Wolves Record 2-2 After 34-20 Defeat

Colorado City's Wolves played another thriller Friday night as they tangled with the Post Antelopes in Post. The outcome of the game was in doubt with only 10 seconds to go in the game when Post scored a touchdown to put the game out of reach for the Wolves.

Post won by a final score of 34-20.

The story of the game was missed opportunities by the Wolves and opportunities that the Post team capitalized on.

Both teams made their share of mistakes with each losing the ball on fumbles three times. Post being intercepted two times and the Wolves throwing one interception.

The Wolves dominated the game statistics, accumulating 337 yards on offense, the highest output by a Wolves team in many years. Post had only 196 yards on offense.

A large crowd of Colorado City fans were on hand for the game and they stayed until the last second.

The game started with the Wolves kicking off to Post. The Antelopes picked up two first downs before having to punt. However, on the punt play, the Wolves had 12 men on the field and were penalized 15 yards, giving Post another first down.

However, only two plays later, the Wolves defense forced a fumble about their own 40.

A few plays later, the Wolves forced another Post fumble which was recovered by Scott Neff at the Post 23. Post held the Wolves and on fourth down, Steve Belvin attempted a 41 yard field goal which was only slightly wide.

The Wolves held Post and their punter got off a 62-yard kick, putting the Wolves deep in the hole at their own eight. A quick kick on third down backfired and only went 10 yards. The ball hit a Post player in the back of the legs and was recovered by the Wolves but the

officials apparently didn't see it hit the Post player and the Antelopes got the ball.

Post had the ball on the Wolves 18. Jimmy Dorland sprinted around left end for the score. On that play, the Post right end jumped up before the ball was snapped, an official on the Wolves side of the field reached for his flag but didn't throw it. The touchdown was good as was the point after by Buddy Britton, making the score 7-0 with 8:14 left in the second quarter.

On the kick-off, the Wolves were again penned in deep in their own territory at the nine yard line but managed to get out to the 25 and then fumbled, again giving Post good field position. Post moved the ball to the seven yard line and C. arterback Brad Shepherd hit split end Evan Heaton on a perfect pass for the touchdown. The point after attempt was blocked by Dobie Williams.

The score was 13-0 with 5:50 to go in the second quarter.

On their next possession, the Wolves moved from their own 19 to the Post eight, most of which came on a 62-yard pass from Quarterback Ray Torrez to Tight End Pete Parham. However, the Wolves turned the ball over on downs after three passes went incomplete in the end zone. Several Wolves fans thought pass interference should have been called on two of the plays.

Then it looked like Post was going to move downfield and try to score as the seconds were ticking off to end the second half. A pass was intercepted by the Wolves Blake Hammond was raced back to the Post 16. With one second to go in the first half, the Wolves threw a pass which fell incomplete.

The second half started with the Wolves kicking-off to Post. They held the Antelopes without a first down and got the ball on the Wolves 43.

However, a fumble ended that attempted drive for the Wolves at the 50.

The Wolves again stopped Post and got the ball back on the Wolves 33.

Torrez ran a bootleg around end for five yards and then lofted a pass on a

Six plays later, including a keeper by Torrez for about 15 yards, Fullback Gary Hulme plunged two yards over the left side of the line for the touchdown. The point after attempt was wide, although the Wolves and fans thought it was good. The score was now tied at 13-13 with 4:14 left in the third quarter.

On the kick-off, the Antelope Wingback Dorland grabbed the ball on his own five and raced through would be tacklers to the Wolves two yard line where he was caught from behind by the Wolves' Kevin Geiger. It should be noted that some Colorado City fans remembered Dorland's father running a kick back for a touchdown against the Wolves more than 20 years ago when he played for Andrews.

After the runback, Fullback Randall Wyatt plunged two yards for the score to put Post ahead. The PAT by Britton was good, making the score 20-13, still in the third quarter. It should be noted that Post had gone all this time in the third quarter without a first down.

