Football Queen at Colorful Pageant Before Perryton and Shattuck Game

Held at Ranger Field

Shattuck Students to Contribute To Program, Which Starts At Eight o'Clock

In celebration of the coronation of the football queen, Perryton High School will observe a gala and traditional occasion on the Ranger Field, Friday night, September 28, at eight o'clock before the game between Perryton Rangers and Shattuck Indians.

The queen, L. Louise Pugh, who was chosen by popular vote of the Perryton school, will be attended by representatives of each grade. A spectacular background of pages, evels, plies, guards, crownbearers, jester, and representatives from the opposing school will attend Her Majesty.

The bands, pep squads, football squads, team captains and superintendents from Shattuck and Perryton will participate in the pageant. Representing Shattuck as Princess will be Jeanne Barcafer, and her court will be Bob Boyd.

The duchesses from the high school will wear evening dresses, and those from the other grades will wear dresses of rainbow colors. Following the coronation, students of the Shattuck High School will present an Indian dance.

Admission will be the regular price for the football games, adults 50 cents and students 25 cents. Season tickets will be honored.

Given Ten Years

David Ash, Habitual Criminal Is Sentenced in 47th District Court in Amarillo

David "Smoky" Ash, who was given a 5 year suspended sentence for burglary here in 1934, was convicted and given a ten year sentence for receiving and concealing stolen property by a 47th district court in Amarillo, Tuesday.

The 10-year sentence was mandatory under the terms of an indictment charging Ash with being a habitual criminal and a second offender.

Ash was convicted of receiving and concealing a diamond ring at Panhandle. Witnesses testified that Ash swallowed the ring upon arrest. The ring was recovered.

APPLICATION DEADLINE SET

SATURDAY FINAL DAY FOR FILING APPLICATIONS ON CROP INSURANCE IN COUNTY

Earl Waide, county crop insurance supervisor, announces that Saturday, September 30th marks the final date for which applications for all risk government wheat insurance may be accepted. Due to unfavorable moisture conditions many farmers have filed applications during the past ten days and many more are expected to make applications this week before the final date expires.

Very few applicants are paying cash for the premiums as a new provision in the setup this year permits the premium to be deducted from the first conservation payment. This provision enables many producers to take advantage of the insurance feature of the program, who do not have the cash or credit to pay for the insurance.

Indications are that the total policies written in the county will exceed the number written for 1938.

During 1938 there were 79 policies applied for with 43 collecting indemnities of 33,750 bushels paid by the government. The losses were attributed to drought, worms and hail.

CCC Enrollment

Next Enrollment in October And No Connection Between CCC And Armed Forces

The next enrollment for young men in the Civilian Conservation Corps is in October. Boys between the ages of 17 and 23 inclusive are eligible to enroll. Mrs. F. L. Garrett, Ochiltree County Welfare chairman, who is in charge of enrollments in this county states that applicants must be unemployed and not in regular attendance at school.

Enrollees should be willing to remain in the CCC for the full six months period, said Mrs. Garrett, and should be willing to be transferred to any camp in the United States.

The Civilian Conservation Corps is not a part of the United States military service and there is no military training in the CCC it is pointed out. The CCC is a civilian group and the enrollees are no more subject to military call than the "man on the street" with no governmental connection.

In this connection, we quote from a recent statement made by Robert F. Peckner, Director of the Civilian Conservation Corps: "The Civilian Conservation Corps is not a part of the armed forces of the country. While I am sure that if they are needed to defend the Nation or uphold its rights, CCC men will be among the first to respond to a call for such duty, enrollees cannot, under existing law, be inducted into these armed forces. They would enlist or be drafted into national defense service just as any others of their age who are not in the CCC."

Sheriff J. S. Talley has been ill since last Friday and unable to be at his office.

