FREIGHT TRUCKS BURNED.

Junction-Menard Freight Trucks Reduced to Ashes.

While enroute from Menard to Junction with their load of freight last Thursday night the Junction-Menard trucks, value about \$7000, were burned. Practically nothing was saved from the load of freight and everything about the trucks that would burn was consumed. The engines and iron works form what there is left of the two big trucks which during the past several months have hauled the great volume of freight passing over the road between Junction and Menard. The trucks were loaded principally with lumber. Among the other things of the load was some gasoline, some of which had run out onto the lumber. According to the report something apparently went wrong with the front truck and the other was pulled up near it to assist. A match was struck for some purpose and as quick as a flash the gasoline had caught and the trucks were ablaze. We understand the trucks were very well covered with insurance held by the car company from whom the cars were purchased, and who had a lien on the trucks. About \$1750 a payment which was raised by some of our business men some time ago and which was to be returned by the manager of the line in hauling, will likely be lost. It is said that new trucks may be procured and the line continued.

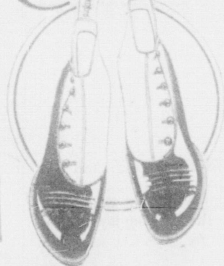

Is your community everything that you wish it? Is your school efficient in building equipment and its work satisfactory? Is your church doing its fullest measure for the moral welfare of your family and your neighbors? Have you as good roads as you want? Are the streets and sidewalks and other conveniences of your town all that your needs and comfort demand? In other words, does your community afford you and yours ideal environment in which to live?

Communities are made by individuals and families of more or less common ideals and common interests coming together in one locality to live. When the community is young every man is for himself, every family is self-centered, in the struggle to become established. There is little community effort beyond the starting of an elementary school or the founding of a primitive church. When material competence is reached by a big part of the population and they have the means of living comfortably at home, and then they begin to give more thought to getting conveniences, necessities that the whole community may enjoy. This thought crystallizes around the community school, the church, the roads, and, if it is a growing town, sidewalks, water supply, fire protection, sewage disposal and so on.

Right here is where community co-operation is needed in dead earnest and must prevail or there will be little satisfactory progress. Public improvements are a public work and must be accompanied by the public, and the public cannot do work with every man independent, both in thought and plan and in action. These communities are best equipped for satisfied living on the part of their people where the spirit of genuine, active co-operation prevails most.

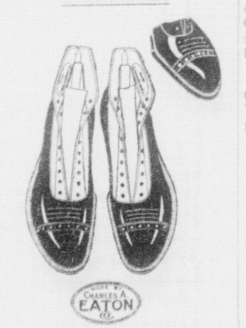