On the Wolves next possession, they fumbled on their own 31, but held Post. They got the ball back on

their own 33 and then had a pass intercepted.

Post moved the ball down to the Wolves 33 and on fourth down and 10, Shepherd completed a pass to Dorland and Britton added the extra point to make the score 27-13 with 7:01 left in the game.

The Wolves got the kick-off to their own 35 and then a long pass from Torrez to Arispe moved the ball down to the Post 14. Torrez then raced around right end for 14 yards and the score with Belvin kicking the extra point, making the score 27-20 with 5:59 left in the game.

The Wolves then tried an onside kick which they made good when Kevin Herm recovered it for Colorado City after it had gone the prescribed 10 yards. However, the Wolves were unable to move the ball and Post took over.

They drove to the Wolves 32 before Wolves Defensive Back Craig Carter took the ball away from an intended receiver on a pass interception at the Wolves 24.

Again the Wolves tried to close the gap. Wolves Coach Mike Farda said the Wolves would have gone for two points to win rather than going for the tie but the touchdown never came.

Four plays later, the Wolves turned the ball over on their own 18 with 1:13 to go in the game. From there, Post moved in with Halfback Randy Baker taking the final two steps for the score. The point after was good making the score 34-20.

Corley D. Bozeman, 79, a World War I veteran and well-known Mitchell County pioneer, died at 7:30 a.m. Saturday in Root Valley Fair Lodge.

Born June 15, 1897 in Cuthbert, Bozeman was the son of the founder of Cuthbert, D. T. Bozeman, who was, along with his wife, postmaster there for a number of years.

In 1916, he went to work as a rural carrier in Colorado, serving until 1919 when he entered the military service during WWI.

In Dec., 1920, he began work at the Colorado Post Office as a substitute clerk and was a postal employee for almost 48 years. He retired in Dec., 1965.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church. Funeral services will be at 3 p.m. today (Sunday) in the First Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Roy Byrd, pastor, officiating.

Burial will be in Cuthbert Cemetery, directed by Kiker-Seale Funeral Home.

Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. John Brown and Mrs. Roy Davis Coles, both of Colorado City, as well as several nieces and nephews.

mental regulation and energy problems.

"The politicians are working on incorrect assumptions," he said. "They say that the oil industry is currently a monopoly, that profits are too high, the companies prevent competition and that their concentration of power prevents success to newcomers in the industry."

Terrell presented facts and figures which refute these claims, stating that no single oil company does as much as 11 per cent of the business in any of the four major areas: exploration and production, refining and manufacturing all petroleum products, transportation including tankers and pipelines, and marketing.

"Divestiture would limit a company to only one kind of operation, in an industry which is organized as it is in order to save as much production cost as possible and plow the profits back into the whole operation," Terrell emphatically said. "What divestiture would do to a stockholder's stock, is another question and no details have been formulated to handle this phase of the break-up."

He said that a conservative estimate of the effects of divestiture would be to create at least 20 years of legal work, lawsuits and so on, over the structuring, plus to take all emphasis off dealing with energy problems to concern company heads with the break-up and re-structuring.

"Alternative sources of energy are a long way off," he said, mentioning the problems with coal, atomic energy, solar energy and shale oil, "so the nation's energy needs will have to be supplied by the petroleum industry for the next 20 years or more."

"Most available sources of oil have been drilled, except for the very costly off-shore oil, deep Delaware formations or Alaskan north-slope oil," he said. "Six companies which paid \$632 million for a Gulf lease several years ago, gave it up after drilling seven dry holes. The Alaskan pipeline is estimated now to cost \$7.5 billion and a few years ago when I first started talking about it, it was in the millions. Environmental debates, inflation, labor costs, and so on, have increased the cost greatly."

"So far, the only things that politicians have come up with to combat higher costs for energy have been an extension of Daylight Savings Time, lower speeds on the highways and this divestiture bill which will wreck the only industry able to deal effectively with the problem," Terrell pointed out.

