Lamesa Public Schools To Open September 6th

The Lamesa Public Schools, as previously announced, will open on Monday, September 6th. The district's school census has been approved by State authorities for 1286 pupils and there are 131 transfers for a total of 1417 pupils who are expected to attend. Final reports on those over seventeen years of age and those from other counties will not be available for some time yet and it is possible that the total will reach 1500 for the 1937-38 term.

There are a few rules which the authorities wish to call attention prior to the enrollment date so that parents may comply. Pupils entering the Lamesa Public Schools are required to be vaccinated against smallpox except where pupils have had that disease and to present proper evidence of such vaccination. Pupils coming from other schools must show a card indicating that previous text book accounts are clear, and also, the grade cards for those from other schools are needed for proper classification. Pupils are not permitted to enter the eleventh grade from unclassified, unaccredited or non-standardized schools without having passed the required entrance examinations. These examinations were given last spring but it is known that a few pupils may not have been aware of the time and these with those who wish to improve their grades will stand by to take the tests on September 6th.

The large number of pupils between the ages of six and twenty-one requires all the space available and perhaps more, so that pupils who are under age cannot be accommodated. All facilities and rooms have been required for several years and the crowded condition is becoming a problem of concern.

No new courses are now contemplated since the Lamesa High School is authorized to offer 40 accredited units many of which are vocational. Boys and girls are offered the opportunity of taking commercial courses in bookkeeping, typewriting, shorthand and commercial arithmetic. Vocational home economics which includes both cooking and sewing with their related phases of preparation and serving of foods and choosing and designing clothing. Opportunity is also offered qualified pupils in Diversified Occupations through cooperation of local business establishments and State and Federal Governments.

Mr. C. E. King will teach Band and Orchestra instruments and have direction of these organizations for the benefit of all pupils who show adequate aptitude and interest. The choral and special vocal music organizations will have definite leadership under an instructor specially trained in one of the nation's most noted conservatories, the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, and may receive credit by meeting the conditions of instruction and practice.

It is reported as doubtful if there will be increases in the number of faculty members because all rooms are now occupied. At least no increase is contemplated until more rooms are available.

All pupils expecting to attend the Lamesa High School are requested to appear for enrollment and class schedules according to the following:

First year or Freshmen, September 1, 8 to 12 A. M.
Second year or Sophomores, September 2, 8 to 12 A. M.
Third year, or Juniors, September 3, 8 to 12 A. M.
Fourth year or Seniors, September 4, 8 to 12 A. M.

Locker assignments and course planning and other details incident to enrollment will be completed at this time under the direction of Mr. F. T. McCollum, High School Principal.

New City Well To Be Completed Next Week

W. A. Henderson, local well driller is drilling the city water well and had reached a depth of 65 feet, on Wednesday. They plan to drill the well to 150 feet. Pumping equipment is already on the ground and with the completion of the drilling next week the well will be put into operation for city use.

The well is being drilled south of the city near the other city water wells.

Date Set For Road Bond Election

The Commissioners' Court of Dawson County in session on Monday, August 9, set Saturday, September 11 as the date for holding an election upon the question of authorizing the issuing of \$50,000 in road bonds for Dawson County. A petition signed by 192 property tax paying voters of Dawson County was presented to the Commissioners' Court calling for the road bond election.

Only persons who are legally qualified voters of Texas and Dawson County and are resident property tax payers, who own taxable property in the county, and who have rendered the same for taxation will be eligible to vote in this election.

Voters are urged to read closely in another part of this paper the legal publication in regard to the proposed election setting forth in detail all necessary information in reference to this important problem.

Mrs. W. F. Scarborough of Midland Dies Aug. 1

Mrs. W. F. Scarborough, a prominent citizen of Midland, passed away at her summer home in Rudosa, N. M., on Sunday, August 1. She died suddenly from heart failure.

