Mrs. Kirk Taylor Honored By Church

Mrs. K. L. Taylor was honored by members of the Methodist Church at the regular "Family Night" services Wednesday night September 4.

The compliment to Mrs. Taylor was a complete surprise to her and remained so until her life story began to unfold as told by emcee Mrs. J. M. Templeton.

Mrs. Templeton announced that a program similar to the TV show "This Is Your Life" was about to be unfolded and for the group to listen carefully for clues to identify someone present.

She first told of the birth of the person at a place about 200 miles East of Loraine and the move with the parents to Loraine in the early 1900s. Attending school and beginning music lessons when she could barely reach to pump the old fashioned organ pedals. A stern father demanding the required practice time when often the six-year old wanted to be out playing.

At the age of 14 she began playing for the church, a place she filled through the years. At this point in the story Mrs. Taylor had "caught on" and knew she was listening to her life story.

Mrs. Templeton continued her story, giving the date 1920 as the year Mrs. Taylor, then Mattie Thompson, began her teaching career, starting many Loraine young folk on a successful musical career, teaching for 35 years.

In 1923 Miss Thompson and Kirk Taylor were married. Mrs. Taylor served for 30 consecutive years as pianist for the local school graduation, she has played for weddings, funerals, and her home is open for entertainments, bridal showers and for visiting preachers during revivals.

She has a life service membership in the Womans Society of Christian Service and is a charter member of the Willing Workers Sunday School class.

Mrs. Templeton closed her story, addressing Mrs. Taylor, "This is your life, Mattie. Often times we have failed to say thank you for your years of unselfish service to our church in the capacity of pianist, organist, and other phases of service as well as your service to the school, town and community, and we want to express that thanks here tonight."

Mrs. Templeton then presented Mrs. Taylor a gift from the church and Mrs. Jim Johnson read an original poem of appreciation.

Mr. Taylor and other members of her family were present to see her receive the honors. Out of town people present included two brothers and their wives, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Thompson and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Thompson of Colorado City.

At the close of the presentation the group gathered on the church lawn whereiced watermelon was served.

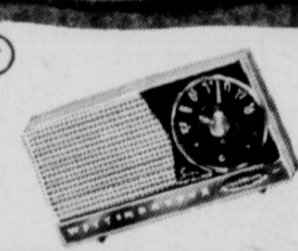

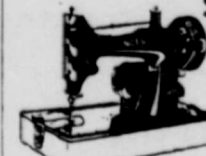

\$800 SCHOLARSHIPS TO 4-H'ERS IN AG., TEXTILES

Chicago (Special) Four scholarships of \$800 each are available this year to college students who have completed three years of 4-H Club work and who plan to major in either agronomy or textiles. G. L. Noble, director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, announced today.

"The scholarships are offered on a national basis," stated Mr. Noble. "To be eligible, applicants should have a satisfactory scholastic and 4-H Club record and must have completed their sophomore year in an accredited college or university."

Two agronomy scholarships are made possible for the first time

to agriculture students by the California Spray-Chemical Corporation, Richmond, California. The Colgate-Palmolive Company, Jersey City, New Jersey, for the second year is offering two home economics scholarships for girls majoring in the clothing and textile fields.

At the time the two national winners are chosen for the agronomy and home economics scholarships, four alternates for each scholarship will also be selected on a descending basis. If the scholarships are not used by the winners, they will be made available to the first alternates. Half of the scholarship will be granted during the junior year, and the remaining half will be provided for the senior year.

Students wishing further information regarding the awards should contact the state 4-H Club leader. All applications must be submitted by the state 4-H leader on or before October 25, 1957, according to Mr. Noble.

Veterans' News**Questions and Answers**

Q. The effective date of my GI insurance policy was August 31. I understand my premiums are due this same date each month. What about months that do not have 31 days? On what date will premiums be due?

A. On months not having 31 days, your GI insurance premiums will be due on the last day of the month.

Q. I want to sell my home and let the buyer take over my GI loan. Of course I plan to pay in advance to VA for relief from liability. Must the buyer be a veteran, in order to assume my GI loan payments?

A. No. The purchaser need not be a veteran in order to take over your GI loan payments.

Q. I already have an AB degree. Would I be allowed to go to college under the Korean GI bill to get another bachelor's degree? The course I want to take

will prepare me for an engineering career.

A. So long as the course will prepare you for a professional goal for which you are not now qualified, you may be permitted to take college training leading to another bachelor's degree, this time in engineering. But full credit will have to be given for applicable previous courses.

Q. Is it possible to take below-college-level schooling under the War Orphans Education program?

A. Yes, provided the young man or woman already has completed or quit regular high school, and provided the below-college-level course will lead to a definite vocational goal.

