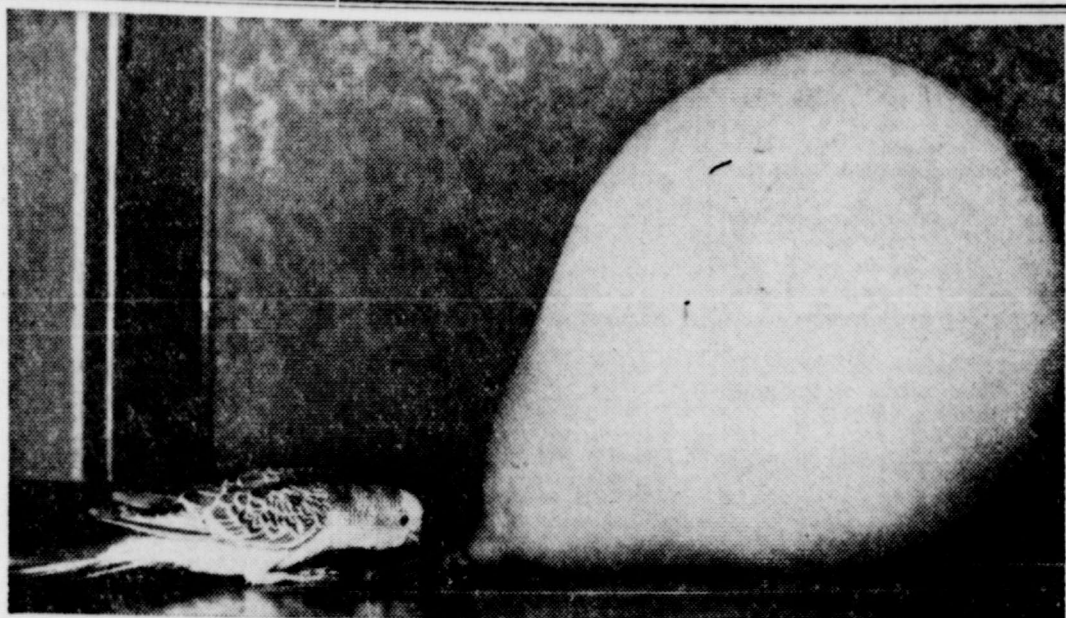
They ought to make some arrangements whereby schools like Breckenridge could play in the high league on the basis of the fine record the Bucks have made.

Mr. Tennyson took over the business Monday and moved his location from 609 Avenue D to the Maytag building at 711 Avenue D.

Mr. Tennyson said that he planned to continue handling his regular radio, television and appliance lines as well as the Maytag line of appliances. The Tennyson firm is one of the pioneers of the television business in this area.

The Cates have operated the Maytag agency for some two years, purchasing it from Dewey Sage. W. B. Cates plans to leave Cisco with his family on March 1 to assume management of large farming interests on the Plains. W. C. Cates plans to remain in Cisco to manage real estate property here.

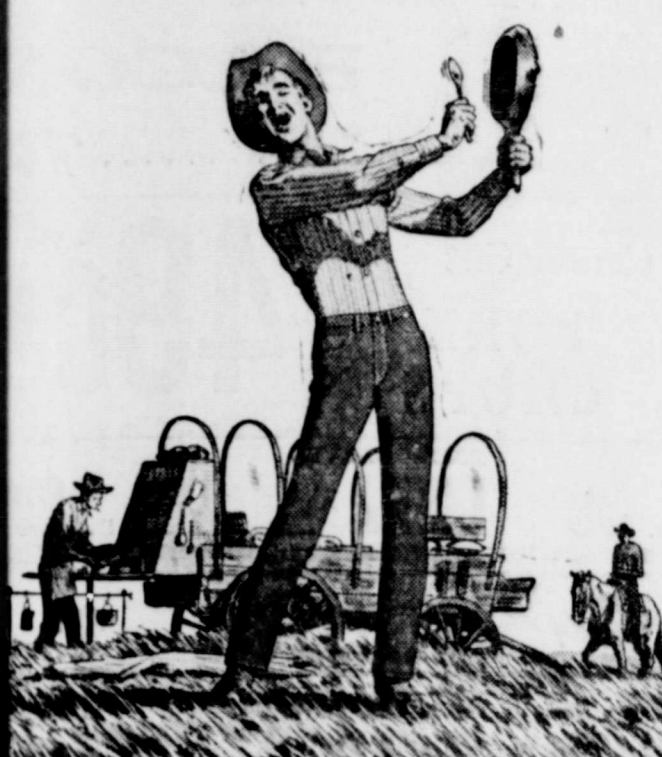

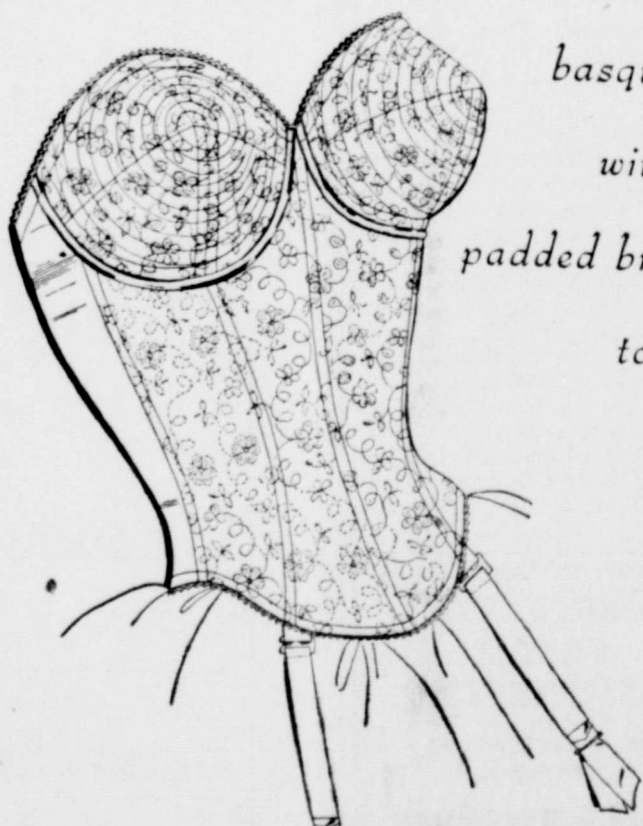
