Dogs Kill Nutria

Bill Claxton, who lives six miles south of Colorado City in the Seven Wells community near Lake Champion, discovered this strange animal Friday night when his three dogs killed it. He is holding a nutria, a large (10-15 pound) rodent which is fairly rare in this West Texas country as they have to live near a pond or stream and subsist on water vegetation. Ronnie Aston, game warden here, also said that they use the water for protection, scurrying into the water when danger threatens, into their burrows on the banks of the pond or creek. They are pests and may be killed at any time during the year, he said.

Marijuana "Farms" Wiped Out By Judge, Sheriff

Some 36 plants, identified as being marijuana growing in two separate locations in and near Colorado City were uprooted by sheriff's officers Wednesday morning.

Some 30 plants were found between Interstate 20 and W. 17th Street just east of Rogers Road. They had been transplanted in a number of areas shaded by mesquite trees.

Sheriff Bill McGuire along with deputies Simon Barrera, L. M. Newby and County Judge Bill Carter pulled up the plants and destroyed several seed beds.

McGuire marked his name along with the name of his deputies in the dirt to let those

growing the marijuana know that the law had been there.

An arrowhead hunter discovered the second area where marijuana plants were growing and notified Chief Deputy Barrera.

The second area was in a creek bed just east of the Colorado River and just north of Interstate 20.

In the creek bed, in shaded areas, the sheriff and his men and Carter found several plants

in flower pots. A bucket to water the plants was found at a nearby water hole.

Several other plants were found planted in the ground of the creek bed, with the plants

surrounded by rocks neatly placed so as to protect the plants. McGuire left his name on a rock along with his card to let the growers know he had been there.

It was estimated that the plants

ants ranged in age from just being planted to four-weeks old. All appeared to be in good shape and well cared for.

No arrests have been made in either case.

Truck Trapped In Creek Driver, Passenger Escape Injury

A 45,000 pound cement pump truck belonging to Dowell, Div. of Dow Chemical and driven by Jesse Dominguez of Colorado City, demolished a county bridge across North Champion Creek Tuesday afternoon when the heavy truck fell into the creek on top of the bridge.

The all-steel bridge fell under the weight of the truck and Dominguez and another occupant of the truck, Nolan Russell, also of Colorado City, escaped injury.

The accident was reported to Texas Highway patrolmen at 2:15 p.m. Tuesday and Patrolmen Marvin Keenan and Don Stewart investigated, along with Sheriff Bill McGuire and Deputy Simon Barrera.

The truck was pulling a 4-wheel pulp trailer at the time of the mishap.

Jimmie Bolin, Dowell employee, said that two trucks from Farmer's Oil Field Company of Snyder were hired to get the Dowell truck out of the creek. They disconnected the two units and pulled the truck up the north bank and pulled the trailer from the south side to get them out about 7 p.m.

Bolin estimated that the truck and trailer suffered no damage as a result of the cave-in. Precinct One commissioner Marcus Vest said that the all-steel bridge had been reinforced and strengthened about five years ago and at that time,

Candidates in a contested election were offered, free of charge, space in the Colorado City Record to present their views on their candidacy in their own words. Candidates for State Senator from the 30th district are Ray Farabee, Charles Fennell and Mary Kirchhoff. Mrs. Kirchhoff, the Republican candidate, declined the offer. The two Democratic candidates' views

are presented below. Justice of Peace candidates for Precinct One, Leonard Henderson and M. O. (Odie) Wise, were given the same opportunity, with Henderson, the incumbent, declining the offer. Other candidates' views will be presented in the next two issues of the Record preceding the May 4 primary election.

Ray Farabee, a Wichita Falls businessman and attorney, is a candidate for the 30th district Texas Senate seat being vacated by Senator Jack Hightower who is running for U. S. Congress in the 13th district.

In making his announcement last December, the 41 year old Democrat expressed his concern over the growing lack of confidence in government and stated his belief that citizens who care must become involved in order to reverse the trend. In stating this belief that government must do a better job of serving the people, he announced plans to wage a grass roots type campaign.

Farabee has visited each of the 29 counties in the 30th district many times over the past three months in an effort to fully understand the issues that concern the voters of this district.

"I feel I have gained a solid understanding of the issues that concern citizens of this large West Texas district. Although I have not sought any office before, I am willing to enter public life at this time because I believe I can offer the effective, mature, common-sense type of leadership that the people of this area expect and deserve."

"Good government needs the involvement of citizens who know the daily problems of working for a living, and raising a family. I have experienced these problems."

Farabee places reform in educational financing along with industrial and rural development as top issues facing Texas. He believes the state has put too much emphasis on financing education through ad valorem taxes which are inequitable for the average homeowner and farmer.

In discussing industrial and rural development, Farabee noted

I decided to run for state Senator because I believe that this important office needs to have an experienced man who has the desire and the determination to serve.