During the summer months, the Baptist membership headed by their pastor, Rev. McClung, conducted a campaign to raise sufficient funds to pay off the existing indebtedness. In the early part of August a thousand dollars had been raised and final payment made on the building, which was erected at a cost of \$30,000.00. An additional \$500 has been received and spent on papering, plastering, painting and reconditioning the basement of the church.

OLD-AGE PENSIONS CUT \$6 FOR OCTOBER

Ruling Reduces Income Of 68 Old People In This County

ALL GET FLAT CUT

The long expected cut in Texas old-age pensions came Friday, September 22, when the State Welfare Board made a flat reduction of \$6, and took from the rolls 1,500 Texas pensioners who had been drawing \$6 and \$5, the latter being the minimum paid.

This cut affected 68 pensioners in Ochiltree County, who were drawing a total of \$1200.00 per month. The lowest pension paid in this county was \$10.00. This new ruling means this pensioner will receive only \$4 for October. With each pensioner having his income cut \$6, there will only be \$798.00 received in the Ochiltree County for October, or a reduction of \$402.00.

In September, there were 121,000 pensioners in Texas and approximately the same number are on the rolls for October. With the \$6.00 eliminations, the rolls drop to 119,500.

Speaking for the board, its executive director, Adam R. Johnson, expressed deep regret at the necessity for the cut.

"There was no alternative," he said. "The funds had fallen so low we could do nothing else. The board tried to find a way to avoid or mitigate the reduction but finally it had to make the flat cut of \$6. We will try to keep it up as long as possible and only can hope the revenues will enable us to do so. As yet we cannot determine the amounts for November or subsequent months."

CCC CAMP TO REMAIN HERE

PERRYTON CAMP INCLUDED IN NEW PROGRAM EFFECTIVE FROM OCTOBER 1 TO MARCH 1940

Perryton CCC, Company 2874, is among the 55 camps in Texas that will carry on the conservation work for the next six months. There are 11,000 enrollees in the 55 Texas camps. This is two less than the 57 camps now in operation.

Under the new program announced September 20 by Robert F. Peckner, National Director of the Civilian Conservation Corps, nine new camps will be opened, two re-established, and 13 camps closed. This program covers the six-month period from October 1 to March 31, 1940.

According to Lt. H. J. McDonald and Lt. J. C. Skinner, commanding officers of the Perryton Camp, a new enrollment in October will bring Company 2874 to its full strength of 200 enrollees. At present, the camp has 156 enrollees.

Certificate Of Title Act Becomes Effective Oct. 1

The Certificate of Title Act, which goes into effect October 1, requires car owners and dealers to furnish proper certificate of title on all vehicles. Application for Certificate of Title to a Motor Vehicle is filed in Ochiltree County with J. S. Talley, Sheriff and Tax Collector.

It was emphasized by Fred Huston, Deputy Tax Collector of Ochiltree County, that this act, passed by the last regular session of the legislature, applies only to motor vehicles offered for sale, purchased or encumbered with liens on and after October 1. In other words, the present owner of an automobile does not have to secure a certificate of title until he sells his car or places an encumbrance against it. If a lien is placed against the vehicle before October 1, 1939, no certificate is necessary.

\$65,000 APPROPRIATION WILL FINISH ALL IMPROVEMENTS IN ORIGINAL PLAN FOR THE PARK

Tourist Cabins and Boat House are Not Included In Present Set-Up for Immediate Development; Will be Outstanding Recreation Spot

WORK 82 WPA MEN ON PROJECT NOW

The development of the Wolf Creek Dam and Park by the Bureau of Agriculture Economics under the Soil Conservation Service is progressing at a rapid pace now that financial difficulties have been eliminated and approximately \$65,000 is available to complete the project as originally planned. The work is under the supervision of M. P. Exline. He has a force of 82 men from the WPA rolls in addition to his regular technical staff.

No provision was made in the original plan for the building of a bathhouse or tourist cabins but it is very probable that these will be built for there is a definite need for both.

The plans call for construction of bathhouse, custodian's house, recreational building, picnic shelters, water and sewer system, bathing beach, and many other structures that will make the park area a real recreational spot. It is thought that all buildings will be of native rock veneering.

