Harsh Weather Hard On Area Livestock

Area livestock are taking the brunt of the harsh wintery weather encompassing the Red River Valley. The sub freezing temperatures, cold snow and rain coupled with blowing winds has placed extra demands on the beef cow and those needs should be met or massive weight

losses can be expected.

Not only can one expect weight losses, but also a drop in milk production which will affect the performance of baby calves.

So, it is a good idea for cattlemen to provide extra protein and energy during these times. A dry cow that is receiving an eight percent protein hay can probably get

by without extra supplementation. It would be a good idea to increase the amount of hay fed and keep the rumen working full time.

On the other hand, cows that are nursing a calf could use some type of supplemental feeding. The type needed will vary depending on the quality hay being fed. A cattleman feeding 10 to 12 percent hay could get by with feeding straight grain such as ground milo.

However, if poor quality hay is being fed, it will take a high protein supplement such as cottonseed cake, breeder cubes and etc.

If trough space is available, cattlemen with high protein hay might want to consider the ground milo route. Three pounds per head per day of ground milo will provide an additional one fourth pound of protein and two and one half pounds of digestible nutrients. This should meet the nutrient needs of a 1200 pound cow nursing a calf if 20 pounds of the top quality hay is fed.

Cattlemen without feeding equipment will have to consider liquid feeds, cubes, cakes and such.

All of these feed supplements are expensive, but the cattle must be taken care of during the bad

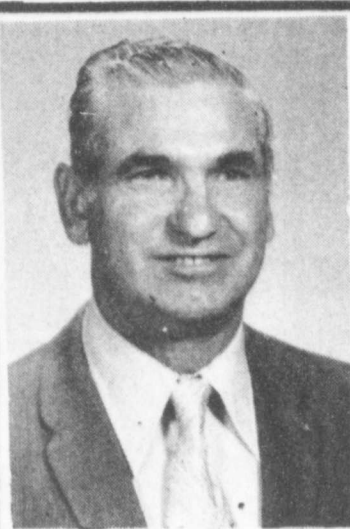

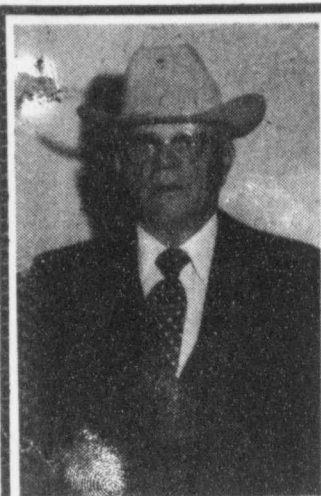

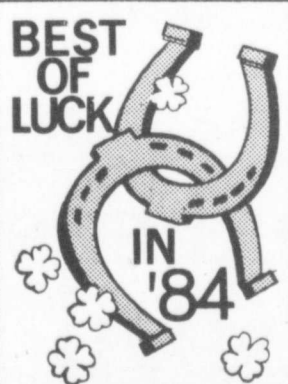

We always wanted to go skating on some of the ponds, I may be wrong but it seemed that it was cold enough at least once during the Christmas season for all the kids to bundle up in their warm clothes and went skating. Some times we would break through the ice and get wet but that was nothing to worry about as we would just build us a fire and dry our shoes and get back on the ice.

When we got a snow was the best time of all, for then Dad would take us rabbit hunting. He would show us how to trail the rabbit and how to set a snare to catch it. We would learn how to dress the rabbit for the table and when it was all ready Dad would hang it up in a tree to freeze and we could go back the next morning and bring it in for Mom to fry for our breakfast.

When I got to an age when I thought I was as big and knew as much as anyone we moved to Pattonville. We had some pretty good times there too. I recall one winter that it snowed and then came a very hard freeze, then snowed again. Us kids had a ball playing on the ice and snow. There was one boy who had an old Model-T Ford and all there was of it was the frame with a gas tank...no seats. It was just right for pulling a sled behind, so we made a big sled that seven or eight could sit on, and

hooked to it with a long chain and loaded up.

The driver would start up and when he got going good he would turn real quick. That was about like popping the whip as we would swing out in a wide circle. It seemed like fun, but now we recall how dangerous it really was.

