

Anderson Defeats Hargett In Election

Harrison County Judge Richard Anderson became the victor over Linden's Edd Hargett in Saturday's run-off election to replace retired State Senator Ed Howard, D-Texas.

Anderson claimed 58 percent of the 72,125 votes cast district wide. Hargett received 42 percent.

Anderson took a two-to-one lead

over Hargett early in the evening and continued in the lead throughout the night. Red River County voters gave Anderson a total of 1,642 votes to Hargett's 762. Box totals are as follows:

Following the election, Anderson stated that he believed the results of the election proved that negative campaigning does not work in East Texas, referring to Edd Hargett's bringing up his (Anderson) 1980 Civil

contempt of court charge and brief detention in the Bell County Jail over child support due his ex-wife. Anderson labeled Hargett's tactic as East Texas mud-slinging.

It was reported that Hargett blamed the failure of supporters of Edd Hargett to turnout to vote as one of the contributing factors to his losing the election.

The only reply I could muster was, "Yes, it really is but you know, I think that armadillo did eat some of those beans!"

His reply was, "He probably did. I was up that way last week, and I heard an armadillo go rattling by. I thought he had been eating marbles, but I bet it was those beans!"

I knew by then my reputation was in the balance.

My long-standing friend, Dicky King, said the other night that his five-year old daughter didn't want to go to school anymore after only three days of exposure to that new way of life. I have decided it's not the school she doesn't like, it's because she is ashamed of Daddy Dicky and Uncle Thomas, whom thousands of people have read in the newspaper, how the bumbling fools can't even cook beans!

towns do not give."

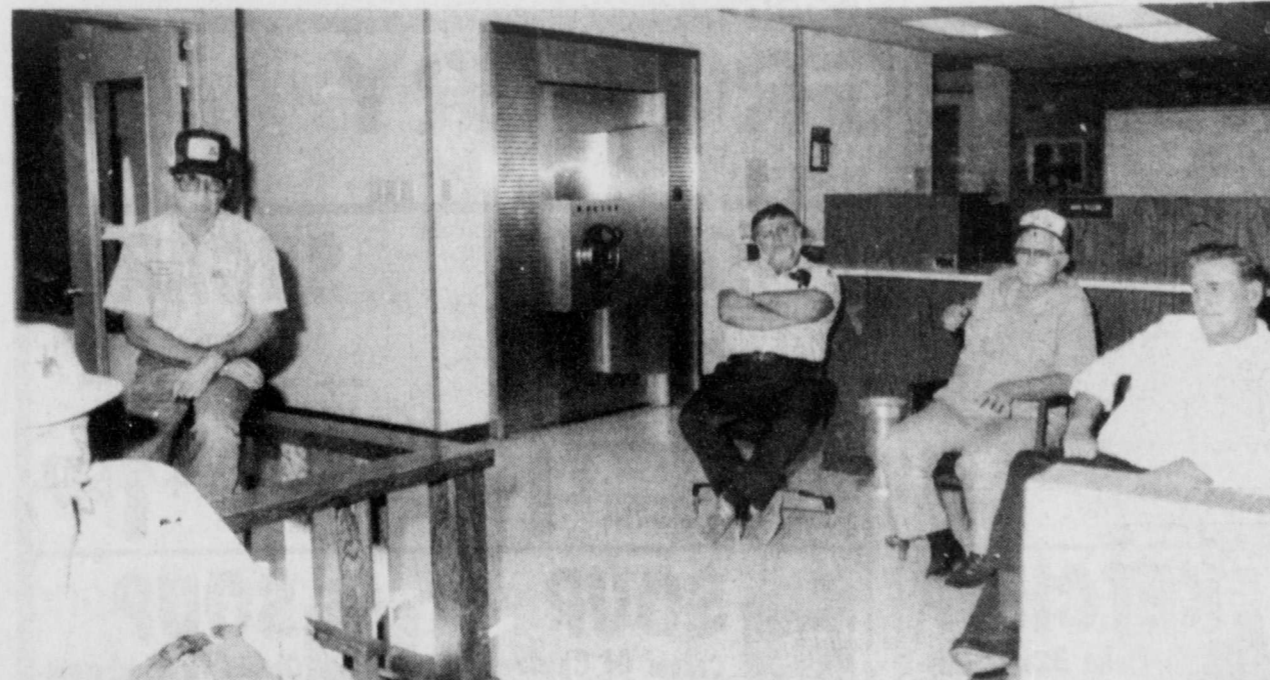
Thomas Nichols, Managing Editor for Thunder Prairie Publishing Co., offered the paper's assistance in promotion plans for the city.

