Dr. and Mrs. Collins of Nebraska, continue bringing them in each day and Mrs. Collins was overjoyed with her five and a half and six pound trout that she caught last Wednesday, as well as a goodly number of lesser size.
Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Du Pri of Corpus Christi, reported fifteen trout, caught under the lights. It is good to have them visit and fish again.
Mr. Adam Reedy of San Antonio, reported nine trout Tuesday, the largest five pounds, and another, four and three quarter pounds.

Three guests at Live Oak Lodges fished off the lodge pier Wednesday afternoon and caught 24 trout, but what trout.
Three of the fish weighed five pounds (scale weight) each, seven or eight of them weighed from three to three and a half pounds, and the rest were nice eating size.

Navigation District To Install Waterline At Cove, Sets Rates
The Aransas County Navigation Commissioners, at their regular meeting, took preliminary steps to install a four-inch water line around the Cove Harbor, and fixed the rate per front foot at \$2.50 per year for a five year period.
In other action the Board granted the Tourist Promotion Committee of the Chamber of Commerce permission to hold boat races in Little Bay ski basin on Sunday, June 18.
The committee was also given permission to sell Coke and other soft drinks, candy and sandwiches at the races.
Approval was given for transfer of the lease on Lib's Miniature Golf Course to Wilburn C. DeWeese of New Braunfels. DeWeese is resigning from the U. S. Customs Service and he and his wife intend to move to Rockport soon, and operate the golf course.
Harbor master Jordan Weber was also instructed to repair and paint arbors and fences in the park areas around the basins at Fulton and Rockport, in preparation for the coming tourist season.

SHOPLIFTER SENTENCED
A Fulton woman was apprehended Saturday by Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine and charged with theft under fifty dollars in connection with pilfering in West's, Roatan's, Morrison's, and Jones' stores.
She was fined \$100 and assessed costs of \$19.50 before Justice of the Peace G. D. Johnson. Failing to pay her fine, she was lodged in the county jail.

C. of C. Approves Wrestling, Boat Race Projects

The Chamber of Commerce directors, at their regular meeting approved plans of the Tourist Promotion Committee to stage a professional wrestling bout in the high school gymnasium on the night of April 29, and a motor boat races in Little Bay ski basin on June 18.
As explained by Jimmy Kautz, committee chairman, the promotion of these items will be financed largely by sources outside the Chamber, and will not come from the Chamber's somewhat straitened budget.
Concessions are to be set up at the boat races, profits to go to defraying the \$450 in purse money and other expenses. In addition to this, although no admission can be charged, members of the committee will pass the hat at the races, and a barbecue will be held. By these means the committee hopes to raise the necessary funds. Advertising will also be sold in a souvenir program.
The wrestling matches have been underwritten by one of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce to the tune of \$350, and permission has been granted by the school for them to take place in the high school gymnasium on the night of April 29.
There will be two matches, booked through the regular wrestling circuit, and the committee says that they will be comparable to those in Corpus Christi.
Other plans for bringing tourists to the area were discussed.
Miss Lola Bonner, head of the legislative committee, reported that the current bills in the legislature have been revised and appropriate action from time to time.
Plans were laid for welcoming newcomers to the area; police protection for Rockport was discussed; and plans were laid for a public relations course for merchants and their employees.
Lawrence Miller, chairman of the Public Affairs Committee, was asked to investigate possible solutions to mosquito control and drainage.
Chairmen and members of the various standing committees were recommended by the executive board and approved by the board (Continued on page 8)

Drive Nets 40 New Members to Club
Directors of Live Oak Country Club met Monday afternoon for their regular monthly meeting.
A report of the drive for associate members was turned in, showing that there were 15 new members from Aransas Pass, 13 from Rockport, 11 from Ingleside and 1 from Corpus Christi, making a total of 40.
Several other applications are in the process of being completed, and directors agreed to extend the time limit through April 15 in order to take in these additional members. Membership in the club at this time totals 225.
Due to the increased costs of maintaining the course and in an attempt to stay in line with other country clubs in the area, the directors decided to raise the green fees to \$2 on week days and \$3 on weekends and holidays. Green fees for inter-city pro-ams will remain at the old price.

SCHOOL ELECTION SATURDAY QUIET

One of the other ballots cast was defective and had to be thrown out, and the second was evidently the work of someone who was against everything, as everybody on the ballot was marked out.