Workmen are now building a new bridge just inside the northeast entrance to the Park. Others are completing the rip-rapping on the dam. The dam and lake bed have held water much better than expected. The surface water line going down only about three feet despite the fact that it has been extremely dry lately. No fish have been placed in the lake yet and none will be placed until all danger of poisoning from decaying vegetable matter in the lake bed has been eliminated. The water has been given one chemical treatment to offset this poison.

With the building of these two new grandstands, crowds at the field can be handled much easier as it will not be necessary for cars to drive inside the fenced enclosure. From the increased attendance at the first game, school officials feel that the new stands will soon pay for themselves in paid admissions.

Football tickets for the Ranger football season will be on sale until Friday. The tickets for the remaining four scheduled games are \$1.50 for adults and 50c for students. This is a saving of 40c on the adult ticket and 20c for students.

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GAS RATE DECISION GIVEN

PUBLIC SERVICE CORPORATION LOSES DECISION ON GATE RATE FOR SEVEN COMMUNITIES

Monday announcement was made from Austin that the Court sustained a state railroad commission order reducing a gate rate natural gas charge for seven communities in the Panhandle served by the Public Service Corporation. Perryton was among the towns included in the order.

No definite information could be obtained from City officials or from the Public Service Corporation as to just how this ruling would affect Perryton gas consumers. The following account was taken from the Amarillo Daily News:

Dist. Judge Ralph Yarborough in 33rd District Court here Monday, September 25, sustained a state railroad commission order reducing a gate rate natural gas charge for numerous towns on pipe lines of Public Service Corporation of Texas as from 40 cents to 27 cents. The company also serves numerous Oklahoma communities.

Burner tip rates in the communities affected had ranged from 60 to 65 cents. With the gate rate reduction, Olin Culberson, head of the gas utilities division of the commission estimated the burner tip rates would be between 50 and 55 cents a thousand cubic feet.

Judge Yarborough in announcing the victory for the commission's rate granted an injunction prohibiting violation of the order. He cited the ruling of the Third Court of Civil Appeals in the recent hard-fought gate rate contest between the state and Lone Star Gas Company.

Dramatic Tale of Fight Game Is Coming to the Ellis Theatre October 5-6

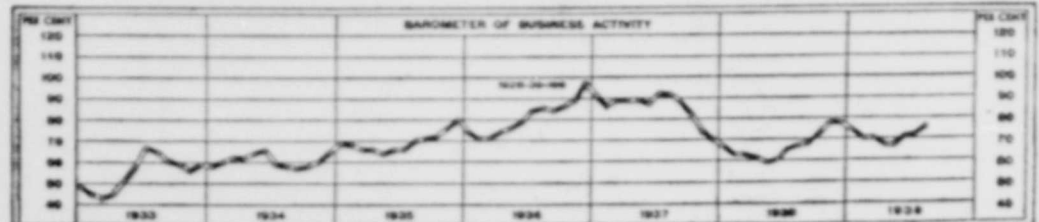

Fight Hopper Plague

Science Aids Cimarron County As Hopper War Continues In Oklahoma County

Science has come to the aid of agriculture in Cimarron county, Okla., as Federal entomologists increase their efforts in combating the grasshopper plague, which has become a serious menace.

W. E. Baker, county agent, says that the governmental agents now have an autogiro airplane spreading 20,000 pounds of poison bait daily. A large truck delivers the poison mixture to the plane. In addition they have working out of Boise City eight pickups and eight spreaders, and two large trucks delivering poison to the spreaders.

There are also eight large trucks carrying weedseed, mill-run bran and sodium arsenite to the county from counties in Texas where there is a surplus.

Cimarron county is now mixing and distributing from 40 to 50 tons a day of the poison mixture.

The infestation has proved to be greater than anticipated, and Baker has urged all farmers to cooperate with the government in controlling the hoppers.

