Temperature Low Brings Killing Frost To Dawson

The 30-degree temperature reading marked up for Sunday night in Lamesa was accompanied by a killing frost. Early risers Monday morning were greeted with a white covering over vegetation, encouraging the idea of pulling their winter coats out of mothballs.

Probable 30 to 40 per cent damage of the feed crops has been estimated by C. E. Tarter, administrative officer of the AAA here. Tarter will make a round of county farms later today, since conflicting reports have been made by farmers over the county.

Brisk winds and the worst sandstorm in months hit the county Sunday to precede the cold snap. A 38-degree low for September was reported by the official weather observer. Saturday night temperature low was 42 degrees.

ATC Announces Award of DFC to Arthur Hoffman

Reports from Calcutta, India, have announced that Flight Officer Arthur M. Hoffman of Lamesa, pilot in the Air Transport Command, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievements.

After 10 months flying "over the hump," Flight Officer Hoffman is scheduled to be back in the states by mid-November.

The flier's wife, the former Maureen Meyers, and their 14-month-old son, Kenneth, are living in Lamesa. Mrs. Hoffman is manager of Montgomery Ward here. Son of Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Abel of Chicago, Hoffman trained at Love Field, Dallas; Randolph Field, San Antonio; St. Joseph, Mo.; and Nashville, Tenn.

Award of the DFC to Hoffman was announced by Brig. Gen. William H. Tunner, commanding general of the India China division, ATC.

The India China division is completing by homeward movements of freight and personnel, its war mission of trans-India, India-China and intra-China transport. It has made air history by flying cargo and passengers in regularly scheduled day and night transit over routes once virtually unseizable, primarily the famed Hump.

Its war contribution, aviation leaders have agreed, has provided far-reaching portents for the future of air transport on a worldwide scale. July, 1945, saw 71,000 tons cross the Hump, while at the moment of Jap surrender the rate was nearly two tons a minute.

"From a small monthly tonnage at the outset," said General Tunner in a war's end statement to his troops, "cargo to China has increased until it has been proved that whole armies could be supplied by air in China—and they were to the distress and destruction of our enemies."

Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, commander of all U. S. forces in China, has said, "Through enemy fire and through all sorts of weather, over oceans, mountains, desert and jungle, those planes came, never-falling. Upon their cargos, China survived when there was no other contact with the world. Your fliers made the Hump the most famous mountain range in the universe."

Bobcats Trounce Tornadoes 28 to 7 In Last Half Surge

San Angelo's Bobcats passed and ran the Golden Tornadoes ragged here Friday night in the last half to take a 28 to 7 triumph in their 3-AA opener before about 2500 fans in ideal football weather.

Lamesa looked to be on the road to an upset victory when Bryant Clark, Tornado end, blocked a Bobcat punt and recovered the ball on the San Angelo 17 early in the second period. Orville Nieman, Lamesa halfback, dashed to the 4 for a first down, plunged over from the 2, and added the extra point to send the home club in front 7 to 0.

But the invaders, sparked by quarterback Dwain Dodson and fullback Bob Hay, stormed back to tie the score shortly before the half. Then in the last two periods the Bobcats mixed passing and running to win decisively.

San Angelo took the Tornado kickoff after Nieman's tally on the Bobcat 33. Dodson completed two passes and ran with the ball once when he couldn't spot an open receiver to move the oval to the Lamesa 22. Pappy Patterson, Tornado quarterback, intercepted Dodson's pass on the Lamesa 1 to stop this drive. Nieman kicked out to the home team's 30, and San Angelo scored in two plays to knot the score. Dodson passed to Pety Renner, Bobcat end, for 13 yards, and Hay surged through the center of the line for 17 yards and a six-pointer. Hay booted the tying point.

The Bobcats finally wound up with the ball on their 20 when they were offside twice on Lamesa's second half kick-off. From there San Angelo marched to pay-dirt. Dodson zipping over from the 1. Hay made the conversion. The 80-yard drive was made up of two passes for 24 yards, and three spurts by Hay for 59 yards.

