That Reminds Me

By FRANK A. JONES JUNE 15, FATHER'S DAY For a number of years Father's Day was observed on different dates in different sections of the country. Credit for the selection of the third Sunday in June as the date on which fathers should be honored is generally given to Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Washington. Mrs. Dodd first conceived the idea as a tribute to her father, who after the death of her mother had devoted himself to the rearing of a family of children. She took the matter up with the Spokane Ministerial Alliance and suggested the third Sunday in June. The first celebration of this date was held in June 1910. The movement spread slowly and it was several years before the setting aside of a day on which to honor a father became a general practice in this country. Two efforts to have a resolution passed in the House of Representatives designating a day to be known as Father's Day have failed to secure enough votes to pass. Father's Day has never attracted the attention given Mother's Day.

TOUCHING THE WRONG KEY I use the typewriter a great deal and while I am not an expert typist I manage to turn out a considerable amount of copy by the two and three finger system. I often find myself admiring the skill of those whose fingers fly over the keys without their so much as a glance at them. I admire their efficiency and skill and dexterity and ability to turn out a beautiful and perfectly typed page. Such work is in singular contrast to my own. In reading over a page of manuscript, I find misspelled words caused by touching the wrong key. These have to be erased and an erasure, however carefully done, leaves a blot on the page. For such errors the operator and not the typewriter is to blame. The typewriter responds correctly if the right key is touched. I thought the other day as I looked at a typed page with more than the usual quota of errors, how like life is a page of typed matter. Every error is recorded, not because life is at fault, but because we, the operators, touch the wrong key, obey the wrong impulse, and ourselves put into the record our errors.

OFFICER CANDIDATE SCHOOL IS OPEN TO CIVILIANS NOW The War Department has opened Officer Candidate Schools to civilians, it was announced by Sgt. James Hendrick of the Eastland Recruiting Station. Men in civil life who wish to become a commissioned officer may do so by direct application for OCS training to begin in 1947. The applicant must be between the ages of 20 1-2 and 28, pass an Army General Classification Test with a grade of 110 or better, be a high school graduate, and pass the required physical examination. Successful applicants will be paid a staff sergeant's pay and allowances for 24 weeks duration of the course. Upon successful completion of the course, the man will be commissioned a 2nd lieutenant in the Army of the United States. A non-graduate of the OCS who entered from civil life will be discharged from the Army. Additional details and application forms may be obtained from the Army Recruiting Station, located in the Eastland County Courthouse.

ORCHARD TOUR OF COUNTY IS PLANNED

An all day Eastland County orchard tour has been planned for Tuesday, June 17 according to reports from the county agent's office at Eastland. The group will leave from Cisco at 9 o'clock that morning and visit 13 fruit and one pecan orchard during the day, it was said. The assembly point at Cisco is at J. E. Spencer's peach stand 5 blocks West of the traffic light. Purpose of the tour is to study varieties, cultural methods, fertilization, insects and diseases, cover crops, winter kill and ripening dates. Orchards on the itinerary are those of H. A. Bible, (apple orchard) George Hicks, J. D. Inabnet, Doss Alexander, A. Witt, Ray Agnew, Claud Cox, Henry Scott, H. A. Bible (peach orchard) Dr. W. L. Allen (Pecans) J. E. Spencer, A. P. Broiles, Dallas Jobe and J. B. Elcer. Communities included on the tour are Scranton, Nimrod, Pioneer, Rising Star, Carbon, Long Branch, Gorman and Pleasant Hill. The group will eat lunch at Rising Star. The extremely cold weather in January materially reduced the peach crop although the apricot crop that will be ripening in the next few weeks is the largest in years according to J. M. Cooper, County Farm Agent. A bumper crop of pecans was set this spring. The case bearer is already at work on the pecan crop, Cooper said. All orchard men from Eastland and nearby counties are invited to participate on the tour. Paul Gregg, A&M Extension Entomologist will be with the group. Tom Denman, Horticulturist, from the Stephenville Agricultural Experiment Station and J. W. Foster, Jr., Horticulturist of the Texas Fruit Growers Supply Company at Weatherford, have also been invited.