Council Tables Curfew Due To Lack Of Support

After some discussion, the Bogata City Council tabled the curfew issue in a regular meeting of the council, Tuesday night, September 9. The council had expected the attendance

of Bogata residents at the meeting to state their opinions for or against the setting of the curfew, however, there were none. The issue is to be placed on the agenda for the next meeting, which will be Tuesday night, October 14 at 7:30 p.m.

Other business conducted was the HUD report by John Hood. The council approved payments to Dewey Wilburn Contractor for work when approved by the inspector.

A report from Attorney Rick Standifer was given on the proceedings on the suit against a Bogata resident for failure to hook up to the city sewer system.

The council heard a report of Hayter Engineering Co. and approved payments for Johansson Construction Co. for work on the sewer plant, and to Caldwell Tank Co. for work on the tank, which is 77% complete.

The council voted to defer payment on construction by Barney Bray Construction Co. until remaining condi-

tions are corrected.

There was a discussion of asphaltting the alley behind the new post office with the possibility of a called special meeting after estimates for the work are received.

The council approved motions to enlarge the culvert on Third Street, to transfer court funds to the general fund account, and to allow city workers to clean up Main Street once a week.

Purchase of a computer system for the city was discussed and the council instructed Anita Couch, City Secretary to make a trip to Quitman to look at the system and see how it works and report back to them. The council noted that the system would allow time for city tax collections to be made in Bogata at the City Hall.

The Council approved the motion to engage Harper, a CPA from Avery to investigate the discrepancies of tax collections at the Red River County Appraisal District.

The council voted to adopt a resolution of support for the locating of a minimum security prison near Clarksville.

Donations Needed For School Picture Frame

Donations are needed to finish paying for the swing panel system bought to frame the Bogata High School pictures.

The frame was bought to preserve the pictures of the school's graduating classes from 1937 to 1965 which were being damaged from storage. The pictures are now on display at the V&S and True Value Hardware Store in Bogata.

The cost for the panel system was \$1,270. Money from the Bogata Homecoming Fund was used to pay

Farmers Defeat Rebels

The Rivercrest Rebels traveled to Farmersville last Friday night looking for their first win of the young season. But instead the Rebels ran into Anthony Craddock, a 195 pound senior fullback, who dashed any hopes the Rebels might have of victory.

Farmersville wasted little time moving 70 yards to take an early 6-0 lead with only two minutes gone from the clock. Anthony Craddock accounted for the bulk of the drive, but the Rebels answered with an impressive drive of their own.

The drive started on the Rebel 20-yard line and with a good mixture of passing and running, they pushed the ball to the Farmers' 15-yard line. Then disaster followed as the Rebels lost a fumble to the Farmers. Farmersville mounted two more offensive drives late in the second quarter, but a swarming Rebel defense ended both possessions forcing unsuccessful field goal attempts, thus leaving the score 6-0 at halftime.

Both teams opened the third quarter eager to play, but the Farmers proved too much for the

smaller Rebels. Farmersville scored quickly in the third quarter on a run by Anthony Craddock. The Rebels were unable to put together a sustained drive in the third quarter but allowed the Farmers one more touchdown in this period.

In the fourth quarter, Rivercrest was still unable to generate any offense, but Anthony Craddock continued to pound away at the Rebel Defense.

Despite a fine effort by the defensive line and secondary, Craddock gained 225 yards on 20 carries for the evening.

The Rebel offense fared much better this week than last. Sporting a new split-back offense Rivercrest gained 134 yards total offense. Senior wingback Amos Brown accounted for the bulk of the Rebel rushing attack as he had 82 yards on 16 carries. Quarterback Jimmy Lewis passed for 42 yards, four to split-end Chris Anderson and one to split-end Marvin Anderson.

The Rebels will be at home Friday night to meet the AAA Mt. Vernon Tigers. Kick off is at 8 p.m. at Rebel Stadium.

