in Oklahoma which he abandoned at Paducah where he stole another, then again switched vehicles at Matador and finally stole the car at Floydada.

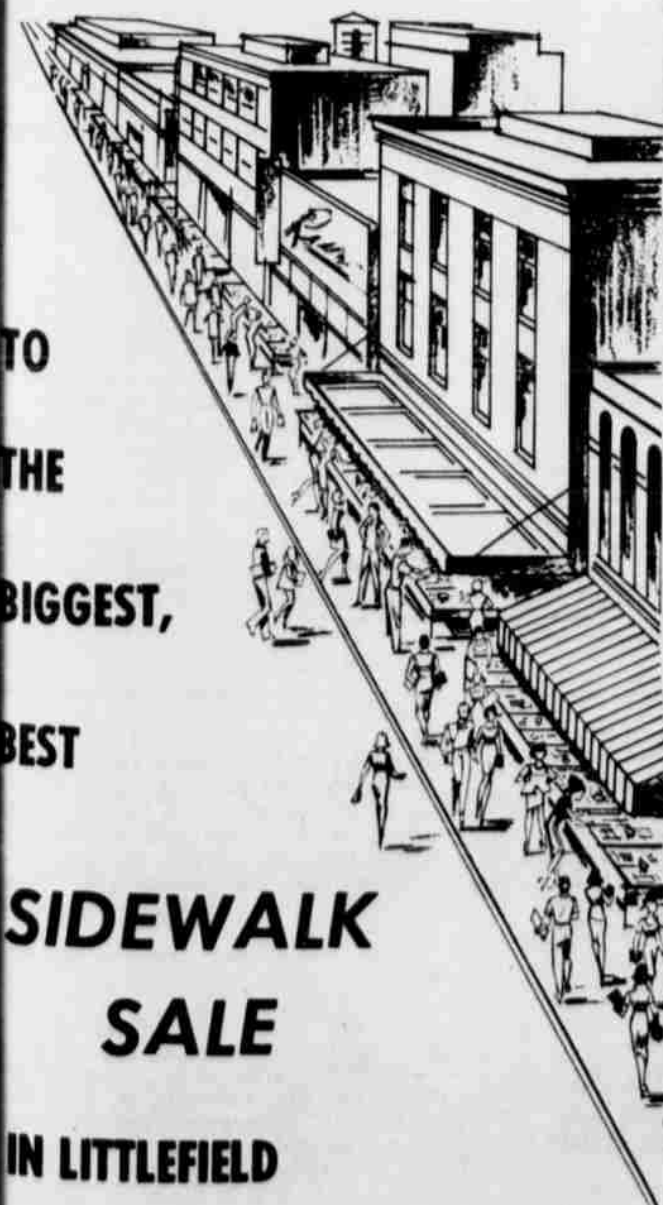

WE ARE at war, no matter what Congress doesn't declare.

Vietnam is no game.

A lot of people forget that Americans are spilling blood in stinking rice paddies. We sit here at home and everything's rationing, no scrap drives, no nothing.

Our soldiers have it lousy over there. It's brought home in a letter from a 19-year-old Michigan boy. He wrote it after he was wounded in Vietnam. Read it and

"I STILL REMEMBER everything that happened on the 19th of June just as if I was there again. I think of it every day. I remember everything that was said and done at that time. Every night before I fall asleep I think of it, of how scared I was and how the bullet and everything felt. I will never forget that as long as I live.

"The bullet didn't really hurt at first, my hand, at the time, I couldn't even feel it. It felt like it had no feeling at all. And my chest gave me a funny feeling over like I was going to die; it kind of knocked the wind out of me, and my body felt all over. Then finally it started to hurt, breathing was a little hard, but I was scared.

"The blood was running all over the place into a little puddle that was there and the water was all red and my head was spinning in that. I couldn't move because I was afraid the VC's would shoot at me again and really put an end to everything.

"I just had to lay there. No one could see me because the VC's were shooting right at my head and I was too much in the open, just kept yelling for help and my body behind cover, just watched me. There's nothing they could do at the time and finally a helicopter gunship came in and started to shoot rockets and mine guns at the VC's.

