HUNTSVILLE, Texas, Aug. 2.—Harry J. Leahy, southwest Texas lawyer and rancher, who staked his life against a fifty-year penitentiary sentence and lost, died in the electric chair of the state penitentiary here early today. The switch was turned on at 12:45 a. m. and he was pronounced dead nine minutes later.

AUSTIN, Aug. 2. (Friday) (AP)—Governor Dan Moody this morning ordered the execution of Harry Leahy delayed for thirty minutes after attorneys for Leahy had telephoned him from Waco that they had habeas corpus plea pending before A. J. Scott there at 11:30 Thursday night.

Judge Scott later phoned Gov. Moody that he had declined to grant the petition and the governor said the execution would go ahead as scheduled.

Beats Elephants Pajama-Clad Youth Causes Riot

NEW YORK, Aug. 1. (AP)—When a pajama-clad pedestrian attracts as much attention as two elephants it's time to call a halt. In the opinion of Patrolman John Meehan, Meehan, on a corner at Madison square saw a crowd hove into sight, "Gosh," he mused, "must be an elephant—no, must be two elephants, one elephant wouldn't draw a crowd like that."

Officer Meehan received quite a shock when he discovered the center of attraction was Samuel Goldenberg, a newsboy, clad only in a new set of yellow and white striped slumber garments. Goldenberg was taken to Jefferson Market court, there Magistrate Gottlieb agreed with Officer Meehan, and found Goldenberg guilty of disorderly conduct. He suspended the sentence when Goldenberg promised never to wear pajamas in public again.

"If you want to wear light clothes," the magistrate lectured the prisoner, "wear something that doesn't attract crowds. We can't regulate your attire but we can regulate your conduct."

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Raving Maniac Claims Four Lives On Rampage

SPARTANBURG, S. C., Aug. 1.—Four men tonight were dead and another lay in a hospital his skull crushed as a result of a swath of death cut by a shipping clerk who suddenly became a raving maniac.

Deprived of his hand axe, with which he dealt death and destruction, T. Earl Robertson, the clerk, late today was in the Spartanburg county jail while preparations were under way to take him to the state hospital for the insane at Columbia. A group of physicians pronounced him violently insane.

The dead: R. H. Day, 30; J. L. Bussey, 58; M. L. Davis, 36; Thad Sherbert, 51.

Injured: Dan Dunlap, 40, negro, expected to die. After killing or maiming every one in the office, the mad man stood in the doorway. A salesman coming to the door was told "You can't come in here. I am the only one in the place." The salesman said he noted something queer about Robertson's eyes and left.

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German Ship Makes 700 Miles Of Air Trip

Art Goebel, Bashful And Retiring, Tells Lubbock Feat Of Crossing Pacific

PARIS, Aug. 1.—Bucking strong westerly winds but beating out stormier weather to the north the great German dirigible Graf Zeppelin, which left Friedrichshafen at 3:29 a. m. today (8:29 p. m. Wednesday E. S. T.) plowed steadily through the air currents of Europe.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon, Greenwich time (10 a. m. E. S. T.), it was 50 miles off Barcelona, Spain, with 700 miles of her American cruise behind her. At 5 p. m. Cape De Gate, Spain, had been passed.

Leaving the Aiso and the Rhone Valley as she struck across the northwest coast of France, the Blue Mediterranean the Zeppelin already had sailed farther than on her unsuccessful attempt to reach America last May. The airship is making approximately 70 miles an hour. From the Mediterranean Key Fortress 3,000 miles of the flight to Lakehurst remains to be covered.

Lying at altitudes ranging from 2,000 to 3,000 feet the Zeppelin appeared at times shaken by gusts of wind.

The 19 passengers including 7 Americans were happy and comfortable according to Herbert S. Siebel, of Saginaw, Michigan, special correspondent of The Associated Press aboard the Graf Zeppelin who sent frequent dispatches during the early hours of the flight. His first message reporting the passing of the Blue Mediterranean, at 8:10 a. m., said the voyage had been wonderful so far, with Swiss airplanes playing around the craft as a gesture of welcome from that country as the dirigible soared over it.

Art Goebel, Bashful And Retiring, Tells Lubbock Feat Of Crossing Pacific

It was Col. Arthur Goebel speaking, intrepid pilot of the Woolaroc who won the Dole prize in a flight from Oakland, Cal., to Honolulu, and who is now president of the Arthur Goebel School of Flying in Kansas City.