Final tribute was paid Mrs. Scarborough on Tuesday afternoon at the First Baptist Church of Fort Worth. Dr. Lee Scarborough of Fort Worth, and Rev. Winston F. Borum, pastor of the church, of which Mrs. Scarborough was a devout member, directed the services.

Mrs. Scarborough, 70 years old, had lived at Midland for 35 years and had been a member of the Baptist church all that time. For the past ten years she had been in ill health and for three years had been an invalid.

Immediate survivors are her husband, and six children, including a son, Hollis Scarborough of Cheyenne, five daughters, Mrs. Zach Collier of El Paso, Mrs. Myrtle S. Smith, Misses Lea and Lucille Scarborough and Mrs. Tom Lineberry of Midland.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Scarborough are well known in Lamesa. They lived in this county when it was first organized, owning a ranch northwest of town, but after a few years moved away.

One of the most systematic burglaries in the history of Lamesa was carried out Monday night when a person or persons broke into twelve Lamesa business houses between dark and midnight, making off with loot of approximately \$34.60 and several packages of cigarettes.

It seems that the burglar or burglars knew exactly what they wanted, going straight to the cash register in each instance and where the registers had not been left open, forced them and carried away their contents.

Firms entered were Clark-McDonald Drug, Spruill's Grocery, Lamesa Steam Laundry, Modern Way Grocery, Bob Stelzer Feed Store, Farmers Bakery, Cleveland Cafe, E. R. Yates Hardware, Richardson Variety, Bryant Coal and Grain, Clarence Nolan's Pig Stand and Nore's Dry Goods.

Officers are working on the case and it is thought that an arrest will be made within the next few days.

Howard Co. Woman Killed in Auto Wreck Near Here Saturday

One person was killed and two others were injured, one seriously, when the automobile in which they were riding overturned 17 miles west on the Lamesa-Seminole highway about five o'clock last Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. J. L. Stewart, 29, of Big Spring, died in an ambulance enroute to a hospital here. Her husband, J. L. Stewart, 30, suffered a dislocated vertebrae and minor bruises, and Miss Hazel Moore of Venice suffered a compound fracture of the right leg. The two year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stewart escaped injury.

The accident happened when their automobile struck a "chug hole" on the unpaved highway west of here. The automobile overturned several times.

First to arrive at the scene of the accident was Charles Culver of Hobbs, N. M. who was enroute to Lamesa. He brought Miss Moore to a hospital here and the ambulance from Higginbotham Funeral Home brought in the other victims.

Miss Moore and Mr. Stewart are patients in a local hospital where their conditions are reported as satisfactory. Funeral services for Mrs. Stewart were held in Big Spring on Monday, where burial was made.

Mr. and Mrs. Stewart lived ten miles south of Big Spring, and were enroute to their home from New Mexico when the accident happened.

Highways Contribute Much to the Progress Of Dawson County

One of the greatest factors contributing to the development of Dawson County has been the interest shown by the people of the County in road building. Today, Dawson County has two paved highways across the county giving many people of the county good roads over which to haul their farm products and also paved connections to other parts of the country. These roads have been built at a nominal expense to the county. Practically all of our roads have been built thru Federal and State participation.

Now, just when our road building program is going at full speed and we have an opportunity to complete badly needed farm-to-market roads for the county, the county finds itself handicapped by the lack of money to match Federal and State funds. If the construction on our roads stops it may not be possible to again get Federal and State aid on our roads. There are too many other counties ready to use the outside funds. We must continue this work and the only solution seems to be by voting a bond issue.

The majority of the people of the county already have access to good roads, but the people who do not have the roads and who have borne equally with others the burden of road building, are now asking for roads, and it seems only fair that we answer the call. The cost will be little and it will hurt no one.

