## Three Boy Hunters Blown To Bits By Explosion

### Eighteen Towns Represented At Banquet

#### Gun Victim Is Found In Pecos River

(By The Associated Press)  
PORT STOCKTON, March 25.—The body of a man about 45, with a bullet hole through his back, was found in the Pecos river 25 miles north of here today, about half a mile from where the bodies of an unidentified woman and girl were found Feb. 21.

Sheriff W. P. Rooney, accompanied by deputies and Ranger Captain W. L. Wright, brought the body here but tonight had failed to establish identity, as no clothing was found. A justice of the peace returned a verdict of death from gunshot wounds, homicidal. The body apparently had been in the river 24 to 36 hours.

**Scar On Face**  
The man had been freshly shaved and his hair cut. He bore a pitted scar on his left cheek and a large scar under the left ear, had grey eyes, heavy grey hair and weighed about 150 pounds.

Sheriff Rooney said a reward would likely be offered for arrest and conviction of the slayer, as well as for identification of the victim.

Rewards of more than \$1,000 have been posted for identification of the woman and girl, who were buried here five weeks ago without identification, and for arrest of the person who killed them.

The sheriff's neighboring counties were asked today to come to Port Stockton to view the body and to assist in solving the mystery surrounding the man's death, which Sheriff Rooney expressed belief had some connection with the killing of the woman and girl.

#### Last Rites To Be Solemnized Today For J. S. Johnson

Retired Cattleman, Victim Of Heart Attack, Will Be Laid To Rest In Lubbock Cemetery This Afternoon

Funeral arrangements were completed here yesterday for John Sidney Johnson, 65-year-old retired cattleman, who died at the family residence, 2003 Broadway early Tuesday morning when a heart attack climaxed several months of illness.

Mr. Johnson, a director of the First National bank and of the West Texas hospital, resident of Lubbock for the past 18 years and prominent in Masonic circles, will be laid to rest in Lubbock cemetery this afternoon after last rites are said at the First Presbyterian church.

**Lewis, Manger In Charge**  
The ceremony will be in charge of Rev. Jack M. Lewis, pastor of First Presbyterian church, of which Mr. Johnson was a member, with Rev. H. L. Minger, pastor of First Methodist church, assisting. Local Knights Templar, one of the Masonic organizations in which the deceased was active, will form a guard of honor. Services will begin at 3 o'clock this afternoon with Rev. H. L. Minger officiating.

AUSTIN, March 25. (P)—Court attaches saw in an application by attorneys of John W. Brady for 190 witnesses, filed today, a move to ask for a change of venue in the second trial of the former appellate court judge for the slaying of Miss Leila Highsmith, stenographer, at last November 9.

The witnesses, Travis county people, representing many trades and professions were not asked to testify in the former trial. The application was filed by Dayton Moses of Fort Worth, who said the witnesses were "material."

#### Two Hundred And Seventy-Five At Annual Conclave

Lubbock's Campaign To Get 1931 Convention Of Texas Retail Merchants Told At Tuesday Meeting

#### White Toastmaster

John E. Phillips Of Fort Worth Principal Speaker On Program; Dallas Man And Others Heard

TWO HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FIVE merchants of Lubbock and 18 other towns of the South Plains, Oklahoma and far-Texas points, banqueted at Hotel Lubbock Tuesday night in the annual meeting of the Lubbock Retail Merchants association.

President Tom A. White, of the Lubbock association, presided as toastmaster, the principal speakers being John E. Phillips, of Fort Worth, credit manager of The Fair, and J. E. R. Chilton Jr., of Dallas, secretary of the Merchants' Red Book. Other talks were made by Mayor Harley D. Woods, George P. Kykendall, Garnett Reeves, A. B. Davis, with a vocal solo by Miss Nell Parnley.

**Two States Represented.**  
Towns represented, other than Lubbock, were: Dallas, Fort Worth, Oklahoma City, Hamilton, Electra, Levelland, Florida, Ropesville, Plains, Ralls, Slaton, Post, Snyder, Spur, Lamesa, Clarendon, Abilene, Plainview. Visitors from these towns were introduced to the gathering by President White, who also introduced A. B. Davis, manager; Garnett Reeves, secretary; and Misses Nell Cook and Gladys Williams, employees of the Lubbock Retail Merchants association.

#### McKenzie Sanity Jury Discharged

Jurors Stand 10 To 2 For Sanity Verdict In Deliberations Lasting Since Last Saturday

SAN ANTONIO, March 25. (P)—After deliberating since 12:35 p. m. Saturday in the second sanity hearing of John M. "Pete" McKenzie, the jury reported it was unable to agree and was discharged today.

The hearing had been 10 to 2 for a sanity verdict practically from the first ballot, a juror said.

As a result of this action, McKenzie will be returned to a state hospital for the insane. Judge McCrory announced Monday that he would not hold another sanity hearing unless by order of a higher court.

The question for the jury to decide was: "Is McKenzie sane at this time." Judge McCrory explained that he should be adjudged sane if he could distinguish between right and wrong and was able to realize the consequences of his acts.

He was convicted of the murder of Sam Street, chief of detectives here, and saved from execution by an insanity finding.

#### PLANES AT MIDLAND

MIDLAND, March 25. (P)—Nineteen planes of the second bombardment group of the United States army air forces, enroute from Langley field, Va., to Mather field, Calif., arrived here today after a flight from Shreveport, La.

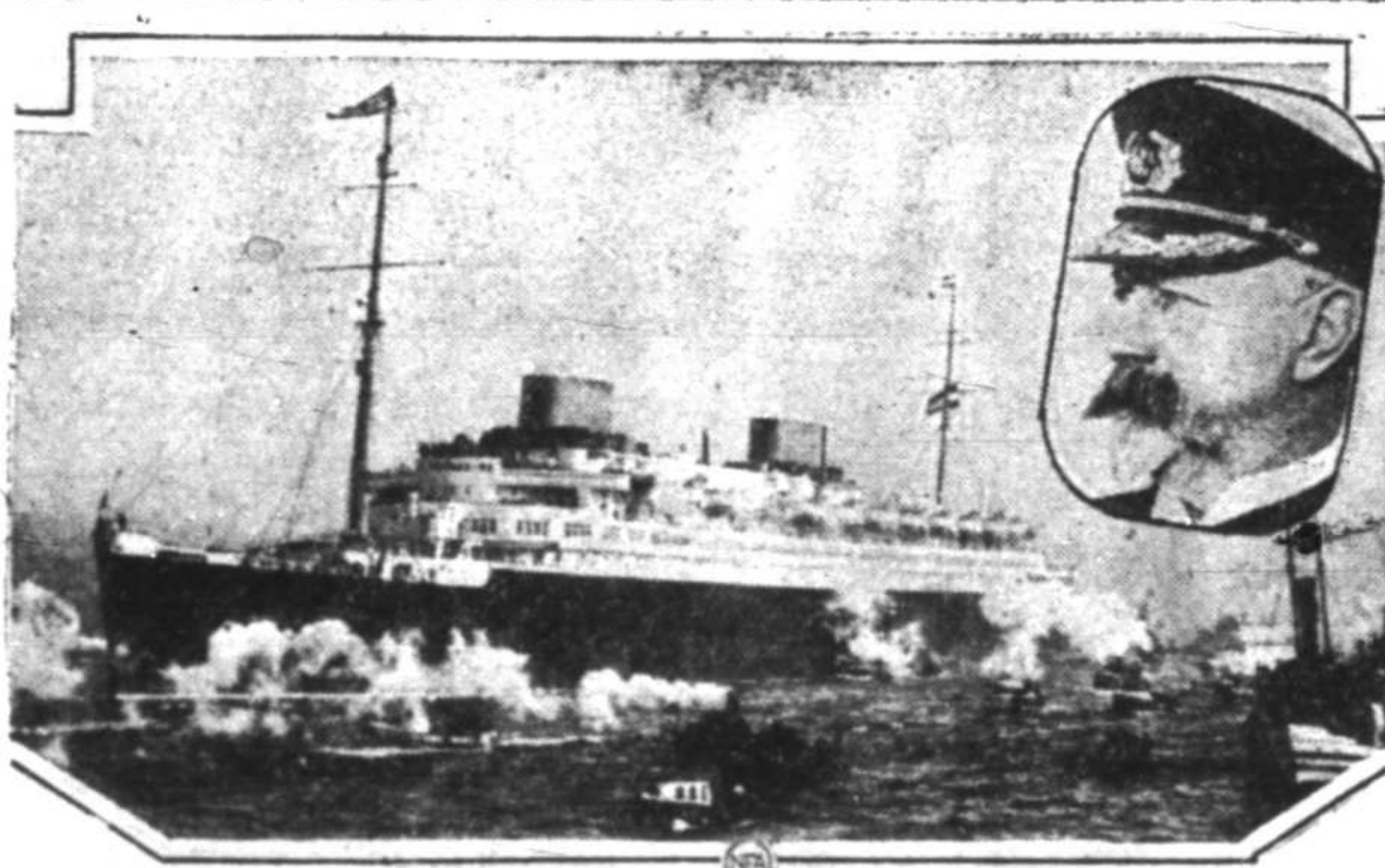

#### Sets New Record for Atlantic Crossing



NEW YORK, March 25. (P)—The new speed mistress of the seas — the North German Lloyd liner, Europa, shown above — slid into a fog bound New York harbor today with a new trans-Atlantic record for her maiden voyage from Cherbourg breakerwater to Ambrose lightship, just off the entrance of the harbor. The Europa passed the lightship at 5:45 a. m. to establish a record of four days, 17 hours and six minutes for the run across the Atlantic's speed lane. She left Cherbourg at 11 p. m. (E. S. T.) #### Platform Announced By J. K. Wester In Mayoralty Election