Miss Spaulding Tells Of Girls State At Austin

Jan' Spaulding, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Spaulding, who was selected by the Eastland American Legion Auxiliary as the Bluebonnet girl, for the Bluebonnet Girl's State at Austin last week, gives the following account: Bluebonnet Girls State is sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary and its purpose is to teach the girls the principles of Democracy and the different steps in the establishment of City, County and State governments. The Girl's State was held at the School for the Blind in Austin. It existed as a mythical 49th State which was composed of four cities which elected their officials and functioned as a city, government, the counties, also elected officials. The state was divided into two political parties, the blue and the whites, who held conventions, nominated officials, adopted platforms, and campaigned for their candidates. The final state elections were held Wednesday and the Governor, Ann Buchanan, of Temple, was given the oath of office by Associate Justice Simpson of the Supreme Court of Texas. After the inauguration the girls made an extensive tour through the State Capital. Wednesday evening a reception was held in the Governor's Mansion honoring the Bluebonnet girls. All the girls met Governor Jester and his family. This was really the highlight of their weeks activities. There were many outstanding speakers who explained the Texas State Constitution and the duties of the officers. Among those were Bert Giesecke, State Commander of the American Legion; Mr. O. Quinn, City Attorney of Austin; Superintendent W. E. Allen of Texas School for the Blind; Mrs. W. A. Cole, State President of the American Legion Auxiliary; Major Walter Gates, Price Daniel, Attorney General; and Associate Justice Simpson. The Citizens of Girl's State received pins and diplomas in graduating exercises held Friday night in the Blind School auditorium. L. A. Woods, State School Superintendent of Public Instruction made the principle address. Miss Billie Murray, head of Girl's State, also made a short talk on "Our Duties as Citizens." The Auxiliary is hoping that through Girl's State and Boys State the future voters of Texas may be better prepared for their responsibilities as citizens of a Democracy.

Twenty-one prominent West Texans are listed on the Texas Citizens Committee on Displaced Persons announced in Dallas yesterday by Executive Secretary Robert S. Strauss. Members from West Texas are R. Mr. Strauss said the committee, of almost 100 outstanding Texans, has been formed to work for expressions from Texas to their congressmen urging their support of temporary, emergency legislation which would permit the U. S. to receive a rightful share of Europe's displaced persons. "We are supporting H. R. 2910, a bill which would provide for entry into this country of 400,000 of these homeless people during the next four years. They would be subject to existing laws such as health, political affiliations and all other present restrictions," Mr. Strauss said. Mr. Strauss pointed out that of the 850,000 now homeless in Europe 80 percent are Christian faiths and 20 percent are Jews. More than 150,000 are children under 18, with at least half having been born in concentration camps.

Vets Enrollment To Reach A New High This Fall

Summer will bring a slight reduction in the number of veterans studying in North Texas colleges and universities under the G. I. Bill. Enrollments in all types of training, however, will reach a new high in September, the Veterans Administration reported today. Robert C. Rice, Regional Manager, said the education and training division of his office had prepared a forecast estimating a training load of 84,455 veterans in the fall. June 6 enrollment in the 51 counties of the Dallas Region stood at approximately 65,000. The in-training load, Mr. Rice said, is expected to increase still further to a total of 89,400 by the Spring of 1948. Since the Dallas Regional Office became operational August 1, 1946, there has been a continued increase in former servicemen seeking training and educational benefits under the G. I. Bill and as disabled veterans. The field includes World War II men and women attending institutions of higher learning, vocational and trade schools, business colleges, barber colleges, secretarial schools and allied institutions. It also involves veterans learning trades by on-the-job training. There were 22,377 veterans in training in August of 1946. The number rose to 39,809 in November, 1946 and to 48,908 during February 1947.

House Committee Scores Federal Housing Setup

WASHINGTON — The House appropriations committee today released a report accusing the Federal Public Housing Authority of "falling miserably" in its job of managing housing units built with the taxpayers money. The report charged that FPHA had introduced a "socialistic" responsibility to World War II veterans. The report was made public as the House prepared to debate on a bill appropriating funds for FPHA and several other government corporations for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