In characteristic droll, monotonous in fashion, but impressive with punctuations of epigrammatic sentences and man to man style of talk, the Colonel reported himself partially with hands resting on the top rung of his chair and related timidly an accomplishment which Lindbergh termed greater than his own. He had flown a group of 33 Lubbock citizens and South Plains visitors who attended a dinner at the Hotel Lubbock in honor of the distinguished aviator.

COMMUNISTS FAIL TO CAUSE TROUBLE

ANTI-WAR DEMONSTRATION IS QUIET THROUGHOUT WORLD THURSDAY AS ARMED POLICE GUARD CAPITALS

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Severe Injury To Several Follows Rioting In Cells

Armed With Forks

(By Associated Press)
U. S. PENITENTIARY, LEAVENWORTH, Kas., Aug. 1.—A mutiny that cost at least one convict's life and severe injury to several others today broke out in the narcotic block of the prison here.

The mutiny began after lunch when the convicts were returned to their cell blocks and was said to have followed the efforts of a group of prisoners to attack Warden Thomas B. White and Deputy Warden P. G. Zerbst.

The disturbance centered in block A, populated by narcotic addicts but quickly spread to block A, which is the west wing of the main building.

Armed With Forks—The mutinous convicts, armed with forks and spoons from the mess hall, and other improvised weapons, destroyed guard rails and broke windows.

Refusing to call upon the military for assistance, Warden White ordered the prosecuting concoction.

Bitter Fight Is Likely In Snook Trial On Friday

Question Of Who Administered Narcotic Found In Stomach Of Slain Girl Will Offer Problem

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 1.—A bitter fight on the question of whether Dr. James H. Snook, or his young mistress, Theora Hix, administered the stimulating concoction that was found in the girl's stomach after she was slain by Snook will be waged on the witness stand in his trial for first degree murder, the opening statements of counsel revealed today.

Countering the claim of the defense that Dr. Snook's mind was unbalanced by a narcotic given him secretly by Miss Hix to stimulate his emotions, prosecutor J. Chester, Jr., declared to the jury that the actions imputed to the girl in reality belong to Dr. Snook.

About one hour before Miss Hix drove with the former professor to the New York central rifle range on the night of June 13, when she was killed, she ate a beef sandwich in which the preparation was placed, the prosecutor said. This was determined, he said, by city chemist C. F. Long's examination of the contents of the girl's stomach.

