

Legion Members Will Be Given Copy of World War "Vet" Laws

Every veteran who has joined, or become a member of the American Legion for 1932, and whose card and dues are of record with the national organization by July 10th, will receive without charge a thirty-two-page magazine-size booklet written in plain language, describing all federal and state laws pertaining to World War veterans.

This announcement was made by Horace Lackey, post commander of the Legion here, following advice received from national headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Not only will there be a full description of all such laws, in words that any person will be able to understand, but all confusing technicalities, and most of the legal references, such as "202-10", will be eliminated.

One of the most important features of the booklet will be suggestions as to how claims may be started and followed through. Often, according to Legion officials, an ex-service man knows in his own heart that he has a just claim for compensation, and that the government is willing and eager to do the right thing, but too often lack of information as to the proper method of procedure prevents the case receiving the attention it deserves. He gets a copy of the law and doesn't understand it. Perhaps he has written a few letters, when first he should have obtained an affidavit, made a certified copy of his discharge papers, or included a statement from his physician.

So far as national headquarters of the American Legion has been able to discover, there is no such consolidated material in existence as will be contained in this booklet, and certainly there is none available without charge.

The booklet will be available only to those who are members of the Legion. It can not be purchased, and besides being of great value to the individual veteran, it likewise will be a sure guide to those veterans who are requested from time to time to aid others with their claims.

In nearly every hamlet in the United States, the merchants and other outstanding public figures are often requested for advice by ex-service men, and the possession of this booklet will undoubtedly be the center of such gatherings in many places following its issuance.

Distribution of the booklet will be made with the August issue of The American Legion Monthly as a supplement of that publication, which goes each month to every member of the organization whose membership card and dues have been received. This means that the Monthly cards from all new members wishing to get this supplement must be cleared through posts and actually in the The American Legion Monthly offices on July 10th.

This point should be made clear to prospective members by all posts, as there is no extension beyond the July 10th date, because the booklets will not be furnished outside the Monthly mailing list. Each post, therefore, should conclude this activity by June 30th.

The booklet will be periodically revised and pages issued for inserts. It should in no way be confused with the government codification of federal laws of interest to veterans of all wars, and which the Legion sponsored in Congress. The codification is being compiled by the Veterans' Bureau. That will be a voluminous technical document, and no doubt will be sold to individuals about six months from now at a comparatively considerable price.

The Legion booklet has been produced by the highest class of writers in the country, staff men and editors of The American Legion Monthly, who have followed each law as it was proposed, introduced in Congress, passed, and then put into operation.

These men know the needs of veterans, not only as those needs are met in provisions of the law, but they also know the trials and problems of the veterans who try to get benefits from the law.

The Legion booklet has been written especially to meet the requirements of every World War veteran, and to answer the thousands of requests for information that come into the editorial offices and the national headquarters, as well as into the national rehabilitation offices in Washington, which is the national head of the Legion's service work, and which has carefully passed judgment on everything written in the booklet.

CREDIT CORPORATION WILL AID STOCKMEN

A livestock credit corporation, to serve stockmen of Oklahoma, with a paid-in capital of \$250,000 was perfected on May 3 and is now in operation.

The name of the corporation is the National Livestock Credit corporation. Its office for the time being will be located in the Livestock Exchange building on the stockyards at Oklahoma City.

The incorporating directors are August Lohmann, Pawhuska; Don Tyler, Bartlesville; S. C. Fullerton, Miami; E. G. Jeffrey, Oklahoma City, and Gordon Stidham, Taloga. These directors will serve for 90 days, to be followed by permanent directors.

The manager of the association will be A. W. Lucas. This credit association will continue the same kind of loan work which the Oklahoma Livestock Marketing association started last October and will take up the loan work right where the marketing leaves off.

Loans made by the corporation will be rediscouted with the Intermediate Credit bank at Wichita. With a paid-in capital stock of \$250,000, the corporation will be able to make loans up to \$2,000,000 in total.

The capital stock of the corporation is divided into \$50,000 of preferred stock, all of which was purchased by stockmen of the state and certain other individuals and organizations interested in financing the livestock industry in Oklahoma; also \$200,000 of common stock, all of which was purchased by the National Feeder Finance corporation with the proceeds of a loan obtained by it from the Federal Farm board.—The Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman.