Below is a statement showing some facts and approximate figures relating to the bond set-up as proposed:

1. Approximate total property valuation of county \$5,250,000.00
2. Amount of proposed bond issue \$500,000
3. Approximate rate of interest 5%
4. Term of bonds 30 years
5. Annual interest and principal payments \$3,500.00
6. Approximate tax on \$100.00 valuation .07
7. 180 acres of land rendered at \$800 will cost \$56 annually

W. B. Collins Chosen Director of American Retailers' Association

An outstanding honor was conferred on W. B. Collins, local dry goods man, at a meeting of the American Retailers' Association early in August in St. Louis. Mr. Collins was chosen as a director of the organization for the next two years representing the State of Texas at the association meetings which are held semi-annually.

The American Retailers' Association was organized in 1923 by a small group of seven retailers who met for the purpose of discussing the need of a national organization to enable retailers to meet periodically to study modern merchandising methods. 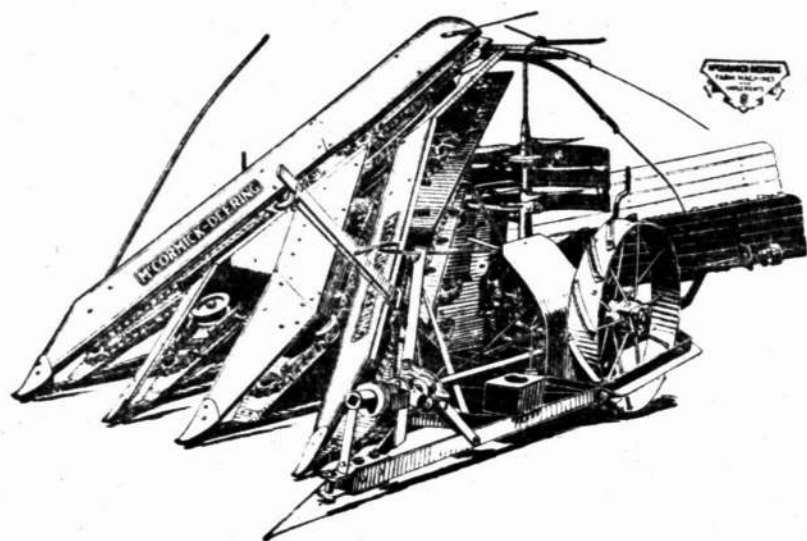