Roberts, Bobcat halfback, sped through the Tornado line for 59 yards and a touchdown soon after, and Hay again converted.

Dodson scored the Bobcat's final marker on an 87 yard dash around end after Nieman had booted out of bounds on the San Angelo 13. Hay swung his educated foot into the pignikin for another extra point and a perfect night on conversions. Just before Dodson broke loose Lamesa had moved to the San Angelo 12 on two passes, one from Nieman to Rowbotham, Tornado halfback, and another from Nieman to Ed Hawkins, Lamesa wingman. Hawkins made a spectacular catch on the 12 although he was blanketed by three Bobcat defenders. On the next play a bad pass from center got away from Nieman and he barely recovered it on his 25. Then the visitors smeared him on the Lamesa 35, and the out of bounds boot followed.

Coach Wallace sent his second string into the game in the waning minutes of the last period and the tiring Lamesans had trouble holding them away from the Tornado goal. Bill Taylor, subbed in at quarterback in place of the ailing Patterson, averted another Bobcat marker when he overtook Donald Taff, reserve San Angelo back, on the Lamesa 30 after Taff had raced 55 yards.

Lamesa had the better of it in the scoreless first period as both clubs got off some woefully short punts in a kicking duel. Then in the second stanza the Tornado line held San Angelo completely in check until the Bobcats launched their game-tying drive.

But the last half was another ball game. The Cats sprung Hay loose time after time through the middle for long gains. Dodson's deception in handing the ball off on the T formation kept the fans as well as the Tornadoes wondering who was carrying the mail. The Bobcat pass defense was adequate, and Dodson's aerials kept the Tornado defense loose enough for the San Angelo running game to click.

Nieman's punting was weak in the first quarter, but he got off two excellent boots later in the contest, one of them a quick-kick that traveled 50 yards.

San Angelo held a big margin statistically with 14 first downs to 4 for Lamesa, 364 yards rushing against Lamesa's 42. The Bobcats completed 5 of 10 aerials for 63 yards; Lamesa made good on 5 of 18 attempts for 43 yards. Lamesa punted 7 times for 212 yards, and the Bobcats booted 3 times for 58 yards. The visitors drew 40 yards in penalties, and Lamesa was assessed 20 yards.

Guard J. R. Bizzell, ends Donald Hoover and Bryant Clark stood out defensively in the Tornado line while Nieman and Patterson helped halt the Bobcat attack in the secondary.

Dodson and Hay were the big names for the visitors with Hay balancing his long gains with fine work on the defense. Other stalwarts were Renner at end, Wills at center and Behrend at guard.

Tankersley at guard, Arthur Blum at guard, and Morris at end were other Lamesa reserves who saw action.

Lamesa emerged from the San Angelo battle without any serious casualties, and Coach Sanders will put the squad to work Monday in preparation for the Mustang contest. The Tornadoes will be trying to get back into the win column in this third conference game after breaking even in the first two clashes with Big Spring and the Bobcats.

Kirk McKinnon, former backfield luminary for Lamesa and Hardin-Simmons, will assume assistant coaching duties as soon as he is released from the Navy. Woodrow Counts, former footballer at Hillsboro Junior College and North Texas State Teachers College who has coached at Harlingen, will also join the faculty as an assistant mentor on November 1. Major Ranson Returns From European War

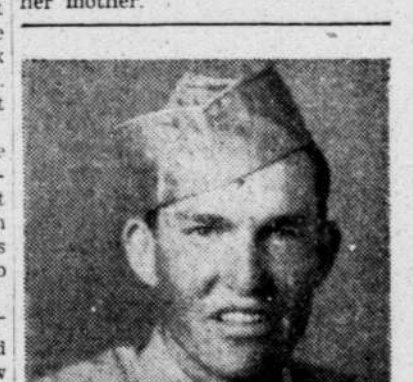

sent in the sputum the germ passes
to another, and contaminated ar-
ticles such as dishes, books, wall-
paper and rugs.

3. Direct infection means tuber-
culosis germs are transmitted from
one person to another during im-
mediate contact. Indirect infection
means that germs are acquir-
ed by uninfected persons from in-
halation of dried particles of
sputum, from articles previously
used by tuberculous persons.