During the presidency of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, I have been deeply and sincerely appreciative of the manner in which West Texas has been led. The confidence has been shown in me with instant inspiration and challenge of the best I have in the position to which I have been elevated.

I could have attended the Sweetwater convention without coming away deeply impressed with the great spirit of determination in times of stress and difficulties we now have.

West Texas Chamber of Commerce met the challenge of the closing year of the convention in an admirable and worthy fashion. At no time in its history has the organization had a better account of itself than at the Sweetwater meeting.

The magnificent leadership of President Houston Harte many miles and far reaching programs inaugurated and carried to successful consummation.

Plans were begun and advanced which will be my purpose to carry out in my administration.

Sweetwater convention adopted constructive and vital resolutions and I shall regard these as the program and platform of my administration. One of our first plans will be to formulate plans for positive results upon the future. These plans will be announced in the form of a definite program with an organization plan for the performing of it.

Three definite objectives in my administration which are of paramount importance.

Taxes and Taxes Reduction
 I want to carry forward the program already under way for reduction of public expenditures and taxation. The leadership of West Texas Chamber of Commerce upon this program is generally recognized and established. It shall be my purpose to advance this program and carry it out to the very end.

There is no problem of more concern than that of the increasing cost of all government. I want every county in West Texas to have a Tax Payers Committee.

I am firmly convinced that we have lower taxes before we can have a full measure of prosperity. We must have lower taxes.

tail public expenditures. To curtail public expenditures, we must demand less services of our government, and perhaps cut off some which we have come to regard as highly essential. This will only be done when demanded by the taxpayers themselves. I believe we have in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and our splendid local chambers with their tax committees the kind of organization that can most easily and effectively accomplish the ends desired. Many of the resolutions adopted at Sweetwater have to do with the problem, and I sincerely hope that all West Texans will familiarize themselves with them so that we may have their intelligent cooperation.

We are pledged to the promotion of the following activities and policies: to memorialize public officials to reduce expenditures, to organize budget making proceedings in all forms of local government, to require proper auditing of county claims, to compel tax collections, to provide less costly county administration, to provide less costly state administration, to provide less costly judiciary administration and to lessen public school affiliation requirements.

Beautification Plan
 The second objective to which I expect to dedicate my administration is the furtherance of the West Texas beautification plan started under President Harte's leadership. One of the common complaints from visitors to West Texas is its barrenness. This condition can be eliminated to a great extent through cooperative effort such as the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is fostering through the eighty odd local beautification committees in as many towns. We have the plan in operation. We expect during this year to stage a big inter-city beautification contest whereby communities will vie with one another in planting trees, shrubbery, and flowers. Soon we shall announce the contest plan which will be conducted until the Big Springs Convention in 1933.

Buy At Home Shows
 The third objective I have in mind is that of having all of our one hundred and seventeen affiliated towns conduct and stage "Buy-At-Home Shows", with the particular purpose of getting the women of each city interested in the promotion of this activity in each town. These shows may be held at one time all over West Texas. Towns will be surprised themselves to find just how many products are manufactured and produced right in their own confines. They will be further surprised to find the great variety of products carried on the shelves of the local merchants. I believe this idea can be made a great factor in promoting Texas industry. If West Texas is to expand industrially it must come from small beginnings we already have. Most of our large industries were once small. By encouraging these shows, we shall be promoting lesser ones for the years ahead.

While I expect to major on the above three projects, I shall also be my purpose through the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to carry the other projects outlined at the Sweetwater convention, and to continue the organization's effort of ever fostering and strengthening that spirit of loyalty, progressiveness, and determination so thoroughly characterized by our West Texas citizenship.

The accomplishment of the objectives I have in mind for this organization is only possible with the cooperation of our one hundred and seventeen affiliated towns through their accredited directors. With all these pulling together under the banner of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, we can do what we make up our minds to do.

If I were to select a slogan for my

administration, it would be "Press On", because only by pressing on toward the objectives we have set up can we expect to be successful in our aims and ambitions for West Texas.

IF YOU WANT LOWER TAXES, SAY SO NOW

Calling upon all who want lower taxes for federal government to say so now in a letter to their senators and representatives in congress the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman has taken a definite stand for economy at Washington and has asked the Oklahoma delegation to either cut down taxes to the level of the ability of the taxpayers to pay or come home.