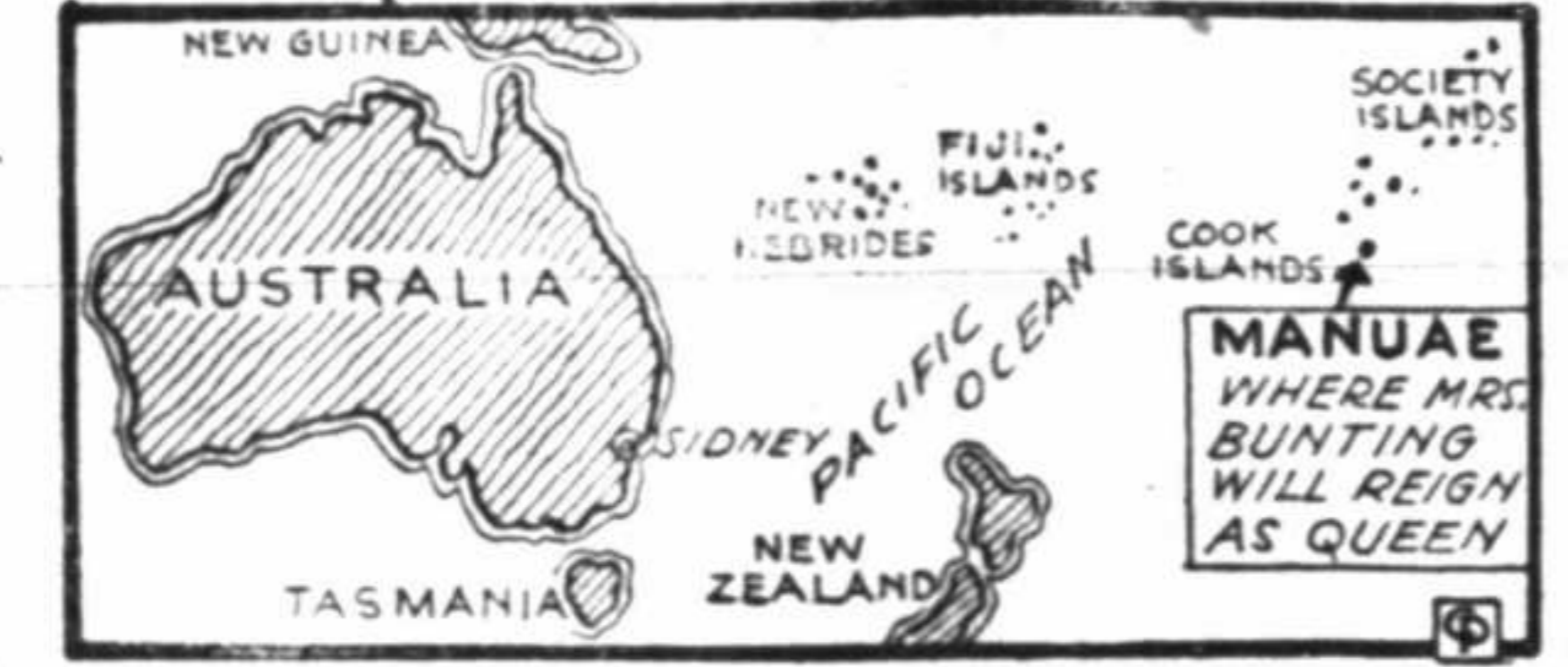
A Balm Paradise

Work On Three Cruisers Postponed Because Of Agreement Between U.S. And Great Britain About Equality

President Hoover Answers Critics Of His Decision To Halt Construction Of Navy Pending Meeting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. (AP)—The agreement between the United States and Great Britain looking to complete equality in the strength of their navies is held out by President Hoover as an answer to critics of his decision to postpone work on the three cruisers which were to have been laid down in navy yards next fall.

Quoting "our naval authorities" as regarding partly with Great Britain as "a complete defense of the United States in any contingency," the president has taken occasion to set forth the importance he attaches to the London agreement in a letter replying to criticisms of his decision to postpone action by Paul V. McNutt, commander of the American Legion's agreement forward step.

He describes the agreement as "the first step of the renewed consideration of reduction of the excessive world naval armament" and holds it to be a forward step of the first importance, reiterating his position that defense is all that the United States is seeking.

The president expressed his opinion that it was better to establish such a relation as that represented in the party agreement than to "restrain ourselves to continue attempts to establish it by rival construction programs."

The closeness with which the president is following the negotiations in London between Prime Minister MacDonald and Ambassador Dawes and Gibson, now concerned chiefly with establishment of a new, comprehensive formula for measuring the strength of navies, is being demonstrated by his frequent conferences with high officials of the state department who are kept informed of the details.

Would Eliminate Confab. The current London conversations are expected to go a long way toward making possible a preliminary naval limitation conference among the world powers to consider not only capital ships but cruisers, destroyers and submarines. It is the belief of officials here that such a meeting would eliminate the necessity for calling a conference under the terms of the Washington arms limitation treaty.

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POINCARÉ IN CLINIC

Cabinet Under New Premier Briand Carries On

PARIS, Aug. 1. (AP)—While former Premier Raymond Poincaré, smiling and confident, entered the clinic where he will be operated on tomorrow for the ailment which partially forced him to retire from the premiership, his old cabinet under Premier Aristide Briand faced parliament today and obtained the average Poincaré majority of 50 votes on its declaration of policy.

The actual majority given to the Briand ministerial declaration was 138. Radical deputies numbering 140 did not vote. By order of the group leader, the actual vote of confidence was 324 to 136. Parliament adjourned to meet in November.

Farm Organization Promoters Opposed By Federal Board

Professionals Acting Under Agricultural Marketing Act Are Scored by Farm Group In Early Sessions

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. (AP)—The Federal Farm Board has decided upon a determined stand against "professional promoters" seeking to "organize" the farmers for benefits under the agricultural marketing act and believes it has fortified itself so that it will not be misled.

Like any important commission when it is first inaugurated, the farm board has been swamped with applications for jobs, but to practically all of the cooperative organization promoters, the board "has shown the door" with the declaration that the policy of the commission is to build up existing cooperatives. Members of the board are convinced that, through education, close supervision and a friendly helping attitude, extant cooperatives will be able to demonstrate their value to farmers and thus increase their membership.

In another category are the apparently large number of well-meaning individuals who believe they can assist the board by "visiting" among the farmers and merely spreading a good will gospel of cooperation—at a fair per diem remuneration. 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They Call Fried Rattlesnake "Treat"

Pennsylvanians Have Queer Ideas On "Delicacies"

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., Aug. 1.—It takes just like chicken or frog legs. It's easily cooked, and once you try it you're sure to come back for more.

That, according to students at the nature study camp of the Pennsylvania State College summer session, is the verdict on fried rattlesnake meat. And the students should know—because they make a picnic lunch on rattlesnake meat every time they can catch one.