4. The meaning of primary infec-
tion used to be called the old term,
"childhood tuberculosis. It means
the total changes that occur in the
body as results of the first success-
ful invasion of the tuberculosis
germ.

5. The "Skin Test" is harmless.
Undiscovered cases of tuberculosis
are found this way. The serum is
on two ends of a piece of adhesive.
It is worn 48 hours and two days
later the results is shown on the
skin. If this test is positive, two red
patches will appear on the skin 48
hours after the patch is removed.

6. Reaction from a skin test is an
indication for an X-Ray, not neces-
sarily that the person has active
Tuberculosis, but that they at some
time have had some activity.

7. Families of Tuberculosis pa-
tients and all others who live in
the house with patients are called
"contacts."

8. Every growing child should
have a skin test yearly.

**Feather Pillows
Can Be Washed**

Many families are just getting
over fall colds and flu and that
brings up the question of airing the
beds and pillows. It will be good
news to homemakers to learn that
feather pillows may be washed.

Feather pillows may be washed
with feathers in them, according to
Mrs. Bernice Claytor, specialist in
home improvement of the Texas A.
and M. College Extension Service.
Or feathers may be removed from
the ticking, put in a large muslin
bag and washed separately.

Whether the feathers are wash-
ed in the ticking or a muslin bag,
the method is the same. Warm water
with lots of suds is needed, and
washing should be done with a
weak washing soda solution. The
pillows may need to go through
another suds and then through sev-
eral lukewarm rinse waters. "When
the washing job is done," says Mrs.
Claytor, "squeeze the water out, and
let the pillows dry in warm air and

in sun, if possible. During the dry-
ing process, lightly beat the pil-
lows two or three times so they
will be fluffy."

If the feathers and ticking are
washed separately, a good stiff
starch can be applied to the inside
of the ticking with a sponge or soft
cloth. This starch will act as a coat-
ing so the feathers won't work
through, Mrs. Claytor says.

18 Vets Record Discharge Papers In County Office

Recorded through Friday were releases for Noble White, Grant E. Butler (negro), Woodrow C. Carpenter, Vaden V. Lester, Carl T. Coffman, Olen B. Westmoreland, Gus S. Junis, Rupert D. Austin, Rufus L. Nowell, Leonard D. Crain, James Byron Edwards, Vernon Ray Barrett, Homer H. Alexander, Joe H. Hansard Jr., Edward C. Dement, Howard H. Miers, William Sheely Cox and Wiler Oscar Holder.

October 8 was the discharge date for Noble White, who served in the European-African-Middle Eastern theater of war. A technician fourth grade, White served with the headquarters company of Gen. Mark Wayne Clark's Fifth Army as a cook.

White was returned to the states October 1, and his papers were signed at Fort Sam Houston. He was in three campaigns in the EAME area—Rome Arno, Po Valley and Northern Appennines.

After serving in both the European and Asiatic war areas, Pvt. Grant E. Butler (negro) has been discharged. He served as a demolition specialist with the 356 Engineers.

Butler was discharged at Fort Sam Houston October 12. He spent almost two years in Normandy and Northern France, shipping back to the states in June. In late August he was sent to the Pacific, but returned in less than a month to the states to await discharge.

Used by scientists at the National Cancer Institute of the United States Public Health Service, the machine continues experiments in

which baby mice from tumorous mothers have been placed with non-tumorous foster mothers and have not developed cancer at maturity. Conversely baby mice from non-tumorous mothers have been placed with tumorous foster mothers and have developed cancer at maturity.

The machine milks four mice at a time. Each mouse is milked every day for a week and gives one half CC of milk daily.

A special breed of mice had to be developed for use with the machine. Some mice don't like it. It makes them nervous.

Solid Ink Won't Leak, Makers Say

AP Newsfeatures
BUENOS AIRES — A fountain pen which, according to its makers, can be used for a year without refilling, can't leak, doesn't need blotting and can't splatter the paper with ink has been placed on the market here.

