NATIONAL BITTERNESS
MARKED 1824 CAMPAIGN

The admission of Missouri as a slave state was one of the dominant issues before the people, was decided by the House of Representatives. The bitterness and sectionalism of the contest never has been equalled, the attacks on Crawford being measured only by the intensity with which President Jackson was assailed in some quarters. The North was openly against the South, the East desperately against the West.

Arguments, powerful, logical, illogical, true and untrue, intrigue, malicious attack and vituperative sneering marked the contest up to every moment of the count. As to the Western farmer interest was against the Eastern industrial forces.

Adams made a deliberate appeal to the South and the North, charging that the South was dominating the entire nation in that every President for twenty-four years had come from the South. This phase of the campaign inflamed both Northerners and Southerners to a point that was reached only in the Civil War.

Owing to the difficulties of travel the speechmaking was of a stationary character. The candidates had no opportunity to appear before the country. Likewise, the press had not reached any widespread circulation, and the contest played an important part in the local, chief dependence placed on the pamphlet. The pamphleteers were busy day in and day out. Before the fight was ended these pamphlets of literature of a disgraceful and, judged by present-day standards, highly dishonorable character.

Few of the pamphlets produced were of a positive character. Mostly they were negative, devoted to attack and vilification rather than to giving reasons why their favorite candidates, they in whose interest they were written, should be elected. Jackson was openly attacked as a murderer, military despot without regard for the Constitution or for law. The Jacksonites swung their acid at Crawford, charging him with being a Federalist. Crawford was clearly the favorite, but this charge hurt. North Carolina and New Jersey practically deserted him. Still he retained the advantage. According to custom the party was to caucus in Congress and make the nomination. Crawford was nominated. Adams, Jackson and Clay were nervous. They combined to attack the infamy of the caucus system, denouncing it as anti-republican, the agency for robbery of the people's rights. Martin Van Buren of New York, genius in politics and with a powerful organization back of him, tried his best to check the reform movement, but the combined scheming of the opposition could not be overcome. The caucus was called. The galleries were packed to suffocation, but the members were only scantily represented. An effort was made to adjourn, but Van Buren, battling for Crawford, opposed it because no mutually convenient date could be set. The people, he said, expected a nomination.

Van Buren called the ballot: Crawford 64, Adams 2, Macon 1, Jackson 1. Crawford was declared the nominee, but 68 votes out of 261 did not satisfy the people—it meant nothing, and so the scramble for office went to the people. Soon after that Crawford was stricken with paralysis, a doctor having administered lobelia to him. Every possible pressure was brought to bear to have him withdraw, but he steadfastly declined. "His pitiful condition" was alluded to by his supporters and denounced as hypocritical propaganda by his enemies. It was quite obvious that with four candidates there would be no election. Clay believed he could carry Louisiana, but he came out fourth. Jackson led with a majority over Adams greater than the entire vote of Crawford or Clay. The bitterness grew in intensity. Public fights were a common occurrence. Even duels were fought. Then came a dramatic episode. Henry Clay appeared at the Crawford home and entered. Crawford's hopes were blasted.

PLAINVIEW WAREHOUSE
GUTTED BY FIRE

On last Sunday night at 9:30 fire was discovered in the southeast corner of the big warehouse of the Plainview Hardware & Furniture Co. The fire department was on the job a few minutes after the alarm was sounded and in about twenty minutes they had the fire under control and practically out. Two streams of water were played on the fire. The fire boys are certainly to be commended for their splendid work. The entire building and contents were ablaze when the department got there and it did not look as though a thing could be saved. Perryton is indeed fortunate in having such a well organized fire department and sufficient water pressure to successfully combat a fire as large as this.

The exact cause of this fire will probably never be known. From all appearances, the blaze started in a pile of horse collars and pads which were stored in the southeast corner of the building. It spread instantaneously to all parts of the building, the big 50x140 building was a mass of flames when the water was turned on. The total loss will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000.00. The building was insured for \$2000.00 and the contents were practically covered. As soon as the insurance adjustment is made the Plainview people will restock and repair or rebuild the warehouse.