Jackson, Collum Beat Dullye And Horton

Two city aldermen running for reelection Tuesday lost to former city officials.
In Ward 1, former Mayor Hollis Collum polled 94 votes to defeat Jack Horton, the incumbent. Horton received 57 votes and Mrs. Amy Simmons polled five write in votes.
Norvell Jackson won the post in Ward 2, defeating two other candidates including the incumbent, V. A. Dullye, Jr. Jackson, a former alderman and chairman of the Aransas County Navigation District for a number of years, received 136 votes, Jim Adams, local groceryman, polled 94 and Dullye received 82. A total of 468 votes were cast in the two wards.

Judge Wendell Says County Is Dealing With Pests, Drainage

Lawrence Miller and J. B. Jackson, of the Civic Affairs Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, conferred with Judge John D. Wendell Wednesday afternoon on the problems of mosquito control and drainage.
Judge Wendell told them that the county was now actively engaged in wiping out mosquito breeding places with larvicide, and that all ponds or sloughs were being treated with this as rapidly as possible. He requested anyone knowing of standing water that had not been treated, to call his office.
Drainage, Judge Wendell said, is being dealt with as rapidly as possible, and he told the committee members that a request had been made some time ago for a preliminary survey by government engineers to see if Aransas County was eligible for a grant of money to help remedy the local situation.
Engineers had been here, he said, and had made pictures and surveyed the terrain some time ago, but no report had been received from them as yet.

Wreck Mars Easter For Local Families

Easter was marred for a number of families in Rockport by the serious Wreck near Falfurrias of a car carrying two couples on a holiday trip to Falcon Lake.
Mr. and Mrs. Dalton Finches of Rockport, and Mr. and Mrs. Max Keller of Falfurrias, were in a car which left the road and wound up at the bottom of a 24-foot ditch, with everyone in it seriously injured.
The Kellers are former Rockport residents. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. George Keller of this city; Mrs. Keller is the former Carol Sparks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Sparks.
The two families were bound for an Easter holiday at Falcon Lake. The Finchers had left here and gone by Falfurrias to pick up the Kellers, and headed towards Laredo.
This was between 5 and 6 p.m. Saturday evening, and they were driving over a detour on which one side of the road had been excavated, directly into the setting sun, which apparently blinded Fincher, who was behind the wheel.
Reports say that apparently one front wheel dropped off the edge of the road, causing him to lose control of the car, which flipped over the pavement and over the road under construction, winding up at the bottom of a deep ditch.
Passing motorists, who reached the wreck almost immediately, called an ambulance and emergency aid, and the two couples were taken to Mercy Hospital in Laredo, where only prompt action saved Keller's life, as he was bleeding seriously from internal injuries. In addition, his jaw and collarbone were broken, and there were other minor injuries.
Fincher, also in the front seat as he was driving, had his jaw and breastbone broken, and may have suffered other injuries.
The two ladies, in the rear seat were also seriously injured.
Mrs. Fincher had her jaw broken in four places, her right arm broken, head injuries, and, possibly others.
Mrs. Sparks had her jaw and collarbone broken, and had to undergo an immediate operation when the hospital was reached, for a ruptured spleen.
The two ladies are in Room 328, Mercy Hospital, Laredo; the two men are in Room 308.
Reports available say that all four will probably be confined to the hospital for the next month or six weeks.
Fincher is an employee of the Hunt Oil Company in Rockport; Keller an employee of Central Power and Light Company in Falfurrias, and Mrs. Fincher works for the same company here.

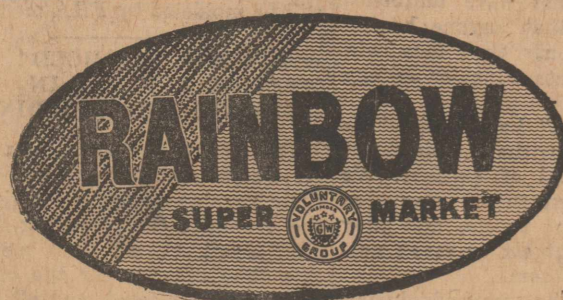

Gonzales To Start Drive

"How can I say 'thank you' to the people who made it possible for me to be treated at Warm Springs?"

That's what one adult patient wanted to know last week as she prepared to leave the Texas Rehabilitation Center, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation to return to her home.

Each week patients of all ages leave TRC to return to their homes and families. They come from Aransas County and from all other parts of the state. And very few of them can pay for all of their rehabilitation.

Judge John Wendell of Rockport, Aransas County volunteer representative of the Texas Rehabilitation Center said, "TRC's goal is to help the physically disabled people of our county and our state. Patients from Aransas County have received treatment at TRC costing more than \$11,370. "The Center depends on many people for contributions of all sizes.