Invention of Ladislao Jose Biro, 46, a native of Hungary and a naturalized Argentine citizen, the pen will also be marketed from manufacturing plants in the United States and England if present plans are completed.

Ink is held in a gelatin suspension enclosed in a long, thin copper tube which is folded in sections and placed inside an ordinary-sized pen barrel. The pen point is a small ball bearing, rolling against the inked gelatin in the tube and marking the paper as it rolls.

Called the "Stratopen," it is appropriate for the air age because the ink in the gelatin suspension cannot leak out at high altitudes, Biro says.

Biro invented the pen eight years ago. It sells here for about \$8.75.

The pen makes a mark like that of a sharp-pointed blue pencil. It writes readily, but some people accustomed to hold their pens in a heavily slanted position must learn to hold it in a more upright position.

Norwegian Sailors Salt Away Cash

AP Newsfeatures
NEW YORK — Leave it to the merchant seaman of Norway to prove that what people say about sailors spending their money wildly in port is not always true. Just look at the millions of dollars they have "salted away" in American savings.

These millions saved have two jobs. As dollars, they will help re-establish the trade flow between Norway and the United States. As money, they will enable sailors now going home after war duty on the high seas to have and bring to their families some American clothing and other goods of a quality difficult to obtain in Europe.

This comfortable situation is the result of planning by the Norwegian government and the sailors themselves. Before the German occupation, the kingdom arranged to have deducted from the sailors' pay money for family allowances, social security or old-age benefits, taxes and voluntary savings, and to have this money carefully invested in American and other Allied governments.

The Norse sailor's cash-on-hand in the United States recently was estimated by the Office of the Norwegian Consulate here at over \$23,200,000; but even more millions were involved as great numbers of the sailors made their own investments.

The Norwegian government is buying the sailors' dollars here at

the rate of \$1.10 for \$1, the men to be paid in Norwegian currency when they reach home. Then Norway will use the dollars.

October is the most suitable month
to set out strawberry plants in
Texas, says J. F. Rosborough, horti-
culturist for the A. and M. College
Extension Service. Folks in south
Texas can use the Missionary var-
iety, and the Blakemore and Klon-
dike are well adapted to east Texas.
The Mastadon Everbearing variety
is good for west Texas.

Plants should be ordered now for
arrival the latter part of the month.
Meanwhile, he says, the soil must
be well prepared and fertilized for
setting them. He estimates that a
strawberry bed should contain from
one hundred and two hundred
plants for each member of an aver-
age family.

Looking elsewhere in the garden
Rosborough reminds that the sec-
ond fall planting may be made now.
For most sections of the state this
means spinach, English peas and
head lettuce, plus late or second
planting of carrots, beets, radishes
and a few other vegetables.

This quick look suggests to Ros-
borough to inquire whether you
started your fall cabbage in a plant
box? If you didn't, he advises buy-
ing a supply at a plant or seed store.
In transplanting, he tells you to
plant the cabbage seedlings deep—
down to the lowest pair of leaves,
and about one foot apart. Firm the

Rescue Grass Is Adapted to Texas

Rescue grass which was introduced
into this country from its native
South America 140 years ago, has
become naturalized in Texas and
other portions of the south. Ac-
cording to Robert R. Lancaster, pas-
ture specialist for the A. and M.
College Extension Service, the grass
is best adapted to humid regions
with mild winters. In the north it
is a short-lived perennial but in the
south, the only areas in which it is
of economic importance, it is a
winter annual.

The best time to sow the seed is
in October, or when the cool weath-
er sets in. It grows vigorously on
good soils but only meagerly on
poor land. On prepared land from
20 to 30 pounds an acre of seed
are used, and in mixtures or on
sod land from 10 to 15 pounds is
sufficient. The soil should be fer-
tilized as for small grains. The ad-
vantage of rescue grass over small

grain and rye grass for winter pas-
turing is its dependable habit of
reseeding, volunteer regrowth and
its better yields.