CHICKEN SEASON OPENS SEPT. 1

The public has been of the opinion for some time that there would be no open season on prairie chickens this year, however, this is a mistake according to M. A. Hudler Game Warden for the State of Texas who has been in Canadian during the past month and who gave us the following information. The season will open Sept. 1st and continue until Sept. 10th. Each hunter will be allowed 5 birds a day or fifteen for the entire season this allowing each man three days of hunting. Persons hunting in their own county will not need license those expecting to hunt out side of the county in which they live will be required to purchase license which will cost \$2.00 each.—Canadian Record

MARVIN JONES GIVES
TALK ON POLITICS

"Andrew Mellon is President of the United States." That is Marvin's opinion of the economical Coolidge administration. Speaking before a packed room in the county courthouse last Saturday Hon. Marvin Jones gave a straight cut talk on politics. "I believe that Coolidge is an honest man." Congressman Jones continued, "He would like to do what is right. He would like to have prosecuted the oil scandal until all of the guilty were convicted but the forces in charge were too strong for him. He failed in the hour of need." In this manner Jones summoned up his denunciation of Republican corruption in office.

Mr. Jones spoke immediately following the meeting of the school trustees. He was introduced by Judge C. C. Small as the foremost democrat of west Texas. He began his speech by a short talk on the value of education. He quoted Mirabeau B. Lamar's famous statement saying "An educated mind is the guardian genius of democracy." After pointing out that an educated class of people was the essential basis upon which any enduring government emanated from the "folks" as he called them. The American government would be rejected in 24 hours if it were transplanted and placed upon some other country such as Mexico or Russia. If another form of government were placed upon this country it would be torn to pieces sooner than that. Governments are like trees. The grow slowly. If this government were torn up however, it would not be many days until a sound government would be functioning again, for this country has the brains upon which a sound government is founded.

After his few words on the value of education, Mr. Jones expressed his pleasure on being in the Panhandle once more. He said, "I am glad to see my old friends again and to have this opportunity of discussing politics with them." Then he launched into an earnest repudiation of the Republican administration. He attacked that party mainly on its stand on the tariff and on its administration during the last four years.

He pointed out some of the evils that result from a high tariff. "In the first place, he stated, a high protective tariff ruins the price of things the farmers sell, for it prevents the foreign nations from buying our stuff. These countries have practically exhausted their supplies of gold. If they cannot send their products to America, they can not buy from us. Thus the American people who pay a tariff ranging from 70 to 150 per cent upon most of their necessities.

Farming machinery was placed on the free list but the component parts were subjected to a high protective tariff. Thus the farmer suffers from the tariff two ways. He has to pay higher prices because of it, and in return the tariff lowers the price he receives for his products.

"Andrew Mellon has made millions recently and much of it can be traced to the high protective tariff. Andrew Mellon is president of the United States. Coolidge is just his dough-boy."

Jones gave evidence upon evidence of the Republican inefficiency and he then said, "I do not claim that the Democratic party is perfect, but along side of the Republican party it looks perfect. Since 1912 the Democrats have established farm loan, rural credits and other agricultural legislation, while the Republican party has procured for forty years to enact such legislation, but has not voted for it as a party."

Jones concluded his talk by discussing the armament question "I believe," he said, "that not only the young men but everything should be drafted if there is ever another war. If it is understood that no profit can be made of war, there will be one war where there were ten before."

Mr. Jones was elected to congress eight years ago. At that time he was the youngest member of congress. During the last election, he was unopposed for Representative.—Channing News.