Addressing the Oklahoma congressional delegation, Clarence Roberts, editor of the Farmer-Stockman, says: "The burden of taxes can no longer be borne. It rests with a crushing weight on the people of this nation. That load must be lifted."

"You were elected to represent Oklahoma in the national congress. There is only one possible way whereby you can do so at this moment and that is by working with your voice and vote to bring about a drastic reduction in taxes."

"The whole thought of congress at this time should be to reduce expenditures to meet reduced receipts. This is exactly what the farmer, the man on salary and the business man have had to do. As his income has vanished he has cut expenses."

"The federal government should do the same. We are led to wonder if you understand the plight of the taxpayer. You continue to draw the same salary. Reduction in the cost of living has in effect raised your salary. In addition, you have appropriated to yourself money with which you can place relatives on the pay roll. For you, this is a time of prosperity."

"While you have been seeking ways to impose another \$1,000,000,000 of taxation on the people of this nation, we in Oklahoma have been organizing taxpayer's associations to bring down taxes. These associations are hard at work. They are looking for every dollar of tax money that possibly can be saved."

"Our schools have been cut. Teachers are now receiving \$50 and \$60 per month. In like manner, township and county taxes are being reduced. Cost of federal government must be cut in the same way. "Your failure to take a stand for tax reduction at this time can be characterized only as a desertion of the people in their hour of need by whose votes you were placed in congress. Alibis, protests and explanations are not wanted. The only thing wanted and demanded at this time is lower taxes. If you cannot help to reduce taxes, better by far adjourn, come home and at least save the taxpayer the further cost of this session."

\$25,000 FROM WOMEN'S DIMES AID DISABLED

The dimes contributed by members of the American Legion Auxiliary here in the last few months went to make a total check of \$25,000 which was presented to the Legion at the recent meeting of the national executive committee, according to Horace Lackey, post commander of the Legion here.

The \$25,000 is to be used by the Legion's national rehabilitation committee in enlarging activities on behalf of the disabled, in obtaining settlements of claims and generally in giving added service, the official said.

The presentation was made by Mrs. Louise Williams, of New York, national president of the Auxiliary.

WHEAT PROSPECTS FADE

Following is a bulletin issued by the Santa Fe Railway Company regarding wheat prospects in the state served by that great railroad system:

Wheat prospects have faded in the last three weeks. Government authorities, not optimistic on the subject at any time this spring, are reducing their estimate of yield whenever they have an opportunity to do so. Their latest estimate is 440,800,000 bushels for the country as a whole, compared with the 5-year average of 548,600,000 bushels. Many private estimates have been higher; none has been lower. But the consensus of opinion is that the crop has slipped.

Of the eleven winter wheat states served by the Santa Fe railway only one—Texas—has a prospective yield substantially above the 5-year average. Kansas, the premier wheat state, has lost more heavily than any of its neighbors. Its estimate now is 87,000,000 bushels. However, with favorable weather from now until harvest the yield might go to the estimate of 87,000,000 bushels, or even higher, as there still are large areas of good wheat in the central part of the state. Indications are that about 8,000,000 acres will come to harvest, compared with 12,800,000 acres planted for the 1931 crop.

Wheat harvest will start the first week in June in Oklahoma where the government expects a yield of from 35,000,000 to 38,000,000 bushels. Oklahoma's five year average is 52,000,000.

Harvesting wheat in Kansas should be in progress along the southern border between the 10th and 15th of June. Many of the large growers, finding their acreages reduced, will, after putting their own grain out of the way, do contract work for the smaller growers. One farmer in the southwest having lost several thousand acres by dry weather will move into central Kansas with a fleet of combine and operate wherever his machines are needed. The cost of harvesting will be considerably lower than usual, thus enabling farmers to harvest low yielding grain.

Texas should have close to 35,000,000 bushels of wheat, as conditions there have been satisfactory until the last two or three weeks. Moisture now is needed. The latest official estimate is 31,000,000 bushels compared with the 5-year average of 23,000,000 bushels.

