Mercury Soars In Upper 90's Past 10 Days

Old Man Summer will officially take over Saturday, June 21, the longest day in the year, but for the past 10 days he has been on a pre-season venture. The mercury has soared upward into the upper 90's.

Farmers have been busy in fields, chopping cotton, plowing, putting up hay, combining vetch crops, and doing other farm work. Cotton is a little late this year, because of continued rains and cold weather about planting time. Most of it has been chopped out and is growing good. No one has reported cotton blooms in fields up to this time.

A good slow, easy rain would be beneficial to the tomato crop in the Bogata area. The heat will cause tomatoes to blister and to mature earlier. Other truck crops and gardens are showing signs of the heat.

Price Daniel to Speak at Mount Pleasant June 27

Price Daniel will bring his campaign for the United States Senate to Mt. Pleasant on Friday, June 27, with a meeting at the Courthouse at 5:00 p. m.

Daniel, who is completing six years as Attorney General of Texas, has won national recognition for his fight to save the tide-lands for the Texas public school fund and for his fight against organized crime and the gambling syndicate.

B. M. Sandlin of Mt. Pleasant is in charge of arrangements for the local meeting. Mr. Sandlin said that Price Daniel would make a speech at the Courthouse promptly after the 5:00 o'clock meeting begins and that the meeting will end by 5:30 p. m. He urged all supporters of Price Daniel and all interested citizens to hear the candidate speak.

In a speech directly to the people of Texas, Daniel announced his candidacy for the Senate January 21 and since then he has been dividing his time between the campaign and his official duties as Attorney General.

Daniel attained his legislative experience as a Member and as Speaker of the House in the Texas Legislature. He waived his legislative exemption in World War II, enlisting as a private in the Army and served three years before being discharged with the rank of Captain.

Daniel is the father of four children, all of whom are direct descendants of the hero of San Jacinto, General Sam Houston. Mrs. Daniel is a great-granddaughter of General Sam Houston.

Oil Production is Ordered Reduced

Texas Railroad Commission cut oil production for July at its Tuesday meeting.

It ordered July allowables set at 2,707,276 barrels a day, down 164,017. The new figure is 487,806 barrels below the record quota set by Texas last March.

A 284,936,000-barrel United States crude stock, backed up by pleas that West Texas operators have a surplus, caused the commission to make the cut.

This happened despite the fact that Humble Oil & Refining Company and the Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners Association opposed any reduction. Humble and TIRPO often disagree.

The commission pegged July production at eighteen days for fields generally and nineteen for the East Texas field. Hawkins field, Wood County, will produce fifteen days; Pickton, Hopkins County, fourteen days; and Millican, Coke County, ten days.

May Establish Game Preserve Along White Oak

An effort is being made to establish a game preserve along White Oak creek from the Hoffman ranch, just east of Talco to Highway 11, running north from Omaha to DeKalb.

Allen Springs, wildlife biologist for the State Game and Fish Commission, in company with Jack Langston, president of the Northeast Texas Wildlife Association, sponsors of the proposed project, have made an inspection tour of the site. The report indicates that the area is very suitable for the propagation of deer and it is believed the area will be stocked this winter.

At the present time the Wildlife Association has a pledge of approximately 3,500 acres of land for the preserve, and other owners in the vicinity of the preserve who wish their lands included have only to write Mr. Langston, Route 5, Mt. Pleasant. Proper blanks will be mailed to those who request them.

Only Third Titus Cars Inspected

With 6,200 registered vehicles in Titus County, only 2,074 have been inspected.

Car and truck owners are reminded again that the final date for inspection is Sept. 6, 1952. After that time it will be a violation of the law to drive an un-inspected motor vehicle. They are reminded also, that the eight inspection stations in Mt. Pleasant can take care of only a limited number of cars each day, and to handle approximately 4,000 cars between now and September 6 will tax their facilities to the limit.

Drivers who continue to wait for inspections may find themselves prohibited from operating their vehicles after the final deadline.