In the back yard plum bushes, wild grape and cottonwood are thriving. All this improvement has been made within the last few years. Aside from the lilies, the planting is largely native.

To anyone who says that trees and plants will not grow here, the Dial home presents a good answer that they will grow if they are planted and given a reasonable amount of care.

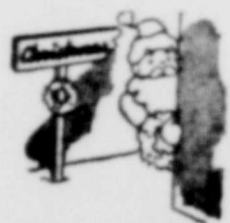

WAR AND THE FARMER

Conflict in Europe boomed U. S. food prices, but there is little indication that farmers in this country will cash in on war-born profits like they did in 1914-18. They are too wary of the disastrous slump sure to follow any artificially-built prosperity.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace has warned farmers that the profits of wartime are but temporary, that they are invariably wiped out in the costs of regulating production in peacetime.

During the World War, unsuitable lands were turned into wheat farms to increase output. Resulting erosion created the dust bowl. Trying to gain normal production, farmers found themselves with surplus grain and lower prices than ever for their crops.

War psychology this time has brought on what appears to be a short-lived boosting of food prices. As a result of announcements that nearly all essential commodities exist in surplus, housewives have curbed their buying and prices are returning to normal.

Through it all, the farmer was no better off than usual. For his crops and produce, he received far less than the fair level, "parity" price set by the Department of Agriculture. And prices were still below any 1914-18 war boom returns.

Yet, a few agriculturists in one section are reported seeding wheat early this fall, even though the ground is still too dry for fertilization.

It's the beginning of the rush to get the seed in the ground, the wheat up and on the markets for sale at boom prices. Farmers would do well to resist the temptation to over plant or to sacrifice the fertility of their soil in the rush for boom prices. For a lesson taught 25 years ago and emphasized by present day conditions proves such a procedure can only mean financial loss in the end.

BIG GUNS OF THE WAR:



Ironside

Keitel

Gort

SPEARHEADING fighting forces in what may become the second World War are generals who rose from the ashes of the first to gain new fame in a rapidly rearming Europe.

General the Viscount Gort, commander of the British field units, won the Victoria Cross directing from a stretcher the successful Grenadier Guards attack at Canal du Nord. At 53, he is a comparative youth in so lofty a military position.

Known as "the tiger," Gort belongs to high London society. As a member of the Shanghai defense corps, he effected a thrilling rescue of nuns being pursued by Chinese bandits; after the last war, he directed military training in India.

A six-foot, 252-pound Scot—General Sir Edmund Ironside—best remembered as chief at Gibraltar during the recent Spanish War, is England's other top army man. The name aptly fits this 59-year-old veteran.

Ironside was the first English officer to reach France in the conflict which began 25 years ago. There he prepared trains for the first divisions of his nation's expeditionary forces. Ironside and his pet bulldog became familiar figures on the western front.

Colonel-General Wilhelm Keitel, 57-year-old chief of Germany's high command, was a World War captain and battery commander. He ascended with

the Hitler regime, was formerly state secretary in the Reich war ministry. A shrewd executive, Keitel is said to believe in overwhelming enemy by sheer numbers and superior mechanized units.

Nazi army commander is Colonel General Walther von Brauchitsch, 58, the son of a cavalry officer under the Kaiser's rule. His rise has been mostly by the seniority route. Schooled in the cadet corps, he served in the past war as a captain and a major. On several occasions, he has been an oratorical asset to the Fuehrer and his party.

Marshal Klementy Efremovich Voroshilov, as Soviet war commissar, is leader of the Russian troops which plunged into battle-torn Poland. Handsome, 58, he is a close friend of Stalin and perhaps the No. 2 man in Russia today. He once spread propaganda for Lenin, later led Bolsheviks in the revolution.