Lancaster says that from the
blacklands westward rescue grass is
most commonly found along fertile
bottoms where shade excludes sum-
mer grasses and in the bare shaded
spots under trees on the uplands. In
regions of ample fall and spring
rains rescue grass, and bur clover
grown with Bermuda grass replaces
Bermuda alone for winter grazing.
Westward, below 35 inches average
annual rainfall, however, rescue
like rye grass, in permanent pas-
ture is likely to exhaust spring
moisture to the extent of serious dis-
advantage to summer grasses.

Earlier bur clover, or annual sweet
clover and black medic, can be
grown with rescue grass to good ad-
vantage. Rescue grass helps to pre-
vent cattle bloat on the clover and
the clover enriches the soil to the
advantage of the grass, Lan-
caster says. If the grass or the mix-
ture is allowed to ripen seed a vol-
unteer fall crop may be depended
upon if the season is favorable.

Following the winter pasture a crop
of cow peas, late sudan or sorghum
may be grown before the pasture
volunteers in the fall.

The market price for rescue grass
seed suggests the possibilities of har-
vesting it, Lancaster says. But har-
vesting must be a little earlier than
oats because the seed shatters easily,
and care must be used in handling
it to prevent heating and molding.

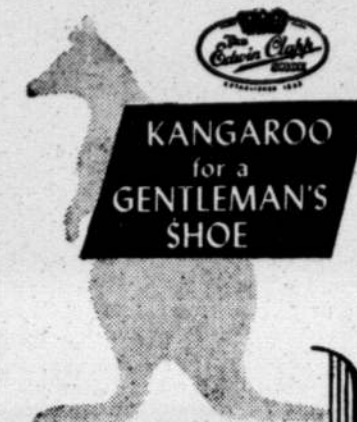

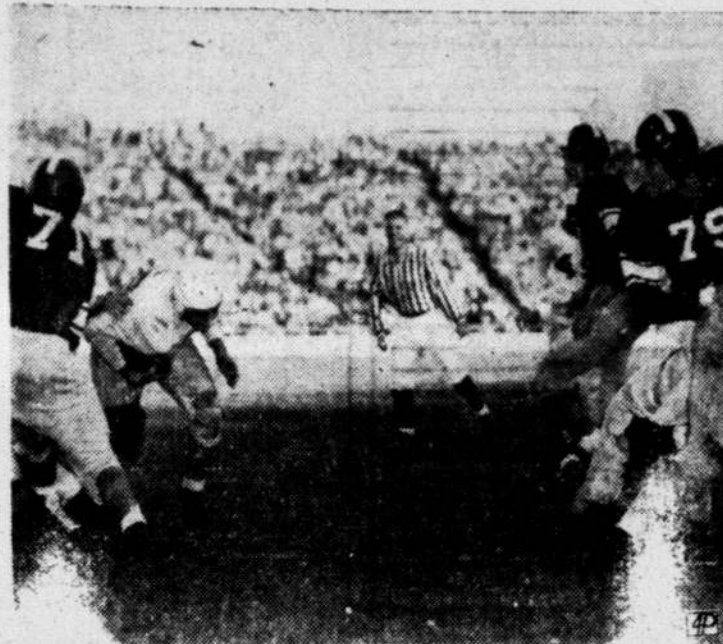

'Standardized' Dressed Hens Find Ready Market

Farm women who are culling old hens from their flocks will find a ready market for these birds if they are placed for sale as dressed or canned hens. Supply of dressed or canned hens has never equaled consumer demand in most sections of Texas, and poultry products "standardized" under the Extension Service requirements always find a ready market, says Myrtle Murray, home industries specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Many consumers buy canned chicken to send overseas. Miss Murray states, and old hens are good for canning because they do not overcook.

A standardized product bears the 4-H Label, which is identified in marketing circles with high quality products. In order to get hens "standardized," the seller must have her county home demonstration agent score method of killing, bleed ing, dressing and wrapping. In the case of canned chicken the agent must check recipe and method used in canning. Other considerations, such as cleanliness of the seller and her kitchen and work area, also enter into the score as well as the product itself.