Three Wells Down And New Location At Sugar Hill

Three tests for oil, east of Talco were at interesting depths on Tuesday. At Sugar Hill John B. Stephens and A. O. Phillips No. 2, F. H. Anschultz, was reported at 4,000 feet, about 200 short of the Paluxy if it is found there.

B. G. Byars' John Parr in the same locality, being drilled by Cooper-Herring, was coring.

Further east Pewitt's No. 1, 4 miles east of production on the Pewitt ranch had reached 4,100 feet.

Back at Sugar Hill, Stephens & Phillips have staked location for their No. 4 F. H. Anschultz. It is 727 from the south and 330 from the east lines of the 79-acre tract in the M. J. Davis survey. That puts it north of the No. 1 discovery.

New leasing is being reported for the Mount Vernon area in Franklin County.

Latest to be recorded is six miles east and northeast of the townsite by Leon Leggett, who is leasing at \$5 per acre tracts in the John Humphrie, Ann English, D. T. Robinson, Joseph Reed and Godfrey Etheridge surveys.

Trading is still taking place in the townsite. Recently M. V. Shaw, Longview, took assignments on twenty-two lots there.

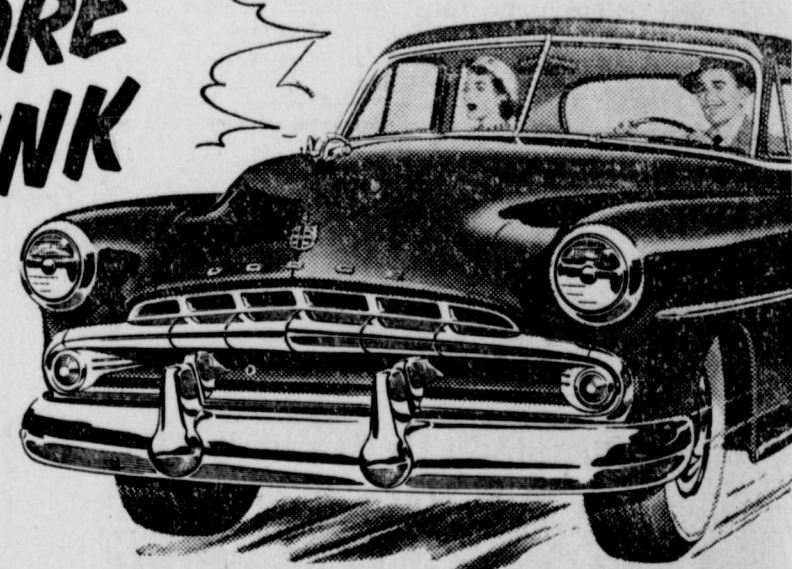

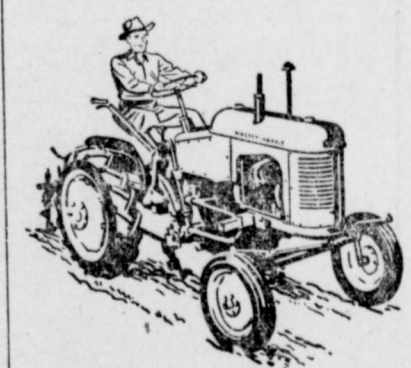

Tomato crop in the Bogata area is expected to start moving to market next week. Dry weather with no moisture for nearly three weeks is retarding production. What the crop needs is a good rain, appears to be the general opinion.

Tomato plants are said to be holding up well, considering the intense heat, but must have moisture soon.

In the Jacksonville area per acre yield is reported short, with demand and prices good. No. 1's brought 14 to 15 cents, and field runs in bushel lots \$5.00 to \$5.25.

Bean crop in the Bogata area is moving to market at 5 cents per pound. They are reported producing a ton or better per acre and the quality is good, according to M. B. Trimm, Bogata ag. teacher. Over 10,000 pounds were sold Monday, according to S. T. Smith of the First National.

Award Contract to Channel Mustang

Contract for channeling 2.6 miles of Mustang creek from a point south of Deport, south toward Sulphur, has been awarded by Federal engineers to a contractor named Milling.