DECLARING for an honest, efficient and economical administration of the affairs of the city of Lubbock, J. K. Wester, "seventh hour" candidate for the office of mayor, last night announced his platform in the municipal elections of April 1.

"I have only one promise to make the people of Lubbock," said Mr. Wester. "If I am elected I shall use my best efforts and ability to give an honest, efficient and economical administration of the affairs of the city."

"It will not be my purpose, if elected mayor, to throw one straw in the way of progress and development of the city, but I am constitutionally opposed to taking all the people for the benefit of a few. However, I shall favor a policy which will be to the interest of all the people, regardless of their standing socially or politically."

Mr. Wester further outlined his platform as follows:

"I am in favor of economy and retrenchment in the city government. I favor reducing water rates and especially the minimum rate."

"I am in favor of employing home people to fill the different positions in the city."

"I do not believe in employing more men and women in the different departments of the city than are necessary for an efficient transaction of the affairs of the town."

"In my opinion, it is better and more conducive to good citizenship for people to own their own homes than for the homes to be owned by loan companies, hence I shall favor reducing the taxes of the town to the lowest rate possible, not to cripple any of the departments of the city government, that the people may use this extra money in paying for their homes of choice."

"I think that the best way to improve the city is to have a formal session next week to announce hopes held for success of London Naval Conference."

(By Associated Press)  
LONDON, March 25.—A formal plenary session of the five-power naval conference next week will inaugurate the world which has been accomplished in 18 weeks of negotiations and what hopes are held out for naval disarmament, delegates of the five powers decided this afternoon. Exact date of the plenary session will be fixed Thursday.

In conference circles tonight the coming session was described by delegates as one of hope instead of despair, indicating an entire change of the conference picture since this morning.

**Adjournment Not Talked**  
There was no talk of adjournment and the reports of a six month interval, which today became tangled in a skein of confirmations and denials, the proposal for adjournment must, credited both to the Italians and British, gave way to more constructive news of plans for proceeding with the conference full speed.

It was authoritatively stated that today's events were largely inspired by Secretary Stimson's frank talk with Prime Minister MacDonald this morning, the British and American chiefs agreeing that the conference must be lifted out of an atmosphere of apathy.

**Tone Hopeful**  
It also was stated Mr. Stimson never has given up his enthusiasm for a five-power treaty. He said tonight "the whole spirit of today's meeting was on the basis that a five-power agreement will be evolved in London. The tone of the

#### Reduction To Be Rule In Acreage Of Cotton Crops

Intentions Expressed By South Plains Farmers On Proposed Cut; More Feed Crops To Be Planted

Evidence that acreage reduction will be the rule on the South Plains is coming from a number of cotton farmers, many of them expressing their own intentions of growing more feed crops, feeding more cattle on the Plains and of getting away from the one-crop system more than ever.

Briggs Robinson, operating 1,300 acres five miles east of Slaton, according to Walter S. Posey, vice-president of the First National bank, relates that he had 1,000 acres in cotton last year.

**To Plant Grain.**  
"This year," states Mr. Posey, "Mr. Robinson says that he might have only about 100 acres in cotton. The remainder of this tract will be planted to grain sorghums, sudan and other feed crops. Mr. Robinson expects to go into the feeding out of livestock quite extensively."

Ed. Woodley, of near Ropesville, is quoted as saying that he had planned to have approximately 3,000 acres planted to cotton this year, but that he has changed those plans to include not more than perhaps

#### POPE INDICTED

Additional Charges Filed Against Southland Man

#### Aged Couple, Unable To Live Without Each Other, End Lives In Suicide Pact

(By Associated Press)  
BALTIMORE, March 25.—An aged couple, in ill health and near poverty, today ended their lives, 32 years of which they had spent together, because one could not live without the other.

Police found the bodies of the couple, Harry B. Applewhite, 75, and his wife, Laura, 70, lying in their bed with throats slashed. Two razors, the instruments of their double suicide pact, were found lying by their bodies.

On a table beside the bed was a note, telling of the fight against ill health and straitened circumstances of the couple. It

was written by Mrs. Applewhite and signed by her and her husband, though police said she had done all of the writing.

"My health has steadily declined," the note read. "I have a heart weakness and my husband is more painful than ever. So I feel that I cannot make the grade. Harry and I have been married for 32 years and one cannot live without the other, so we have concluded together by our own hands."

Lying on top of the note, which instructed that Mrs. Applewhite's sister be informed, lay a nickel with another note saying "It was for the telephone call."

#### More Candidates Seeking Posts As School Trustees

W. G. Alderson And Maple Wilson Announce Their Candidacy For Election Here On April 5th

#### Four Terms Expire

Applications Are Closed At Midnight Tuesday For School Vote; Members Of Board Seek Re-Election

WITH applications closed last night at 12 o'clock for places on the ticket for the forthcoming school trustee election, two new candidates for the board were announced yesterday afternoon.

The applications of W. G. Alderson and Maple Wilson were filed late Tuesday by Mr. Alderson and J. W. Sampson in the office of the board's secretary.

The terms of four of the members are to expire this year and all four are candidates for re-election. They include J. T. Hutchinson, C. E. Maedgen, Neil H. Wright and W. B. Aldridge.

Three hold-overs on the board are S. C. Wilson, E. L. Robertson and R. P. Bayless.

The election is to be held on April 5 at the city hall in Lubbock and polls will open at 8 o'clock and close at 7 o'clock.

#### CONVICT KILLED

Youth Shot Down In An Attempt To Escape Guard

CORSICANA, March 25. (P)—Ralph V. Graft, 20, Tipton, Ind., was shot and killed today when he jumped from a truck in which T. M. Franks, guard at the Navarro county farm, was conveying prisoners to the farm. The youth was held on a charge of unlawful train riding.

#### Two Boys Accused In Gouge Murder

Beach Slaying Last July Is Echoed As Investigation Is Resumed; Reward Offered For Murderers

HOUSTON, March 25.—Authorities today accused two 18-year-old boys of the beach murder of Howard (Buster) Gouge and the wounding of his girl companion, Lillian Bissett, 18. On the night of July 2, 1929 Gouge, sitting with Miss Bissett in front of his automobile at Morgan's point, was shot to death by two men and one bullet struck her.

Frank Clause, in jail at Dallas on a burglary charge, and Clyde Barrow, held in Waco awaiting transfer to Huntsville prison to serve a 14-year sentence for 14 burglaries, were charged with murder in complaints filed before a justice of the peace by a district attorney's investigator.

A reward of \$2,000 for apprehension of the slayer or slayers was offered by the father of the slain youth and hundreds of officers joined in the search. The case finally was consigned to the "unsolved" files until several weeks ago J. S. Wyatt, the investigator and Sheriff T. A. Binford located several witnesses sought since the night of the slaying, and obtained information that led to the filing of the charges.

**NINE WORKMEN KILLED**  
MEXICO CITY, March 25. (P)—Nine workmen were killed and several injured today in the collapse of the Tecamachalco dam at Morales Hacienda, near Toluca. They were buried in the debris.

#### HEARING SCHEDULED

Orange Man And Wife Held For Officer's Death

BEAUMONT, March 25. (P)—Preliminary hearing for N. E. Perkins and his wife, Fannie, on charges of murdering Will C. Whitcomb, Orange policeman, early today, will be held at Orange tomorrow morning.

The night patrolman was shot at the Perkins home after stopping there to quiet an altercation between the man and his wife, Leonard Carr, an Orange youth, said he was with White; that he went after some cigarettes and returned to find the officer shot dead. Carr said Perkins told him he had killed White. He said Perkins and his wife had been drinking.