Official estimates of wheat yields in other Santa Fe states (first figures) compared with the 5-year average (second figures): Nebraska, 25,000,000—52,000,000; Illinois, 23,000,000—33,000,000; Colorado, 5,000,000—15,000,000; Missouri, 19,000,000—21,000,000; Iowa, 4,500,000—7,500,000; California, 10,000,000—11,000,000.

New Mexico, 1,700,000—1,500,000; Arizona, 500,000—500,000.

TAXPAYERS FACE A LONG, HARD FIGHT

Up to date some 60 counties in Oklahoma have organized or have started organization of county taxpayers associations. These associations have also joined to form a state taxpayers association.

Commenting upon these associations the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman says, "The task to which taxpayers have set themselves is no 60-day campaign. We have been raising taxes for 30 to 40 years. We must expect that it will take at least five to six years of hard work to bring down taxes as low as they should be and can be, still to carry on the necessary functions of government."

"We must not expect very much, if any, voluntary lowering of taxes. Spending money has become a habit with the tax spenders. Their answer to a plea for lower taxes is, 'It can't be done.' Their usual

thought has been to get more money to spend and not to find ways to save tax money. Their point of view is opposite to that of the taxpayer."

"Tax spenders have been in control all these years. Legally, they are still very much in control. Our tax laws give them the power to spend and waste money. Their point of view must be revised and since they can't or won't do it voluntarily, the taxpayers must take on the task of creating an intelligent, aggressive, public opinion which only a rare official will ignore."

"The job ahead calls for a strong organization in each county. Every taxpayer should align himself with the organization in his county. This movement is one in which we must submerge our own peculiar likes and dislikes. The common cause demands that we work with a singleness of purpose, keep the one object—lower taxes—in mind and contribute whatever we can to the movement."

Few "Fair" Spots On Business Map



This map represents business conditions in every state in the Union as set forth in the June number of Nation's Business, official publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

WASHINGTON.—Weather conditions and developments in Congress in April combined to disappoint the hopes of the business community that the month would bring a favorable turn of affairs, says Frank Green in his monthly review in Nation's Business, published by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

"April," Mr. Green observes, "was expected to pick up some of the slip-back of March, but didn't. Indeed, its developments were less favorable than March. Chief of them, perhaps, was the failure of Congress to balance the budget. Instead, to business, Congress appeared to seek new openings for extravagance."

"April weather was not favorable to sales of spring goods. Industry showed contraction. Spring-planted crops had an irregular start and while cut-door operations made for increased employment, manufacturing failed to measure up to hopes."

"In the case of winter wheat the practical breaking of the drought in the Southwest spoiled a promising chance for an uprush in wheat prices."

"Earnings statements of the first quarter were none too good. Bank troubles were still present despite the vast improvement over earlier months. Credit conditions eased in some directions but there were complaints in others. The closing of the Steel Corporation dividend on common stock was hurtful, even if expected."

"In industry, petroleum and petroleum products seemed about the best off. The automobile trade, though gaining, was slow and the steel industry which waited on the automobile rose only slightly."

"In wholesale trade and industry, the light industries, particularly the textiles, apparently lost ground with all three showing rather slow conditions. In woolen goods, curtailment was marked; in cotton, price reductions occurred and heavy reductions in output were planned. In silk manufacturing, a reduction in consumption was indicated. After a gain in output over last year for the first quarter, the shoe trade sagged off."

"In the heavy industries, building, pig-iron and steel production and safe-coal outputs were slack enough to affect seasonal employment and pay rolls unfavorably."

"The decline in stock prices initiated in March went further in April, with new low costs. In foreign trade,

indications were that only a few lines of export, as for instance, raw cotton, were profiting by the attractive prices of their prices. Most of this was visible in Oriental takings. "Commodity prices reflected the reactionary trends in the stock market, with the result that the general price level sagged to the lowest point since the spring of 1929."

seem to point to a reduction of the burdensome surplus induced by government intrusion into price regulation. There were hopes that this country might choose this time to quit, as Canada did, its Wheat Pool and Japan its silk syndicate.

"The spring-crop season was irregular in starting and there was talk of a slight reduction in planting. The notable weakness in cotton, corn, tobacco and a number of other agricultural products pointed out other directions in which reduction of acreage might prove advisable, but results were lacking."