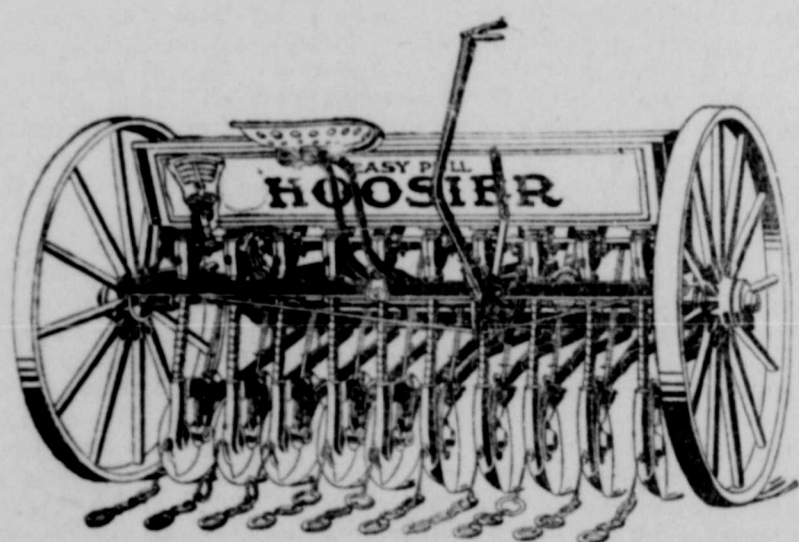

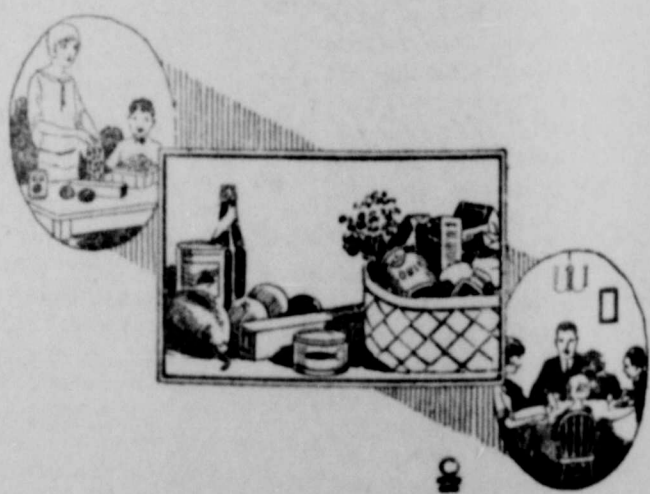

NESS OF SMALL CITY

A common remark nowadays is that
the big towns are swallowing up the
little ones, that automobiles and good
roads are taking all the business to
the big towns, and that soon there
will be nothing left of the small town
but a depot, a grain elevator or two
little stores.

Fred Anderson, founder of the An-
derson department store, in Casad,
Nebraska, has proven that this is not
necessarily true. Casad is a town of
1,300 population, located near two
large towns. Fred Anderson started
in business there with a capital of
\$3,000, \$2,000 of it borrowed. That
was in 1916. He started in a little
frame building. Last year he did a
business of \$300,000 and his store

now contains 3,700 square feet of
space.

The first ten years he did little or
no advertising and just dragged along.
Then he started advertising in the lo-
cal paper. He has been at it every
year and his business has grown stead-
ily to its present proportions. He gives
all the credit to advertising. He
says he could afford to spend twice
that much.

He does lots of direct-by-mail ad-
vertising and he improves any and
every opportunity for keeping his
store before the public. But space in
the local paper is his chief reliance.
He never uses less than a page, and
sometimes several pages in the same
issue. He says he has bought the lo-
cal paper many times and never
got title to it, but he doesn't want title
because it serves him so well as it
is.

The Rosenbaum store in Harvard,
Nebraska, another 1,300 town, is an
example of what it wants and doing
enough advertising to make the facts
known. Harvard is within easy dis-
tance of four or five large towns, one
of 60,000, one or two of 12,000 or more
and others much larger than it is,
but this store draws much trade for
fifty miles or more.

These stores have proved it is just
as easy to follow the good roads in
a Ford to a small town as a large
one, provided the small town goes
after the business. Mr. Anderson says
that what they have done anyone can
do by following the same methods.
He says a merchant is justified in
spending six per cent of his income
for advertising while he is starting.
But no small town will ever get any
place by bemoaning the fact that all
the business is going to the big
towns and then doing nothing to pre-
vent it. And no country editor will
help the situation any by printing ed-
itorial and news items encouraging
such a belief.—Liberal News.

GAS WELL IS NEARLY A
MILE AND A HALF DEEP.

The deepest prospect for gas in the
world reached a depth of 7,000 feet
last week in the Ligonire field in
Pennsylvania, says the Texas Public
Service Information Bureau. Geolo-
gists of the company are confident
that gas will be reached after a bit
more drilling.

This well was begun just four years
ago. More than 114 tons of casing
have been placed in the hole. So far
not a cubic foot of natural gas has
been produced from it.