"THAT WAS WHEN my squad leader, friend and a medic came out to me, but the VC's were still shooting at us. The medic and the squad leader pulled me to somewhere about 30 yards away. There I waited while. Then a helicopter landed right behind me. They put me on that and flew me to a hospital where I went into the operating room away.

"A lot of guys laid out there for about 15 hours. The helicopter couldn't land because four of them were shot down. The helicopter landed for me I don't know. The pilot took a hell of a chance just for me. I was the first one to get out of there, I guess God was really with me that day. I am lucky to be alive today. The bullet he had killed me if it had went just one inch to the left (it would have hit my head) so I thank God every day.

"What the army is going to do with me I don't know. I imagine I will probably be sent back to Vietnam. But I keep praying that they will send me back to the States where I am safe."

He said, "We can stop it, we must stop it, we will stop it!"

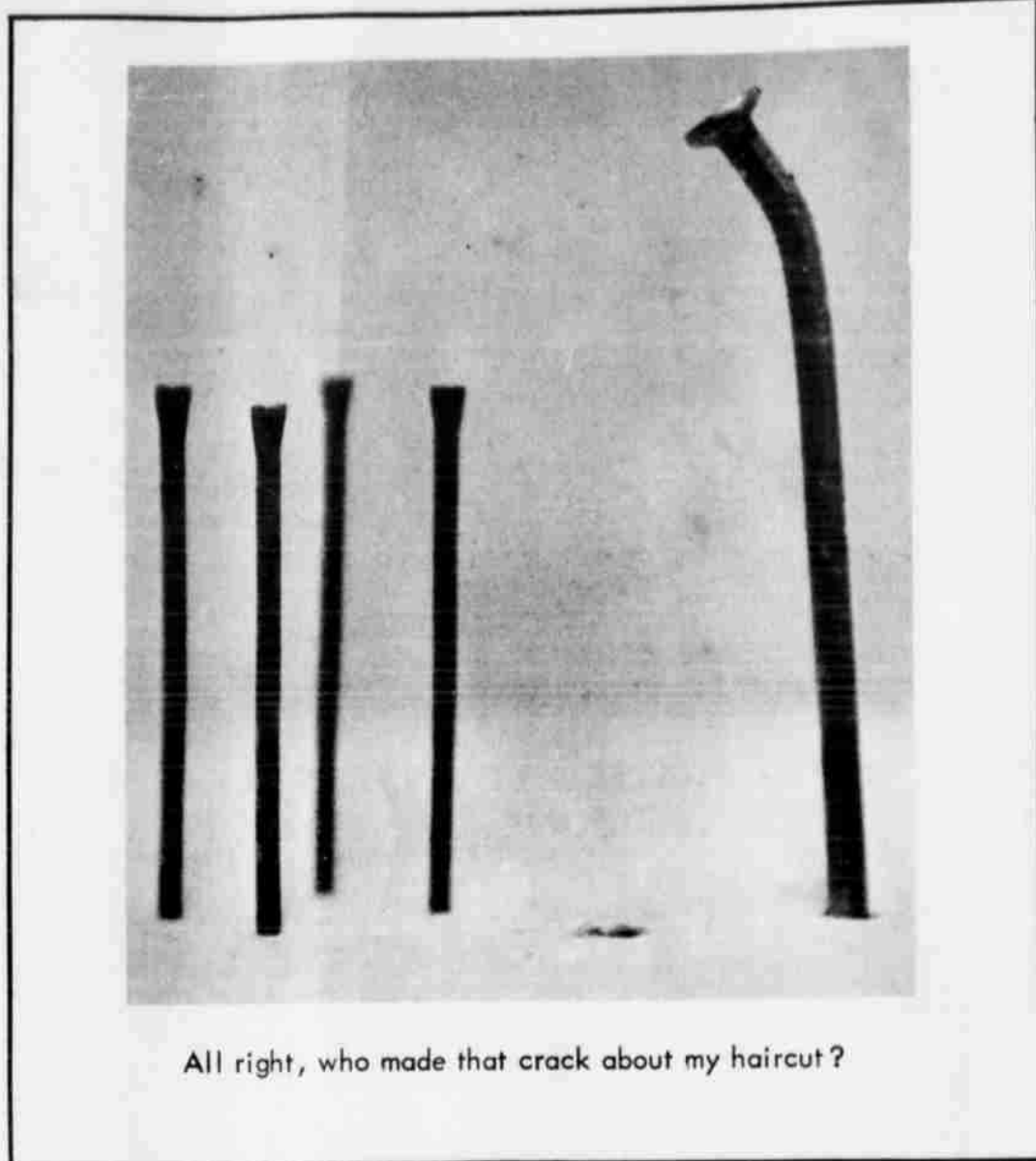
Now, after scores are dead and thousands of miles of America the Beautiful are in ashes, our Vice President is "ashamed" of those who protest grievances with violence . . .