The agent will then score the product and methods used and if it scores 90 or above, the product then may be submitted to an Extension Service headquarters specialist for her scoring. A sample of dressed chicken will be scored by the food preparation specialist, who will check it in the seller's home if the

product is perishable. The food preservation specialist will score canned chicken, if two cans of each kind are sent to her.

Only after the food specialist has approved the product as standardized and Miss Murray has sent a statement to that effect to the demonstrator or seller, the county

Get The Most Out Of Electrical Appliances

Electrical appliances for making home work easier soon will be on the market, and farm women will be buying new cleaners, mixers, irons and other appliances which they have had to do without during the war. Electrical appliances, if used in the correct manner, can save a great deal of energy and time, says Mrs. Bernice Claytor, home improvement specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. All too often, however, the housewife starts out using her ap-

pliances without checking to see if her methods are best for time and labor saving.

When the homemaker buys a new appliance, it will save her time and work in the long run if she studies out first the best way of doing the job. Just as an example, here are a few pointers in cleaning a room with a vacuum cleaner. First the housewife should see that there is enough light and ventilation in the room for a good and comfortable job. After she decides on the best methods of doing the job, she must eliminate any part of the task she can or combine steps in the clean-

ing. "If you can use one attachment for several jobs," says Mrs. Claytor, "you may be able to do all those steps before the attachment is changed. Keep everything within easy reach so that when you need to change attachments you can do it quickly. Attachments have a specific job. Be sure you are using the right one for the job you are doing."

Proper method of using any electrical appliance will save money, too, Mrs. Claytor continues, because the appliance will last longer and need fewer repairs.