**BULLETINS ANSWER
QUESTIONS ON SURFACE
AND GROUND WATER**

College Station, September 9—What is surface water? What is ground water? Is it lawful to use them for irrigation? If so, how much of this water can you use? Is a permit necessary?

These questions and others of similar nature are being asked by farmers relative to an individual's rights to use surface or ground waters for irrigation.

Robert Thurmond, extension agricultural engineer, has prepared two bulletins, MP-214, "Questions and Answers on Ground Water Laws in Texas for Irrigation," and MP-215, "Questions and Answers on Rights in Surface Water for Irrigation." Persons interested in this subject will find these bulletins very helpful and informative. They may be obtained from local county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

This is the month that separates the outdoorsmen. Some are hunters, some fishermen, some both. How does a "both" man decide where to go—field or stream?

I'll guess with you. He goes dove hunting, if in reach of the North Zone; his mind's ear hears the shotgun blast, and his mind's eye sees the birds fall.

But some of our outdoorsmen will stick to their fishing. They'll figure that now September's here the fish will be a little bit more cooperative, maybe. Also, shrewdly, they'll think the best fishing spots may be less crowded, what with the hunters gone to the sunflower patch.

Let's talk about both of those guys—the firstman first.

He is concerned about the black bass, and that fish has been suffering his usual case of the summer sulks.

He has been playing it cozy, down deep where the water is cool, moving around very little, using up not much energy and requiring a minimum of food.

Old time anglers are getting bass, these hot days, by fishing deep with minnows or plugs. Deep trolling also pays off.

The Hellbender has been a productive lure at Lakes Whitney, Texhoma, Possum Kingdom, and the Highland Lakes of Central Texas. Work it deep and slow.

The big bass are down deep as they can get to keep cool, but they have to stay above the "dead" water where the oxygen content is too low.

That may be 20 to 30 feet down but you'll have to experiment to find the right depth in your own favorite fishing hole. All depends on the water temperature and the oxygen content of the water.

If the first norther of autumn hits before this gets into print—change signals.

When that happens, your lake or stream will "turn over." That means when the surface is colder than the bottom, the top, cold water will sink and the bottom, warmer water will rise to the top.

Look for that day! When it comes, get out your top water lures and be confident of getting bass if you are fishing in good water, and using your bait adroitly.

Meanwhile, the bass will hit surface lures, even in hot weather. Try them early in the morning or in late afternoon. Or at night.

How About Whites
That's black bass we've been talking about. Now, what about the white bass?

All summer, these fish have been congregating in the swift water below dams, eating their fill of shad that abound in such waters.

Many fishermen have caught limit strings of white bass all through the summer, fishing in the fast water. But now, this kind of fishing has dropped off. What's the trouble?

Well, the spring-born shad are now getting a little too big for the whites to handle. So the fish are drifting downstreams, looking for other food.

They will be moving around a lot. But if your minnow or spoon is there—in the right place at the right time—you will be in business in a big way.

Work your bait deep, where the water is cool, using the same technique as for blacks.

Work Lures Slowly
I suspect that most anglers work their lures too fast.

Fish like action, but they like it slow. To give an example, my fishing partner and I catch good strings of bass in the Highland Lakes of Central Texas, using minnows, either free swimming or with a light split shot.

This is the procedure: toss the minnow out there in bass water and let him swim. Put the rod down and pour a cup of coffee out of the thermos. Maybe you get a strike, maybe not.

But pick up that rod and begin reeling in—very, very slowly. Pretty soon, here comes a little tug. Don't get excited. Wait.

Reel in some more—very slowly. Another tug, maybe harder

this time. Don't strike yet, wait him out. You can feel when he is on. Then strike, hard. Result: bass.

Trotline Technique
Well, about catfishing: how often do you run your trotline?

The experts are at odds on this point. Some of them give the line a test every hour or two—others allow much more time for the catfish to get themselves hooked.

One experienced trotliner of my acquaintance belongs to the long-wait school of thought.

He reasons that a big, heavy, lazy catfish will take his own sweet time with a bream or other bait. He nibbles at it, nudges it around, contemplates it, and takes it (maybe) when the notion strikes him.

I am inclined to go along with this easy-does-it kind of catfishing.

Fishing is not much of a hurry up proposition, anyhow. You've got to relax to catch fish. And learning to relax is maybe the best thing about this sport.

Dove Shooters Prosper
Turning to the hunting situation—reports coming in here say the North Zone shooters are doing pretty well, and there are plenty of birds, though some are small.

Scattered rains around the state have not been heavy enough to change the birds' watering habits. One complaint of the dove hunters is that their birds fall in the dense sunflower patches and can't be found.

Whitewing hunters will be numerous in the Valley about now; the season being Sept. 13-15-17.