Career For Jurists



(Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnsgrass farm comes up with an odd idea this week, but it's not the first time.)

Dear editor:

I was looking over a three-week-old newspaper I found in some weeds out here on this Johnsgrass farm yesterday -- you know, there's a lot to be said for a paper that old, what was headlined as a major crisis then by now has turned into something you can hardly remember, and you can relax and read worry-free.

At any rate, over on an inside page I read about a murder trial where it already had taken five weeks to pick a jury and they were still three short. I presume they finally made it, but that's beside the point. I thought of something else.

I talked with a neighbor who got called to jury duty some time past and he said as he understood it, the job of lawyers on both sides was to find 12 people who didn't know anything about the case.

With newspapers, radio and television going 24 hours a day, not to mention women, this is getting harder and harder to do.

Therefore, I have a suggestion for the courts. Why not specialize? If you're going to send some men on a space flight, you don't go out on the street and pick up a few, do you? Of course not. You pick them carefully ahead of time and keep them in training.

The same would work with juries. What the courts ought to do is pick 12 fair-minded, reputable men interested in a jury career and sign them up for say a four-year term. Lock them up in comfortable quarters, pay them a first-rate salary, feed and exercise them carefully, but don't let them find out anything. After all you never know what citizen, however prominent, may be involved next. No newspapers, no radio, and no newscasts on television, just Gunsmoke and sports and soap operas if they can take them.

With 12 men with fresh minds and completely out of touch with everything, every case could go to trial immediately, or as soon as the lawyers on both sides got through with their customary delays. Just get set, get the judge in place, call for quiet, then open the door and let the 12 in and start the testimony.

In the long run I believe this would be cheaper than bringing in 75 to 150 people every time a trial comes up and spending a week getting down to the 12 who know the least.

I doubt if this would work, but if you've ever spent any time on a jury panel waiting around in a court room, you got to admit it's worth thinking about.

18 Per Cent Lost In County Cotton

The season's first estimate of 1967 cotton production from 23 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers Inc. adds up to 1,173,500 bales, down from 1,278,616 bales produced in 1966, and 46 per cent below the 1961-65 average over 2,175,000 bales.

Almost every county in the area has been hurt to some extent by the elements, but Hale County has the dubious honor of toppling the list. Hale County farmers planted or planned to plant 168 acres and have lost about 33 per cent of that total, most to hail.

Lamb and Hockley Counties were also badly hurt in this category, losing 18 and 16 per cent respectively.

This is the second year of a new four-year cotton program acted by Congress in 1965 which offsets strong payment incentives to farmers for reducing acreage up to 35 per cent.

Under this program High Plains farmers signed up to plant 1,430,384 acres of 65.6 per cent of the 2,198,908 acres available for planting.

But according to the first estimate, compiled jointly by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange, total "standing" acreage of the 23 counties is only 1,250,000. Some planting intentions were foiled by a lack of sufficient moisture until the planting deadline had gone by and other acreage has been lost to rain, hail and wind storms.