Directing the French offensive on the western front, General Maurice Marie Gustave Gamelin, 67, is the eldest but probably the most tactical of all the commanders. After his graduation from Saint Cyr, the French West Point, he joined the Algiers Rifles in Africa. A protégé of Marshal Joffre, he planned the winning strategy at the battle of the Marne, and in 1925, helped put down the Druse revolt in Syria. He knows every one of Napoleon's campaigns from memory.

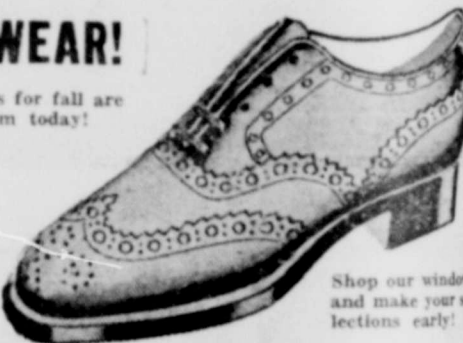

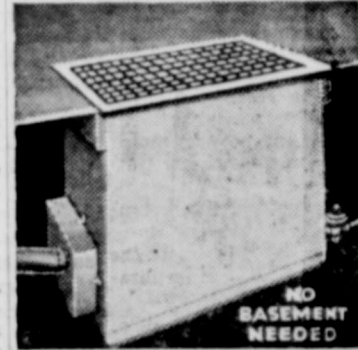

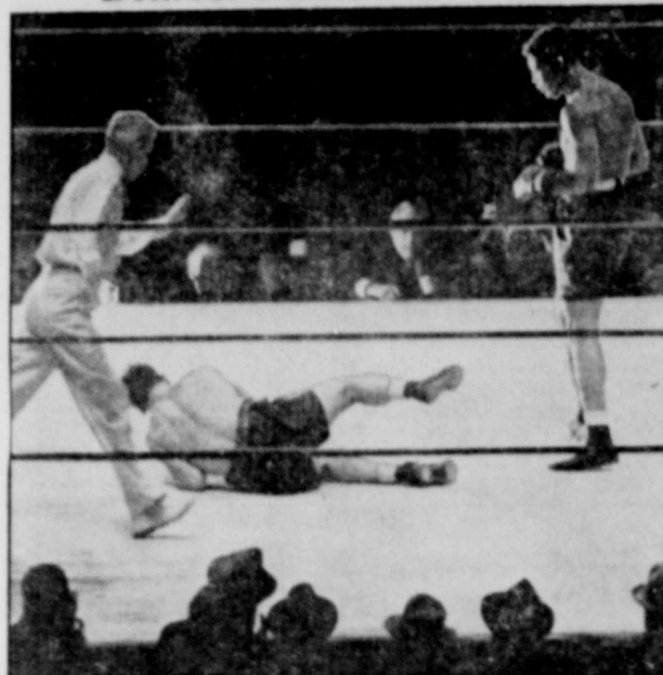

INTERNATIONAL Sunday School Lesson

Jesus in Infancy

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for October 1.

Text: Matthew 2:13-23

WE begin our study of the kingdom of Heaven with a lesson on the infancy of Jesus and the preservation of His earthly life. The Messiahship of Jesus was grounded in Old Testament prophecies. Jesus himself would have denied that He was the founder of the kingdom of God. He said that He came to fulfill the teachings of the prophets, and He earnestly represented the teaching and work of the prophets as having laid the foundation.

It is this, also, upon which we find Paul and other early Christian leaders insisting. Saints and prophets have laid the foundation of the structure of which Jesus Christ is the cornerstone and head, and the saints and prophets, as they preceded Jesus, are following Him in the same great task.

Those in power and authority are always aroused about anything that may shake their power and authority. When the wise men came from the East to seek the infant Jesus whose star they had seen, they naturally appealed to Herod, the ruler of Judea. The talk of one born who was to be in authority in Israel greatly alarmed Herod. Herod was a glamorous ruler, but he was cruel and relentless where his own interests were concerned. He did not adopt half measures but determined to do away with this king of whom prophets and wise men spoke, by destroying all the children in

and around Bethlehem under two years of age.