"Six years ago, the U.S. imported 25% of the petroleum needed domestically from the OPEC countries. Three years ago, the figure went up to 36% and now, we import 40% from foreign countries. When, and if, the divestiture bill is passed, the nation will be even more in

the clutches of the Arab-controlled OPEC," he said.

"We are now importing over one million barrels a day from OPEC," he warned. "Since 75% of all the energy used in the U.S. is from the petroleum industry, the trend will be toward even greater dependence on foreign sources of oil."

He said that there are about 20 companies which would be affected by the bill and it calls for them to become 80 companies, with all the attendant needs of starting those new companies. "Exploration, production, refining, transportation and marketing would all take second place in the chaos created by this bill."

"You and I as consumers will have to foot the bill," Terrell cautioned. "You and I can help by writing our congressmen and also by being informed, talking to our neighbors. Gasoline is a bargain in the United States, lower per gallon than in any other nation in the world. The oil companies, get 2c per gallon, about 13% return on the investment and that's about what other industries get."

In summing up his remarks, Terrell said that the diversity of structure is what keeps the oil industry going and able to supply low gasoline prices and "this diversity of structure, if done away with, will affect you very much."

In answering questions from the audience, Terrell said that Sen. Hugh Scott (R-Penn.), was the major sponsor of the Senate bill, and that it was also supported by Birch Bayh, Edward Kennedy and others.

"Senator Tower supports the oil industry, Sen. Benton is sort of so-so and I don't know about Rep. Burellson," he said in answer to a question on Burellson's position. "Our Congressman is Rep. George Mahon and of course, he supports us," he said.

"I believe that President Ford wanted the decontrol bill sponsored by Krueger to pass, but he was afraid that Congress would be even more punitive if it did," he responded in reply to another question.

Kiwanian Dell Barber, who noted that he has a few wells that are not producing much and don't bring in much because of government regulation, asked a few pertinent questions and made a few interesting comments.

President Bobby Lemons presented a certificate of appreciation to Terrell following his talk.

"(Preston's Texas Trilogy is playing to sell-out crowds at Kennedy Center in Washington.)