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitation and restrictions provided by law

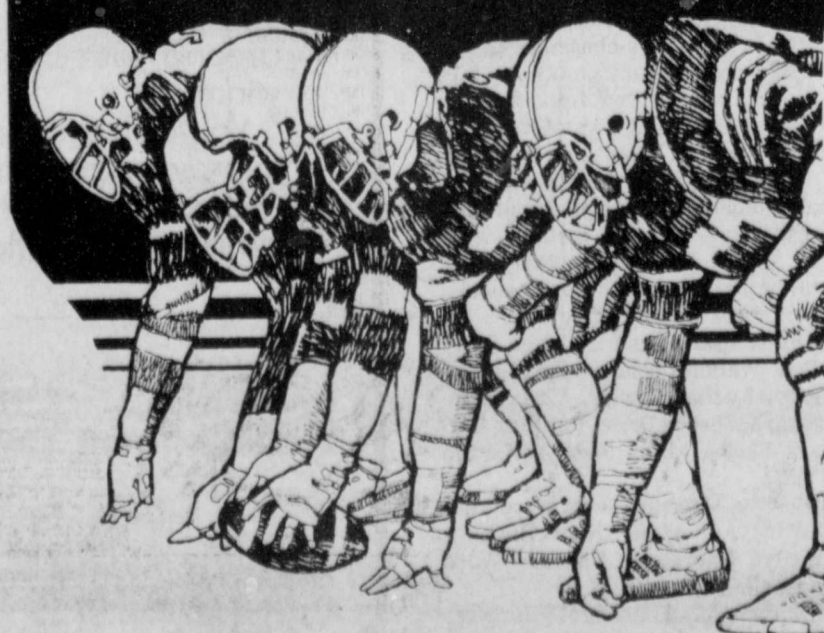

Area Resident Recalls Life In War Torn Germany

Crystal Maria Elizabeth Weinert Mayfield became a United States citizen in 1964 by naturalization.

Lisa, as she's called by family and friends here in the states, was born in Berlin in 1939. Although she speaks with affection for her native land, when asked about her allegiance she quickly replies, "I'm a genuine Southerner and Texan from the good ol' USA."

Lisa recalls with sometimes painful clarity, the rise of Hitler's power and her life in Germany during World War II.

At age four, she remembers walking through the market place in Berlin with her mother and seeing three people hanged there with a sign over them which read "Punishment for speaking against your Fuhrer."

In the years that followed, she recalls the scarcity of food and standing in long lines in freezing weather for hours to receive her family's rations only to be turned away because the store had run out of supplies. Even friends could not be trusted during this time. There was always the possibility that anything said against Hitler would be reported.

Lisa's father, Carl Weinert, was serving as Master Sergeant in the German Infantry assigned to the Russian front. He refused to become an officer for the Nazi force. Lisa's mother took great risks by warning her children about the evils of Hitler and the Third Reich. She also risked her life and that of her family's by hiding and feeding many of the persecuted Jews.

Bomb raids and enemy attacks were daily happenings and frantic flights to bomb shelters for protection were common for Lisa and her family.

On May 9, 1945, Lisa recalls that the Russians marched into Germany. They were told they had nothing to fear from the Russians, however, many of the soldiers looted the houses, raped the women, and brought fear and terror to the people. Lisa's grandmother barely escaped being shot by a group of these Communist terrorists when they broke down the door of their house and entered. Lisa's mother was able to slip out and run to help and the family was spared.

Lisa's father was captured while retreating by the English and was hospitalized because of severe frost bite to his feet. He was treated and allowed to return home in August of 1945 only to be picked up two hours later for interrogation by the Russians. Although he was soon released, he realized what was sure to happen

to East Germany due to the Communist take over, so through contacts with the black market, he planned the exodus of his family. He was able to escape into West Germany with the two older sons and plans were for Mrs. Weinert, Lisa and the younger brother to follow at a later date, however, a neighbor reported to officials that Mr. Weinert and the two boys were missing and a surveillance was placed on the remaining family. The family was separated for seven years.