PROGRAM FOR LAKE OUTLINED BY OFFICIALS

MINERAL WELLS, June 10.—A pledge to combat a rough fish menace and to continue a sizeable restocking program at Possum Kingdom Lake was made here by officials of the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission. Marion Tool and Joe Marks of Austin, both commission officials, were principal speakers at a meeting of the Possum Kingdom Game & Fish Association held at the Baker Hotel. They stressed that steps were taken to employ commercial fishermen to rid the big lake of gar, drum, carp and turtles. "This Spring we placed approximately 5,000,000 bass and crappie in Possum Kingdom and we will continue to plant this number of young fish each year," Tool said. "The commission is very proud of Possum Kingdom Lake and are most anxious for it to retain its name as one of the best fishing spots in the Southwest." Announcement was made at the meeting that the 15 and 16th prize fish of the Possum Kingdom Fish Rodeo had been secured. They were caught by J. E. McMeans and H. E. McGee, both of Dallas. McMeans caught a pound and a half bass bearing the tag No. 78 worth \$160 in prizes. He was fishing from Lakeview Camp. McGee landed a three pound bass bearing tag No. 63 in the mouth of Cedar Creek. SAYS BRITAIN ANXIOUS OVER BALKAN CASES

LONDON—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin told Commons today that developments in Bulgaria had aroused "serious anxiety" in the British government "lest it be the intention of the Bulgarian government to extinguish the last vestiges of liberty in Bulgaria." Bevin said messages concerning Hungary were coming in from Moscow when he left the foreign office, but had had no time to study them. —Sir Maurice Peterson, British ambassador in Moscow, has been asked by Bevin to see Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov about the situation in the Balkans, Bevin told Commons. Laborite Albert Blackburn asked Bevin to "press hard and quickly for the facts which should have been furnished to him long ago, so that the people of Britain and Europe may make up their mind whether we are witnessing a revival of totalitarian terror."

Johnson of Duncan, Oklahoma, and went to Duncan with his family in 1907. He was a World War I veteran and a member of the Duncan American Legion Post. His wife, who with two daughters, his mother and a brother, survive, was the former Ruby Cannon of Duncan, Oklahoma.

INTENTION REVEALED IN SPEECH BEFORE CANADIANS

By United Press OTTAWA—President Truman, in an historic appearance before the Canadian Parliament made a bid for Canadian support of the "Truman doctrine" today with a pledge of continued American efforts to protect weaker nations from intimidation. The President's speech was certain to provoke heated discussion in the Canadian House of Commons which recently has been debating the degree to which Canada should bind itself to the foreign policy of the United States. From the American viewpoint, the President's speech appeared to be another in a series of efforts to fuse North America into a fortress of good neighborliness and cooperation.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—In well-fed America it is hard to get excited about food shortages in other parts of the world. Yet anyone with a nickel's worth of sense must realize that there can be no peace or stability until more people have enough to eat. Hunger is the world's public enemy number one.

The report which Sec.-Gen. D. A. FitzGerald has just made to the International Emergency Food Council meeting here in Washington points up some of the horrible truths of this situation.

World War II was seven times as destructive as World War I—\$132 billion as against a mere \$18 billion damage. Obviously, recovery cannot be as quick and easy as in 1920-21.

The world acreage under plow is no greater than it was 10 years ago, but the population has increased by from 5 to 10 per cent. In southeast Asia alone it is estimated there are 100 million more people to be fed than there were in 1939.

Living standards are rising all over the world. People want more to eat. People who used to be content with corn or rice now want more wheat and meat.

In the face of these conditions which tend to aggravate wartime food shortages, many old world countries are finding it necessary to continue food rationing. In some countries the ration may have to be cut, even though new crops will soon be harvested.

THE first rule of politics is that the ration must be maintained or the governments imposing them will fall.

Today there are only three areas in the world that have more basic foods—grains and meat—than they will consume. They are Argentina, the U. S. and Canada, Australia and New Zealand. The fights among the importing countries for larger shares of the exporting countries' surpluses have been long and bitter, behind the closed doors of IEFEC.

Despite record wheat crops and exports from the U. S. and Argentina, lower production of cereals in the old world will make this year's total supply less than last year's.

This cereal shortage is made to appear greater by a number of complicating factors. Wheat must be used as a substitute for rice, meats, fats and oils. Grains normally feed to livestock had to be allocated for human consumption. That has made it impossible to build up livestock and poultry numbers to increase meat, dairy products, and egg supplies to prewar levels.