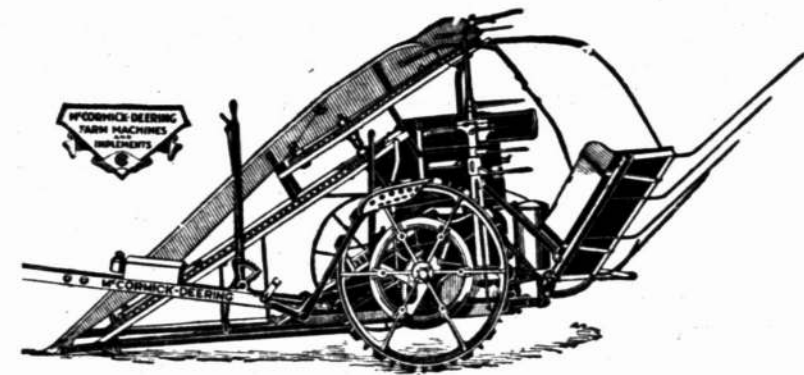

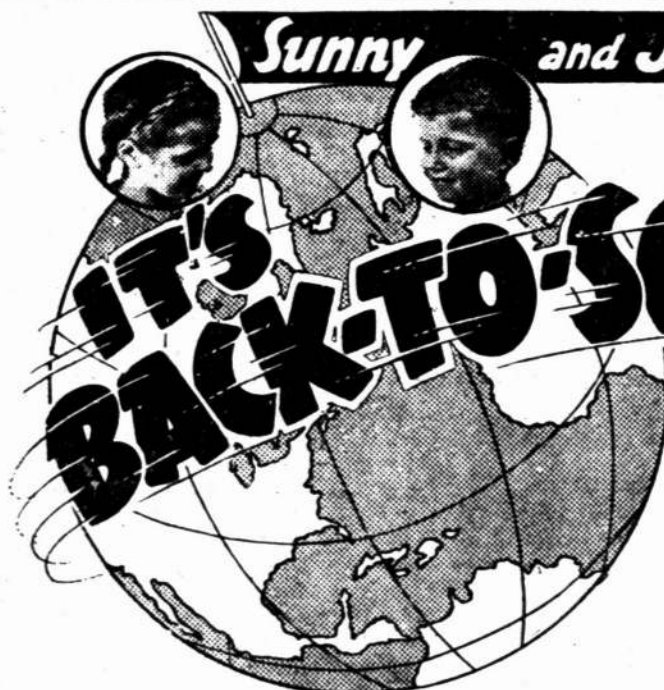

Big Spring Selected As Site For State Hospital For Insane

The State Board of Control announced last Friday the selection of Big Spring as the site for the new state hospital for the insane.

Claude Teer, chairman of the board stated that Big Spring had been definitely chosen with the only condition that it complete certain proposals contained in its bid.

"The board of control is of the opinion that the City of Big Spring offers the best opportunity of conveniently serving the people of West Texas," a statement said, "and will locate the hospital on a site offered by Big Spring if and when the terms of their application and proposal and all legal requirements have been met."

The board said it desired immediately to begin construction of the buildings and "architects and superintendent of the institution are standing by ready to carry on the work in an efficient and rapid manner."

"It will very likely take a year to complete various units provided for by the legislature and when they are completed it will be necessary for the legislature to make an appropriation for support and maintenance and for the staff of the institution."

Very likely that appropriation will not be made before the legislature meets in January, 1939, unless perhaps the legislature should make it at some time during a special session in 1938. The board of control hopes to make this the most modern institution in the system of seven state hospitals.

Dr. George Thomas McMahan recently was chosen as superintendent of the institution. He was graduated from Baylor Medical College, at Dallas, and was a member of the staff of the San Antonio state hospital for six years during which time he served as senior physician and clinical director of psychiatry.

Big Spring proposed to give the state 500 acres of fertile tillable land overlooking the city about one and one-half mile north of the center, on the west side of Highway No. 9, and bounded on three sides by public highways. It also agreed to furnish water, electric power, sewage, and natural gas facilities, as well as a railroad spur to the buildings without cost to the state.

The city would furnish sewage service at five cents a day per person and give the state the choice of two things with reference to water supply. It agreed to furnish 300,000 gallons of water from the city's sources at 10c per 1,000 gallons, or to deed the state a tract of land on which five water wells are located and which will produce 300,000 gallons daily. The state under the latter agreement could pump water through the city's lines for \$1.00 a year.

The Big Springs Chamber of Commerce was informed of the Board's decision and advised to proceed in carrying out the city's proposal, namely, obtaining assurance from the county and county as to construction of the spur, and other necessary legal steps.

It is planned to complete the sale of these bonds during the month of August.

Will Bedman, representing the Commissioners' Court, and J. E. Barron, the County Planning Board, gave reports on the progress of the road projects in the county.

**NARRATIVE OF WORK
By Mrs. Harvey Weir**

I was elected wardrobe demonstrator January 4, 1937. I count it a privilege, an honor and a great responsibility. A privilege because it enables me to work directly with my home demonstration agent to make improvement of permanence and value to my own home, an honor because it shows my club has confidence in my ability, and it brings me in contact with the leading women of the county, and a responsibility because I will be expected to pass on to others information I have gained in my work.

I have taken inventory of clothing for my family and put it all in good condition and I have provided adequate closet and storage space for my family of three. I find one does not have to spend a great sum of money to have a complete wardrobe, but it means a wise expenditure of money and a woman with small means may be well dressed at all times if she will take into consideration wearing quality, kind of fabric, lines suited to her personality and gives clothes systematic and intelligent care.