#### DAGUE ON TRIAL

Companion Of Gunwoman Is Charged In Slaying

NEW CASTLE, Pa., March 25. (P)—Taking of testimony started today in the trial of W. Glenn Daguerre, former Wheeling, W. Va., automobile salesman, indicted with Mrs. Irene Schroeder, for slaying Highway Patrolman Brady Paul after a holdup. The court ordered another night session to speed the proceedings.

Developments included a visit to the scene of the slaying by the court, jury and defendant, and the appearance of Mrs. Schroeder in the courtroom for identification purposes.

**FATALLY WOUNDED**  
GREENVILLE, March 25. (P)—A. O. Thurman, 54, garage owner here for eighteen years, was found today fatally wounded at his home. He was lying unconscious in a bedroom, a pistol nearby.

#### Returns Baby To Burning House

TULSA, March 25. (P)—Because his 3-year-old sister thought he was "too cold" outdoors and carried him back to his bed in their blazing home after he had been rescued from the flames by a 5-year-old brother, John William Page, 11-months-old, was burned to death here late today. The girl dashed to safety after tucking the baby in his bed.

The mother, Mrs. W. H. Page, was at the home of an ill neighbor at the time and the father was at work. The fire was said to have started when one of the children thrust one end of a scrap of paper into the kitchen stove and then threw the blazing paper into a box of wood.

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#### Explosive Found On Oil Lease Is Fatal To Youths

Fate Of Victims Not Known Until Scheduled Return Home Overdue; Search Is Started In Mountains

#### Blast Not Noticed

Father Finds Head Of Son; Other Parts Of Bodies Found Scattered About On Ground

(By Associated Press)  
TULSA, Okla., March 25.—Three boy hunters were blown into bits by an explosion today near Turkey mountain, southwest of here, which was attributed to nitroglycerin believed to have been found by the trio on a nearby oil lease.

The dead were Luther McClough, 16, and Union Butler McClough, 13, brothers, and Harold Edward Komers, 12.

**Blast Unnoticed**  
The youths left their homes this morning with two shot guns for a day's hunting. They were last seen alive, so far as could be learned, on a road leading through the lease. Because of blasts set off by workmen engaged in repairing the road, the explosion which killed the boys went unnoticed. Their fate was not discovered until tonight when their failure to return home led their parents to begin a search.

Ben McClough, pumper employed on an oil lease, found the head of his oldest son, one-half mile from the McClough home, in a "thick" wooded section. Further search disclosed other parts of the three boys' bodies scattered on the ground, while in tree branches were small pieces of their clothing.

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#### Dan Sanders Case Gets Continuance

Trial Scheduled At Post This Morning On Charge Of Selling Intoxicants; Defense Witness Missing

POST, March 25.—A motion for continuance in the case of Dan Sanders, charged with sale of intoxicants, was granted this afternoon by Judge Gordon B. McGuire due to absence of a defense witness in the scheduled trial.

Judge McGuire granted a continuance until Wednesday morning when the case will again be called. Sanders' case was originally set for tomorrow morning but was pushed up to this afternoon when a re-arrangement of the docket was made necessary.

Sanders was indicted by a Garza county grand jury last Friday as the aftermath of an investigation of the death of J. T. Henson, 60-year-old man, for whom heart failure, alleged to have climaxed a drinking bout, proved fatal. Tommy Ross, Sanders' son-in-law, was also charged with sale of intoxicants at the same time.

The missing witness is Duane Sanders, son of the defendant.

## Canada's System Of Liquor Store Will Be Related

E. C. Drury Of Province Of Ontario To Appear As Pro Witness In Hearing For Repeal Of Laws

WASHINGTON, March 25. (AP)—A picture of the operation of the government liquor store system in Canada is expected tomorrow when E. C. Drury of the province of Ontario will appear as a witness for prohibition forces before the house judiciary committee hearing on measures to repeal the 18th amendment.

Mrs. Lenna Lowe Yost, organizer of the dry witnesses said today that John J. Lentz, president of the American Insurance union and former representative from Ohio, would be the second witness. His testimony probably will deal with the insurance company view of prohibition and the actuarial findings on alcoholic mortality rates, a subject that has caused considerable debate in the committee.

Prohibition engaged house attention late today in a speech by Representative O'Connell, republican, New York. He said "Volsteadism becomes the nation's most colossal burden and blunder," and declared that alcoholic deaths, crime conditions, penitentiary and court unsupplies and unAmerican law.

After declaring that the coast guard fleet next year would employ a personnel greater than that of the navy during the Cleveland administration, O'Connell concluded that "surely we are paying a high price for a fallacious and unworkable experiment."

## Two Suspects Are Held In Robbery

Arrests Made Nine Hours After Restaurant Owner Is Shot To Death In New York Tuesday

NEW YORK, March 25. (AP)—Nine hours after William Curry, 48, had been shot to death in a \$35 holdup of his restaurant in Newark, N. J., two suspects were arrested in New York, all because of a witness' memory of casual details.

One of the customers remembered that one of the robbers had made a telephone call to a girl, and he also remembered the number. Police traced it to an apartment. While they were there the girl telephoned and asked for George B. Harris. The detective who answered said Harris was out, but that he was expected soon and that she was to come to the apartment.

She did, and while she was being questioned, Harris, whose brother occupied the apartment, arrived with Lawrence A. Doyle. Both were arrested. Neither was armed.

## Search for Hammer To Wichita Falls

FORT WORTH, March 25. (AP)—Developments in the search for the hammer slayer of Mrs. Pearl Voss, 30, found with her skull crushed in a pasture four miles from here March 16, shifted to Wichita Falls tonight.

Officers here said that a man and woman were wanted here in connection with the case. Their names were not disclosed. The persons sought are said not to be the actual slayers, but it is hoped that they may offer a clue to the identity of the murderer.

So far all leads uncovered by investigators have ended without any tangible evidence as to the slayer. A description of the man and woman has been given Wichita Falls authorities.

## IN NARROW ESCAPE One Injured When Trains Meet In Collision

EASTLAND, March 25. (AP)—Crews of two Texas & Pacific trains narrowly escaped death when their trains met in a head-on collision three miles east of Olden.

Gus Kelly, fireman, was the only one injured. He was taken to a hospital where his condition was said to be serious. Both locomotives were wrecked and a number of cars of each train derailed.