Mrs. Weinert developed a severe gall bladder infection and was sent with Lisa to West Germany for an operation. The younger brother was kept in East Germany as "insurance" that they would return. While in West Germany, Lisa was able to see the freedom of the people there and the availability of food and clothing which could not be obtained in East Germany. After returning to East Germany, Lisa was enrolled in the Communist school. One of the Communist teachers began teaching the students that the Americans had destroyed all the crops in West Germany and the people there were starving. Lisa stood and recited these accusations, relaying the facts about West Germany that she had learned from her visit. She was promptly called to the office and confronted by Russian officials and the German Police. Through efforts of another teacher, whose Jewish wife had been helped by Mrs. Weinert, Lisa was released from the charges.

Realizing the grave danger their lives were in, Mrs. Weinert worked feverishly trying to find a way to get to the other side. Finally, by giving an official some very expensive paintings which she had kept hidden, she

was able to secure passports for herself, Lisa and the younger child.

By using these passports, they were able to board the train just three miles from the West German border. Just before the train was to leave, Mrs. Weinert was escorted from the train by Russian officers, taken to a room next to the train, stripped and searched. As she was being allowed to get dressed, she heard the train whistle blow in departure. Realizing that the train was leaving with her children on board, she had only enough time to grab her coat, rush from the room and jump the train. She rode the three miles on the outside of the train in freezing rain. At the West German border, American soldiers came aboard and found Mrs. Weinert, her hands frozen to the rails. The first American words her mother recalls hearing in West Germany were those of one of the soldiers who said to her, "Did you make it, Baby?"

The family was reunited in West Germany and Lisa lived there until 1956 when she married an American soldier of German descent and came to the United States.

Although most of the memories Lisa has of her life in East Germany are ones of sorrow, she tells her story with no tone of bitterness. In fact, it seems the hardships have had an influence on making her the kind and loving person she is.

Lisa now lives with her husband, Clyde Mayfield, on Highway 910 between Cuthand and Clarksville. She returns to West Germany to visit her family about once every two years. She has four children, Fred Hildebrand of Houston, and Greg Hildebrand, John Haynes and Tina Williams, all of Bogata.

Time To Spray Weeds

By Herb Brevard

The next 30 days is the time to put a preemerge herbicide application on home lawns to control winter and early spring weeds, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The herbicides, if properly applied, take out winter weeds and help the desired grass spread quicker in the spring by eliminating competition.

Balan, Simazine and Ronstar are examples of the type herbicides which can be used in lawns. Others are also available. These herbicides come in liquid or granular form or may be purchased already mixed in fertilizer. All are effective if used properly.

Most of the approved products can be used around trees or shrubs that have been planted for at least one year. Herbicides should be kept out of flower beds, especially where flowers

will be planted within six months or so.

Approved preemerge herbicides can be applied to bermudagrass, centipede and St. Augustine grass. The herbicides need to be applied now, especially to centipede and St. Augustine. The reason is that after the weeds come up, chemicals that will kill the weeds will also kill the centipede or St. Augustine. Post emerge herbicides are available for bermudagrass lawns that will kill the weeds and not harm the bermudagrass.

When using the fertilizer with the preemerge herbicide mixed, do not double fertilize with the fertilizer-herbicide combination. The extra herbicide can damage trees, shrubs and the grass.

Read and follow label directions on both the herbicides and fertilizer and herbicide combinations.

Household Bleach Plus Ammonia Toxic Combination

The combination of household bleach with ammonia, two relatively safe cleaning agents when used separately, can cause toxic pneumonitis—severe airways irritation and inflammation. According to *Medical Times*, two University of Missouri, Kansas City, School of Medicine doctors treated patients who had combined these household chemicals. The patients exposed to the combination of chemicals required hospitalization, needed antibiotics, and suffered from lasting lung function impairment (reduced vital capacity) and shortness of breath.