He had his engineers running lines at location on Wednesday afternoon and told Tom Jeffus he would move machinery and begin work about July 15.

An appropriation of \$25,000 was made for additional clearing and channeling and it is presumed that amount will be spent in doing the work.

Deport had asked for \$50,000 for this work several years ago and half the amount was granted. This was spent and it did much good, but high water from Mustang continued to cause damage in the business district of Deport and adjacent farm lands.

These figures are on record in your District Clerk's office and are open for your inspection at any time.

I am not now, nor will I ever become obligated to any person or group seeking special favors under the law. I owe allegiance to the law, to the truth and to justice, these shall ever be my guiding principles.

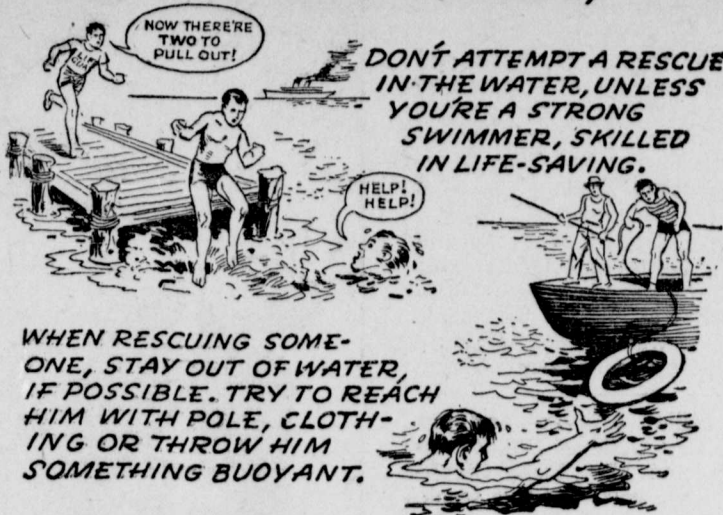

JUSTIFICATION

Sin is a terrible thing. It brings misery and suffering in the world. It separates man from God, and its wages is eternal death. Hence, one of the truly wonderful things about the gospel of Christ is that it provides justification for the sinner. The poor sin-burdened soul need not despair of hope for God has, through His son, Jesus, made possible the sinner's justification.

Paul wrote to Christians at Corinth and reminded them of an ugly catalogue of sins (1 Cor. 6:9-11) which he declared would keep men from inheriting the kingdom of heaven. Then he said that the Corinthians had once been guilty of all these sins, "but," he suggested, "ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God." Hence, the Corinthians had been justified from sin.

Paul could not have used a better term than the word JUSTIFIED to set forth the completeness of the Corinthians' forgiveness. Let us consider what the word implies. Occasionally some man takes the life of one of his fellows, and when the grand jury meets for the purpose of deciding with what he shall be charged, after a consideration of the facts, they declare his case to be one of justifiable homicide. This simply means that the defendant took the life of his fellowman, but that under the circumstances he HAD THE RIGHT TO DO IT. Now, you and I know that we have no right to sin. No one has a right to sin, but when man has sinned it is possible for him, through obedience to the gospel of our Lord, to reach a point in the mind of God where it is as though he had had the right to sin. O wonderful thought, so full of comfort and encouragement!

Now, the question arises in our minds: "How did these Corinthians, who were once such vile sinners, attain unto this state of justification?" Paul says that they arrived at this state through having been washed (1 Cor. 6:11). Well, when and how were they washed? The answer is they had been baptized. When Paul had gone to Corinth preaching the gospel he had found these people groping in the errors and superstitions of idolatry, and walking in their own lusts. As Paul brought them the story of Christ's death, burial, and resurrection, and reminded them that all of this was for their justification "Many of the Corinthians hearing, believed, and were baptized." Acts 18:8.

Baptism is a washing. It is a washing away of sins. (Acts 22:16). Hence, the washing that the Corinthians had received was baptism. In baptism their sins were washed away, and they were justified. By the same process they came into Christ (Gal. 3:27), and became New Creatures (2 Cor. 5:17). Old things for them passed away and all things for them became new. Thus they reached a point, in the mind of God, where it was as though they had the right to sin. They were JUSTIFIED.

