Ships Crippled As Furious Gale Lashes Florida Coast

Peak of Storm Is Believed Moving Toward Mainland

Palm Beach Waits In Terror for Brunt of Disturbance, Expected to Strike With Hurricane Force.

BAROMETER SINKS TO ALARMING LOW LEVEL

Extensive Damage Reported in City As Gale Lashes Awaits, Shrubbery and Small Buildings.

(By Associated Press) MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 7.—The Tropical Radio company station here reported tonight that the steamship Algonquin with 300 aboard had lost its bearings in the hurricane off Jupiter. The station's operators said they were centering efforts to keep the vessel from running ashore.

The Honduras steamship Lempira in the center of the disturbance, was reported crippled by terrific seas and unable to make headway. The steamer Xastilla was standing by the distressed ship to aid if possible.

The radio station said it had been informed of the Algonquin's plight through the government wireless station at Jupiter. The Algonquin is enroute from Galveston to New York. The Lempira sailed from New York July 28 for Porto Cortes, Honduras.

Hurricane Appears To Be Quickening Hourly

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Aug. 7.—Anxiety increased tonight as the West Indian hurricane, hovering at sea off here, continued to whip the mainland with a 60 mile an hour gale that showed no abatement and appeared to be quickening hourly.

Here and at Palm Beach, darkness when the winds snapped electric power lines, the streets were nearly deserted. Territorial rains added to the dismal night into which few dared to venture. Power

LOVE FOR DOLL SAVES LUBBOCK GIRL'S LIFE

Love for her doll which was almost as large as she, probably saved the life of little Joye Royalty, six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Royalty, 1710 Avenue B, who was injured when struck by a car yesterday afternoon.

The little girl had been playing and had started to cross the street in front of an approaching car. The large doll which she clung to desperately held on the main weight of the car which ran completely over her back. Witnesses declared that the doll saved the child from serious injury.

Physicians reported that her injuries consisted of bruises only. She was knocked unconscious when the car struck her but regained consciousness as she was being carried home in a Bynum Brothers ambulance. Her condition was reported not serious last night.

The driver of the car which struck the little girl said that he was blinded by the sun and failed to see her. He stopped and came back to determine the extent of her injuries.

Wife Held For Slaying Spouse Claims Accident

Youthful Radio Lecturer Found Dead, With Dozen Knife Wounds Through-out Body.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Olen Kirkwood, youthful Queens veterinary and radio lecturer, was stabbed to death today with a broad knife and his wife told the district attorney she inflicted the wounds, more than a dozen, by accident as she fought for possession of the knife so that she could take her own life.

She was charged with murder. A patrolman found Kirkwood lying on the floor in the kitchen of his home, his wife, six years his senior, crying over and over, "I've killed my husband." Mrs. Kirkwood, seemingly calm except that she smoked one cigarette after another, sat in the district attorney's office and made what he termed a "full confession" of the girl of which follows:

Mrs. Kirkwood, 32, was first married about 15 years ago to John McAvoy, with whom she lived in Woodside. They were divorced several years ago and last year she married the veterinary.

Mrs. Kirkwood said she found evidence there that her husband had been giving parties and when she heard neighborhood gossip that he had been "running around" with women she accused him of infidelity.

Last night an argument started early this morning she ran to the kitchen and seized the knife, intending to take her life.

Kirkwood had sought to take the knife from her, she said, and in the ensuing struggle she unintentionally inflicted the wounds.

Smith Challenges New York Pastor To Prove Charges

Sends Caustic Answer To Dr. John Roach Straton After Accusation From Pulpit.

PREACHER ACCEPTS DEFY OF GOVERNOR

Smith Demands Right To Appear In Church And Give His Side of Minister's Argument.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—The Rev. John Roach Straton tonight announced he would accept the challenge of Governor Alfred E. Smith to repeat in the governor's presence his charges made in a sermon last Sunday when he said Governor Smith was "the deadliest foe in America of the forces of moral progress and true political wisdom."

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 7. (AP)—Demanding proof of the charge and right to reply, Governor Smith today told Rev. Dr. John Roach Straton to ask for Straton's reported declaration from his New York pulpit Sunday that the Democratic presidential nominee "as a public man" is "the deadliest foe in America today of the forces of moral progress and true political wisdom."

Smith, in a caustic letter to Straton, requested "in a spirit of American fair play" that he be invited to the clergyman's church and given an opportunity to be heard on his side of the question. He promised to answer any questions Dr. Straton might put to him regarding his public career.