Why keep an account? To show where money goes to and find the leak and have to make adjustments and to know how to plan our next year's clothing needs, and about how much money we will need for our clothes. Also to teach the children the value and need of money. It shows us the need of keeping record of farm business, to aid in adjusting family differences.

My family clothes closet cost the sum of \$1.00. I took some old planks that came out of an old barn, washed and sawed them the right length. It is 9x5 1/2 x 3. Twenty-three inches from the top I put a ceiling and put a small door to that. From there down is my clothes space. In one end I have a bar for hanging clothes. In the other end I have shelves for clothes, blankets,

etc. I have pockets on the door, shoe rack on the floor, and a rack at the top. In this way, I can keep my things neat and in order. My club has done some good work, and we are 90 percent on foundation patterns. Several have made dresses for Rally Day. Some have made ironing sleeve boards. Also quite a few have adequate storage space.

NARRATIVE OF WORK By Mrs. N. T. Meeks

I was elected wardrobe demonstrator for my club in March. I felt it an honor, and went to work to make this demonstration a benefit to the members of my club as well as myself and family of six.

The first thing I did was to make plans to take care of the clothing of the family in a more convenient and adequate manner.

In my home there is only one built-in closet which is 9 feet high, 3 1/2 feet wide and 4 feet deep. It was overcrowded, so I decided to build a closet in the boys' room to provide storage for their clothing. This closet is built to fit in behind the door, using two sides of the walls, and building an outside wall and top for closet from tongue and groove. It is of scrap lumber, is 2 feet wide, and 2 feet deep. I placed a small iron rod across the closet to hang their clothes on, and a shelf at the bottom 12 inches from the floor to take care of their shoes, and a curtain is used for the door.

I removed everything from the overcrowded closet, raised the top shelf 6 inches and placed a rod (a discarded sucker rod) 18 inches from the back wall and 4 inches below the top shelf. I painted the entire closet with white flat wall paint. There is plenty of room now for mine and my daughters' clothes to hang on the rod. The two lower shelves take care of all our hats worn in season with each a hat stand shelf are stored boxes of out of season made from of metal boxes. On the top clothing and hats. A shelf is 12 inches from the floor and extends the width of the closet on it is placed our shoes.

My husband has an old fashioned wardrobe that has been in the family for years. It has double hooks screwed in the top to hang clothes. They were inconvenient and misplaced so I removed those hooks and placed a rod to fit across 12 inches from the top. I hang his clothes and it is much neater and convenient. His folded clothing is placed on the bottom where he can always find it.

Now for a dressing room for myself and husband, I used a small room 10x10. I removed all the surplus junk and placed another rod 5 feet long from the side of a cabinet of shelves to the outside wall, to hang all of our winter clothing; first brushed, cleaned and aired, then hung in moth proof bags. A dressing table and mirror complete this room. I also painted this room white.

The total cost was \$1.50 for 1-2 gallon of white flat wall paint.

Now we can all dress without dozens of trips, to the one closet in the house, and without so much confusion.

I have made six print dresses, 2 slips for myself. The total cost was \$8.02 and are valued at \$14.27, saving \$6.25.

For my daughter I made a silk dress, 3 print dresses, 2 slips, 1 pair of slacks for a total cost of \$7.82, valued at \$14.83, saving \$7.01. I have taught my daughter how to take care of her own clothes so that she may look well dressed at a moment's notice.

In my work as demonstrator I have made 8 foundation patterns for members of the club, and 2 for ladies not members. They are all well pleased with the convenience of cutting and fitting their clothes by these patterns. There is no pattern that exceeds the value of a well fitted foundation pattern for the woman who makes her own clothes. I have profited by my work as demonstrator, and have helped my cooperators to the best of my ability.

I want to thank our home demonstration agent for the valuable information and help she has given us throughout the year. I have enjoyed every meeting.