The Cotton Exchange and PCG make the estimate each year using information gained from county agriculture agents, producers, ASCS offices and others. The first guess made each year on the first of August, then revised on the 15th of each month until the final estimate is made Dec. 1.

Hardest hit by the spring drought has been Howard County where only 30,500 acres of an intended 47,477 acres are standing -- a loss of 37 per cent to dry weather.

Rambling Europe Recollections Made By Earth Baylor Student

(Editor's Note: Miss Jill McCord, sophomore student at Baylor University, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat McCord of Earth, made a tour of Europe during July. She recently wrote the following "rambling" report of her trip.)

MY MEMORIES of Europe don't come to me in a vast snow storm, but in small flakes caught here and there in the wind. Each member of the tour group, mostly Baylor students or former Baylor students, helps bring events to life. Managing all the many moods and activities of this group were Dr. and Mrs. Lynn. Dr. Lynn is a European history professor at Baylor. He was also "papa", who insisted through all sorts of trials, we were the "creme de la creme."

I MAY AS WELL take this excursion chronologically to keep my wandering memories in some semblance of order.

England, rolling and green, with her tiny cottages surrounded by a huge mixed flower bouquet, enchanted us at once. Learning London's subway system, getting lost around Carnaby Street, feeling a part of Picaresque Circus with its flashing neon signs declaring what was showing, and freezing amidst the crowd to see the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace, kept us busy in London.

Westminster Abbey and the tombs of renowned kings, statesmen, and poets, brought history to reality, as did Big Ben and the houses of Parliament. Windsor Castle, where the Queen spends most of her time, is out of King Arthur. That reminds me, we supposedly saw King Arthur's round table near Winchester Cathedral. In Bath, named because of the old Roman baths found there, we attended an opera presented during the Bath festival. Stratford-upon-Avon was still strictly Elizabethan.

BY THE ROYAL Shakespeare theatre a park lies and the Avon cradles swans. "As You Like It" was performed excellently here. Antique shopping in Warwick brings bittersweet memories of what was bought and what was left behind. A short drive from Warwick is Coventry and its most impressive cathedral. Coventry Cathedral was bombed during World War II, leaving only the shell and spire. The altar now holds a charred cross, made from burned beams, and the inscription "Father Forgive."

Adjoining the shell is an ultra-modern Coventry Cathedral. In its building and decorations are used the materials of modern man -- copper, glass, and aluminum. The cross of nails from the old Cathedral is resting within the High Altar Cross.

My mind next takes me to warmth of the Oxford Student Union where we had lunch on a very cold day.

ENGLAND is behind and Holland reached by way of overnight cross-channel steamer. Amsterdam was much too charming for such a short visit as we made. Her windmills, canals, homes and people seemed to show a robust and growing land. Her language assured us we were no longer in England; we were now on the continent.

In Amsterdam Herr Muller joined us -- he was to be our bus driver, (and friend), until Geneva.

We entered Germany and the Ruhr Valley on a Monday. Smog filled, it is apparent this is the rich industrial area. Farther south is Bonn, the capital of West Germany. It is a surprisingly small town for a country's capital, but to the Germans it is still a temporary capital, Berlin being the real one.

Continuing south and east we joined a Rhine steamer for a two-hour journey down the Rhine. The tiny villages nestled in the hills and the vineyards planted up to the top of the steep hills delighted us. After that ride we were just ready to be charmed by our cozy old hotel on a misty evening in Heidelberg. Heidelberg is set in the hills by the Neckar River and is a university town.

Still in southern Germany was Munich. Munich was big, bustling, and bouncy. From her palace of the former Bavarian kings to Schwabinger, the student section, Munich kept us busy. The sidewalk cafes, discoteques and art students selling their wares by lantern kept Schwabinger on the go at night.

LEAVING GERMANY we first viewed the Alps, still in their baby phase. Throughout Germany and Austria, where we next entered, we observed the farming life of the people. Whenever a man was at work in the fields there was a woman and usually children. They might be stirring hay or hanging it on a line to dry.