As you know, I have served in the Legislature for eight years. At age 22 I ran for the Legislature because I saw a need and an opportunity to help my fellow man. Too often we hear our government described as "they" but this impersonal pronoun has no place in our vocabulary. It is my desire to continue helping to personalize our state government and restore public confidence in our legislative process.

Everyone is for ethics now that there has been a scandal in Austin and Washington; however I have advocated a strong code of ethics since my first term when I supported such a bill. If some of my fellow legislators had shared my concern in 1967 we might have avoided some of the problems we have today. We did pass some meaningful legislation last year which I supported. The campaign reporting and financial disclosure laws will help make legislators' records open to the public.

The last session we were able to pass a no-new-tax budget. I am proud to be a member of the Legislature which met its responsibilities without raising taxes. I know that we can have a no-new-tax budget again next year if we, the members of the Legislature, are careful and weigh the priorities of various programs against their cost.

One of the priorities is the establishment of a long range water plan for the state, especially for the West Texas area. As a member of the Committee of 500 I worked for the Texas Water Plan. As a member of the Senate I will continue to work to solve this crucial problem.

Friends of Precinct One, especially those of you that I have failed to contact personally, I appreciate this opportunity afforded me to ask for your vote and support in electing me Justice of the Peace of Precinct One.

I am asking for your vote because I need this job. I feel that my background as a bookkeeper and my experience as an office manager does qualify me for this office.

My age is 61 and I have lived in Mitchell County for more than half of my life. I am a Baptist and an active member of the Masonic Lodge and I am a veteran of World War II, a member of the local V.F.W. and a charter member of Disabled American Veterans organization at Big Spring.

I have a service connected disability caused by gun shot wounds but this disability will not hinder me in any way in discharging my duties as Justice of Peace and, if elected, I will give this office my full time and do by you exactly as I would expect you to do by me.

Burglars Strike Again

J. C. Britton's Western Auto Store is the latest victim of burglars in Colorado City and the area.

Entrance to the store was made through a wooden door panel at the back of the store sometime between Saturday night closing and opening Monday morning, Britton said.

He called the Colorado City police department Monday morning about 8 a.m. and police investigated the break-in. A hole had been made in the door and appliances pushed to the side to make enough room to crawl into the store.

Britton estimated that \$150 worth of merchandise was stolen: two or three pellet guns, three or four B.B. guns and four or five baseball gloves.

This latest burglary increases the number of break-ins being investigated by police and sheriff's departments within the past two weeks. Included are the burglary of Eddie's Pharmacy, Cattlemen's Restaurant, Hale's Westbrook Truck Stop, Sequoyia Mobile Homes, a missing calculator from Texaco station on I-20 and Highway 208 and an attempt to break into Marshall's Downtown Department Store.

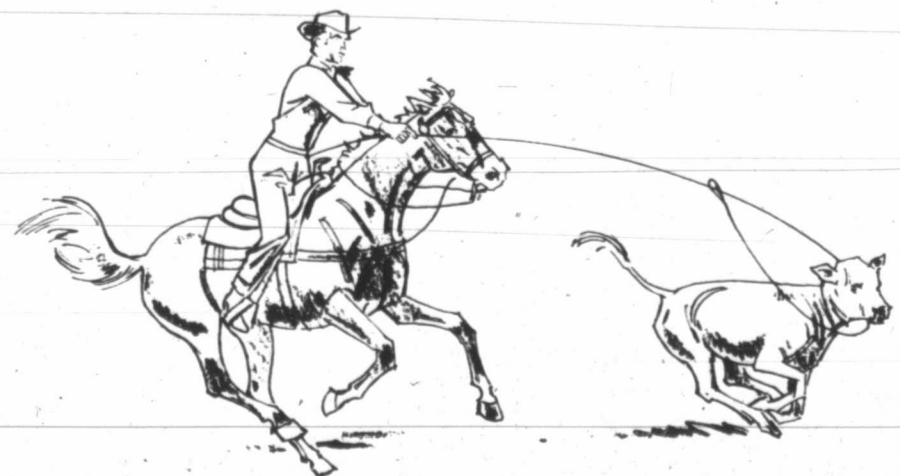

ted that each of the counties in the 30th Senatorial District had lost population according to the 1970 census. He called for additional funds and concerted effort to bring industrial diversity to the area.

"Throughout the past several years I have worked with area industrial development agencies and major industries seeking new locations in Texas. These efforts have created many new jobs in this district. As a senator, I will continue my efforts in this area and assist communities with efforts to diversify and create more jobs. There is a need to keep our young people in their home towns," stated Farabee.

Throughout his campaign, Farabee has advocated 'pay as you go' policy for Texas. He has criticized the Legislature for passing legislation without providing the necessary funding and thus putting pressure on community taxing bodies to pay the bill. He is critical of over-regulation and feels that common sense solutions are best found at the local level of government.