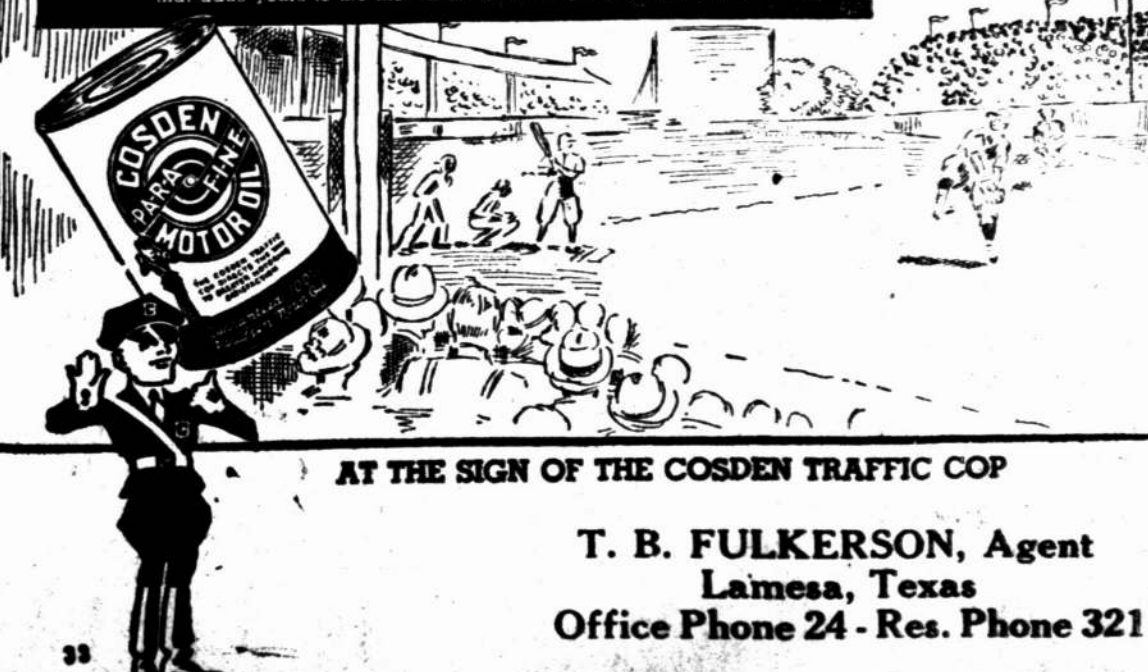

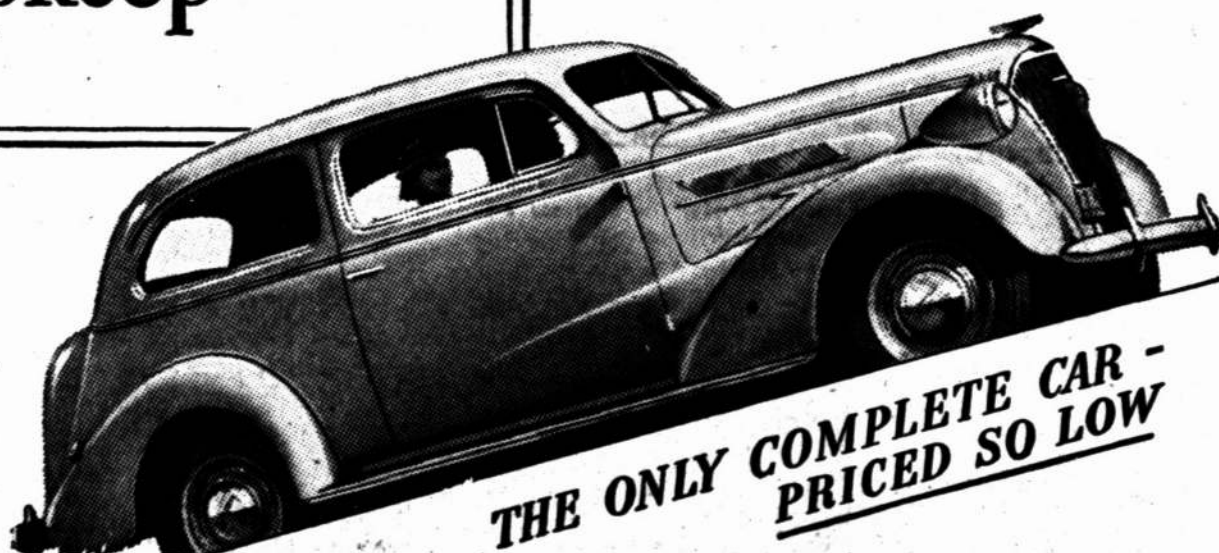

Reinvestigation of Pension Rolls a Normal Process

Reinvestigation of the rolls is the normal process by which a social welfare program is adjusted to changing economic conditions, State Pension Director W. A. Little explained this week.

"It is logical that an assistance grant made six months ago is probably either too small or too large for the present needs of an applicant. 'Reinvestigation' means that the Old Age Assistance Commission is going back and studying cases to see if each grant meets the needs of the individual," he added.

Little said the old age assistance program under both the Texas and federal laws was based upon the grants of aid being in the exact amounts of the needs of the applicants. He pointed out that continuous reinvestigations were an important part of any welfare program.

"When a grant is changed, either by being raised or lowered, such action must come only after the studied and serious consideration of the conditions surrounding the particular individual, of his needs, of his resources. To change a person's grant without a complete study of his case would be thoroughly unfair," the Director declared.

CHILDREN SHOULD BE PHYSICALLY FIT TO ENTER SCHOOL SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

Austin, August 10.—Now is the time, according to State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, for every parent to ask himself if his child is physically ready for school. A visit to the family physician will answer this question and give time for correction of minor defects before school bells ring out this September.

School children are exposed to so much infection that where a definite preventive against disease is known, parents should take advantage of it.

Vaccination against typhoid, diphtheria and smallpox should be done at once. These vaccinations may save many days out of school, doctor fees and perhaps life itself. More than three hundred children die each year in Texas from diphtheria.

A child with defective vision cannot be expected to do the required work in school, until this handicap is removed. Inflamed, watery eyes, granulated lids, chronic styes, nervous actions as habitual winking may be caused by defective vision and should be attended to immediately.