Few of those who make use of nat-
ural gas in stove and heater give
thought to the wearing and costly
enterprise of seeking to make up the
growing efficiency in that commodity,
or the romance of extracting from
below the ground what is left of the
precious fuel.

It is a precarious game of chance
in which the natural gas companies
are engaged. The geologists point to
the most likely places, and there the
rigs are set up and drilling operations
are commenced. As the wells which
furnished the supply slow up in pro-
duction or sob out the last of their
life, other wells are drilled.

How often the utilities have played
and lost has been of little interest in

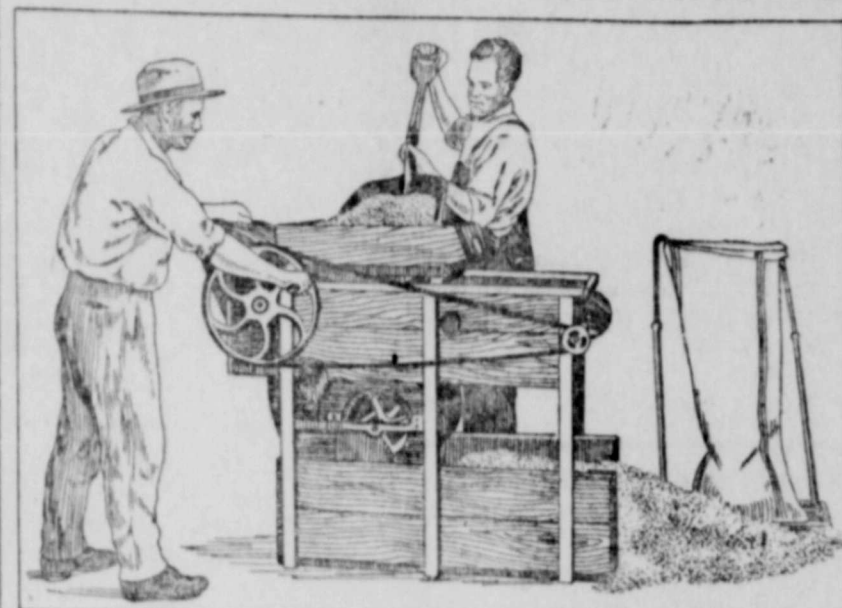
IT PAYS TO USE GOOD SEED WHEAT

By H. M. Bainer, Director,
The Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association.

Even though Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas have just harvested a big wheat crop, good authority has conservatively estimated that, through the use of better seed alone, the total yield could easily have been increased 25,000,000 bushels. This is equivalent to an additional profit of \$25,000,000, as good seed costs very little more than ordinary seed. In fact, eliminating smut, rye and mixtures, the increase in value would easily have been twice this amount.

Mr. A. H. Leidigh, agronomist of the Texas Experiment Station, says: "Through the use of superior varieties of seed wheat in Northwest Texas, during recent years, large increases in yields have been secured. Had this kind of seed been uniformly sown last fall, in the place of a lot of country-run mixtures, the profits to Panhandle farmers this year would have been increased thousands upon thousands of dollars."

"Central-North Texas is known by the mixed wheat it grows; pure seed is almost unknown. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has repeatedly tested the mixtures grown, as well as graded versus ungraded seed, and has found that the yield can be greatly improved through pure seed. The Station is ready to recommend and help locate seed of certain pure wheats for sowing in this part of the state."

ACTUAL RESULTS FROM GOOD SEED.

In Kansas (From 6½ to 12 bushels gain.) County Agent Roy E. Gwin, of Columbus, writes: "Last fall, Mr. W. H. Shaffer sowed part of his field with a pure variety of wheat which gave him an average yield of 31 bushels per acre, while the balance of the field sown with ordinary seed yielded 21 bushels per acre." Mr. G. L. Bainer, a well known farmer of Scott County, reports a gain of 6½ bushels per acre in favor of good seed. Still another farmer from Pratt County reports 23 bushels an acre from good seed, while his neighbor sowed "just wheat" and harvested 11 bushels an acre.

down one grade or more on account of rye. On this basis, the wheat delivered in Kansas City from July 1, 1923 to April 30, 1924, would have included over 1,200,000 bushels mixed with enough rye to lower the quality from one to two grades, representing a loss of approximately \$50,000 on this one market in less than one season.

Mixed Seed.