It was under these circumstances that Joseph took Mary and the child and fled into Egypt, to remain there until after Herod's death when they returned to the homeland and dwelt in the city called Nazareth. It was from this that Jesus was to be known as "the Nazarene." Nazareth was the fitting home for a future Messiah, situated as it was on the brow of a great hill where the very location suggested vision, and near enough to the great lanes of trade for contact with the teeming world of business, industry, and toil.

We shall study this kingdom of God for which we daily pray in the words that Jesus taught His disciples: "Thy kingdom come." The petition for the coming of the kingdom is inextricably associated with the petition that follows it: "Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven."

SOME commentators see in the kingdom of God the rule of God in the hearts of men and His sovereignty over human lives. It is also stressed that this kingdom of God is an internal kingdom rather than an external one. But is it not both? The doing of the will of God on earth as in Heaven is not a thing confined to the inward life. It is external in its results and it has to do with acts and relationships among men.

Thus, the kingdom of God is social as well as individual. It is in time as well as in eternity, and it is earthly as well as heavenly.

Headlee, Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service CCC Camp located at Perryton, Texas. This cover, it is pointed out, really serves the double purpose of conserving moisture and checking soil losses.

Where closely-grown crops are not practicable for winter cover, it is suggested by Mr. Headlee that the stubble, straw and other crop residues be left on the fields and protected from over grazing during the fall, winter and early spring months. Such material, he says, guards against both wind and water erosion, and, after serving its usefulness in erosion prevention such crop residues are valuable as a source of organic material when plowed under.

Soil with organic matter content are cited as being much less susceptible to erosion than are soils with a low content of organic material. That covered soil is protected, Headlee observes, is shown by the fact that the most productive farms are those on which the soil has been protected by cover during the periods of high winds and heavy rains.

pany as authority for his decision, which disregards a jury finding. He pointed out that even if the jury finding had been accepted the final judgment still would be the same. He held, however, that the jury finding did not take precedence over the commission finding.

Included in Judge Yarborough's ruling was a finding that two cents a thousand cubic feet was ample to cover the cost of gas purchased at the well head in the Panhandle field.

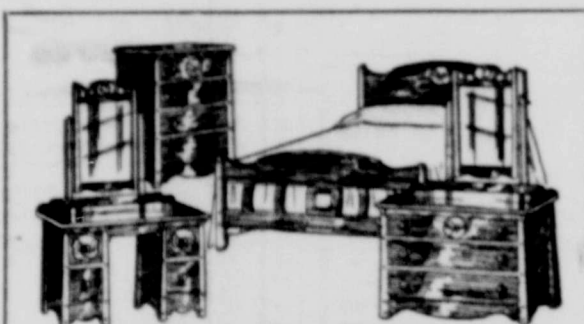
The ruling upholds the state commission allocation of pipe line costs between Texas and Oklahoma users. On this point Judge Yarborough said: "Law and justice do not require that the Texas consumers pay all the burden for a pipe line used primarily to convey gas to another state for use in that state."

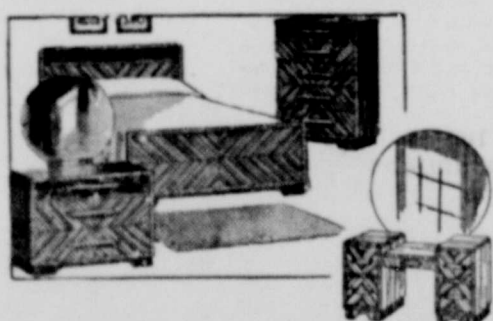

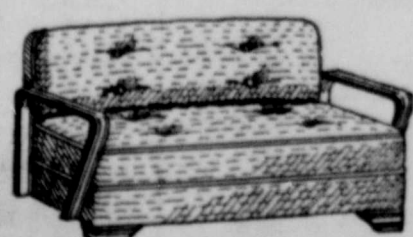