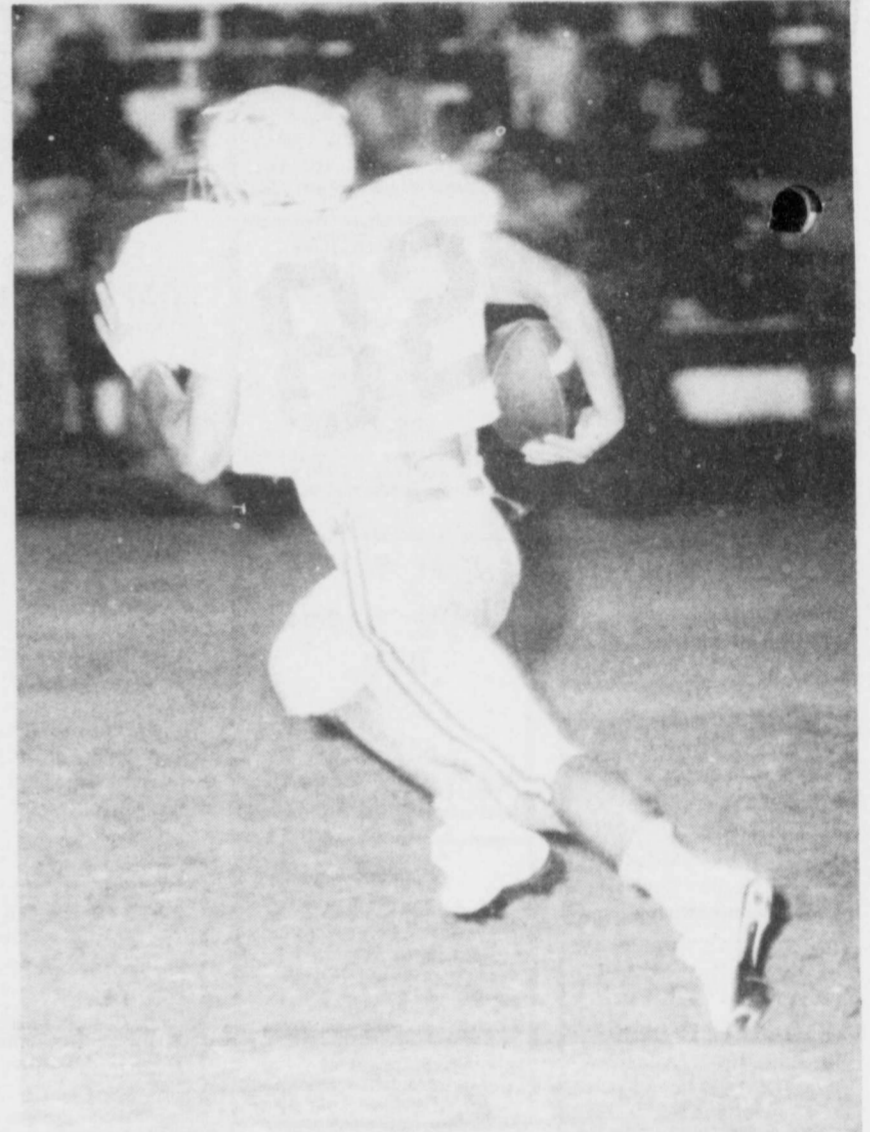

Bogata's Hobo,
Where
Did He Go?

Whatever happened to old Bob Vinson? For those of you who do not recognize the name, he was the town hobo several years ago. He slept in various old buildings around town and worked at odd jobs for those who would use him. He ate some of his meals at Mrs. Bogie's Cafe, which was located at that time on 271, where Guess Feed Store is now. The meals he ate were usually consisted of chili and crackers and lots of water to drink.

Bob was a fairly large man and was very shabbily dressed. This was evidently a chosen way of life for him. Often people would buy or give Bob new clothes, but he'd usually discard them for his old tattered ones.

Bob was always kind and no one seemed to be afraid of him. I don't ever remember him causing any trouble or bothering anyone.

When he needed money for a meal, he would sometimes come to our house and ask for work at my dad's sawmill. Daddy would always find something for him to do. On those days when he worked at the mill, after we had eaten lunch, Daddy would call Bob and feed him. There was never anything left over when he finished. He could consume a great amount of food.

On Sundays, it was common practice for my married sisters and their husbands to all come for Sunday lunch at our house. On one of those Sundays, when we arrived home from

church, Bob was there waiting. He told my dad he was hungry and asked if he would give him something to eat. My dad invited him in and when the meal was prepared, Daddy called Bob to the table and sat him at the head of it. Grace was said and the food was passed around. Old Bob ate to his fill that day. The rest of us were

a little startled at first, but I think it made an impression on us all. I know for sure it made one on me. I've thought about this act of kindness by my dad a lot through the years. I had always been taught the Golden Rule, but this was the rule in action. There's an old saying that I've found to be true, "Actions speak louder than words".

Bob left Bogata after a few years. Many have reported seeing him in different places from time to time, still living the way he likes—as a hobo.