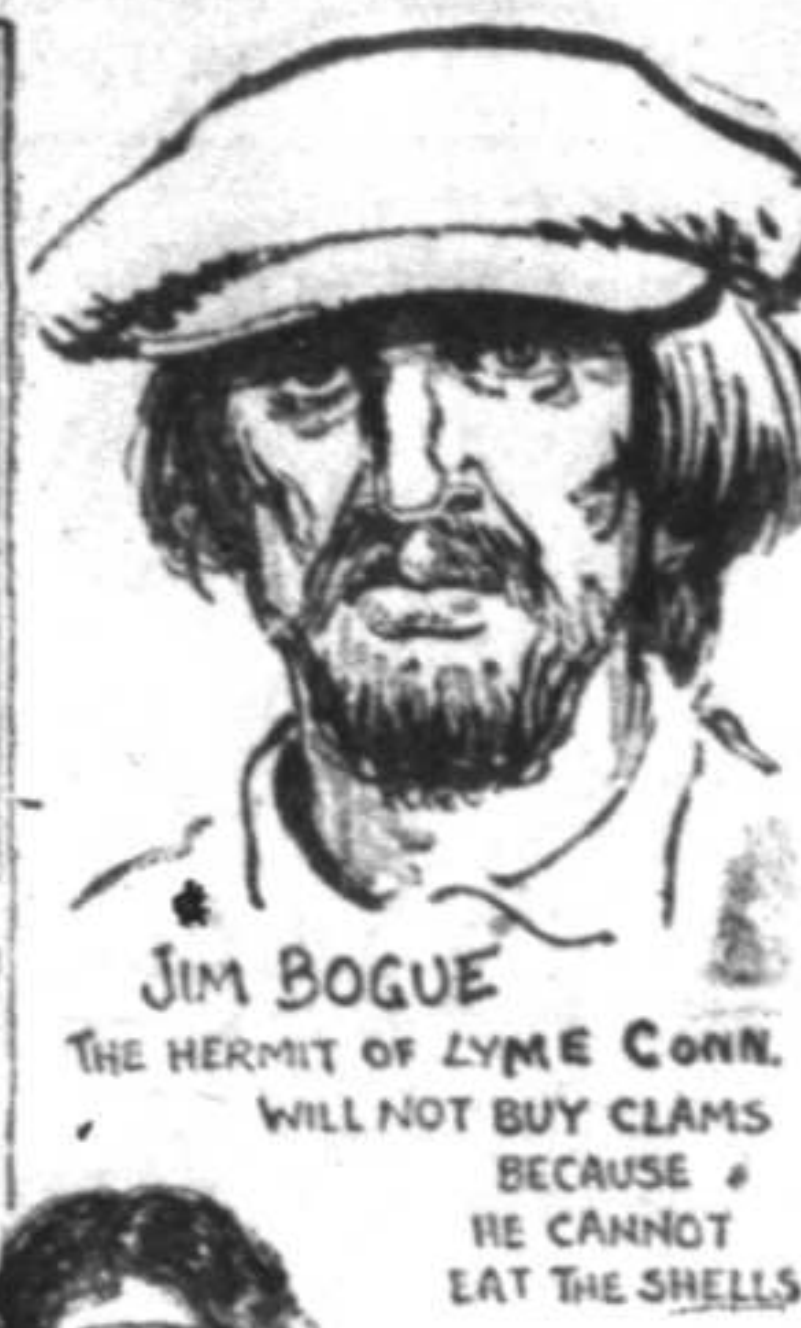

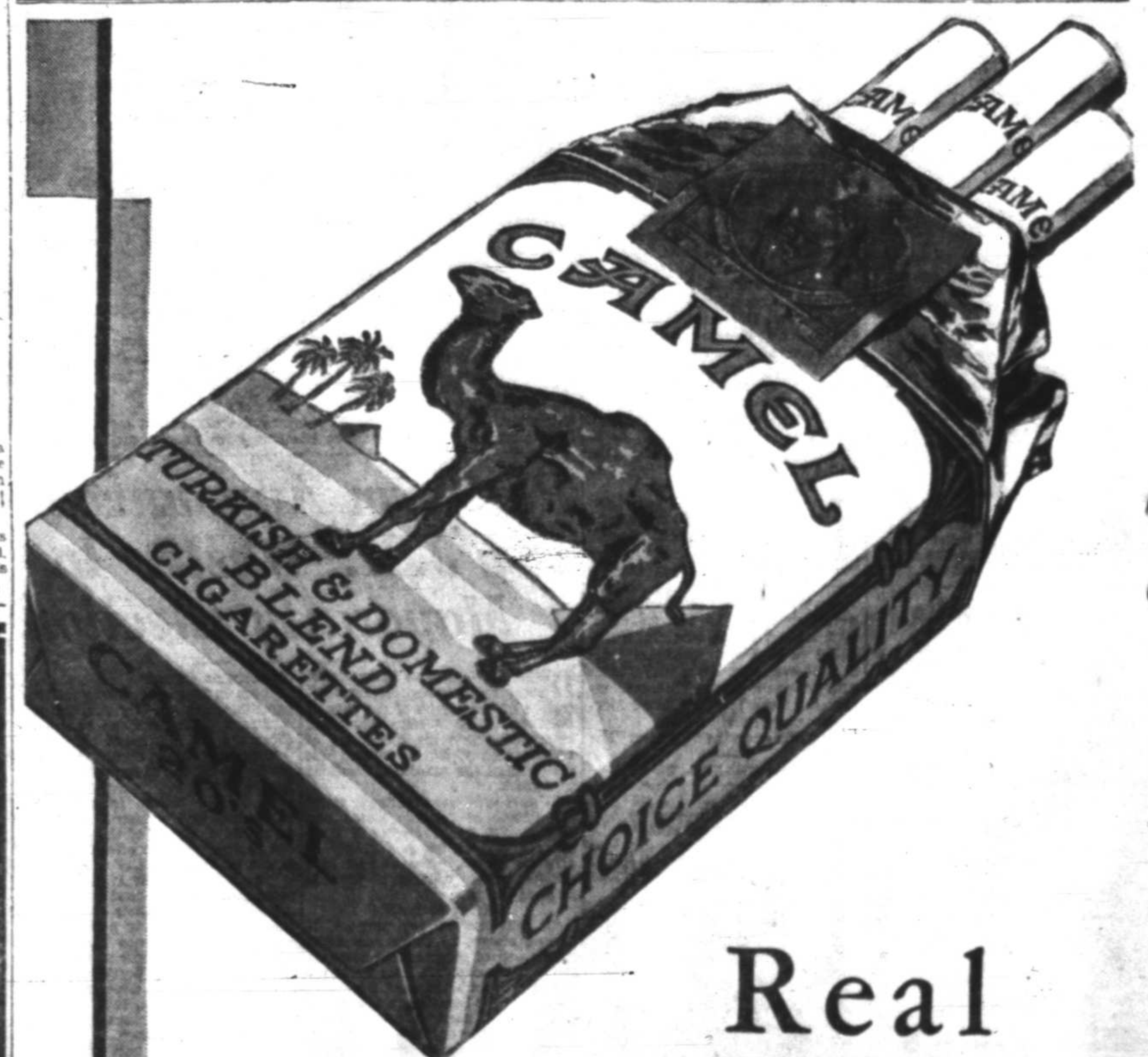

## Four-Month Hunt For Chemist Ends In Double Suicide

Body Of Cleveland Man And  
Woman Identified After  
Death In Vienna Hotel;  
Family To Get Insurance

VIENNA, March 25. (P)—Four months of search for Dr. Ernest Watzl, Cleveland chemist and inventor who disappeared last November, was ended today with identification of his body by his father in hotel here. With Watzl's body was that of a woman believed to be Mrs. Mary McGranahan of Cleveland.

The bodies, both bearing gun shot wounds, were found in a room at the Hotel Sacher yesterday. The woman was known here as Josefa Kropel, but she was reported to be a mannequin named Mary McGranahan, whose mother, named Julia Horvath, is a resident of Cleveland.

**Body Identified**  
This morning H. Matz, a watchmaker and now owner of a toy show in Vienna, identified the body of the man as "Hermann Watzl," his son. He said that his son was a chemist 40 years old, that some years ago he went to the United States to sell patents and that there he married and had three children. Some months ago the younger Watzl disappeared, and his wife, unable to obtain insurance, instituted police inquiries for her husband which were unsuccessful.

**Married In Cleveland**  
From the information gathered here the dead woman was married in Cleveland and her husband sued Watzl for \$50,000 for the estrangement of his wife.

Financial distress, coupled with worry over this suit, was believed to have been among the causes leading to the suicide of the couple.

CLEVELAND, March 25. (P)—Dr. Ernest Watzl, Cleveland chemist, died in Vienna as dramatically as he did his disappearance in Pennsylvania.

The \$80,000 life insurance policy which he kept paid while eluding a four-month search would have expired a few hours after his death, the friends here believed that, driven to desperation by financial difficulties, he timed his suicide so that his widow and the persons who insured his last trip would not suffer.

James L. McGranahan, whose pretty 20-year-old wife, Mary, disappeared shortly after the chemist said his wife once told him she and Dr. Watzl once went on a motor trip planning outside, but that the inventor "backed out." Mrs. Watzl declined to comment.

Dr. Watzl's bearing, ability to make friends and reputation as a chemist, opened the city's best homes to him. He was a conspicuous figure in night clubs.

PORT, Mar. 25. (Special)—With calling of the case of J. M. Pope, former Southland banker, and charged with false entry, theft by bailor and accepting deposits in a bank he knew to be insolvent, continuance was granted in the 1926th district court until Monday, March 31.

Upon pleas of Pope's attorney, Andy Bill of Littlefield, Judge Gordon B. McGuire, of Lamesa, presiding, granted the six-day continuance.

Pope, whose privately owned bank of Southland closed its doors last December, was on hand for the trial. He now resides at Littlefield.

**MISSIONARIES ISOLATED**

SHANGHAI, March 25. (P)—Almost nation-wide telegraphic investigation during the past 12 hours disclosed tonight that 16 American Catholic missionaries—10 men and six women—were at Hangchow, Kiangsu province, today, isolated from the outside world and unable to come to coastal cities to obtain safety due to depredations of untamed hordes of Chinese bandits and communists.

## Boy of 2 Is Pawn in Suit Arising from Clinic Fire

AKRON, O., March 25.—A chubby little 2-year-old boy known as Carl Long, Jr., is the center of one of the strangest lawsuits ever heard in the Ohio courts—a lawsuit that dates back to the Cleveland Clinic disaster of last May, when more than 100 persons died in a fire and explosion.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl W. Long both perished in the tragedy. They left an estate valued at approximately \$40,000. Two knotty legal questions have arisen.

First: was little Carl the natural son of the Longs or was he—as one side asserts—the son of Lorela Rush, 20, of Barberton? Second: did Mr. Long or Mrs. Long die first in the Clinic tragedy?