Dear Editor: It's a long way from out here on Sulphur to Korea and hasn't anybody asked me for my opinion but it seems to me the men who have been supervising the prisoners of war on Kojima Island never did get around to learnin' a few basic facts about human nature.

The way to run a prisoner of war camp is the same as the way to run your own affairs, your own business, or your own farm, or anything else. The way to run it is like you think it ought to be run, not like somebody else thinks it ought to be run.

Take a man here at home. If he's always wonderin' how the next business step he takes is gonna affect somebody else, he's whipped to start with. The fellow that won't decide how much he ought to donate to the Red Cross or the church or anything else, the one who hedges and tries

to find out how much somebody else gave so he can stay in line, ain't near as self-satisfied or respected as the man who makes up his own mind on how much he can give and hauls off and gives it, regardless of what anybody else does, and if he over-shoots or under-shoots his neighbor, it doesn't matter a particle.

Now take those officials in charge of those prisoner of war camps over on Kojima. Instead of runnin' the things like they ought to be run, they been leanin' over backwards to run em so they offend the enemy, on the theory if they don't please the enemy the latter will take it out on American prisoners of war in their hands.

This is known as baloney. If the Communists want to do anything they're good at, it's manufacturing excuses. We could furnish those prisoners of war with Turkish baths twice a day and air-conditioned loungin' rooms and four-bit cigars, and if the Communists wanted to mistreat American prisoners, them cigars and

Tex. Editors Visit Chemical Plant on Texas Coast

Delegates to the Texas Press Association, meeting in Houston this year took a look at the booming Brazosport area on June 14 as guests of the Dow Chemical Co., Brazoria County newspapers and the county's three chambers of commerce.

They visited Freeport and Lake Jackson as one of the features of the TPA's annual meeting in Houston.

A highlight of the visit was a tour of the 3,000-acre Dow plants, built in the 12 years since the company came to Texas to extract magnesium and bromine from the seawater of the Gulf of Mexico. Now Dow makes 65 chemicals, employs 5500 people, and is in the midst of a large expansion program.

"We regard the frontiers of industrial chemistry as still barely tapped," Dr. A. P. Beutel, Dow vice president and Texas division general manager, said in welcoming the TPA. "In the years since Dow first came to Freeport, many chemical companies have also found that coming to Texas is mighty good business. It is good business for everybody concerned—this multiplication of nature's resources for the use of man by chemistry.

"Dow is working steadily to put many of nature's most bountiful and largely-neglected resources into the service of man," he continued. "Out of seawater, out of salt, out of natural gas—out of many other previously-unutilized fluids, minerals, and gases—have come hundreds of chemicals which help make our lives more enjoyable and secure."

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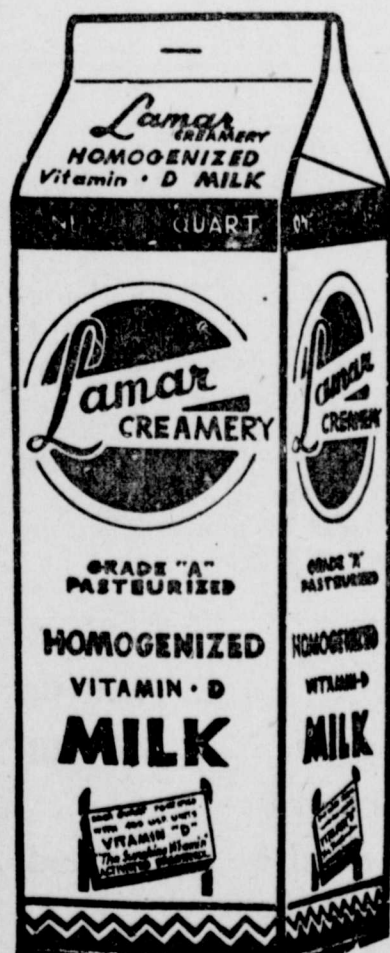
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