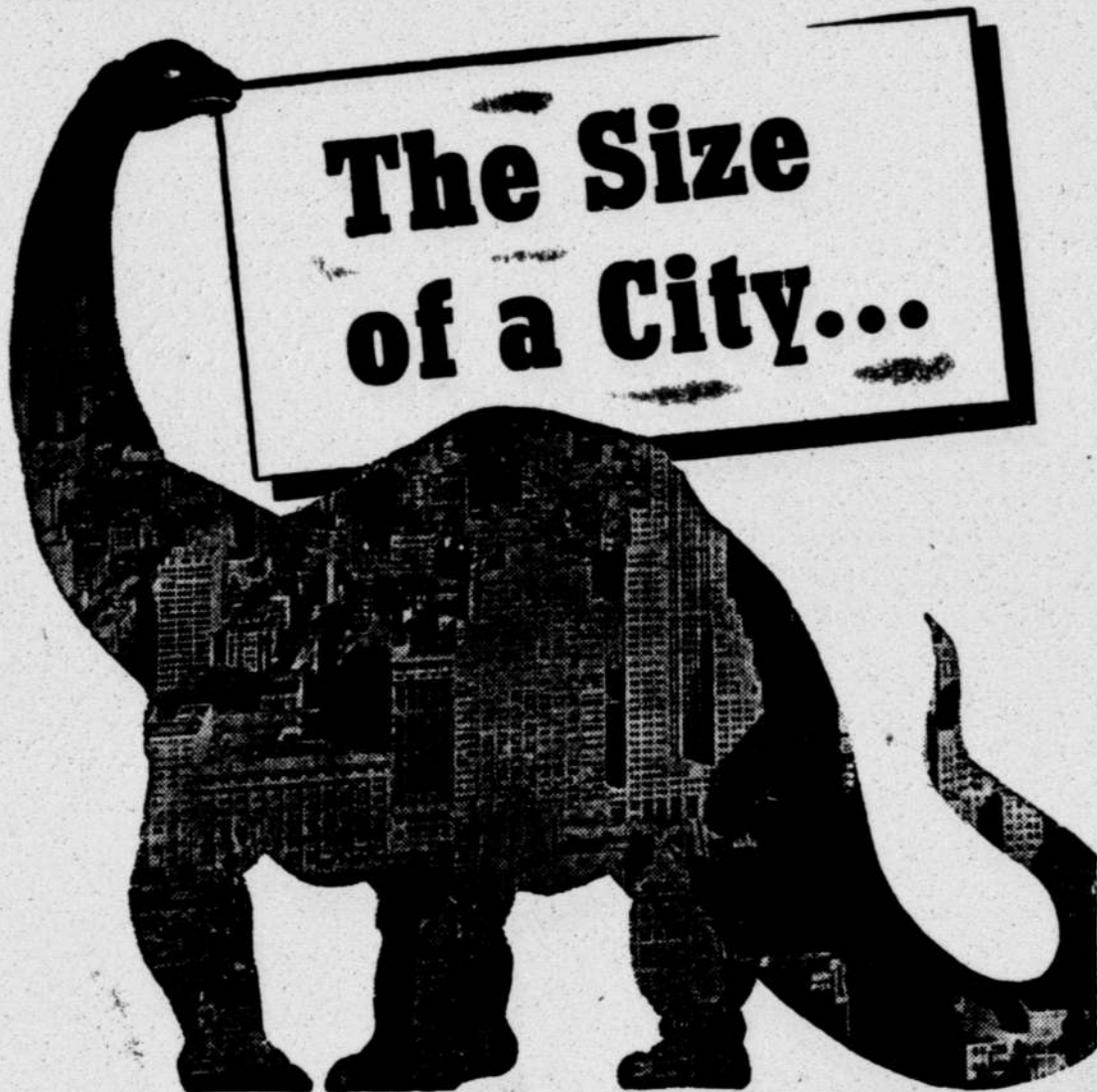

Latest News From THE HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

MYRTLE DICKIE NEGY

Many families are just getting over fall colds and flu and that brings up the question of airing the beds and pillows. It will be good news to homemakers to learn that feather pillows may be washed.

Feather pillows may be washed with feathers in them, according to Mrs. Bernice Claytor, specialist in home improvement of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Or feathers may be removed from the ticking, put in a large muslin bag and washed separately.

Whether the feathers are washed in the ticking or in a muslin bag, the method is the same. Warm water with lots of suds is needed, and washing should be done with a weak washing soda solution. The pillows may need to go through another suds, and then through several lukewarm rinse waters. "When the washing job is done," says Mrs. Claytor, "squeeze the water out, and let the pillows dry in the warm air and in sun, if possible. During the drying process, lightly beat the pillows two or three times so they will be fluffy."

If the feathers and ticking are washed separately, a good stiff starch can be applied to the inside of the ticking with a sponge or soft cloth. This starch will act as a coating so the feathers won't work through, Mrs. Claytor says.

TRY DRY SUDS FOR UPHOLSTERY

You can't put your sofa through a washing machine, but if it's upholstered and is washable you can do a successful home cleaning job with dry suds. To make sure the material is washable, try cleaning a little spot that won't show—behind a cushion or under one arm of a sofa or chair. If dry suds brings a bright new gleam to the test spot, that's your cue to go ahead.

Now here's the recipe for dry suds. It comes from Mrs. Bernice Claytor, home improvement specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Just as you'd expect, the ingredients for dry suds are soap and water—a neutral soap and soft water. Dissolve a half cup of neutral soap shavings, flakes or chips in one quart of soft water. Then pour the solution into a wide-mouth jar and let it cool. When it's cool it will become a jelly.

Next take a half cup of this soap jelly and beat it with a rotary egg beater until you have a pretty white froth that looks like a good cake icing. This white froth is dry suds.

Now for a few pointers on that dry suds shampoo for your upholstered furniture. Mrs. Claytor suggests that you first clean off all the dust you can. If you haven't a vacuum cleaner, use a whisk broom. Next apply the suds on just a small space at a time, then let each new area overlap the last one

A little. Put the suds on with a brush or a sponge. Spread them on liberally and use a light circular motion to shampoo the dirt out. The suds will absorb the dirt, so your next step will be to remove the soiled suds with a plate scraper, spatula or the dull side of a knife.

Rinsing is the next step—and an important one. Remember the soap must come out, and you must use as little water as possible. Use a sponge or cloth wrung from clean, luke-warm water. You'll need to do the rinsing job at least twice. Finally, wipe the fabric dry with a clean, absorbent cloth. Rub the fabric in the direction of the nap or weave.