If the court decides that Carl is the Longs' son, he will inherit most of the estate. Testimony shows Mrs. Long in February of 1928, laid in a stock of baby clothes; and a physician has testified that he helped her bring Carl into the world. But the Barberton girl insists Carl is her child, whom she turned over to Mrs. Long at birth and for whom she received \$100 from Mrs. Long for medical expenses.

If Carl is ruled not to be the Longs' child, the question which died first is important. If Long died first the estate would go to heirs of Mrs. Long. If she died first, his heirs would inherit it.

Cleveland police and hospital records have been scanned for evidence. It has been shown that Long's body was received at the county morgue before Mrs. Long's, but the confusion attending the fire at the clinic may keep this evidence from being exclusive.

**PRISONERS SURRENDER**

PARIS, March 25. (P)—Forty mutineers in the military section of the island prison of Oleron, who had barricaded themselves in a casemate, surrendered today.

Messages received by the ministry of war said there was no fighting. The governor of the prison surrounded the mutineers with troops and the 40 were forced to submit, because of a lack of food.

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## Probe Continues In Two States Of "Jake" Paralysis

Alcohol Manufactured From Petroleum Thought Cause Of Malady Suffered By Scores In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 25. (AP)—Tests seeking to ascertain if alcohol manufactured from petroleum might be responsible for a paralysis like malady suffered by scores of persons here were made by state officials today, in the face of a declaration by the originator of the process for extraction of the alcohol that the investigation would be in vain.

James P. Pien, assistant state health commissioner, announced yesterday that tests had been ordered in the belief petroleum alcohol might have been used in the manufacture of Jamaica ginger. Many persons suffering with the paralysis have admitted drinking Jamaica ginger.

Dr. Robert Isham, Okmulgee, Okla., chemist, credited with discovery of the process for making petroleum, or iso-propyl alcohol, said it could be drunk, but would not cause intoxication or paralysis.

### Three Hundred Cases In Kentucky

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 25. (AP)—Belief of physicians and state board of health officers that the drinking of adulterated Jamaica ginger is the cause of the outbreak of partial paralysis in Kentucky that has resulted in more than 300 reported cases has been substantiated by the case histories of six men brought here for observation and tests.

The six, brought to the Louisville city hospital from Eastern Kentucky, admitted readily, Dr. C. H. Harris, city director of health said, that they had used from two to six ounces of the so-called "Jake" daily, drinking it from three to six weeks before they lost control of their legs.

## Crude Production Shows Reduction

Estimated Daily Average For Week Ending March 22, 43,601 Barrels Less Than Previous Week

TULSA, Okla., March 25. (AP)—As abruptly as it started upward during the week ending March 15, the estimated daily average production of light and heavy crude oil in the United States coursed downward again during the week ending March 22 to register a total of but 240,805 barrels, 43,601 less than for the preceding week.

Light oil, according to the current report of the Oil and Gas Journal, dropped 45,239 barrels, apparently due to continued operations in the midcontinent area and in accompaniment with a losing sixth vote in congress on a proposed oil tariff.

Decrease Shown Oklahoma contributed 36,005 barrels of the total decrease of which 21,970 was registered in the Oklahoma City pool alone. This field is under virtually three-fourths complete curtailment of production. Both St. Louis-Pearson and the Seminole areas dropped. The northern miscellaneous fields climbed perceptibly.

West Texas area lost 2,479 barrels while the midcontinent area, dropped 38,554 in light and heavy oil 552. The Gulf coast heavy area gained approximately 2,000 barrels while the southwest Texas area dropped slightly. California coursed downward 8,450 barrels recorded

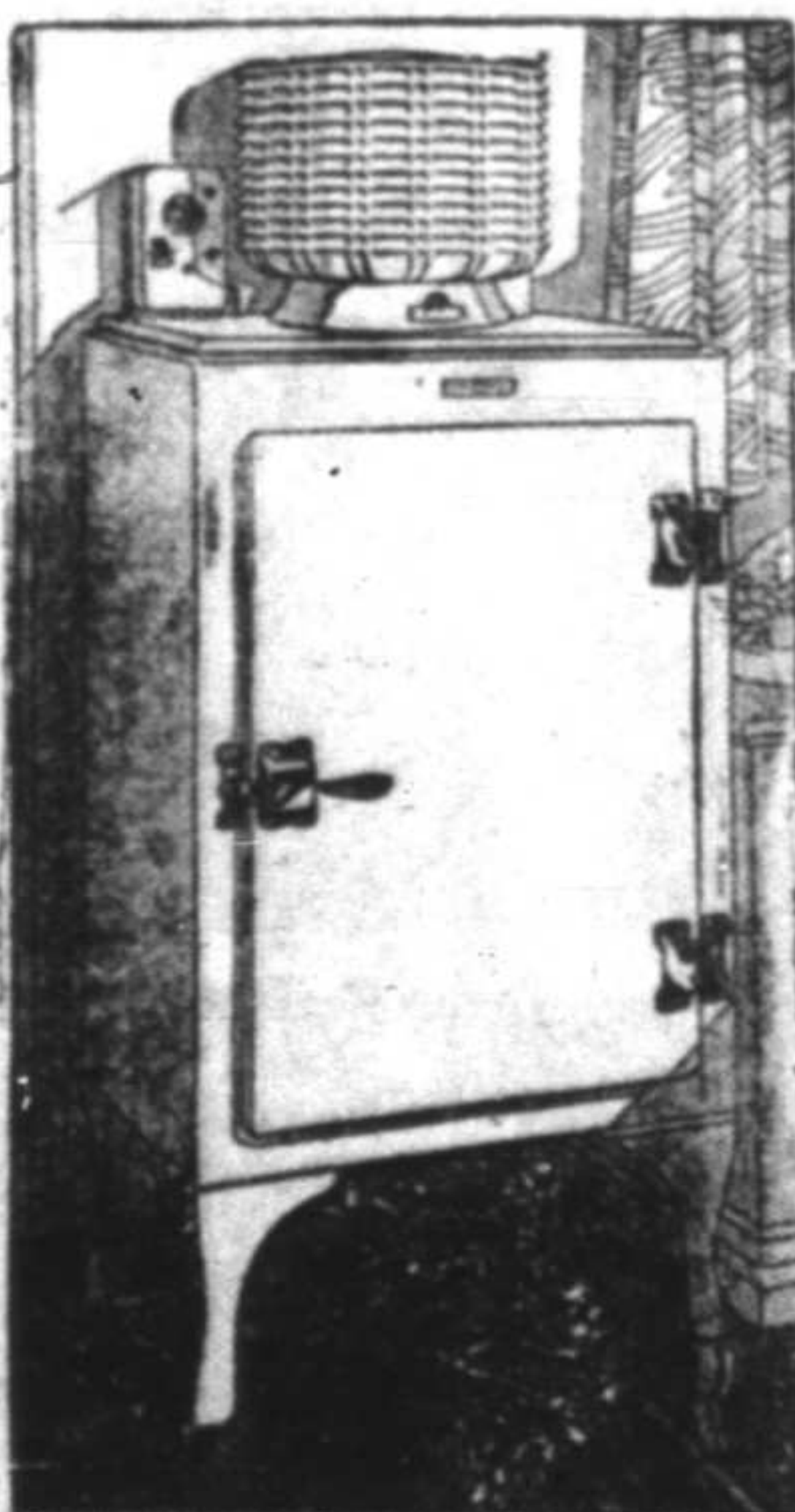

## Prison Reform Is More Hopeful As Simmons Accepts

Members Of Board Pleased With New Management Of System; Committee Named For Improvements

HOUSTON, March 25. (P)—New hope for prison reform in Texas was seen by members of the prison board today as the result of Lee Simmons' acceptance of the system management. It will counteract, board members believed, to a large extent, the legislature's failure to provide a new plant and pave the way for obtaining such a plant from future legislatures.

Meanwhile, chairman W. A. Padlock of the board appointed two committees to plan improvements allowed under the \$775,000 appropriation passed at the recently adjourned fifth called session of the legislature. Mr. Padlock will act as ex-officio chairman of both committees. One of these consisted of Joseph Wearden, Goliad, Fred Horton, Greenville, Dr. A. C. Scott, Temple, and J. B. H. Holderby, Fort Worth. They will have charge of improvements to be made at the Huntsville walls. The other is composed of E. H. Astin, Bryan, Frank Tiller, Rosenberg, and Dave Nelson, Orange. They will plan work to be done on the farms.