The letter of the governor to the New York minister was given out by Smith personally to newspapermen one of whom remarked: "He'll take you up on that."

"That's what he's getting this letter for," Smith rejoined.

The text of the governor's letter was:

"Dear Dr. Straton: 'Papers of Monday, August the sixth, quote you as saying from the pulpit of your church that as a public man I am the deadliest foe in America today of the forces of moral progress and true political wisdom.'

"I do not know why you should make a statement of that kind, but I do know that I never will permit it to go unchallenged. I have spent 25 years in the service of the state in elective office and the record of that service is open to the public. I do not feel that I should charge you with making this statement for any political purpose, as it was made in a church devoted to the teachings of Christ, one of which was 'thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.'

Senatorial Race Gets Under Way

Connally Charges Ferguson and Power Trusts Are Seeking To Buy Seat In Senate.

(By Associated Press) FORT WORTH, Texas, Aug. 7.—Charges that an effort is being made to purchase the seat of the next United States senator from Texas for Earle B. Mayfield were made by Congressman Tom Connally running against Mayfield in a campaign address here, Connally alleged that Mayfield, former Governor James E. Ferguson and a representative of the "Louisiana Light and Power Company" last Tuesday in an Austin hotel had "pulled off a deal" to return Mayfield to the Senate.

His final thrust at alleged Mayfield-Ferguson-Electric Power interest combine was extemporaneous. The candidate was speaking through the microphone of a radio station as well as to an audience in a park.

Mayfield Accepts Connally Challenge

BROWNFIELD, Tex., Aug. 7. (AP)—Making his first appearance in his runoff campaign for reelection, Senator Earle B. Mayfield declared today that he would not include in a mud-slinging campaign but that many charges made by Congressman Tom Connally of Mayfield's opponent were "unfair, untrue and untrue" and that he intended to answer them.

Officers Launch Search for Pair In Flogging Quiz

Victim Tells Story Of Being Kidnaped and Severely Beaten; Alleges 'Bootleggers' Revenge.

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, Aug. 7.—Officers today began search for two men alleged to have kidnaped and severely beaten Homer T. Chambers, 25, of Farmers Branch last night.

To the district attorney, Chambers reported he had accepted an invitation of two men in an automobile to ride with them. Instead of letting him out at his destination they drove into the Trinity River bottoms here, he said.

Chambers declared the men beat him with a leather strap and an iron tire tool, and said when he exhibited a scar from a recent operation and asked leniency one of them drew a knife and suggested they "finish it."

Chambers said the men accused him of having informed officers of whiskey making activities.

Boozing establishments which have been running full blast in utter defiance of the law for weeks were darkened tonight. Announcements made tonight at several alleged drink emporiums that Assistant Attorney General Dave Pickle would arrive tomorrow to take charge of the investigation of reported lawbreaking here, spread gloom among the mingled crowds.

Probe Proceeds Into Slaying Of Society Leader

Husband Challenged To Explain Delay In Reporting Death of Wife To Police, After Discovery.

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7.—An attorney's challenge of the asserted failure of Hank Melius to report the slaying of his wife for more than two hours after he and her were found, or dying last Sunday, marked a court climax today to an inquest over the body of Mrs. Melius, alleged victim of a romance with a "butcher boy."

Leo Kelly, the family "butcher boy" and alleged illicit lover of Mrs. Melius, had been taken into custody for arraignment on a murder charge after the inquest.

Kelly's lawyer declared he would like to know why Melius, prominent sportsman, manufacturer and clubman, had failed immediately to notify police when he found the undied form of his wife stretched across her bed in the palatial Melius home in the fashionable Wilshire district.

Hahn explained that Kelly said he left the Melius home at 3:30 Sunday, where by his own admission he was visiting clandestinely with the wealthy woman. Police notification was made at 5:30 p. m., according to reports at Central station.

Comanche Man, For Whom State Asks Death Penalty, Hears Girl Tell of Mistreatment.

EARLY CONCLUSION FOR TRIAL LOOMS

Companion of Attacked Girl Is Cleared of Charges As Accomplice In Alleged Assault.

(By Associated Press) COMANCHE, Aug. 7.—Sobbing as she told of a night of terror through which she passed, Miss Velma Bankhead, 19, of near Dr. Leon, late today testified for the state in the trial of Dick Hazard, 27, for whom the state has asked the death sentence on a charge of criminal assault here.