There may be one predominating variety in mixed seed suitable for local conditions, but it is out of the question to assume that a mixture of two or more varieties is uniformly desirable. Crops from this kind of seed do not ripen evenly, and when sold, grade as "mixed," with considerable reduction in price.

In Nebraska (A gain of 9 bushels.) County Agent C. R. Young, of Dakota City, says: "I furnished seven farmers with good, pure seed wheat, which outyielded the wheat from the common seed of the county by 9 bushels per acre."

In Oklahoma (A gain of 3 bushels.) A report from County Agent Tom M. Marks, of Ellis County, says: "During the past three years, I have kept an accurate record of the yields of twenty fields of wheat sown with good seed of adapted varieties in comparison with the yields from fields sown with the common varieties. All fields were handled alike, so far as preparation, date of sowing and quality of soil were concerned. The three-year average showed an increase of almost three bushels per acre in favor of the adapted varieties."

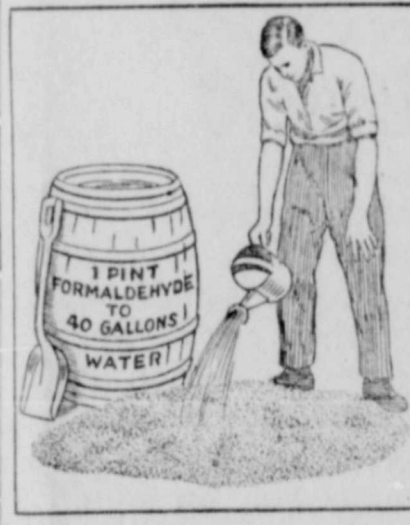
In Texas (A gain of 7 bushels.) Our last year's records show that eight Panhandle farmers sowed a total of 968 acres of wheat; they made an average yield of 17 bushels per acre on 460 acres, sown with good seed, and 10 bushels per acre on 508 acres, sown with country-run seed.

Sow Clean Seed at Least.

Even though country-run seed may lack purity, it can be greatly improved by cleaning and grading. Good authority states that 20 per cent of the wheat sown in the Southwest consists of cracked, immature or injured kernels that will not grow. The feeding value of these kernels, which are useless as seed, will pay the expense of running the seed through a fanning mill. It is generally known that the best wheat farmers, who re-thresh their seed and sow only the clean their seed and sow only the purest, obtain yields of at least 3 to 5 bushels more than the country average.

Avoid Rye.

The presence of rye in wheat cuts down the grade as well as the price. It darkens the flour and produces a heavy bread. Five per cent of rye in a choice milling wheat will reduce the price from 3 to 5 cents a bushel. Over 2½ per cent of the Hard Winter wheat coming into Kansas City during 1919, 1920 and 1921 graded

Look Out for Smut.

The loss in the Southwest this year from smut is greater than for the past several years—amounting to millions of dollars. Fully 90 per cent of this loss could have been prevented through seed treatment just before sowing. The cost of the material for treating seed is from 1 to 5 cents a bushel.

Treatments for Smut.

Use of Formaldehyde. The old standard and dependable remedy for smut consists of dipping, floating or sprinkling the seed in a solution containing 1 pint of formaldehyde to 40 gallons of water.

Use of Copper Carbonate. This new, dry method of seed treatment is now being quite generally recommended by agricultural colleges. It consists of thoroughly mixing the seed with copper carbonate dust, at the rate of 2 ounces to a bushel. "Coppercarb," a well known commercial mixture may be used at the rate of 4 ounces to a bushel of wheat. This treatment cannot be made by shoveling; it must be done in some kind of a mixer, either home-made or commercial. An old churn, as shown in the illustration, or a concrete mixer will do.

For more information on either of the above methods, see your county agent or write the state agricultural college.

How and Where to Obtain Seed Wheat.

Those desiring to locate pure or certified seed should see their county agent or write the state agricultural college. The Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association is locating a lot of good seed, as well as the districts needing seed. Where seed is needed, arrangements are being made so that the local mill, elevator or county agent will have on hand a supply of suitable seed, which can be bought or exchanged, usually on a cost basis. If you have more seed than you need or if you desire good seed and are unable to obtain it through your county agent, write The Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association, 946 New York Life Building, Kansas City, Missouri.