The meeting was the first one attended by Mr. Nelson since his appointment by Governor Moody to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of Rabbi Henry Cohen, Galveston. Governor Moody now has another place to fill on the board, since Simmons was a member himself and by acceptance of the management necessarily had to resign from the board. He has been a member for the last ten years.

Mr. Simmons succeeds W. H. Mead, who resigned last fall. Since that time Padlock has been acting manager. Acceptance of the position by Mr. Simmons followed repeated efforts by board members, legislators and other friends of prison reform to persuade him to undertake the work.

## Americanization Goal of Soviets

MOSCOW, March 25. (P)—Complete "Americanization" of the industries appears to be the goal of the Soviet government.

Under the stimulus of American engineering skill and enterprise, the government today decided to erect this year, on modern American lines, a series of huge industrial plants costing \$2,150,000,000.

The government is scrapping most other methods of construction. No less than 39 American firms are now operating in Soviet Russia, between them supervising nearly \$3,000,000,000 worth of construction.

Since withdrawal of W. A. Harman and company from the big Georgian manganese concession, no American financial interests have invested capital in Soviet enterprises but the number of American engineering firms securing profitable contracts is increasing.

The latest contract was signed today with the New York engineering firm of Stewart, James & Cooke, a concern which already has three contracts with the government for furnishing technical aid and supervision in the mines of the famous Donetsk coal basin.

NICHOLAS BRADY ILL. NEW YORK, March 25. (P)—The New York World today says Nicholas P. Brady, chairman of the board of the New York Edison company and a director in a score of public utilities, industrial companies and banks, is critically ill at his home on Fifth avenue. Mr. Brady arrived in New York Sunday night in a private car from Florida. He was taken from the train direct to his apartment where he is under the care of his private physician. Members of the family declined to discuss the nature of his illness.

In view of the fact that Lubbock is stressing a campaign to have this city established as headquarters for district No. 2, the meeting is of great importance. This designation would make Lubbock a cotton concentration point for 64 counties of the Panhandle and South Plains.

Vernon was recently established as a branch office for district No. 1, after the Vernon Chamber of Commerce had underwritten the expense necessary for organization work.

## Wallace Beery's Plane Is Wrecked

LOS ANGELES, March 25. (P)—Wallace Beery's cabin biplane, in which the film villain expected soon to fly to Mexico City, today lay in ruins near Alhambra, Calif., where it crashed yesterday, bringing death to two men and a woman. Beery was not aboard the ship.

George Maves, 23, Beery's pilot, his wife, Cynthia Maves, and Lynn H. Hayes, 26, transport pilot and friend of Maves, were killed when the plane crashed and burst into flames after going into a tail spin at 50 feet altitude. It struck only a short distance from Valley boulevard, one of the main highways south from Los Angeles. Scores of motorists rushed to the scene, but were unable to aid the passengers.

Witnesses said the plane apparently developed trouble shortly after taking off from the Burbank airport on a cruise over the San Gabriel valley.

## Indebtedness of Scouts Taken Up

With the mailing of a \$300 check yesterday to national headquarters, indebtedness of the South Plains area council of Boy Scouts was cleared.

This final payment liquidated a debt of \$5,000, which faced the organization one year ago.

D. T. Jennings, of Kansas City, recently appointed executive of the council, will arrive in this city on April 1.

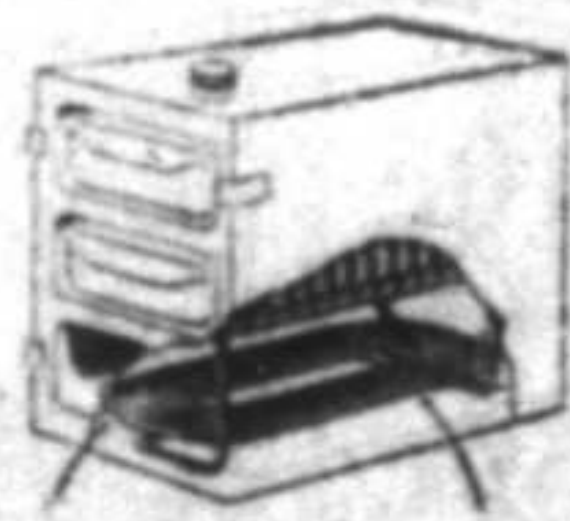
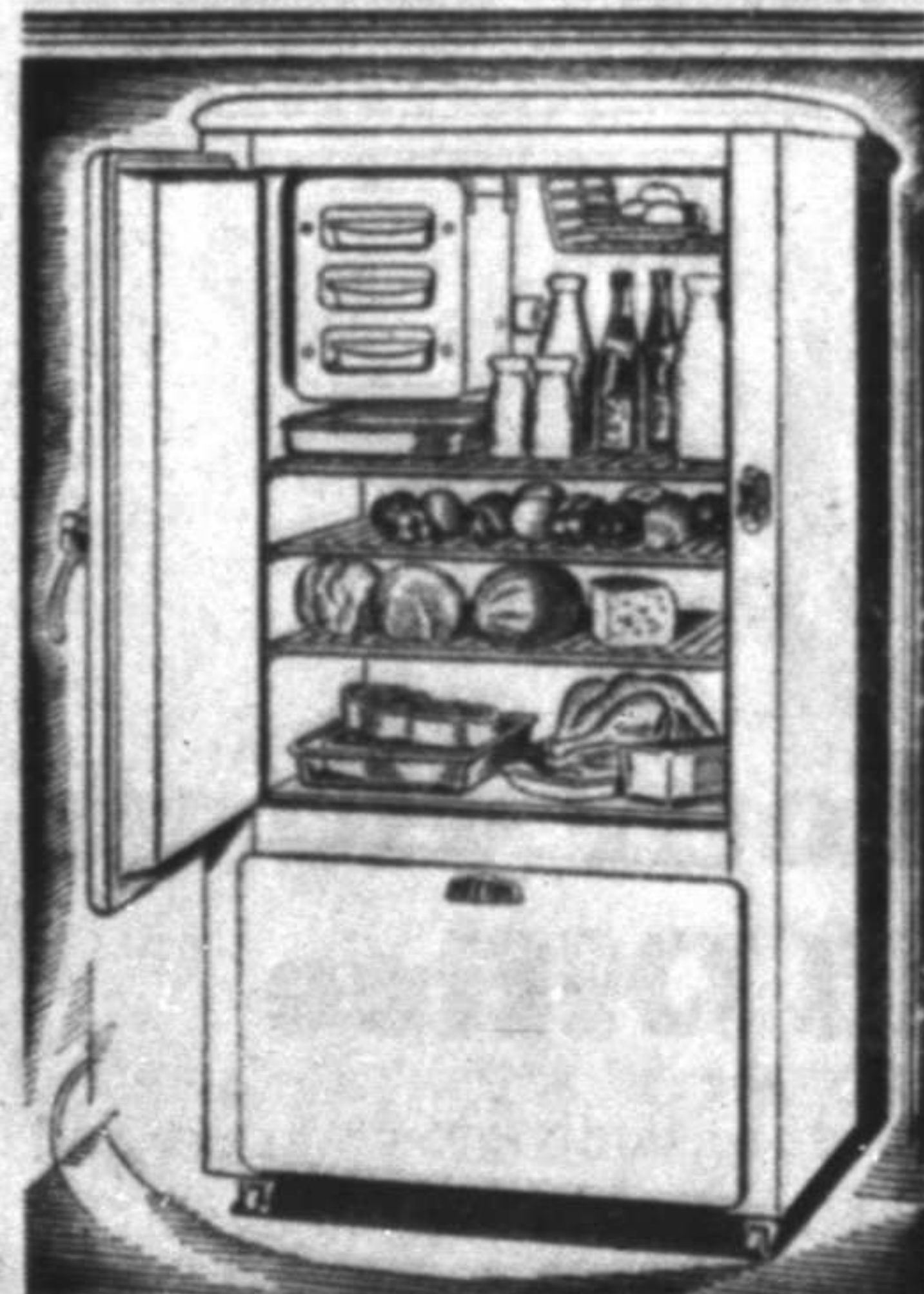

## Rules Committee Will Take Action To Curb Infraction Of Grid Laws; Stop Period On Shift Is Changed

Four Pairs Of Eyes To Look Out For Violations; Resolution Adopted To Stop Confusion In Uniforms

NEW YORK, March 25. (AP)—Finding some teams last fall beat the stop rule on shift plays and others wore equipment the same color as the ball to trick opponents, the National Football Rules committee today announced definite action to curb these practices. These were the most important results of the annual session of rule-makers.

Instead of "approximately one second," the stop period on shift plays was changed to "a period of at least one second." The count roughly measuring this second was increased from four to six and the referee was empowered to carry a split-second watch.