She is slight figure, weighing barely 100 pounds. She said Hazard and his companions, J. D. Pierce and Harley Holland, indicted jointly by a special grand jury each attacked her on a highway the night of July 21.

The girl's testimony corroborated that of Miss Christine Gammage, 17, against whom charges of accessory were dismissed yesterday in order she might testify for the state. Miss Gammage testified she remained in the automobile during the alleged attacks.

With the completion of Miss Bankhead's testimony both sides rested. The defense offered no testimony. Arguments were scheduled to start tomorrow and it was predicted that the case would go to the jury before tomorrow night. The jury, selected yesterday from a special venire of 60 men, is composed of 12 farmers and a barber.

Other state witnesses introduced during the day included two doctors, who testified as to Miss Bankhead's condition, and E. L. Bankhead, her father, who told of returning from a search for his daughter and finding her sobbing on her mother's lap.

More than a hundred avid spectators went without food and water all day in order to hold their seats.

Miss Bankhead testified she had accompanied the party to Gorman and that on the return, Hazard was assisted by the other youths in pulling her from the car. She said they dragged her about a hundred yards while she fought and cried out for help.

She asserted Pierce held her while Hazard attacked her and that Holland then attacked her. According to her testimony, they carried her back to the automobile and drove down the road some distance after which Pierce attacked her and Hazard made a second attack.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Aug. 7. (AP)—With exception of three races, results of major contests in the Oklahoma primary election appeared late tonight to be crystallizing rapidly.

Branson, chief justice of the state supreme court, who faced a storm of newspaper criticism because he held invalid last winter's impromptu legislative session which sought to impeach the governor, met stiff competition. Returns from 58 of 303 precincts gave him 1,941 while his nearest opponent W. H. Brown, had 1,285.

Rescuers Perform Near-Miracle By Retrieving Craft

Wearily Salvage Crew, After Ceaseless Vigil of Work, Open Hatch Only to Find Tomb of Comrades.

INTERIOR OF VESSEL WAS FILLED BY GAS

Premonition of Disaster To Thirty-One Men In Submersible Came When Signals Terminated.

(By Associated Press) ROME, Aug. 7.—The Italian submarine F-14 with its crew of 31 dead from poisonous gas was brought to the surface of the Adriatic tonight in which it had sunk after a collision 34 hours before.

The weary salvagers, who had performed almost a naval miracle in retrieving the submersible from a depth of 131 feet, peered hopefully into the opened hatches only to find they were gazing into the tomb of their comrades.

They had been forewarned of tragedy when, during the afternoon submarine telegraph signals brought to the surface of the craft had ceased. They continued to drive at their task, however, in hope that the ominous silence meant simply that the crew had withdrawn to a safer part of the submarine or at worst, that they were simply weakened by the difficulty of breathing in the sealed air. The revelation that all were dead came as a shock.

At least a few of the crew were believed to have escaped the torture of the helpless wait at the bottom of the sea for rescue for the stern compartment of the F-14 was flooded when the sharp bow of the destroyer Giuseppe Misori rode over the emerging craft.

Captain Weil and Commander Pannico were the officers who died in the submersible. Normally, craft of the size of the F-14 would carry 25

Violating Mann Act Is Charged

Former Oklahoma Pastor On Trial In Arizona: 19-Year-Old Secretary Is First Witness.

(By Associated Press) PRESCOTT, Ariz., Aug. 7.—Trial of the Rev. Arthur Blaine Brooks, formerly of the First Christian church of Ponca City, Okla., on charges of violation of the Mann Act, opened in district court here today with Miss Velma Vorhes, his 19-year-old secretary, relating as the first government witness, the story of her association with her employer.

Miss Vorhes testified that while she was employed by Brooks, during the years of 1926 and 1927, he first made advances to her, and later, when she left for Denver to attend a Camp Fire Girls' session, he resigned his pastorate and, deserting his sick wife, followed her from Denver, she related, they went by motor to the northwest, living as man and wife.

In Texas, she said, Brooks traveled as "Arthur Blaine" and bought her a wedding ring which she wore from time to time.

One wonders, however, if the no-kissing edict is significant so much of a deep sea change in politics as in women. If politicians thought that baby-kissing would do them any good in this modern day, it's rather safe to bet that even Herbert Hoover would do it.