I remember too one night about seven of us got on the sled and went all the way to Paris...about ten or twelve mile.

When we got back I had a frost bitten big toe, it had been dragging in the snow all the way to Paris and

back! We had a lot of fun back then...we created our own brand of something to do.

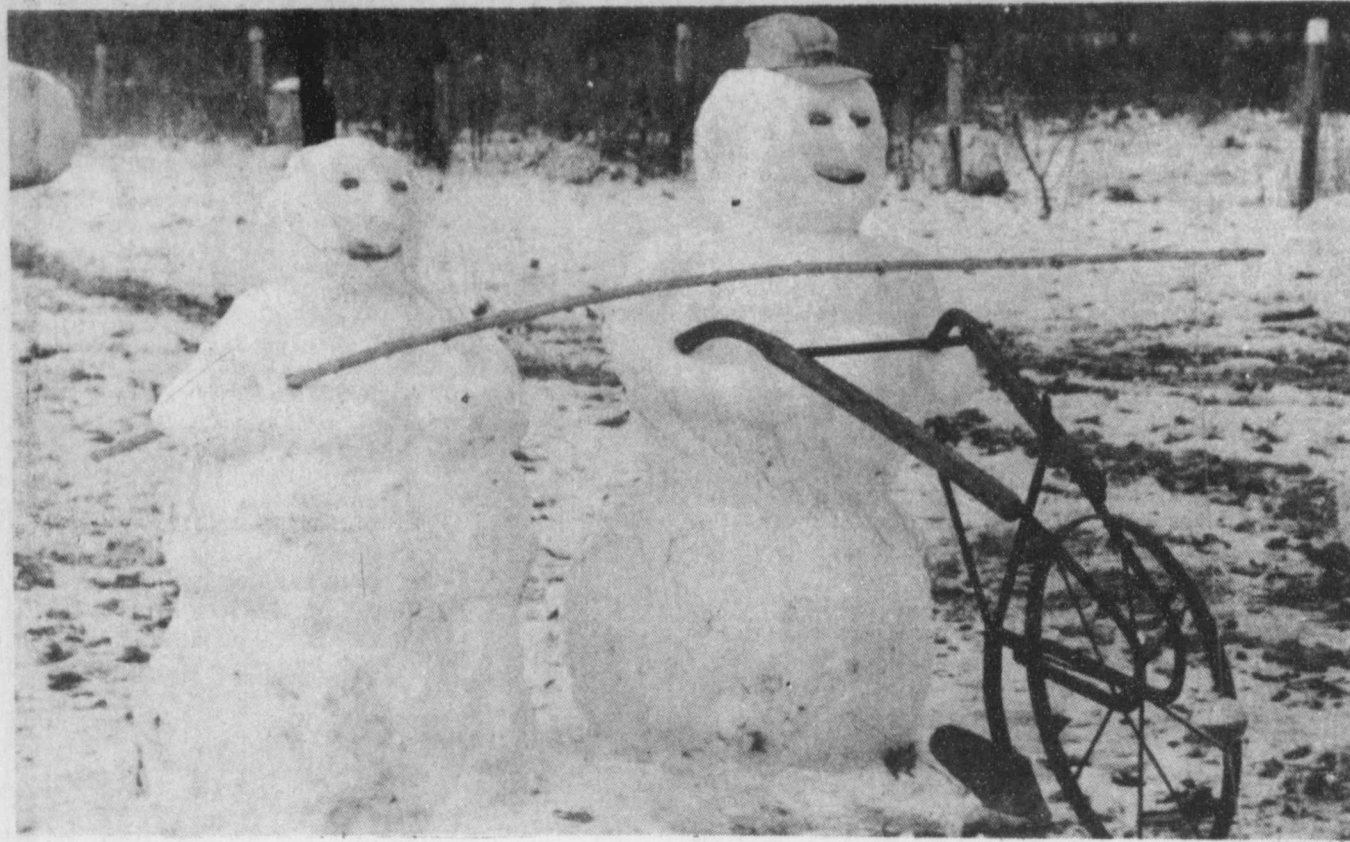
I suppose we have grown out of the thrill a lot, but those were some of the best times ever!