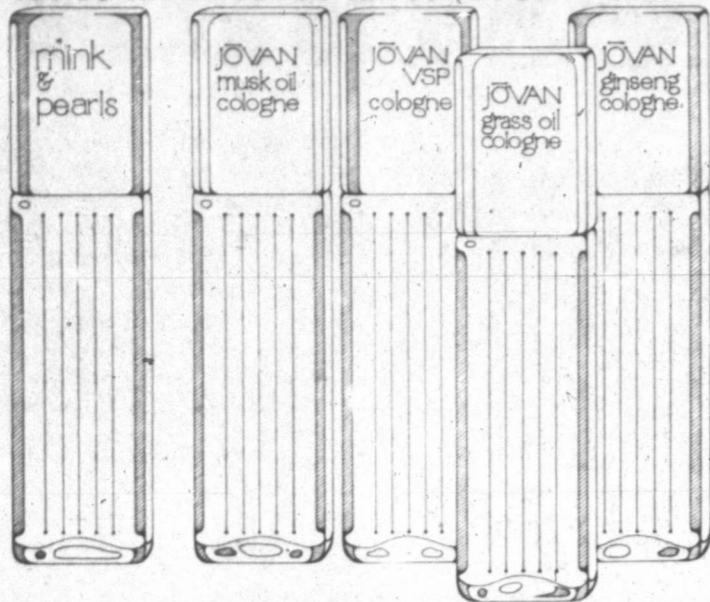

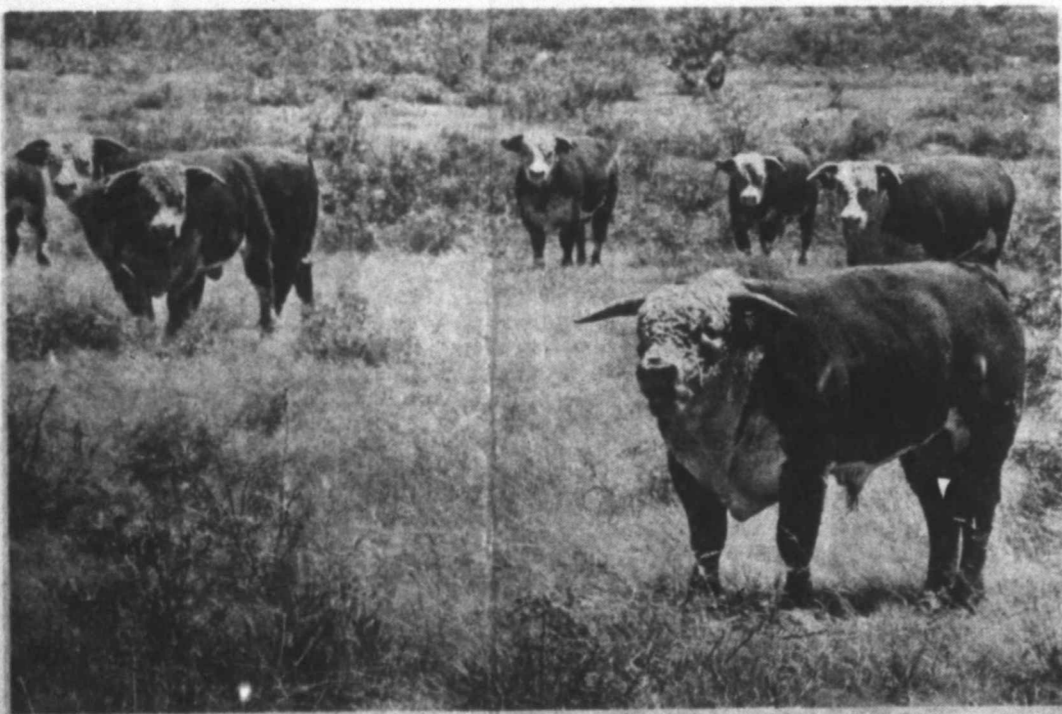

Shepherd Dies In Beaumont

Garland Shepherd of Beaumont, and formerly of Colorado City, died last Saturday afternoon (Sept. 18) of an apparent heart attack while playing golf. He was 69.

Shepherd was dead on arrival at St. Elizabeth Hospital at 2 p.m. after being stricken at Pinewood Country Club.

Services were held at 4 p.m. Monday (Sept. 20) at St. Mark's Episcopal Church. Burial was under the direction of Broussard's Mortuary.

Born Nov. 17, 1906 in Colorado City, Shepherd was the youngest son of Judge and Mrs. J. L. Shepherd. He lived in Colorado City until his family moved to Cisco in June of 1919. He had lived in Beaumont for the last 44 years.

A former Lamar University regent, Shepherd had also been a track star at the University of Texas while he was studying there and was active in many charity projects. He lived at 6387 Ivanhoe with his wife, Mary McGinnis Shepherd.

A 1929 graduate of the University of Texas, Shepherd was on the All-American Track Team in 1927 and held the Southwestern Conference high jump record for 13 years. He was a member of the Longhorn Hall of Fame.

After graduation he was active in the officiating and organizing of high school and college track events in the Beaumont area.

An independent oilman, Shepherd owned many wells in Southwest Texas. He was also on the Lamar governing board and served as vice president for one time.

He was also president of the Beaumont Country Club at one time.

Shepherd is survived by his wife; a daughter, Melissa Watson of Keller; two sisters, Madeline Shepherd of Bedford, Va.; and Mrs. Ford Hubbard of Houston; one brother, Robert A. Shepherd, also of Houston and two grandchildren.