WOMEN HAVE CHANGED

Politicians know that the woman voter "ain't what she used to be." That she's a keen mind-of-her-own person who has scrapped all such rubbish as selling of her vote in return for a call for baby. A political record which testifies to the politician's consideration for the welfare of her baby means much more to her and is much more likely to get her vote.

MORE THAN KIDS

BREAKFAST - Sliced peaches, oatmeal porridge, grilled tomatoes on toast with cream sauce milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON - Bacon and lettuce sandwiches, chocolate milk shake baked apples.

Citizens Bank Erects Chimes Clock

Musical Chimes to Ring Out Time at Each Quarter Hour Throughout Day and Night

An electrically operated and illuminated clock, which will sound the time by chimes that ring out every quarter hour, is being installed by the Citizens National bank in its building at the corner of Texas Avenue and Broadway. The clock will be in operation within the next few days. Sam C. Arnett, president of the institution, said late yesterday.

According to Mr. Arnett, the most distinctive feature of the clock aside from its artistic appearance and the perfection of its construction is the complete set of Westminster chimes with which it is equipped. These chimes, sounding every quarter hour in the day and night, may be heard practically as far as the clock may be seen, Mr. Arnett states.

Master Clock Inside
The big clock is operated by electricity from a master clock located in the main banking room inside the building. The master clock is handsomely constructed of mahogany and plate glass. Mr. Arnett says, and with a 12-inch dial is guaranteed to keep practically perfect time. Every minute the hands of the big clock outside the building are set ahead one minute, the movement being governed by electricity and based upon the master clock within the building. The connection between the two clocks is mechanically perfect, insuring correct time both inside and outside the building.

Attached to the corner of the bank building, the huge clock measures 10 feet six inches in height and is three feet square. It is constructed of bronze, copper and brass with a statutory bronze finish. All faces of the clock are alike and the name of the bank appears under each face, done in art glass. The dial of the clock is of white glass with crystal glass on the outside and are 24 inches in diameter.

Chimes Have a History
The Westminster chimes, consisting of five tubular chime bells, with which the clock is equipped, have a history all their own. Mr. Arnett

BRIDGE MADE EASY

THE DUCK—4

When drawing trumps you should not as a rule indulge in ducking. To do so might unnecessarily permit opponents to ruff with the result that your entire ducking campaign would collapse and your opponents might make tricks that otherwise could never have been made by the. As a rule, draw the outstanding trumps and postpone the ducking.

Used to best advantage when one of the hands is weak in re-entry as in the illustration which follows:

Dummy holding spades—5 4 3; hearts—A 2; diamonds—A K 7 6 5 4 clubs—3 2. Declarer, spades—A J 2; hearts—Q J 10; diamonds—3; clubs—K Q 7 6 5 4.

The only way in which the declarer may possibly make game is to establish the diamond suit. This may be accomplished by ducking the first time that suit is played. As soon as declarer gets the lead he should play heart Queen and overtake with heart Ace in the dummy. Then he plays diamond Ace and diamond King in turn with the likelihood that all of the missing diamonds will drop, enabling him to win tricks with his three remaining cards in that suit with the probability of going game.

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Coolidge Plans To Make Use Of Veto Authority

Will Blue-Pencil Appropriations Made at Forthcoming Congress; Large Deficit Is Feared

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 7 (AP).—President Coolidge is preparing to veto at the next session of congress any bills carrying appropriations which would threaten the balance of the budget.

He was informed yesterday by General Lord that the large appropriations already made by Congress and the possible reduction in revenues owing to last season's tax cut, would result in a deficit of \$100,000,000 on next June 30.

President Coolidge believes the tax reduction promulgated last spring will have small effect on the general revenue returns of the country. The cuts effected, he thinks, were not of the kind to stimulate greatly the activity of industry and commerce and thus boost revenue. Any increase in revenue in the current year over previous ones will have to be looked for, he thinks, in the general prosperity of the country.

General reports received by him relative to business conditions point to fair tax returns in the current year.

Yield of Cotton Smaller, Report

Unfavorable Planting And Cultivation Conditions, With Weevil Infestation Blamed.

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 7.—Condi-

tions throughout southeastern states including Louisiana and Texas, indicate this year's cotton crop will be considerably less than that of last year, commissioners of agriculture from cotton states, meeting here today, said.

The consensus of opinion was that not more than 70 percent of a normal crop will be harvested this year, on the basis of information gathered first hand and through field representatives.

Unseasonable weather, both for planting and cultivation together

with boll weevil infestation were blamed for the condition of the crop.