Meat production in Europe is still only 60 per cent prewar. That pulls world production down to 8 or 10 per cent below prewar. Meat prices are still so high that importing countries cannot afford to buy. That creates a still greater demand for cereals.

Fats and oils supply is estimated 20 per cent less than prewar in total tonnage, but 25 per cent less on a per capita basis because of population increases.

PRODUCTION of pulses—peas and beans—other than soybeans—is estimated slightly above prewar. But there will be a third less pulses than the importing countries are demanding to make up for shortages in meats, cereals, fats and oils.

This is the sad picture that confronts food experts as they meet to divide up world supplies. What it indicates is that world food production is not recovering nor correcting itself as rapidly as it should.

The hard fact seems to be that the governments themselves have not provided adequate machinery for dealing with these food shortage situations. Deficit countries have been lax in their controls. They have not controlled their imports and have not collected all indigenous food supplies. They have not rationed wisely and have not stopped black markets. Most of all they have not concentrated on getting their food production back to prewar levels. When shortages become acute they take the easy road of appealing to the U. S. for food or for loans to buy food. This is now an old story, to which the U. S. Congress is showing less inclination to listen.

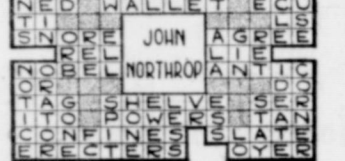
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

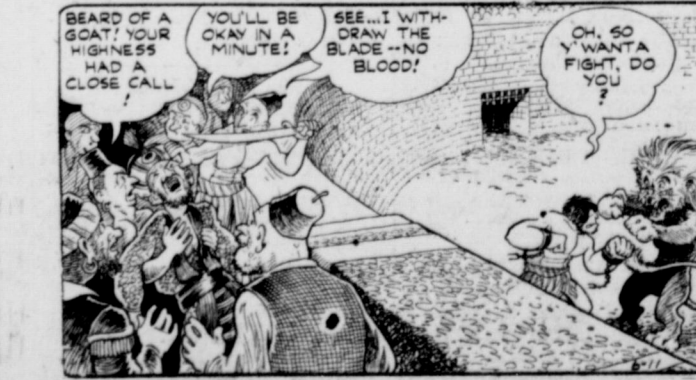

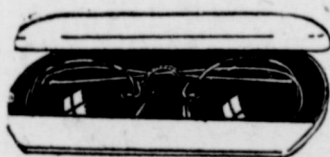

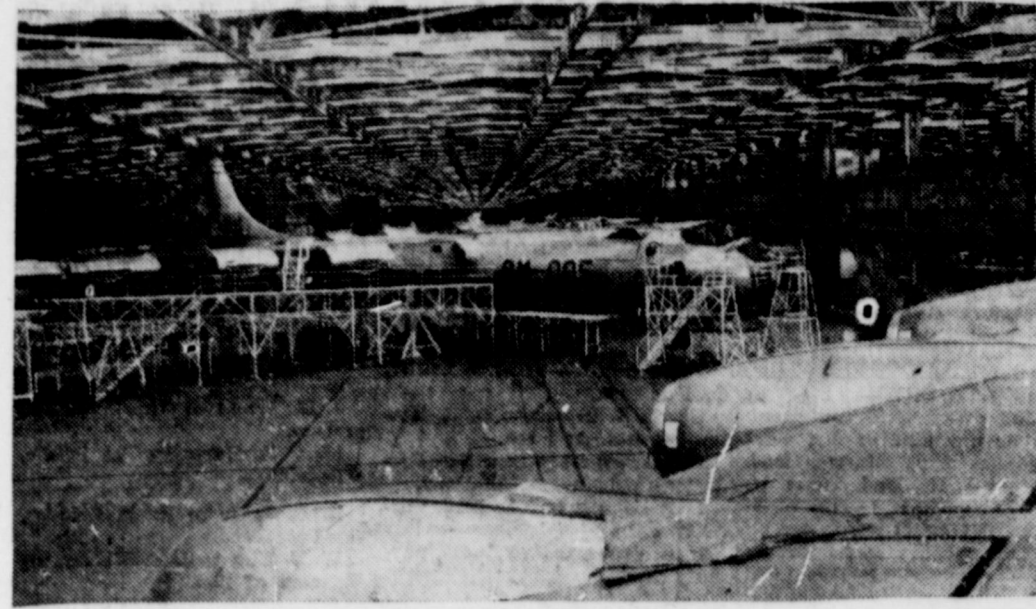

T&P TO GIVE EMPLOYEES SERVICE PINS

DALLAS, Tex., June 11—For the first time in the 75-year history of the Texas & Pacific Railway, a general distribution of employee service emblems is being made.