A Wild Luncheon Menu
The nature study camp is located in a snug valley of the Seven Sisters mountains, and rattlesnake has been a leading article on its bill for years. When Prof. George B. Green demonstrated that the flesh of this highly poisonous reptile is a genuine delicacy. Here is the sort of menu the nature students like when they go picnicking.

Snapping turtle soup, fried rattlesnake, roasted Indian turnip creamed hemlock fungus, green bristled salad with staghorn sumac dressing and wild huckleberries. But it's the rattlesnake that is the really startling part of the bill of fare.

Catching the rattler is the only hard part about it. You can use your own method in this part of the job, taking care not to bruise the victim, for that spoils the meat. Anyway, once the snake is caught, here's the procedure:

Grasp the reptile back of the head and decapitate it with a hatchet. Cut off the rattles for souvenirs, turn the victim on its back and with a sharp knife slit it from head to tail, cleaning and dressing the snake as soon as this slit is made. Then strip off the beautifully marked skin, to be tacked on a board, dried and salted for another souvenir—and take the remaining length of

clean white meat and put it on ice for 24 hours.

Next day the meat is ready to cook. Get a frying pan hot, melt some butter in it, cut the rattlesnake in lengths about half an inch long, roll them in flour or bread crumbs, and fry them a nice golden brown!

At the nature study camp forks are never used in eating fried rattler. Each diner is given his plateful—the cooked meat looks much like a plate of fried scallops—and is given

a sharp larkspur thornapple spike to use as a spear in eating the meat.

Newcomers to the joys of rattlesnake-eating usually wait four or five minutes, getting up their nerve before the first bite. But no one who has ever tried it here has failed to finish his entire allotment. One and all vow that the meat is as tasty and delicate as chicken.

A Famous Society
Having eaten rattlesnake at this camp, one automatically becomes a member of the society known as

membership in which is limited to those who have dined on rattlesnake. There are now upwards of 200 members in this camp, and the only thing that keeps fried rattlesnake from appearing on the bill of fare daily is the fact that rattlesnakes in this vicinity are getting scarce.

Every visitor who comes here is initiated, provided a rattlesnake can be captured. Among the prominent people who have dined on rattlesnake as guests here, are Ernest Thompson Seton, famous naturalist; Dr. W. Elmer Ekblaw of Clark University, Arctic explorer; Albert F. Gannier, noted bird specialist, and Mrs. Anna Botsford Comstock of Cornell University.

Farm Tariff Rate Receives Increase

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. (AP)—Agricultural tariff rates received increases from the republicans of the senate finance committee in their revision of the house tariff measure today but the pruning knife was applied to lumber and tobacco schedules.

The duties proposed on milk and poultry were jumbled up above the increases voted in the house. The rates on cattle, sheep, swine and butter were kept at the house figure. The increase voted by the house on tobacco wrappers used in manufacture of cigars was eliminated and the tariff which has applied since 1922 on mahogany logs was repealed.

Senator Cappers of Michigan, who yesterday vetoed the secrecy rule of the republican conference sections, made this information on the committee's actions today available to his constituents. He said he would not be bound in the future by the secrecy rule because he became aroused at the constant "leaks" of the committee's information to the "lobbyists."

Sheep, Goat Men Hold Convention

DEL RIO, Aug. 1. (AP)—An active horde of representatives of one of the oldest Texas industries—sheep and goat raising—met here today to go over in convention their problems of the range.

It was the Sheep and Goat Raisers association which came together after a preliminary barbecue yesterday across the Rio Grande in Mexico. There, Congressman Claude Huddspeth castigated the Box immigration bill and in turn was praised by Dayton Moses, Fort Worth lawyer, and James Callan, cattleman, for his efforts in behalf of the shepherds and goat raisers.

Thousands of ranchers were expected today.

Rich American Is On Trial Again In Court At London

Richard Reynolds, Charged With Driving While Intoxicated, Gives Story Of Accident

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 1. — Richard Joshua Reynolds, wealthy young American standing trial on a manslaughter charge growing out of an automobile accident, took the stand today at resumption of the trial made necessary by last week's sudden halting of the case.

Reynolds, 23, denied he was drunk when he ran into a motorcycle driven by Arthur Graham last May. Replying to questions by Norman Birken, his counsel, Reynolds recounted his journey with a friend to Hurley on May 14 to play golf. Because of rain, however, they played at Dares Indoores. Just before 2:30 in the afternoon he had a drink known as "Pimm's No. 1 cup" and between 5:30 and his leaving about 8:30 he had four other drinks of the same kind. He declared that he was quite fit to drive when he returned to London.