Weevil infestation in Louisiana is particularly severe, Harry B. Wilson, agricultural commissioner, said. He declared that the slight increase in acreage had been more than offset by abandonment and weevil ravages. Conditions of the crop in Alabama are not much improved, said J. M. Moore, commissioner in that state, but it will produce hardly 800,000 bales this year, he estimated, because of abandonment and weevils.

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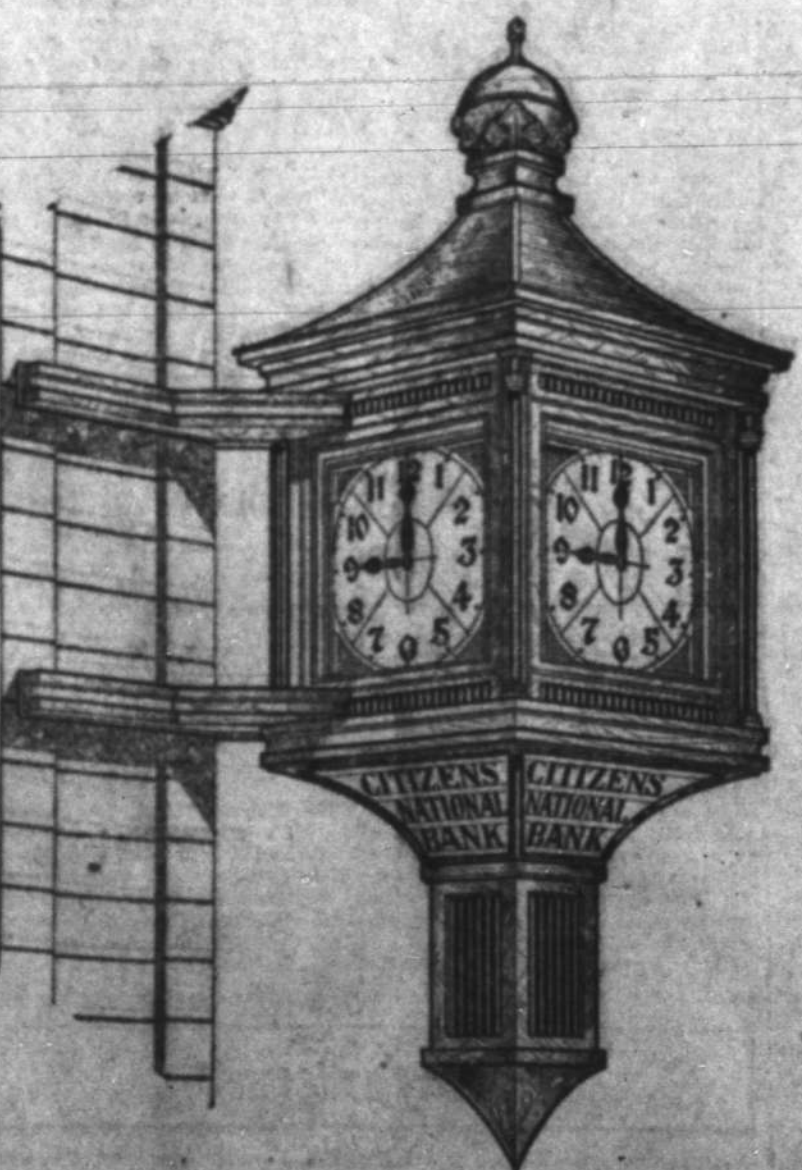
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OUT OUR WAY--



SO THINK WE

We think that if some people know as much about the political situation as they would have one think, there would be no need to bother about the election, as the political prognosticators would need only to make a statement and the thing would be settled, but we are glad that the people will have a chance to speak at the polls, and will no doubt be better qualified to name the men for the important offices than the ordinary, or even extraordinary, curbside politician.

We think that Lubbock county was thoroughly Democratic in the county convention Saturday. There were at least fifty voters participating in the meeting and as they were representative citizens there should be no other thing to do than to abide by their resolutions, which will not be done by some people.

We think the main thing that should be uppermost in the minds of Lubbock is getting the kiddies ready for school. If they are physically in need of treatment to do it now rather than wait till the school begins and then have to be treated and go to school too.

We think that Lubbock will very likely have to have two or three new school buildings soon, especially if the population continues to increase as rapidly as it has in the last five years. The buildings will be crowded, and the arrangements will soon have to be made to take care of more students.