**Four Will Watch.** Four pairs of eyes instead of one or two will look out for violations, under a provision giving the referee, umpire, field judge and linesman "concurrent" jurisdiction over all fouls. The referee will act as final judge.

The committee adopted a resolution which "deprecates the use of head protectors, jerseys or attachments which are so similar in color to the ball that they give the wearers an unfair and unsportsmanlike advantage over their opponents."

The resolution further "suggests that if such head protectors are worn, the solid color be broken by at least two cross strips of a markedly contrasting color at least two inches in width, and that the solid color of such jerseys or attachments be definitely broken by stripes or numbers of markedly contrasting color."

**May Be Mandatory.** The committee felt that this statement which will appear in the 1936 rule book simply as a resolution, will be sufficient to stop the abuse, but if not it is planned to make it a mandatory regulation in 1937.

One well known football last fall, wore a headgear that would roll like a football, which it closely resembled in color. Just before he was tackled this player would dislodge his headgear to make it appear he had fumbled.

Representatives of all sections of the country and of the national football coaches association strongly recommended no material change in the content of the rules from those of last year.

## Peace Comes to Cotton Mill Towns as Communists Turn to Cities; Gastonia, Scene of Bloody Clashes, Now Calm

GASTONIA, N. C., March 25.—Communist outbreaks may be becoming increasingly frequent in the nation's larger cities, but peace has come to Gastonia and apparently is here to stay.

A year ago, or less, Gastonia's name flamed in the newspaper headlines as the scene of the first Communist outbreaks in the southern textile mill districts. Communist organizers from New England called a strike at the Loray cotton mill here, said to be the largest cotton mill in the world.

There were frequent bloody clashes between strikers and mill guards. Troops, hurriedly called out after a battle at the mill gates, pitched their tents and mounted artillery and machine guns at the mill doors. Soldiers patrolled the streets around the mill and at the height of it all a mob of thousands invaded, and wrecked the Communist headquarters, smashing the building and tossing boxes of Communist literature into the street.

Police Chief Stain then came the turning point. It proved to be the murder of Police Chief C. F. Adersholtz of Gastonia last June 7. Chief Adersholtz was killed and three officers wounded when fired upon from the darkness while visiting a tent colony where the strikers, under their Communist leaders, had for weeks maintained a cordon of guards armed with shotguns and pistols.

Chief Adersholtz's murder shattered the Communist power and broke the strike in Gastonia. For it, 10 persons were arrested in one of the wildest nights the town has ever known. This number was later reduced to 14 and cases against seven of them were dropped. But the remaining seven were tried and convicted. Fred Edwin Neal, fiery and youthful leader of the Communists, was sentenced to 17 to 20 years. The six others got 5 to 15 years each. They are now at liberty on bond with their appeals scheduled to be heard by the North Carolina supreme court in April.

EDITOR'S NOTE: A little less than a year ago the town of Gastonia, N. C., flamed in the newspaper headlines as the scene of the opening effort of Communists to organize the cotton mill workers in the southern textile belt.

With interest in the Communist revived by their recent demonstrations in big cities, Robert Talley, staff writer for the *Avalanche* and NEA Service, who "covered" the Gastonia riots at the time, has just returned there and now tells of conditions in Gastonia today.

Communist Power Broken  
With the murder of Chief Adersholtz the Communist leaders of the mill workers abandoned their headquarters here and departed hurriedly for Charlotte, 20 miles away. They continued to direct their operations from Charlotte, but with a waning power that has since dwindled to the negligible.

The only outbreak since that time was the killing of Mrs. Ella May Wiggins, a striking mill worker, last September 14. Mrs. Wiggins and others were en route to South Gastonia in a truck to attend a Communist meeting when the truck was fired upon by men evidently determined to prevent the meeting. Five men were recently tried at Charlotte for this crime.

Peace reigns today at the big Loray mill which is still operating, but on a reduced schedule. Just now the market for cotton fabrics is so low, which it manufactures, is off.

Most of the striking employees were taken back, but agitators were refused their old positions. Although employees' committees were set up by the mill owners to pass on certain matters, in no sense was a union recognized.

Mill Grants Concessions  
Other concessions, admittedly designed to encourage continuation of peaceful relations, have been granted. Free rent is now given workers who live in the company-owned houses, for which the company once

collected 30 cents per week per room, plus 50 cents more for water and lights. A social welfare program, including aid to churches and distressed families and marked recently by free lunches for school children, has also followed.

In line with other mills, the Loray has cut from 60 to 55 hours a week without, it is claimed, any corresponding reduction in pay. It is difficult to get exact figures since the mill pays on a basis of individual ability.

However, a year ago the Communists were claiming that workers received as low as \$3 a week and the mill was claiming an average pay of about \$15. Today, the mill claims an average wage of \$13.19 and says that its lowest is \$12, which is paid to the negro floor sweepers. However, this is based on full-time operation—and the mill is not now operating on full time.

A. F. of L. Holds Off  
Other mills in Gaston county—and there are more than 100—were not affected by the strike, the Communists centering on the huge Loray plant as their attempted entering wedge. It is owned by the Manville-Jensen Company, of Pawtucket, R. I.

While the Communists are no longer active in the southern textile regions—not aggressively at least—they have not entirely disappeared. Occasional small meetings are held in various cotton mill towns but they lack the fire of the old

days and there have been no more Communist strikes.

The American Federation of Labor, which announced some time ago that it planned to enter and organize the southern textile mills has not as yet begun this drive. Apparently, it is holding its plans in abeyance until improvement in business conditions brings an end to the present labor surplus in many cotton mill towns.

### THE CORRY TAYLOR PARDON

Generally speaking, and unless there is good and sufficient reason for the process, the Morning Avalanche is opposed to the granting of criminal pardons. Especially the "carload lot" system of pardons and paroles, as practiced by some Texas governors, has been distasteful to this newspaper, as it has been to Texans generally.

But, as it takes the exception to prove the rule, since in awhile we note with satisfaction the granting of official clemency to some man or woman who has fallen afoul of the law and who is allowed a measure of mercy.

Such a case was reported yesterday when Governor Dan Moody issued a general pardon to Corry Taylor, of Jefferson county, who has grown gray behind prison walls. From this vantage point, at least, it appears that Taylor has paid his debt to society and is worthy of another chance.

Thirty-two years ago, at the age of 16, Corry Taylor was found guilty of murder and sentenced to life imprisonment. Commuted to the state penitentiary, he has been in servitude ever since as the years turned him first into young manhood, carried him through his prime and have now delivered him to the brink of old age. For 32 years he has been screened from society, has been denied liberty, opportunity and pursuit of happiness. His course, aside from the commonplace activities of eating, sleeping and breathing, is practically run.

Although The Morning Avalanche knows nothing concerning the facts of the murder with which Corry Taylor was charged—despite that we know nothing of him personally or of his rights to clemency—for some reason, we are touched with his pardon.

All things being equal, the Recording Angel has probably written a "well done" beside the name of Governor Moody. At any rate, we cherish that hope.

### THE TRIAL INSTINCT

War lust and war dread are alternate Europe's masters and oppressors—and there is little to choose between them. Americans can understand these main springs of Old World statecraft. They can comprehend such sentiments, but cannot share them, any more than they can justify them in their own minds.

And yet the modern Europe came honestly by these relics of the past. It must be remembered that until modern times her population was one of small, warring tribes which, for self-preservation, and in order to avert complete extinction, gradually banded together into loose confederations, then into small and more or less homogeneous states, and finally into closely knit, powerful nations.

In Europe the age-old impulses and reactions still persist. Europeans are still to a large extent under the domination of the spirit of the warlike tribes of old, of the inherited blood feuds which trace back into the dark ages, of the old suspicions and of the ancient grudges never quite forgotten.

Centuries of freedom from any overpowering menace of hostile frontier neighbors have left the American people without either war lust or war dread. Formation of the union, barring the possibility of 48 independent states, saved this continent from Europe's plight.

### COMPETITION

Competitive building is not limited to navies. It is found in many fields of modern life. Imposing upon the public in several of them financial burdens comparable with that of naval construction when world powers aspire at the same time to the biggest navy.

For years there has been going on throughout the United States a free-for-all race and many private races for doubtful honor and advantage of being the largest city. Communities have forced their growth in population and area merely that their burghers might lord it over some rival town or city. Some of these rivalries between cities and towns have been written into history and come down through the generations as traditions.

Competition in skyscraper construction, between hotels for leadership in number of rooms, between ocean liners for speed and size, between railroads for speed and between corporations for highest capitalization is not for profit only.