"Such hope as April gave was based on statistical knowledge of the tremendous shrinkages shown in prices, outputs and distribution since the Great Deflation began. Some prophets said that the process was fairly well completed and that recuperation and repair were likely to follow as soon as the "shadow boxing" and political maneuvering of a presidential year were behind."

BUDGET THE CANNING

College Station—"Can by budget instead of by guess" is the advice Miss Lola Blair gives to Texans at the opening of what may prove to be the greatest canning season the state has ever known. As food specialist in the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service she has general charge of the 4-H pantry work of more than 25,000 farm women and girls who are acting as demonstrators and cooperators in the drive this year for a healthful farm-grown living in 118 counties where home demonstration agents are employed.

"Canning is not new, but canning by a planned budget to meet the needs of an adequate diet for the whole family for six unproductive months was carried out in few homes until the 4-H pantry demonstration was organized," Miss Blair says. "Budgets help to avoid those spring bilious spells and general run-down conditions so common at the end of winter. A planned food supply makes canned tomatoes last as long as corn, for instance, and avoids the necessity of having to spend money for food that might just as well have been put on pantry shelves in the first place."

"A family of five ought to put up 120 cans of leafy, 100 cans of starch, and 80 cans of other vegetables; 125 cans of tomatoes; 150 cans of fruit; 52 cans of preserves, jams and jellies; 52 cans of pickles and relishes; and 50 cans of meat to supplement the supply of fresh foods through the year. This is based on the proportions of different kinds of food a family needs for nourishment and health."

FARMER SAYS, 'CULL COWS; EAT BUTTER'

"If I were to make up a set of rules to improve the dairy business," an Oklahoma dairyman who has been breeding up a herd for 19 years writes in the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman, "I would include the following:

"Cull out all the poor producers and send them to the block. Use all the dairy products you can at home."

"Above all things, Have enough honor and enough respect for the dairy business to eat butter and not

substitutes."

Culling the poor producers seems hard to do with cheap grass on hand, but now is the proper time. It will be no use to sell the cull cows to the neighbor. He will probably milk them and the gross production will not be decreased. There is probably not an average dairyman in the state who shouldn't cull his herd from 25 to 50 per cent!

Continuing his argument this dairyman says, "Suppose that every herd in the state of Oklahoma was culled to the extent of 25 per cent; it would reduce the production considerably. If this could be extended

to all the dairy states, the result would be of major importance to the industry. The farmers who would have less labor in handling their dairy herds, would make a saving in feed, would get a better price for dairy products and the percentage of profit would be much larger."

"Last fall I did some culling and got as low as \$9 for big cows. I add the saving of a winter's bill and deduct the small amount milk they would have been able to produce and the total would be about 4 to 5 cents a pound, the same price when times were normal even if the cows didn't get fat. The culls eat as much pasture the summer and as much hay in the winter as the good producers."