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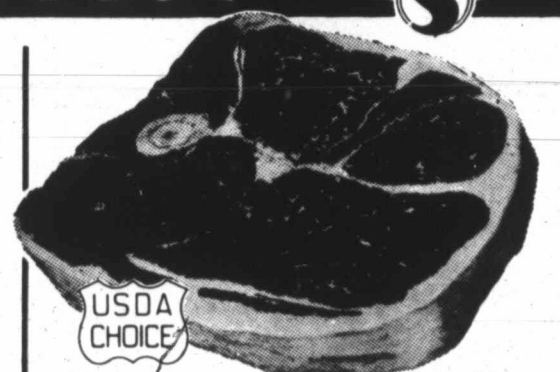

Tommy Doyle was high individual in placing cattle and high individual in Area II and the team won 3rd in placing cattle and 4th in grading cattle.

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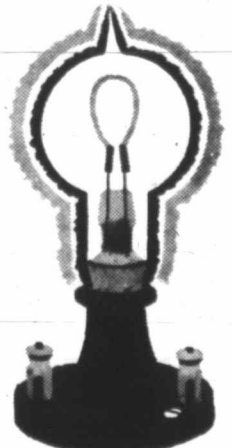

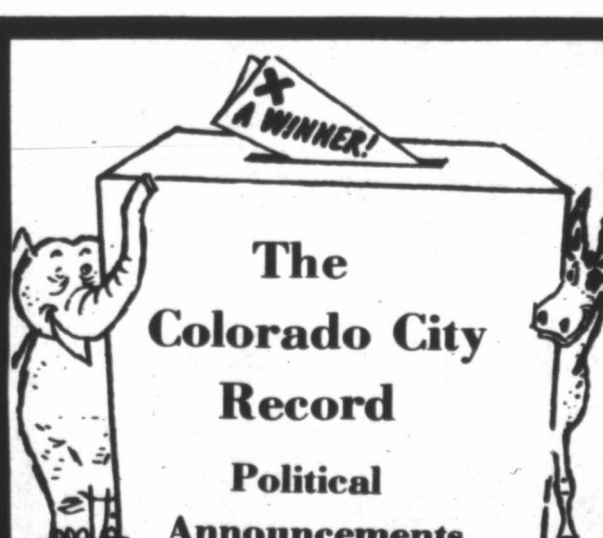

blem. Water is especially important to an agricultural area. I know how our rural economy depends on agriculture. I am from a rural area, Archer County, and I have served on the Agriculture and Livestock Committee for the eight years I have served in the Legislature.

Seniority on the Agriculture committee provided me an opportunity to serve on the Natural Fibers and Textile subcommittee which conducted a feasibility study of textile operations in other states. There is no reason that Texas fiber could not be manufactured into finished products without leaving the state. At the present time I am chairman of the Subcommittee dealing with Agricultural Shortages in baling wire, pesticides and fertilizer. This committee will report back to the Legislature in January of 1975 with specific recommendations.

In addition to the Agriculture committee I have served on the oil and gas committee, on the aeronautics committee as vice-chairman, and on the elections committee as vice-chairman, as well as other committees. I am proud of my attendance record. I have been present every day a recorded vote was taken during both regular and special sessions for the past eight years.

I work for the best interests of my constituents and keep in closest contact with the people of the district. To keep up with the public needs and opinion I subscribe to every paper in my

district and many papers outside my district. I am open-minded enough to listen to all political view points. In addition to papers I have sent out questionnaires to my district on various questions and issues. This spring I sent out a questionnaire to find what was the reaction to the issues facing the Constitutional Convention. I have consistently supported in addition to a strong Code of Ethics and a water plan, technical vocational training, rights of local government, farm to market road program, rights of senior citizens.

I have consistently opposed a state income tax, trailer brake law, tax on groceries and medicine.

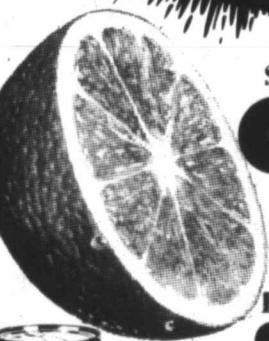

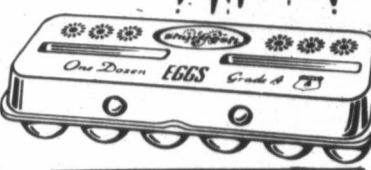

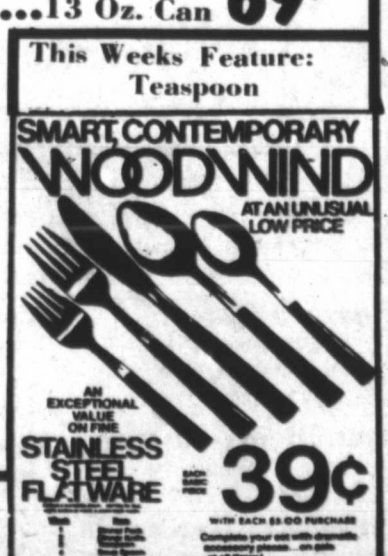