Cities and towns build libraries, museums, art galleries, parks, public buildings, airports, convention halls, stadiums and indulge other extravagant desires because other cities and towns have them or because they want to be first in having them. It made Chicago bankrupt.

This desire to be bigger and better has been named "adult-infantism," but while it often assumes childish proportions it is often a virtue. Were it not for this "adult-infantism" many communities would be devoid of all the graces.

## On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

NATION'S LAWMAKERS NOW BEGIN TO WORRY ABOUT RENOMINATIONS

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Our nation's lawmakers are beginning to worry about their renominations—those of the senators whose terms are drawing to a close, and the entire outfit of representatives. Marring over re-election will come later. Renomination is the first problem—and important, too: a candidate can be just as effectively eliminated in the primaries as, subsequently, at the polls.

Some lawmakers, like Senator Simmons of North Carolina, are dead sure to be re-elected if their parties renominate them, but have renomination fights on their hands. Others like Senator Goff of West Virginia, are certain enough to be renominated, but will have to work like sixty for re-election. Still others, like Senator Robison of Kentucky, face opposition in the primaries and hard campaigns afterward. A very few, like Senator Capper of Kansas, have their renominations and reelections, both, already safely cinched.

Senator Deneen of Illinois is back home now, hustling to be renominated. His state's primaries are first on the list—early next month.

Deneen couldn't wait for congress to adjourn. Representative Ruth Hanna McCormick wants to supplant him as the Sucker state's senatorial candidate on the G. O. P. ticket, and they say it is nearly even betting that she'll beat him.

Senators and representatives from 14 other states will be breaking away from Washington in the near future to cultivate the soil for renominations which they hope to harvest during May, June and July. Most of the rest, from ballistics where the primaries are not held until August or September, will stick it out here up to adjournment, probably about mid-June. Staying on the job clear through to the bitter end has an appearance of dogged faithfulness and devotion to duty that count with the voters—if not persisted in until to darn late in the day.

It is not partisan to say that the indications point toward democratic congressional gains this year. It is not partisan for the reason that the trend usually is somewhat away from the administration in "off" presidential years. Besides, the last election was a "landslide," in which republican victories were won in normally democratic territory. The pendulum is apt to swing back now.

Moreover, unless business picks up at an extraordinary rate, there is likely to be considerable dissatisfaction with the G. O. P. on economic grounds—because it was in power when the slump came.

Finally, the wet promise to be exceptionally militant. They will hardly be enough so to elect any republicans in the south, where Auntie Democracy is dry; they may quite easily be enough so to elect some wet democrats in the north (it happened recently in Mr. Coolidge's ordinarily strongly republican Butte wet Massachusetts district), where the G. O. P. finds it difficult to avoid being considered dry, because Mr. Hoover so obviously is dry.

The democratic managers even talk of gaining control of the house of representatives. What the democratic forces actually would like is sufficient strength to combine with the insurgent republicans and outvote the stand-pat G. O. P. organization, as the democrats and republican insurgents are able to do so much of the time in the senate.

Thus they would be able to hamstring the administration, while at the same time pointing constantly to its paper majority in both houses of congress, just as if it were an honest-to-goodness majority.

This would be very pleasant for Auntie Democracy for awhile, but it is hard to see how it could do her any particular good in the long run.

What Auntie is looking ahead to, of course, is 1932.

But by that time prosperity may be with us once more, running full blast.

As for such seals as she may win in the senate and house of representatives as a result of wet activities in states like Mr. Coolidge's Massachusetts, they will be a source of "weakness to her; not strength.

They will be a source of weakness to her because, whereas she undoubtedly will be as dry as ever in the south, the very fact of her wet northern victories (if she has won any) will make her northern followers all the more belligerent in their demands for another Mr. Smith at her 1932 presidential convention.

In a state of affairs like this, it will be all the worse for Auntie Democracy that Mr. Hoover (who, naturally, will be renominated) is a dry.

### Your Health

CHILD'S INTELLIGENCE DETERMINES SPEED IN LEARNING TO TALK

When a child first begins to talk it uses simple words to express itself, often repeating the word several times. As it grows older, more and more words are joined together to make sentences which may be incomplete in that they lack either subject, object or verb, but which gradually become complete, although the child may not realize the meaning of a complete sentence.

At the age of 18 months, children will use sentences having subjects and verbs. Up to the age of four and a half years complex and compound sentences constitute a very small proportion of all the statements made. At the age of five or six all sorts of involved sentence structures enter into the speech of the child.

A French investigator divided the speech of the child into two types—egocentric and socialized. At six years of age egocentric speech, consisting largely of repetitions and monologues, constitutes 50 per cent of the child's discourse. An American investigator checking this work on American children found only 30 per cent of the speech egocentric between the ages of 18 months and 54 months.

The investigators have not determined whether this result was due to a difference in the nature of the study or of some fundamental difference between the lives of French and American children. Study in language is particularly important since it forms the basis of practically all mental tests. The relationship between language and the mental age of the child is as close as the relationship between its language and its actual age in years.

Feeble-minded children are invariably retarded in their development of vocabulary and ability to speak. Practically all investigators have found that girls learn to talk earlier than boys and to better advantage. Furthermore, the children of families that are well-to-do and educated learn to talk earlier and to better advantage than do those of the laboring and what are sometimes called the lower classes.

## Demand Exclusion Of Filipinos In Immigration Row

Resident Commissioner In Reply To Welch Declares Freedom Of Philippines Is Only Solution

WASHINGTON, March 25. (AP)—Representative Welch, republican, California demanded exclusion of Filipino immigrants in the house today and Resident Commissioner Ocasio rejoined that the social and economic issues involved could be solved only by freeing the Philippines. The Californian urged favorable consideration for his bill to exclude the Filipinos in order to stem what he called the "third invasion of the Pacific coast states" by oriental races.

Outbreaks Cited Referring to recent outbreaks between whites and Filipinos in his state, he said the question could be settled quickly by closing the door to the island immigrants. Representative Schaefer, republican, Wisconsin, interrupted to ask what California's attitude was toward the proposal to place Mexican immigration on a quota basis.

Welch replied that the majority or the people there were in favor of restricted Mexican immigration.

Power Recognized After the Californian concluded, Ocasio said he recognized the power of congress to exclude Filipinos, but he insisted that Welch's plan was only a "make-shift" solution of the whole question. He advocated freedom for the islands. "Exclusion would not remedy the evils," he shouted, "and millions of my people will interpret exclusion as heaping insult upon injury."

### Canada's First Woman Senator

WASHINGTON, March 25. (AP)—In nationwide celebration of the tenth anniversary of suffrage, women of America will turn again tomorrow to the 70-year-old pioneer campaigner of the women's cause, Carrie Chapman Catt, as chief spokesman.

Her anniversary address will be broadcast to luncheon tables from coast to coast, between 2 and 2:30 p. m. Eastern Standard time. Mrs. Catt will call the attention of the nation to a \$250,000 league of women voters foundation fund, memorializing a "roll of honor" of women leaders who campaigned for suffrage.

Picture Accomplishments Taking stock of what 10 years had accomplished in official recognition to the women who battled for the ballot, their leaders today saw that feminine names gradually had filtered into high places.

None was on the list of cabinet or supreme court and the senate, where the suffrage question was most bitterly fought, today was merely threatened by feminine invasion from the electorate. Edith Ruth Hanna McCormick, representative at large from Illinois, campaigning for the senatorial nomination.

## Public Buildings Bill Is Approved By Senate Tuesday

Two Hundred, Thirty Billion Included In Measure: To Provide For Road Work And Agriculture

WASHINGTON, March 25. (AP)—The senate passed the \$230,000,000 public buildings bill and the agriculture department appropriation measure carrying funds for road construction today and then granted itself a week of rest.

The tariff bill was returned formally to the house. No action will be taken on it there until Monday.

Increase Permitted The public buildings bill allows \$115,000,000 additional for construction outside Washington, bringing the total for this work over a 10-year period of \$363,000,000. It permits an increase in the annual amount of republic construction outside the capital from \$35,000,000 to \$50,000,000. The administration is prepared to take immediate advantage of this to stimulate employment. It was returned to the house for acceptance of a minor amendment. Acting on the agriculture supply bill, the senate added \$6,900,000 on motion of Senator Trammell, democrat, Florida, for continuation of the drive for eradication of the Mediterranean fruit fly.

All amendments proposed by the senate appropriations committee to the agriculture measure were approved. The bill carried a total of \$162,253,786 as finally passed.

Road Aid Provided The regular allotment of \$75,000,000 for federal road aid for the next fiscal year beginning July 1 was provided by the bill. The Dowell measure increasing the appropriations for road aid from \$75,000,000 to \$125,000,000 is still in conference between the senate and house.