The far reaching effect of infected tonsils on the system has been recognized by health workers for many years. Many of the ills of later life as heart disease, arthritis, deafness and the like, are directly traceable to tonsils that became infected during childhood and were allowed to remain untreated.

Dental defects are found in more children than any other imperfection, estimates the Texas State Department of Health, urging that children should be taken regularly to the dentist for examination and cleaning of the teeth. This precaution keeps the mouth clean and makes it possible for dental defects to be discovered as soon as they appear.

Postural defects are detectable in children much sooner today than was formerly the case. Have your family physician see if your child's shoulder blade project and if his arches are low. Simple exercises while the child is young, diligently adhered to, will prevent later developments.

Some physical defects of children, particularly underweight or malnourishment, show no appreciable present effect. If such a condition is not corrected it may result seriously in later years.

Hard and fast rules for a child's weight at a certain age are difficult to arrive at due to variation in children's bone construction and physical build, but some gain should be shown each month. Average weights for height-and-age, as computed by experts, may be had from your family physician.

Resettlement Administration Saves Many Dollars for Farmers

Savings amounting to \$1,360,949 were effected for 1,302 farmers in the five-state area served by Region XII of the Resettlement Administration in the past year, William Klein, chief of this agency's Farm Debt Adjustment Section, announced this week through S. P. Collins, county supervisor.

These adjustments, it was said, resulted in the payment of taxes totaling \$76,546.

Indebtedness adjusted in Region XII for this period amounted to \$3,958,290, a reduction of 34 per cent and an increase of 125 per cent over the previous year. Klein's report to Regional Director L. H. Hunter of the Resettlement Administration, sets forth the savings to farmers in each state in the region.