J. B. Shores, director of public and employee relations, said today that by the end of this week 10,555 T&P employees with three or more years continuous service will have received the awards. They are designed as miniatures of the well-known T&P red triangle to wear on suit coat or dress. Women employees receive pin-style service emblems. Men get buttons.

Oldest Witherspoon, there are 17 other T&P folks—all men—who have 50 or more years of service and who are getting 10-carat, solid gold buttons with a three-point diamond set above the triangle.

Just one of the 18 railroaders entitled to 50-year buttons is an executive of the company. He is C. D. Johnson, former T&P general agent in El Paso, and now assistant to President W. G. Vollmer with headquarters in New Orleans.

Three of the 50-year men are conductors. The T&P woman employee with the longest unbroken service record is Annie Louise Hanes Giesler, who has been on the job 38 years. She is a stenographer in Dallas.

In addition to the diamond-studded triangle for employees with

50 or more years service, there are four other categories, signified by different-color pins and buttons, all, however, with red enamel backgrounds.

There are 187 employees having 40 through 49 years service who are given gold-filled pins and buttons with an orange circle.

In the 25-through - 39 bracket, there are 1,409 persons receiving gold-filled emblems with a black circle.

The 3,142 who have worked continuously for the T&P from 19 through 24 years are wearing sterling silver emblems with a black circle. And there are 5,799 who have been in service from three through nine years and get a silver triangle with a white circle.

Hi-way Commission States New Policy On County Roads

AUSTIN, June 11 — The State Highway Commission today released details of a new state-wide policy on Farm to Market Roads, which will permit an expansion of the present state operated Farm to Market Road Program.

It was explained in the Highway Commission's new policy that the Federal Funds made available by the Postwar Highway Act of 1944 for the construction of Secondary or Farm to Market Roads, covering a three year period, have all been earmarked for specific roads throughout the state. Approximately one-half of this work has been paced under contract and, consequently, no additional funds from this source are now available.

The Commission's statement also noted that no additional funds on the National or State level have been made available for the expansion of the program of construction of Secondary or Farm to Market Roads.

On behalf of the Highway Commission, State Highway Engineer Dewitt C. Greer explained, "This new policy of the Highway Com-

mission has been formed to place into operation the new laws passed by the Fifth Legislature relative to this type of road."

Mr. Greer pointed out that "a law was passed at this session giving permission for the counties, road districts, etc., and the State Highway Department to enter into a cooperative plan of construction of Farm to Market Roads by a pooling of finances."

He said, "Two additional laws were passed that will tend to yield additional revenues for Farm to Market Roads on the county level. One of these covered the distribution of the surplus of the one cent of the gasoline tax that goes to the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness. This law will tend to give more money from this source to the smaller counties of Texas. The other law is the Constitutional Amendment covering the abolition of the state ad valorem tax and permitting such

tax to be assumed by the counties for the construction of Farm to Market Roads and other things."

Mr. Greer explained that "under the new policy of the Highway Commission, if a county or road district desires additional Farm to Market Roads and is willing to furnish the right of way and 75 per cent of the actual construction cost, the State Highway Department will provide the engineering and 25 per cent of the construction cost from its funds, and will provide for the future maintenance of the road, which item alone generally equals the construction cost over a period of fifteen years."

Mr. Greer further pointed out that in the Commission policy it was necessary, due to the limited finances of the Department, that a ceiling of not more than \$100,000, in construction costs in any one county in any one year be used to give state-wide distribution under this plan.

Shaw Gives Nod To Henry Wallace

BRUSSELS—George Bernard Shaw endorsed Henry A. Wallace today for president of the United States in 1948.

The 90-year-old British sage and playwright praised Wallace's speaking tour as an aid to the cause of peace.

In a postal interview between Belgium and England, Shaw warned that "twaddle about formulas" would not help avoid a third world war. Political capacity of leaders will determine events, he said.