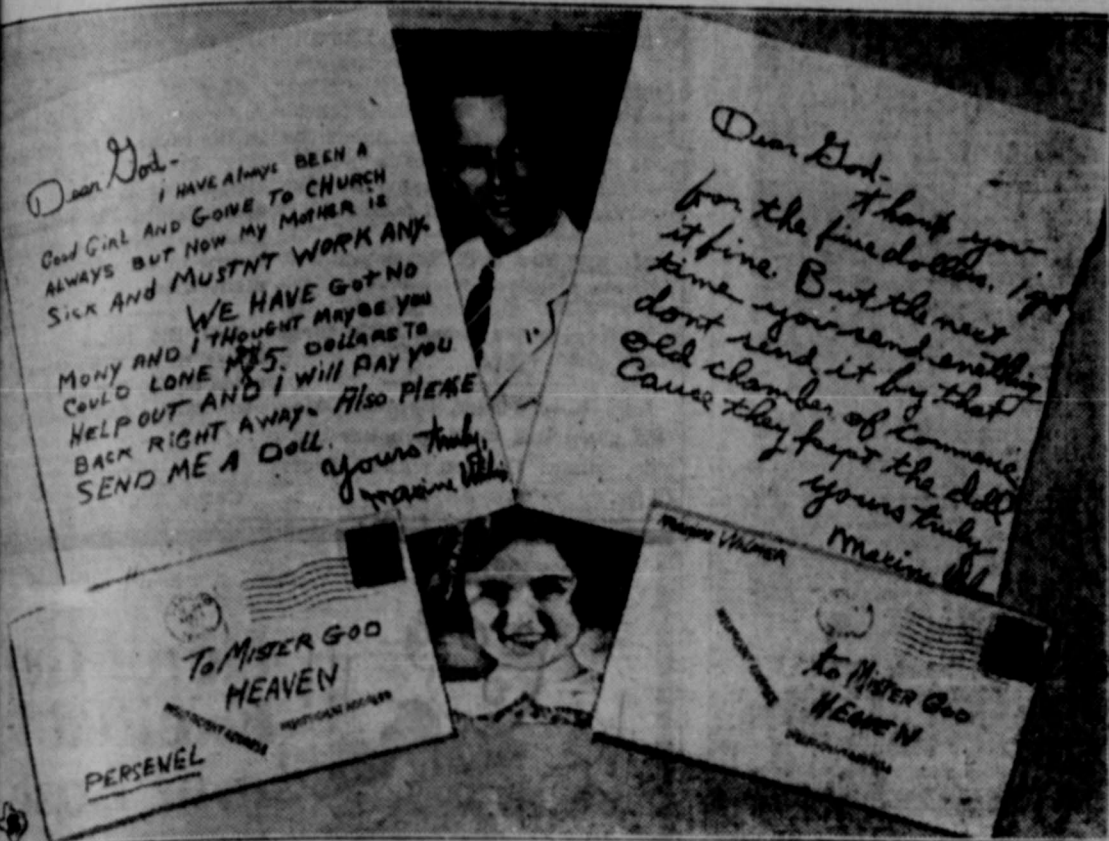

M., on Thursday, May 26. Rev. and Mrs. Hendrix left Perryton about two weeks ago for Gallup, expecting to bring Mrs. Hendrix's mother and sister back to Perryton with them. Arriving at Gallup, the found the mother rather indisposed but as her condition was not considered serious, they proceeded on to Mormon Lake, where they met a brother-in-law and sister who came from Phoenix, Ariz. On Monday, May 23, they received a sick call from the mother stating that her condition was very serious. On their arrival back to Gallup, they found her alive and at times conscious. On Thursday, May 26, she revived, and it was thought for a short time that she would recover and be able to accompany them back to Perryton, but that evening she passed on at nine o'clock and was buried the next afternoon in a Gallup cemetery. Rev. and Mrs. Hendrix expect to return to Perryton tomorrow, Friday.

LIVESTOCK CO-OP TO PAY DIVIDEND

After having been in operation on the yards at Oklahoma City only since Oct. 19, 1931, the Oklahoma Livestock Marketing association has announced that in the next few days it will pay a 10 per cent "dividend" to its members. Each member of the association will receive exactly 10 per cent of the amount of commissions paid by him on livestock handled through the association.

So far as is known, according to the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman,

the Oklahoma association is the first market agency owned and operated by stockmen on any terminal market of the nation to make a distribution of profits to members at the end of the first six months.

"It is hardly accurate to call the payment made to the members a dividend," the Farmer-Stockman continues. "In fact, it is not a dividend earned on the stock investment. The payment is a rebate of a part of the commissions collected. The co-ops call it a patronage dividend, being based on the amount of business done by each member stockholder of the association."

"The marketing association continued to grow. Its membership on May 15 was 1,161. It grows at the rate of over 100 members a month. Nearly all of this is voluntary growth. Most of the memberships come to the association through the mail from those who want to identify themselves with the organization and want to do so badly enough to sit down, write a letter and send the association \$1 in payment for one share of stock."

"The association still has all of its paid-in capital stock on hand as cash. As \$1 memberships are received this money also goes into the cash capital fund. Every expense of every kind to date has been paid out of operating income. In addition to this it is building up a cash reserve."

"If the marketing association had chosen to pay out to members its entire profits earned the first six months, the patronage dividend, or rebate, would have been equal to 25 per cent of commissions paid by members for selling livestock. The board of directors did not deem it wise to so distribute its profits. A strong organization is one with cash reserves built up to take care of

emergencies. The board felt that the marketing association should be fortified with reserves against what the future might hold and so the dividend was held to 10 per cent."