The far-reaching effect of Farm Debt Adjustment work, Klein says, in preventing an unjust conviction of farmers from their homes is being felt in all sections of the country and has registered the confidence of all impartial individuals.

This achievement, he points out, is the result of all parties working together in an effort to bring the debtor and creditor together in a friendly atmosphere, where each other's problems were defined and worked out in voluntary agreements, benefiting both debtors and creditors. While it resulted in huge savings to debt-burdened farmers, it also liquidated many thousands of dollars of frozen assets of the creditors.

Debt adjustment in 47 counties in West Texas amounted to \$612,755. Indebtedness prior to adjustment totaled \$1,493,644. The 394 cases closed resulted in payment of taxes amounting to \$25,088. There are 256 cases now pending, according to Peter F. Murray and Walter R. Allen, district Farm Debt Adjustment supervisors.

Klein calls attention to the fact that the Farm Debt Adjustment service is free to any farmer residing in Region XII. He hopes that all farmers needing help in adjusting his debts will immediately get in touch with the county rural rehabilitation supervisor, a member of his local Farm Debt Adjustment committee, or write direct to him at the regional office in Amarillo, Texas.

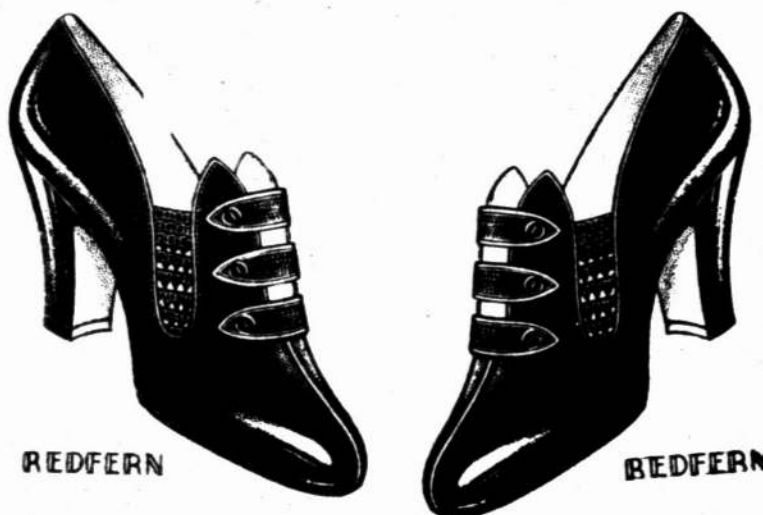

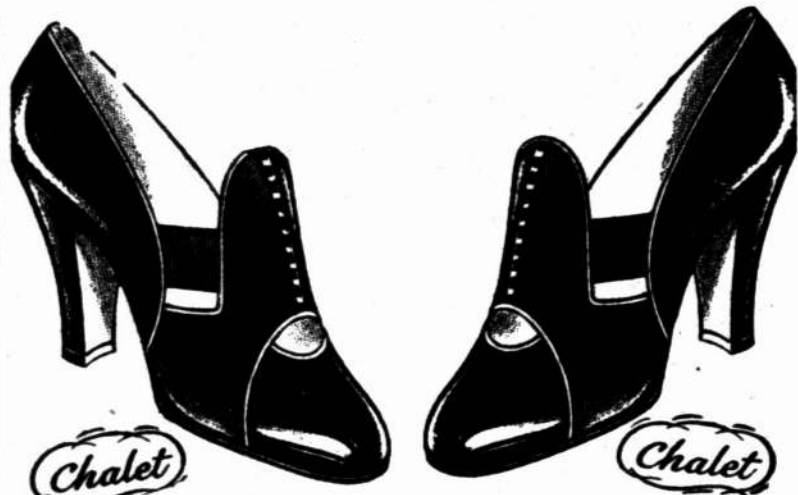