We think the Tech College will need all the buildings that the Texas Legislature will be willing to give, as it would seem that the enrollment will mount far above the two thousand mark this fall.

We think the flower department of the South Plains Fair should be a good one this year. There are so many pretty yards, we are sure that the ladies of Lubbock could dress up the building in grand style this fall.

Campaign managers of both major parties have announced they are in a receptive mood for campaign contributions, and while they are watching the golden tide flow into the coffers they are also maintaining a wary eye on the source of that flood.

Two committees of congress, one named by the senate and the other by the house, are standing ready to hold public hearings, to carefully scrutinize either contributions or expenditures, and as members of both major parties are represented thereon, there can be no question that each committee is ready to pick a flaw as soon as one can be developed.

Under the federal law the campaign contributions can be expended for certain specific purposes--and these do not include many for which the campaign funds of former generations were expended. No longer can the campaign manager stuff his pockets with "ones, fives and tens" and start out in quest of votes without danger of finding himself in the toils of the law with an investigating committee turning loose to the opposition press full details of his illegal methods. Bookkeeping in connection with political campaigns has become a high art and consummate skill is required to hide from the eye of the law any deviation from the straight and narrow path laid down by the federal and state statutes.

In the old days there was no federal law that compelled political parties to make an accounting. The identity of contributors was never officially revealed. Now the law requires a strict accounting of every item in a political budget, although there is a limitation upon the amount an individual may contribute and no restrictions on the total that a party may receive.

A cow may have its udder infected with the germs and then all of the milk from that cow will be infected. When the milk is collected, this milk is mixed with the other milk and if pasteurization fails, the epidemic may attack every one who drinks the milk.

To prevent such epidemics, dairymen should not permit any one with the slightest sore throat to milk cows, handle the milk in any way, or be at all concerned with the care of the pails or milk utensils.

Once any employee develops a sore throat, he should stop work at once. A sore throat may not only be the result of infections with these germs, but of infection with scarlet fever or diphtheria, two other diseases that may be spread by milk.

Before beginning his work, the milker should wash his hands thoroughly, and it will do nothing to harm the milk any more than he will wash them frequently during the milking process. This serves not only as a protection for the milk and the consumer but also for the cow.

After milk is collected for ordinary purposes, it should be pasteurized. The milk is heated to a sufficiently high temperature to kill the germs of disease, and is held at that temperature for at least one-half hour.

Ninety per cent of the milk used in the large cities of this country is now pasteurized. In not one of the outbreaks of septic sore throat that occurred in 1926 and 1927 was pasteurized milk at fault.

WORK ON HALE HIGHWAY.

Contract was let yesterday by the State Highway department for the grading and drainage structures for Highway No. 9 from the Lubbock county line to the Swisher county line through Hale county. Womack Construction company of Fort Worth were the successful bidders at \$63,000. The estimate for this work made by the state engineer was \$85,000 and the contract prices viewed with general satisfaction. It is probable that part of the work will be sub-contracted. Such arrangement that work will be available for local people as much as possible will be urged by Hale county authorities.

Hale county has voted bonds for paving two cardinal highways across the county. One of these, No. 9, traverses the county north and south and the other, No. 28, is part of the Lee transcontinental highway, and traverses the county east and west. A concerted effort will be made by the counties between Hale and Wilbarger to secure the hard-surfacing of this highway at the earliest possible time.

County Judge George Mayfield and members of the commission court are in Austin, having attended the meeting of the highway commission on August 2.

The Canadian government also is directly interested, for the runners are liable to seizure by the Canadian if they fail to sail within the time allowed after obtaining clearance papers. For many of the boats this time will expire tonight.

The U. S. Coast Guard is maintaining close watch over the fleet but is outnumbered. There are only five coast guard craft in the river, whereas the rum fleet has numbered twenty-seven. One of these was captured in an effort to get across and ten others disappeared last night and are thought to have eluded their guard and landed their cargoes on the American banks.

RASKOB MAY QUIT Plans to Associate With Radio Corporation

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP)—The Evening Post says today that Raskob is current in Wall Street at the end of the presidential campaign John J. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic national committee, will permanently sever his business relations with General Motors corporation and become identified with the Radio Corporation of America. Shortly after Raskob was selected to direct Gov. Smith's campaign he resigned his post as chairman of the finance committee of General Motors, lest anyone should think that the company was "playing politics." In accepting his resignation officials of the company made it clear that they expected him to resume his position as soon as the campaign was over.