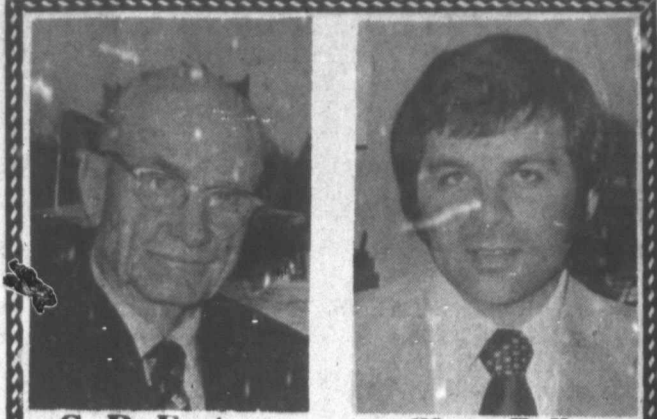
The Rev. Guy White, pastor of East Fourth Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in Mt. Olive Memorial Park.

Faithful Is He That Calls You, Who Also Will Do It

God is faithful! You can trust God to keep His word. What He says, He will do. We should be thankful for His faithfulness. "Know therefore that the Lord your God, he is God, the faithful God, which keepeth covenant and mercy with them that love him and keep his commandments to a thousand generations." (Deut. 7:9) We can be assured today that God's word is true. The promises of God, whether spoken by the Holy Spirit direct to man, or through the written word, or by God's prophet or prophesy; shall come to pass. Those promises of blessings and love from God above is ours, as well as wrath and correction for disobedience, or unbelief. So we need to determine, for ourselves, will I believe God or not.

As I pray for my family, friends, church, or the lost, I can depend on God to meet the need. God is faithful to quicken to those in need: His deliverance.

I leave you this thought from First Thessalonians 5:23-24: "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it."



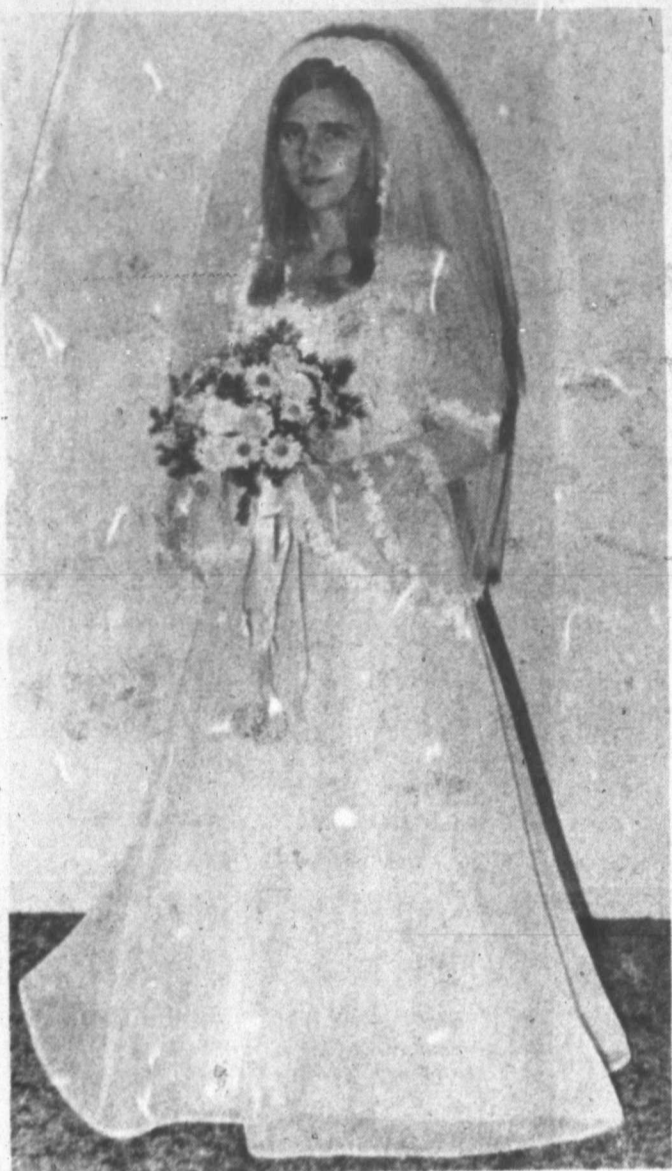