Salzburg, "Sound of Music Country," provided a restful pace. Our guest house was on a hill overlooking Salzburg. The meals were out under the trees, and we had space to roam and

relax. It was Austria, of all places, where we went swimming.

The change from Austria to Italy is quite striking, especially in the living conditions. The villages are much like those of old Mexico. The farms are small, the tools wooden, and oxen pull the wagon.

The cities of Italy cannot be compared as each is distinctly itself. Venice . . . a city to sit and remember. The white city on blue water, the Bridge of Sighs, the pigeons in St. Marks Square, and all the treasures there are to buy, that is Venice.

Before going to Rome we spent a night in another country, San Marino. This miniature mountain-top republic contains only a few square miles and is surrounded on all sides by Italy. It has for its main industry, tourism.

AS WE ENTERED Rome we discovered all was not well. The main train station was ablaze and was on fire for fourteen hours.

Rome was hot and ice cream vendors were always a welcome sight. The Roman ruins, fountains, monuments were all very impressive. The Vatican inspired awe and we saw the Pope Sunday morning. The catacombs and the Appian way took us back to olden days.

Florence is a very uplifting city. Her art galleries, in which the art of the ages stand, expresses the unity of man through ages by means of beauty. Michelangelo's works were pieces for thought.

Besides her galleries Florence had many other attractions -- the straw market, flea market, and the Ponte Vecchio, the only shop covered bridge left across the Arno from the war.

A side trip to Pisa gave us a chance to see the famous leaning tower. In the sun it looks like a giant wedding cake about to topple. As my mind wanders back to Florence I see the destructive power of nature. The flood of last year cut into the culture of the world and the lives of the people.

AGAIN A CHANGE of countries and a contrast. Switzerland and beauty must be synonymous. Geneva was a lovely, clean city on Lake Geneva, but

I must go on to Zermatt. Barely accessible by car, blanketed in the Alps, clinging to the foot of the Matterhorn, Zermatt is the perfect resort town. Made up entirely of Swiss Chalet Hotels, skiers, and sun bathers, Zermatt had an air I found nowhere else. The hikes, the cable car rides, and the kegel (nine pin bowling), are only a small part of Zermatt.

Nature reached out with her softest embrace and held fast. Her people were pink cheeked and her fondue delicious. Leaving Zermatt by a small train more views of green grass, blue sky, and white waterfalls told us farewell.

EXCITEMENT was our group when we arrived from an overnight train ride to Paris. We had been warned not to expect too much and so we did not. We should have, because Paris captured our hearts. Staying only three blocks off the Champs Elysee the busy life of Paris enveloped us.

Riding the subway or walking we investigated Paris thoroughly on our own. Together the group visited Versailles which seemed very special to me as I thought of the number of times my roommate and I had sat and discussed Louis XIV for history class.

July 14 arrived, Bastille Day! This is to the French as July 4 is to us. A military parade with tanks and planes streaking red, white, and blue overhead began the day.

The Champs Elysee was draped with flags as was the Arch de Triomphe. It was lined with people clear down to the Concord square where the guillotine used to be.

The afternoon we spent shopping for prints at open stalls along the Seine on the left bank of Notre Dame, strolling in the Latin Quarter, and walking up all those steps to the Church of Sacre Coeur.

When night came we watched a tremendous fireworks display over the Seine and wandered around St. Germain. After the 14th we were tired, but not about to give up as the 15th was our last day in Paris. Besides trying to stuff our suitcases with all our "loot" we visited the Louvre. That night our whole group ended a grand summer together at the Lido.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be made for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

tirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and the Fund shall be governed elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to supplement and effectuate the sign and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in participation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void for reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of qualified electors of this State at an election to be held November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to veterans who served in the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to veterans who served in the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

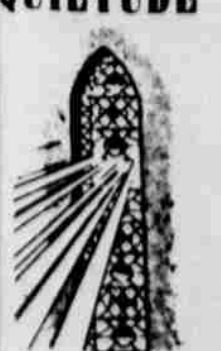