Mr. Raskob could not be reached to comment on the Post's story, but his secretary, however, said he did not believe it.

EXPLOSION AT FORT Six Soldiers On Guard Are Killed

BUCHARREST, Rumania, Aug. 7 (AP)—Six soldiers on guard at Fort Caceron on the outskirts of Bucharest were killed when the Fort was blown up yesterday. Flames poured forth from the fort after the explosion. Exploding shells, four hundred of which were of the high explosive variety, showered the neighborhood.

The origin of the explosion was not determined.

NEW YORK STOCKS
NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Higher call money rates again proved effective today in checking speculation for the advance on the New York stock exchange. A flurry of buying in the mail order shares brought about a partial recovery in the last few minutes of trading, but final quotations were irregularly lower, with a number of losses running from 1 to 5 points.

Call money renewed unchanged at 6 per cent but the rate was advanced to 6 1/2 and thence to 7 as banks called \$30,000,000 in loans. Time money and commercial paper rates held firm.

The recent improvement in growing crops was advanced by Wall Street today as another "bull" factor to help explain the recent rise in stock prices. It was pointed out that big crops invariably foreboded

low industrial activity and increased purchasing power.

One of the most interesting business developments of the day was the publication of the monthly steel report of the American Iron and Steel Institute showing record-breaking production of 28,604,450 tons in the first seven months, as against 27,611,522 in the corresponding period last year.

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP)—The cotton market showed continued nervousness and irregularity today, a good part of the business being attributed to further evening up in preparation for the government report expected at noon tomorrow. A further decline which carried December off to 19.10, or 18 points net lower, was followed by rallies on covering with that position selling up to 19.30 in late trading. The improvement was not fully maintained, December closing at 19.23. The general market closed steady at net declines of 4 to 11 points.

The market opened steady at a decline of 7 to 14 points, active months soon showing net losses of 18 to 21 points under further liquidation, coupled with local and Southern selling. A favorable view of the early weather map and relatively easy Liverpool cables, together with reports of labor troubles in Fall River, seemed responsible for liquidation or selling of recent purchases, while some observers thought they saw indications of a

Firm to higher prices prevailed today on most classes of cattle and calves. Matured steers have staged a decided comeback this week and present price levels are 50 cents or more higher than a week ago. Chicago scored 16.75 on choice long yearlings, while heavy steers there were only a notch below at 16.55 common to medium south-western grassers at Kansas City, cleared from 10.35-12.50. Vealers registered a sharp advance at all markets. Chicago reported a top of 18.00. Trade on hogs was somewhat uneven, most points maintaining steady to 10c higher values. The day's top of 11.75 paid at St. Louis and Chicago was the same as on Monday. Total offerings were around 69,300 and increase of 2,700 over last Tuesday but 22,000 short on a year ago.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON
NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 7 (AP)—Eleventh hour liquidation in advance of tomorrow's official crop condition and yield report dominated trading in the cotton market today, although a later volume of offerings were absorbed by last minute covering and trade buying induced by reports of boll weevil infestation, and fears that the tropical storm now reported off the Florida coast might bring rains to the eastern section of the belt.

October contracts which had sold off to 18.62 or 21 points down rallied to 18.90 and closed one point under the latter figure, at a net decline for the day of 3 points. The general market closed steady at net losses of 2 to 5 points.

Liverpool cables were 6 to 7 penny points worse than due and first trades here showed losses in sympathy. At the end of the first hour of trading October had traded at 18.62 December 18.66 and January 18.68, or 14 to 21 points down from the previous close.

Prices gradually worked lower under additional liquidation until at the lowest active months showed

losses of 20 to 23 points from the previous close. After mid-season trading became more active under the stimulus of buying and covering encouraged by reports of increasing boll weevil damage, and fears of rain in the east due to the tropical storm. Before the demand was supplied December had sold up to 18.95 and January 18.92. The close was just a few points under the best.

NONPARTISAN POLICY
This Is Urge To Organized Labor

ATLANTIC CITY, N. Y., Aug. 7 (AP)—Organized labor was advised to continue to adhere to a nonpartisan political policy during the presidential campaign in a statement today by the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor. The statement adds that in view of expectation of declarations of "great significance to labor" in the coming speeches of acceptance "we will await with very great interest the expression of each candidate, reserving to ourselves the final decision regarding our future policy during the remainder of the campaign."