Dazzled By Lights
He said that at Burnham he was dazzled by the head-lights of an oncoming car and found that he had mounted the curb, he had no idea he had struck a man on a motorcycle and backing into the road again he proceeded on his journey. Had he known he collided with a motorcyclist, he said, he would have stopped and done all he could for him.

George Middleton, bartender of the Old Bell hotel at Hurley, said that "Pimm's No. 1 cup" was taken in half a pint of lemonade and that Reynolds was not under the influence of drink.

2 Men Drown In Irrigation Ditch

The accident occurred when their car struck a bridge railing while rounding a curve. McCullum was a brother of the sheriff of Bee county, Erringer was a traveling salesman.

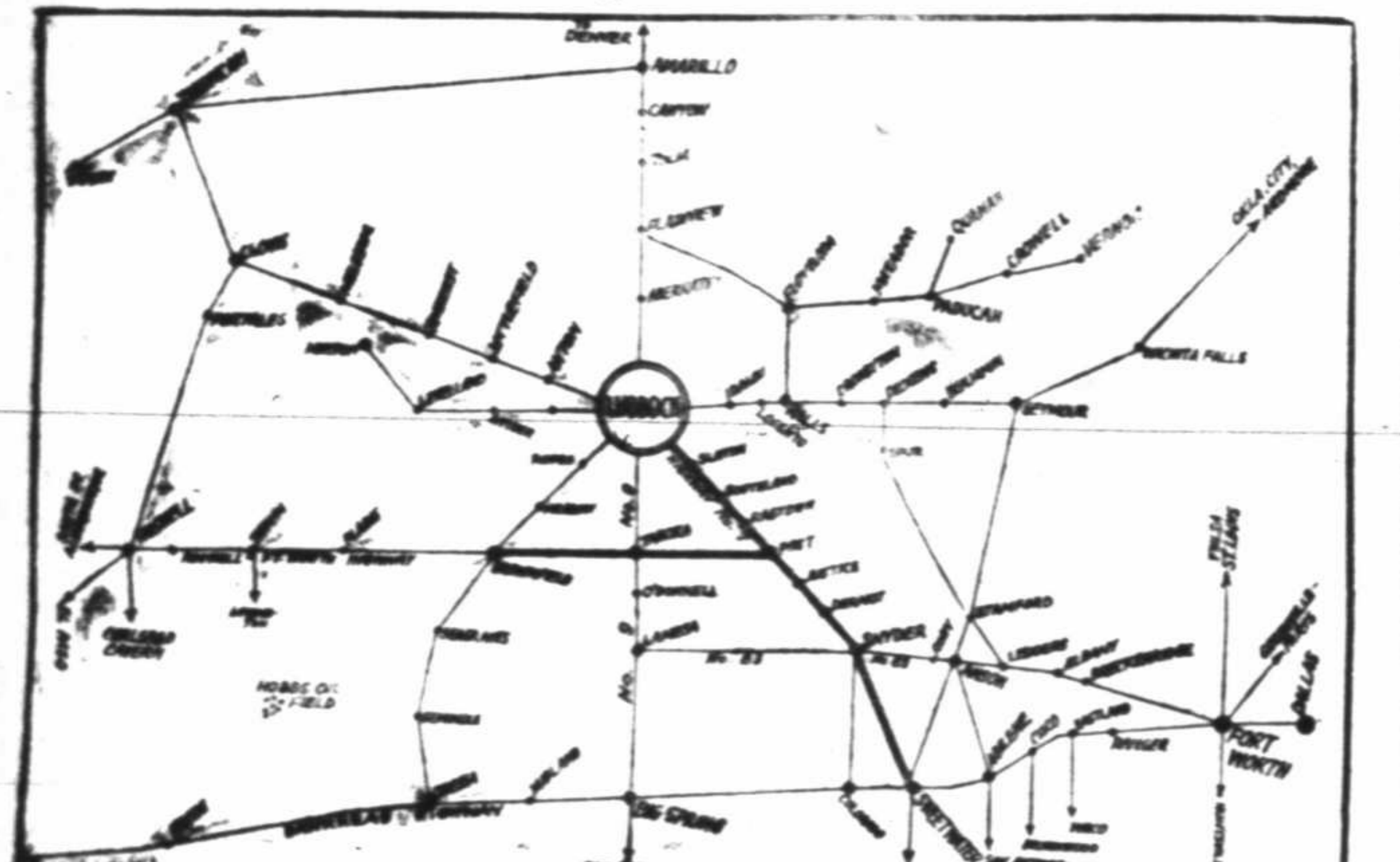
